Report of Trustees of Trust Funds

RYE, NEW HAMPSHIRE, February 1, 1933.

To the Citizens of the Town of Rye:

The Trustees of Trust Funds now hold all of the assets of the Dalton Fund consisting of a list of divers bonds, stocks, bank deposits and real estate. The face value of this Fund is \$58,666.54. The market value under present conditions is difficult to estimate. The income for the past year has been \$2,454.43.

Aside from the miscellaneous bonds, stocks and real estate constituting a part of the Dalton Fund, the Trust Funds are invested as follows: \$17,500 in United States Bonds, \$13,800 in Town of Rye notes; \$4,865.38 in Rockingham County banks; \$314.92 income has been paid the Cemetery Trustees for the care of lots; \$325.11 to the Library Board; \$38.39 has been used on account of amortization of premiums paid for certain bond investments and \$968.64 has been expended from the income of the Dalton Fund primarily for the reconstruction of the first section of the main highway entering the Cemetery.

This Board would call to the attention of all owners of lots in Central Cemetery, who have not already established trust funds for the care of such lots, the desirability of creating such funds for the maintenance of their lots when able to do so and not allow such provision to be indefinitely delayed. The Board would furthermore suggest to the citizens that the time has now arrived when so far as possible no cemetery lot should be sold without provision for its future care and this condition might well be incorporated in the Cemetery regulations.

With the growing importance of the Public Library in all

communities increased endowment for the Rye Library is worthy of consideration.

Acknowledgment is made of two new Trusts, that of Oliver Perry Garland for the Rye Public Library in the amount of \$500 and Frances Garland Eisener \$100, for the decoration of her lot in Central Cemetery.

To the Citizens of Rye:

With sincere appreciation of its lasting value to the town, your Trustees report a bequest of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) from the late Mrs. Frances Garland Eisener for the establishment of the Oliver Perry Garland Fund, the income to be used for the purchase of books.

For the better display of reference books a new wall bookcase has been added to the Library equipment. Drop lights have been installed between the bookstacks, thus assuring good lighting for all the shelves. An attractive wood basket for the fireplace has been purchased, and fire irons loaned.

We acknowledge with thanks the gift of ten dollars (\$10.00) from the Every-Other-Tuesday Club, providing for the purchase of three books (non-fiction) and for a special book plate to be used in books presented by this club.

With the interest from the various trust funds it has been possible to purchase outstanding books of widely different kinds. We have now reached the time when some of the reference books placed in the library at its founding must be supplemented by more recent editions, and the scope of our reference literature should be enlarged. Our budget for the coming year therefore includes expenditures from the town appropriation to meet this fundamental need, and we are asking one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for Library support.

The total circulation for the year of 1931 was 15,000 and this past year 14,795, a decrease of 205 books. As the pupils of the Junior High School grades secure outside readings from Portsmouth Libraries, the local Library has suffered a decrease in circulation. The general output of service has held to the average of last year showing the decrease due to the change in school needs.

The Library was visited in August by Miss Dorothy Annable Secretary of Library Commission. Miss Annable makes annual tours to the libraries throughout the state, outlining ideas for the advancement of Library work.

National Book Week observed for the encouragement and betterment of children's reading takes place annually about the second week of November. Owing to a conflict with the visit of the Myopia Hunt Club, the party for children of elementary grades was held the first Saturday of December. Fifty-five children were entertained by readings, games, and books purchased for the occasion. The Library staff was assisted in entertaining by Mr. Hannum and Mr. Fox and financially by the Crescent Club. Library books are often easily misplaced and forgotten in bookshelves with one's own. A request is made to the patrons of the Library, to search among their books and return those belonging to the library.

Report of the School Board and Building Committee

The work of the School Board and the Building Committee has been so closely united the past year that the report of the two is made as one. The report of the Superintendent of Schools will cover the report of the School Board and this report will deal with the committee as a whole. In compliance with a vote taken at the school meeting the building committee went carefully into the needs of the school department and after visiting many school buildings had several architects submit plans for a seventh and eighth grade school building. These plans were presented to the citizens of the town at a special meeting held in July. At this meeting the fact was brought out that the tax payers present favored a consolidated school building. With this in mind the committee again went to work, but as business conditions fail to improve and the outlook for the next year or two are not bright, we have also considered several other means to carry on the school work until conditions improve, at which time a building could be provided that will take care of the first eight grades and could be paid for by the tax payers much easier than at the present time. We have three school buildings at the present time in fair condition that can be used as in the past, but some provision must be made for the seventh and eighth grade children. There are three plans which your committee submit for your consideration. First to go ahead and build a consolidated school building for which we have plans at an estimated cost of \$52,000 complete. This building would care for the first eight grades. Plan two, to build a building for the seventh and eighth grades on the lot where the Wedgewood School building stood. This

building not to exceed \$12,000 complete. Plan three, sending all children now attending school in Portsmouth to Exeter. Although tuition at Exeter would be much less than at Portsmouth the transportation would cost \$36.00 per day. These are the plans we submit. The fact remains that some means must be provided the coming year for the seventh and eighth grade children, as the decision of the school board of Portsmouth is that they cannot take care of them unless Rye starts a school building this year, in which case they will take them for one more year, or until such time as our building is ready. If the citizens of the school district should vote to build the consolidated school the committee would suggest that the district be bonded, this loan to run over a period of twenty years and should be substantially retired the first five years. This plan would mean an increase over the present tax rate of \$6.00 per thousand for the first year, based on the present tax rate, dropping each year until at the end of five years the rate would be \$22.25. The situation that we are facing is one that should be considered very carefully by the tax payers as they are the ones, especially those that are paying a large tax at the present time and receiving very little income from their property, that would feel an increase much more than the small tax payer or those paying only a poll tax.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board of Rye:

I herewith submit to you my third annual report as superintendent of your schools.

Although handicapped by the burning of the Wedgewood School, causing a loss of time and efficiency for a while, the work of the past year was completed in a satisfactory manner. Mrs. Crockett's pupils were moved to the Community House. The Junior High School, with our own staff of teachers, carried on its work in the Portsmouth Junior High School building. Since our domestic arts equipment and our manual training supplies were destroyed numerous adjustments of courses were necessitated. At the close of the year the percentage of promotions was at the average of recent years. That our pupils were well prepared for their next year's work is proved by the fact that our proportion of failing ranks, during the fall term of the current year, is nearly one percent below that of the national average. The people of Rye may well be pleased with the progress of their children in Portsmouth.

During the summer Mrs. Crockett resigned and her place was taken by Miss Alberta Piper, a teacher of successful experience who came to us well recommended. She has charge of grades three and four with a total registration of 35. Mrs. Mary Campbell Hopkins at the West school teaches grades one and two. Miss Edwards, with grades five and six, is carrying a very heavy pupil load with an enrollment of 43. Indications point toward a somewhat smaller enrollment in these grades next year, otherwise it would seem that something must be done to relieve the overcrowding here.

As is true of all modern school systems, our schools were regularly examined by means of approved standardized

tests. Weaknesses disclosed by these tests are corrected immediately.

The important question to be settled by the people of Rye this year is that of school housing. Should Rye consolidate its schools into one modern building and thus follow the trend which will in all probability be universal at some time in the future or should Rye delay this step for a time by either a temporary building or by a permanent building for the seventh and eighth grades? (As an aid to deciding this problem I am inserting an estimate of yearly operating costs under conditions expected for the next few years in Rye. The figures are taken from rather accurate sources and show the comparative costs of operating a consolidated school in Rye and of operating four different schools for these same pupils.)

The indicated savings of \$1,560.00 a year in operating expense of a consolidated system is, I believe, a conservative estimate. It will be noticed that the increase, under either system, is due to increased tuition costs and transportation. The modernizing of the toilet systems must be done before long if we are to continue in our present buildings. The expense of this would be approximately \$5,000.00.

I believe the year's results at the ungraded school proved a decided advantage to the pupils attending. One of these pupils received a double promotion at the end of the year as a result of individual attention given her by the teacher. Two have entered the Portsmouth system. The other pupils, remaining in Rye, have been placed in their proper grades. All have had the feeling of satisfaction and accomplishment obtained from working upon something which they are capable of doing well. Repeated failures bring discouragement and a discouraged person is a liability to his community.

I wish to recommend the introduction into the first grade of Rye of an improved method of reading. It is in the first grade that reading habits are established. Word calling is not reading. By this method children meet unified ideas before they come into contact with separate words. They are thus taught to read thoughts instead of calling each word singly. I am sure we would realize a great improvement in the reading of our pupils because of this change.

May I again express my appreciation to the school board for its helpful guidance in my work and to the townspeople, parents and pupils for their co-operation with the schools and its officials.
