#### REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

With two or three exceptions the schools, during the past year, have been entirely satisfactory to the School Board, and so far as is known, to the people in the district. The exceptions are the Fall and Winter schools at the Centre and No. 3. Some of the people at the Centre foolishly, (as we think), allowed their children to leave the school at the Fall, and also the Winter term, but those who were dissatisfied with the Fall school were well pleased with the Winter school, and vice versa. As it seems to be impossible to please all at the same time here, perhaps, by doing what we thought to be right in each case we may have hit the egolden mean," and pleased everybody a part of the time. We regret that a feeling has crept into this school and neighborhood which renders it almost impossible for a teacher, no matter how well he or she may do, to please all parties. The people at No. 3 took the wiser course, and chose "rather to endure the evil which they had, than fly to those they knew not of." It was intended to have had a Winter term in school No. 2, but upon inquiry we learned that we were not sure of more than four scholars, and two of them could be about as well accommodated at the Centre, and the other two were small, and quite as well satisfied not to go to school. was thought best not to have a school. At South Landaff we have had two terms aggregating twenty-two weeks. Could we have foreseen the favorable winter, and have known that the people there would have liked a winter term, they could have had it. Generally, owing to the distance some of the scholars have to go, and the bad roads, they have not wanted a Winter school. scholars from this town have attended school in Benton, for which we had to pay a tuition of \$2,50 each per term. This is more than we have paid heretofore, and we thought too much, especially when five of the scholars have to go nearly a mile and a half to get to school, but in the absence of any previous arrangement we had to pay it. Hereafter it will be well for those having this matter is charge to make their arrangements at the beginning of the school year. Five of these scholars can, with a little expense, be sent to one of our own schools.

The Summer term on Foster Hill closed abruptly at the begin-

ning of the fourth week, without notice to the School Board, and without examination. No further attempt was made at having a Summer school, but a very successful term of eleven weeks was had in the Fall. The school house is not a suitable place in which to have a Winter school, but we should have liked to have given the few scholars here a few more weeks of school. Some other time it may be made up to them. The other three schools have had three terms each, two of them having a Winter term of twelve weeks each. We think as a whole good progress has been made by the scholars throughout the district. Our observations in the schools have led us to fear that the tendency has sometimes been to push the pupils along too fast, without spending sufficient time in the elementary matters. This is especially the case in Arithmetic and Algebra. Some effort was made in the Winter schools to correct this, and, we think with good results. No scholar can build well upon a foundation that is defective.

In the purchase of school books we have endeavored to use all the economy that was consistent with the welfare of our schools. In the use of books, scholars cannot get along with any less than enough, and we have bought, of each kind, only what we thought would be sufficient to meet the demand that would be made for them. We have a few Readers, a few Histories, and some others that have not been used. The expense so far has fallen below the estimates which we made a year ago. Most of the books have been returned to the School Board. A few have been kept by permission, but we think we have a record which shows where every book is.

Petitions were circulated and presented asking that an article be inserted in the warrant for town meeting, looking to a return to the old district system of schools. This matter properly comes before the voters of the district instead of the town, and an article of that character was inserted in the school meeting warrant. It was a matter of some surprise to us to find that these petitions had been most generally signed by people living in those localities which have been the most benefitted by the operations of the present law, while the names of those who have derived the least benefit from the change are conspicuous by their absence. We hope these petitioners will make no mistake in voting upon this matter, but

carefully consider what the result will be. It may be gratifying to some parts of the town to have the sole control of their portion of the school funds, but it seems to ue this will hardly compensate them for the loss of nearly a third of the money they have had the benefit of under the new law. It seems to us that such would be the case in such districts as numbers 4 and 5. Other districts would have plenty of school money, with only three or four scholars; and this is the worst feature of the old district system. The school money must be divided and paid over to the district whether there are any scholars or not, while the present system allows the exercise of some discretionary powers in these matters by the School Board. We think we can make these few suggestions without being charged with any selfish motive, for such a change if made would relieve the School Board of a great amount of vexations and profitless work, which would certainly be a great relief in the supervision of the schools.

Number of scholars in town as enumerated by Selectmen, boys, 47; girls, 31; total 78. Number over fifteen who have attended school, 12. Number reported in school register attending not less than two weeks, 100. Number registered in more than one school, 12. Over five not attending any school, 4. Between fourteen and twenty who cannot read or write, 0.

The appended table furnishes all the statistical facts required by law not already given. Under whatever law our schools are run we hope the town will still continue their liberality in making a little extra appropriation for them which is money well invested.

In settling with the Selectmen and Treasurer we find the financial affairs of the town in a very satisfactory condition. Vouchers were produced for all expenditures when called for. We find the same provision in our Treasurer's accounts that he has always maintained. The town will see by the reported available assets, that there is probably funds enough to pay the ordinary expenses of the town for the coming year and therefore, we should not recommend the raising of any money for that purpose. We have examined the School District Treasurer's accounts and find them correctly cast, and properly vouched for.
