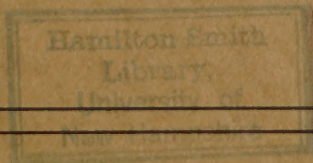

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sullivan on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for building and repairing highways and bridges, or take any action relating thereto.

4. To see if the town will vote to pay for digging graves and going with the town hearse for residents.

5. To see what sum of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for the support of the public library.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise money for Memorial Day, or take any action relating thereto.

7. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see if the town will vote to help stamp out the white pine blister disease and raise money for the same, or take any action thereto.

9. To see what sum of money the town will raise for removing snow from the highways.

10. To see if the town will vote to purchase some snow fence and raise money for the same.

11. To see if the town will vote to build or buy a small building to shelter tramps, and raise money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate money for Old Home day, or take any action relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue two sections of the Franklin Pierce Highway, known as the Concord Road, and lying between East Sullivan Village and the Nelson Town Line, and to authorize the Selectmen to petition the Superior Court for its consent to such discontinuance, and to do all other things necessary in connection therewith.

Said two portions of public highway, the use of which is no longer required by reason of relocation of said highway during reconstruction of the Franklin Pierce Highway.

14. To hear the reports of agents, auditors and committees heretofore chosen, or take any action thereon.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Sullivan:

I herein submit my tenth annual report as superintendent of schools.

The economic situation today compels us to weigh everything that we are doing to make sure that it is worth while, to evaluate it from an economic standpoint, to make sure it is being done in the best way possible and at the least cost commensurate with efficiency.

Your school officers have tried to eliminate unnecessary leaks, to take advantage of every reduction of costs in needed materials, to maintain standard qualities and not to cripple the efficiency of the teachers through lack of things necessary for successful work.

Taxes and tax burdens are today the topic of much discussion. There is no denying that public education faces a crisis. What shall we do? Shall we lose faith?

Due to the world-wide depression, a popular wave for the cutting of teachers' salaries swept over the country last year.

An error was made in placing the development of children on a level with mercantile and manufacturing business. For the business may recuperate its loss when times become favorable; but the loss to the developing child is loss forever.

Here, I wish to commend the action of the towns of my district in the fact that five of the eight towns maintained the same salaries and the other three made moderate cuts. If I may judge from what I read in the papers today, the peak of cutting teachers' salaries is past. The wave is on its ebb.

A question which is sometimes asked is: "How far can a man go into the woods?" The answer, "Only half way." For after that he is on the way out. We trust that so far as the depression affects our public school system, New Hampshire and the rest of the country are on the way out.

Therefore, let us be optimistic. Let us not take props from under the bridge over which the country must travel to reach better times. But as citizens of the greatest republic in the world, let us be mindful of the following facts: (1) The school is the agent of the state in preserving itself; in creating its own future. (2) Education is not a charity but a part of the national defense. (3) Education is the author of national ideals, the moulder of the soul of America.

Let us resolve: Not until other means have been exhausted should the necessary appropriations for education be touched. We have no right to punish the children for our lack of foresight, and they are the ones who will suffer under this procedure.

The above statements are made not for any emolument unto myself, but they are made in the interests of your children and for the prosperity of our state and nation.

A very interesting program was given by the East Sullivan school at the graduation exercise.

At the East, Miss Day completed a very successful year. Miss Day continues her work during the present year maintaining her former reputation for excellent organization, efficiency in instruction, methods of teaching and in accomplishment of required work.

During the school year ending June 30th, the Center school was under the cadet system. We were fortunate in having three strong cadets sent to this school, viz.; Miss Hazel Connor, Mr. Oscar Frazer and Mr. Robert Hill. Each one gave evidence of strength in his or her chosen profession. For the present year, Mr. Oscar Frazer was selected as a regular teacher. Mr. Frazer has the school well organized and is getting good results. We predict a successful year.
