WARRANT FOR ANNUAL MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lyndeborough in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Lyndeborough on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Namely town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration expenses, expenses of town hall and other town buildings, police department, fire department, health department, vital statistics, auto and dog fees, town maintenance of highways and bridges, street lighting, general expense of highway department, town road aid, libraries, town poor, old age assistance, Memorial Day and other celebrations, aid to soldiers and their families, parks and playgrounds, cemeteries, Monadnock Region, interest on temporary loans, on long term notes, on principal of trust funds used by town, payment of notes in anticipation of taxes, serial and long term notes, county taxes, payments to school districts.

3. To see if the town will vote to accept State T. R. A. for the construction of Class V roads, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$335.85 and the state will contribute \$1343.39.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise and ap-

propriate the sum of \$300.00 for the control of white pine blister rust.

5. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

6. To see if the town will vote to close, subject to gate and bars the road leading from Wilder farm, so called, to road leading to Alexander Bill farm.

7. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see if the town will vote to allow the selectmen to distribute inventory blanks at the time of taking inventory April first.

9. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget as prepared by the budget committee, or make any alterations relating thereto.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

To the School Board and Citizens of Lyndeboro:

I respectfully submit my twenty-first annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

The Shortage of Teachers is Serious

Since Pearl Harbor 120,000 teachers or one eighth of all the teachers in the United States have left the profession for causes directly due to the war emergency. The largest source of replacement is the teachers colleges, but the enrollment in these institutions has fallen off 60 percent in the same period. Some vacancies have been filled with teachers of lower than standard qualifications and many schools throughout the country have been closed. There is no indication that this condition will not be worse next year.

The most pertinent facts in the situation are these:

1. The country over, about one fourth of all the teachers (254,000) are getting less than \$1200 salary this year. In New Hampshire nearly one half (45 per cent) are paid less than \$1200. In Maine and Vermont the proportion is slightly above 50 percent, but in the other New England states and in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware and Maryland, fewer than 5 percent are paid less than \$1200.

2. Teachers' salaries in the United States have increased on the average about 10 percent above the level of 1939. Thousands of teachers see their former students scarcely out of high school making better wages than teachers of long experience.

3. The pay of the average factory worker the country over is 80 percent higher than it was in 1939; workers in ship yards have doubled their earnings, and the net income of farmers has more than doubled.

4. Until 1940 teachers were exempt from paving

federal income tax. Now a single teacher with no dependents with a salary of \$1200 pays \$140 income tax. No special salary adjustment has been made in recognition of this fact.

5. In the same period in which teachers' salaries have increased 10 percent the cost of living has increased 26 percent, so that in purchasing power teachers' salaries are lower than they were in 1939. The teacher who received \$1200 in 1939 is actually worse off today with her 10 percent larger salary of \$1320; she pays \$164 of it in income tax, and the remaining \$1156 will buy only slightly more than \$900 would buy in 1939. The factory worker who was getting \$1200 in 1939 and is now getting 80 percent more, or \$2160, pays \$332 income tax, and the remaining \$1828 will buy slightly more than \$1450 would buy in 1939.

It is circumstances like these that are to blame for the teacher shortage. It is not to be wondered at that teachers feel themselves forced out of the school when they can not cover the increase in taxes and the cost of living on the salaries they are paid, but can go into industry and command an average salary of at least \$600 more. In fact most teachers are far better trained than the average wage earner and can command not the average but the top wages in industry. Teachers like everyone else must have the necessities of subsistence and must meet the usual obligations that require thrift and economic independence, to provide for the uncertainties of life. But the teacher has other obligations; he is charged with passing on the ideals and standards of good living and the culture of our democracy. To do this requires cultural and professional preparation.

It is evident that the salary question is the main issue and we must think of this not merely in terms of the requests of teachers for higher salaries, but from the standpoint of the type of service the public schools must have. We must protect the educational opportunities of the children. With juvenile delinquency on the increase, competent teachers are more necessary than in ordinary times. It is not possible to name a figure that would represent the actual worth of a good teacher but each community may well ponder whether it can afford to employ a teacher who is not worth much more than is now the prevailing salary.

Budget

The budget items this year do not differ materially from last year's figures except in the following instances: Transportation of pupils was estimated last year as \$1400 and is costing \$1200 which is the basis for the new estimate. The number of pupils attending high school will be increased because there is only one to graduate from high school while there will be six Lyndeboro pupils ready to enter high school next fall. Insurance comes due every three years and is payable during the period covered by this budget. The total budget is \$471.50 more than last year. On the income side last year's budget showed an estimated cash balance of \$800; this year we can show only \$250. The state aid figure is not known at this date; consequently the \$1200 estimate, which is based on the amount of state aid received this year, will be subject to correction at the district meeting.

Some consideration is being given to an alternative plan which might reduce the cost several hundred dollars. It does not now appear that there will be any school children in the "West District" next fall; there will probably be six school children in the "Center District." If 8-grade schools were maintained at the Center School and South School there would be six pupils at the former and 25 at the latter, and no transportation required.

For two years we have had the four upper grades at the Center and the four lower grades at the South and the budget estimates are based on a continuation of that plan, requiring the transportation of four lower grade children from Center to South, and 11 upper grade children from South to Center. Now it would be feasible to discontinue the Center School and provide for a 6-grade school at the South to accommodate 26 pupils, and send the five 7th and 8th grade pupils to Wilton. The saving in the salary of one teacher should more than cover the cost of tuition and transportation for the 7th and 8th grade pupils at Wilton, besides providing for them the advantages of a larger school with departmental teaching including Domestic Arts and Shop. Twenty-six pupils in six grades would be a perfectly feasible plan for the South School.

The present estimate of pupils at the Perham Corner School next year is 14, which would warrant the continuation of that school for all eight grades.
