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SELECTMEN'S REPORT FOR 2011

Tough fiscal times continue for Rollinsford and most local government in New Hampshire and across the country in 2011. The deficit gap for governments reflects the declining revenues and rising costs. Many young families with children in the school system plead to fund an adequate education system. Meanwhile, older people on Social Security cry that rising property tax rates will soon force them to sell their homes in a weak housing market. One group says to cut budgets and reduce the tax rate, while another says we need more business to expand the tax base while essential service spending should continue to ensure an adequate education for the children who will inherit the debt and entitlement problems now on the horizon.

Rollinsford is in better shape than many local governments because it has little bonded debt to repay. The last \$50,000 principal payment on the Town Hall renovation bond is due in 2013. During 2011 several employee changes occurred. In the Police Department, Officer Baker resigned and was replaced by Officer Lajoie, who brings military police experience and previous experience as a certified Officer in Maine. Part time police officers were added to full gaps in staffing patterns, part time Officer Carroll, and part time Officer Bailey, who will act as the town animal control officer. In the tax collectors office, Andrea Cass took over in January 2011 replacing Pam Morgan who resigned to start enjoying retirement. At the transfer station Robert Strauss and Robert Grant resigned due to health issues and were replaced by Robert Norris and Richard Hackett. Richard Fogarty replaced Phyllis Ross as the janitor in the Town Hall.

The part-time secretary position in the police department held by Denise Foss was eliminated in the 2012 police budget. Officers will now perform the duties formerly assigned to the secretary. Citizens looking for police forms or information should call the police and schedule a meeting with the officer on duty. The Selectmen thank Denise for 19 years of loyal service to the Police Department and understand the adjustment imposed on her by the restructuring of the police department.

In 2011 the road drainage project on General John Sullivan Way was completed including 720 feet of drainage pipe and six catch basins. Hopefully this will enable adjacent homeowners to reduce recycling of water from sump pumping and reduce ice build up on the road surface. Ice has been forming on several town streets as a result of discharge water from sump pumps in private homes flowing into streets and freezing. Whenever, such runoff from private homes occurs, the homeowner will be required to divert water to a dry well or redirect the water away from the road.

The 2012 capital budget items include \$150,800 for a new highway truck equipped with a new snow-plow and sander. The current truck is 23 years old and becoming unreliable and requires frequent expensive repairs. The police department is requesting a \$29,000 appropriation for a new police cruiser. Priority for the cruiser arose after a cruiser was rear ended and totaled last year on Portland Avenue while responding to a call. A Fire Department request for a \$65,000 renovation of Engine 3 was postponed until 2013 in an effort to help hold down budget costs. Likewise, the Selectmen postponed a request for a \$50,000 increase in the paving budget until 2013 or 2014.

The Planning Board has approved (Feb. 2012) a new Capital Improvement Plan that identifies capital expenditures recommended for the 2012-2020 time period.

Finally, a capital budget request to take \$200,000 from the Land Trust Fund to be used to finance the

\$200,000 contribution to the conservation land purchase approved by a Special Town Meeting on July 12, 2011. If approved the \$200,000 scheduled to be raised by bond would be replaced by land trust funds. The town would benefit by avoiding up front bond issue costs and eliminate future bond repayment costs. The transfer of \$200,000 from the Land Trust Fund would not change the 2012 tax rate for the town. The land project approved enables the town to accept the 90 acres scheduled for over 200 condos as a wetland reestablishment project that would be subject to Federal no build restrictions.

The proposed 2012 budget represents a cooperative effort by Department Heads, the Selectmen and the Budget Committee; to address municipal budget needs while remaining aware of the financial burden faced by taxpayers. Lower non-property tax revenues, a reduction in State funding for retirement, and rising costs for petroleum based products, and combined declining house values and lower household incomes add to a crisis that will probably continue for several more years. The proposed 2012 total operating budget totals \$1,390,998.00 or an increase of \$30,302.

The combined tax rate increase for the town, school and county budgets in 2012 appears to be approximately \$1.40 per \$1000 of assessed value. (Town = \$.33, school operating and capital items = \$1.00 and county = \$.09)

The Selectmen again wish to recognize the contributions of employees in the Town Hall, Police Department, Fire Department, Highway Department and the Transfer Station. Likewise, we recognize the dedication of volunteers on the Budget Committee, Planning Board, Zoning Board of Adjustment, Conservation Committee, Recreation Committee, and the Library. The Police Chief, Fire Chief, and the Road Agent provide examples of high work ethics, dedication and leadership.

Dear Residents,

2011 was a very productive year for the fire department. In February we organized and started our first youth program, the Rollinsford Fire Explorers Post #1, and it has been very rewarding. They have been very active within the department and community, raising money and collecting food for local charities. Two of the explorers have gone on to join the ranks of the regular firefighters, and March will see a third do the same. Their enthusiasm and dedication is invigorating and I am proud of them all.

Thanks to the members of the community, we were able to purchase and put into service a slide in tank & pump unit to enhance our brush firefighting capabilities. The new unit saw action several times, the first fire being two days after we took delivery of the unit.

Also put into service this year was a 2011 Ford E-450 Utility Van, replacing the 1984 Chevrolet van. It carries medical, extrication, flooding, rescue and fire suppression equipment. This new vehicle is a valued addition to the fleet and should serve the community very well for many years to come.

The Rollinsford Firefighters Association has been busy with the monthly pancake breakfasts, and we wish to thank the members of the community, our neighbors and visitors for their generosity and support.

As always, the members of the Rollinsford Fire Department are to be commended for their dedication to the town. The volunteer firefighter is a special breed of human being, dropping anything and everything at a moment's notice to help whomever, whenever.

We have the opportunity to work with other town officials on a level that I believe not many other towns can boast of. The cooperation between our departments is second to none, and I wish to thank the Rollinsford Police and Highway Department's for their continued support to make our community a safe place to live and visit.

There have been several personnel changes within the department since last year. First, Officer Baker resigned in July to pursue other interests. We wish him the best. In November we hired a part time officer, Officer William Carroll, formerly of Rollinsford and he is now attending the part time academy. We also hired Animal Control Officer Matthew Bailey, after not having an ACO for the last two years. Baker's full time position was filled by Officer Jamie Lajoie who started January 1. Officer Lajoie has a couple years of experience with a Maine police department.

Administrative Assistant Denise Foss' position was eliminated from the 2012 police budget in an effort to help keep the budget from experiencing a significant increase, as other fixed costs not within the town's control rose sharply. Denise was my first hire after assuming the Chief's position in 1992. She has been a most valuable employee and friend throughout the years. We have watched her children grow to mature adults during that time. It was a most difficult decision and one that did not come easily, but my preference has always been to have police on the streets protecting the good citizens of Rollinsford for as much time as the budgets would allow. We all wish Denise and her family the best with their future endeavors and she will be missed.

Sergeant Jonathan Uraskevich was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant effective January 1. He continues to oversee the patrol functions and prosecution department. He was also awarded the Officer of the Year Award for 2011.

The department applied for and received three grants last year, one which allowed us to equip the conference room with the necessary equipment for an Emergency Operations Center for use in large scale emergencies or natural disasters. The EOC was put to use during Hurricane Irene. The remaining two grants allowed us to install an in-cruiser digital camera in one of the cruisers and the other a lap top in one of the cruisers. Overall we received over \$25,000.00 in equipment and software last year to better facilitate our operations.

We have already applied for three grants for year 2012 which have been approved pending acceptance and authorization to purchase a cruiser in 2012. The grant money will be used to purchase a digital camera, lap top, and radar unit for the vehicle. The grants are valued at \$7500.00.

Overall calls for service continue to increase. As you know we experienced our second armed bank robbery in as many years, and just like the first one, the second was solved and arrests were made within a few weeks.

The town has experienced an increase in home burglaries the last couple of years. The majority was from the Rollins Road area and that individual had since been caught and sent to jail. Just recently we

experienced another round of home burglaries in the Heritage Drive/Moses Carr Road area, and I am pleased to report that our suspect in those burglaries has been arrested in Florida on other charges and we eagerly await his return to NH.

We continue to solve the majority of our major criminal cases. We also have a very successful conviction rate both at the Superior and District Courts. This is a direct result of the dedicated and hardworking individuals of the police department who take that extra time to get things done and done correctly.

As I start my 20th year as Chief of Police, I reflect on the many employees who have come and gone over the years and I can truly say that the current staff is the best we have ever had.

The officers of the department are committed to keeping Rollinsford the picturesque, safe community that we have all come to enjoy and expect.

I would like to thank the members of the community, other town agencies, committees, and boards for their assistance and cooperation in working with the police department.

ANNUAL REPORT

2011 was an active and productive year for the Planning Board. The Board's primary focus for 2011 was two-fold – the updating of the Town's Master Plan and the Capital Improvements Program (CIP). The goal of the Planning Board is to update/draft 2–3 chapters of the Master Plan each year. In 2011 the Introduction/Vision Statement and Land Use chapters were successfully updated and adopted. The Board began working on the Community Facilities chapter in 2011 and plans to adopt the new chapter in the spring of 2012.

The CIP is a planning tool for the Town in scheduling and funding capital expenditures. The CIP update began in the fall of 2011 and the plan was adopted in February 2012. It is the goal of the Planning Board to update the CIP annually. Thanks go out to all the department heads and the Board of Selectmen for their help putting this plan together.

Processing and permitting applications was not the primary focus of the Board this year; however, the Board did entertain several applications in 2011 including the permitting of the new C&J bus facility recently completed on Jesse Doe Road. The Board also continued its work with the Selectmen in the conservation effort of the 90+- acre property slated for residential condo development located behind Market Basket. Should the conservation project be successful the Town will end up owning the property subject to a conservation easement.

In 2012 the Board is scheduled to work on two additional Master Plan chapters – Population & Housing and Transportation. The Population & Housing chapter has not been updated for some time and the recent release of the 2010 Census is well timed for this update. The Transportation chapter is also another important chapter to update given the current focus of the Board of Selectmen and the Road Agent to prepare a long range road maintenance plan for the community.

Our Planning Consultant, John Krebs, has been extremely helpful with our Master Plan and CIP updates as well as an advisor on applications and technical matters. John has a world of experience and has proven to be invaluable.

The Planning Board normally meets once a month on the first Tuesday at 7pm at the Town Hall. These meetings are open to the public and all are welcome to attend.

In 2011 the Cemetery Trustees expended \$14,757.02 from the cemetery operating budget and \$2000.00 was put in the capital reserve fund for construction of a cremation area in New Town Cemetery. The total cemetery expenses for New Town, Old Town and Doe cemeteries for 2011 were \$16,757.02.

The trustees expended \$112.50 for the Memorial Day cleanup in the Doe Burial Ground. The area was raked and cleaned up and brush was removed from the site. This expense is withdrawn from the Doe trust.

In 2011 one four grave lot was sold in New Town cemetery.

In 2011 an additional five lots, with a total of 38 graves were added to the perpetual care list with a total of \$1800.00 added to the perpetual care trust funds.

In 2011 the town received \$75.00 in tomb rental.

In 2011 a spring grave cleanup was completed with volunteer labor.

In 2011 three stones in New Town cemetery were dug out and reset. In Old Town cemetery a few stones were repaired and reset.

The trustees would like to thank Andrea Cass, Beverly Dionne and Charisse Baker from the Rollinsford town office for the time that they put into working on cemetery business throughout the year.

The Rollinsford Cemetery trustees would also like to thank all Rollinsford taxpayers for supporting the Rollinsford cemeteries.

-The NHDES reported in the District's Annual Sanitary Survey that the Rollinsford water system is well maintained and is operated by a competent, professional operator. The Rollinsford water system meets all water quality standards.

Treasurer: Julie Gosselin

- -Porter well replacement working with the State to certify the well and put it on line. Looking at new technology to reduce costs and add treatment.
- -Consumer Confidence Reports (CCR) is sent to all home owners at the end of June. It is to report your water quality and anything that has transpired during the course of the year.
 -Biannual hydrant flushing is done to flush out areas where water does not move on a continuous bases. Customers may notice some discoloration of the water. This is temporary and will not

pose any threat to public health. The hydrant flushing helps to maintain water quality throughout the distribution system and water pressure in the pipe lines.

Reminders

- -Disposing of chemicals or gas in the ground is hazardous to our water supply.
- -Leaking toilets can be very costly. It can triple or quadruple your normal water bill.
- -It is a felony to tamper with the water meter installation and all parts.

SEWER

- -Resurfaced cement and tanks at the wastewater treatment plant
- -Electrical upgrades with Public Service to save costs
- -Infra Red to find where we are losing energy
- -Looking into other financial options to replace the pump station on Foundry St. and some sewer line.
- -Scada system is being upgraded to include all the stations
- -Annual cleaning of the sewer distribution system was accomplished to maintain the quality of the system.

Reminders

-Sump pumps overload the system. They *CANNOT* be hooked into the sewer lines. This is a finable offense.

To the inhabitants of the Rollinsford School District qualified to vote in district affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet on Saturday, February 04, 2012, at 9:00 AM at the Rollinsford Grade School in Rollinsford, New Hampshire, for the first session of the Annual School District Meeting to hear explanation, discuss and debate the subjects in said Warrant. Articles 5-12 may be amended subject to the following limitations:

- (a) Warrant articles whose wording is prescribed by law shall not be amended.
- (b) Warrant articles that are amended at the February 4th session shall be placed on the official ballot for a final vote on the main motion, as amended.

You are also hereby notified to meet again on Tuesday, March 13, 2012 for the second session of the Annual School District Meeting to vote by official ballot to elect officers, to vote questions required by law to be inserted on said official ballot, and to vote on all warrant articles from the first session. Polling hours for the March 13, 2012 sessions are 7:00 AM to 7:00 PM at the Rollinsford Town Hall.

- Article 1: To choose by ballot a School District Moderator to be elected to serve for one (1) year.
- Article 2: To choose by ballot a School District Clerk to be elected to serve for one (1) year.
- Article 3: To choose by ballot a School District Treasurer to be elected to serve for one (1) year.
- Article 4: To choose by ballot three (3) members of the School Board, two (2) member to serve a three (3) year term and one (1) member to serve a two (2) year term.

Article 5: By Petition: We, the undersigned, do request that the School Board of the Town of Rollinsford, New Hampshire, place on the ballot or on an article as required by law: Official Ballot Law 40:13

To reduce the Rollinsford Grade School budget for the 2012 Year by zero.

Article 6: To see if the Rollinsford School District will raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$5,102,614 (five million, one hundred two thousand, six hundred fourteen dollars).

Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$5,081,513 (five million, eighty one thousand, five hundred thirteen dollars) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Rollinsford School District or by law: or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with the RSA 40:13, X and XVI to take up the issue of the revised operating budget only.

To the residents of the Town of Rollinsford:

Another year has gone by and we have accomplished so many wonderful and long awaited things at the Rollinsford Grade School. We also welcome our new principal Kate Lucas.

One of the school board's goals for many years was to move the Nurse out of the Library. This year we did it. After many hours of discussion it was decided on removing a girl's bathroom across from the principal office and convert it to the Nurse's office. This plan was approved by the Fire Chief and Tom Clarke Rollinsford building inspector. Renovations were started the middle of June and were completed when school started in the fall. We also completed phase one of the Asbestos tile removal and tile replacement on the bottom floor and hope to complete phase two this year as referenced in Article 9 for a sum of \$55,982 for the main floor.

Relocations within the entire school were also approved. The goal was to place students back into the classroom and not in the halls. In order to do this Music and Art are being relocated onto the stage. Some modifications needed to be done to make using the stage safe and modify lighting to make it function as a classroom. Although not a perfect plan and one that will need to be addressed in the future it is a plan that all staff, administration and school board supported. We also moved our Library to the bottom floor to support a Media Center. Work was performed by our Librarian during the summer months on her own time as well as other staff members volunteering their time to make all the moves happen and to be completed before the new school year started. A huge THANK-YOU to all who helped it is a beautiful Media center for our students to use. All supporting projects were approved to come from the 2010/2011 budget using funds that was left over from tuition for the middle and high school due to lower then expected enrollment.

In July the school board and the Rollinsford Educational Association started to negotiate a one year contract that will save Rollinsford residents considerably this year and in ongoing years. The main portion of savings is a change to the health plan offered to school employees. Rollinsford Educational Association has agreed to an increase to their co-pay for prescription drugs. In the coming school year 2012/2013 will save the town \$10,869. An increase to the co-pay also applies to the non-union employees who qualify for insurance, which will add to this savings. However, in order to realize the above savings, the contract must pass on Tuesday, March 13, 2012. We have reduced the buyout on retirement, capped Paraprofessional's hourly wage not to exceed \$18.00 per hour and agreed to additional increase in contribution to medical insurance including the prescription drug plan mentioned above.

Committee work is continuing on the review of the area agreement and feasibility study on the placement of our 7-12 grade students. Space needs study and the CIP plans for the Rollinsford Grade school are also being worked on. Minutes of the Rollinsford School District Meeting – First Session

February 7, 2011

Rollinsford Grade School, Rollinsford, NH

Moderator Joseph Caouette called the meeting to order at 9:10 AM. All were asked to stand and recite the Pledge of Allegiance. Mr. Caouette asked for a motion to allow the SAU staff to address the gathering even though they are not Rollinsford residents. The motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously by voice vote.

Article 1: To choose by ballot a School District Moderator be elected to serve for one (1) year.

Article 2: To choose by ballot a School District Clerk to be elected to serve for one (1) year.

Article 3: To choose by ballot a School District Treasurer to be elected to serve for one (1) year.

Article 4: To choose by ballot two (2) Members of the School Board, One (1) member to serve a one (1) year term and One (1) member to serve a three (3) year term.

Article 5: To see if the Rollinsford School District will raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first deliberative session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$4,869,169 (four million, eight hundred sixty nine thousand, one hundred sixty nine dollars).

Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$4,851,543 (four million, eight hundred fifty one thousand, five hundred forty three dollars) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Rollinsford School District or by law: or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with the RSA 40:13, X and XVI to take up the issue of the revised operating budget only. Budget Committee and School Board recommend.

C. Dionne moved to accept as read. N. Leach seconded. Discussion as follows. C. Lamoureux, school board member, explained this budget was reached through a collaborative effort. Their goal as always is to keep the level of service to the children consistent. Each line reflects exact expenditures for accuracy. Goals continue to include an increase in technology and media services which are provided by the librarian. She assured the audience that they are listening and do realize this is a lot of money, but also reminded everyone that only 5-6% of the budget is actually controlled in this building. R. Wasson then asked the board to continue pushing the state to comply with their obligations and fund programs they require, especially special education services. The moderator could not determine the outcome of a voice vote, so tellers (C.Dionne, G.Flynn, L.Larkin, and R.Chabot) were appointed to count a show of hands. The motion carried – 50 yes and 8 no.

Article 6: To see if the Rollinsford School District will vote to approve the cost items included in the collective bargaining agreement reached between the Rollinsford School Board and the Rollinsford Education Association, which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits:

and furthermore, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,867 (forty thousand eight hundred sixty seven dollars) for the upcoming fiscal year such sum representing the additional costs attributable to the increase in salaries and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year.

According to RSA 273-A:12, if approved the terms of this collective bargaining agreement including the pay plan but excluding cost of living increases will continue in force and effect until a new agreement is excuted.

School Board recommends. Budget Committee does not recommend.

K. Salvati moved to open the discussion. W. Irving seconded. W. Baker asked how this money is raised. The board answered that it would be through appropriations. R. Salvati questioned what the tax impact would be. It would be approximately \$0.16 per 1000. G. Cordeiro explained the Budget Committee's opposition was based on the language which seemed to tie us into future bonuses. W. Hassett questioned whether this vote would just be for the collective bargaining. Yes, it would be. A secret ballot request was submitted by M. Rollo, C. Spencer, G.Runde, N. Dionne, and D. Rollo. The results were Yes -54 and No -27.

Article 7: To see if the Rollinsford School District, if Article 6 is defeated, authorizes the governing body to call one special meeting, at its option, to address Article 6 costs items only pursuant to RSA 197:3. K. Salvati moved to place this article on the ballot. It was seconded by W.Irving and passed by a voice vote.

Article 8: To see if the Rollinsford School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 (twenty thousand dollars) for the purpose of a feasibility study within Rollinsford School District for the purpose of outlining options for educating students in the Rollinsford School District.

Budget Committee and School Board recommend.

M. Rollo moved to accept and N. Leach seconded. An unidentified person questioned how this figure was estimated. The board called for bids but only received one which is where this figure came from. The board is looking for authorization to proceed. N. Leach asked if more funds would be requested next year. No, the amount would be capped at \$20,000. Hasn't the board does this before? What happened to those studies? The board replied that this proposed study is about more than space needs, as it will address the needs of all students, K-12. J. Whitehouse questioned what had happened to the study done several years ago during his time on the board. While the board will look at all previous studies, they feel the needs and opportunities have significantly changed. T. Laurion explained that the need for an independent, qualified company to analyze all the avenues presently available. F. Rosselli questioned whether the SAU had submitted all the necessary paperwork created by the latest revision of the AREA agreement. D. Knowles said all the modifications have been sent to Somerworth. M. Rollo urged support of this article. R. Wasson encouraged townspeople to participate in this new study. A voice vote was called, and the ayes carried the motion.

Article 9: To see if the Rollinsford School District will raise and appropriate the sum of up to \$10,000 (ten thousand dollars) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of education of educationally disabled children with such amount to be funded from the June 30, 2011 undesignated fund balance for transfer on July 1st. Budget Committee and School Board recommend.

M. Rollo moved to open this for discussion, and G. Field seconded. There was no discussion. A voice vote carried the motion.

Article 10: To see if the Rollinsford School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$65,685 (sixty five thousand six hundred eighty five dollars) for the purpose of repairing the Rollinsford Grade School's drainage, asbestos removal and floor replacement and further to authorize the withdrawal of that amount from the School Building Improvement Reserve Fund established for that purpose. Budget Committee and School Board recommend.

G. Fjeld moved to open this for discussion and M. Rollo seconded. There was no discussion. A voice vote carried the motion.

Article 11: To see if the Rollinsford School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,853 (six thousand eight hundred fifty three dollars) for the purpose of the replacement of the Rollinsford Grade School's fixtures and faucets and further to authorize the withdrawal of that amount from the School Building Improvement Reserve Fund established for that purpose.

Budget Committee and School Board recommend.

G. Fjeld moved to open for discussion. R. Wasson seconded. N. Leach questioned whether this would save on water. Yes, it would. A voice vote carried the motion.

Article 12: By Petition: To see if the District is in favor of increasing the number of members of the Rollinsford School Board from three (3) to five (5) members. K. Salvati moved to open for discussion. W. Irving seconded. P. Carroll proposed an amendment calling for the wording to change to include: "effective at the March 2012 election of the School Board at which time one of the two new members will be elected for an initial term of three years and the other new member will be elected for an initial term of two years, and thereafter each member will be elected for terms of three years." In support of the motion, T. Laurion stated that this would disperse the load for the board and would also give more townspeople a voice. N. Dionne asked if this would give Rollinsford more representation on the Somerworth board. Yes, it would. A voice vote carried the ammendment to Article 12. N. Dionne then moved the vote on the ammended Article 12. W. Irving seconded. Article 12 ammended: By Petition: To see if the Rollinsford School District is in favor of increasing the number of members of the Rollinsford School Board from three (3) to five (5) members effective at the March 2012 election of the School Board at which time one of the two new members will be elected for an initial term of three years and the other new member will be elected for an initial term of two years, and thereafter each member will be elected for terms of three years. The ammended Article 12 passed by a voice vote.

Mr. Caouette reminded those in attendance that the second session of the Annual Rollinsford School District Meeting will take place on March 8, 2011 at the Town Hall where the polls will be open for voting from 7 AM to 7 PM.

Minutes of Rollinsford Town Meeting STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE STRAFFORD, SS March 12, 2011

You must look at the ramifications of the new/current ordinances wording and imagine the whole picture. It is a process.

Jim Murphy asks if there are plans for another article to clarify the current zoning ordinances.

Mike Garrepy explains that all ordinances are worked on at planning board workshops prior to the election.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) for storm drains and road resurfacing (\$30,000 for resurfacing and \$45,000 for 720 feet of storm drains and 5 catch basins on General John Sullivan Way). (Majority vote required) Motion accepted by Mr. Vercauteren and seconded by Michele Small.

Discussion

Mr. Vercauteren is very concerned about where the water is going to go, right now it is being put back into the same water table and is concerned that this will be a waste of money if problem is not fixed

Ed Jansen explained that this money is going to bring the storm drain to the end of General Sullivan then it will flow under route 4 away from General Sullivan. This will not solve all of the problems but it will allow the residents to pump water into the storm drain as well as meeting

EPA standards. The water that will be pumped into the storm drains will be carried away and not be put back into the streets or water table.

Gail Penny talked about 2-3 feet of mud and 2-3 pumps in a basement. The drain by the cemetery has sand in it and is not as effective as it can be. Also would like to see the pumps run all the time in that area. Currently they are being shut down periodically. Article Passed (Voice Vote)

ARTICLE XVI

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to be added to the Land Trust Fund previously established. Ten thousand will be transferred from the Land Use Change Tax Fund to fund this appropriation. The Budget Committee and Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required) Motion accepted by Paul Connolly and seconded by Nancy Dionne.

No Discussion. Article Passed. (Voice Vote)

ARTICLE XVII

To see if the Town will vote to [raise and] accept and appropriate fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) to renovate the second floor of the Town Hall and to authorize the acceptance of private gifts and/or private grants to fund the renovation. (Renovation will not be undertaken until required gifts or grants have been received.) The Budget Committee and the Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required) Motion accepted by Nancy Dionne and seconded by Jesse Aikman

Discussion

Kim Turgeon wants to know about the upstairs of the Town Hall.

Ed Jansen explained that it is now used for storage and we would have to receive donations/gifts to even think about starting the renovations. There will be no tax dollars used for the renovations. Robert Meegan expressed his concern about the amount of money that we have wasted on the Town Hall from the start. Every project that has ever been done has not been done correctly and inefficiently for example the mold in the Police Department, the tower leaks, including general renovations.

Mike Garrepy expressed that the wording in the article is not appropriate.

Mr. Roberts explained the legalities.

Jamison Small confirmed that there would have to be a special meeting regarding spending of the funds.

Mike Rollo made a motion to remove raise from the article and input accept.

Jesse Aikman seconded.

Motion accepted and passed. (Voice Vote)

Motion to accept Article as amended above by Nancy Dionne and seconded by Mike Rollo. Article Passed. (Voice Vote)

ARTICLE XVIII

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate forty-two thousand dollars (\$42,000) for the purchase of a Fire Utility Van for the Fire Department, and to authorize the withdrawal of \$42,000 from the Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. (Majority vote required)

Discussion

Lucy Putnam requested from the Moderator that the Fire Chief clarify this article.

Mike Spinney Fire Chief explained that the current vehicle is 27 years old.

Motion accepted as read by Ron Chabot and seconded by Charlie Dionne.

Ken Shorey wants to know how much money is in the Capital Reserve fund.

Ed Jansen said 93,000.

Paul Connolly asked if the Governing body if selling the used equipment will offset the cost.

Ed Jansen explained yes that the money will be going into the General Fund.

John Hinds wants to know if we are selling the 1977 two wheel drive, and that is yes.

Article Passed. (Voice Vote)

ARTICLE XXI

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Police Cruiser Reserve Fund. (Majority vote required)

Article accepted as read by Kate Salvati and seconded by Ron Chabot

Discussion

Ed Jansen explained that by setting up a reserve fund for leasing cruisers then the town would not have to come up with a large lump sum for the payment. This is an effort to spread out the money needed.

Article Passed. (Voice Vote)

ARTICLE XXII

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,500) to be added to the Police Cruiser Reserve Fund previously established. (Majority vote required)

Motion accepted as read by Marion Aikman and seconded by Catherine Lamb.

No Discussion. Article Passed. (Voice Vote)

ARTICLE XXIII

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Cemetery Cremation Area Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of creating a cremation area in New Town Cemetery. (Majority vote required)

Motion accepted as read by Ron Chabot and seconded by Michele Small.

Discussion

Marion Aikman asked why this needs to be done.

Marc Couture explained that there is an area in the cemetery that they are unable to dig due to ledge. So they would like to utilize it as a future cremation area.

Article Passed. (Voice Vote)

ARTICLE XXIV

To see if the Town will authorize the Cemetery Trustees to transfer two thousand dollars (\$2,000) from the 2011 cemetery operating fund into the Cemetery Cremation Area Capital Reserve Fund, and transfer two thousand (\$2,000) from 2010 cemetery funds held by the town as a cemetery liability. (Majority vote required)

Motion accepted as read by Mr. Vercauteran and seconded by Kathy Lamb.

No Discussion. Article Passed. (Voice Vote)

ARTICLE XXV

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Transfer Station Compactor Reserve Fund, and to raise and appropriate seven thousand dollars (\$7,000) to be added to the Transfer Station Compactor Reserve Fund. (Majority vote required).

Motion accepted as read by Paul Connolly and seconded by Charlie Dionne.

Discussion

Michele Small inquired on how long it would be before it needed to be replaced. Ed Jansen explained that it would be next year. They want \$7000.00 this year and \$8000.00 next year. Dennis St. Hilaire wants to know why we waited so long to replace it. Ed Jansen just explained that the current Transfer Station Compactor is very poor condition and working overtime. Time is not on our side.

Article Passed. (Voice Vote)

ARTICLE XXVI

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate one million three hundred sixty thousand six hundred ninety-six (\$1,360,696) for general municipal operations. This article does not include capital articles addressed above. (Majority vote required)

Motion accepted as read by Paul Connolly and seconded by James Murphy.

Discussion

Denise questioned that the current Police Leased vehicle was not in the budget. Ed Jansen explained that it was on a different page that had the carryover.

Article Passed. (Voice Vote)

ARTICLE XXVII

To see if the Town will vote to accept the road that the Selectmen laid out in October 2009 over part of the existing class VI Old Indigo Hill Road between Rollins Road and Scoutland Road, and over +- 400 feet of land on tax Map 8, Lot 5. The new class V right-of-way will be 60 feet wide for a distance of 1980 feet and built to Rollinsford subdivision road standards. The road is shown in the subdivision approved by the Rollinsford Planning Board on September 17, 2009. (Majority vote required).

Motion accepted as read by Charlie Dionne and seconded by Nancy Dionne.

Discussion

Ed Jansen would like to amend the article due to the fact that they are not ready to accept the above article due to the fact that it is not ready as selectmen to accept it. There are supposed to be some property line adjustments that have not taken place yet. Another parcel of property is supposed to be reverted back to the abutters.

Joe Caouette reads the proposed amendment below.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT FOR ARTICLE XXVII

To see if the Town will vote to (1) authorize the Selectmen to accept the road that the selectmen laid out in October 2009 over part of the existing class VI Old Indigo Hill Road between Rollins Road and Scoutland Road, and over +- 400 feet of land on tax Map 8, Lot 5 and (2) vote to discontinue .35 acres of the Old Indigo Hill road which will revert to the abutters. The new class V right-of-way will be 60 feet wide for a distance of 1980 feet and built to Rollinsford subdivision road standards. The road is shown in the subdivision approved by the Rollinsford Planning Board on September 17, 2009, and the discontinued .35 acres of the former Old Indigo Hill Road is shown as tract C. (Majority vote required)

Motion accepted as read by Paul Connelly and seconded by Charlie Dionne

Discussion

Marc Couture is explaining that it is called Indigo Hill Road, not Old Indigo Hill Road. He has been to the selectmen and explained that this road has been in place since 1694. He does approve to accept the road but not change the name of the road. He does understand the 911 issue, though let's change all the roads in town not just this one.

Mike Garrepy would like to see the plan and the actual land that is being reverted back to the abutters

Paul Connolly explains while displaying the plan. You can also NHDeed.com to see the plan. The plan number is 98-84. He discusses tract C along the Railroad tracks and how it ends at the new road put in last year. The selectmen cannot discontinue the road as the board of selectmen. Liz Marcotte is unclear where the road is she wants to know where they are discussing. Paul explains that it is across the road then across the RR tracks and that is where the tract begins. He also explains that where the old gate is located off of Rollins Road is owned by the State of NH. John Hinds asking if we have the right to cross the railroad tracks. Paul Connolly explains that he is not aware of documented right that allows anyone to cross the railroad tracks anywhere. Only the Wentworth Family has documented rights to cross the tracks to reach their property. Tamara Niedzolkowski would like more information regarding the name of the road. Joe Caouette explains that we would need documentation pertaining to the historic name. Ed Jansen explains that they did not mention the historic name. It is not the essence of the issue in this article. It is not a town issue it is the issue of the governing body. It does not matter what the name is, the owners just want it to be something different than Indigo hill. Owners concerned with GPS confusion etc. They as a board have been urged to change the name due to 911 issues. Marc Couture has no issues with 911 although they recommend that you change all similar names in the town for example Silver Street and Silver Lane.

Liz Marcotte brought up the issue regarding the name of Old Indigo Hill road at the end of Somersworth Road.

Ed Jansen explains that all this will be addressed at a future date.

Motion to accept amended article as read. (Voice Vote)

Amended Article Passed. (Voice Vote)

ARTICLE XXVIII

To see if the Town will request that the Planning Board prepare a proposed zoning change in 2012 to enlarge the Conservation Zoning District to include the 34 acres Tax Map 2 Lot 12, owned by the town located in the Industrial Zone. (Majority vote required) Motion accepted as read by Michele Small and seconded by Lucy Putnam.

No Discussion. Article Passed. (Voice Vote)

ARTICLE XXIX

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell to the highest bidder, the surplus equipment and vehicles owned by the Town. (Majority vote required) Motion accepted as read by Nancy Dionne and seconded by Cathy Lamb.

No Discussion. Article Passed. (Voice Vote)

ARTICLE XXX

To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting. Motion accepted as read by Denise Knowles and seconded by Carol Irving.

Discussion

Denise Knowles and Carol Irving acknowledged Caroline Lamoureux for her many long and hard hours on the Rollinsford School Board.

Caroline Lamoureux expressed her appreciation of all who is involved with the school. Joe Caouette expressed his great appreciation and the importance of our Highway, Fire, and Police Departments. Mr. Caouette also was impressed with the new volunteers that the Town Clerk Charisse Baker provided for this year's Town Election.

Patrick Carroll wanted to thank all who are involved with the town committees, boards, as well as the selectmen, Beverly Dionne and the new Explorers Program as well as the past reps that represented Rollinsford. He thanked Tia Pass who has put together an amazing new web site for the town.

Eric Knowles wanted to know if there were any future plans for the old Town Shed. Ed Jansen explained that there are no plans at this time.

Mike Rollo made a motion to adjourn the Town meeting and seconded by Nancy Dionne. Meeting adjourned at 11:30am.

TOWN OF ROLLINSFORD MINUTES OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING JULY 12, 2011

ARTICLE I

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to expend Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00) from the One Million Dollar (\$1,000,000.00) open space, public recreation, public facilities land bond article which the voters approved as Article VI of the March 14, 2005 Town Meeting. This Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00) will be used as the Town's share of the purchase price of the land for open space/conservation purposes. The land is approximately 90 acres. It is located near Tri-City Road and Pinecrest Lane, and otherwise identified as Tax Map 1, Lots 3 & 25-2.

Motion to accept Article as read made by Paul Connolly, seconded by Charlie Dionne. It was explained that this land, approximately 90 acres, was purchased by the developer to build 200-+ condo units. The Town felt that condos were not allowed in that area, and the case was taken to court. The Town lost the case. The developer and the federal government, in the form of the conservation agency Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) hope to get funding to place the land into conservation use.

Selectman Edmund Jansen stated that this does not mean the town will front the \$200,000.00, it gives the Board of Selectmen authorization to spend the funds if the NRCS decides to fund the majority of the land purchase. The Town will pay 10% and the developer will match the 10% of the final purchase price, if the sale occurs. (up to \$200,000.00 for the town)

Question was asked if town would get deed to land, answer was yes.

Resident Robert Meegan asked if this was the entire parcel in the court case, and if this was part of a legal settlement. Selectman Albert Dionne answered that it was the same parcel which is 50% developable and 50% wetlands, and that it was not part of a legal settlement.

Motion made and seconded to allow Mr. Joseph Falzone, owner of the property to speak. Mr. Falzone said that he has done an environmental study of the property, and there is no hazardous waste, the land is clean. He has also restored a washed out area of 100+ feet, which the town will not have to do. No further discussion, vote on Article I is GRANTED. (Voice vote)

ARTICLE II

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to place twenty-two (22) Town owned parcels, known as Tax Map 21, Lots 8 & Lots 10 thru 30, under a conservation easement for open space/conservation purposes in conjunction with and subject to the successful purchase and conservation effort described in Article I; and to further authorize the Selectmen to place Tax Map 21, Lot 9 under a conservation easement in the event the Town should acquire said parcel in the future.

Salme Perry, seconded by Kristin Anderson, moved to accept Article II as read. It was explained that the parcel of about 25 to 30 acres abuts the parcel in Article I, and is mostly wetlands and unbuildable.

Vote of Article II is GRANTED. (Voice vote)

ARTICLE III

To see if the Town will adopt the provisions of RSA 41:14-a which will authorize the Selectmen to acquire or sell land, buildings or both, following review and recommendation by the Planning Board and the Conservation Commission, and upon holding the required two (2) public hearings.

Motion to accept as read made by Kristin Anderson, seconded by William Irving.

Selectman Patrick Carroll said that if this Article is passed it would be placed "on the books" should another piece of property become available for conservation use. A special town meeting would not have to be called to authorize the use of funds from the open space, recreation, and public facilities land bond article.

Article III as read is GRANTED. (Voice vote)

Paul Connolly, seconded by Kristin Anderson move to adjourn meeting.

Strafford Regional Planning Commission (SRPC), a political subdivision of the State of New Hampshire, serves in an advisory role to the Town of Rollinsford and seventeen other communities. We provide planning services to assist officials, boards and citizens in managing growth and development and to foster regional collaborative efforts.

SRPC's professional staff offers a range of planning services in transportation, land use, economic development, hazard mitigation, natural resources and geographic information systems (GIS) mapping and analysis. These services are available in customized modes to meet the diverse needs of communities. Access is also provided to SRPC educational resources including our website, library, workshops and forums, and customized training.

2011 Accomplishments:

- Collaborated with Town officials and businesses to create the 2011-2015 Strafford Regional Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy including a regional priority projects list
- Worked with Town officials and citizens to update their local Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan
- Worked with Town officials in developing a corridor management plan for the Route 108 corridor to be submitted to NHDOT to be considered a State Scenic Byway
- Worked with Town officials to schedule Town building energy assessment as part of the NH Energy Technical Assistance Program
- · Collected data from the electrical and oil accounts for the four municipal buildings in Rollinsford

ROCHESTER DISTRICT VNA "Your VNA" ANNUAL REPORT for 2011

Rochester District VNA (Your VNA) continues to serve as your home health and hospice agency providing skilled nursing, rehabilitative therapies, medical social work, licensed nursing assistance and supportive services on an intermittent basis. We are proud to provide you with highly skilled and well trained clinicians. In addition, we provide an active Adult Day Care Center, which is open Monday thru Friday. Located at our office, it provides a safe, family atmosphere for loved ones no longer able to be at home alone. Our Certified Lactation specialist provides visits to new moms and babies to ensure a healthy beginning.

We continue to provide support services including: homemakers, personal care service providers and in-home companions although the numbers have been reduced due to lack of funding. Services are paid in part by Title XX and the patient, and it allows individuals who require minimal support to remain safely in their homes at the lowest possible cost.

We became recertified by Medicare for hospice care in April 2011 after Seacoast Hospice was sold to a for-profit hospice in 2010. We are the only non-profit hospice in Strafford County. We have admitted over eighty hospice patients in the first nine months. This is an example of our Board seeing a need in the community and responding to that need.

Our biggest and most critical challenge is being dependent on the government for 85% of our revenue. We are reimbursed at rates the government sets regardless of the actual cost to provide the care. Medicare is the only service we provide that is not always a loss, and the Medicare revenue has been used to assist in supplementing many of the under-funded programs we provide. Due to reductions in Medicare every year since 2006, we can no longer depend on a surplus in Medicare to assist with these programs. Therefore, your continued support of Rochester District Visiting Nurse Association (Your VNA) is vitally important to our ability to meet the many health needs in your community. The number of people depending on Medicaid continues to increase with the down turn in the economy. The state reimburses for Medicaid at about 40% of the cost.

Pursuant to RSA 674:39-aa, notice is hereby given to all Rollinsford residents and property owners that any lots involuntarily merged prior to September 18, 2010 may be restored to premerger status upon the owner's request to the Board of Selectmen. RSA 674:39-aa is included below.

This notice shall remain posted through December 31, 2016, and the same or similar notice shall be published in the Town's 2011 through 2015 annual reports.

Board of Selectmen December 19, 2011

Section 674:39-aa Restoration of Involuntarily Merged Lots.

- I. In this section:
- (a) "Involuntary merger" and "involuntarily merged" mean lots merged by municipal action for zoning, assessing, or taxation purposes without the consent of the owner.
- (b) "Owner" means the person or entity that holds legal title to the lots in question, even if such person or entity did not hold legal title at the time of the involuntary merger.
- (c) "Voluntary merger" and "voluntarily merged" mean a merger under RSA 674:39-a, or any overt action or conduct that indicates an owner regarded said lots as merged such as, but not limited to, abandoning a lot line.
- II. Lots or parcels that were involuntarily merged prior to September 18, 2010 by a city, town, county, village district, or any other municipality, shall at the request of the owner, be restored to their premerger status and all zoning and tax maps shall be updated to identify the premerger boundaries of said lots or parcels as recorded at the appropriate registry of deeds, provided:
 - (a) The request is submitted to the governing body prior to December 31, 2016.
- (b) No owner in the chain of title voluntarily merged his or her lots. If any owner in the chain of title voluntarily merged his or her lots, then all subsequent owners shall be estopped from requesting restoration. The municipality shall have the burden of proof to show that any previous owner voluntarily merged his or her lots.
 - III. All decisions of the governing body may be appealed in accordance with the provisions of RSA 676.
- IV. Any municipality may adopt local ordinances, including ordinances enacted prior to the effective date of this section, to restore previously merged properties that are less restrictive than the provisions in paragraph I and II.
- V. The restoration of the lots to their premerger status shall not be deemed to cure any non-conformity with existing local land use ordinances.
- VI. Municipalities shall post a notice informing residents that any involuntarily merged lots may be restored to premerger status upon the owner's request. Such notice shall be posted in a public place no later than January 1, 2012 and shall remain posted through December 31, 2016. Each municipality shall also publish the same or similar notice in its 2011 through 2015 annual reports.

You are hereby notified that the polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Rollinsford Town Hall, on Tuesday, March 13, 2012 to bring in your ballot for the Town Officers to be elected in Article I, and then to meet at the Rollinsford Grade School at 9 a.m. on Saturday, March 17, 2012 to act on the budget and other Articles in the Warrant.

ARTICLE I

To bring in your ballots for:

One (1) Selectman and Overseer for the Poor for three (3) years.

Town Clerk for three (3) years.

Town Treasurer for one (1) year.

Chief of the Fire Department for one (1) year.

Three (3) members of the Budget Committee for three (3) years.

One (1) Trustee of the Trust Funds for three (3) years.

One (1) Trustee of the Library Trust for three (3) years.

One (1) Trustee of the Cemetery Trust for three (3) years.

One (1) Moderator for two (2) years.

One (1) Supervisor of the Checklist for six (6) years.

ARTICLE II

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum equal to all revenues in excess of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) that may be received from the Hydro Electric Plant to be placed in the Town's Hydro Electric Fund. The first \$50,000.00 or any lesser amount that may be received will be used as offset against Town Budget expenditures (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE III

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) and authorize the withdrawal of \$5,000.00 from the Land Trust Fund Capital Reserve to finance land survey and related expenses that may be incurred in assisting private land owners who donate Conservation Easements and/or to purchase options to buy critical lands the town may wish to protect for open space or conservation uses. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE IV

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to be added to the Land Trust Fund previously established. Ten thousand will be transferred from the Land Use Change Tax Fund to fund this appropriation. In the event that the Land Use Change Tax Fund contains less than \$10,000 the balance will come from Town surplus. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE V

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) for road resurfacing, side walk repairs, and road drainage improvements. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE VI

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate twenty-nine thousand dollars (\$29,000) for purchase of a new Police cruiser, and to authorize the withdrawal of \$8500 from the Police Cruiser Reserve Fund for partial payment. (The net impact on the 2012 property taxes will then be \$20,500) (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE VII

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate five thousand three hundred forty-five dollars (\$5,345) for a Police Cruiser Video camera. (Up to twenty-five hundred dollars of cost will be funded by a grant and the remainder from current taxes). Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE VIII

To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) to be added to the Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE IX

To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars \$2,000) to be added to Cemetery Cremation Area Capital Reserve Fund. (Majority vote required) Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE X

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to renovate the second floor of the Town Hall and to authorize the acceptance of private gifts and/or private grants to fund the renovation. (Renovation will not be undertaken until required gifts or grants have been received). The Budget Committee and the Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE XI

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to renovate the transfer station compactor and authorize the Selectmen to withdraw seven thousand dollars (\$7,000) from the Transfer Station Compactor Reserve Fund for partial payment of the renovation. The remainder to be raised from current revenues. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee. (Majority vote required)



ARTICLE XII

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) from the Land Trust Fund to pay for the town's share of land acquisition cost for Tax Map 1, Lots 3 & 25-2, which was authorized at a Special Town Meeting on July 12, 2011. (On July 12, 2011 the town voted to authorize the land acquisition to be funded with a \$200,000 bond issue. Passage of this Article would change the source of the \$200,000 from a bond to funds now held in the Land Trust Fund. This action would eliminate the need for bond issue costs and eliminate the amortization payments on the bond in the future. Currently, the grand total in the Land Trust Fund is \$261,635.98). Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE XIII

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate one hundred fifty thousand eight hundred thirteen dollars (\$150,813.00) to purchase a replacement Highway truck with snow plow and highway sander. The truck will be funded with \$60,703.00 to be withdrawn from the Equipment Trust Fund, a highway grant of \$37,000 and \$53,110 from current property taxes. (Equipment Fund held \$47,239.11 on January 1, 2012 and \$30,000 to be added by Article VIII in 2012 warrant). If Article VIII in 2012 warrant is not approved, the amount taken from current taxes would increase to \$83110.00. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE XIV

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate one million three hundred ninety thousand nine hundred ninety-eight dollars (\$1,390,998.00) for general municipal operations. This Article does not include capital articles previously addressed. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE XV

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the reduction in the size of the Rollinsford Planning Board from six appointed members and one Ex-Officio Selectman member to four appointed members and the Ex-Officio member from the Board of Selectmen. The Planning Board supports this Article due to difficulties in securing citizen volunteers and problems obtaining quorums required to transact business. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE XVI

To see if the Town will vote to accept the road named Turgeon Way that was laid out as part of the Armand Turgeon subdivision plan prepared by Civil Consultants, and approved by the Planning Board on March 15, 2007 and recorded on March 21, 2007. (The layout and construction of the road was inspected by Road Agent Al Johnson several times during construction. The final 1-inch layer of asphalt was completed on Sept. 11, 2011 by R & M Paving and inspected by Road Agent Jeff St. Jean and Selectman Al Dionne.)

ARTICLE XVII

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the surplus equipment and vehicles owned by the Town. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE XVIII

To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.
