REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1892.

There have been during the past year four terms of school in the Summer and two in the Fall, or three, regarding the last three weeks of the school at Nelson Center as a separate term.

The school at the Center, Summer term, commenced May 4, 1891, and closed July 3 following, having been in session eight weeks. Miss Helen M. Humphrey of Athol, Mass., was teacher. The school was fairly successful. But for sickness, causing a suspension of the school a week, near the middle of the term, and irregular attendance, it would have been a model school. There were 29 different scholars; average daily attendance, 13; number attending to reading and spelling 29, penmanship 26, arithmetic 20, geography 21, grammar 4, history 4, physiology, 2, book-keeping 6, algebra 3.

The Fall term of the school at Nelson Center was taught for nine weeks by Miss Emma L. Taylor of Worcester, Mass., and the remaining three weeks by Mrs. Helen B. Berry of Lynnfield, Mass. The whole number of different scholars was 32; average daily attendance, 20; number attending to reading and spelling 26, penmanship, 26, arithmetic 26, geography 22, grammar 22, history 22, composition 24, physiology 10, algebra 1. Many of the scholars made fair progress during the nine weeks earliest in the term. The remaining three weeks were spent mainly in review, singing, gymnastics and calisthenic exercises. The general attendance was not as regular as it should have been to secure the best results.

The Summer term of school at Munsonville commenced May 5 and closed June 4 following. Teacher, Miss Mattie A.

Wilder of Surry. Whole number of scholars, 15; average daily attendance, 13; number attending to reading and spelling 14, penmanship 6, arithmetic 8, geography 6, grammar 6, history 4.

The Fall term, taught by Miss Fannie I. Bennett of Whately, Mass., was attended by the scholars of the Northwest or Taylor district, in addition to the scholars residing in Munsonville. The term commenced Sept. 8, and closed Nov. 13. Whole number of scholars, 21; average daily attendance, 20; number attending to reading and spelling 21, penmanship 16, arithmetic 14, geography 14, grammar 7, history 6.

The Summer school was closed on account of sickness in the teacher's family, which was of such duration that it was thought best not to open it again on account of the lateness of the season. The Fall term of ten weeks was highly satisfactory and commendable progress was made in the several branches of study.

School No. 3. Summer term commenced May 4, continuing eight weeks, and was taught by Miss Ada D. Hall of Ashburnham, Mass. Whole number of scholars, 7; average daily attendance, 6.83; number attending to reading and spelling 7, penmanship 7, arithmetic 7, geography 4, grammar 2, history 2, physiology 1. This term was highly satisfactory as to regular attendance, and good progress generally was made in the various branches of study.

School No. 4. Summer term was taught by Miss Mabel F. Rowe of Dublin. It commenced May 4 and closed June 19. Whole number of scholars, 4; average daily attendance, 3.87; number attending to reading and writing 4, penmanship 4, arithmetic 4, geography 4, grammar 3, history 3, composition 4, vocal music 4, physiology 3, book-keeping 1, algebra 2. It was a matter of regret to the School Board that this school was so small as hardly to justify a second term, there being only two scholars of legal school age. In attention to study and order, progress made and regular attendance, it was the banner school of the year.

REMARKS.

The School Board hoped and expected that the new school house at Munsonville would be completed in season to accommodate the Fall term for the consolidated schools No. 2 and 3. Being disappointed in this, the teacher for those schools was hired for ten weeks, under the impression that the consolidation could not take place in 1891. This would have made another teacher necessary. Not being able to secure the teacher subsequently any longer, the term was some three weeks shorter than desired.

The School Board feels under a moral obligation to remark that there is altogether too much indifference on the part of parents as to regular and punctual attendance of their children when the schools are in session. A neglect of these things, if all other conditions are favorable, will render the schooling the children receive much less valuable, besides laying a foundation for habits of carelessness and inattention in after life which will be an obstacle to success in whatever they undertake.

It seems incredible that parents should be indifferent to the advantages resulting from a fairly good English education which our schools place within the reach of every scholar of average mental capacity. But what other reason can we assign for the conduct of those parents who for slight reasons, or no apparent reason, keep their children out of school, or let them stay out, one, two or more days in a week ?

The schools are now well supplied with text books on all subjects with the exception of physiology. All others have been newly introduced within the last three years.

The average wages of teachers, exclusive of board, was \$15.20 a month of four weeks.

The number of different scholars who attended school in town the past year was 63, divided among the schools as follows: No. 1, 36; No. 2, 16; (one from Stoddard) No. 3, 7; No. 4, 4.

So far as ascertained only two children of school age in town failed to attend school, and those under circumstances involving no violation of the school laws.
