STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Gilmanton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Gilmanton on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. (\$17,687.50)*
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for Temporary Loans in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$450.00) for the maintenance of the Iron Works Fire Department. (\$450.00)*
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$450.00) for the maintenance of the Corner Fire Department. (\$450.00)*
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) to cooperate with the State in the control of White Pine Blister Rust. (\$200.00)*

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for the support of Town Libraries. (\$300.00)*
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) for the observation of Memorial Day. (\$50.00)*
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for Summer Maintenance. (\$5,000.00)*
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000.00) for Winter Maintenance. (\$7,000.00)*
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) for the payments on Long Term Notes. (\$4,000.00)*
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Eighty-five Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$1,285.50) for State Aid Construction. (\$1,285.50)*
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Trustees of Trust Funds to invest these Funds in such legal way that the income will be increased.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for the maintenance of the Civil Defense Organization for the ensuing year, with full realization that should a major emergency be created, more money will have to be used for said purpose.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Hundred Dollars (\$1,100.00) for Town Road Aid. (\$1,100.00)*
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) towards the support of the Laconia Hospital. (\$100.00)*

- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) towards the support of the Wolfeboro Hospital. (\$100.00)*
- 18. To see if the voters of the Town of Gilmanton, will vote to close that part of the Camp Manning Road formerly known as the Old Moulton Road which road leads easterly from the Guinea Ridge Road, from the easterly end of the abuttment of the bridge over Moulton Brook to a point opposite the westerly boundary of property of Leo Foundation, Inc.
- 19. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town.
- 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
- *Amounts approved by Town Budget Committee.

MINUTES OF THE TOWN MEETING

March 13, 1951

Meeting called to order by the Moderator at 9:45 A. M. Warrant read by the Moderator; Ballot Box shown to voters. Ballots unsealed by the Clerk and given to Ballot Inspectors for counting.

Voted to close the Polls at 6:00 o'clock P. M.

Voted to act on all articles after dinner.

Number of ballots counted 503.

Number of names on checklist 546.

- 2. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,460.30 to defray town charges for the ensuing year. \$600.00 for civil defense.
- 3. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for the maintenance of the Iron Works Fire Department.
- 5. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for the maintenance of the Corner Fire Department.
- 6. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to cooperate with the State in the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 7. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the support of Town Libraries.
- 8. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 9. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for summer maintenance.
- 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 for winter maintenance.

- 11. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for payment on Long Term Notes and \$2,000.00 for payment on Short Term Notes.
- 12. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,341.00 for State Aid Construction and \$1,050.69 for T. R. A.
 - 13. Voted to indefinitely postpone.
 - 14. Voted to place on the table.
- 15. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to discontinue road from former buildings of Royal Page to Guinea Ridge, subject to gates and bars.
- 16. Voted to refinance the floating indebtedness of the Town now outstanding, by the issuance of serial notes or bonds in an amount not exceeding \$21,000.00, payable in equal annual payments of \$2,000.00 for the first ten years and \$1,000.00 for the year following, at such interest as may be determined by the Selectmen, under the provisions of Revised Laws, Chapter 72, known as the Municipal Bonds Statute.
- 17. No vote on this article as the Beano vote was on the Ballot.
- 18. Voted to instruct the Budget Committee to reinstate the appropriation of \$100.00 to the Laconia Hospital and \$100.00 to the Wolfboro Hospital. Vote: Yes 29 No 23.

Voted to change the number of Road Agents from three to two, to take effect next year.

Suggested that the citizens cooperate with the Town to help on the improvement of roads, and to help paint the Town Hall, and to improve the grounds around the Town Hall.

Two chairmen were chosen, Harold V. Jordan was chosen to work with the Road Agents and Charles B. Roberts to work with the Selectmen.

CIVIL DEFENSE

ANNUAL REPORT

Of the appropriation of \$600.00 for Civil Defense purposes, only \$392.80 was spent.

The Ground Observation Post was erected on Frisky Hill, lights and telephone were installed, and the necessary minor equipment such as shelves, pencils, pads and an oil stove were purchased or donated, chiefly the latter.

The work of setting up the Civil Defense Organization as such was a voluntary affair, as was the collection of data and information for our own use and that of the state and national organizations.

The people who are the active and reserve members of the organization are volunteer workers, who offered their services at the time of the meeting in the Grange Hall of the Town Hall some months ago. This list, as most of you know, was published in detail in the Laconia Citizen late in 1950, and there have been a few changes and some additions since.

The Air Raid Warning System has been set up, and it takes effect both through sirens which blow after the warning is received at the Post Office in the Corner, and by an elaborate system of telephone communication, the details of which of course are not to be published here.

For refugees we are prepared. An inventory of all the available housing has been made, and we can accommodate a number about equal to our own population. The machinery has been set up—in skeleton form—to feed these people. All trucks, station wagons, vehicles of all kinds are listed and allocated for specific functions, should that be necessary.

We are in a working agreement with the Laconia group for medical, hospital, nursing and surgical aid; they are to send a nurse here in the event of minor trouble and a doctor, if a major catastrophe occurs. They will be responsible for sanitary and health inspection in the event of refugees coming to us. We in turn have agreed to store certain of their supplies, if they request it.

We have had a first aid course, from which we may get a nucleus of about a dozen people for action or further instruction. There are at least another dozen people who are already trained in this work, and upon whom we may call.

There have been several local and state-wide, as well as semi-nation-wide, tests of the Ground Observation work, of which we are a part, and we are listed as being "completely prepared and organized" for the work, and have been as well congratulated by the Air Force for our effective contribution to date, small though it is.

Several necessary pamphlets of various kinds have been circulated to every family in town, and supplies are adequate for additional circulation of them. This has been done through the facilities of the Post Office and Rural Free Delivery.

Additional special police have been appointed, and other people have been "tagged" for possible future appointment. We are also prepared with a complete training course for special police.

An additional fire department unit is prepared for the Corner, which, by the way, will lower the cost of fire insurance by one third for all those within the precinct.

A headquarters building for the whole organization of Civil Defense has been made available for our use, when, as and if the need arises; this is located at the Corners.

Further local protection of the school children is being studied by the school board, as well as the local defense group, and while we have not appropriated the money for the purpose, it is the expectation that a part of our current small appropriation may be allocated to this purpose, with the hope that further money may be made available, if necessary.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the Year of Our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and fifty-one.

An ACT relative to secretaries of supervisory unions. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

tives in General Court convened:

1. Supervisory Unions. Amend section 47 of chapter 135 of the Revised Laws as inserted by chapter 172, Laws of 1949 by striking out said section and inserting in place thereof the following: 47. Budget. At a meeting held before January first of each year the supervisory union board shall adopt a budget required for the expenses of the supervisory union for the next fiscal year, which budget may include the salary and expenses of supervisors of health, physical education, music, art and guidance, and any other employees, and expenses necessary for the operation of the supervisory union. The regularly employed office personnel of the supervisory union office shall be deemed employees of the Union in so far as payment of salaries and contributions to the employees retirement system of the stare of New Hampshire are concerned. The supervisory union board shall apportion the total amount of the budget among the constituent school districts on the following basis, provided that each district shall be required to pay for only those services in which they share. The basis for the apportionment shall be one-half on the average membership for the previous school year and one-half on the last adjustment valuation of the district. Prior to January fifteenth in each year, the board shall certify to the chairman of the school board of each constituent school district the amount so apportioned. Each district within a supervisory union shall raise at the next annual district meeting the sum of money apportioned to it by the supervisory union board for the expenses of services which each district received in connection with the union office. The provisions of this section shall not apply to supervisory unions comprising only one district. The supervisory union board, in adopting the budget, shall not add any new services to the budget of any constituent member district unless such member district has voted, at a duly called regular or special district meeting during the preceding year, to accept such new service. A vote to accept a new service shall not be construed as a vote to raise and appropriation money within the meaning of section 3, chapter 139 of the Revised Laws as amended.

- 2. Application. As of the date of the passage of this act, each supervisory union in the state shall be deemed to have elected to have its regularly employed office personnel become eligible to participate in the employees retirement system of the state of New Hampshire; such union shall be known as an employer for the purposes of acts relative to the employees retirement system. Any regularly employed office employee who at the date of the passage of this act is a member of the employees retirement system as defined by chapter 201, Laws of 1945 under elections by school districts shall continue such membership as an employee of the supervisory union.
- 3. Takes Effect. This act shall take effect as of July 1, 1951.

THE MINUTES OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT

Gilmanton Town Hall

March 6, 1951

Pursuant to the above warrant a meeting of the School District of Gilmanton was held at the time and place within mentoned. In the absence of the Moderator the meeting was called to order and the warrant was read by the Clerk.

- 1. Voted that Richard L. Small be elected Moderator for the ensuing year by one ballot cast by William Prindle.
- 2. Voted that Hattie P. Kelley be elected Clerk for the ensuing year by one ballot cast by the Moderator.
- 3. Voted that Florence M. Durgin be elected Treasurer for the ensuing year by one ballot cast by the clerk.
- 4. Voted that Dorothy B. Rusk be elected member of the School Board for the ensuing three years by one ballot cast by the clerk.
- 5. Under this article a member of the School Board announced that the annual report of the School District will appear in the town report.
- 6. Voted that Howard Osler and William Evans be elected auditors for the ensuing year by one ballot cast by the Clerk.
- 7. Voted that the salaries of the School Board and other District Officers remain the same as last year. (\$185.00)
- 8. Voted that the School District raise and appropriate \$35,742.18 (as called for in the School Board's budget) and to authorize the School Board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the School Board (State equalization probably \$2,800.00, other income

\$33,0.00, total \$31,300.00, balance probably \$32,612.18) exclusive of state aid, and upon the determination of the amount of state aid to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year, to authorize the School Board to apply against such appropriation the amount to be received from state aid and with the School District Clerk certify to the Selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes.

- 9. After discussion it was voted to lay on the table the question of whether to construct an addition and/or make alterations to the Iron Works School.
- 10. Voted to lay on the table the question of whether the District will raise and appropriate money to construct an addition and/or make alterations to the Iron Works School.
- 11. Voted to lay on the table the question of authorizing the issue of bonds or notes to meet all or any part of an appropriation for the construction of an addition and/or making alterations to the Iron Works School.
- 12. Voted to lay on the table the question of raising and appropriating money for transporting pupils to high school.
- 13. Voted that the School District raise and appropriate \$3,000.00 to drill a well and install flush toilets at the Iron Works School. Voted that the work be done under the condition of sealed competitive bidding.
- 14. The vote that whether the School Board shall apply for and accept in the name of the district any federal and/or state funds which may be made available for plan preparation, building construction, building alterations and/or equipment for the Iron Works School and/or Corner School was: Yes 62 No 2
- 15. Mr. Carlson explained the plan under consideration by Loudon, Canterbury, Chichester and Belmont to build a regional school for pupils above sixth grade in the five towns. It was voted to appoint a committee to confer with

committees from the other towns. A committee was elected: Charles Roberts, Richard Small and Donald Osborn. Voted that the above committee bring back a full and detailed written report to the next annual meeting. Voted that the name of Fred Carlson be added to the committee — making four instead of three.

By vote the meeting was adjourned.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Gilmanton qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Gilmanton Corner School in said district on the fourth day of March 1952, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to

the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see if the district will vote on Articles 9, 10, 11, and 12 of the School Warrant of Tuesday, March 6, 1951, said articles having been laid on the table at said district meeting.
- 10. To see whether the district will authorize the School Board to transfer any balance from item to item in the 1951-52 school budget, providing the school appropriation is not exceeded.
- 11. To see if the district will authorizze the School Board to apply for and accept in the name of the district any federal and/or state funds or gifts which may be made available for plan perparation, building alterations and/or equipment for the Iron Works School and/or the Corner School.
- 12. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board, Parents and Voters:

The school report will be very brief, since I assumed the position of superintendent of schools of Supervisory Union #59 on November 1, 1951.

The increase in tuition rates at the high schools to which Gilmanton sends pupils will continue to increase the school district budget.

The Legislature passed a new State Law in 1951 which divides the Supervisory Union costs on the basis of pupil attendance and adjusted valuation. Formerly it was based on assessed valuation. This means that Gilmanton pays an increased share to the operation of the Union office. A copy of the law follows on a separate page.

It appears that the chief problem of the Iron Works school is the overcrowded conditions which led to placing one pupil group in the Town Hall.

The Iron Works school has started a school lunch program, sponsored by the P. T. A. and operated by Mrs. Walter Jones in her home. This is most commendable.

The Corner school has a Federal Aid program for school lunches. This program is known throughout the State as one of the best school lunch programs. Mrs. Dorothy Rusk is responsible for the suuccessful operation of the lunch and facilities. The tremendous cooperation of parents and citizens with continuous gifts of vegetables and other foods has assisted in making this program financially possible.


