

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SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Despite the ever worsening economic climate and a stagnant real estate market in the northeast, 1990 witnessed several positive accomplishments in Marlow.

In the face of diminishing revenues and escalating costs of all goods and services, Marlow actually achieved a <u>decrease</u> in the 1990 tax rate over 1989; an exception to virtually every other municipality in the State. Although various factors contributed to this phenomenon, the basic fact remains that the Town succeeded in holding the line on spending while still maintaining all of our basic services and responsibilities adequately. This encouraging achievement is one for which we should all be justly proud.

Due mainly to the dedication of those involved and the overwhelming acceptance of the program by the townspeople, Marlow's first full year of mandatory recycling proved extremely successful. Thanks to the excellent cooperation of all concerned in separating their trash, we achieved a net savings of approximately \$6000.00 in overall garbage disposal costs for 1990. We thank everyone whose efforts helped make recycling work.

However, it is only the beginning. Through source reduction and increased markets for the recycled materials, our waste stream can be further reduced and even greater savings realized. In time a regional solution may yet become reality; but for the present it is up to us. Recycling works if we all do our part.

As approved at Town Meeting, the selectmen entered into contract with Cartographics Inc. for the production of new town tax maps. Work on this project, including aerial photography and field work, has progressed on schedule, and the finished product should be available this coming June. Please remember that ample opportunity will be afforded all interested parties to review these maps and suggest changes before final acceptance by the selectmen.

Also in accordance with Town Meeting vote, a new sander and a used dump truck and plow were purchased for our Highway Department. The truck is a 1973 International. It replaced our 1970 Chevy which is now being used for parts. We are fortunate that our current employees possess the necessary skills to perform much of the repair and maintenance work required to keep our equipment functioning. When older equipment is relied upon, many man-hours are expended simply to keep it running.

Aside from routine road maintenance we are currently engaged in a long-term program of widening critical sections of our roads and rebuilding the ditches in order to improve drainage and lessen the possibility of washouts. This type of work was done on the Jay Allen Road in the vicinity of the cemetery, the upper portion of Honey Road, the Marlow Hill Road before its junction with Honey Road, and the Baine Road at the top of Phelps Hill, where it also included curve mitigation. This work is accomplished utilizing only our own men and equipment. It entails the cutting of trees, removal of stumps and dirt, resetting of driveway culverts, and regrading the road surface.

Regrettably, no further work was done to upgrade Sand Pond Road. Work on this road will require substantial appropriations and will undoubtedly require contracted labor in order to accomplish anything in a timely manner. Eventually this matter will have to be addressed.

This past June our agreement to mine gravel in the Miller Pit was terminated. This leaves the town in the awkward position of having no viable gravel source at its disposal. Until such time as one is found, the town will be forced to purchase both bank run and crushed gravel from commercial operations at decidedly increased costs.

During a routine bridge inspection conducted by State engineers this past summer, the Cameron Bridge was determined to be unsafe for continued use, and the town was advised to close it. This was done at once, and various methods of replacing it were investigated. Fortunately we were able to obtain adequate steel girders at a reasonable cost, and the bridge was rebuilt mainly by our own crew with a minimum of contracted labor.

As addressed in a warrant article, the town has the opportunity to relinquish control of the Cameron Bridge and turn it and the road beyond it back to the abutter, who has requested such action. Should this article meet with favorable action, the landowner has agreed to reimburse the town for all costs beyond our own crew's time incurred in replacing the bridge. This would return roughly \$2500.00 to the town and relieve us of any further responsibility for this bridge and stretch of road.

Finally we take this opportunity to express our appreciation to our office staff without whom we would find it difficult indeed to accomplish anything.

And to all of you reading this report, please attend the Town Meeting. Your input, opinions, and votes are very important. They are the only means we have of determining the course to pursue during the entire year. Thank you for your interest and cooperation.

ABSTRACT OF THE 1990 TOWN MEETING

Meeting was called to order at 10:15 AM in Jones Hall by Moderator Charles Strickland. The rules of the meeting were read by the Moderator including the reason and directions for voting on the position "Road Committee — 3 Year Term." The voting process was agreeable to Mrs. Rose Foote, the candidate who filed to run for this position.

The Moderator then began reading the results of the election on Tuesday, March 13, 1990:

Article 1: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. Results of the

Article 2: Amendments to Town Zoning Ordinance. 195 ballots cast.

 To amend Section 202 of the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Marlow by inserting alphabetically in the Term Definition for commercial use: "COMMERCIAL USE - The conducting of business involving the sale of one or more products, the provision of one or more services, or any combination thereof."

YES: 88 NO: 90 ABSTAINED: 17 DEFEATED

2. To delete subparagraph 2 of Section 408.4 of the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Marlow, said paragraph containing the following: "In the event an application for approval is not granted by the Marlow Planning Board for a proposed commercial use, commercial use change, or additional commercial use, in either Zone I or II, the applicant may appeal to the Zoning Board of Adjustment as outlined in Article VI, Section 605, 606 or 607 of this Ordinance. This was omitted in the official printing of the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Marlow.

YES: 104 NO: 85 ABSTAINED: 3 PASSED

Article 3: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:28, V and VI for an optional veterans' exemption and an expanded qualifying war service for veterans seeking the exemption? The optional veterans' exemption is \$100 rather than \$50.

YES: 107 NO: 85 ABSTAINED: 3 PASSED

Article 4: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:35, IV for an optional property tax exemption on residential property for a service-connected total disability? The optional disability exemption is \$1400 rather than \$700.

YES: 124 NO: 85 ABSTAINED: 3 PASSED

Article 5: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:37, for the exemption for the blind from property taxes. This statute provides that every inhabitant who is legally blind shall be exempt each year from the property tax on a residence to the value of \$15,000.

YES: 124 NO: 68 ABSTAINED: 3 PASSED

The Moderator then announced that a recount had been requested by Mr. Donald Blanchard for the results of the position "Selectman - 3 years." The recount was to be conducted at the Town Offices on Forest Road, at 7:00 PM, on Wednesday, March 21, 1990.

Immediately following the announcements by the Moderator, the motion was made and seconded that the next articles to be considered be Article 31, 32 and 33.

Article 31: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law, RSA 32. (By petition) A "YES" vote would mean adopt the provision, and "NO" would mean reject it.

YES: 27 NO: 51 Article 31 - DEFEATED

The motion was made and accepted to pass over Article 32 and Article 33.

Article 32: To see whether the Town wishes to have the members at large of the budget committee appointed by the moderator or elected by the Town Meeting. (By petition.)

Article 33: To see if the Town wishes to have the budget committee consist of 3, 6, 9 or 12 members at large. (By petition.)

The motion to table Articles 32 and 33 PASSED by voice vote.

Article 6: Motion was made and seconded to raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town expenses for the year ensuing, and make appropriations of the same, as set forth in the following budget, for a total of \$249,767.00.

Motion was made and seconded to decrease the operating budget by \$9,200.00, for a total appropriation of \$240,567.00. There was a standing vote.

YES: 39 NO: 27 The amendment to decrease the budget PASSED.

Motion was made and seconded to add \$200.00 to the Library budget to support the development and presentation of special programs that will benefit the people of Marlow. There was a voice vote. The addition of \$200.00 to the Library budget PASSED.

Motion was made and seconded to vote on Article 6.

PASSED by a voice vote.

Amended budget of \$240,767.00 passed by voice vote. Unanimous.

Motion was made and seconded to skip to Article 27. Motion PASSED.

Article 27: Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Four Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy Three dollars (\$24,873.00) for the acquisition of new tax maps, to be prepared by Cartographics Associates, Inc., and to authorize the issuance of not more than Nine Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy Three dollars (\$9,873.00) of notes in accordance with the provision of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33), and to authorize the town officials to issue and negotiate such notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon; furthermore, to authorize the withdrawal of Five Thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) from the Town Tax Maps Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose; with the balance of Ten Thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) to be raided by General Taxation. (2/3 ballot vote required).

Motion was PASSED by written ballot. YES: 54 NO: 23 (2/3 vote is 52)

Article 7: Motion was made and seconded to authorize the Tax Collector to give a two percent (2%) cash discount on all property taxes which are paid within ten (10) days after the date of the tax bill.

Article 7 PASSED on a voice vote. Unanimous.

Article 8: Motion was made and seconded to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes when necessary under terms and interest rates which they deem to be in the best interest of the Town.

Article 8 PASSED by voice vote. Unanimous.

Article 9: Motion was made and seconded to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal and state grants which may become available during the course of the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-B, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money.

Article 9 PASSED by voice vote. Unanimous.

Article 10: Motion was made and seconded to authorize the selectmen to sell or dispose of any town equipment which they deem to be outdated, outmoded and/or of no further use to the town. The manner of such disposal shall be determined by the selectmen.

Article 10 PASSED by voice vote.

Article 11: Motion was made and seconded to authorize the selectmen to sell or convey any real estate which the town has acquired, or may acquire, through tax collector's deeds. Such sale shall be through auction or sealed bids, or otherwise as justice may require, in accordance with RSA 80:80.

Article 11 PASSED by voice vote.

Article 12: Motion was made and seconded to authorize the selectmen to update the official names of all Class V highways within the boundaries of Marlow, and, after sufficient public review, affix appropriate signs at relevant intersections utilizing available funds.

Article 12 PASSED by voice vote.

Article 13: Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00) for the restoration of old Town Records. Said project to be under the control of the Town Clerk.

Article 13 PASSED by voice vote.

Article 14: Motion was made and seconded for the Town to abolish the Cemetery Committee. All powers and duties of the Cemetery Committee to be assumed by the Trustees of the Trust Funds. The funds normally budgeted annually by the town for the maintenance of the cemeteries to be controlled and administered by the Trustees of the Trust Funds. (RSA 31:19, 31:22, 289:7).

Article 14 PASSED by voice vote.

Article 15: Motion was made and seconded for the Town to vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Hundred Dollars (\$1300.00) to purchase an advanced type of fire-fighting foam and related equipment for use on the Town's M2 Fire Department vehicle.

Article 15 PASSED by voice vote

Article 16: Motion was made and seconded for the Town to vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand (\$7000.00) to renovate or replace, as appropriate, the pump and water tank on the 1962 GMC American LaFrance fire truck known as M3.

Article 16 PASSED by voice vote.

Article 17: Motion was made and seconded to accept the donation of a 1989 Ford Ambulance, serial number IFDJE34M9KHB91468, from the Marlow Fire Department Ambulance and Rescue Squad at no cost to the Town. Said vehicle is currently being used to provide emergency transportation and medical services to the towns of Marlow, Stoddard, Gilsum, East Alstead, and parts of Washington.

Article 17 PASSED by voice vote.

Article 18. Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to be added to the Highway Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

Article 19: Motion was made and seconded to approve applying the trade-in value of the Town's previous Ford Backhoe-Loader towards the lease/purchase of the new Ford 655A Backhoe-Loader currently in service. Amount allowed was Ten Thousand, Eight Hundred Ninety-One Dollars (\$10,891.00) and the Lease/Purchase Agreement was approved at the 1989 Town Meeting.

Article 19 PASSED by voice vote.

Article 20: Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty Nine Dollars (\$5,839.00) for the purchase and installation of a plow frame, hydraulic pump and wing tower and authorize the withdrawal of Five Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty-Nine Dollars (\$5,839.00) from the Highway Road Equipment Capital Reserved Fund for that purpose. (This expenditure was approved at the 1989 Town Meeting under Article 13 and the objective was accomplished in 1989, however the bill for the above described equipment and service was received in 1990.)

Article 20 PASSED by voice vote.

Article 21: Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to purchase a used dump truck and authorize the withdrawal of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) from the Highway Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund for that purpose.

Article 21 PASSED by voice vote.

Article 22: Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$5,300.00) for the purchase and installation of a Fontaine Model AC 2420 Series "A" Hydraulic Sand Spreader and authorize withdrawal of Five Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$5,300.00) from the Highway Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund for that purpose.

Motion was made and seconded to table Article 22. It was defeated by a standing

vote. Yes (table the article): 30 NO (do not table it): 36

Motion was made and seconded to accept Article 22 as written.

Article 22 PASSED by a standing vote. YES: 47 NO: 18

Article 23: Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Two Thousand Dollars (\$22,000.00) for the purpose of continuing the upgrading and repair of the Sand Pond Road commenced in 1989 and additionally authorize the use of the December 31, 1989 fund balance of Seven Thousand Three Hundred Seventy-Five Dollars (\$7,375.00) for this purpose. (This balance represents the unexpended amount of the 1989 appropriation for the Sand Pond Road.) The balance of Fourteen Thousand Six Hundred Twenty-Five Dollars (\$14,625.00) to be raised from general taxation.

Article 23 TABLED by a standing vote. YES: (table the article): 30 NO: (do not

table it): 23

Article 24: Motion was made and seconded to discontinue the unmaintained portion of Reed Road, so called, passing over land of Hopkins and Welch and Gorges, which was bypassed as a result of highway reconstruction on New Hampshire Route 10 in 1964.

Article 24 PASSED by voice vote.

Article 25: Motion was made and seconded to discontinue the unmaintained portion of road leading to the former George E. Reed farm in Stoddard, passing over land of Hopkins and Welch, beginning at the bend or corner in Reed Road as presently maintained and continuing to the Stoddard Town Line.

Article 25 PASSED by voice vote.

Article 26: Motion was made and seconded to correct the wording of the Capital Reserve Fund set up for the purpose of updating and redrawing the town's tax maps to acquisition of new town tax maps.

Article 26 PASSED by voice vote.

Article 28: Motion was made and seconded to authorize the selectmen to enter into contract on behalf of the town with AVITAR Associates of New England, Inc., a private appraisal firm that has been approved by the Department of Revenue Administration, for a complete revaluation of the town, and to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Eight Thousand Dollars (\$38,000.00) for that purpose and to authorize the issuance of not more than Fifteen Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$15,200.00) of notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the town officials to issue and negotiate such notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon: furthermore, to authorize the withdrawal of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000.00) from the town Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose; with the balance of Thirteen Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$13,800.00) to be raised by general taxation. Revaluation to be completed for the tax year 1991. (2/3 ballot vote required.)

Article 28 DEFEATED by written ballot. YES: 15 NO: 56

Article 29: Motion was made and seconded to designate and proclaim April 22 1990 as Earth Day, 1990 and to set aside that day for public activities promoting preservation of the global environment and launching the "Decade of the Environment". (By petition).

Article 30: Motion was made and seconded to direct its representative to the Southwest Solid Waste Management District that the highest priority shall be placed on real waste reduction and recycling and that refuse disposal facilities shall be sized to meet the needs of district communities without bringing in any outside trash. (By petition.)

Motion was made and seconded to amend the article to remove "and that refuse disposal facilities shall be sized to meet the need of district communities without bringing in any outside trash" and to read "....to direct its representative to the Southwest Solid Waste Management District that the highest priority shall be placed on real waste reduction and recycling."

Article 30 amended as above PASSED by a voice vote.

Article 34: Motion was made and seconded to impose a spending limit on the 1990 town budget. Any increase in the total town budget to be limited in sum not to exceed 3% above that amount budgeted and approved for the year 1989. Said vote to be by written ballot. (By petition.)

Motion was made and seconded to table Article 34.

Article 34 TABLED by voice vote.

Article 35: Motion was made and seconded to act upon any other business that may legally come before the meeting. Motion was made and seconded that we do not print the property evaluations next year in the town report.

Motion was **DEFEATED** by voice vote.

Motion was made and seconded to print individual assessments in the town report under the budget, using existing available funds.

Motion was <u>PASSED</u> by a voice vote.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to correct the wording of the Capital Reserve Fund set up for the purpose of purchasing heavy highway road equipment.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to be added to the Heavy Highway Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the Cameron Road (A.k.a. Jefts Road) from the northern extremity of the Cameron Bridge to its termination point in Jeffrey Heleen's dooryard. (Positive action on this article will revert the entire portion of the road involved to its sole abutter, Jeffrey Heleen, and relieve the town of further responsibility for the bridge.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to Article 13. exceed Thirty Two Hundred Dollars (\$3,200.00) for the purpose of purchasing a steam cleaner for the use of the Town Highway Department. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to Article 14. exceed Thirty One Hundred Dollars (\$3,100,00) for the purpose of installing a poured concrete floor in the original section of the Town Highway Barn and upgrading the exterior siding on said structure. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw the sum of \$395.30 plus Article 15. interest accumulated from the Capital Reserve Fund-New Town Tax Maps and to place such funds in the Town General Fund. MARLOW PUBLIC LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT

The town library is a vital part of any community. Our library serves Marlow residents three days a week, all year round, and is available to town groups and

committees for holding meetings and activities which are open to the public.

Since May 1990 a new system has been implemented which ensures the confidentiality of library patrons. To date 182 Marlow residents have registered to use the library, which offers magazines, reference material, juvenile literature, children's books, and adult fiction and non-fiction. The librarian orders new selections regularly, and can obtain books through Inter-Library Loan. Circulation has increased by 883 in 1990, and is up 1300 from the year before.

Activities sponsored by the library this year included: a family game night; The Little Red Wagon. a travelling children's theater group; Native-American story-telling by Kathy Raynes; and a children's sing-along led by Robyn Miller. The trustees hosted a successful coffee shop and book sale during Old Home Days, made possible through the donation of baked goods and books by community members. Visitors to

Old Home Days also enjoyed our "Days Gone By" bulletin board.

Volunteers have made a big difference! Thanks to Fran Strickland, Yolanda De Robertes, the third gradedclass (for the bulletin board), Faith Plumb, Cheryl Ciccone, Jen Avery and Sarah Avery.

1990 was a discouraging year for the Marlow Volunteer Fire Department. We proposed a bare bones budget to the budget committee in January. They made even further cuts. After town meeting we took a 5% overall cut along with all other departments. At annual town meeting a warrant article for repair of M-3 tank and pump was approved for \$5,000.00, although the request had been for \$7,000.00. The \$2,000.00 additional had to come out of our regular operating budget. This left us with no money for drills, training or new gear.

1991 does promise to be a better year. Captain Richard Hebert has spent many hours setting up a Fire Fighter One Certification Course, due to start February 27, 1991. Seven members have signed up to take this course. It will take about four months to complete and should make Marlow Volunteer Fire Department much better

trained to do its job.

We have also spent many hours taking a complete inventory of all Marlow Volunteer Fire Department property. We now have a very accurate list of members including each person's current level of training, personal gear held by each, and its condition.

Thanks to John and Pearl Perkins for once again donating a beautiful large Christmas wreath for the front of the fire station. Thanks also to all who have donated money and or time to help us throughout the year.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

During Calendar Year 1990, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without a fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden, permit fires that escaped control and rekindled fires. All of these fires are preventable, but ONLY with your help.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27 II) requires that "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any materials in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 2224:27 II and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1990, including a 262 acre fire in Moultonboro and several fires in Hooksett.

In 1990, the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands trained 844 local Wardens and Deputy Wardens in the Incident Command System (ICS), an incident management system for all types of emergencies. In 1991, Wardens will be trained in the use of Class A foam in wildfire suppression.

to us last year.

REPORT OF TOWN AUDITOR

The audit of the books and financial records for the entire year of 1989 is now complete. Cash book entries were verified to source documents, invoices and vouchers. Also motor vehicle permits, dog licenses, marriage licenses and property tax vouchers.

The year-end bank statements were reconciled to the check book and cash book balances.

The Trust Fund account statements were examined and found all in order, they are handled by the Trust Department of the Granite Bank, which makes this less time consuming.

The tax collector's computerized records and hard book were both accurate and balanced. The only problem was that people took the discount for the entire year, instead of half the year on each billing. This proved to be very time consuming, making sure that the bills were corrected properly.

The audit of the Library records found everything in balance. The only problem was

that there were 7 invoices missing, where checks were made out.

The following invoices were missing: #436, 437, 424, 420, 410, 406 and 402. They should make sure they have a copy of every invoice paid out, even if it's a photocopy.

The following discrepancies were found in the audit of the town clerk. There were overcharges on 3 motor vehicle permits which will have to be refunded, they are as follows: May 21, 1989 — \$48.00; January 1, 1989 — \$45.00; April 14, 1989 — \$72.00; Total of \$165.00.

Also, there were 3 motor vehicle permits missing and not listed in the cash book. I have called Concord about these permits and they found that they were issued in 3 different towns; they will be getting back to me on these.

The town clerk's year end report to the treasurer was \$50.00 off from the actual figure. This was an addition error; she mistook a figure when totaling the cash book. Also the total figure of funds turned over to the treasurer was \$124.00 short, which was corrected in January 1990.

I found that the town clerk makes over or under deposits quite often, which makes a lot of book work and is very time consuming when doing the audit. I would advise the town clerk to do her report to the treasurer before she makes her final deposit for the month. This way she would know if she was over or under beforehand.

She should also total her cashbook for each month and carry the ending total to the bottom of the page. This way there will be less chance of picking up the wrong figure

from the previous month.

The final records of the Selectmen's office, the tax collector and the town clerk and the treasurer, for the year of 1989, are considered accurate and correct. This audit was conducted in accordance with State RSA Regulations.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT

What is a Conservation Commission?

- Protects and encourages proper use of local resources
- Protects watershed areas
- Conducts research on use of local land and water areas
- Seeks to coordinate local unofficial conservation groups
- Establishes an index of open space and wetlands areas with information as to their proper and best use
- Files an annual report describing commission activity

The Marlow Conservation Commission usually meets on the second Monday of each month and at various other times when necessary to investigate a site.

April 28 four members attended the Community National Resource Workshop in Keene. Since there were several subjects presented, we split up to cover all sessions so that in the future we could share with each other what we had learned. Subjects covered: site plan review, community natural resource planning, high intensity soil survey mapping, wetlands protection and regulations, interpreting engineering plans and wetlands identification (verbal discussion and films). The afternoon session was a field trip for wetlands identification and delineation. We studied various land markings, vegetation and soils to enable us to determine an official wetland area.

Also in April we participated in Marlow's celebration of Earth Day. A film was borrowed and shown throughout the day, literature and refreshments were provided to

the public in the Town Library.

On May 29 we, along with Statewide Program of Action to Conserve our Environment (SPACE) and Cheshire County Cooperative Extension Office, cosponsored a Current-Use Workshop to inform and answer questions of area residents about the purpose of current-use programs, application process, policies, conflicts and results.

Early June we received a complaint about concrete being dumped into the Ashuelot River during State removal of guardrails. A couple of phone calls by the Conservation Commission and by afternoon local transportation highway authorities assured us that concrete would be removed and measures would be taken to prevent more concrete falling into the river. Within three days, said concrete was removed and no further incidents occurred.

During the summer months we viewed two sites regarding driveways in possible wetland sites which proved not to be wet areas. We joined ZBA in viewing a proposed septic system site near Village Pond and made our recommendations.

Taking advantage of the long summer days, we called meetings earlier than usual to drive around Marlow to view ponds, rivers and streams and acquaint ourselves with town roads as a precursor to our preparation for the 1991 natural resource inventory project.

One member attended the 20th Annual Meeting of the NH Association of Conservation Commissions. Seminars attended were: Conservation Commissions' Responsibilities for New Members and Process of Wetlands Board Permits and

Conservation Commission Reports.

In November we investigated four separate sites ranging from rip-rap along the river's edge, to gravel excavation in possible wetland area, to damage resulting from a clear-cut operation. These sites were viewed, documented with text and pictures, discussed at our next meeting and letters produced and sent to the Wetlands Board with copies to the respective landowners.

We have had a good year and 1991 will be busier and more rewarding as we have a full complement of interested and devoted members. Our goals for 1991 are to provide more educational workshops for Marlow residents, build better communication, cooperation and support with other town committees and officials and to accomplish the natural resource inventory — all in an effort to protect and encourage proper use of our resources!

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

At this time I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen, town residents and other town agencies for their continuous support of the police department in 1990.

Your police department has answered 315 calls, made 17 arrests, put in 546 hours in court, and patrolled a total of 51 hours. Our total hours for 1990 came to 536 and we drove a total of 5.493 miles.

In 1990 the police department has seen a substantial increase in calls and arrests over the previous years. The amount of calls increased from 240 in 1989 to 315 in 1990. This is attributed to town residents showing a more concerned interest in the safety and the security of their town, your continued support in reporting any suspicious activities to the dispatch center at 352-1100 will help us make Marlow a safer place for all residents.

PLANNING BOARD

Although 1990 was a quiet year as far as subdivision, building or development was concerned, the Marlow Planing Board, with a full complement of Board members, was kept quite busy throughout the year. Rules of procedure and organization were approved and implemented. A comprehensive set of rules of order were adopted. Very thorough procedures for regularly scheduled business meetings were formed and conduct of public hearings in regards to the Planning Board were established. In order to cover situations or projects that could not be completed at the monthly meetings, conduct of workshop meetings were also put into effect.

Several months were spent in formulating a questionnaire for the townspeople in regards to a survey of possible industrial development in Marlow. The questionnaire was mailed with the property inventories and the results were studied in depth by the Planning Board. The questions were:

- What types of industry would you like to see in Marlow? (Light, heavy or none) Examples could be listed.
- 2. Should an industry be considered by how much area it would cover or the number of employees?
- 3. Would you consider a small industrial park to be suitable for development of industry? (Yes or No.)
- 4. If an industrial park were to be developed, are there particular areas in town more adaptable for this type of development?
- 5. What considerations and criteria would you apply in evaluating a prospective industry?
- 6. If industry were excluded from Marlow, should the town be developed as a bedroom community for the larger towns surrounding it?
- 7. If Marlow remains a rural community, what ideas would you use to broaden our tax base?
- 8. If an industrial zone were developed, should it be within the current commercial zones (by zoning ordinance all of N.H. Route 10)?
- 9. Would you be willing to serve on a committee made up of townspeople, business people and a representative of each of the Land Use Boards to assist in developing a plan for industrial growth in Marlow?
- 10. Should a Chamber of Commerce be formed to promote the kinds of suitable businesses that the town would favor?

The following is a summary of the answers to the Planning Board Survey:

In answer to the first question, the respondents felt that some kind of light industry in Marlow would be a good thing. The vote was 45 in favor of light industry, 7 for heavy industry, and 14 for no industry — a ratio of over 2 to 1. Some examples of light industry included: a small machine shop, a woodworking plant, a distribution/warehouse business, a craft manufacturing business, a high-tech assembly plant, etc.

According to Question 2, most people answering the survey felt that an industry should be considered for this town in terms of <u>both</u> the area it will cover and the number of employees hired.

For the third questions, most people believed that a small industrial park would be suitable for the development of industry. The vote was 38 to 26 in favor of this idea.

The fourth question, however, revealed some ambivalence on the part of the respondents as to where this site should be located. Indeed, most people registered no opinion on this question. Many people felt only that it should be

far from the center of town. Route 10 Commercial Zone was suggested, and some fewer suggested Route 123. A few requested that the wetlands be protected.

The answer to the fifth questions showed that almost half the residents felt that environmental and pollution factors were the most important criteria in evaluating a prospective industry. Thirty (30) voted for this, while nineteen (19) others left this question blank. The other twelve (12) mentioned such things as tax base, traffic problems, and the necessity of hiring only local people.

The next answer demonstrated little enthusiasm for the idea of making Marlow a bedroom community for the larger towns around us. Only eleven (11) embraced the idea, while twenty one (21) rejected it, and twenty six (26) had no opinion, (which seemed to indicate to the Planning Board that although they would not

object to the idea, they did not feel it worthy of active pursuit.)

The greatest problem was revealed in answers to Question 7, which asked for ideas to broaden the tax base should Marlow decide to remain a rural community. Some ideas were mentioned, but were actually supported by very few. Three respondents suggested taxing current industries; two more thought Current Use designation should be stopped. Other ideas included a broad-based tax, development of senior housing, a lottery. But thirty seven (37) others, an overwhelming majority, left this question blank.

A roughly even three-way split developed in answer to Question 8. Twenty two (22) respondents felt that an industrial zone should be developed within the current zone (Route 10). Seventeen (17) felt it should not be so developed.

Twenty three (23) others left this question blank.

Roughly 25% of the respondents indicated that they would be willing to serve on a committee to develop a plan for industrial growth in Marlow, answering Question 9.

Finally, a resounding NO put down the idea of developing a Chamber of Commerce to promote business. The vote was 19 in favor, 34 opposed.

The Planning Board wishes to thank all of those who took the time to register their opinions and inform us of their preferences. These responses will be carefully studied in planning any course of action the Board might wish to take. As always, citizens are encouraged to make their feelings on these questions known to us at any meeting or at any other time.

In summary, I would like to thank each and every board member and alternate for the time and effort that they have contributed in the past year. To the almost 20 citizens who expressed a willingness to serve on a committee to develop a plan for industrial growth in Marlow, we would love to see and hear from you at our meetings the second Tuesday of every month. Addressing the current comprehensive plan and zoning ordinances as well as possible future site-plan review changes is rapidly looming as a necessary undertaking by the Town of Marlow; an undertaking with which the Planning Board would appreciate any assistance available.

MARLOW RECYCLING COMMITTEE REPORT

In October of 1990, the Marlow Recycling Center/Transfer Station reached its first full year of operation. The continued co-operation of Marlow residents has helped keep things running well. Due to recycling, the town has saved approximately \$6000 in disposal costs this past year. At the present time, we are collecting eight (8) categories for recycling: plastic, glass, aluminum cans, tin cans, newsprint, mixed paper, corrugated cardboard, and scrap metal. It appears that some residents may not be aware that we are recycling mixed paper and tin cans. We ask everyone to please recycle ALL of these items — recycling is mandatory and the more we recycle, the more we can save.

We continue to collect the 5¢ returnables, the proceeds going to benefit the school playground fund. As of October of 1990, the playground fund received over \$400 as a result of this collection. The Marlow Playground Committee thanks you for your help.

As most of you know, the container for construction debris, furniture, and bulky waste has not been available; it has been temporarily removed. Because of the 5% cut in the town budget at last year's town meeting, we were required to cut approximately \$2000 from the transfer station's operating budget. When deciding where to cut this money, it was felt that the loss of the demolition container for a few months would produce the least impact on residents and would save the most money. If it were not for the money saved by recycling, we would not have had the money to keep the demolition container for as long as we did. The demolition container will return in the spring. This part of our disposal costs is very high and we are working on ways to lessen this expense for the town.

Brush and other burnables have been collected at the old dump on occasional Saturdays. Notices of collection days are always posted 2 weeks in advance. We hope to establish regularly scheduled days for the collection of these materials and we

apologize for any inconvenience you may have experienced.

We now have a "Swap Shoppe" for second hand items. Residents may bring in usable items any time during operating hours. We encourage everyone to come in and look around; you never know what treasures you may find. All items are free and we

have an excellent return policy.

The state of N.H. now requires all transfer stations and recycling centers to be operated by a certified attendant. Our facility is operated by one paid, certified attendant with occasional help from non-paid volunteers. If you have questions or need assistance, please ask your attendant or volunteer; they are there to help and to ensure that things continue to run smoothly. The hours of operation are Wednesday 4 to 7 PM and Saturday 8 AM to 4 PM.

During this past year, the committee has continued to look for ways to increase our efficiency, expand services, and keep costs down. We look forward to some positive changes this coming year. We welcome your comments and suggestions and encourage you to attend any of our meetings. The Recycling Committee meets about once a month or so, and notices are posted in advance.
