

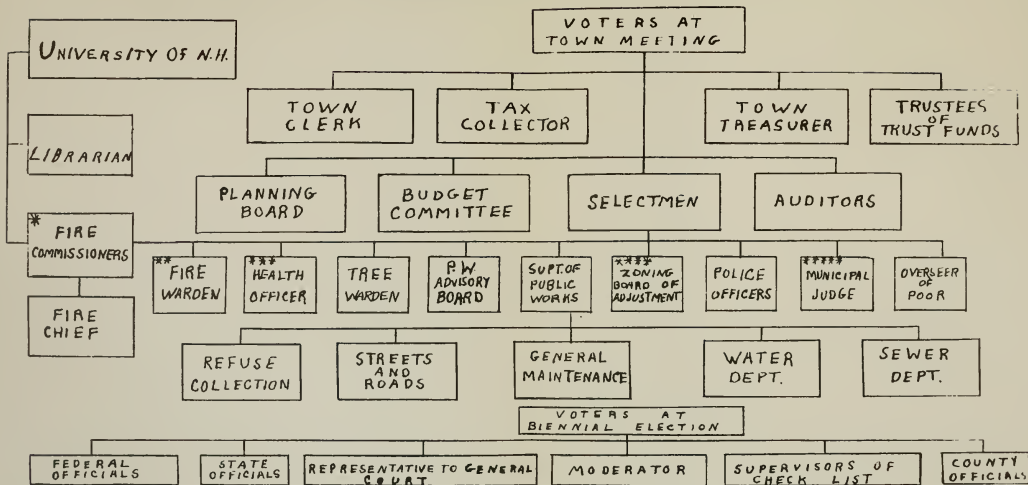

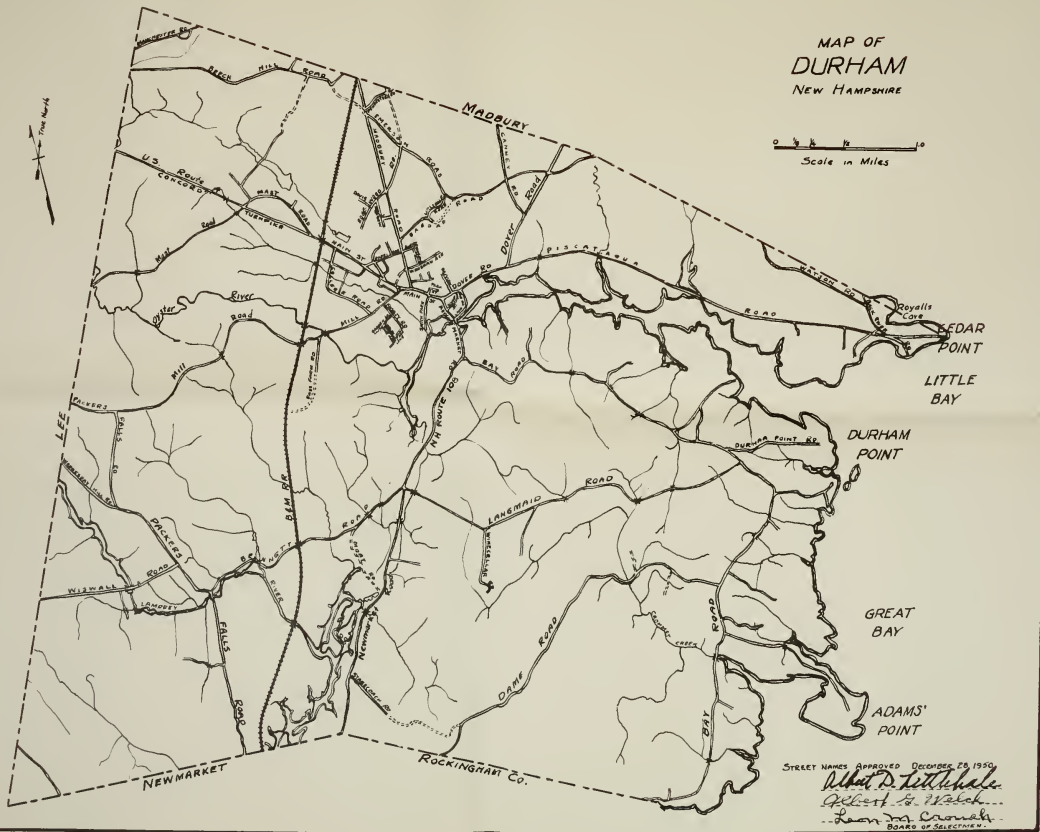

M., that there be no voting during the morning session except for those few who are unable to vote at any other time, and that voting be continuous from noon until after all the articles have been disposed of, or until 4 P. M. whichever is later.

Higgins, that the budget as presented by the Budget Committee be approved with the exceptions of (1) the item of \$274.00 for the Seacoast Regional association and (2) the item of \$1,500.00 for Edgewood Road extension as these two would be considered in Articles 4 and 5 respectively, that the amount of the proposed budget be reduced by the sum of \$1,774.00 to \$86,203.95 and that this latter amount be raised and appropriated for the purposes of the article.

Richard W. Daland moved an amendment, seconded by Daniel B. Ninde, that the item of \$5,97.00 for new equipment be reduced by \$1,000.00.

**Article 4. Edgewood Road Extension.**

Moved by Russell R. Skelton, seconded by James A. Funkhouser, that this article be adopted and that \$1,500.00 be raised and appropriated for the purposes of it.

Motion Carried.

**Article 5. Seacoast Regional Development Association.**

Moved by Perley I. Fitts, seconded by Norman Alexander, that this article be adopted and that \$274.00 be raised and appropriated for the purpose of it.

Motion Carried.

**Article 6. Construction of Incinerator**

Moved by Clifford S. Parker, seconded by Lucy Seiberlich, that this article be indefinitely postponed.

Motion Carried.

**Article 7. Tax Discount, Amount and Time.**

Moved by Albert D. Littlehale, seconded by Leon M. Crouch, that this article be adopted, and that a one percent discount be allowed to all persons who shall pay their taxes, other than poll taxes, within six weeks from the date that the tax rate is approved by the State Tax Commission.

Perley I. Fitts moved an amendment, seconded that the discount rate be one half of one percent.

#### Article 8. **Sell, Tax Deeded Property.**

Moved by Albert D. Littlehale, seconded by George G. McGregor, that this article be adopted.

Moved an amendment by Norman Alexander, seconded, to see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen and their successors in office to administer and to sell and convey any real estate acquired or hereafter acquired by the Town from tax sales and by deeds from the Collector of Taxes and to execute and deliver to the purchasers thereof, deeds and instruments of conveyance provided that all offers for any of said real estate shall be submitted by sealed bids to the Board of Selectmen and that advance public notice of the dates for receiving bids shall be posted at the Town Hall and the Durham Post office; and be it further provided that the Board of Selectmen shall be empowered to reject any and all bids when in their judgement no bids represent the fair and reasonable value of such real property but if any bid is accepted it shall be the highest bid received. The powers and authority hereby granted are to remain in effect until the Town votes to rescind this action.

**Article 9. Deputy Tax Collector.**

Moved by James A. Funkhouse, seconded by Albert D. Littlehale, that this article be adopted.

Perley I. Fitts moved an amendment, and seconded, that the salary of the Collector and Deputy Collector shall not exceed \$300.00, the amount budgeted for the collection of taxes.

**Article 10. Borrowing, Anticipation of Taxes**

Moved by Harold C. Grinnell, seconded by Harold I. Leavitt, that this article be adopted.

Moved by Clifford S. Parker, and seconded, that Article 13 be considered before Article 11.

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**Article 13. Interim Policy, Extension of Utilities To Subdivisions.**

Moved by Carroll M. Degler, seconded by Max F. Abell, that this article be adopted.

Clarence B. Wadleigh moved an amendment, seconded, that the last sentence of this article (Each lot shall be assessed separately as a building lot.) be stricken out.

Amendment	Carried.
Article as amended	Carried

Moved, seconded, and carried that the meeting adjourn, except as to balloting, until two P. M.



**Article 11. Bond Issue, for Water Lines.**

Moved by Mathias C. Richards, seconded by Albert D. Littlehale, that this article be adopted.

Russell S. Harmon, Sr. moved an amendment, seconded by Robert B. Knox, that the amount to be raised by bond issue and appropriated be raised from \$12,000.00 to \$21,000.00.

Harold W. Loveren moved an amendment to this amendment and seconded, that the amount to be raised by bond issue and appropriated be raised from Mr. Harmon's \$21,000.00 to \$30,000.00.

This amendment was accepted by Harmon and Knox. Harmon's amendment as amended by Loveren Lost.

James A. Funkhouser moved an amendment, seconded by Richard W. Daland, that \$12,000.00 be used for the purposes of this article; that \$7,500.00 be raised by bond issue or serial notes, and appropriated; and that the remaining \$4,500.00 be transferred from the Capital Reserve Fund and the balance of the unexpended Water Construction Bonds of 1948.

Motion Carried.

The Moderator ruled that this article must be voted on by ballot.

Moved by John C. Tonkin, seconded, and carried that the meeting proceed to ballot.

Moved, seconded, and carried, that the meeting proceed, after the balloting, to the remaining articles, and then the ballots on this article be counted at the conclusion of the meeting.

#### Article 12. **Bonding for Facilities for "Riverside Drive."**

Moved by Clifford S. Parker, seconded by Clarence B. Wadleigh, that this article be indefinitely postponed.

#### Article 14. **Reopening Bennett Road.**

Moved by John C. Tonkin, and seconded that this article be adopted.

Motion Lost.

#### Article 15. **Any Other Business.**

A. Moved by John C. Tonkin, and seconded that Article 6 relative to the construction of an incinerator be taken from the table.

Motion Lost.

B. Moved by Harold W. Loveren, and seconded, that this Town Meeting instruct the Town Officers to follow the recommendations of the Auditors as outlined in their report of the year 1949.

Motion Carried.

C. Moved by Sam Smith, seconded by Harold W. Loveren, that the Moderator be empowered to appoint a committee of four citizens of the Town comprising two representatives of the University Administration, and two others not connected

with the University; said committee to study and report to the citizens of the Town at the 1951 Town Meeting on ways and means of reorganizing the management of the Town's business in such a manner as to promote its efficiency and economy.

Motion Carried.

D. Moved by Isabelle Meyers, and seconded, that Article 3 be reconsidered.

Motion Carried.

Moved by Perley I. Fitts, and seconded, that the Hydrant Service Fee be \$50.00 per hydrant, that the hydrants owned by the Town be counted and that the proper amount be entered in the budget, raised and appropriated.

Motion Carried.

Clerk's Note: The Superintendent of Public conferred with the Superintendent of Properties of the Universities of New Hampshire and reported to your Town Clerk on March 18, 1950 that the Town had jurisdiction over 23 hydrants. Thus, the Town will raise and appropriate an additional \$200.00 for Hydrant Service, or a total budget, including Articles 3, 4, 5 and 15 (D) of \$88,177.95.

E. Moved by James C. Chamberlain, and seconded, that Article 4 concerning the extension of Edgerwood Road be considered.

Motion Lost.

F. Moved by Harold I. Leavitt, and seconded that after the counting of the ballots the meeting adjourn.

Motion Carried.

## WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

Tuesday, March 13, 1951, at 10:00 a. m.

New Hampshire Hall  
Two Hundred and Twentieth Meeting

To the inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at New Hampshire Hall on the University Campus, at Durham, N. H. on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, 1951, A. D., at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three years, one Selectman for a term of two years, one Selectman for a term of one year, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, one Auditor for a term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, four members of the Budget Committee for a term of three years, and all other elective Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the budget as submitted and recommended by the Budget Committee. (See details following)

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding \$18,000.00 for the erection of a Town Garage on the lots now owned by the Town and to do the filling and grading necessary to make the garage usable.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$30,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.

5. To see if the Town will vote to direct a discount of  $\frac{1}{2}$  of 1% to be made to those persons who shall pay their taxes within a limited time after receipt of their tax bills.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to transfer the balance now in Water Funds in Capital Reserve to the Durham Water Department to permit further replacement of existing Town water lines and to extend new Town water lines in accordance with a policy on line extensions and replacements developed by the Board of Selectmen with the assistance of representatives of the Public Works Advisory Committee and of the Planning Board.

7. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Board of Selectmen and the Public Works Advisory Committee to initiate steps necessary to determine the status of long range water supply for the Town.

8. To see if the Town will vote to abandon the remaining unused portion of the Emerson Road upon which the present Boynton property fronts, with the provision that the remaining Emerson Road Right-of-way, providing access to Madbury Road shall not be reduced to less than fifty feet in width. If it is



voted to abandon this road as recited above, this land, together with land abandoned in like manner by the Town Meeting held March 14, 1939, shall be transferred by quit claim deed to each of the three abutting property owners as the land is included by the extension of their side lot lines to intersect with the Madbury Road Right-of-way, providing that the frontage lines on Madbury Road shall not reduce the Madbury Road Right-of-way to less than sixty feet in width, and further providing that each of the abutting property owners shall furnish a survey meeting the minimum standards for land surveys as adopted by the N. H. Society of Engineers, and pay the cost of preparation of the deeds.

9. To see if the town will vote to amend the Preamble and Articles 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 10 of the Zoning Ordinance adopted in Town Meeting March 13th 1934, as recommended by the Planning Board.

10. To see if the Town will vote to empower the Planning Board to approve or disapprove, in its discretion, plats showing new streets pursuant to provisions of Sections 19-29, inclusive, Chapter 53, Revised Laws of New Hampshire, 1942, as amended, the cited provisions being an authorization for communities to regulate new subdivisions of land.

11. To see if the Town will vote to vest in the Board of Selectmen the power to issue on behalf of the Town certificates of failure of the Planning Board to take action on plat plans within the time limit prescribed by the provisions of Section 23, Chapter 53, Revised Laws of New Hampshire, 1942.

12. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance Adopted at the Town Meeting of March 13, 1934, by striking out the Articles 1 to VIII inclusive.

Petition signed by Alden Winn and 9 legal voters.

13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws of the State of New Hampshire relative to playing games of Beano.

14. To see if the Town will vote to install in Park Court, a public way of the Town, a proper six (6) inch water main in replacement of the present Town system which, because of its limited size, unsuitable material, and state of disrepair, is inadequate to serve properly the five (5) families on Park Court now dependent thereon for water.

Petition signed by Robert J. Dunfey and 15 other legal voters.

15. To see if the Town will vote to accept three (3) fifty foot wide private ways (previously graded, gravelled, and furnished with water main adequate for domestic use at the expense of the owners, and presently giving access to two newly constructed homes) adjoining Madbury Road and known as Cowell Drive, Glassford Lane, and Sauer Terrace, as plotted and laid out, and as described in warranty deed of gift in fee simple previously tendered to the Town by the Owners.

Petition signed by Louis E. Brown and 15 legal voters.

16. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the so-called "Interim Policy, Extension of Utilities to Subdivisions," adopted by the Town as Article 13 (as amended) of the Warrant for the Town Meeting of March 14, 1950.

Petition signed by Marshall Shields and 9 legal voters.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee of three persons to serve with the Chairman of the Budget Committee and the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen to make a study of the feasibility and advisability of the Town making contributions to the support of hospitals, and make a report to the Town Meeting in March 1952.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## REPORT OF DURHAM PUBLIC WORKS

The Durham Public Works will soon celebrate it's second birthday. After the first year of operation numerous changes in procedure were found to be desirable and undoubtedly there will be other improvements to be made every year we encounter. The organization seems to be functioning a little more smoothly as time passes.

### HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

There was but one major project during 1950, the reconstruction of the Packers Falls Bridge. This work was accomplished under the State Bridge Program. Our part consisted of a major share of the cost and cooperating with the State Public Works Dept., by furnishing part of the necessary labor and equipment within our abilities. Now, we have practically a new bridge at relatively small expense to Durham, which, having been designed by the State Dept. of Public Works should certainly be satisfactory.

Town Road Aid money was not completely expended this year. The forces were very busy on various activities during the summer months and it wasn't until the first part of November that we started our T. R. A. work. This consisted of installing culverts, widening and applying a substantial gravel surface to three of the roads so sadly in need of reconstruction as indicated by the breakup experienced in the spring. Wednesday Hill Road was improved from the Packers Falls Road to the Lee line. Winecellar Road from Langmaid Road to the Joseph Krist farm and the Langmaid Road from Newmarket Road almost to the Kitfield Home. It

is planned to continue this work during the coming spring.

General Maintenance included the application of approximately 18,000 gallons of tar. Some of the streets treated were Woodman Ave., Dennison St., Park Court and all streets in Faculty Development. Part of this tar was used for repair after Water Dept. Construction activities on Mill Road and several private driveways. As always, considerable attention was given to patching. Catch basins and culverts were cleaned and repaired as necessary. Snow plowing again was not the major project that it has been some other years.

The brush spraying program was expanded a little. Examination seems to indicate that a single application of the spray does not give a complete kill on some of the hardier varieties, but in most cases where this brush was not destroyed there was definite indication that the growth was severely stunted. It is planned to continue with spray control again during the coming year.

Hundreds of yards of gravel were hauled on back roads to keep them passable. This practice will need to be continued for many years to come.

Considerable attention was given to guard fence, some being placed where none existed previously, some being replaced and some just patched and painted.

## WATER DEPARTMENT

### Construction:

Approximately 1600 feet of new cast iron main was laid on Mill Road. Part of this was to replace

some of the old Pettee system and part to provide water for residential use beyond the area previously served. The contract for the improvement of Main Street from Madbury Road to Dover Road was awarded by the State with planned construction to start in the coming spring. For that reason a 6" cast iron line was installed across Main Street to the entrance to Park Court as one of the terms of this improvement by the State was that no work of this nature which could be accomplished in advance would be permitted for a period of ten years after the reconstruction.

#### Maintenance:

A number of breaks on the old part of the system occurred during the past year. The line in Dover Road gave trouble twice. The old line serving Mill Road froze twice. This troublesome section is eliminated temporarily until individual service connections are made to the new main. None of the anticipated connections were made on Ballard st., Rosemary Lane and Woodman Ave. The available forces were inadequate to accomplish all that might have been done in this field, but these should be done this year if materials are available. Little by little the old system is being abandoned, but not as rapidly as it should be.

### SEWER DEPARTMENT

#### Construction

730 feet of 8" sewer line was installed in Garrison Ave., and Madbury Road. This line had been planned by the Sewer Commission under their administration and the preliminary work done. It

had been hoped to be able to extend the line sufficiently to bring all of the present residences within reach but because of ledge encountered in Madbury Road available funds did not quite complete the project.

#### Maintenance

The Sewer Dept. purchased some of the necessary equipment for the maintenance of the system, namely, a flexible cleanout rod with some attachments. It is hoped that given proper preventive maintenance the use of this equipment will be held to a minimum, but it must be on hand when needed. We succeeded in passing through this year with but very minor troubles.

### SANITATION DEPARTMENT

Garbage collection, it is anticipated, will be accomplished the same as in the past. Occasionally there seems to be a complaint for one reason or another. If these are registered with the contractor, Mr. Harry Denning, Jr., whose phone is Dover 1422-R or at the Town Office, an endeavor will be made to correct the condition.

Refuse Collection will be conducted in the usual manner, with the service provided to fraternities and business establishments weekly on Wednesdays and to others on the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month. There are no changes in the regulations from those published in the 1949 Town Report.

Proper care of the dump is impossible under the present conditions so some change is anticipated in this respect. What shall be done is not determined

as yet but it may mean closing the area except for certain periods when supervision can be provided, possibly fencing around the immediate dumping area to prevent the blowing of loose papers through adjoining property, and possibly providing water at the site so that controlled burning may be accomplished and thus reduce the fire hazard.

## REPORT OF PLANNING BOARD

**Reorganization:** Due to the expiration of the term of E. W. Bowler and the resignation of the Chairman, Charles Dawson in March 1950, the membership of the Planning Board was changed by the Board of Selectmen by appointment of Mr. Russell Skelton to replace Mr. Bowler, and Mr. George H. Deming to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Mr. Dawson. At its meeting of April 17, 1950, the Planning Board was organized with Mr. Deming as Chairman, and Mrs. Funkhouser as Secretary.

**Program:** In addition to the functions of a Planning Board as delineated in the Revised Laws of New Hampshire, the Planning Board was fixed by the 1950 Town Meeting with a function, in coordination with the Board of Selectmen, of controlling subdivisions and the extension of utilities to subdivisions in the Town of Durham. This function, as here contemplated in Article XIII of the Warrant for the 1950 Town Meeting, has been a course of considerable difficulty to the Board of Selectmen, the Planning Board, and, even more important, to property owners of the Town, primarily because of conflict with the provisions of an existing state law pertaining to sub-division control.

Early in its deliberations, the Planning Board, in concurrence with the Board of Selectmen, reached the necessary decision that the administration of this function could be reasonably carried out only with the continuing assistance from the Town's legal counsel. This counsel was sought together with that of the State Attorney General, and their inter-

pretation of the Town's action in adopting Article XIII was followed to the best of the ability of the Planning Board.

Two developments have been affected by the policy to date: The Harmon Development was approved for a limited number of residences with septic tanks after consideration and application of the best technical assistance which could be afforded, namely the Durham Health Officer and the State Board of Health; An extension of the Faculty Development was approved after agreement by the University with the provisions of Article XIII.

The minutes and correspondence of the Planning Board incidental to the administration of Article XIII is a matter of public record and the voter or other interested person is invited to acquaint himself with the record.

The 1950 Town Meeting instructed the Planning Board to develop for consideration at the 1951 Town Meeting a revised Zoning Ordinance. A revision has been prepared for consideration, by the voters of the Town.

The Planning Board has continued the interest in the development of adequate maps of the Town. A set of aerial photographs of the Town has been secured. From these, it will be possible to develop accurate line maps which may then become the basis for tax maps, municipal utility maps, and such other maps as may from time to time be required in the conduct of the Town's business. The Town has been offered **gratis** the service of one of its citizens,

Mr. Karl W. Woodward, long experienced in interpreting aerial maps, in the development of this project. His generous offer is herewith gratefully acknowledged.

During the year, the Planning Board has held a total of twelve formal meetings and in addition, several informal discussion meetings. One public hearing has been held. In addition, the Chairman has devoted considerable time to discussion with legal counsel, counsel of property owners, and interested citizens. The Board has advised, when requested, in the conduct of other Town Business.

The Planning Board is appreciative of the increasing expression of confidence which it has received from citizens of the Town and from the other officers of the Town.

**Recommendations:** 1 It is recommended that the voters of the Town, reconsider Article XIII of the 1950 Warrant with a view to bringing the procedural provisions into line with the provisions of the Revised Laws.

2. It is recommended that the voters of the Town give consideration to the desirability of surveying the Town's water potential in light of the contemplated program of the University of New Hampshire and the needs of the Town.

## REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

In an endeavor to improve the manner in which the trust funds have been handled over a period of years, the trustees feel that progress has been made and that the constructive criticism in the last town report has accomplished the following results:

The three trustees have been bonded.

An acceptable account book has been purchased from town funds and all items of business were transferred to same as of January 1, 1950. This book is kept in the town vault and is available for all to see.

The funds of the town cemetery are now duly separated into principal and interest.

An attempt has been made to improve the general appearance of several family plots by the painting of fences and straightening of stones, so the expenditures are slightly higher than in previous years. The trustees have also considered that the Doe wood lot is worth conserving and are therefore following the dictates of the will and expending the monies derived as interest in the construction of fencing and possible new plantings. Therefore the funds are not available for the school as they have been annually for some years.

The town appropriation of \$100.00 for the old cemetery on School street has been well expended in the greatly improved general appearance. There are only three lots in this cemetery having trust funds.

## REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER For the Year 1950

The following communicable diseases were reported in Durham during the year:

Disease	No. of Cases
German Measles .....	4
Mumps .....	69
Scarlet Fever .....	1

Except for the outbreak of Mumps, the above figures indicate that the incidence of communicable diseases in Durham was very low. It is possible that on certain occasions infections are not reported to the Health Officer. Our State Laws require that the attending physician, nurse or the parents report the following diseases: Chicken Pox, Diphtheria, German Measles, Influenza, Measles, Meningococcus Meningitis, Mumps, Poliomyelitis (Infantile Paralysis), Pneumonia (all forms), Scarlet Fever, Septic Sore Throat, Typhoid Fever, Paratyphoid Fever, Undulant Fever, and Whooping Cough. This reporting is considered particularly urgent during the present war emergency.

The water and milk supplies of the town were tested by the Health Officer at regular intervals. All restaurants were inspected periodically and the sanitary quality of the eating utensils checked by swab tests for bacteria counts. Practically all residences within 100 feet of a town sewer line have now been connected to the town sewerage system. The remainder must be connected by April 1 or June 1, 1951.

## REPORT OF THE HAMILTON SMITH LIBRARY

Jan. 31, 1951

To Durham Residents:

During 1950, 150 books were purchased for the Durham Public Library, and 40 were discarded. Included among the purchases was a new edition of Compton's Pictured Encyclopedia in 15 volumes, at a cost of more than \$100. The total of books in the collection on January 1 numbered 4,452. But since the entire resources of the University Library are available to Durham residents there are available for use (January 1) 173,237 volumes.

Hours in general remain the same—during the school year 8 to 10 Monday through Friday, 8 to 5 Saturday, 6 to 10 P. M. Sunday; during vacation periods, 8 to 5 Monday through Saturday; during the summer session, 8 A. M. to 9 P. M. Monday through Friday and 8 to 5 Saturday. The children's room, however, is now closing at 7 P. M. Teachers and other adults wishing to make use of the collection after that time should apply to the librarian in charge.

## REPORT OF AUDIT OF TOWN RECORDS

March 1, 1951

The Board of Selectmen  
Durham, N. H.

Gentlemen:

We have audited the books of the selectmen, treasurer, town clerk, tax collector, municipal court, trustees of trust funds, sewer construction fund, sewer maintenance fund and the water department and submit our report herewith. We have examined the bonds of the trustees of trust funds, tax collector, treasurer and town clerk in accordance with the law and find them in good order.

We offer the following comments and suggestions.

**Selectmen's books** Charges were made to town officers expenses which we think should have been made elsewhere as follows: In our report we have made the allocations as we think it should have been made.

\$34.72 paid for coupon service on bond. Should be charged to bond coupon service.

\$39.65 was paid for sewer contracts and billheads for the sewer department. We believe this item should be charged to sewer maintenance.

\$4.29 for recording sewer liens, should be included with the other charges of the same nature, I. E. sewer entrance recording fees.

\$678 paid for office furniture and fixtures should be charged to that account.

\$12.15, voucher 5571, printing ballots, should be charged to election and registration.

Vo. 5871, Check should have been written for \$44.48, but was written for \$44.08.

Vo. 5833, Ten dollars should have been charged to refuse collection and \$20 to town maintenance according to the voucher. In the book the entire \$30.00 was charged to town maintenance.

Vo. 5883, Charge to payroll according to voucher should be \$27.90. Charge in the book is \$27.00.

Care should be taken to make sure that the distribution on the vouchers and the distribution on the are the same.

We believe too many items are charged to town officers expenses that should be charged to other accounts. We do not believe that the town officers expenses account should be used as a "catch-all."

**Treasurer's Books** \$7,500 borrowed for water construction was omitted from the treasurer's cash receipts book.

**Tax collector's Books** We recommend that the tax collector make at least monthly remittances to the treasurer in accordance with the law. We believe that when he makes remittances he should remit all tax money in his possession at that time. We further recommend that the tax collector use the stand-

ard forms in remitting to the treasurer, so that the treasurers books will show the amount of taxes remitted as such. The breakdown cannot be obtained from the treasurers books under the present practice.

**Town Clerk's Books** The Town Clerk should make remittances to the treasurer at least once a month, and when remitting should remit all such funds then in his possession.

**Trustees of Trust Funds** We are pleased to report that the trustees now have modern books in which to keep record of the trust funds.

We again urge that the trustees show in their report of securities held the amount invested in bonds, or other securities and the amount of savings bank accounts separately rather than lump all principal funds. We suggest that the trustees keep a cash receipts and disbursements book.

**Water Department** Water voucher No. 85, \$187.24 was for culvert pipe. The charge should have been made to the highway department and should not appear in the water books. The invoice was marked "Charge highway dept." The water department should be reimbursed for this item.

No charges for water connections should be entered on the water consumers ledger. During 1950 some such charges were entered on this ledger and some were not. Such charges should be kept on a separate schedule. Only water charges, charges for turning on water, and meter charges, if any, should appear on the water consumers ledger.



**Sewer Maintenance Fund** The balance of the sewer maintenance fund, January 1, 1949, was \$451.05. During 1949 sewer rental fees of \$339 were collected and should have been added to the \$451.05. Such was not the case. We called attention to this in the audit for 1949. In 1950 \$540 was collected from sewer rentals. This amount should also be added to the sewer maintenance fund. It was not. We find the following notation in the sewer maintenance fund book. "Fund of \$451.05 withdrawn and deposited in general funds as recorded January 4, 1951." This item is in the cash balance for 1950. In 1950 an appropriation of \$350 was made for sewer maintenance. This item should also have been added to the sewer maintenance fund.

The sewer rental fee is charged to provide funds for maintenance. The way the town books are kept this fund will become lost in the general funds under the present procedure and we will be paying sewer maintenance out of the general taxes, the first thing we know. All maintenance charges for the sewer should come from the maintenance fund, but no construction or equipment costs should be charged thereto. There was charged to the sewer maintenance fund during 1950, \$443.50 for sewer cleaning equipment. This was a capital expenditure and should not have been charged to maintenance. We have shown the item in our report as an expenditure for sewer cleaning equipment. The sewer maintenance fund should appear as follows:

This balance of \$1,307.99 should be removed from the general funds and set up as a separate fund.

The treasurers books show a cash balance as of December 31, 1950 of \$21,667.26. Of this amount \$9,118.22 are encumbered funds and \$12,549.04 are unencumbered funds. We believe this is too large a cash balance to be carried over and that the budgeting should be more carefully done. The break down of the cash on hand is as follows:

All town officers should submit reports to the auditors with their books.

We quote as follows from our last year's report. "We find from the books that the Superintendent of Public Works was allowed three hundred dollars expense money for the year. No vouchers were submitted for expenditures. We do not find that the Town ever voted any such appropriation. Until the Town does no vote we believe the Superintendent of Public Works should be reimbursed for out of pocket expenses upon presentation of a properly itemized voucher." This year we find the same practice was followed, except that the amount was \$350. We repeat our recommendation of last year. We recommend that more care be used in preparing the poll tax list, and when it is found that some name is on the list that does not belong there an abatement slip be issued to the tax collector to clear his records.

There is again this year a sizable expenditure for tax refunds. These items could be handled by abatement slips to the tax collector, rather than collect the excess taxes and then make refunds. We recommend that the selectmen make use of abatement slips in these cases wherever possible.

There should be no use of a miscellaneous column in the selectmen's books. The nature of town transactions is such that each item should be allotted to some account. There was no appropriation made at the last town meeting for the payment of County Taxes. The taxes were paid, however.

On page 34 of the town report of the year 1949 there appears a list of town property. We believe this list should be more complete and that the equipment should be appraised and a value stated in the

list. As new property is acquired it should be added to the list at the cost price. A few years ago there was purchased a safe for the use of the town clerk, but it does not appear in the list. Over the past few years considerable engineering equipment has been purchased but it does not show in the list. The water and sewer departments have equipment which should be listed. We recommend that for the next town report a careful list be made of town property together with the appraised value of each item.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of Durham :

As I assumed my duties as Superintendent of your School district on November 1st, 1950, my report will be brief and will of necessity draw on information furnished by Jonathan Osgood your former school Superintendent.

It was a pleasure for me to be present when the new addition to the Durham Center School was dedicated in November. Already several groups have used the new auditorium and kitchen which has been made available at a nominal rental fee when it does not conflict with the regular school program. The wing housing the kindergarten, first grade room and nurses room lends a pleasing atmosphere and meet to a high degree the needs of primary children. The manual arts department is one of the best in the state for junior high students. Durham citizens should be proud of these new facilities.

### Teachers

Since last June Mrs. Ruth Nelson, Grade 4, resigned and was replaced by Miss Susie Chafee. Mrs. Marilyn Pinkham was replaced by Marjorie Radcliffe in Grade 7-8. Mrs. Doris Granger was added to the staff, in the Kindergarten.

All teachers in the Durham Center School should be commended for the fine job they are doing for the youth of Durham.

### New Additions

It was expected that a complete report showing the total costs and the acceptance of the building

by the School Board could be included in this year's report, but due to the fact that Ross Associates have not completed the building in every detail this report cannot be made until a later date.

### **Federal Aid**

Negotiations are underway to qualify the Durham School District for Federal Aid under Public Laws Bill 874. Due to the activity at the Portsmouth Navy Yard and at the U. S. D. A Agency in the F. C. Smart Building in Durham, we can expect to receive in the vicinity of \$2,000.00 for the school year 1950-51. It will be necessary to make occupational surveys quarterly because of increased federal activity. I hope that residents of Durham will cooperate in this matter.

As a part of this report, charts will show census children and also those attending high school with tuition rates.

It is my desire to be of service to the citizens of Durham and to cooperate with you in school matters. My office is located in the Chandler School in Somersworth and its facilities are open to you at all times.

In conclusion I wish to thank the School Board, Teachers and Citizens of Durham for their fine cooperation during the past three months.

## REPORT OF PRINCIPAL

February 1, 1951

To the Superintendent, School Board and Citizens of Durham:

It is indeed a pleasure and a privilege to be able to present my third annual report as principal of the Durham Center School. In my second report the testing program, the reading program and the enriched curriculum was discussed. This report will deal mainly with the following subjects: The Expanded Plant; The Well-Rounded Child; The School and the Community and The Future.

### **The Expanded Plant**

When the appropriation was made to build the two additions to the school building it was clear to most everyone that the additions would include a new auditorium and two new classrooms. Now that the dust of construction has cleared away and visitors inspect our building it is a joy to point out how much the citizen received for his money. It might be appropriate to list the facilities that are now available due to the construction. That we have two new classrooms and a splendid auditorium is readily seen. Facilities now in use, which were not available before are: a well-equipped shop for Manual Training and used only for Manual Training; a cafeteria seating well over a hundred; a fine kitchen used solely for the preparation of hot lunches; a boys' dressing room complete with showers; a girls' dressing room with showers, and a large toilet for the use of boys. As a by-produce of the additions we have at hand a room used by the girls for sewing and one devoted to teaching of science and audio-

visual work. We here at the school are proud of our added space. It is gratifying to know that the citizens of Durham want the very finest environment for their students.

It should be mentioned here that our playground at the rear of the property has been wholly completed and places at our disposal a fine playing area for such activities as football and baseball.

### **The Well-Rounded Child**

Less than a generation ago such activities as physical training, folk dancing, art, music and club work was thought of as being an unnecessary part of the school program. They were called the extra curricular part of the curriculum. Educators today realize that the happy, healthy individual is the well-rounded one. It is the purpose of this school to first develop the child's personality and secondly, to educate him up to his capacity. When the first object is achieved, the latter comes the more readily.

The Durham Center School offers nearly every kind of activity suited to its pupils. Perhaps the most important of these activities is the physical education program. Instructors from the Women's Physical Education Department of the University assist in training for sound bodies throughout the grades. The principal works with the older boys and it is expected that a fine schedule of intra-mural games will result. We have far to go yet in the matter of physical training but we look forward to expanding this phase of our school offerings.

The cultural side of the activities program is not neglected. Mrs. Wholey, our art supervisor does

much with the time allotted her and Mrs. Coombs, the supervisor of music achieves what can be accomplished in a limited time schedule. It is hoped that our musical offerings will be greatly expanded in the near future.

Square dancing and folk dancing are popular. The many people who witnessed the Fiesta last December realize what such activity does in developing poise and the fostering of an appreciation of our country's heritage as well as that of other lands.

### **The School and the Community**

The school is now equipped to serve everyone in the community as never before. Our new auditorium should be thought of as a place for public meetings insofar as its use does not interfere with the proper conduct of the school. Arrangements for its use may be readily made by contacting the principal well in advance of the desired date.

The auditorium is already in use on two evenings a week. Through the courtesy of the Durham Youth Association boys of high school age are enabled to play basketball.

The school cafeteria is used four afternoons a week by groups of Girl Scouts and Brownies, though these groups are sponsored by an outside organization.

It is expected that you, as citizens will think of this school as Your school.

### **The Future**

As indicated by the recent school census, enrollments in our beginning years will be higher, at least for the next three or four years. Our first

grade will be very large next year as there are presently forty-two in the kindergarten. Provisions have been made for the division of the group if the number remains high. With many veterans leaving this year the number in prospect for next year may be altered somewhat. In any event, if the first grade has to be divided next year, we have the space to take care of the division without loss of any of our present offerings.

With an inspired superintendent, a far-seeing school board, a willing staff of teachers and an enlightened citizenry this school is able to look forward to greater service to our youth and our community.

# CIVIL DEFENSE PLAN FOR THE TOWN OF DURHAM

December 20, 1950

**1. Civil Defense Center** Location of the defense center will be the fire headquarters, where the necessary adjustments can be made quickly to accommodate civil defense personnel if a state of emergency should be declared. Fire headquarters, Tel. Durham 107-W, has been designated as the point of notification by the State Civil Defense in case of an impending emergency.

At this center all warnings, requests for aid, etc., from state, district, or local levels will be received. The Director of Civil Defense or the Deputy Director will coordinate the functions of Civil Defense from the center in periods of declared emergency. During such periods, the chief of each unit or his assistant will be at the center to assist in handling the many problems that will arise during the emergency.

An alternate location for a defense center should be determined and plans made for moving into said center in case the fire station is not available because of accident or for some other reason.

**2. District Wardens** In order to handle an emergency with maximum efficiency, the town is divided

into 21 districts with a warden in charge of each district. William Robinson is Chief Warden. The necessary assistants needed in a district will be assigned to serve under the warden.

A warden may be delegated responsibilities within his district, such as warning and communication, refugee, blackout, engineering, transportation, medical, nursing and first aid, rescue and evacuation.

The district warden will see that all general town regulations regarding civil defense are complied with in a district in accordance with instructions received from the civil defense center.

**3. Manpower Pool** There will be one or more centers established where unassigned manpower will assemble at a time of a declared emergency. From such a pool help may be drawn to aid in any emergency at any point in the town on order from the Defense Center.

The men assigned to the manpower pool will supplement the manpower required in the districts during periods of emergency. The requirements for manpower during a period of emergency divide into eleven functions. Each function or unit will be headed by a chief.

**4. Functional Units to which Manpower may be assigned during periods of declared emergency.** Chief of each unit is listed.

**Unit 1. Warning and Communication Unit.**

Stanley R. Shimer, Eric T. Huddleston.

Has charge of local warnings and communication coverage from the civil defense center to the 21 districts.

## STANDARD AIR RAID WARNING SIGNAL

N. H. C. D. Directive No. 112      Dec. 29, 1950

**"RED ALERT"** - A series of short blasts by the fire whistle over a **three minute period**. This announces imminent attack and all persons should take cover.

**"ALL CLEAR"** A series of **three steady one minute blasts** by the fire whistle interrupted by **silent periods** of two minutes each.

### Unit 2. Ground Observer Unit.

Instructions for the operation of the ground observer unit come from the state and federal level. The Durham Center School is available as an observation post if desired. The following statement was received from the Office of the Coordinator, Concord, N. H., December 18, 1950: "...the Eastern Air Defense Command does not contemplate at this time the establishing of an Observation Post in the Town of Durham."

### Unit 3. Refugee Unit - Red Cross

University authorities will handle a large number in case of an actual emergency.

Definite plans are at hand for meeting problems of health and sanitation in an emergency.

**Unit 10. Medical, Nursing, First Aid**

Definite plans are made for handling problems that may arise.

**Unit 11. Rescue and Evacuation**
