Town Warrant 1986

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Exeter, in the County of Rockingham, in said state qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Exeter, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, by official ballot, and to take other action required to be inserted on said official ballot; the polls to open at eight o'clock in the forenoon and to close not earlier than eight o'clock in the evening, and thereafter to reconvene at the Exeter High School gymnasium on Monday, March 17, 1986 at seven o'clock in the afternoon, for the purpose of acting on all other matters to come before the meeting.

ARTICLE 1

To choose by ballot and plurality vote two (2) selectmer for the term of three (3) years.

ARTICLE 2

To choose by ballot and plurality vote three (3) members of the Library Committee for the term of three (3) years.

ARTICLE 3

To choose by ballot and plurality vote one (1) Trustee of Trust Funds for the term of three (3) years.

ARTICLE 4

To choose by ballot and plurality vote one (1) Trustee of the Robinson Fund for the term of seven (7) years.

ARTICLE 5

To choose by ballot and plurality vote one (1) Trustee of the Swasey Parkway for the term of three (3) years. ARTICLE 6

To choose by ballot and plurality vote one (1) Supervisor of the Checklist for the term of six (6) years.

ARTICLE 7

To choose by ballot and plurality vote one (1) Moderator for the term of two (2) years.

ARTICLE 8

On petition of Edward Elcik and others, to see if the Town will adopt the provisions of REVISED STAT-UTES ANNOTATED 73:37 for the exemption for the blind from property tax. This statute provides that every inhabitant who is legally blind, shall be exempt each year from the property tax on a residence to the value of \$15,000.

ARTICLE 9 - Zoning Amendment #1

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 to the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board for this Town as follows?

Amend Section 6.88 "Growth Management" to increase the number of residential building permits restricted under this ordinance from 132 to 136 and other textural changes.

ARTICLE 10 - Zoning Amendment #2

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2 as

proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows?

Amend Article 2.20 "Definitions" definition of junkyard to conform with State law definition New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 236:112.

ARTICLE 11 - Zoning Amendment #3

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows?

Amend Article 7.30 "Enforcement" by substituting for the text "Enforcement procedures in accordance with New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 676:17." ARTICLE 12 - Zoning Amendment #4

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows?

Amend Article 7.20 "Building Code" to reference 1984 BOCA Basic/National Building Code, 1984 BOCA Basic/ National Fire Prevention Corde, and Life Safety Code NFPA Doc. No. 101, 1985.

ARTICLE 13 - Zoning Amendment #5

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Amend Article 8.20 "Fees" by increasing filing fees for Board of Adjustment Applications to Thirty-Five Dollars (\$35.00).

ARTICLE 14 - Building Code Amendment #1

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 as proposed by the Planning Board as follows?

Adopt by reference BOCA Basic /National Building Code, 1984 edition, in the place of the 1981 edition currently in force. Substitute for the violation and penalty sections of said code New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 676:17. Maintain all other locally adopted amendments, as previously adopted.

ARTICLE 15 - Building Code Amendment #2

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2 as proposed by the Planning Board as follows?

Substitute the 1985 Life Safety Code, NFPA Doc. No. 101 for the 1981 Life Safety Code, NFPA Doc. No. 101 previously adopted by the Town, substituting for the violation and penalty sections of said code New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 676:17 and granting appeals authority to Zoning Board of Adjustment.

ARTICLE 16 - Building Code Amendment #3

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #3 as

proposed by the planning Board as follows?

Adopt the 1984 BOCA Basic /National Fire Prevention Code by reference, substituting for the violation and penalty sections New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 676:17, and granting appeals authority to Zoning Board of Adjustment.

ARTICLE 17

To choose all other necessary Town Officers, Auditors, or Committees for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 18

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the construction of a new library building on property belonging to the Town and bounded by Chestnut Hill Street, Chestnut Street, and High Street, and the Squamscott River; and to appropriate a sum not to exceed Two Million Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,300,000.00) to be raised by the issuance of serial notes or bonds of the Town under, and in accordance with, the provisions of Chapter 33 (Municipal Finance Act) of NEW HAMPSHIRE REVISED STATUTES ANNOTATED, as amended, the discretion of fixing the date, maturity, interest, or discount rate, the place of payment, the form and other details of said bonds or notes, to be delegated to the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 19

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Trustees of the Public Library to expend funds (and accumulated interest) held in the Library Capital Reserve Fund established in 1982, as needed for the construction of a new public library.

ARTICLE 20

To see what sums of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the poor, for repairing and building bridges, for repairing and building side-walks, for building drains and sewers, for oiling streets, for payment of the Town departments, for lighting streets, for defraying expenses of decorating the graves of soldiers, for payment of firemen during the ensuing year, and for other charges arising within the Town.

ARTICLE 21

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropraite the sum of Five Hundred Ten Thousand Dollars (\$510,000.00) for the purpose of constructing the Court Street Pump Station, said project to be funded in the following manner:

\$402,500 Federal Aid 102,000 State Aid

25,500 Exeter Sewer Reserve

and to authorize the Selectmen to raise the sum of Ninety Seven Thousand Dollars (\$97,000.00) by the issuance of serial notes or bonds of the Town under, and in accordance with, the provisions of Chapter 33 (Municipal Finance Act) of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended; the discretion of fixing the date, maturity, interest, or discount rate, the place of payment, the form and other details of said bonds or notes, to be delegated to the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 22

To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of Ninety-Five Thousand Dollars (\$95,000.00) to pay the state share of the sewer project, Contract #6 Combined Sewer Overflow, in anticipation of the state repayment of said sum, and allow the Selectmen to raise said amount through the issuance of serial notes or bonds of the Town under, and in accordance with, the provisions of Chapter 33 (Municipal Finance Act), as amended; the discretion of

fixing the date, maturity, interest or discount rate, the place of payment, the form and other details of said bonds or notes, to be delegated to the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 23

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, and pursuant to New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Section 33.7 and Section 33.7-a to incur debt for temporary loans in anticipation of 1986 taxes, and in anticipation of any bond issue which may be voted by the Town, and to issue therefor notes of the Town payable within one (1) year after their date, and to pay or renew the same by issue of new notes payable within one (1) year after the date of the original publication.

ARTICLE 24

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of purchasing future rubbish trucks. And authorize the selectmen to act as agents for the Capital Reserve Fund. And to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) to establish the fund and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to be received by the Town in the 1986 calendar year.

ARTICLE 25

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund established in 1985 for the purpose of purchasing future fire trucks and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to be received by the Town in the 1986 calendar year.

ARTICLE 26

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for the purpose of structural renovations to town buildings to eliminate handicapped access restrictions, and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to be received by the Town in the 1986 calendar year.

ARTICLE 27

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) for the purpose of installing fire detection and alarms systems at the Public Works Garage and the Community Center, and for weatherization improvements at the Community Center.

ARTICLE 28

To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept, and expend money from the state, federal, or any other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 31, Section 95-b, requiring that such sums be used only for legal purposes for which a town may appropriate funds; and provided that the Selectmen hold a prior public hearing on the

action to be taken; and that town funds not be expended, including such federal funds as Land and Water Conservation Funds (LWCF) for the purpose of renovations and improvements to the recreation park swimming pool.

ARTICLE 29

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) for riverfront improvements at the old Sears Lot, so-called, and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to be received by the Town in the 1986 calendar year.

ARTICLE 30

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for site improvements salt shed repair, and spreader hangers at the public works facility on Newfields Road, and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to be received by the Town in the 1986 calendar year.

ARTICLE 31

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500.00) for a study of solid waste disposal alternatives, and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to be received by the Town in the 1986 calendar year.

ARTICLE 32

To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to withdraw the sum of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000.00) plus accrued interest from the Capital Reserve Fund established in 1983, for the purchase of a replacement Recreation bus.

ARTICLE 33

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00)to install a new well at the Public Works Garage and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to be received by the Town in the 1986 calendar year.

ARTICLE 34

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) for the purchase of 1.91 acres of land on Court Street abutting the Little River for the purpose of construction of the Court Street Sewer Pump Station and open space, and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Sewer Reserve.

ARTICLE 35

To see if the Town will vote to sell a parcel of land approximately 30,800 plus or minus square feet abutting the Webster Avenue Sewer Station and the property of Flynn's Car Wash, so-called, for the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00).

ARTICLE 36

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Col-

lector to accept prepayment of all taxes due for any current tax year.

ARTICLE 37

To see in the Town will vote to exempt verified Prisoners of War from the motor vehicle permit fee due the Town at the time of annual registration.

ARTICLE 38

To see if the Town will vote to fix the annual salary of the Town Clerk at Twenty-Five Thousand Two Hundred Eleven and Fifty-Five Hundredths Dollars (\$25,211.55) and to raise and appropriate an additional sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Twenty-Nine and Sixty-Seven Hundredths Dollars (\$2,529.67) above the sum budgeted therefor.

ARTICLE 39

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to withdraw the funds in the road and sidewalk trust funds for the purpose of continuing road improvements during the calendar year 1986.

ARTICLE 40

To see if the Town will vote to fix the annual salary of the Town Treasurer at Six Thousand Five Hundred Sixty Two and Forty-Five Hundredths Dollars (\$6,562.45), and to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Two and Forty Hundredths Dollars (\$252.40) above the sum budgeted therefor.

ARTICLE 41

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept as public highways, new streets that have been laid out and fully constructed in conformance with the Planning Board's Subdivision Regulations, including but not limited to compliance with NH Department of Public Works and Highways Manual 'Standard Specifications for Road and Bridge Construction', as amended, or its successor.

ARTICLE 42

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Eighty-One and Fifty Hundredths Dollars (\$8,081.50) as its contribution to the Rockingham Planning Commission.

ARTICLE 43

On the petition of Alan H. Vrooman to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$15,600.00) as partial reimbursement to the Exeter Area Visiting Nurses Association, Inc. for providing continual home health care services to residents of the Town of Exeter.

ARTICLE 44

On petition of Richard F. Niebling to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00) to defray a portion of the cost of services rendered by the Area Homemaker-Home Health Aide Service, Inc.

ARTICLE 45

On the petition of Rita A. Plante and others, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$9,500.00) for the Seacoast Mental Health Center.

ARTICLE 46

On petition of Marilyn Fellows York and others, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to assist the Newmarket/Exeter Child Care Centers, Inc., a non-profit child care agency.

ARTICLE 47

On petition of Paul R. Mahoney and others, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) tor Seacoast Big Brother / Big Sister, a non-profit volunteer oganization, to help defray some of the expenses for fiscal year 1986.

ARTICLE 48

On petition of Flavia J. Page and others, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$1,800.00) to help defray some of the expenses for fiscal year 1986-1987 of the Retired Senior Volunteer Program.

ARTICLE 49

On petition of Elizabeth M. Ford and others, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Seven Hundred Forty Dollars (33,740.00) to assist Seacoast Hospice, a non-profit organization.

ARTICLE 50

On petition of Maureen Barrows and others, to see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Six Hundred Seventy-Five Dollars (\$8,675.00) to assist Rockingham Child and Family Services, a private, non-profit social service organization.

ARTICLE 51

On petition of Katherine B. Cornell and others, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1.500.00) for A Safe Place, a shelter for battered women and their children operated by the Seacoast Task Force on Family Violence, a non-profit organization.

ARTICLE 52

On petition of Karen Moyer and others, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Eight Hundred Eighty-Eight Dollars (\$7,888.00) for the Greater Raymond Community Action Center, a part of Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc, a private, non-profit, anti-poverty agency. ARTICLE 53

On petition of Donald Briselden and others, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$3,400.00) for the Richie McFarland Children's Center, an early intervention center and non-profit organization.

ARTICLE 54

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to remove the Vital Statistics section from future Town Reports.

ARTICLE 55

To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to take such action as necessary to enable the Exeter Housing Authority, using such Federal and /or State funds as may become available, to develop fifty (50) dwelling units, more or less, of housing for lower income families and /or elderly, handicapped or disabled persons, and in this regard, to exercise powers of the Town conferred by NEW HAMPSHIRE REVISED STATUTES ANNOTATED Chapter 203, as amended. ARTICLE 56

On petition of Joanna Pellerin and others to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) for the use of the Exeter Conservation Commission to enable it to purchase land,

conservation Commission to enable it to purchase land, easements, or water rights; which purchase or purchases it deems to be in the public interest for the purpose of preserving open space and natural resources and providing sites for recreation.

ARTICLE 57

On petition of Joanna Pellerin and others to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Exeter Conservation Commission to apply for, secure, and accept such state or federal funds as may be available, and to spend therefrom for the purpose of acquiring land, easements, or water rights, in order to preserve open space and natural resources of the Town and to provide sites for recreation. ARTICLE 58

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell a parcel of land and buildings, known as the old Clemson Sewer Plant, acquired by the Town as a gift, for the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00).

ARTICLE 59

On petition of Jeffrey J. Warnock and others to directly authorize the Selectmen to either provide (a) direct extention of town services, or (b) a means to defray or reimburse annual expenses for snow removal, road sanding, and road grading on Runawit Road, Split Rock Road, and Indian Trail, so that fire, health and safety vehicles, as well as vehicles for the transportation of students, may be unimpeded.

ARTICLE 60

On petition of Helen Carr Dix and others to see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the municipal budget law.

ARTICLE 61

On petition of Barbara James and others to see if the Town will vote to oppose the burial, storage, transportation, and production of high level radioactive waste in the Town of Exeter and State of New Hampshire; and to call upon Congress to conduct an independent investigation with full public participation into the feasibility and prudence of the US Department of Energy's (DOE's) present plan to dispose of radioactive waste and into the DOE's competence to carry out such a plan. The record of

the vote shall be transmitted to the Governor of New Hampshire, the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation, and the President of the United States.

ARTICLE 62

On petition of Emily Carlson and others to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand (\$25,000) Dollars to be combined with funds from other sources to purchase a certain parcel of land owned by John Wentworth, off Allen Street, for public recreation and conservation.

ARTICLE 63

On petition of Herbert S. Moyer and others to see if the town will vote to require that: prior to the town's determination that the Radiological Emergency Response (Evacuation) Plan is approved and capable of being implemented, all officials, agencies, organizations, and individuals given an emergency response role in the plans sign a Letter of Agreement (as required by federal regulation NUREG 0654) indicating that they understand, are capable of and are willing to carry out their responsibilities listed in the town's Radiological Emergency Response Plan.

ARTICLE 64

To see if the Town will recommend approval of the Radiological Emergency Response Plan (RERP) as sumbitted in Draft dated January, 1986.

ARTICLE 65

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Exeter continues to find itself in the midst of an economic boom that will challenge everyone from taxpayers to those involved in local government. Nineteen Eighty-five was a very productive year. Everyone encountered. with surprising patience, the effects of the storm water separation program which, by the way, is expected to continue for several more years pending the availability of federal funds. The Public Works Department has a new director and a new look at their facility off the Newfields Road. Major renovations have taken place, including a new entrance and an addition to the public works garage. Planning also has a new director this year, as well as new challenges created by the current economic climate.

We feel an excellent job has been done by the Boards and Commissions, and the Town Manager and his team of department heads and employees leading the town through 1985. providing good services within their respective budgets. The proposed 1986 budget, excluding warrant articles, while showing an increase does not increase the tax rate. Most of the increase comes from labor contract negotiations that were successfully concluded earlier this year. Firm cost control measures have kept the budget in line, while at the same time, properly addressing maintenance programs, equipment replacement, and the needs of Exeter's residents.

Nineteen Eighty-Six will be the year when you should expect

significant steps to be taken in solid waste management, completion of a new master plan, street improvements, and waterfront development.

As has been the case in the past, it has been our pleasure working with all those who contributed so much and gave so freely of their time.

Town Managers's Report - 1985

Nineteen Eighty-five will go on record as the most dynamic growth period for the Town of Exeter. As a result of change in the growth, control ordinance, pre-existing conditions, and the completion of several projects. over three hundred new units were introduced to the community. Those homes served became new customers for our water and sewer services and all became recipients of one town service or another. The potential for future development is vast and the orderly introduction of the residential expansion will contribute greatly to the future of the community. A renewed effort in the industrial and commercial development of the town will balance the growth of governmental ser-

Shirley Sheehan, Exeter's Tax Collector for many years, retired in 1985 and, following a previous town meeting vote, the Tax Collector's office became a part of the office operations within the Town Office. The collection functions of taxes, and water and sewer fees have been combined in a new automated service area on the first floor of the Town Office.

The recent job changes of Robert Strout in Public Works, and Douglas Mellin in the Planning Department, have brought about some changes in those areas. I wish both men, and Shirley, well in their future years.

During the year, Department Heads and I continued to refine long term plans and forecast our needs for the years to come. As a result, we have a well defined long-range plan that covers the replacement and maintenance of vehicles, equipment and buildings.

A future goal will be established with the same type of plan for streets, sidewalks, and other public properties.

As part of the long-term plan and the 1985 budget, a number of projects were undertaken by town staff and selected vendors. An addition to the public works garage, site improvements and a new rubbish truck were several projects completed. A new fire pumper, forestry, and pick-up were placed in service, and the town will soon be serviced by a new ambulance. Access to public buildings by the handicapped is a continuing project and, in 1986,

implementation of the plans will be seen in the reconstruction of many entrances and restroom facilities.

Fiscal control has been a major area of concern for me and, in 1985, the Town tax rate provided a three (3%) percent increase in funds for the town to provide services. Exeter, like many other towns, experienced dreadful increases in the cost of insurance premiums, yet by year end, I am happy to report that the details included in the budget have been accomplished and a modest surplus will be available to reduce taxes in 1986. A goal of the 1986 budget is to stabilize the tax rate while continuing a reasonable replacement and maintenance schedule.

My compliments to all who have contributed to attaining the goals of 1985, and a challenge to all to continue that effort in the year to come. It has been a pleasure to share the accomplishments of 1985 with everyone.

Public Works Department

I am pleased to submit my first report to the citizens of Exeter.

The year has been a busy one for the Department. Robert Strout, former Director, left during the year to become Highway Agent in North Hampton. I assumed responsibility on August 5th.

The Department oversees and maintains approximately fifty miles of roads and sidewalks, the entire water/sewer and storm drain systems, all municipal buildings, trash and landfill operations, maintenance of Town equipment and vehicles. We experimented with a more comprehensive fall pickup week (with few exceptions worked out well and, next year will again pick up items not previously allowed), and we direct and inspect work being performed by contractors, engineers, and consultants doing work for the Town of Exeter.

The Highway Division accomplished the following: paved Phinney Lane, Drinkwater Road, Wheelwright Avenue, Towle Avenue, Thornton Street, and the shoulder of Water Street; oil and sand sealed Powder Mill Road, Beech Hill Road, Old Town Farm Road, Oakland Road, and Watson Road; approximately 420 feet of culvert pipe was laid to correct drainage problems; winter

storms were salt/sanded and plowed; and sidewalks were paved on Front and Court Streets.

The Water Division accomplished the following: repaired eighteen water main breaks and ten damaged hydrants; installed 300 feet of 4inch ductile iron pipe at Oak Haven Trailer Park, and 550 feet of 2-inch copper pipe on Morrow Street: continued working on the Meter Replacement Program; made more water service connections on High Street: flushed all hydrants in the spring. The Water Treatment Plant processed 373,365,515 gallons of water, with an average demand of 1,022,188 gallons per day. (This represents a 3 percent increase in water demand from 1984.) A new system installed at the plant was built to save thousands of gallons of treated water by utilizing setting lagoons to return filter back flushing water to the head works of the plants.

The Sewer Division cleaned and installed new aerators in the lagoons to better treat the effluent; continued to upgrade and refurbish the lift stations, and televised and video taped sections of sewer pipe to pinpoint failures for repair; worked with the contractor to locate buried pipes for

the storm water and sewer system separation project, and repaired and corrected numerous sewer main breaks and problems.

The Department purchased a new rubbish packer and demolished the old "chicken coop". Work has begun on the Department's grounds to provide a more attractive and safer work place. A new building addition has been erected at the garage for more secure storage of vehicles and supplies. We have started to buy engineering and drafting supplies to do more engineering and design in-house.

I am very happy to report I have found the employees of the Department to be hard working. dedicated, and loyal to the Town. This Department will continue to work hard and progress to better serve the residents and businesses of Exeter. My office will always be open to all people to discuss, comment, make suggestions, or complain about any activity or service this Department is responsible for. I look forward to working with the Town Manager, Selectmen, Department Heads, Town Employees, and all the residents in the upcoming vears.

Exeter Fire Department

During the year 1985, a dramatic increase of fire and rescue calls was received and handled by the Exeter Fire Department. No patterns have surfaced other than the Town is growing and our services are bound to increase.

I am delighted to report another productive year, as the dry hydrant projects are being completed, a comprehensive refurbishment of our 1975 Maxim pumper, and the fabrication of a new Forestry unit on a 1985 GMC chassis, all of which were accomplished by our own personnel with hundreds of hours of volunteer time.

Joining our fleet this year is a 1986 Ford Diesel Rescue Unit, which replaces the present 1979 unit.

Although it has been a good year for us, we did not escape without a new conflagration as the Loaf & Ladle Restaurant was almost totally destroyed by a fire in October. One hundred fifty firefighters from New Hampshire and Massachusetts turned their efforts from offense to defense as the fire threatened another nearby building. Exeter's water system, coupled with a recently installed dry hydrant, proved to be sufficient to handle the volume

of mutual aid units at the fire scene.

Perhaps the most significant accomplishment of the entire year was the new fire insurance rating, by the Insurance Service Office, which was lowered to a Class 4 rating. This new rating will result in possible lower insurance premiums for some of Exeter; s mercantile properties.

In summary, I wish to thank all of the other Town agencies for their cooperation during 1985.

Planning Board

Nineteen Eighty-Five marks a year of challenge, excitement, transition and accomplishment for the Exeter Planning Board. The upswing of the economic pendulum has continued to fuel the building boom of the southern tier of New Hampshire. The Planning Board, probably more than any other town committee or board, has most directly felt its effects.

In 1985, the Board met a total of 53 times (not including weekend site visits and special work sessions), usually weekly and often to the early hours of the morning, in trying to keep up with the rapid pace of development. The Board has continued to grapple with growth pressures to assure that development occurs in a managed fashion without overtaxing municipal services

and harming the unique qualities that make Exeter an appealing community within which to live.

Over 50 applications were processed: 24 for subdivisions of land into 95 new house lots and 27 for multi-family residential, commercial and industrial site developments. Among those were two residential developments: the 22 unit Belmonte Estates off Kingston Road and the 79 unit Exeter Falls Trust subdivision off Hampton Falls Road.

Nineteen Eighty-Five brought positive commercial and industrial growth to expand the local tax base and provide employment opportu-nities. In February, the Planning Board endorsed a proposal, which was later approved at the Town Meeting, to create a new Professional/Technology Park zone off the Spur Road. This zoning change paved the way for the construction of two corporate headquarters of subsidiary companies of Tyco Laboratories Inc. In addition, the Exeter Industrial Park, after laying dormant for a number of years, has shown no signs of life. Plans for its expansion and the development of two new sites for manufacturing facilities were approved during the summer and fall. With the amount of vacant industrial land diminishing, future planning efforts will be directed toward providing more opportunities for economic development.

Perhap the most exciting and vibrant of all projects to come before the Board in 1985 was the redevelopment of the former Nike/Clemson Mill into 140 housing units and commercial office space. Plans emerged in early summer to revitalize the historic mill and put it back to a productive use after being vacant for two years. The Board will finalize its review of the plans in early 1986, paying careful attention to keeping traffic impacts to a minimum and assuring that the public is granted access to the waterfront.

In addition to reviewing specific development projects, the Planning Board has managed to find time for long range planning.

Working closely with the Rockingham Planning Commission, the Planning Board completed its update of the 1978 Master Plan, and developed a six year capital improvements plan. The Rockingham Planning Commission remains a tremendous resource to the Board in providing long range planning guidance and technical assistance.

Nineteen Eighty-Five was also a year of transition for the Board.

In June, Doug Mellin resigned as Planning Director, after twelve years of dedicated service to the Town of Exeter. In September, Diane Flint was hired to assume the position of Planning Director. Nineteen Eighty-Five was not a year without its problems. The Planning Board was faced with thorny legal issues and code enforcement problems which demanded many long, arduous, and

often frustrating hours. In June, the Town's Growth Management Ordinacne was legally challenged. For the first time since the ordinance's enactment, the number of permits requested exceeded the number of permits to be issued. This resulted in a Special Town Meeting held in September which temporarily relieved the pressure, yet provided a strict mandate for the Board to reevaluate the need for the Growth Management Ordinance at the following Town Meeting.

All in all, 1985 was an active and rewarding year. Members of the Board would like to express their appreciation for having the opportunity to serve the community. We are especially appreciative to those (developers and citizens alike) whose cooperation made our jobs a little easier, and those residents who cared enough to directly participate in the planning process. We look forward to the challenges which lie ahead in our efforts to achieve well-planned and balanced growth for the Town of Exeter.

Housing Authority

The Exeter Housing Authority owns and manages 107 apartment units in Exeter: Squamscott View Apartments (85 units for elderly). Linden Fields (15 units for families with children). and 16-20 Auburn Street and 11-13 Portsmouth Avenue (7 units for families with children). EHA's tenants pay thirty percent of their adjusted income for rent and utilities. The EHA receives a Federal subsidy to provide the difference between rental income and operating expenses. In EHA's Fiscal Year 1985, a Pavment in Lieu of Tax of \$9,943,10 was made to the Town of Exeter, 15 percent more than in 1984, All EHA owned apartments are occupied and eligible applicants are selected from a waiting list as vacancies occur.

Housing Assistance Payments made via the Section 8 Existing Housing Program were \$415,155. Through this Federally funded program, the EHA pays private landlords the difference between 30 percent of a participating tenant's monthly income and the cost of any apartment's rent and utilities. The EHA assists 125 elderly/handicapped households and 34 families with children through this Program.

A significant decline in Federal funding for lower income housing opportunities has resulted in no increase in the amount of dwellings available for either the elderly or families in Exeter. The EHA is preparing for any dollars available in the future by seeking prerequisite approval from the Town to expand its programs.

The EHA is also looking for land and /or buildings to be donated or sold for a reduced price as locations for new or rehabilitated housing units for both lower income families and elderly, disabled and handicapped persons.

The EHA will continue to strive to provide affordable, safe, decent, and sanitary housing to Exeter's lower income residents, and all interested in our Programs are invited to contact the office at 277 Water Street, 778-8110.

Police Department

It is fitting and proper that I first express my appreciation and gratitude, in my first full year as the Chief of Police, for your support and for your confidence. I look forward to adding to the legacy of those who have contributed so much to this community in the past.

While the incidence of crime in this country remains at intolerable levels, the law enforcement community can take some degree of pride in the fact that crime has decreased for three consecutive years.

Various reasons have been given for the decline, many of which encompass and demon-

strate the efforts of the law enforcement community. Increased citizen interest and cooperation in crime prevention have been engendered by our department through formal programs and as a result of our commitment to positive community relations. Improved training of police and dispatch personnel have made our department more effictive and efficient. The coming of the information age has been a major benefit to this department in improving our operation.

The Exeter Police Department is now meeting the challenge of applying computer technology to the analysis of crime data. Not only vitally important to our own community, but also at the state and national levels, reliable data on crime and offenders to satisfy contemporary law enforcement. needs are critical to continued success in the fight against crime. In an attempt to identify these informational needs, a project to purchase a computer for this task was undertaken by Lt. Jim Gilmore. A fund raiser was organized by Mr. William Gilmore and monies were donated by nearly a hundred business organizations and private individuals. A total of \$11,000 was collected for the purchase of a State Police On-Line Telecommunications System, which has been in operation since April of this year. This accomplishment is worth of praise, as it clearly demonstrates a total community effort to combat criminal activity.

Other notable involvement of the Police Department during 1985 included: Hurricane Gloria hit the seacoast in September. All available police personnel were tasked in assisting evacuation routes, transporting emergency personnel, controlling key traffic points, placing detour signs as a result of road hazards and evacuating residents in low lying areas. For the 16th year in a row. the Town of Exeter has been awarded the Pedestrian Safety Award from AAA indicating no pedestrian fatalities. Police officers made numerous public appearances for various groups and organizations. The dispatch center now is responsible for dispatching fire apparatus to six other communities. Patrolman Robert Dickinson retired from the force after twenty years of service to the community and was honored at a retirement celebration in August. Our dispatch center now has special equipment to communicate with the deaf. A mini-computer phone was installed earlier this year, that now gives us a direct line of communication for the handicapped.

Motor vehicle traffic accidents remain on the same level as the previous year, even though arrests and traffic enforcement has increased substantially. Arrests for DWI and moving violations has increased as well as the enforcement of the parking ordinance

Police officers attended numerous in-service training schools as well as participating in the department's in-service training program. Lastly of course, is the Tammy Belanger investigation.

For the first quarter of this year, this case was fully pursued. Most of the summer was spent accomplishing areas that gave us little direction and for organizing

the report, which now totals eleven volumes. The task force last met in September as the investigation came to a halt. The case report was turned over to the State's Attorney General for review. No further action has been taken since that time

The police department continues to work in many other areas as indicated in this report. We commit ourselves to serving you and welcome your thoughts and interest in the department. In conclusion, I wish to thank all members of the Police Department and all other Town Agencies for their cooperation and assistance throughout the year.

As the focus of healthcare continues to shift from the institutional provider to the individual, home health care and community-based health promotion/disease prevention programs become increasingly important to residents.

In this regard, I am pleased to present this overview of services provided to Exeter during 1985:

The total value of these servies rendered to Exeter was \$226,571. For the same period, Exeter's appropriation was \$15,005., or approximately 7% of their cost.

The Visiting Nurses receives limited funding from federal, state and private sources, and we, therefore rely heavily upon the support we receive from the townspeople we serve.

Exeter Recreation & Parks Department

The continued growth in number of students and adults in recreational programs has kept the department quite busy the last six years. We do not foresee any let up as the town continues to grow at a pace that has been faster than I think many expected.

We saw our adult softball leagues grow to thirty teams this year; up six teams over 1984, with a waiting list of teams interested in participating in both our Men's and Co-Ed leagues. The youth baseball program saw a large increase, as did the soccer and youth basketball programs. The summer Day Camp program also saw a good increase in numbers over previous years. Once again, the outdoor swimming pool saw a very busy summer with increased numbers and with revenues up close to two thousand dollars. The Exeter Recreation Park has seen many groups making requests to use the facility for outings and special events. I am not sure how many of you realize how many people use this park throughout the spring, summer and fall months, but would say that you would be

surprised. The summer concert series saw large turnouts of students and adults for the six week series and we would like to thank the many co-sponsors for their help with the series. The highlight of the summer concerts series was the performance by the Shaw Brothers, as a record crowd was on hand for this concert. We started planning the program for 1986 in October of last year, in hopes to improve on the program if we can. The summer movie program, co-sponsored by our department along with the Rohr Family Restaurant and Pepsi-Cola, has been received quite well over the years and we foresee continued inter-est. In June, the bike race was brought back after a one year break thanks to Pepsi-Cola and Bud Light, with hopes that they will continue with us in '86

In the fall of 1985, we were able to increase the size of our office to accommodate you, the public, better. We are a service organization and try our best to give you the best that money will allow in the way of programs and special events. If you have an idea for a program, just stop by the office and we will be happy to discuss it with you.

Providing our budget is approved for 1986, we have plans to change two of our tennis courts over to multi-use courts to be used for street hockey, basketball and other sports that need a court.

Tennis play has dropped the last few years, so this change will help in the usage of the courts.

One of the major concerns to our department is the lack of playing fields as we try to meet the needs of the community. One of the projects of the department is to acquire some land across from the Brickvard Pond that we hope will give us at least another ball field. We are fortunate to have the oportunity use the Phillips Exeter Academy facilities as much as we do: they have always been a great deal of help to us in our scheduling. We do use the Exeter Junior High School indoor facilities during the winter months and will continue to work with them to try to work out a schedule where we can use the hall fields

One highlight of the department was the opening of the new Senior Citizen's Center on May 11, 1985. It was a project that our department has been involved in for more than twelve years. With the seniors in their own building now, it frees up the Recreation Center for other groups to use the building during the day, as well as evenings. It does seem unusual not to have the seniors in the building, as they have been here for a number of years.

To the many volunteers who give countless hours to the youth and adults involved in our programs: we thank you all, for without your support many of the activities we offer could not exist. To the department staff: another fine job in '85, as the team trys its best to keep you recreating.

Conservation Commission

The close of 1985 marks the Exeter Conservation Commission's twentieth year of service to the Town. At the March 1985 Town Meeting, Exeter residents, signaling their concern for the maintenance and protection of Exeter's rich endowment of natural resources and open space. voted to establish the Exeter Conservation Commission. The Commission's mandate then as now was the protection and management of open space, wetlands and groundwater. It was empowered to receive gifts of money and property in the name of the town, to acquire by gift, purchase, grant or bequest lands. water rights, development rights, etc. for the purpose of conserving open space. The town was authorized to appropriate monies for the purpose of establishing and maintaining the Conservation Commission. In 1973, state legislation further empowered conservation commissions with the right to review dredge-and-fill applications before their submission to the permitting agency. The Wetlands Board.

I recently spent the better part of a day reading the history of our Commission as recorded in its minutes from 1965 to 1985. That marathon reading left me with renewed awareness of and appreciation for the untold hours of dedicated work contributed over the years by all our volunteer commissioners. Their efforts have:

- provided the town with surveys, maps and inventories of the town's resources, chief among which was the Wetlands Survey which paved the way for the town's Wetland Ordinance and Prime Wetlands designation;
- provided information and guidance in the designation of Land-Water Conservation zones on our Zoning Map:
- received, in the town's name, by gift or purchase approximately 493 acres of land to be managed as open space for passive recreation:
- established a nursery which, in its productive years, supplied the town with all of its street trees; the commission continued to support the street tree program by funding the purchase of trees when the nursery maintenance became economically unfeasible:
- promoted environmental programs involving the schools, individual students and Scouting groups;
- furthered its own environmental education by attending seminars and workshops;
- and, in general, tussled with many environmental problems facing the town.

This is but a brief summary of your Conservation Commission's accomplishments in the past twenty years. I would be remiss, however, if I failed to mention that very little could have been accomplished without a great deal of cooperation among the departments, boards, commissions and committees of the town. The Conservation Com-

mission is grateful for that spirit of co-operation which has made it possible to work together for the good of the town.

In 1985, the Commission was happy to renew its symbiotic relation-ship with Mr. Andy Anderson't Forestry students from the Voc Ed School. Their firewood cutting contract in Hender and Swasey Park provides them with a first rate laboratory experience within easy commute of the school and, at the same time. provides the Commission with the labor and know-how to continue its timber stand improvement and wildlife cuttings in the park, Roger Sloan undertook and completed the all-important maintenance task of axe-blazing and painting the bounds of the park. Carl Anderson, coordinating with the New England Orienteering Club, has helped the Commission lay the groundwork for an orienteering course in the park. We hope more residents will discover and enjoy the park's offerings in the future.

Dave Ouellet has kept our signs repaired and in place, and has made a new sign for the Great Roundabout by the Route 51 bridge over the river. The wood for this sign was donated to the town by Ottie and Mildred Lowther. Many thanks to Ottie and Mildred. The Commission has decided that the sign will be installed facing the river as most visitors to this area will, no doubt, arrive by water, and because the contour of the land would make it all but impossible for the sign to be read by passing motorists if installed near the road

Our Youth Conservation campers this year were Kadie

Hinds and Steve Abbott. Their report to the Commission, full of enthusiasm and gratitude for the opportunity extended them, served to strengthen our commitment to foster public awareness of ecological/environmental concerns through education. Both Kadie and Steve have indicated an interest in participating in future Commission projects. They, and students like them, are surely one of Exeter's greatest resources.

The 1985 street tree planting, though ably organized by Dick Niebling with the help of the Highway Department, concluded disastrously when most of the trees died. Not all transplants are successful, but this is the first time we have faced such a heavy loss. The Arbor Day Foundation, source of the trees, promises to make-good on the loss.

Such were the ups and downs of the Commission's twentieth year.

The next twenty years, by dint of the increasing development pressure on the town, will bring many challenges to the Commission to grown in pace and scope along with the town. This is a good time for the reaffirmation of our commitment to protect Exeter's open space and natural resources.

Our thanks again to all who have contributed their time, energy, expertise and encouragement.

Historic District

During 1985, the Commission has reviewed and evaluated applications for changes in existing facades, site features, new construction, changes to existing signage and new signs to be erected within the historic districts. The Commission has also provided advice and guidance to individuals and businesses seeking information regarding general maintenance and preservation measures appropriate to their specific structures.

During 1985, the Commission has also seen renewed interest in developing the riverfront side of several downtown buildings.

The Commission meets the third Tuesday of every month at the Town Offices. All meetings are open to the public and citizen participation and input is encouraged.

Board Of Adjustment

For many years, the Zoning Board of Adjustment has played a very important, yet unobtrusive role in the development of the Town.

Sometimes praised, sometimes criticized, their principal responsibility, which represents no easy task, is to review applications for zoning variances, special exceptions, and appeals from administrative decisions. Their role is a judicial one - to grant relief where a strict interpretation of the zoning ordinance causes an undue hardship to the property owner.

There are three types of appeals which are heard by the Zoning Board of Adjustment:

— Variances are granted where there is a physical hardship unique to a piece of property which keeps the owner from using his/her land in a way consistant with the zoning ordinance. The Board may waive requirements provided adjacent properties are not adversely affected, and the public interests are protected.

— Special Exceptions are granted for certain types of uses upon a finding by the Zoning Board, that specific conditions, as outlined in the Zoning Ordinance, are met.

 Appeals from Administrative Decisions - are granted when an error was made by the Zoning Administrator in interpreting the zoning ordinance.

In 1985, the Zoning Board met fifteen times, and heard a total of 58 applications: 34 petitions for variances and 24 petitions for special exceptions. There were no appeals from administrative decisions. Of the variances applied for, 19 were granted and 15 were denied. The success rate for special exceptions was higher: 20 were granted and only 4 were denied. Appeals were granted which permitted the historic re habilitation and conversion of the Exeter Mills into 140 residential units and commercial space, the expansion of the Exeter Hospital. and the construction of corporate headquarters of a subsidiary of Tyco Laboratories, Inc. Nineteen Eighty-Five brought two new faces to the Board. Ed Dyson and Nick DeMassee were appointed in April by the Board of Selectmen for five year terms.

The Board of Adjustment meets the first Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. in the Nowak Room of the Town Office Building. All meetings are open to the Public. Applications for appeals are accepted in the planning office fifteen days prior the scheduled Board meetings.

Building construction increased in 1985. We had a busy year in 1984 and we did \$2 million more building in 1985. People want to live in Exeter; commerce and industry want to locate their businesses and plants here, and those plants that are here want to expand.

The Building Inspector's office. Fire Department, and Board of Health all go through the process of plan review on new commercial and industrial projects.

Permits were issued in the amount of \$17,720,526,00, which generated \$68,383,10 in revenue for the Town. The Town updated and liberalized its Growth Control Ordinance at a Special Town Meeting on September 17. 1985. We went to a true 3% growth rate as implied by our ordinances. This brought the number of residence permits to 132 from 96. This temporarily took a lot of pressure off this office.

In 1986, the cost to the seniors will be \$.85 per ticket, while the Town and COAST pay \$.95 each. The total budget runs \$30,250,00.

We know at times there are not enough tickets to take care of all your needs, but we are one of the few communities that provide such a service. One change that has been in effect with our contract with COAST is that we must set a de at least one thousand tickets for the general public to use. In 1986 we will have ten thousand senior tickets and one thousand general public tickets, for a total of eleven thousand for the year. Many people have asked what COAST stands for - "Cooperative Alliance for Seacoast Transportation," and is based in Durham, New Hampshire.

The Exeter Council on Aging would like to thank the Town Manager, and the Board of Selectmen for their continued support with the senior citizen's activities.

Direct Relief is to assist persons whose income is not sufficient to maintain a decent standard of living. Emergency assistance is available only on a temporary basis and, due to a continuing low unemployment rate, this portion of the budget has decreased slightly.

The Town was also responsible for the costs of all children in placement if the parents of said child have lived in that town for a year.

Due to passage of a new law, Senate Bill No.1, these costs will, in the future, be borne solely by the State and County. Good news for the Town of Exeter, and a decrease in the 1986 Welfare Budget!

The Exeter Mediation Program, a parent-child dispute resolution process, continues to meet with local families to assist them in resolving conflicts. Overall, it has been a good year and I look forward to 1986.

Mosquito Control Commission

The municipally-run Mosquito Control Service serves Exeter. Hampton Falls. Newfields and Stratham: the goal being to use mosquito surveillance techniques to obtain the greatest reduction in mosquitoes with the least amount of insecticides. It is important to keep mosquitoes from increasing in numbers (although they still do at times) because of the annovance factor to man, but more imporantly they can transmit dog heartworm disease. and the encephalitis virus. Eastern equine encephalitis (EEE) has not caused a problem in New Hampshire since it was responsible for the deaths of 9 horses in 1982 (70 such deaths in 1973). Human incidents continue to occur Massachusetts indicating that Rockingham County is not free from danger. For this reason, the disease vector populations are watched closely.

Adult mosquito surveillance consists of operating eight trapping devices every week from mid-May into September. The captured mosquitoes are identified with the aid of scientific guides and with stereo microscopes. Over 22,000 mosquitoes were counted in 1985; 43 species were represented. Counts were tabulated and graphed for interpretation of findings.

In the four town district, there are some 270 documented mosquito breeding sites that each are are examined for the presence of larvae and treated, if necessary. In addition, the 120 acres of saltmarsh in the four towns have the capacity to produce two ag-

ressive mosquito species and must be inspected for hatchings approximately ten times a season. All insecticides used have been extensively studies and shown to be effective and safe when properly applied; they are approved for use by the State Pesticide Control Board and the Federal Environmental Protection Agency. One aspect of the 1985 season helped reduce the occurance of fresh-water pest species was the dry spring and summer. This affected both the "spring brood" that develops throughout April and May and emerges as an adult by June, and the summer freshwater hatchings hat rely on woodland pools left after rain. However, the saltmarsh mosquitoes became a problem particularly at one point in the summer after an insecticde used in the program did not kill the mosquito larvae adequately and resulted in a large emergence of adults.

A problem being worked on is how to control the "cattail marsh mosquito" that lives in many permanent marshes. The total number of this species caught in our adult traps for adults in 1985 was more than the combined total of 1981, 1982, and 1983; last year (1984) was also high. Because of the unique larval characteristic of living attached to aquatic roots, conventional controls are not as effective; populations are reduced by adulticiding only.

If residents notice any problems, please leave word at the Exeter Town Office building (where our office is located) so we can better target control efforts.

The Commissioners and I wish to thank everyone for their cooperation and support. Controlling the mosquito is an involved process, and by working together through scientific methods and common sense we can lower mosquito populations safely and efficiently.

Civil Defense

Nineteen Eighty-Five was a busy year for Civil Defense. About May, approximately forty local residents were evacuated to the Christ Church due to a ruptured gas line on High Street. With the aid of local Red Cross units, Phillips Exeter Academy, and volunteer citizens, the evacuees were successfully transported and housed during the emergency.

In September, due to Hurricane Gloria, about five hundred residents were evacuated from their homes and sheltered at the Junior High School, Senior Citizen's Center, and Christ Church. Again, with the help of the Red Cross, school officials, town emergency personnel, school bus drivers, and local volunteers, the evacuees were fed and cared for during the crisis.

The Civil Defense budget for 1985 was \$5,460, however only forty-nine percent was expended for the maintenance of the local warning systems and communication requirements.

During the last half of 1985, and the first quarter of 1986, the Town has seen increased activity regarding the implementation of the Emergency Response Plan for the Seabrook Power Station.

Exeter emergency personnel,

school administrators, and others have been involved in an on-going program training, drills, and exercises.

I would like to thank all those who have assisted in emergency responses throughout the year. Your dedication in assisting your fellow citizens is very much appreciated!

History of Exeter Continuation

In 1988, Exeter will be 350 years old. Some years ago, the Exeter Historical Society decided that sponsoring a continuation of Bell's History of Exeter would be the most appropriate contribution it could make towards celebrating that great event. Governor Bell's book covered the period of 1638 to 1888 and a new history of the 100 years since

would dovetail nicely with a 350th Anniversary celebration. The Society asked the Town to underwrite one half of the costs of publication and undertook to provide the other half.

The funds thus advanced are maintained in separate accounts under the supervision of a joint Town/Society committee. We estimate that with reasonable support from town businesses and individual townspeople, the book will probably pay for itself and, in the long run, the Town and the Society will be repaid.

The research and writing of the history is being done by several Society members, but Nancy Merrill will write the major portion of the book — a chronological narrative of the 100 years — 1888 to 1988. She is already well underway and has begun writing after a full year of research. The others are in various stages of their tasks and some will soon be turning in copy for editing. For instance, among the special sections in addition to Nancy's narrative will be the following: a

chapter about the interaction of the Town and Academy; biolgraphical sketches of famous sons and daughters of Exeter: a section telling something about descendants of Exeter's earliest settlers who still live within the 1638 boundaries: a section describing some of the fine examples of architecture to be found in Exeter: a section listing Town Officials; a section listing those who have served in the United States Armed Forces in the wars and armed conflicts that occurred between 1888 and 1988; a section about the various organizations, religious, fraternal, charitable, etc. to be found in the Town; a compilation of the Town's industries and commercial enterprises, and an initial chapter summarizing the first 250 years. The book will be profusely illustrated, will include maps, and should have something of interest to all townspeople.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION

Wayne F. Gersen, Superintendent Nathan S. Greenberg, Assistant Superintendent

For the past three years, curriculum development has been the primary focus of the SAU #16 stafff. Working together on Curriculum Task Forces with parents and School Board members, teachers and administrators have written goals and objectives for every High School course and every curriculum area in grades 1 through 8 except science and language arts, which are currently being reviewed.

With the curriculum development work nearing completion, the Board and administration have turned their attention to the development of a long range plan for the six towns that comprise SAU #16 With the recent increase in the student population in the elementary grades, and the continued overcrowding at the high school, it is clear that significant expenditures will be necessary to improve and expand the facilities in our district. Some of the alternatives presented to the SAU Board to deal with population growth are:

- * Constructing a new High School in Stratham for Stratham and Newfields students, while simultaneously renovating Exeter AREA High School for students in grades nine through twelve in Brentwood, East Kingston, Exeter, and Kensington.
- * Constructing a new, second AREA Junior High in Exeter to house grades 7-9, moving ninth grade students from the High School and assigning them to the two AREA Junior Highs, and simultaneously renovating Exeter AREA High School to house grade ten through twelve students in the six SAU towns.
- * Constructing a new AREA Middle School for sixth and seventh grade students in the six AREA towns, moving ninth grade students from the High School and housing them with the eighth grade in the Current Junior High, and simultaneously renovating Exeter AREA High School to house grade ten through twelve students in the six SAU towns.
- * Nuilding an addition onto Exeter AREA Junior High School to house ninth grade students from the High School, and simultaneously renovating Exeter AREA High School to house grade ten through twelve students in the six SAU towns

Each of these alternatives requires the expenditure of millions of dollars on facilities for secondary students. Furthermore, none of the alternatives directly address the elementary facility needs, which are unique to each community. Thus, collectively, the SAU towns may be required to invest over \$10,000,000 in their facilities in the next three to five years. Given the magnitude of the funds required, the SAU Advisory Committee voted to invest \$15,000 to secure the services of an educational planning consultant. This consultant will: obtain accurate data on future pupil population; conduct a comprehensive review of the space needs in each town in the SAU; conduct public hearings on facilities improvements for parents and citizens; develop several alternative Master Plans for the SAU Boards to consider; help the Boards weigh each of these alternatives, and, provide a Master Plan that addresses the long range facilities needs for each town in the SAU

The consultant's report should be completed by the end of the current school year—this will enable the Boards to review the information over the summer, to develop specific recommendations by September, 1996, and to begin implementing those recommendations by the 1997-88 school year.

We hope you will work with us as we plan for the future. Once again, we appreciate your continued support for the education of the outh in our districts.

ACCOUNTANT'S REPORT ON INTERNAL ACCOUNTING CONTROL

To the Members of the School Board Exeter School District Exeter, New Hampshire

We have examined the combined financial statements of the Exeter School District for the year ended June 30, 1985, and have issued our report thereon dated October 3, 1985. As part of our examination, we made a study and evaluation of the School District's system of internal accounting control to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the system as required by generally accepted government auditing standards. The purpose of our study and evaluation was to determine the nature, timing and extent of the auditing procedures necessary for expressing an opinion on the School District's financial statements. Our study and evaluation was more limited than would be necessary to express an opinion on the system of internal accounting control taken as a whole.

The management of the Exeter School District is responsible for establishing and maintaining a system of internal accounting control. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of control procedures. The objectives of a system are to provide management with reasonable but not absolute, assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

Because of inherent limitations in any system of internal accounting control, errors or irregularities may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the system to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

Our study and evaluation made for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph would not necessarily disclose all material weaknesses in the system. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the system of internal accounting control of the Exeter School District, taken as a whole. However, our study and evaluation disclosed no condition that we believed to be a

ACCOUNTANT'S REPORT ON COMPLIANCE

To the Members of the School Board Exeter School District Exeter, New Hampshire

We have examined the combined financial statements of the Exeter School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 1985, and have issued our report thereon dated October 3, 1985. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards, the provisions of "Standards for Audit of Governmental Organizations, Programs, Activities and Functions", promulgated by the Comptroller General, which pertain to financial and compliance audits; the Office of Management and Budget's "Major Compliance Features of Programs Administered by State and Local Governments" (the approved compliance supplement); and, except as described in the following paragraphs, provisions of Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-102, "Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants-In-Aid to State and Local Governments", Attachment P, "Audit Requirements" and the Guidelines for Financial and Compliance Audits of Federally Assisted Programs (Guidelines), and accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The reporting objectives for compliance audits contained in the Guidelines suggest an examination of all transactions for compliance purposes, as opposed to the selective testing required by Attachment P; therefore, we have followed the reporting objectives of Attachment P. In addition, the Guidelines do not provide sufficient guidance for determining the representative number of charges to be examined and performing the procedures to ascertain compliance. Accordingly, we utilized other materials as supplements in those areas.

Attachment P requires that the examination include a determination of whether the Federal financial reports (including financial status reports, cash reports, and claims for advances and reimbursements) prepared by the Exeter School District contain accurate and reliable financial data. We have been informed that OMB interprets the phrase "accurate and reliable financial data" to mean that the Federal financial reports present the underlying financial data of the grants within limits that are reasonable and practicable to attain under the circumstances.

In our opinion, except for the matters that might have come to our attention had our examination encompassed the provisions of the Guidelines referred to in the second preceding paragraph, for the tested operations and records, the Exeter School District complied with the material terms and conditions of its Federal grants, contracts and agreements, and the tested Federal financial reports present the underlying financial data of the grants within the limits

described in the preceding paragraph. Further, based upon our examination and the procedures referred to above and except for the matters that might have come to our attention had our examination encompassed the provisions of the Guidelines referred to in the second preceding paragraph, and except the following item, nothing came to our attention to indicate that the Exeter School District had not complied with the compliance matters referred to above, and the Federal financial reports do not present the underlying financial data of the grants within the limits described in the preceding paragraph.

Outlined below are the administrative spending priorities for the 1986-87 budget. While some of these priorities are carried over from previous fiscal years, their order has been changed. The first two priorities are crucial to ensuring that the Exeter School District can maintain a quality educational program in the coming years The administrative spending priorities follow PRIORITY I - RESTRUCTURE AND UPGRADE THE TEACHER'S SALARY SCHEDULE - In Exeter, as is true for the entire region, the salaries paid to ALL teachers must be upgraded. While the negotiated salary increases for the past school year were approximately 11%, the entry level salary, at \$14,435, remains low compared to other areas of potential employment for recent college graduates, and places Exeter 14th in the State By 1987-88, all Maine districts will be paying an entry level salary of \$15,500. In the same year, most Massachusetts districts will be offering \$18,000 for entry level teachers. Unless we continue to increase our salary schedules, teacher recruitment will be difficult PRIORITY II - CONTINUE FUNDING THE ESTABLISHED PLANS FOR PLANT MAINTENANCE, EQUIPMENT REPLACEMENT, FURNITURE REPLACEMENT, AND CAPITAL RESERVE While the 1985-86 budget included only modest increases in the Maintenance and Operations Programs, key maintenance projects were funded and fully the established cycle of furniture and equipment replacement was fully funded. Most importantly, the Board extended its commitment to the funding of warrant articles to provide funding for the Capital Reserve Account established in 1984, approved a warrant article to fund several maintenance projects removed from the general fund budget, and approved a warrant article to create new Capital Reserve Accounts. This commitment has enabled the School District to upgrade its facilities, and this commitment must be continued even if the district embarks on Capital Improvement Plan

PRIORITY III - PROVIDE FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE SCHOOL BOARD'S LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE. The recently created School District Long Range Planning Committee will be preparing recommendations regarding the long-term facilities needs for the Exeter School District. Given the recent growth in our region, and the deficiencies of our current facilities, the Budget Committee and School Board should confront the district's facilities needs in preparing the budget for the coming fiscal year. The Long Range Planning Committee's recommendations will include the upgrading facilities, the future was of computer techning in our district, and the future development of athletic fields and legilities.

PRIORITY IV - CONTINUE TO FUND CURRICULUM INITIATIVES The Elementary Curriculum Development Committee and the High School Curriculum Committee are continuing their efforts to identify the texts and materials needed to upgrade their instructional areas. For the coming year, an emphasis will be placed on the purchase of Science and Language Arts materials at the elementary level. Additional mathematics and reading texts may also be needed at that level, but on a more limited basis than in the past year. Many secondary curriculum needs are associated with the Long Range Planning Committee's review. Finally, the Enrichment Programs at the Elementary and Secondary levels must be sustained through continued funding.

FRIORITY V - CONTINUE PROVIDING FUNDS FOR CURRICULUM AND STAFF DEVELOPMENT - The \$10,000 earmarked for curriculum and staff development included in the 1985-86 budget is a good first step in the direction of fully funding a comprehensive staff development program. With released time in-Service discontinued, the district must begin to provide more funding for increased curriculum and staff development costs. Furthermore, the many curriculum initiatives that have occurred, the increased use of technology, the increased mainstreaming of special needs students, and the expansion of enrichment opportunities occurring in Exeter will require additional training of teaching personnel

<u>PRIORITY VI - PROVIDE FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR THE SCHOOL</u>
<u>BOARD'S 1985-86 GOALS</u> - The School Board's 1985-86 goals and
their potential impact on the 1986-87 budget are outlined
below:

Upgrade the Curriculum for Grades 1 through 12
Funding for this goal will be accomplished as indicated in Priority III and V, above.

Improve the Delivery of Special Education

The recommendations of the Special Education

Department will be presented to the Budget Committee for their consideration.

Improve Organizational Climate in Exeter Schools
Many methods proposed for addressing this
1984-85 carry-over goal were included in the final
1985-86 budget. These budget adjustments will
be retained in the 1986-87 budget. Too, the
