THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE
TOWN OF LANGDON
TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Langdon, County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Langdon on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, at twelve of the clock noon until six p.m.. Regular business meeting will be held at seven p.m.

Article 1. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 466:30-a, Dog Control Law, which reads: I. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this chapter, it shall be unlawful for any dog to run at large, except when accompanied by the owner or custodian, and when used for hunting, herding, supervised competition and exhibition or training for such. For the purpose of this section, "accompanied" means that the owner or custodian must be able to see or hear, or both, or have reasonable knowledge of where the dog is hunting, herding, or where training is being conducted or where trials are being held. Nothing herein provided shall mean that the dog must be within sight at all times.

II. In this section, "at large" means off the premises of the owner or keeper and not under the control of any person by means of personal presence and attention as will reasonably control the conduct of such dog, unless accompanied by the owner or custodian.

III. Any authorized person may seize, impound or restrain any dog in violation of this section and deliver said dog to a person or shelter authorized to board dogs. Such dogs shall be handled as strays or abandoned dogs pursuant to applicable laws.

IV. In addition to impounding a dog found at large or in violation of this section, any law enforcement officer may issue, in the name of the owner or keeper of such dog, a notice of violation. Such notice shall impose upon the owner or keeper of such a dog a forfeiture of \$10, which must be paid to the clerk of the town or city wherein such dog is owned or kept within 96 hours of the date and time notice is given, in full satisfaction of the assessed penalty. In the event such penalty is not paid to the town or city clerk within the time limitations specified, a summons shall be issued for appearance in district court or municipal court and any person found guilty of violating the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a violation.

V. The provisions of this section shall not be effective in any city or town unless adopted by a city or town pursuant to RSA 466:30-b.

Article 3. Are you in favor of adopting Amendment #1 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town of Langdon to amend Section 2, Paragraph A. of the Building Code for the Town of Langdon to read: "Minimum lot size upon which a dwelling may be built or constructed shall be three (3) acres. All buildings, including attached or detached accessory buildings, shall not occupy more than 25% of the lot."

Article 4. Are you in favor of adopting Amendment #2 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town of Langdon to amend Section 2, Paragraph A, Number 2 of the Building Code for the Town of Langdon to read: "Lots will have a minimum frontage of three hundred (300) feet on a road, street or public right of way."

Article 6. To see if the Town will appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to use the revenue, estimated to be \$69,500 from:

The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$115,000 for the maintenance of highways and bridges. The State of New Hampshire to furnish approximately \$41,000 in State Aid. The Town will raise the balance. (Approximately \$74,000).

The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provision of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of Revaluation and to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to be placed in this fund and to designate the Selectmen as agents to expend.

The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provision of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of Town Office Facilities and to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand (10,000) to be placed in this fund.

The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4000 for the Capital Expense of the Fire Department.

The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to be added to the Fire/Rescue Truck Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for the purchase of a computer for the Police Department to run the software provided by the State for the new State forms and record keeping required by the State.

Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) to be added to the Cemetery Fence Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) for the Fall Mountain Food Shelf/Friendly Meals Program. These programs, supported completely with volunteer labor and contributions, have provided benefits to the people of Langdon, for twenty and ten years respectively.

The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, in their discretion, to sell Town personal property which they deem to be unnecessary.

The Selectmen recommend approval of this article.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize a discount of 2% if 50% of the prior years tax assessment is paid after April 1, 1997 and by June 30, 1997.

The Selectmen recommend approval of this article.

Article 18. Shall we modify the elderly exemptions from property tax in the town of Langdon, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$15,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$30,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$60,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$13,400 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$20,400; and own net assets not in excess of \$35,000 excluding the value of the person's residence.

The Selectmen recommend approval of this article.

Article 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

LIST OF APPROPRIATIONS -- TOWN MEETING, 1996

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM by Moderator Robert Cunniff, who also lead the townspeople in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Article 1. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year. This was completed during the day. The moderator asked to dispense with reading the complete warrant at this time. All agreed.

Article 2. Are you in favor of adopting Amendment #1 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town of Langdon to amend Part 1, Paragraph B, Number 1 of the Building Code for the Town of Langdon to read: "Permits will be issued in three (3) parts. (1) A permit will be required for all dwellings foundations. (2) Upon completion of said foundation and approval of same by the building inspector, a permit will be issued for the superstructure. (3) A Certificate of Occupancy will be obtained from the building inspector before the building shall be occupied." (Article 2 was voted by ballot during the day: YES)

Article 3. Are you in favor of adopting Amendment #2 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town of Langdon to amend Part 1, Paragraph E, Preamble of the Building Code for the Town of Langdon to read: "A permit to be issued by the road agent for permanent or temporary access or alteration to an access to and from Town roads or public right-of-way, will be required." (Article 3 was voted by ballot during the day: YES)

Article 4. Are you in favor of adopting Amendment #3 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town of Langdon to amend Part 1, Paragraph E, Number 1 of the Building Code for the Town of Langdon to read: "1. Access permit fee will be \$10.00 except for temporary permits issued to commercial or industrial applicants." (Article 4 was voted by ballot during the day: YES)

Article 5. Are you in favor of adopting Amendment #4 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town of Langdon to amend Part 1, Paragraph E, Number 2 of the Building Code for the Town of Langdon to read: "Temporary permits will be granted to commercial or industrial applicants upon proof of acceptable letter of credit or bond sufficient to insure the return of the area to its original condition. A nonrefundable fee of \$50 will be required when application is made to the road agent." (Article 5 was voted by ballot during the day: YES)

Article 6. Are you in favor of adopting Amendment #5 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town of Langdon to delete Part 1, Paragraph E, Number 3 of the Building Code for the Town of Langdon. (Article 6 was voted by ballot during the day: YES)

Article 7. Are you in favor of adopting Amendment# 6 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town of Langdon to amend Part 2, Paragraph I of the Building Code for the Town of Langdon to read: "All plumbing construction will be installed by a plumber licensed in New Hampshire and conform to the Basic Building Codes (BOCA), as amended." (Article 7 was voted by ballot during the day: NO)

Article 8. Are you in favor of adopting Amendment #7 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town of Langdon to amend Part 2, Paragraph J of the Building Code for the Town of Langdon to read: "All electrical wiring will be installed by an electrician licensed in New Hampshire and conform to the Basic Building Codes (BOCA), as amended." (Article 8 was voted by ballot during the day: NO)

Article 9. Are you in favor of adopting Amendment #8 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town of Langdon to amend Part 10, (Enforcement) of the Building Code for the Town of Langdon to read: "Whoever violates any of the provisions of the above regulations shall be punished upon conviction by a fine of not less than \$10 per day but not more than \$100 per day for each day of violation." (Article 9 was voted by ballot during the day: NO)

Article 10. Are you in favor of adopting Amendment #9 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town of Langdon to amend Section 1 of the Board of Licensing to read: "The Board of Licensing of the Town of Langdon shall consist of the Board of Selectmen. One member of the Board of Licensing will be appointed to serve as secretary of the Board of Licensing. The secretary for the Board of Selectmen shall be responsible for supplying application forms, publishing notices, receiving funds and securing such information as the Board shall require." (Article 10 was voted by ballot during the day: YES)

Article 11. Are you in favor of adopting Amendment #10 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town of Langdon to amend the Preamble to the Zoning Ordinance for the Town of Langdon, New Hampshire to include as the last sentence: "The Town of Langdon Zoning Board of Adjustment may use and refer to any and all Federal and State regulations which it deems will be helpful and necessary." (Article 11 was voted by ballot during the day: YES)

Article 12. Are you in favor of adopting Amendment #11 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town of Langdon to amend Section V, Paragraph B of the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Langdon to read: "Upon request of the petitioner, the Board will call a public hearing. Cost of advertising in local papers, notification of abutters, posting of notices and all other costs will be borne by the petitioner. The Board of Adjustment will hold a public hearing within thirty (30) days of petition. A decision will be rendered within twenty (20) days of public hearing. (New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 155-E:7)" (Article 12 was voted by ballot during the day: YES)

Article 13. Are you in favor of adopting Amendment #12 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town of Langdon to amend Section V, Paragraph F, of the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Langdon to read: "Before removal of soil, rock, sand, gravel, loam or similar material, a special exception must be received from the Board of Adjustment, including payment of all fees and costs. When removal of material is completed, sufficient grading must take place to allow covering with not less than 4 inches of top soil and seeding with suitable crop cover, except where ledge rock is exposed. The Board of Adjustment shall require the posting of a sufficient bond with the Town Treasurer to insure compliance. The Board is authorized to consult with any recognized authority it deems necessary before setting the requirements. The Board may include any such conditions as they deem necessary to protect the interests of the Town and its citizens." (Article 13 was voted by ballot during the day: YES)

Article 14. Are you in favor of adopting Amendment #13 as proposed by the Planning Board of the Town of Langdon to make the following amendments to correct typographical errors, correct RSA numbers and bring the Town in compliance with changes in the State Statute:

Building Code: Part 5, Paragraph B - delete reference to section 2C

Building Code: Part 5, Paragraph C - last sentence - change "which" to "while"

Building Code: Part 5, Paragraph F - delete in first sentence - "shall conform to Paragraph 2C or"

Zoning Ordinance: Preamble - change "Chapter 31:60-89 to RSA 672-677"

Zoning Ordinance: Definitions, Paragraph C - change "NH RSA 1955 Chapter 31: Paragraphs 66-76" to "RSA 673:3"

Zoning Ordinance: Amendments, paragraph A - change "Chapter 31, RSA" to "RSA 47:26" (Article 14 was voted on by ballot during the day: YES)

Amendment was offered by Jeff Cushing to increase the Solid Waste appropriation (n.) by \$5,000 to \$44,000. This year we paid Acworth \$8,000 as our final charges from them. This year Langdon must pay \$5,000 to the NH/VT Solid Waste District. Once the decision was made to have our own transfer station, the Town needed to create a site. We have expanded into some recycling. We hope to see our costs return to approximately \$2,000/month. (Amendment motion/second/vote: YES) (Article 16 as amended/motion/second/vote: YES)

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000 for the maintenance of highways and bridges. The State of New Hampshire to furnish approximately \$36,000 in State Aid. The Town will raise the balance. (Approximately \$64,000). Discussion centered around how the money will be spent, paving plans, and the preservation of the roads in general. Comment - the maintenance work isn't being done when it should be; we need a long range plan for the roads. (Article 17 motion/second/vote: YES)

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate up to the sum of \$48,000 to purchase a new Highway Truck and authorize the withdrawal of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000) from the Capital Reserve fund created for Highway Equipment. The balance of thirty six thousand (\$36,000) is to come from general taxation.

Amendment by Jeff Cushing "To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$80,000 for a new diesel rear-wheel drive Mack dump truck with plow and sander. Also, to continue to own and operate one (1) on the 1-ton trucks now in use." Discussion centered around money issues and the need to decide whether the Town will have a full-time or part-time road agent or contract out the road work. (Amendment motion/second/vote: NO)

Amendment by Steve Holmes: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate up to \$50,000 to purchase a new Ford F7000 dump truck with plow and possibly wing, and to authorize the withdrawal of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000) from the Capital Reserve fund created for Highway Equipment. Five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be raised by the sale of the old 1-ton now in use, and the remaining thirty three thousand (\$33,000) is to come from general taxation." Amendment amended by Steve Holmes to remove the Ford stipulation. (Amendment to the amendment motion/second/vote: YES) (Amendment motion/second/vote: YES) (Article 18 motion/second/hand vote: YES 48, NO 15)

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3500 for the Capital Expense of the Fire Department. (Article 19 motion/second/vote: YES)

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to purchase tires, a radiator, and gauges for the Fire Department and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1700 for this purpose. (Article 20 motion/second/vote: YES)

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a Fire/Rescue Truck and to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to be placed in this fund. Discussion - We now have a 1973 3/4-ton pickup that will need to be replaced in the near future. cost may be around \$35,000, but more study needs to be done before a decision can be made. (Article 21 motion/second/vote: YES)

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to purchase and replace the light bar on the Ford cruiser, purchase a body armor vest, and a hand gun for the Police Department and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1400 for this purpose. Comment by the Police Chief - The old lights are 25 years old and don't work reliably; a personal weapon is being used for the police department; and one of the officers is without a body armor vest. The second cruiser is being used on an almost weekly basis. (Article 22 motion/second/vote: YES)

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to indefinitely authorize the Selectmen, until specific rescission of such authority, to accept on behalf of the Town of Langdon gifts, legacies, and devises made to the Town in trust for any public purpose as permitted by RSA 31:19. (Article 23 motion/second/vote: YES)

Article 24. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 for the purchase of a push lawnmower. Amendment by Fred Roentsch to substitute for the word "push", "self-propelled, walk behind". (Amendment motion/second/vote: YES) (Article 24 motion/second/vote: YES)

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand (\$3000) to replace the Lower Cemetery Fence and authorize the withdrawal of one thousand dollars (\$1000) from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The balance of two thousand dollars (\$2000) is to come from general taxation. Amendment by Charles Grout to delete "raise and". (Amendment motion/second/vote: NO) (Article 25 motion/second/vote: YES)

Article 26. To see if the Town wishes to amend the existing agreement under Section 218 of the Social Security Act by excluding the services performed by election workers for a calendar year in which the remuneration paid for such services is less than \$1000. (Article 26 motion/second/vote: YES)

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectman to sell Town property. (Article 27 motion/second/vote: YES)

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize prepayment of taxes, and to indefinitely authorize the Tax Collector, until specific rescission of such authority, to accept payment in prepayment of taxes after April 1st of any tax year. (RSA 80:52-A) (Article 28 motion/second/vote: YES)

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize a discount of 2% if 50% of the prior years tax assessment is paid after April 1, 1996 and by June 30, 1996. (Article 29 motion/second/vote: YES)

Article 30. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

1. Twice a year tax billing
 - a. Survey results

The vast majority of respondents were not in favor of twice a year tax billing. There were concerns about increased costs on computerization, but research will continue on using available volunteer expertise to develop appropriate software to meet Town needs.

2. Police facility options
 - a. Addition on Highway Garage
 - b. Renovation to Town Hall Shed
 - c. Processing through Charlestown
 - d. Other

State regulations to protect police, the Town, and the detainees. Issues are (1) toilet/water facilities, (2) issues of confidentiality, (3) safety concerns in the Town Hall. Comments - Can other towns help with calls at the high school? State Police can, and other towns are called in an emergency. new construction must meet ADA requirements. Can we process through the State Police barracks? Yes, but it is a 20 mile drive. Can we arrange a cooperative agreement with Charlestown? "Other" option received the most support, with addition to highway garage a distant second preference.

3. Road Agent options
 - a. Two part-time workers
 - b. One full-time worker
 - c. Sub-contracting

Part-time workers are the least expensive option with no benefits being paid. A sub-contract arrangement would still require a road agent to be in charge of the bid process and organization and small jobs. Comments - All that needs to be done is not being done with the part-time positions. A long range plan needs to identify and prioritize projects, equipment rotation plan, etc. Show of hands: part-time 7, full-time 38, sub-contract 13.

POLICE CHIEF'S REPORT - 1996

1996 was a busy year. Our overall activities, like other towns, were up about 40% over last year. Due to storms this past year, we had 70+ hours into helping Public Service and highway departments by blocking traffic to keep travelers safe.

We had one report of rape which was followed up by State Police.

We had two cases of arson. In one of the cases, the woods were set on fire causing little damage. The Fire Department did a good job getting it under control. The other arson case was an attempt to burn and blow up our cruiser. But thanks to a passer-by for reporting the fire and quick response by one of our officers in putting out the fire, very little damage was done and the bomb did not get set off. In both cases the accused were charged and found guilty.

Because of our increase in other activities, our patrol time was down from last year. We made 120 motor vehicle stops. We had 28 cases go to court. 20 of our 28 court cases were motor vehicle-type violations which we won except for one minor traffic violation.

1997 has started off even more active than 1996. This is due to some new changes in state laws. We are working with the high school and we have started an ongoing drug program. We will continue to do drug searches in the high school. We do this in conjunction with other towns in the Fall Mountain District.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN
AND
STATE FOREST RANGER

We had one woods fire incident in 1996. This was a case of arson and burned less than one acre of woods. As of early 1997, the person(s) involved are being handled by our judicial system.

Again - Thank you for using the fire permit when necessary and also for calling me when the permits are not necessary.

Again this year - Please call our dispatcher at 352-1100 for an emergency. The state (911) is still not up to par.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact you local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing any open burning. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are ten Forest Rangers who work for the N.H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. State Forest Rangers are available to assist communities with forest fire suppression, prevention and training programs as well as the enforcement of forest fire and timber harvest laws. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws please call our office at 271-2217.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments.

Permits issued for additions to dwellings appear to be an indication of families increasing in number. Enclosing decks is either a sign of the need for more functional space or just a need to keep out bugs and May flies. Garages provide much needed protection for vehicles from nature's harm, as well as much needed storage space. Tool sheds come in handy when there is no more room in the garage for the lawn mowers and the garden tillers. An interesting request for a building application was to convert a two car garage to a residential dwelling. The garage already had in place a septic system and a drilled water supply: that's planning ahead. Two commercial businesses applied for building permits to provide new and improved facilities in order to meet the demands of doing business.

1996 REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board has had a very busy year again with a variety of items.

The Building Inspector developed Occupancy Permit forms and submitted them to the Planning Board for review and acceptance.

The Planning Board also developed and accepted Driveway Regulations. The Road Agent was very helpful in this project giving the Board his time and advise on many of the items. We also developed Driveway Permit applications and forms.

Public Hearings were held by the Planning Board to discuss adopting a Dog Ordinance and also a minor change to the new Driveway Regulations. More recently, a Public Hearing was held to discuss changes to the minimum acreage and minimum road frontage for subdivisions in the Town of Langdon. We were glad to see this was very well attended and many residents contributed to the discussion. A brief summary of our proposed changes are as follows:

1. The Dog Ordinance will allow our Dog Control Officer to enforce the Dog Control Law in our Town.
2. The change to the Driveway Regulation will add a time limit for the Road Agent to act upon an application.
3. The change of the Lot Size will help preserve the rural/agricultural character of the Town in keeping with the intent of the Master Plan as voted on by the Town. With one acre zoning, the Town will not be able to maintain it's rural character. This changes the lot size from 1 acre to 3 acres.
4. Present minimum Road Frontage allows narrow lots, making it difficult to meet standard building requirements. This changes the road frontage requirement from 200 to 300 feet.

In November the Board entertained a guest speaker. Ken McWilliams spoke to the Board regarding Scenic Byways. This will be further discussed by the Board in 1997.

There were only two subdivision applications submitted this year. One was not carried to completion by request of the land owner, and other one was denied.

We are fortunate to have a very dedicated and hard working Board serving the Town of Langdon. Every member has given generously of their time with several extra meetings to complete all that needed to be done during the past year. Thanks to each of them for their contribution.
