

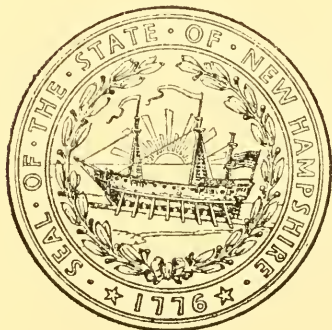

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bristol in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bristol on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. Business meeting for action on all other articles will begin at 8:00 p. m.

2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee, and raise and appropriate the sums set forth therein to be raised by taxation.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell and execute a deed to the tramp house lot on Central Street.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to dispose of any real estate acquired by said Town through Tax Collector's deeds for such sums as in their opinion may be sufficient and execute such deeds on behalf of the Town as may be necessary to transfer the Town's title to said real estate, such vote to remain in effect until rescinded at a regular Town Meeting.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to convey by quit claim deed for \$1.00 to Properties Inc., of Manchester, N. H., the right of way to lay a water main over Ames land, deeded to the Bristol Aqueduct Co., in 1897 by the late Burley Ames and acquired by the Town of Bristol in 1949. This water main having been discontinued for approximately fifteen years.

6. To see if the Town will vote to have the selectmen appoint instead of elect a Road Agent.

7. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following by-laws for the licensing and operation of open-air motion picture theatres:

- "1. No person shall operate an open-air motion picture theatre, whether charging admission or operating gratuitously, without first procuring a license therefor from the Board of Selectmen.
 - "2. The fee for such license shall be Twenty-five Dollars per calendar year or portion thereof, payable in advance.
 - "3. No licensee shall operate such an open-air motion picture theatre so as to disturb the peace of the neighborhood or create a public nuisance.
 - "4. The sound and loud speaking equipment used in the operation of such open-air motion picture theatres shall be so regulated, positioned and controlled that the sound produced thereby shall be confined within a reasonable zone surrounding such theatre.
 - "5. The penalty, upon conviction of a violation of any of the foregoing regulations, shall be a fine not exceeding Twenty-five dollars for each offense, the same to be paid to the Town of Bristol.
 - "6. These regulations shall take effect upon their passage.
8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the State Mutual Fire Aid Law.
9. To see if the Town will enter into the Urban Planning Assistance Program, the approximate cost of which will be \$9,600.00 by voting to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,200.00 as its share of the cost, the balance to be supplied by the State and Federal Governments; the Town to receive as a result of this project essential base maps, serial photographs, a land-use, and economic base study to guide the future development of the Town and reports for general distribution with full findings and recommendation along with suggested land sub-division regulation and study of lake shore improvements.
10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to file in behalf of the Town an application (in form and manner required by the United States and in conformity with P. L. 560, 83rd Congress) and do whatever else may be required for an advance, in the amount of \$10,000, to be made by the United States to the Town of Bristol to aid in defraying the cost of preliminary report and plan preparation for sewerage and sewerage treatment facilities for the Town of Bristol, and further, to see if the Town will make the necessary arrangements to provide such additional funds as may be required to defray the cost of preparation of the report and plans.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The income from the Minnie Jackman Fund supplies the Reading Room with 32 magazines and the Bristol Enterprise.

Our librarian, Mrs. Wilbur Doran, conducts a Story Telling Hour from 1 to 2 each Saturday afternoon for 1th, 2nd and 3rd grade pupils, and older pre-school children. The librarian tells two stories, followed by an opportunity for the children to choose as many books to be read as time will permit. There are many modern children's books available and the librarian encourages the little folks to look at books and to take a book home. This gives them an introduction to the library at an early age, which we hope will continue as they grow older.

Minot-Sleeper Library joined a Shieling Trust group, about a year ago, organized by the N.H. State Library and including libraries from Franklin, Tilton, Belmont and Canterbury. This group buying enables us to purchase books at a considerable saving through the State Library. The Shieling Trust makes available \$1,000 for the purchase of expensive books, and when the Shieling money is exhausted our library will have \$200 worth of these books permanently, with access to books in participating libraries. With five libraries placing orders through the State Library a saving of approximately 6% is realized. To date the Book Committee has spent \$550 on new books, including children's, teenagers', adult fiction and non-fiction, selections made after reading books, reviews and consulting with trained personnel of the State Library. The Book Committee and Librarian meet regularly with similar groups from the other participating libraries. In an effort to improve the library, the State Library will send trained personnel to cull out damaged books for repair or replacement and discard books not circulating. The Book Committee have had five meetings with the participating libraries and State Library and feel the Shieling Trust plan is an advantageous set-up for the improvement of our library.

PUBLIC HEALTH REPORT

The following is a report of the activities conducted by the N.H. Department of Health, Bureau of Public Health Nursing, for the year 1961.

At the request of the Newfound Area District Nurse, Immunization clinics were held on the following dates - January 10, November 14 and December 19. The January and November clinics were held at Bristol High School auditorium and the December clinic was held at the Nurse's office. The following immunizations were given by Dr. Greenan assisted by Mrs. Lois Reed, R.N., N.H. Dept. of Health, local visiting nurse, school nurse and a committee from Bristol's Woman's Club.

I also feel that Bristol and the association were very fortunate in obtaining the services of Mrs. C. Banard, R.N. to carry on the program without too much interruption. I hope the local public health nurse will feel free to call upon the N.H. Department of Health public health nurse at anytime when she can be of assistance.

I would like to thank each and everyone who assisted in our program during the past year. It was greatly appreciated.

MUNICIPAL COURT REPORT

In the fifty sessions of Bristol Municipal Court held in 1961 the number of complaints entered was 198, which was 48 less than in 1960. Only one complaint was for a felony, and this was passed on to the Superior Court. Of the 197 misdemeanors charged, 175 or 88.8% were traffic complaints; 11 were fish and game violations; and 12 were for miscellaneous offenses. Analysis of the cases shows that 104, or 52.5%, involved New Hampshire residents, 68, or 34.4%, were against Massachusetts residents, and 26, or 13.1%, of the respondents were from all other states. As usual, speeding and crossing solid traffic lines were the most numerous violations, 86 and 46 respectively. There were 3 cases of grossly careless and negligent driving, and it is disturbing to report that convictions for driving while intoxicated rose to 10 in 1961 from 3 the previous year. Three persons failed to appear in answer to summons, and had their driving privileges suspended as a result. Two respondents appealed to the Superior Court from convictions in this Court. 23 small claims were disposed of during the year, but no civil cases were entered. Only two actions were brought in Juvenile Court.

On November 23rd, John W. Dole was retired by age limitation, having served as Justice since September 1954. Special Justice Fred A. Dushame has presided over court sessions since then. No one has yet been appointed as Justice of this municipal court.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Bristol, qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District on the eighth day of March, 1962, at eight o'clock, in the afternoon, the polls for balloting to be open from 8 o'clock to 9 o'clock, or thereafter, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose by non-partisan ballot all officers whose election by ballot is required by law.

2 To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the District.

3 To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

4 To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-four hundred dollars (\$3,400) the same to be made available during the current fiscal year. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

5 To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) for the purpose of providing for a teacher for an art course in the High School. (Submitted with no action by Budget Committee.)

6 To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to provide a teacher-guidance counsellor for the High School. (Submitted with no action by the Budget Committee.)

7 To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand-sixty-four dollars (\$1,064) to purchase two more sections of bleachers for the High School. (Submitted with no action by Budget Committee.)

8 To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) to initiate an interscholastic soccer program at the High School. (Submitted with no action by the Budget Committee.)

9 To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund, together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

10 To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to appoint a committee of three persons, including one member of the Board of Selectmen, to investigate participation by the Bristol School District in a cooperative school district and to report their findings at a special meeting to be called for the purpose.

11 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

It is rather discouraging for a new superintendent to have to report an anticipated deficiency in funds during the first year of his work. But the situations certainly justified the results. 46 sixth graders, in a room built for 30, were just too many to keep together for good learning. We felt that we had to employ another teacher and split the grade, just as we had to engage a teacher's aide to assist the first grade teacher. A large group of beginners with a wide range of reading readiness meant that some youngsters would not get the fundamentals of reading, which they need so badly, without special help. Providing this help is the function of the teacher's aide. The addition of these folks has been largely responsible for the request for a deficiency appropriation, although an increase in anticipated tuition receipts will decrease the amount of the expected deficit. It does not require many extra pupils or many fewer tuitions to wreck a tightly planned budget.

Slowly but surely, the enrollment in Memorial High School is increasing. The building which looked so adequate ten years ago is becoming crowded. If we are to maintain the standard of the education offered to the young people of the area, this situation must be overcome, either by providing more room or fewer pupils. Will we build or will we refuse our neighbors? If we build, will Bristol do it alone, or will we work with nearby Districts? The Legislative Interim Commission on Education may present some suggestions for the future. Since New Hampshire is on, or next to, the bottom of the list of States in the percent of State funds provided to support education, many people hope that some material increase in State Aid will be forthcoming.
