- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. \$16,925.15*.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectment to incure debts for Temporary Loans in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$450.00) for the maintenance of the Iron Works Fire Department. (\$450.00.*
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$450.00) for the maintenance of the Corner Fire Department. (\$450.00)*
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) to cooperate with the State in control of White Pine Blister Rust. (\$200.00)*

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for the support of Town Libraries. (\$300.00).*
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) for the observation of Memorial Day. (\$50.00)*
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for Summer Maintenance. (\$5,000.00).*
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000.00) for Winter Maintenance. (\$7,000.00)*.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars \$4,000.00) for the payments of Long Term Notes. (\$4,000.00)*.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) for State Aid Construction. (\$1,500.00)*.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars for the Maintenance of the Civil Defense Organization for the ensuing year, with full realization that should a major emergency be created, more money will have to be used for said purpose. (\$300.00)*

MARCH 11, 1952

Meeting called to order by the Moderator at 9:30 A.M. Warrant read by the Moderator. Ballot Box shown to the voters. Ballots unsealed by the Clerk and given to Ballot Inspectors for counting.

Voted to close the Polls at 6:30 P.M.

Voted to take up articles in warrant after dinner.

- Art. 2. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,687.50 to defray town charges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for temporary loan in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 4. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for the maintenance of the Iron Works Fire Department.
- Art. 5. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for the maintenance of the Corner Fire Department.
- Art. 6. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to cooperate with the State in the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- Art. 7 Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the support of the Town Libraries.
- Art. 8. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.
- Art. 9. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for Summer maintenance.
- Art. 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000,00 for Winter Maintenance.
- Art. 11. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for payment on Long Term Notes.
- Art. 12. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,438.30 for State Aid Construction.

- Art. 13. Voted to instruct the Trustees of the Trust Funds to invest these Funds in such legal way that the income will be increased.
- Art. 14. Voted to arise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the maintenance of the Civil Defense Organization for the ensuing year.
- Art. 15. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,050.52 for Town Road Aid.
- Art. 16. On this article to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 toward the support of the Laconia Hospital, the vote was: Yes 23—No 31.
- Art. 17. On this article to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 toward the support of 'he Wolfeboro Hospital the vote was Yes 14—No 29.
- Art. 18. Voted to close that part of the Camp Manning Road, formerly known as the Old Mountain Road, which leads easterly from the Guinea Ridge Road, from the easterly end of the abuttment of the bridge over Moulton Brook to a point opposite the westerly boundary of propertry of Leo Foundation, Inc., subject to gates and bars.
- Art. 19. No vote on this article as the Beano vote is on the ballot.
- Art. 20. Voted to authorize the Trustees of the Trust Funds to expend income from certain permanent funds, known as the 1926 Tebbetts and 1931 Watson-Hall Funds for the care of the approach to the lot for which the permanent funds were established as well as upon the graves or lots themselves.

The town hereby indemnifies the Trustees of Trust Funds from any liability which may result from use of income of the 1926 Tebbetts and 1931 Watson-Hall Funds in the care oft he approaches to and are immediately surrounding the graves or lots for which the permanent funds were established.

1952 ANNUAL REPORT CIVIL DEFENSE ORGANIZATION

Thanks to the cooperation and participation of the Selectmen, the Town Officers, and approximately one hundred of the townspeople the Civil Defense had a reasonably successful year.

With the exception of the Incoming Warning Signals Organization and the Ground Observation Corps matters were quiet, although everything was and is set up for action in case of emergency.

We received several incoming test warnings from the Filter Station in Manchester alerting the telephone and siren warning systems, but of course these tests were not carried down to the individual line or person level. People will not, as individuals, be warned except in case of a real emergency, when the sirens in both sections of town will sound their long wavering three minute blast. The All Clear is three one minute blasts with a minute interval between each.

The telephone will function this way in emergency: Doris Bowdoin, the Postmaster at the Corner, when she gets her alert from Manchester, will phone her two assistants, Mrs. Hattie Kelly at Lower Gilmanton, and Mrs. Emma Price at the Iron Works, and they in turn will call their assistants on each phone line, and the latter in turn will call everybody on their own line.

The Ground Observation Post on Frisky Hill was manned (or womanned) a hundred percent for three months, with a gradual dropping off of active personnel until the winter months cut it down to the operating minimum. As soon as the weather is a little better the people will be asked to cover once again a hundred per cent.

The Air Force was particularly pleased with the job done by the Town of Gilmanton, and so stated on several occasions officially and unofficially. They were highly complimentary at the turn out on Frisky Hill for the pictures (posted in the Post Offices and at the Post) and at the group which attended the showing of the Air Force Films at the Academy. They requested and got a newspaper story on the activities on the Hill (see Laconia Citizen issue of November 29th, 1952) and have further requested a story for the Air Force Leaflet for the February or March number.

which story will show Mrs. Schultz and Mrs. Thistle doing a weaving job at a loom to be set up in the Post.

Although it is more or less officially admitted that the town has done one of the best jobs at Ground Observation in the State, they tell us quietly and firmly that (a) all towns must get that way, and that (b) the better we are the better we have to get! There does not appear to be the slightest chance for a lessening of the care and watchfulness necessary, and it is pretty near a certainty that we are going to be asked — as are all towns — for still more action.

The reason is that these towns of ours out here in the country are the truly valuable set ups, for they give the warning long before the planes get to where they will do the real damage. By spotting planes here we get our interceptor plans in the air in time to blast the incoming enemy bombers, thus preventing disaster and the sending to us of the refugees which the dropping of bombs will cause.

A second small building is to be put up on the hilltop. And if anybody has any old comfortable chairs that he wants to contribute and magazines or books that aren't working, they would be much appreciated, for those hours get long even in that comfortably warm room, especially in the night shift. Just bring them up and put them in, or if you prefer, somebody will come and get them.

And, we need more watchers — men, women, and boys. Girls, too, if they are properly chaperoned. The idea is to get complete coverage for all 168 hours per week, but to arrange it so that each person takes a two hour stretch only once every two weeks. To do that a good many more people are needed. Won't you add your name to the list of people who have already done such a fine job? Call Howard Osler, Supervisor, or the undersigned, or any one of the day or night supervisors listed below. Howard Osler, Supervisor.

TUITION RATES

The School District of Gilmanion will face continued increasing High School tuition costs. The following rates have been established at high schools receiving Gilmanton pupils for 1953-54:

Laconia, \$305.00 Alton, 200.00 Belmont, 225.00 Pittsfield, 250.00

The rates at Laconia High School have increased over 200% in ten years due to rising costs for school operation.

ADDITION AT GILMANTON IRON WORKS SCHOOL

The annex to the Gilmanton Iron Works School which was constructed by the Selectmen from the proceeds of the Myrtle Marsh Fund will result in a more unified school and program.

The large basement will give the opportunity to establish an excellent school lunch program. It is hoped that the Parent Teacher Association and individual citizens will assist in raising funds for equipment and storage so that the children will enjoy the same excellent school lunch services as are being furnished at the Gilmanton Corner school.

It is highly recommended that the program operate under the Federal Aid Program for School Lunches. The Federal Government pays .06 per pupil for each lunch served and also furnishes excellent food commodities, such as turkeys, ham, butter, cheese, and all forms of canned vegetables and fruits.
