ALTON TOWN WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Alton, in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles:

ARTICLE 1. a. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year and to elect one Selectman for three years, one Town Clerk for three years, one Tax Collector for three years, one Treasurer for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Highway Agent for one year, one Auditor for two years, three Budget Committee members for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, one Fire Ward for three years, one Water Commissioner for three years, two Planning Board members for three years, one Supervisor of the Checklist for six years, one Moderator for two years and one Constable for one year.

b. To vote on proposed change to the Zoning Ordinance.

And you are hereby further notified to meet at said Alton Memorial School Gymnasium on Wednesday, the tenth day of March, next at seven thirty o'clock in the evening to act upon the following articles:

ARTICLE 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay all necessary charges of the Town for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$29,062.38 of Highway Subsidy Funds to be expended on Town roads in accordance with RSA 241, Section 14-\$13,861.08 and RSA 241, Section 15-\$15,201.30.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,674.35 provided the State will contribute the sum of \$11,162.36 for Class V roads so called.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow monies in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Public Library.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for:

1. Decoration of Soldiers' Graves
2. Patriotic exercises on Independence Day\$1,000.00
3. Old Home Celebration\$3,000.00
ARTICLE 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise

and appropriate for Parks and Playgrounds, including band concerts. ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and, further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro-rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be placed in Highway Equipment Reserve Fund for the purchase of Highway Equipment and Authorize the withdrawal of this amount from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Revenue Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be placed in Fire Truck Reserve for the purchase of a new fire truck and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Revenue Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for a Capital Reserve Fund for the revaluation of the Town and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Revenue Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to allow the transfer of the balance of a savings account for the Revaluation of the Town as provided for in Article 37 at the 1975 Town Meeting to the Capital Reserve Fund for the Revaluation of the Town.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,00 for Civil Defense.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$34,325.00 for the maintenance and operation of the land-fill.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70,000.00 for the purchase of a loader-compactor machine for the landfill operation and the sum to be raised by the issue of long term notes or bonds.

ARTICLE 19. That the Town of Alton designate and accept Lily Pond Road, situate in Alton, New Hampshire, as a Class V highway for its entire length between the Old Wolfeboro Road and Route 28, and further that the Town of Alton allocate and set aside sufficient funds as may be necessary to repair and to maintain Lily Pond Road as a Class V highway. (8y petition)

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to accept and maintain the roadway joining the property of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Jensen to the Stockbridge Corner Road, which is commonly known as "Fletcher Road", as a town road, or, in the alternative, to see if the town will simply vote to maintain and plow said Fletcher Road under a right of prescription since the town has so maintained and plowed said road for a period in excess of 20 years prior to January 1, 1982. (By petition).

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town of Alton will raise the money to build a sidewalk from Old Riverside Cemetery to McGrath's driveway. (By petition) Not recommended by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town of Alton will supply a light on Mauhaut Drive at the four corners of Mauhaut Drive, Lamprey Ledge Road, Indian Shore Road and Clough Point Road. (By petition) Not recommended by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town of Alton will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the Center of Hope, Inc. (By petition) Not recommended by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will execute a Quitclaim Deed to Christian Camps and Conferences, Inc. for a nonexclusive easement to use the property formerly of Christian Camps and Conferences, Inc. condemned by the Town of Alton on 14 September 1979. The easement is to provide access to and egress from other land of Christian Camps and Conferences, Inc. to Route 28A. The Town will reserve the right to subject the property to gates and bars which shall not limit the use by Christian Camps and Conferences, Inc.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State,

Federal or another Governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to grant one or more franchises to operate a cable television system in this Town, said authorization to encompass the setting of such conditions as the Board shall deem necessary and appropriate. Said conditions may include the setting of subscription or service rates to citizens and franchising feed to the Town or the extent that they are not inconsistent with N.H. RSA Chapter 53-C and the Rules and Regulations of the Federal Communications Commission.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the semi-annual collection of property taxes as provided for in RSA 76:15-a and to become effective in 1983.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Board of Selectmen to set the Building Permit Fees as described in Article 1 Section 6 of the Building Regulations as amended March 14, 1978 or any other vote pertaining thereof.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, exchange or otherwise convey a portion of the lot of land located easterly of Main Street and shown on the Town Tax Map No. 29 as Lot No. 72 to Richard C. Foss for consideration to be deemed appropriate by the Selectmen, including but not limited to, a cash payment to be received at closing and/or an exchange of property of equivalent value as determined by the Selectmen, all for the purpose of facilitating the elderly housing project ("THE PROJECT") proposed by Mr. Foss and to be located on a portion of said lot 72, provided, however, that the conveyance of said lot 72 as described above, shall be subject to the approval of "THE PROJECT" by the following agencies:

1. New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission;

- 2. Alton Conservation Commission;
- 3. Alton Planning Board;
- 4. Alton Board of Selectmen, and
- 5. New Hampshire Housing Finance Authority.

ARTICLE 30. Be it resolved by the Town of Alton that the New Hampshire Housing Finance Authority be and is authorized to operate in the Town of Alton, in the State of New Hampshire that said New Hampshire Housing Finance Authority is authorized to sponsor a project for low income elderly persons under Section 8 of the U.S. Housing Act of 1937 as amended, for the following accommodations: (a) newly constructed housing, 24 dwelling units.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell to the abutters or retain any remaining portions of Lot 72, Tax Map 29 being part of the former Boston & Maine Railroad property.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to approve monies in the amount of \$6,000.00 already expended and to be expended from the Municipal Improvement Fund. Said monies is to employ Town unemployed on Town projects during the period of January 1, 1982 to December 31, 1982.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for the purchase of the land adjacent to the fire station and Water Department Pumping Station on Route 140 known as the Moody land and identified on the tax map as Map 28, Lot 53. Not recommended by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 for the updating and improvements to the Mt. Major Community Center. Not recommended by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,292.00 to pay a claim of Mr. Thomas Axon for the use of this equipment to close the old dump in 1979 and 1980.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fire Truck Fund an amount not to exceed \$25,000.00 for the purchase of a preowned aerial ladder truck, if such a vehicle becomes available and the purchase of said vehicle is approved by a majority of the Fire Wards and the Board of Selectmen. Not recommended by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 37. To hear reports of Agents, auditors, committees of officers hereinbefore mentioned chosen and to pass any vote relative thereto.

ARTICLE 38. To transact any other business that may legally come before this said meeting.

OFFICE OF SELECTMEN

During the last year the Selectmen introduced a policy of delegating more authority to Department Heads, and to the various Boards and Committees. This concept promoted non-interference on the part of the Selectmen, but full cooperation and assistance if needed. We believe the program is working well and has enabled the Department Heads, Boards and Committees to develop a more efficient and smoother-running organization.

It is necessary for the Town to operate on borrowed money for a large part of the year. Last year, instead of borrowing as the need arose, a large loan was negotiated in April, and the proceeds invested so as to provide funds as the Town needed them. This resulted in an overall reduction in interest charges to the Town, and we believe a further reduction may be possible.

In the past year an effort got under way to clean up and establish proper documentation on several roads accepted by the town but not finalized.

The Board adopted a Workshop Program to allow closer contact with all Boards and Committees and to fit into a more orderly arrangement of working on all town affairs in addition to the regular scheduled weekly meeting of the Board.

In cooperation with the Conservation Commission and the Planning Board, all Town owned property has been evaluated and parcels it is felt the town should retain has been established. The remainder will be disposed of at auction as voted, but we have postponed that to the summer of 1982, as the lateness of the final evaluation lead the Board to feel the town would do better financially at that time.

This Board of Selectmen wishes to extend its sincere thanks to all

other elected officials, the town employees, and all the volunteer members of the various Boards and Committees. The cooperation and dedication of these people is vital to the successful operation of the town government.

REPORT OF THE SALARY & WAGE REVIEW BOARD - 1981

This committee, appointed by the Selectmen under RSA 41:8 and to implement Warrant Article 42 at the 1981 Town meeting, is in its first year of operation. Officers were elected, by-laws written and a-dopted under RSA 31:66-76 and the specific directive issued by the Selectmen for this year, 1982, has been carried out.

Since that directive was given to the Board immediately after Town Meeting, the board has met nearly continuously at least once a month to accomplish its task. Job descriptions of all permanent full-time appointed town employees have been written and approved. Each job has been evaluated on the basis of education, degree of responsibility, skill, personal characteristics, and working conditions, and a relative value placed on each job. From information given to the Board by nearby towns and from surveys made by the N.H. Municipal Association, the Board established a general wage chart and a wage scale for each job.

This fall, an Individual Employee Performance Form was devised and each Department Head gave the Selectmen evaluations of all town employees. Using these performance evaluations, the Selectmen's directives and the Board's accumulated information and method of approach, the Board recommended increases for all employees.

The funds requested in the 1982 budget will provide for carpenter, plumber, and electrician services necessary to make the building usable 12 months of the year.

VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION – ANNUAL REPORT – 1981

The Visiting Nurse Association of Wolfeboro and Vicinity, Inc. now provides Home Health Care to residents of eight towns. Services to Ossipee residents began shortly after voters' approval was obtained at the March Town Meeting. Total service provided continue to increase, even after allowing for the increase in our service area. A total of 6,792 home visits were made by the Agency Staff, while 338 Home Health Aide visits were made under the contractual agreement with Carroll County Health and Home Care Services, Inc. and Lakes Region Community Health Agency, Inc.

The Well Child Clinic Program offers comprehensive preventative health care services to children from birth through age five. Three clinic sites are now utilized: Ossipee, Wakefield and Wolfeboro. The addition of the clinic site in Wolfeboro makes the clinic services more accessible to Wolfeboro and Alton residents. Through cooperative efforts with local school district personnel, school age children are immunized according to State requirements. Children within this agency service area have one of the highest rates of completed immunizations within the State.

Funding cuts for Health Care, both at the State and Federal level do affect this agency. Every attempt is made to lower costs of providing service. Our per visit cost of \$12.50 compares favorably with the costs of \$25.00 or more charged by agencies in neighboring areas. Patients whose care is not reimbursed by insurance are asked to contribut toward the cost of the care they receive.

Again this year, the success of our program has been dependent upon many people: the active commitment of the Board of Directors; the assistance of physicians and school nurses; the many volunteers who assist with the Well Child Clinic services; the cooperative efforts of other agency personnel; the support of contributions to our annual fund drive and to the residents of our service area who give their support to our appropriation requests. The Board of Directors, the Agency Staff and I thank you all.

ALTON POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Alton Police Department greatly appreciates the support of the community, without which we could not exist.

Many crimes have been solved when detected through citizen participation, a must if a community is to reduce the crime rate. Burglaries and Larcenies are problems which can be reduced if citizens would call when they observe a crime being committed, or anything suspicious. I like to feel that Alton is a community who gets involved. I urge all of you to get involved. Your eyes and ears throughout the community can aid tremendously.

Reducing crime also reduces your insurance cost, for when the crime rate goes up so do your rates.

Due to the large area which must be patrolled and the limited resources, it is difficult to properly patrol all the areas, without increasing the cost to the taxpayer. More and more people are living outside of the compact area of town who require and expect police coverage.

With the return of Officer James Wheeler the department's backup capabilities were increased.

Two new men were added to the department replacing Officer Donald Marren who accepted a position with the Gilford Police Department, and Lt. Alan Stewart who resigned.

Officer Kent Chapman began his duties on January 1 coming to us from the Sanbornton Police Department. Kent is a certified officer and will be residing in Alton after moving from his home in Tilton.

Officer Richard Marini began his duties on January 3 and comes to us from the Norfolk County Sheriff's Department in Massachusetts where he was employed with the Corrections Department. Dick has thirteen years of law enforcement experience in all phases of police work.

Officers continued their training by attending courses in Radar Certification, Breathalyzer Specialist and Management and Crime Scene Investigation.

Another Fire Radio was added, aiding in communications with the Fire Department from both cruisers.

We would like to thank all the departments who assisted us throughout the year, especially during Old Home Week. Their assistance was greatly appreciated.

The Alton Fire Department has had another busy and successful year, answering the following calls:

For a total of 95 calls within the town and 117 total incidents responded to.

The new Fire Boat was delivered in June and put into service by the end of the month. We feel it will service us well. There were few calls on the islands this summer and we attribute this to the interest and concern of the residents there who participated in a training program and have implemented a fire brigade.

The Ladder truck has undergone extensive repairs and is now back in service, thanks to the fine work and dedication of Lt. Walter Thumm. (Thanks Wally for a good job.)

We also want to take this time to thank all the firefighters and officers for their continuing help and enthusiastic support of the department. An average of 45 hours training time and from 40 to 80 hours service time was recorded this past year.

The Old Home Week was touched off on August 7 and proved to be a big success. This effort involved many months of planning by members of the fire department and by organizations in the town. It is my hope that this will be carried on as an annual event for the town.

Our equipment seems to be in fairly good repair. We now have four trucks that have been in service for over 20 years.

Requests for woodstove inspections are increasing. Lt. Jack Woodland is our inspector and we welcome calls if we can assist you.

In closing we would like to thank the residents of Alton for their fine support this past year. Some residents have expressed reluctance to report a chimney fire and we would like to assure you that no problem is too small. We are ready and willing to serve.

STATE REPRESENTATIVE'S REPORT JANE F. SANDERS, STATE REPRESENTATIVE Belknap County, District No. 4 Alton, Barnstead, Gilmanton

This year has brought a mixed bag of positive and negative in carrying out my duties as your State Representative. Although our regular legislative session ended on schedule, many major problems were left unresolved. A special session this winter offers little further resolution.

The basic difficulty is general economic dislocation at all levels of government. At the same time that the traditional forms of revenue in New Hampshire are contracting because of inflation, the federal government has cut its revenue returned to the state while telling the state to pick up certain financial responsibilities which had been exclusively in the federal domain. We have simply not found the solution to doing more with less at any level, be it state, county, or local.

Fortunately, other areas of legislative activity have been more rewarding. Legislation which I sponsored has now become the state's first comprehensive program to combat the weed nuisance in our lakes. Although quite modest in size, the program is planned to be self-supporting and will aid our recreation industry. In another area, I successfully sponsored legislation giving local communities input in the siting of hazardous waste facilities.

Last year at this time, I noted that reapportionment would consume much legislative effort. Although this district was relatively uncontroversial, tempers and blood pressures in many other areas of the state have still not returned to normal! As of this writing, it appears that the district will be split, with Barnstead having its own member in the House, and Alton and Gilmanton sharing two members.

Altogether, this year has been a challenge as your Representative. I appreciate your comments and look forward to more of them either by mail: P.O. Box 97, Alton Bay, N.H. 03810, or by telephone: 875-5140.

ALTON CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT

The most promising reflection of the year's activities of the Conservation Commission is that, for the first time in several years, there is something to report. Shortly after the 1981 Town Meeting, the Board of Selectmen brought the Conservation Commission back up to full strength. During the spring and summer, regular meetings were held monthly and since September we have met at least twice each month.

Our first project was the review of town-owned land as mandated by last year's Town Meeting. After on-site inspections and discussion, we recommended several parcels for sale, and several parcels for review by the Planning Board and Selectmen before further disposition. We also recommended one five-acre parcel bordering Coffin Brook in South Alton for retention by the town under the supervision of the Conservation Commission for use as a nature area. Our full report is on file with the Selectmen. During the year we have also been actively reviewing applications for state wetlands permits. Through excellent cooperation among the Conservation Commission, the Selectmen and the building inspector compliance with the regulations and resolution of many violations has taken place.

Our major project was development of a Wetlands Ordinance, to be voted in March. Using a basic ordinance adopted by approximately twenty towns, working over several months, we adapted the proposal to Alton's needs and improved it in areas where other communities noted deficiencies. The purpose of the proposal is not to halt growth, but to preserve these natural areas which are normally inappropriate for development. Protection of these areas will not eliminate their use, but guide that use to protect water resources. With well over 90 percent of those responding to the Master Plan Survey favoring a Wetland Ordinance, we hope this will be reflected in voter support of the Conservation Commission proposal.

In sum, the Conservation Commission's activities have been marked by excellent cooperation from the Board of Selectmen and dedication and hard work by the members. We are hopeful that protection of the town's natural resources will continue high among Alton's priorities.

LAKES REGION PLANNING COMMISSION

The Lakes Region Planning Commission (LRPC) is an organization composed of and supported by member communities, which provides planning and related services to the towns and cities in the central New Hampshire lakes region. Alton has benefited from being a member of the LRPC over the years, especially with lake water quality and master plan map and survey work. In 1981 the LRPC has worked with Alton in the preparation of the land use maps, helped revise the subdivision regulations, advised on wet land ordinances and assisted with the historic survey project plus many other items.

Numerous projects are now pending for Alton. The experience and expertise of the LRPC in town planning has and will continue to help Alton.

ALTON PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board has had another busy year. Of the plans presented for Board consideration, 75 Lots involving some 500+ acres were recorded. It should be noted that the Town already sends out tax bills for over 1,700 vacant parcels of land and this situation has a potential for very rapid growth. Fees received amounting to \$1,875.00 help to defray expenses.

The Subdivision Regulations have been amended twice in order to conform to legislation passed in the 1981 Session.

Good progress has been made in Master Planning. Some 34 volunteers and 68 students and their teachers in the 6th and 9th grades assisted in drafting the Land Use Map. This map has now been finished by the Lakes Region Planning Commission and they are in the process of drafting both the Land Use and the Population Chapters of the Master Plan. Board volunteers have done much valuable work on Town statistics and preliminary work is now being done to set up the format for the Historic Survey.

An ordinance has been drawn up for voter approval to regulate and stipulate requirements for the benefit of the Town for both new condominiums and condominium conversion where they are now permitted by our Zoning.

Volunteers will be needed to assist in working with the Board on amending our existing Zoning Ordinance to correct problems which have shown up over the years since zoning was first enacted. Analysis will be made of the citizen opinion survey to determine how best to take advantage of changes in state legislation in order to safeguard the Town and prepare for future growth.

The Gilman Library had an active year during 1981. According to Mrs. Mohr's records our circulation totaled 11,600. 492 new books were added to the collection which now totals 9,262.

The Gilman Library, again this year received its certificate in recognition of meeting standards of the Statewide Library Development Program.

The shelving in the Library's Meeting room was completed in the Spring, thanks to the efforts and fine work of John Schmidt, Keith Benson and Dan Schmidt. The work was completed with funds from the Agnes Thompson Fund. The room has been dedicated to the memory of Agnes M. Thompson. The facilities have been used by many town organizations.

The Friends of the Gilman Library continue to promote the use of the library. Ginny Dore serves as President. A special art project was initiated this year under the Chairmanship of Winona Houle. Paintings of local historical places are being solicited from local artists to decorate the Agnes M. Thompson Room.

Alton continued to participate in Rali (Rochester Area Libraries Cooperative). There are now 13 member libraries who share A.V. equipment and materials and receive a 37% discount through the book buying cooperative.

Mrs. Mohr organized various activities for the children in Alton, including a weekly story hour for preschoolers. The children's summer program this year included; a Summer Reading Club, a weekly storyhour, a weekly film program, a drama club and a filmstrip making workshop.

As part of Alton's Old Home Week celebration, the Drama Club presented its program. An old indian dug out canoe found by Charles Roberts, 15 years ago was on display. And finally a painting by Jeanette Jones - Alton's Original Meeting House was dedicated on August 10, 1981.

The Gilman Library received a bequest of \$5,000. from the Estate of Edith C. Welch. This gift was made in memory of her father, Laban G. Welch.

I would like to compliment Marjorie Mohr - Librarian and Mary Batchelder - Assistant Librarian for their organization and management of the various activities and services offered by the Gilman Library.

ALTON REFUSE COMMITTEE – ANNUAL REPORT

Following the town meeting in March 1981 the Refuse Committee was re-activated to review the best plan for operating the new land fill. The committee met from March through November, developing a report on the requirements for both town operated and contract operated landfills. This report was presented to the Selectmen and is on file.

Since our report was presented the Selectmen have asked for bids for private operation of the land fill. The outcome will be presented to the town meeting.

The Refuse Committee outlined, in its report, the needs of the town, the requirements of the state, and what regulations must be followed to insure the town that the landfill will be operated to the towns needs for the longest life span of the landfill.

Since it was the feeling of the 1981 Town Meeting that a choice be given as to private contract operation or, the continuation of town operation of the landfill, the town meeting will be presented with both proposals. Once a plan is implemented the Refuse Committee will continue to monitor the landfill operation and advise the Selectmen.

BUILDING INSPECTOR/HEALTH OFFICER REPORT

In September of 1981 I assumed the responsibilities of Building Inspector, Health Officer and Landfill Supervisor from Mr. Harris. Before his departure in mid September Mr. Harris familiarized me with the position.

A total of 241 Building Permits were issued during 1981. Of this number 53 permits were for new residences and major renovations. The remaining permits were issued for minor renovations and repairs.

The number of Sanitary Permits issued in 1981 was 81. This was a large increase over the previous year. Of the 81 permits issued, 42 were for new systems having State approval. With more and more seasonal homes becoming year around homes, I am receiving many inquiries about new systems for older homes.

Forty well permits were issued this year. Most of these permits were for new artesian wells. A few dug wells were installed.

The landfill was in full operation for the past year. Measurements were taken in early September after 18 months of operation. The measurements indicate that the volume of compacted and covered trash is less than what was estimated by the design engineer, Beach & Jones. This indicates that the landfill may last longer than the designer estimated.
