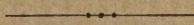

Highways.

The first meeting of the highway agents after their election in March was held April 11, which resulted in their organizing as a board with William L. Furber as chairman and Jackson M. Hoyt for secretary. The different highways throughout the entire town had been inspected previous to this date and their condition noted. It was agreed that Agent William C. Pickering should control the Greenland road as far as the town hall, also the Ham and Gosling roads. Furber to care for the Bay roads and Hoyt the remainder.

It was the unanimous opinion of the board that the greater part of the highway appropriation ought to be expended on the roads assigned to Pickering and Hoyt, and it was voted thus to do. Gosling road received a goodly share of Mr. Furber's labor; he also expended a portion of his share of the appropriation on the road near the residence of Benjamin S. Hoyt.

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School Report.

To the Citizens of the Town of Newington :

In compliance with the Public Statutes, we herewith submit the annual report of the Newington School Board for the year ending July 15, 1904, accompanied with the table of general statistics.

The fall term began with Mrs. Hattie M. Greenough in charge of the grammar grades and Miss Fannie C. Chapman of Greenland in charge of primary grades.

At the close of the term Miss Chapman resigned to accept a position in the Portsmouth schools.

The school board were fortunate at this time in again securing the services of Miss Abbie N. Frink, who continues to give most excellent satisfaction to both pupils and parents in the management of the primary room.

At the end of the winter term Mrs. Greenough tendered her resignation. Mrs. Greenough has made a remarkable and favorable record as a teacher, having taught the school for a number of years and given very general satisfaction, a most difficult thing for a resident teacher to do.

For the spring term the services of Miss Eunice E. Ransom of East Mattapoisett, Mass., were secured for the grammar grade, and her administration has been very satisfactory in keeping up the high standard of this room. We are pleased to announce that the financial condition of the district is such as to enable us to retain the services of both drawing and music teachers this year, Miss M. S. Bosworth of Portsmouth, teacher of drawing, and Miss Lucy M. Hoyt of Greenland, teacher of music. Both we think have made good progress.

Doubtless it will please our citizens to learn that the number of school children is increasing. The primary room has

been taxed to its utmost, necessitating the placing of additional seats and desks. However, quite a number of pupils from this room will be promoted to the grammar grade next year and we hope this will relieve the congested condition. Masters George and Roy Neil presented the school with a fine picture, "The Fathers of Confederation," for which we express our appreciation and thanks.
