STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Campton, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Campton on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, at two of the clock in the afternoon to act on the following articles :

Art. 1 : To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 2 : To see if the Town will vote in favor of amending the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board, said amendments include road setback to coincide with the subdivision regulations, deleting one item as the Board of Adjustment is already empowered under another article, and that portable signs may be allowed by Special Exception.

Art. 3 : To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

Art. 4 : To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of its highways and bridges.

Art. 5 : To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Art 6 : To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Memorial Day.

Art. 7 : To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,135.90 for the Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency, Inc.

Art. 8 : To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,174.00 to reimburse the Town of Plymouth for ambulance service.

Art. 9 : To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,234.50 to reimburse the Campton Village Precinct for hydrant rental.

Art. 10 : To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 to support additional expenses of police protection, if deemed necessary by the Board of Selectmen and the Chief of Police.

Art. 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,025.28 for the maintenance of Blair and other cemeteries in Town and to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$3,825.28 from the Cemetery Trust Funds for Perpetual Care leaving \$6,200.00 to be raised by taxes.

Art. 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for road improvements at Blair Cemetery.

Art. 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to repair the cemetery fence by Donald Hutt's.

Art. 14: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for the support and maintenance of its Fire Department.

Art. 15: To see if the Town will vote to continue its membership to the North Country Council.

Art. 16: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the North Country Council.

Art. 17: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to support stray animals from the Town of Campton placed with the N.H. Humane Society.

Art. 18: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to help support promotion and publicity for the I-93 White Mountain Gateway Chamber of Commerce.

Art. 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$315.00 to support the Upper Valley Senior Citizens Council, Inc., which handles the Meals on Wheels at the Center for the older citizens of the area.

Art. 20: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for fighting Forest Fires.

Art. 21: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the use of the Planning Board.

Art. 22: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the use of the Park and Recreation Commission.

Art. 23: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$49,500.00 as the Town's share to replace Osgood Bridge.

Art. 24: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to purchase a tract of land for a salt shed and authorize the Board of Selectmen to negotiate for this purchase.

Art. 25: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to construct a salt shed.

Art. 26: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$847.00 for continuation of the study on a regional refuse disposal district.

Art. 27: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund established for the purpose of purchasing highway equipment and appoint the Selectmen as agents for the withdrawal of monies required from said fund. The goal of this reserve fund is \$50,000.00.

Art. 28: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for future waste disposal facilities and/or equipment needs of the Town of Campton either individually or in agreement with other towns and appoint the Selectmen as agents for the withdrawal of monies required for said fund. The goal of this reserve fund is \$200,000.

Art. 29: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$12,000.00 for a Police Cruiser and equipment and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

Art. 30: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and, further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro-rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon.

Art. 31: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Chase Library Building Committee consisting of one Selectman, three Library Trustees, and three other voters to study building plans, locations, and costs, and report back, with their recommendation to an adjourned Town Meeting June 12, 1984.

Art. 32: To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen or a majority of them to convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by sealed bid or public auction or in such manner as justice may require.

Art. 33: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year pursuant to RSA 31:95-b.

Art. 34: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to act as the agents to carry out the purposes of the Capital Reserve Funds.

Art. 35: To see if the Town will vote to accept in accordance with RSA 230:1 the road shown as Oak Lane which is approx. 464' long on Plan, "Birch Hill" which was approved by the Campton Planning Board on August 14, 1979 when deemed acceptable by the Board of Selectmen.

Art. 36: To see if the Town will vote to accept in accordance with RSA 230:1 the roads shown as McCormack Road, 875' and Jenny Lane, 550' on Plan "Subdivision of Kenneth and Marjorie McCormack" which was approved by the Campton Planning Board on March 12, 1981 when deemed acceptable by the Board of Selectmen.

Art. 37: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to negotiate with the Waterville Estates Village District Commissioners and accept such roads as the Board of Selectmen deem acceptable.

Art. 38: To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the existing Class VI road known as Puckerbrush Farm Road extending from the relocated right of way of Puckerbrush Farm Road across a portion of Lots B, R, P and Tyler Way so-called in the Deer Run Subdivision as shown on a plan approved by the Campton Planning Board on October 11, 1983.

Art. 39: To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the remaining balance of the Old Livermore Falls Road west of the right of way of old Rte 175 to the Livermore Falls Bridge approach, approx. 550'.

Art. 40: To see if the Town will vote to direct its Selectmen not to incur any additional expenses whatsoever relative to a Petition for Declaratory Judgement filed by the Waterville Estates Village District vs. Town of Campton, Town of Thornton, Francis M. Wells, Gladys M. Wells, Marle Haefll and Richard Stott. Dated October 2, 1983 docketed in Grafton County Superior Court as E-83-098, or to incur any additional expenses or any other issues related thereto. (By Petition).

Art 41: To see if the Town of Campton, N.H. shall call upon the Governor, and Executive Council, its State Representative(s) and State Senator to promptly convene a Special Session of the Legislature for the sole purpose of preventing the imposition of huge cost increases in electric rates resulting from the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant on the citizens, businesses, schools and agencies in the Town of Campton, N.H., and to direct the Selectmen to promptly notify our above listed elected officials of the Town's desire. (By Petition).

Art. 42: To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of agents and officers heretofore chosen.

Art. 43: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

It is that time of year again for the Selectmen to try to answer to the taxpayers and voters of the Town of Campton. We feel that we have had a very productive year, and we will try to briefly list some of the accomplishments we feel have been a betterment to the town.

First of all, one of the major projects of the Selectmen was to attempt to adjust a lot of the discrepancies in property appraisals and we physically visited and examined the existing buildings to the best of our knowledge. To help us in this project, we used as a guideline the State of N.H. Appraisal Guide Book which recommends assessment on the square footage basis. In conjunction with this, 99% of all buildings in the Town have been photographed and permanent property appraisal cards have been initiated for future use in the Town of Campton. We were in hopes to have done the same thing for each house lot and parcel of land in Town as we now have the completed Tax Map, but were unable to do this as time ran out. This is the #1 priority project of the Selectmen for the coming year.

The completed Tax Maps are displayed at the Town Office.

The major road project was the completion of Stickney Hill Road, which was felt to be a necessity in view of all the traffic now using that road.

Our Town Office Building has taken on a new look - some of which was anticipated and planned, while others were not. Some of these things include a completely new heating system necessary because the old heating system was inadequate, it needed repairs to such an

extent that we felt it necessary to replace the whole system. Our new fire-proof vault is completed - well within its proposed budget. Also, there is a new roof on the Town Office and the interior roof was insulated and vented.

We were also able to have some of the trees surrounding the Town Hall removed and cleared to prevent further damage to the roof, this being done at no cost to the Town.

The Town has also agreed to allow the Boy Scouts to use the basement in the Town Office for a meeting room. They are fixing up the basement for themselves at no cost to the Town.

Due to legislative mandate that we must appoint a Deputy Tax Collector, we were fortunate to appoint a very experienced person to fill that position and the position of Deputy Town Clerk to compliment our existing staff which will give us a trained back-up in case of illness or leave of our present staff.

In spite of the lack of new construction, the increase in the school and county budgets, we feel we were able to hold the tax rate well within reason. The growth and added construction this year is encouraging for the tax base in 1984.

Our appointed Police Study Group completed their study and gave their recommendations for the operation of the Police Department.

The future of cable TV is looking more promising as the site for the tower and dish has been approved and construction is well underway on the Chandler Hill site.

We have tried to hold the line by our recommended budget as posted.

The balance reverts to the general fund of the Town of Campton for other Planning Board expenses.

The Planning Board also had quite a few meetings relative to the Master Plan and broke up the Board and those volunteers interested in working on the Master Plan into individual committees. The Board has reviewed two other master plans for aiding in the Campton Master Plan. We would also like to encourage any and all interested people in helping with the Master Plan to contact the office.

REPORT OF THE GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

We appreciate this opportunity to more directly communicate with our taxpaying citizens through their annual town/city reports.

Because of our July 1st fiscal year, it is hard to anticipate the local tax impact of the county budget. The Commissioners are accountable to the public and taxpayers, and accordingly are extremely conscious of meeting the citizens' needs adequately and efficiently, yet as economically as possible. However, we are faced with similar budgeting dilemmas as towns and cities. Real budget concerns are created by the federal and state mandated programs and services without supporting funds or local control, and the increased demand for services while attempting to hold down budgets and taxes. We all must maintain a close relationship with our legislators. The Commissioners are following very closely the pending legislation regarding settlement and assistance programs, and hope that the towns are also involved in this very important issue.

Courtroom #2 was finished last summer and was dedicated during the opening of the fall term of Superior Court on September 13, 1983. We anticipate having a second judge in March, which should relieve the backlog and reduce the need for masters.

Counties, as well as towns, are experiencing the transition of the courts into the new State Unified Court System, and should notice a decrease in local expenses for the judicial system. However, the counties will have to "reimburse" \$2.75 million to the Unified Court System in fiscal year 1985, which means approximately \$200,000 to Grafton County. We also expect that the counties will retain certain operating expenses such as Probate Court guardianship and appeals costs, Superior Court bailiff costs, and probably will have to provide court space, furnishings and equipment without remuneration.

On Commissioner recommendation, the Delegation Executive Committee appointed a Jail Study Committee to review the needs for the county correctional facility. The National Institute of Corrections made an independent study of the correctional facility at no cost to taxpayers, and issued an encouraging report recommending minor changes, but overall indicating a good facility in general compliance with laws, regulations and meeting needs. Some attention is being given to the need for additional space, especially for "weekend" incarcerations. There was no recommendation for new permanent facility construction at this time.

Grafton County is currently involved in litigation in a retirement buy-back issue which could have heavy impact on all local governments in the N.H. Retirement System. Assessment on Grafton County in this one case could run approximately \$70,000 plus legal fees and could result in a serious "domino" effect on local governments.

Grafton County will be going through the budgeting process in May and June, with a public hearing on the Commissioners recommendations expected to be held in mid-June. The hearing will be advertised, and we strongly encourage your attendance at the hearing to voice your opinions and feelings on the budget. We welcome your attendance and comments.

The Commissioners meet Mondays at 9:30 a.m. at the Courthouse and at 12:30 p.m. at the Nursing Home. Meetings are open to the public.

CAMPTON-THORNTON FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT FOR 1983

The girls in the town office tell me it is time to write another year's report. Time really moves on. I have been told as one gets older it moves faster and guess that is very true.

You will find Chief Mardin's report on fires as well as your fire department expenses, elsewhere in this book.

The Commissioners hope you notice we were one department in the town who cut their budget by 10% this last year. We also lived within that budget. Now if we can do it, why is it necessary all other departments raise their budgets by 10-20%? Enough on that subject, we will let the voters decide on that in both towns.

Again, we have been lucky to not have any major expenses this year.

The Commissioners want the voters to know that the reason for such a large balance last year was that the bills for our equipment purchases did not come to us so that we could pay them before the close of 1982.

This year we owe for two radios \$1,500.00. New tires for a truck \$500.00. These items we have but bills did not arrive until Jan., 1984. Also we must put aside \$5,000.00 to cover our expenses until April 1, 1984. This leaves us approximately \$2,000.00 which we hope we are able to put in a special account toward the purchase of any new major equipment.

Hope this explains the balance which shows in our report as of December 31, 1983.

We state again this year in our report that the Commissioners wish each person who reports a fire, **please** give a complete description of the location to the dispatcher, who is located at the Plymouth Fire Station and does not know all the roads and area the Campton-Thornton Fire Dept. covers. He has maps but these two towns have many areas alike. Just take a few minutes more to describe the location of the fire, which may save many minutes on time it takes the truck to get to the fire.

We had a small problem with rust in the compartments of our new truck. It was returned to the Campton station to be repainted and wood platforms were built for each compartment. This took much longer than the Chief and Commissioners thought it would, but remember we have volunteer help.

This reminds us, we welcome all people interested in helping the department. The Chief is always looking for new members.

The Selectmen of Campton and Thornton have just appointed David Hiltz as Dept. Chief of the department to replace Bill Cheney who is now a Selectman of Campton. The Commissioners hope that Bill will give as much time as he can to help in the department. He has done one terrific job and we thank him.

We want to also thank the firemen for giving of their time to fight fires all hours of the day and night in our towns as well as mutual aid calls.

We all want to thank the Firemen's Auxiliary for all their help in keeping the firemen happy at the fires by feeding them. Also this organization contributes much in major purchases of equipment each year. They work very hard for the benefit of the department.

Again this year we have given the Committee from Thornton more costs and figures which they have asked for. We again hope these figures will help them and the voters of Thornton will realize that the Agreement should continue as in the past years, so we may have one of the best fire departments in the area, as we have a big area to cover.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Once again, our cooperative town and state forest fire prevention and control program leads the nation in least acres burned per forest fire. Less than one-half acre per fire statewide average.

At the town level, your Forest Fire Warden is responsible for the prevention and control of all grass and woods fires when the ground is not snow covered.

Forest fire prevention is achieved at the town level by issuing a written permit for every fire that is to be kindled on the ground out of doors when the ground is not covered with snow. Each person wishing to have an outside fire must obtain this written permit from the town Fire Warden before kindling the fire. Any person that does not obtain a fire permit, when one is required, is violating our forest fire permit law and is subject to a court appearance and could be fined up to \$1,000 and receive a jail sentence of up to one year.

No fire permit will be issued between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. unless it is raining. The reason for this is twofold: the fire danger increases steadily between 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., then subsides to a safe level between 2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. This happens because the sun dries out the fine fuels that are easily ignited and dries the air which permits rapid fire spread. Also during this part of the day, fire fighters are not readily available in most communities so an escaped fire could burn longer and cause greater damage before being suppressed.

Your cooperation in burning only when conditions are safe is greatly appreciated.

As Smokey says, "Remember, Only You Can Prevent Forest Fires!"

REPORT FROM THE PEMI-BAKER HOME HEALTH AGENCY

The Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency wishes again to extend to Campton an invitation to become a member of our home health care services. This service is becoming more and more important in the health field, statistics proving that hospitalization costs are reduced by having home health care services available in our community. Therefore, primary payors such as Medicare, are encouraging earlier discharge from hospitals and extended care facilities to home care situations. This creates less financial burden and enhances the well-being of the patient who is happier recovering in the home setting. This year Pemi-Baker has noticed a decided increase in requests for home health care.

During 1983, the Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency supplied Campton with the following health services:

Professional Home Health Aide Visits	72
Trained Homemaker Visits	561

Blood pressure clinics are held in Campton at the Baptist Church Vestry at 1:30 p.m. on the 3rd Thursday of every other month. 85 Campton residents took advantage of these free blood pressure clinics in 1983. 19 residents were referred to their physicians for further check-ups. Immunization clinics are held Bi-monthly, on the second Wednesday at the American Legion Hall in Plymouth for all member towns. Total immunizations given to Campton residents numbered 63.

The Infant Car Seat Program initiated in April, 1982 by Pemi-Baker has been extremely successful. Car seats for infants are now required by law and any resident of Campton in need of an infant car seat should contact the Agency which is located on Highland Street.

The Hospice program instituted in 1982, is another service offered Campton residence. This program provides support to the family of a terminally ill patient. If such services are needed by our residents, do not hesitate to call on Pemi-Baker for help.

The Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency looks forward to serving Campton residents and your needs in 1984.

As in previous years, we are asking the town to help fund the summer program. A fee will still be charged to each child.

As our third year concludes, we feel the figures show a need and an interest for activities in the community, especially for children in the summer. We wish to thank the community and school district for their continued support.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Note 1. Nature of the Organization and Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of the organization:

Waterville Estates Village District is incorporated in the State of New Hampshire. Its charge is to collect taxes and use those funds for the maintenance and improvement of common area roads and the water system within the District area. The District has also been established for the additional purposes of construction, maintenance, and care of parks and commons; the maintenance of activities for recreational promotion; the control of pollen, insects and pests; and the appointing and employment of watchmen and police officers, however, no moneys were authorized for these additional purposes in 1983.

Significant accounting policies:

Fund accounting:

The accounts of the District are organized on the basis of funds and account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures, or expenses, as appropriate. Resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The various funds in the financial statements in this report are as follows:

The General Fund is the general operating fund of the District. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

The General Fixed Asset account group is used to maintain records of long lived public assets. General fixed assets are recorded at cost and no depreciation has been provided for on them.

The General Long-Term Debt account group contains long-term liabilities expected to be financed from the General Fund.

Basis of accounting:

The General Fund records are maintained on the modified accrual method of accounting whereby tax revenue is recognized when levied and expenses of the general fund are recognized when incurred. Principle and interest payments on long-term debt are considered to be obligations of the general fund in the year in which amounts are appropriated to make such payments.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE 1983

I am pleased to report that all students at the Campton School are fully immunized in compliance with the State requirements. This is partially due to the free immunization clinics held by the Pemi-Baker home health agency.

Grades one through five are participating in a fluoride rinse program for the second year. This program is sponsored by the State of New Hampshire and involves dry brushing daily with a fluoride rinse once a week. The dental hygienist who examined the children at the beginning of the program indicated to me that the status of their teeth is improved from last year.

Dr. Steve Elgert did physical examinations on all fifth graders and any new students in grades sixth through eighth. We welcome Dr. Elgert to the area and look forward to continuing working with him.

Annual screening tests were conducted on all students. Each child has his or her vision, hearing, height and weight monitored. Color vision is checked on all beginning students. Blood pressure and posture is checked in students above fourth grade. Students with possible problems are referred to their own physician. Parents are contacted and agencies providing special services or funding are explored if there is a need.

Preschool vision and hearing are checked in May at a clinic held at Plymouth Area High School. This is a State sponsored program that utilizes high school students as part of the work team. I was pleased to see many of Campton's High School students helping. Kindergarten registration was held over three days this year because of the large enrollment. Each parent and child came to the school. The children were screened by a speech pathologist for possible difficulty and a resource teacher for physical and emotional readiness. The parents provide the teacher and nurse with pertinent medical and social information and both have an opportunity to meet Alma Grand, the kindergarten teacher and to become acquainted with the Campton School. A slide presentation has been developed to provide further information about the school and its many programs. Parents who have a child turning 5 by September 30, 1984, should call the school for kindergarten registration.

As school nurse I spend a great deal of my time with individual students checking medical problems or discussing health matters. I am always available as a resource person both in and out of school.

I would like to finish by thanking all the parents, teachers and professionals who were so helpful and cooperative.

**CAMPTON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL
PRINCIPAL'S REPORT
1983**

To the citizens of Campton, I would like to present my ninth annual report.

The 1983-84 school year has been extremely productive and our mission of being a friendly school striving for excellence continues. One of the major reasons for our success has been the school's ability to attract and reemploy highly competent teachers. This year there are two new teachers. Beverly Boggess is our new Resource Room teacher replacing Carolyn Kent who has accepted a position as Director of Pupil Personnel services for SAU #48, and Cathy DiCenzo is teaching in fifth grade for one of our teachers on a maternity leave.

Enrollment

As of January 3, 1984, the enrollment was 217 at the elementary school and 81 at the high school. The Kindergarten class this year began with 35 youngsters and necessitated the formation of another session. Next year the enrollment projection is 27 students in Kindergarten and 91 in high school for a total district enrollment of 308.

Physical Facilities

In an attempt to utilize all space available in the Campton School the janitorial storage area was converted into an attractive learning area for special service and is called the Resource Room. A loft and shed were built to replace the janitorial space.

Located in the front of the building is an announcement sign which provides information about school activities. The acquisition of the sign was a cooperative project with S.T.A.F.F., our parent-teacher group.

For the winter of 1982-83 we burned 8600 gallons of fuel. Although it is generally believed that last winter was warmer than normal our lowest previous annual consumption was 13,600 gallons. The savings of approximately 5000 gallons indicates that the energy conservation measures performed during the 1981-82 school year are paying dividends.

Chapter I

Chapter I is a federally funded program to assist schools with the education of students who are achieving less than is reasonable to expect. For the 1983-84 school year funding was based for the first time on the 1980 national census, and Campton's share doubled. As a result, the number of students participating has increased from 10 to 30. Two instructional tutors are working with these youngsters in the morning in small groups in reading.

Grants

Again this year the school district has been awarded grant monies from Artists-in-the-School (A.I.S.), Reading is Fundamental (R.I.F.), Block Grants, and National Forest Reserve. Briefly, the A.I.S. program is focusing upon writing and the students are writing under the direction of poet, Georgia Heard. R.I.F. provides the school with the opportunity to distribute three paperback books to each student at various times during the school year. Block Grant funds have been used to expand the computer education program and we now have three micro computers. In addition, SAU #48 has been able to join a federally sponsored consortium of education software. National Forest Reserve funds are being used for library media materials.

Physical Education/Health Update

Last year at the district meeting petition Article 2 was passed which essentially meant that the school district would receive PE/Health services on a full-time basis. All students are now receiving formal health instruction. The lower grades health instruction has been in the area of fitness which is a program designed to help students become conscious of fitness and they are tested according to the Presidential Fitness Tests twice a year. For the upper grades the fitness component is combined with classroom instruction.

Our young people need schooling and the schooling must challenge, nurture, and direct each student according to their potential. I hope that we can work together to accomplish that goal.

REPORT FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Education has received a considerable amount of state and national attention during the 1982-1983 academic year. Approximately 30 reports on the status of education have been issued by commissions, task forces, and individuals. While the reports often make common recommendations and occasionally differ, one message is consistent. Excellent education is basic to the future of our country.

The communities which comprise School Administrative Unit #48 (Campton, Holderness, Plymouth, Rumney, Thornton, Waterville Valley, and Wentworth) should be aware that some of the recommendations cited have already been implemented or are being implemented in our schools. More can and will be done to assure a brighter educational future for our students and continued economic, intellectual, and cultural vitality for our state.

There are no easy solutions to the very complex problems of revitalizing education. Vision is needed to enlist capable thinkers from the school community, colleges and private and public sector agencies to help identify curricular goals for the variety of students served by the public school. Flexibility of offerings, organizational patterns, and scheduling are paramount issues at the building level which can assist in meeting the needs, abilities, and learning styles of a differentiated school population.

School Administrative Unit #48 continues to place much emphasis on goal-setting activities. During the 1982-1983 academic year refinemvnt focused on: (1) improving student performance in language arts (reading and composition), mathematics, and U.S. and NH history and government; (2) improving curriculum coordination amongst the seven elementary schools and articulating with the Plymouth AREA High School; (3) progressing with programs in vocational education, special education, and giftedness; (4) identifying resources which can enhance inservice training opportunities for teachers and administrators; and (5) disseminating and employing the findings of "effective schools" research.

Our teaching staff also continues to keep abreast of contemporary developments. Computer awareness, gifted and talented opportunities, writing and mathematics instruction, and vocational skills receive considerable attention. Interest has been maintained at a high level, and we constantly attempt to utilize in-house expertise and share information.

In conclusion, School Administrative Unit #48 will continue to provide the leadership which nurtures the development of partnerships which are designed to improve educational opportunities for all students.

A school cannot exist independently of the community served. This administration will exemplify a commitment to reach out and establish itself as a focal point of the community. Our schools are still our greatest single natural resource.

Your continued support and cooperation is cherished. It can only serve to contribute to our quest for evolving excellence.

**EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S AND
ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY FOR 1982-1983**

Chapter 189, Section 48 Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire, requires that the school district annual report show the total amount paid to the Superintendent of Schools as per the following quotaion: "Reports. Each Superintendent of a School Administrative Unit shall annually prepare a report of the total salary paid to the superintendent, showing in detail the amount paid by the state and each local school district and their share of same...Said report shə'll be included in the annual report of the respective school district as a separate entry. A like report and entry shall be made for each assistant superintendent, teacher consultant, and business administrator if any is in service in the unit."

One-half of the School Administrative Unit expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the unit on the basis of adjusted valuations. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The salary of \$32,940 which was received by the Superintendent of Schools of School Administrative Unit #48 during 1982-1983 was prorated among the school districts comprising the School Administrative Unit. Allowance for \$2,200 travel within the Unit was also prorated as stated above.

The salary of \$27,324 for the Assistant Superintendent during 1982-1983 and travel allowance within the Unit of \$1,700 was prorated as stated above.

The table below shows the portion of salary and travel charged to each school district.
