

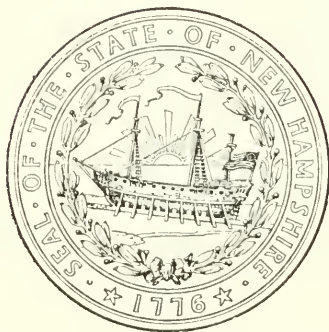

TOWN WARRANT**The State of New Hampshire**

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bristol in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bristol on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Polls close 6 P.M.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. Business meeting for action on all other articles will begin at 8:00 P.M.
2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee, and raise and appropriate the sums set forth therein to be raised by taxation.
3. To see if the Town will vote to request the assistance of the State Tax Commission in making a reappraisal in said Town of land and buildings. One half of the cost of same to be paid this year and the balance to be paid in 1964, and raise and appropriate money for same.
4. To see if the Town will vote to name that part of old route 3A on the easterly side of Newfound Lake that runs by Lakeside Cabins as Stark Road.
5. To see if the Town will vote to use the accumulated interest of the Proctor Capital Reserve Fund to improve the parking facilities at the Town Lot.
6. To see if the Town will vote to rebuild and oil the so called Camp Red Fox Road. The cost to be approximately \$1600.00, and raise and appropriate money for same.

7. To see if the Town will vote the following: That the Square presently known as "Bristol Square" and or "Central Square" be redesignated and named "Follansbee Square" in memory of the late Harold and Calvin Follansbee. (By Petition)
8. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote of March 11th, 1958 whereby the police officer was appointed by the selectmen and elect the police officer by ballot. (By Petition)
9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Planning Board to approve or disapprove, in its discretion, plats showing new streets or the widening thereof, or parks, and upon adoption of this article it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to file with the Registry of Deeds of the County of Grafton, a certificate or note showing that the said Planning Board has been so authorized, giving the date of authorization, as provided in Sections 19-29 inclusive, Chapter 36 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.
10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said Meeting.

MINOT - SLEEPER LIBRARY

Report of Board of Trustees 1962

The library is open Monday, Wednesday and Saturday from 1 to 5, and 6 to 9 P. M.

The librarian reports a circulation of 10,598 books and magazines during 1962 as follows:

The income from the Minnie Jackman Fund supplies the Reading Room with 32 magazines and the Bristol Enterprise.

Our librarian, Mrs. Wilbur Doran, conducts a Story Telling Hour from 1 to 2 each Saturday afternoon, with an average attendance of 13 children. The sessions were in progress through the winter and spring until the April vacation. They were resumed in November and, except for vacation, were continued the rest of the year. There are many modern children's books available and the librarian encourages the little folks to look at books and take a book home.

The Minot-Sleeper Library is still a member of the Shieling Trust group organized by the N.H. State Library and includes libraries from Franklin, Tilton, Belmont and Canterbury. The library will continue with this group even though our Shieling money has about run out. Final distribution of the Shieling books will mean that we acquire for our library, \$200 worth of books that we would otherwise hesitate to buy with our own money. We will also have access to \$800 worth at any time on a loan basis. The cooperative buying group will still continue to function, which means an extra 6% buying power for us, and every two months we make selections from a large display of books.

The trustees are doing their best to supply you, the reading public, with more and better reading materials, and we would appreciate suggestions as to books and services which might help us do a better job.

With deep regret we accepted the resignation of Mrs. Helen Lidstone who carried the books selections and buying for many years. Mr. Wilbur Bowen has signified his willingness to fill Mrs. Lidstone's unexpired term.

We are asking you, the voters, this year, to make it possible for us to make two major improvements in your library. They are badly needed and will make it a pleasanter place to read and relax.

MUNICIPAL COURT REPORT

During the year of 1962 there were 192 complaints entered in the Bristol Municipal Court. One complaint was for a felony and was passed on to the Superior Court. Of the remaining 191 misdemeanors charged 133 were motor vehicle complaints; 28 were boating complaints; 5 were fish and game; 5 drunk and disorderly complaints; one case was nol prossed, and two were appealed to the Superior Court. The remaining 21 were made up of miscellaneous offenses. Five respondents were found in default for non appearance. Analysis of Motor Vehicle complaints shows that speeding and crossing solid lines were most numerous. The court is pleased to report that the number of "driving while intoxicated" cases dropped from 10 in 1961 to two in 1962. Only two hearings were held in Juvenile Court and no official action was necessary.

The Legislature has before it several bills which affect the Municipal Courts. One bill already passed the House calls for Towns to furnish a Court room. Bristol has no official court room and will have to take action accordingly. Another bill yet to be considered would increase the Town's share of fines nearly 50%.

PUBLIC HEALTH REPORT

The following is a report of the activities conducted for the Town of Bristol, by the Bureau Public Health Nursing, N.H. Division of Public Health for the year 1962.

Due to the fact that Bristol has its own Public Health Nurse under the Newfound Area Nursing Association, it is not necessary for the State Nurse to give as much time in the community. However assistance was given with the following activities:

Cooperating with the medical committee of the Association, four Sabin Oral Vaccine and other Immunization Clinics were held for pre-school children. These clinics included pre-school children from Bristol and surrounding towns. The following immunizations were given:

Salk Poliomyelitis Vaccine series 5-19 yrs of age 0 boosters 9
adults over 20 years 8 boosters 0

Diphtheria, Tetanus & Whooping Cough Immunizations:

Under 1 year series 24 boosters 0

1 - 5 years series 13 boosters 9

Smallpox Vaccinations - pre-school under 6 years 12

Sabin Oral Poliomyelitis Vaccine:

The Sabin clinics for school age children was conducted by the local Public Health and School Nurses.

The duplicate cards signed at the clinics for pre-school age children have been turned over to family physicians stated on the card. If your child has not completed three Sabin Types you should consult your family physician.

I have held conferences with the local Public Health Nurse regarding various phases of the health program. Together we have made some home calls on request from the State Office.

As of January the State Nurses districts have been changed. The Bristol Area is now under the supervision of the State Nurse from Franklin, District No. 6. I have enjoyed working in Bristol and the excellent cooperation of the various organizations, medical people and lay persons.

In the past year I have loaned several books to the local Public Health Nurse, have met with committees, loaned the teaching doll for demonstrations for the Baby Sitting Course at the Community Center, and obtained literature and films for the above course.

In the fall, the State Mobile X-ray Unit was in the town and there were taken 337 X-rays at industries and 57 in the community. This survey is under the direction of Mr. Jenson, Survey Supervisor of the N.H. Division of Public Health. The nurse follows-up on X-rays as necessary. Other Bristol people have attended the Plymouth Chest X-ray Clinics conducted twice a year by the N.H. Tuberculosis & Health Association and the N.H. Department of Health. Reports of

X-rays are sent to physicians and patients concerned, following the X-ray and home visits made as required.

My sincerest thanks to the following for the excellent cooperation given in the health program for Bristol: Newfoundland Area Nursing Association Nurse, local School Nurse, Dr. John Greenan for professional services rendered, the Bristol Woman's Club for excellent assistance in arranging clinics and their efficient assistance at all clinics, The Bristol Enterprise for publicity given the programs, and any other individual or organization contributing to its success.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District on the 7th day of March, 1963, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, the polls for balloting to be open from 8 o'clock to 9 o'clock, or thereafter, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose by non-partisan ballot all officers whose election by ballot is required by law.

2. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the District.

3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

4. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand two hundred thirty-two dollars and eighty-three cents (\$1,232.83) the same to be made available during the current fiscal year, and to authorize the application against said sum of Building Aid received from the State in excess of that estimated by the State Department of Education. (Recommended by the Budget Committee).

5. To see if the District will vote to dispense with the printing of the detailed statement of payments of the School District in the Town Report.

6. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums

as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

7. To see if the Bristol School District will vote to petition the State Board of education to become a member of a cooperative school district as provided in New Hampshire RSA 195:3, which may include, in addition to this District, the following School Districts, namely: Alexandria, Bridgewater, Danbury, Groton, Hebron, New Hampton.

8. To elect two representatives to serve with two representatives from each of the above mentioned school districts, namely: Alexandria, Bridgewater, Danbury, Groton, Hebron, New Hampton, on an interim committee which shall prepare a financial budget for the operation of the proposed cooperative school district.

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Another legislative year has arrived, and it seems that no other area of State business is getting more attention than Education. The publication of the preliminary report of the Legislative Interior Commission on Education has encouraged many people to take a hard look at our whole system. This report is based on a great deal of study and is the result of thousands of hours of real work. It is deserving of serious study, for its conclusions are very significant for the Towns in this area. There is no indication of immediate legislation to implement the suggestions of the report, except possibly in the area of increased State aid to school districts. We should all watch carefully those items of legislation which affect our schools, and let our representatives know how we expect them to vote.

Of particular interest to citizens of the Newfound Area is the bill which is being drafted to enable the seven towns to form a regional school district. This legislation is being made necessary by the desire of the school study committee to provide for the accomplishment of this cooperation by using some ideas not incorporated in the present Cooperative School Law. Between the time that this is available, a great deal of information will be disseminated in various ways. It is our sincere hope that folks will make up their minds after this information is available to them.

As we have so frequently indicated, the facilities at Bristol Memorial High School are overcrowded now, and future enrollments figures give promise of a greater, not a smaller, burden on these facilities. This is not only Bristol's problem, as whatever is done there will materially affect the education of the young people in the surrounding Towns.

The average salary for the teachers in New Hampshire's elementary schools this year is \$4900. For high school teachers the average is \$5225. There is a shortage of elementary teachers in the state, and, wherever we pay less than the average, we have difficulty finding teachers to come to our smaller schools. Whenever we find one who is willing to start here we take a chance on the quality of her teaching, and serve as a training school for larger and more affluent districts.

We have many fine, dedicated teachers in this area who are offering a good, sound educational background to our youngsters. It is our intent and hope to keep them, and to be able to get equally effective people to replace them when they leave and to supplement the staffs when necessary.

BRISTOL COMMUNITY CENTER

The past year has been another in the continued growth of the recreation program and the facilities at the Community Center. It would be impossible to give a detailed analysis of the variety of events that have taken place during the year so this report will be in capsule form. However, a detailed report of all the recreational activities will be available on request under a separate cover.

A marked increase in participation by both children and adults, use of the building by organizations and clubs, and recreation sponsored groups, can be easily noted by comparing figures from the previous year. In 1962 non recreation sponsored meetings totaled 836 as compared to the 1961 figure of 575. Meetings directly under the supervision of the Center's staff were increased to 893 or an addition of 31. These statistics alone indicate that a great deal of cooperation was necessary from all the participating agencies to keep harmony. At this time I would like to express my appreciation for the patience shown by the many people involved, a necessary factor with such a crowded schedule.

Also revealing an increase was the total recreation participation for the year. Total attendance rose to over 30,000 as compared to 28,000 in 1961.

Once again the major recreation areas at Kelley Park, Turnpike Slope, Slim Baker Day Camp, and Pike's Beach were in operation in addition to a variety of games, crafts, dances, socials, athletics, trips, and special activities. There were only a few actual additions to the activity calendar; however, several already in existence were "spruced up" which led to an increase in attendance and were more beneficial to the participants.

Close cooperation between the Community Center's Advisory Council and the Park Commission aided in the continued progress of recreation. A major step was taken in April when the first written constitution was adopted by the council. At that time a new slate of officers was elected. They included Norman Slayton, chairman; Harold Sheffield, vice-chairman; Ellis Frank, treasurer; and Robert Ledger, secretary. Also, several new members were elected to the Council to fill vacancies, and replace retiring members. The Advisory Council meets once monthly and has been actively guiding the fortunes of the Center. Attendance at meetings has been remarkable with approximately 85 percent of the members present on many occasions. Membership on the Advisory Council consists of representatives from local organizations, surrounding towns, life members, members-at-large, and Park Commissioners.

During the course of a recreation year many individuals and organizations are called upon for assistance and seldom has there been a time when that needed help was not forthcoming. Certainly words alone cannot express the appreciation to those many people who volunteered their time or services, and we at the Community Center can only hope that they understand our gratitude and in some small way hope that they have acquired a feeling of accomplishment for their efforts.
