ALTON TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Alton, in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year and to elect one Selectman for one year, one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Highway Agent for one year, one Auditor for two years, three Budget Committee members for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, one Fire Warden for three years, one Water Commissioner for three years, two Planning Board members for three years and one Constable for one year.

And you are hereby further notified to meet at said Alton Memorial School Gymnasium on Wednesday, the eleventh (11th) day of March, next at seven thirty o'clock in the evening to act upon the following articles:

ARTICLE 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay all necessary charges of the Town for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,580.00 for the purchase of Tarvia and the application of the same.

ARTICLE 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways and bridges for the ensuing year in addition to that required by law.

ARTICLE 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow from the Town highways for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to rebuild and resurface with Tarvia the Town gravel roads, so called, this sum to be raised by taxation.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,685.47 provided the State will contribute the sum of \$11,236.44 for Class V roads so called.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow monies in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Public Library.

ARTICLE 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the decoration of Soldiers' graves.

ARTICLE 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for patriotic exercises on Independence Day.

ARTICLE 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Parks and Playgrounds, including band concerts.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the care of trees.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Civil Defense.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,400.00 to the Alton—Alton Bay Chamber of Commerce for the purpose of promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town. (By request)

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$43,234.00 for the maintenance and operation of our new landfill.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,665.00 for the support of the Lakes Region Planning Commission.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the Town stray animals. (By request)

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for the use as a set-off against budget appropriations in the amounts indicated and further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro-rata reductions in the amounts if estimate entitlements are reduced or any other action taken hereon:

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$7,500.00 for the purchase of a Sander for the Highway Department and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Revenue Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$5,800.00 for the purchase of a pickup truck for the Highway Department and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Revenue Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 for the purchase of a new Fire Boat and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Revenue Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 23 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be placed in Fire Truck Reserve for the purchase of a new fire truck and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Revenue Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be placed in Highway Equipment Reserve Fund for the purchase of Highway Equipment and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Revenue Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00 for the purchase of a Police Cruiser and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Revenue Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 26 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purchase of Police Equipment and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Revenue Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 27. As a taxpayer in Belknap County, are you in favor of the County Delegation appropriating monies to continue the Belknap County Sheriff's patrol unit on a twenty-four hour basis to act as a back-up to the various police departments of the towns in Belknap County as it has done for the past eleven years. (By request — Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 28, To see if the Town of Alton will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the promotion and operation of Old Home Week. (By request)

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the updating of facilities and improvements of the building and authorize the Selectmen to appoint a permanent committee of six residents to oversee the operation of the West Alton Community Center. (By request) Not recommended by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to increase the salary of the Town Clerk from \$5,950.00 to \$7,441.00 per year.

ARTICLE 31, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,000.00 for a Town Salt Shed and Snow Plow Storage Space. Not recommended by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to rescind that portion of Article 35 of the March 1975 Town Meeting "and the remaining amount of \$13,970. to be raised by issue of long term notes and bonds".

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to approve monies in the amount of \$6,000.00 already expended and to be expended from the Municipal Improvement Fund. Said monies is to employ Town unemployed on Town projects during the period of January 1, 1981 to December 31, 1981.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$36,607.09 of Highway Subsidy Funds to be expended on Town roads in accordance with RSA 241, Section 14 – \$20,849.69 and RSA 241, Section 15 – \$15,757.40.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000.00 for the purpose of extending the water line from Pearson Road to the reservoir at Bay Hill, and any other necessary improvement. The sum of \$60,000.00 to be borrowed on short term notes or bonds. The sum of \$40,000.00 to be withdrawn from Water Department Savings Account. Notes or bonds to be paid from Water Department revenue.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a gift from the Riverside Association land known as Lot 015 on Tax Map 030, said land to be used as a public park under stewardship of the Parks and Playground Committee. (By request)

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lease one acre of Town owned land at the junction of Alton Mountain Road and Avery Hill Road (Tax Map 10, Lot 15) to Daniel Wells for the purpose of construction and operating a convenience general store. (By request)

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to review and approve or disapprove Site Plans for the development of tracts for non-residential uses, or for multi-family dwelling units other than one and two-family dwellings as provided in RSA 36:10-a. If the article is adopted, it shall further be the duty of the Town Clerk to issue all certificates of failure when the Town Planning Board shall fail to take action as provided in RSA 36:23. (By petition)

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to install two (2) street lights on Pearson Road for their protection and protection of their property. (By petition) Not recommended by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light at the fork in the road by Kincade property in Echo Shores. (By request) Not recommended by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action taken under Article 5 at the Town Meeting held on March 12, 1962 and Article 5 at the Town Meeting held on March 12, 1968.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Wage and Salary Program proposed by the committee appointed by the Board of Selectmen and recommended by the Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 43. To see if the Town will vote to have the Road Agent appointed by the Selectmen instead of being elected as provided in RSA 245:6 and 245:8 effective March 1982. (By request)

ARTICLE 44. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in property taxes to five percent and to limit the annual increase in spending by the state or any city, town or other governmental unit of the state to five percent. (By petition)

ARTICLE 45. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in both taxes and spending by the state or any city, town, or other governmental unit of the state to five percent unless approved by a 2/3 vote of those present and voting of such taxing or spending authority. (By petition)

ARTICLE 46. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another Governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b. (By request)

ARTICLE 47. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept, and expend Federal Funding under the Non-Metropolitan Discretionary Community Development Program.

ARTICLE 48. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey Town land not needed for Town use and property acquired by Tax Collector's deed only by sealed bid or public auction after 30 days public notice. No conveyance shall take place without the approval of the Conservation Commission and the Planning Board. Minimum sales price and terms and conditions of sale may be established by the Selectmen as appropriate.

Exceptions to this requirement may be granted only if decision on subject parcel or parcels is placed before the voters at Town Meeting.

An affirmative vote would remain in effect until specifically rescinded by vote of the Town. (By request)

ARTICLE 49. To see if the Town will vote to require the Board of Selectmen, before the sale of Tax Titled Land identified as Tax Map 2, Lot 25; Tax Map 5, Lot 38; Tax Map 5, Lot 48; Tax Map 6, Lot 34A; Tax Map 10, Lot 15; Tax Map 10, Lot 19; Tax Map 15, Lot 22; Tax Map 30, Lot 25; Tax Map 68, Lot 3; Tax Map 71, Lot 19; Tax Map 71, Lot 29; Tax Map 71, Lot 56; Tax Map 71, Lot 151; Tax Map 71, Lot 152; Tax Map 72, Lot 65; Tax Map 66, Lot 42; Tax Map 70, Lot 52; Tax Map 72, Lot 30; in addition to the requirements specified by RSA 80:42 Sec. III, to comply with the 1973 Town bylaw and submit these parcels to the Planning Board and the Conservation Committee, with notice to the public, to determine if the land should be retained for the Town's use.

Also, require the land to be sold at public auction by a licensed auctioneer and, at least 30 days prior to the sale, have posted on the front lawn of the Town Hall a temporary sign advertising the sale. The sign to contain the words "Public Auction" and "Tax Titled Land" in letters at least eight inches high, and in smaller print, date, time and place of sale. The actual lots to be posted with notice of the sale and the dimensions of the land.

Notice of the sale to be posted in the Alton Bay Post Office, the Alton Post Office and inside the Town Hall in lettering larger than typewriter sized letters. The sale to be held on a Saturday at 1:00 p.m. (By petition)

ARTICLE 50. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell Lot 72, Tax Map 29 (to the abutters) being part of the former Boston & Maine Railroad property. (By petition)

ARTICLE 51. To see if the Town of Alton will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Center of Hope, Inc. (By petition) Not recommended by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 52. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,157.63 to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages, as well as preservation of the natural resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region. (By request)

ARTICLE 53 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the Town's share in support of the home-maker services of the Lakes Region Health Agency Inc. (By request)

ARTICLE 54. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,976.00 for the continuation of the services to the low income and elderly residents of the Town of Alton, through the Laconia Area Center of the Community Action Program—Belnap/Merrimack Counties Inc. (By request)

ARTICLE 55. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,900.00 for the Town's share in support of the Public Health Nursing Association. (By request)

ARTICLE 56. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Town's share in support of the work of the Lakes Region Family Service Association, Inc. (By request) Not recommended by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 57. To see if the Town will vote to rescind that portion of Article 32 of the March 1974 Town Meeting "and to authorize the Selectmen to fill such position with a qualified professional engineer".

ARTICLE 58. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire engineering services on,an as needed basis.

ARTICLE 59. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to maintain the Building Inspector and Health Officer as separate and part-time positions on a temporary basis.

ARTICLE 60. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the prepayment of property taxes and to authorize the Tax Collector to accept payments in prepayments of property taxes as provided by RSA 80:52a and to allow a discount of one percent (1%) on the amount paid as provided by RSA 80:52, on payments made on or before October first of the calendar year.

ARTICLE 61. To see if the Town will vote to authorize prepayment of resident taxes and to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayments as provided by RSA 80:1a.

ARTICLE 62. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue separation of cans and glass but continuing separation of light metal – heavy metal – newspapers – magazines – cardboard – household refuse and garbage. (By petition)

ARTICLE 63. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to close the Public Rest Rooms on Route 11 on the West side of Alton Bay from November 1st to April 1st of each year. (By request)

ARTICLE 64. To hear reports of Agents, auditors, committees of officers hereinbefore mentioned chosen and to pass any vote relative thereto.

ARTICLE 65. To transact any other business that may legally come before this said meeting.

ALTON POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

On behalf of the Alton Police Department I would like to express my appreciation to all the citizens of this community. To our summer residents and to those who reside throughout the year, thank you for your support and cooperation.

Your police department underwent many changes during the last six months. The first six months the department was without a Chief and was headed by Lt. Alan Stewart, as Acting Chief. I assumed duties on June 9, 1980.

The first week saw four of our regular officers and one special officer in the Weirs for Motorcycle Weekend. Coverage for the town was assumed by our special officers and myself. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the special officers for their years of service to the community.

Our reporting system has been updated, utilizing the Uniform Crime Report (UCR) which has enabled us to better evaluate our activities, improved our record keeping and aided in supplying UCR information to the state.

Much needed space was gained by the removal of two old cells, through the generosity of a local salvage dealer.

A partition was put in front of the office for added security for the Secretary/Dispatcher and more privacy for citizens wishing to speak to the officers.

The department now photographs and fingerprints those arrested at headquarters. We have acquired a Breathalyzer which has reduced the amount of time an officer has to be out of town.

The department has adopted comprehensive Rules & Regulations, Policies & Procedures to better professionalize the departments.

Members of the department have attended Advanced Firearms Training, Breathalyzer School, Domestic Violence Courses and Medico-Legal Forensic Seminars, to advance their knowledge.

The department lost the service of James Wheeler in the fall and Kenneth Gilbert was appointed to fill the vacancy.

Through Chief Jones of the Alton Fire Department, the Police Department acquired a fire radio for the front line cruiser, which has greatly aided with communications between the two departments.

Fire and Police Departments have established procedures for assistance at accidents and bomb searches.

We would like to thank the Alton Fire Department, Alton Ambulance, New Hampshire State Police, Belknap County Sheriff's Department and surrounding departments for their assistance throughout the year.

We look forward to serving the community in the year to come.

REPORT OF THE TOWN ENGINEER

This report covers the period from the time Mr. Keller left in June through the end of the year. The responsibility for issuing building permits was transferred from the Town Engineer to the Selectmen in June.

The full operation of the landfill started in early March when the frost permitted the excavation in preparation for the placement, compaction and the covering of trash in the phase II area.

Measurements were taken in early September after six (6) months of operation. The measurements indicate that the volume of compacted and covered trash is less than what was estimated by the design engineer, Jones and Beach. This indicates that the landfill may last longer than the designers estimated average life of eight (8) years. Measurements taken in the Spring after a years operation will give a better indication.

The separation bins were completed in July and placed in operation. The response was excellent. We had good cooperation in keeping the bottles and cans in the proper bins.

There were 52 septic system permits issued during 1980. Of this number 34 were for new systems which were approved by the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission and 18 for the alteration of existing systems. Many existing systems are within the 100 foot minimum distance from surface water and must be relocated.

Progress was made on the layout of roads. Chestnut Cove Road bridge was replaced and relocated in October and work has started on the clearing for the connection of the southern end of Woodlands Road to Route 11D. Field work has been completed for the layout of a section of Dudley Road.

Engineering work has started on a water main connection between Bay Hill Road and Pearson Road.

STATE REPRESENTATIVE'S REPORT

JANE F. SANDERS, STATE REPRESENTATIVE

Alton, Barnstead, Gilmanton Belknap County, District #4

In past reports, I have always had words of encouragement for the local communities regarding the problems of state government. This year, I cannot be quite so optimistic.

Although New Hampshire continues to be a bright light in the nation-wide gloom over economic growth and productivity, many other money-related problems have caught up with us. The primary one, of course, is inflation. It affects government at all levels no less than it affects us in our private pocketbooks.

There is little agreement on how large the state deficit is or how to cure state financial ills in general. The major difficulty with both state and county budgets is that over half the bottom line is outside the control of the legislature, either as a result of federal mandate or negotiated employee pay contracts, an unending circle which, it seems, cannot be broken.

The legislature, however, is trying to cope in certain areas. For example, we are deeply involved with "Sunset" review of state agencies and programs in an effort to streamline the bureaucracy. In another area, each piece of legislation we review now must include a "fiscal note," the financial impact of the proposal. In essence, the word has gone out that if there is no way to finance a new program, it will not be created.

We are squarely facing a policy issue we have ignored at all levels of government for too long: Are we willing to pay for public programs, and if we are not, which ones are expendable?

The only answer can come not from government, but from the public which foots the bill.

By comparison, all other legislative efforts will pale. However, a major issue looms over redistricting. Growth in Belknap County will result in the addition of one new representative as well as a reorientation of communities in Belknap District #4. Any large controversy here will concern the communities to be included in our state senatorial district.

I have been reassigned to the Committee on Resources, Recreation, and Development, an excellent location from which to serve the interests of Alton, Barnstead, and Gilmanton.

This report is being submitted at a period when legislative action is just gathering momentum.

The Sunset Committee reviews are taking precedence in all General Court committees at the present time and will consume many hours in the future.

To acquaint the public: The General Court of N.H. adopted the Sunset Act in 1977 because of the realization that governments like people fall into bad habits. The purpose of the Sunset Act is to help state government correct them after the discovery of their existence in the various state departments.

Under Sunset every state agency and program is automatically terminated on a regular schedule. Before the termination date the designated committee (Sunset Committee) investigates and makes their report to the legislature to take final action.

The report to legislature might indicate termination or merger with another department, however, final action is in the hands of the legislature. This is a complex and time consuming but necessary function of state government if the Budgetary process is to be properly examined.

Of immediate interest to local taxpayers is the county budget which has to be approved by all of the Representatives from Belknap County. They are known and referred to as the County Delegation.

Meetings are held every Monday night from December until March until final approval of the budget submitted by the County Commissioners is approved.

Attendance by the Delegation, chaired by the capable Mike Hanson of Laconia, is excellent and performance indicates a sincere concern for the taxpayer who pays the bills.

I want you to know I share the concern of the delegation in the practice of frugality wherever possible and will work to accomplish that objective by participating in each and every meeting.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Forest Fire Prevention: Your business, Our business, Good business. Forest fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ALTON FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Alton Fire Department has had a busy year in 1980.

The new fire truck to replace the 1946 engine at the Alton Bay Station was delivered in April and put into service. This new piece of equipment is one of our prime attack trucks. It has inspired Company 2 at the Bay station who have made it their business to be the

first on the scene of most fires.

We have spent quite a lot of money on 1M1 and 1M3 this year, hoping to get a few more years of service from them. The Ladder truck has proved, again, to be a big help to us also.

The men in the Alton Fire Department continue to train and are becoming more proficient everyday.

Your department receives numerous calls for stove and chimney inspections and a great deal of time has been spent on them. We feel it an excellent preventative measure. There has been an increase of chimney fires this past year.

The largest of the structure fires this year was the Pearson barn in South Alton which was started by lightning. Several other fires to mention were at the Macdonald residence on Lily Pond Rd., the Young house on Depot St., the Zappone house off Rte. 11 and the Shibley fire on 11-D.

There have been changes in the officers of the department this year. Our Deputy Fire Chief John Young has chosen to step down from his office and continue as a fire fighter. John has served as Deputy for a number of years, performing a big service to the fire department and the Town of Alton. It is not always easy to step back and let someone else give it a try. As Chief, I would like to say thanks to John for all his help.

LAKES REGION PLANNING COMMISSION

ANNUAL REPORT

The Lakes Region Planning Commission is an organization composed of and supported by the member communities, which provides planning and related services to the towns and cities in the lakes region of central New Hampshire. These services assist local planning boards, selectmen and other town officials, as well as private citizens.

Alton is one of the original members of the Lakes Region Planning Commission (LRPC). Over the years the Town has benefited from the preparation of resource maps, the municipal law lecture series, research regarding the problem of milfoil and water quality in the Lake, meetings concerning population growth and how it affects taxes, education, solid waste disposal, roads, etc.

The LRPC has helped Alton in the following specific ways in 1980:

- (1) Provided assistance on the preparation of a revised base map highlighting the town roads.
- (2) Conducted detailed site appraisals for the Planning Board.
- (3) Provided consultation on the Town's master plan survey, printed the survey, and helped in its distribution.
- (4) Advised the Planning Board on the best way to prepare a 1:1500 scale tax map.
- (5) Drew up a procedure that would protect the Town against the subdivision of excessively narrow lots.
- (6) Provided the opportunity for Alton to consider the advantages of sharing town administration assistance.

Many other projects are now in the works to help Alton. The expertise and experience of the LRPC in the fields of economic development, energy, land use, forest resources, transportation, solid waste, water quality, and major impact studies has and will help the Town to speed up the planning processes and help to save Alton money.

ALTON PLANNING BOARD

The first elected Planning Board for the Town of Alton took office in March 1980. A period of familiarization with the duties and responsibilities preceded a year of diligent and constructive accomplishments. The Board met weekly on Monday evenings and for site inspections as necessary.

Forty-three applications for Board action involved a total of 127 potential lots and one light industry site plan review. Rapid growth continues unabated. The Cedar Mountain Development Corp. action in Superior Court is continuing.

Due to procedural requirements of recent Supreme Court decisions and enactment of State laws, the Board:

- a. enacted Excavation Regulations as required under RSA 155E
- b. adopted Light Industry Site Plan Approval Regulations and recorded the Park Site Criteria for Mobile Home, Trailer and Camping Parks under Sections 351 & 360 of existing Zoning Ordinance. By this action, potential developers are provided advance information on the standards which must be met in the interest of the Town and the protection of their investment and
- c. amended existing Subdivision Regulations. The filing fees which were initiated last year for subdivision applications provided some \$1,925.00 to offset our expenses in this area.

In August, with the assistance of many volunteers, community survey questionnaires were distributed throughout the Town. The computerization tabulation of the results is continuing through the generosity of an Alton resident. The information provided will be of inestimable value when public meetings are held later in the year to discuss plans for the future of Alton.

Volunteer assistance is now needed for work on the completion of maps and compilation of necessary data for preparation of a Master Plan for the Town. Citizen participation has already, and will continue to save the Town a great deal of expense, but more importantly, will involve as many citizens as possible in the decision making process. Those interested in assisting should contact a member of this Board.

ALTON PARKS AND PLAYGROUND COMMISSION

We wish more organizations would arrange to have their members come to see our excellent collection of antique furniture, glass, porcelain, lamps, buttons, etc. We are willing to make special arrangements to open the museum in the event the regular opening days are not convenient.

Visiting Nurse Association of Wolfeboro and Vicinity, Inc. ANNUAL REPORT

Requests for the services of our Agency continue to increase. Earlier hospital discharge, increased population and increasing services available are all contributing factors. A total of 5,511 visits were made by the Agency Staff members. An additional 265 Home Health Aide visits were made under the contractual agreements with the Carroll County Health and Home Care Service which serves Carroll County, and the Lakes Region Community Health Agency which serves Alton.

Our Immunization Clinic Program continues to offer immunization clinics in Alton, Wakefield and Wolfeboro. These clinics are held in co-operation with the local school systems. A total of 680 children received 1131 immunizations through this program. Four clinics are held in Alton and Wolfeboro each year; monthly clinics are held in Wakefield. All clinics are open to all children from age two months and are free of charge.

Adult Health Screening Clinics, open to all residents of our service area were held in Alton and Sandwich in cooperation with the local Lions Clubs. Screening tests for glaucoma, diabetes, hypertension, vision, hearing and oral cancer were provided. Staff members assisted at the Wolfeboro Senior Citizens Club Flu Immunization Clinic and held blood pressure screening clinics in Sandwich and at the Huggins Hospital Street Fair.

Our application for funding for a Well Child Clinic Program through the State Department of Public Health, Bureau of Maternal and Child Health was accepted. At present we are offering these services at two locations: Wakefield and Ossipee. The Ossipee clinics are being held in cooperation with the Ossipee Nursing Service. The Well Child Clinic Services are available through regularly scheduled clinic appointments for children enrolled in the Program. Services include physical examinations and assessments, immunizations, hearing and vision screening, speech assessment, nutritional counseling and dental preventative care. The services are available to children from birth through five years of age who reside in our service area. We hope to establish a third clinic site in Wolfeboro to make this program more accessible to Alton and Wolfeboro residents.

The success of our programs is dependent upon many people; the commitment of our board members; the assistance of school nurses, particularly with the Immunization Clinic Program; the doctors, nurses and volunteers who assist with our Well Child Clinics; and the support of local residents and taxpayers who contributed financially to our Fund Drive and give their support to our appropriation request. The Board of Directors, the Agency Staff and I thank you all.
