## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sullivan on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for building and repairing highways and bridges, or take any action relating thereto.

4. To see if the town will vote to pay for digging graves and going with the town hearse for residents.

5. To see what sum of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for the support of the public library.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise money for Memorial Day, or take any action relating thereto.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise money for Old Home Day, or take any action relating thereto.

8. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.

9. To see if the town will vote to help stamp out the white pine blister disease and raise money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

10. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for removing snow from highways.

11. To see if the town will vote to purchase some snow fence and raise money for the same.

12. To hear the reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen, or take any action thereon.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the School Board and Citizens of Sullivan:

I herein submit my eighth annual report as superintendent of schools.

Herbert Spencer told us many years ago that "To prepare for complete living is the function which education has to discharge; and the only rational mode of judging of any educational course is to judge in what degree it discharges such functions."

Today this definition implies not only a knowledge of the "Three R's," a reasonable accuracy in the fundamentals, a workable habit in the mechanics and skills of knowledge, but also an adjustment to conditions which prevailing isms and a machine age have brought upon us.

The propaganda in the form of various isms which are attacking our institutions can be successfully met only through education.

The rising generation must have its intellectual activity aroused and strengthened through the habits of cogent reasoning. They must be taught to think. Teachers must not be content with the when, where and what, but more emphasis and attention must be placed on the why. That is, factual questions alone will not accomplish our ends but we must rely more on reasoning projects rightly directed. The walking encyclopedia of facts is not the educated man of today. For often the facts of the Past become the untruths of the Present, especially in science.

Again, the need for training for leisure has been forced upon us during the last year more strongly than ever before. The unemployment situation is provocative of our most serious

consideration. Labor, today, is calling for the eight-hour day and the five-day week and machines are doing the work formerly done by human brain and muscle.

What will the rising generation do with their leisure time? How can we train the young so that they can utilize their leisure in beneficial rather than in detrimental ways? How can our pupils be taught to be appreciative and to gain enjoyment from reflection, meditation and thought instead of eternally seeking nervous excitation, so called thrills? How can we cultivate in our leisure time an appreciation of the culture which we have inherited from former ages and is available for all of us in literature, in art, in music, in architecture and in the beauty and mystery of nature?

These are questions which challenge our best intelligence, efforts and thought.

Carroll E. Pelkey, Dora Swett, Dorothy Swett, Maurice Swett and Dorothy Wright continued their school work in the Keene High School.

Judging from the impressions received on frequent visits of inspection and from results obtained with standard tests, I feel safe in saying that the teachers have maintained a favorable reputation for efficiency in teaching and results in drill work.

The results in all tests showed a normal year's work and the classes well graded.

At the beginning of the present year, the school at the Fifield was discontinued on account of the fewness of scholars. Miss Farnum resigned her position at the Center. Mrs. Wheeler of Peterboro, an experienced teacher, was assigned to the Center school. After a few weeks, Mrs. Wheeler was compelled to resign on account of illness. Since then, the school was placed on the cadet system.

An excellent type of young teachers have been assigned to this school thus far who under the experienced direction of Miss Farnum, the critic teacher, are doing excellent work.

The East school continues under the instruction of Miss Margaret Estes. Both schools, at time of writing, are well organized and give promise of a successful year.
