JOHN HATCH, E. H. ROKES, Auditors.

The registers of the schools of the town show a total enrollment of eighty-nine scholars, — forty-six boys, forty-three girls. The High school has twenty-five scholars, the North school, twenty-one, the South school, twenty-three, the Bayside school, twenty.

The High school was taught during the Spring term by Miss Della E. Hapgood, who fulfilled two years of service with the school. The Fall and Winter terms have been taught by Miss Josephine A. Pickering. Miss Pickering has been ably assisted by her mother, Mrs. M. E. Pickering. The school has had instruction in singing, one hour and a half each week, throughout the year by Mrs. J. A. Spaulding.

The North school has been taught by Miss Lillian Y. Chapman, who has served this school for four years.

The South school has been taught by Miss Lois D. Beck, who has served this school for four years.

The Bryside school was taught during the Spring term by Miss Mabel P. Neal. The Fall and Winter terms have been taught by Miss Lilian R. Smith. The schools have been in session thirty-six weeks during the year.

For three years the cost of books, stationery and other supplies has been very near to \$150.00 a year. Taking the present number of scholars, this amount represents a cost for such supplies of about \$167 for each scholar. This year, several new maps have been placed in the school rooms.

It is desirable that the schools of the town be made to co-operate under a well defined plan. The aim of our school system should be to give a good and thorough common school education to all our scholars and to lay good foundations for, and to awaken aspirations within, as many as may have and will seek further educational advantages.

The work of the North, the South and the Bayside schools should be of uniform grade. The primary and the intermediate courses should be taught thoroughly in these schools. The High school should maintain at least a high grammer grade. It would be very easy to let the High school drop to a lower grade. The members of the Board of Education were much disappointed in the examination papers of the class which came up for admission to the High school this year. As the numbers will show, there is no occasion for lowering the grade of the High school to relieve the lower schools, nor would there be necessity even in a considerably larger number of scholars in those schools. We should heartily sustain our High school at, at least, its present grade. Our present system makes such a school entirely practicable and it is of great advantage to our scholars. The courses taught in the three lower schools should be considered together with that of the High school and all made to serve the aim set forth above.

#### LIBRARY TRUSTEES' REPORT.

----

The trustees of the Weeks Public Library respectfully submit to the town their fourth annual report.

At the present time there are 2653 volumes in the library, an increase of 463 since our last report. They comprise 1567 volumes of fiction, 116 vols. of biography, 247 vols. of history, 81 vols. of travel, 118 vols. of literature, 71 vols. of natural history, 101 vols. of poetry, and 350 vols. of religious and scientific works and books of reference.

The library has been open every Wednesday and Saturday afternoon and evening but once during the year. Books have been taken out 5413 times, an average of 49 books each library day. The largest number of books taken out on any one day was 99; the smallest, 17. Of the books taken out, 5181 have been fiction, and 232 history, travel, etc.

There have been presented to the library during the year 87 vols. as follows: From Miss Martha A. Pickering, 2 vols.; Mr W. P. Frink, 2 vols.; Mr. J. S. H. Frink, 5 vols.; Mrs. John Crowell, 1 vol.; Mr. J. Clifford Simpson, 1 vol.; Mrs. Sarah A. Ball, 29 vols.; Mr. Alfred M. Clough, 1 vol.; Mr. J. Hatch, 2 vols.; Miss Addie Weeks, 1 vol.; Governor Frank W. Rollins, 2 vols.; Mrs. Moody Currier, 1 vol.; Mr. Samuel C. Eastman, 1 vol., State of New Hampshire, 9 vols., and from Mr. Eugene S. Daniell, 7 vols. of Gibbon's Rome, and from Mr. William A. Peirce \$25., with which was purchased 11 vols. of the works of Henry D. Thoreau, and 12 vols. of Ralph Waldo Emerson's works.

Among the books acquired the past year have been some excellent historical works, such as Knight's Popular History of England, Giezot's History of France, Motley's Rise of the Dutch Republic, Gibbon's Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire, and Thoreau's Rambles about New England; all of which, in addition to many others of like character in the library, are recommended to readers.

We regret that the librarian's report shows that so small a proportion of books of the above character are used by the public, for they will be found to be both interesting and instructive reading, although we believe that from the care taken in selecting the books of fiction (few books having been purchased without being first critically read) some knowledge as well as pleasure can be gained from almost any volume in the library.

We again urge upon the patrons of the library as much care in handling the books as is consistent with their free use. Books must never be marked with pencil or ink, or the leaves turned down. A very large number of books have required repairs the last year, apparently from having had the covers bent back in reading, or from carelessly letting the books fall so as to loosen the binding. The greatest wear of our books seems to be in the bindings, the

leaves being generally in good condition. Books should not be left open with the face down in order to mark the place, but a slip of paper, or the card containing the library rules, should be used for that purpose. There is a book mark in use in libraries known as the Cleveland Library League book mark, on which is printed the suggestive line; "The wit and wisdom of the world are stored in books"; and on the reverse the motto, "Clean Hearts, Clean Hands, Clean Books". In the Pillsbury Free Library, of Warner, N. H., book marks are supplied to the school children with suggestions that are so good that we think it worth while to repeat them. Printed upon the cards is the following:

"If a library book could talk to boys and girls, it would say things like these:

"Please Boy—please Girl—take good care of me, for I can't take care of myself.

" Please put on my paper coat when you take me home.

"Please don't let me get wet,—that would spot my covers and spoil my leaves.

"Please don't handle me with dirty hands,—I want to keep clean and not be ashamed of my looks when the next boy or girl borrows me.

"Please don't mark on me with pen or pencil.

"Please don't wet your fingers to turn my leaves,—you would not like other boys and girls to wet their fingers and touch you.

"Please don't lean on me with your elbows when you are reading me,—you would not like to be so leaned on.

"Please don't open me and lay me face down on a table,—it might break my back.

"Please don't put a pencil on anything thicker than a slip of paper between my leaves and then shut me up, it would strain my binding.

"Please don't turn down the corner of a leaf to keep your place when not reading,—put in a Children's Service Book-Mark, then close me and lay me on my side, so I can rest comfortably. "Please don't forget how long I am to visit you; and take me back when the day comes.

"Please remember that I am to visit a great many other boys and girls when you are through with me,—besides, I may meet you again some day—and you, and the other boys and girls, would be sorry to see me soiled and torn, and marked up, and broken-backed. Help me to keep fresh and clean and I will help you to have a pleasant time and to know things, and to be good and happy."

These suggestions are worthy the attention of many grown persons, as well as the children. Such card bookmarks would be desirable to have; but the trustees do not feel that the expense would be warranted at this time with the many other needs of the library.
