

### **TOWN WARRANT**

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Westmoreland in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March next, at Ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money in addition to what is required by law the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Highways and bridges.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to apply for state aid for state road construction and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 5. To see what disposition the town will vote to make of the income of the Jothan Lord fund.

- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the support of the library.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to buy fire-fighting apparatus and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road from the Glebe road, so called, near the house of Edward C. Greene leading to Hyland Hill, past the Chase place to the line of the Hyland farm, subject to gates and bars, or petition the Superior Court for such discontinuance.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell or let revert back to heirs of its donor, the present hearse house, so that it may be equipped as it was in former years when it was a town armory.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway from its intersection with the state aid road at John Burt's Chickering place, so called, to its intersection with the road leading to Chesterfield, from Westmoreland village at the concrete bridge.
- 11. To see whether beer or other lawful beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under this act from Chapter 99, Section 22, of the Public Laws of New Hampshire.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to purchase snow fencing and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### SCHOOL WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the school district in the town of Westmoreland, qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 20th day of March, 1934, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose one member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Westmoreland:

I herewith submit my first report as Superintendent of Schools.

In assuming the duties of superintendent in the Westmoreland district, I appreciate the efficient work which has been done by Mr. Thompson.

#### ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

Several changes in the teaching positions have been made. Miss Dorothy Gary has succeeded Miss Marion Carey as teacher in the upper grades of the Village school. Miss Hester Gordon is teaching the grades formerly taught my Mrs. Ruth Comstock. Miss Bruna Farinoli was elected to fill the position at the Corner school left vacant by the resignation of Miss Mildred Neal. Miss Gary is a graduate of Keene Normal School with ten years of successful experience. Miss Gordon is a graduate of the elementary department of Keene Normal School. Miss Farinoli is a graduate of Keene Normal School and the University of New Hampshire. She has had five years experience as a teacher in elementary schools.

The work in the Westmoreland schools is in accordance with the standards for the State. Standard tests are being given as a part of the program of supervision. The results of the tests will be tabulated for purposes of comparison. Remedial measures will be provided where deficiencies in fundamentals are apparent.

In the primary grades the importance of reading cannot be overestimated. In the new elementary program of studies developed by a committee of New Hampshire teachers and superintendents, it is recommended that formal instruction in reading extend beyond Grade III. Training in silent reading as well as oral reading is emphasized. Through training in silent reading, the pupils of the upper grades should be able to study independently and assimilate text material prepared for pupils of their age and grade. Certain processes in arithmetic that seem very difficult for young children are mastered with comparative ease by pupils who are a little older and whose minds have developed to a point where they can understand such problems.

Milk is being supplied each day to twenty-four pupils in the Westmoreland schools. Cod liver oil is provided and given by recommendation of the school nurse.

Pupils' lunches are supplemented during the winter months with a hot dish which is prepared in the school room. Application has been made for Federal aid in this service.

The number of cases of tardiness for the year is excessive. It is a responsibility of the school to impress pupils with the importance of forming habits of promptness. I solicit the cooperation of parents in our effort to improve the record this year.

The progress of some pupils in their school work this year has been seriously affected by unnecessary absence.

### BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

The Westmoreland school buildings are in good condition and unusually well equipped. New curtains have been provided at the Village, East Westmoreland, and Corner schools. The two windows on the east side of the Corner school have been covered to eliminate cross lighting. About seventy-two feet of bulletin board space has been added.

Application has been made to the Civil Works Administration for an appropriation to grade the school yard and to paint the building at East Westmoreland. The grading of the school yard at the Depot school is worthy of consideration as a possible project if the work of the Civil Works Administration extends into the late Spring or Summer.

Some of the schools would profit by the addition of wall maps and reference material.

Playground apparatus would be helpful in organizing outside activity.

Westmoreland pupils should be appreciative of the interest of the Parent-Teacher Organizations which have supplied for them many facilities and improvements.

The pupils at the Corner school will this year enjoy the use of an outdoor basketball outfit which was given to them at Christmas by a friend.

Dear Sir:-

I herewith submit my annual report as school nurse:

- 130 pupils were examined.
  - 30 pupils were underweight.
  - 55 pupils were in need of dental care.
  - 27 pupils were unvaccinated.
  - 8 pupils showed defective vision uncorrected.
  - 3 pupils showed defective hearing.
  - 29 pupils had enlarged or diseased tonsils.
  - 14 pupils had enlarged glands.

Dental clinics were held May 10th, 1933 at Mr. Forest Hall's residence; May 18th, 1933 at the Town Hall, with work done as follows:

Number of cases treated,	50
Number receiving complete care,	41
Number having teeth cleaned,	26
Number of extractions,	69
Number of silver fillings,	7.7
Number of porcelain fillings,	9

The total bill for this work was one hundred and fourteen dollars (\$114.00). The depot school had 100% work done, the bill for their work was paid by the Parent Teacher Association.

11 pupils had their teeth cared for by their own dentist.

Tonsil clinics were held at the Mousley Hospital, Walpole and the Keene Community Hospital, Keene. Four cases were treated.

One pupil had special eye examination and defect corrected.

Four tonsil cases were treated privately.

An underweight clinic was held April 25th, 1933. Thirtyeight pupils were given chest examination by Dr. Robert Kerr of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association.

I wish to express the appreciation of the district to the local Red Cross chapter, the Grange and the Parent Teacher Association's of the Depot and South Village.

I wish to express my appreciation to the teachers and parents for their help and cooperation.
