

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

The 2001 Annual Report gives an account of the town's activities during the year as well as information about programs and plans. Release of the 2000 Census count places the Town's population at 6,800, an increase of 564 or 9% over that set at the last census. The continued growth, both residential and commercial, within our town and region is reflected in changes over the past decade in the budgets, services and programs provided by the Town. This year's budget and warrant continues to respond to those changes and plan for the town's future. An important project over the past two years, updating the Town's Master Plan, is anticipated to culminate in 2002.

Several major infrastructure projects were completed in 2001 including: *The Slate Covered Bridge dedicated and opened to traffic in October marked completion of a new covered bridge replacing that lost to fire in March of 1993.

*Sewer Commissioners oversaw necessary upgrades to the West Swanzey Wastewater Treatment Plant approved by voters at the 2000 meeting.

*The Public Safety Facility, housing the Town's Police and Emergency Management Headquarters, was dedicated at an open house held in March.

*Reclamation and reconstruction of Goodell Ave was completed this summer. Arrowcrest Drive was also rebuilt this past year.

Regional efforts to provide services supporting town activities continued to move forward in 2001. The Regional Prosecutor program successfully recruited a new prosecutor who began work in January of 2002. Five towns, Chesterfield, Sullivan, Troy, Swanzey and Walpole participate in this program. A sixth, Marlborough, is considering participation this year. Other programs that may merit consideration as a regional effort include code enforcement and assessing. With new assessing standards developing, this area is sure to become a frequent topic of discussion at ongoing Regional Selectmen's Meetings.

This year's annual meeting warrant includes several articles focused towards Swanzey's future.

*With much of the town's long-term debt scheduled to be paid off in 2003, Selectmen and Sewer Commissioners support initiation of efforts to extend sewer lines to serve North Swanzey. This area of town, scheduled to be connected to the Keene Wastewater Treatment Plant almost 15 years ago, is heavily developed with small lots crowding around Wilson Pond. Funding to update design work for the necessary pump station and sewer

collection lines in an area of North Swanzey west of Route 12 is sought this year. Investigation of state and other funding sources to support the project's construction is underway.

*Discussions over the past few years amongst town officials and planners, state officials and property owners have culminated in an article requesting authority to negotiate and layout a right of way for a future road connecting NH Route 12 and 32 south of Wilson Pond. This is a long term project with no funds requested at this time.

The Carpenter Home operation, and the special revenue fund created by voters at last year's Town Meeting, has been the subject of continuing discussion. While operational costs have been close to those projected when the budget was developed, revenues have not. Revenue generated by resident payments since establishment of the special revenue fund in April 2001 has not been sufficient with more than \$45,000 of trust fund income needed to offset operational costs incurred from April to December 2001. Unfortunately, these losses combined with those incurred in 2000, have depleted trust fund income available to offset operational losses of \$35,000 projected by Trustees for 2002. Support from taxpayers will be required to continue the operation of the Carpenter Home. Voters will be asked to consider several articles at Town Meeting concerning the Carpenter Home. Difficult choices will need to be made.

This annual report is also our opportunity to recognize and thank those whose efforts have improved our town. This year statewide recognition was extended to Francis W. Faulkner, Jr. for his municipal volunteer efforts over many years, and particularly related to the Slate Covered Bridge Fundraising Committee. The entire committee, for their diligent work organizing, fundraising and showing community spirit deserve our thanks. As we have said in past years, the key to our town's success is the commitment of its citizens. Many hours of service are given by townspeople serving on boards, as emergency personnel, volunteering at the Swanzey Museum, organizing for Old Home Day and filling countless other roles. Their efforts ensure Swanzey remains a great town to live in.

TOWN HALL

The Town Hall staff provides a variety of services to townspeople, serving as a link between citizens, part time officials, departments, boards and committees. Some of the services that most frequently bring residents to Town Hall include motor vehicle registration, dog licensing, vital records and related licenses, assessment and land use inquiries, payment of taxes and sewer bills. Town Hall is regularly open Monday through Friday from 9 am to 5 pm, excluding holidays. If you have any questions regarding your Town, its government, zoning or other matters please call.

The Town Clerk's Office has seen its best year ever. Due to the 0% financing promotions by area auto dealers we have seen an influx of new vehicle registrations. This has raised the revenues considerably over the previous years. <u>Just as a reminder-State Law requires that you bring in your current registration when doing a renewal or transfer of plates on your vehicle.</u>

<u>Remember</u>, dog license renewals are due in April. Failure to license your dogs may result in additional fines or court appearances.

Publication of "Swanzey Uncovered" continued in 2001. In addition to the Town's newsletter, residents may also obtain information regarding Town Government at www.town.swanzey.nh.us. The website includes a directory of Town officials, minutes from the Board of Selectmen, Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment meetings, press releases and notices of job opportunities.

Finally, Town Government is the responsibility of each and every citizen. If you would like to serve on a committee, volunteer at recreation events, or would like to find out more information, please contact Town Administrator Beth Fox at Town Hall.

PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board's duties include the review and approval of all subdivision, boundary line adjustment, sand and gravel excavation, and site plan review applications. The Board also reviews applications for sign permits, home occupations and multi-tenant applications. In addition, the Planning Board has the authority to propose amendments to the Swanzey Zoning Ordinance and is responsible for updating the Town's Master Plan and Capital Improvements Program.

The Board consists of ten members, six elected at Town Meeting, one ex-officio member appointed by the Board of Selectmen, and three alternates appointed by the Planning Board. The meetings are held on the first and third Thursdays of each month, with meetings commencing at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall. Notices of public hearings are posted at the Town Hall, Mt. Caesar Library, the two post offices, as well as being published in the Keene Sentinel and certified mail sent to all abutters. All meetings are open to the public and the Board encourages your attendance and participation.

The Planning Board reviewed over 65 applications during 2001 (18 sign permit applications, 12 home occupation applications, 11 site plan review applications, 10 multi-tenant applications, 8 boundary line adjustment applications, 4 notices of voluntary mergers and 2 subdivision applications). This, in addition to work on the Zoning Ordinance, revision to the site plan review regulations, preliminary conceptual consultations, discussions regarding code enforcement issues and other general matters concerning the future land use needs and development in Swanzey has led to a busy year for the Board.

SWANZEY MASTER PLAN SUB-COMMITTEE

The Swanzey Master Plan Sub-Committee is more than halfway through its task which is to update the Plan of 1990 prepared by the Southwest Regional Planning Commission. The earlier plan provided excellent analytical benchmarks for most dimensions of life in Swanzey. Because the Plan was the work of outside consultants, however, it did not presume to set goals and priorities for the Town. That is the task of your current committee.

Comprised of 16 residents of Swanzey, the sub-committee has carried on extensive factfinding over the past 18 months, including the town-wide survey, extensive interviews with town staff and department heads, as well as representatives of all organizations whose purpose bears in any way on the well being of life in Swanzey. We have reviewed all previous comprehensive plans and documents, and we continue to process data from the year 2000 census as it is released. Fortified with the best information attainable, we are now preparing recommendations for the near term future (5-10 years) in each of the areas stipulated by law (RSA 674:2), and such additional areas as we deem appropriate. Those areas, as noted in earlier reports, include the following:

land usehousingtransportationutilitiescommunity facilitiesconservation & preservationrecreationconstruction materialseconomic development

The Master Plan, once adopted by the Planning Board after a public hearing, becomes the principal policy document for the immediate future. It provides Selectmen with stated objectives, based upon popular input, on which to base the many executive decisions forced by everyday life. The Planning Board will have a community vision by which to formulate ordinances. The Town will have priorities for capital spending, knowing that once sewer financing is paid up, for example, that utility improvements would be the preference for the next capital investment program, etc. Master planning is significant work.

We anticipate completion of our draft document at the end of the summer of 2002 with public hearings to begin in the fall. An executive summary of our plan will be published before year end with the full document available on the Swanzey web-site, at libraries and municipal offices.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) is a board whose function is to hear appeal applications from property owners who have applied for relief from the terms of the Swanzey Zoning Ordinance. The ZBA has the power to hear the following: requests for variances, requests for special exceptions, appeals from administrative decisions and requests for an equitable waiver from dimensional requirements.

In 2001, the ZBA heard twenty-five cases. Fourteen were for special exceptions, nine were for variances and two were for equitable waivers from dimensional requirements. In addition, the Board considered two requests for rehearing.

The ZBA meets on the 3rd Monday of each month at 7:30 pm at the Town Hall. Notices of public hearings are posted at the Town Hall, Mt. Caesar Library and the two post offices. In addition, notices are published in the Keene Sentinel and sent by certified mail to all abutters.

REPORT OF THE SWANZEY POLICE DEPARTMENT

Writing these annual reports is a task that becomes a little more difficult each year. I try to give the reader some sense of what has occurred in the year past and an overview of the plans for the coming year. The challenge comes in not making the reports sound the same each year. One realizes that, as each year passes, it is only the faces, the names and the numbers that change. Our task remains constant. To help make this as safe a town as we can for our residents and visitors.

2001 saw a police related shooting on a cold February morning when a distraught man aimed a gun at three of our officers. Officers Sean Cavanaugh, David Eldridge, and Lt. Thomas DeAngelis performed with the highest degree of professionalism. In fact, the NH State Grange Association saw fit to recognize Officer Cavanaugh as their Police Officer of the Year for his actions that day.

We have been in our new station for a year now and all is working well. There are still a few odds and ends to be finished but it has met our needs with flying colors. The Regional Prosecutor Program, the School Resource Officer and our K-9 "ARGO" are all assets to the department and the Town. As I write this, Officer Joel Sampson is enduring his first day at the Recruit Academy in Concord. When he graduates, he will join the other officers helping to keep this one of the nicest communities in the area.

Statistically we saw increases in every category but accidents. This is not a surprise as it continues a trend that has occurred for the last several years. We are a growing and dynamic community of just under 7,000 residents. When you take into account the traffic that passes through town, Swanzey's Emergency Services are looking at about 45,000 potential "customers" each day.

For 2002, we are looking to upgrade our cruisers with a financing package from Ford. We can obtain three new cruisers now to replace three vehicles with well over 100,000 miles and pay for them over three years. The "per year" costs are about the same as buying one vehicle a year but where we gain is from the perspective of maintenance and changeover costs. Presently we have to change three vehicles each year. We strip the old vehicle, outfit the new and convert one to unmarked status. In addition, we have the high costs associated with taking care of multiple driver, fleet vehicles. The proposed program would allow us to upgrade to new vehicles, and only have one year of changeover costs.

Other projects are to continue towards Level One State Accreditation, continue our community based programs and to replace our old copier, fax, and printer machines with a new combination unit. I would also like to initiate a senior volunteer program that could utilize some of the talents of our residents. This is still in the planning stages.

In closing, please remember that this is your community and by working together, we can ensure that it remains safe and secure. I would urge you to call us with activity that you feel is suspicious or unsafe and we will do our best to assist you. This is truly a community that we can all be proud of.

SWANZEY FIRE DEPARTMENT

2001 was a devastating year for the fire service as a whole. There were 441 line of duty deaths in the fire service more than any other year and 343 of those occurred on September 11th at the World Trade Center. Our thoughts are with our departed brothers and their families.

While I don't believe that the Town of Swanzey is a target I am sure that the Town of Shanksville, Pennsylvania did not think of themselves as a place of terrorism. Though the world has drastically changed, the emergency services remain a constant and will be first to respond. Last year I was unsuccessful with my grant application for the fire department. This year the federal government has increased the funding for fire departments and I am hoping this increase in funding will improve our chances.

Locally our calls for service grew by 8% this year. What everyone should know is that we do not have a full time fire department. Everyone, including myself, has a full time job doing something else. With the increasing number of calls, we will need to address this in the future. We have started the ground work on what the department's needs are for a new station. All this works together as no station is adequate for full time staff.

COMMUNITY FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER REPORT

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands cooperate and coordinate to reduce the risk of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing <u>ALL</u> outside burning. Fire permits are mandatory for any open burning unless the ground where the burning is to be done (and surrounding areas) is completely covered with snow. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs. Open burning is a privilege, **NOT** a right. Help us to protect you and our forest resource! Build small brush piles that can be quickly burned and extinguished.

New Hampshire experienced over 940 wildland fires in 2001. Most of the fires were human caused. Due to dry conditions fires spread quickly impacting more than 20 structures. Homeowners can help protect their homes by maintaining adequate green space around the house and make sure that the house number is correct and visible. Only You Can Prevent Wildland Fires. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

The winter of 2001 was one that I will always remember. While it started out fairly tame, it picked up steam as it went along. The first part of January kept us busy with small storms and on the 21st we got our first big storm of 18 inches. In February, we got hit with our first 30 inch storm in quite a few years and then came the rain and ice in the middle of the month. We worked 16 out of 28 days maintaining the roads. In came March with another 30 inch storm.

Because of the amount of snow we received we were not able to grade the gravel roads until May which is usually a job that can be done in April. Now, with all the snow we had you would think that it would have been a somewhat wet May and June but what a difference a year makes. Once we could grade the roads there was not enough moisture and this made the job a little more time consuming as we had to truck water in.

For summer projects we resurfaced 1.7 miles of the Marcy Hill area with cold mix and put the top coat on Goodell Avenue. We chip sealed 3 miles of road and shimmed about .3 of a mile. We started a project at the cemetery to change the slope and hopefully stop some erosion problems. We will be finishing that project in 2002. We made the playground at Lane Field a safer place by putting sand under the swings and slide. And then there was all the routine things such as raking leaves, mowing, cleaning ditches, marking the crosswalks, doing little things for the police, fire and recycling departments.

In addition, we maintain the town owned dams and bridges which include four covered bridges now that the Slate Covered Bridge is open again. This year we saw major destruction done to the Carlton Bridge and we had to do minor work on the Cresson and Thompson Bridges seven times. Most of the time these accidents go unreported. Please, if anyone observes an accident with the bridges, please take note of the vehicle and call the police department.

I welcome all town residents to call if they see a tree down or a hole in the road or even a street light out. There is an answering machine on so please leave a message.

A REPORT FROM THE SUPERVISOR OF CEMETERIES

Another year has past and a few changes have taken place in the appearance at some of our cemeteries. You may have noticed the missing pine trees along Route 32. Public Service contacted us and requested that the trees be removed because they were a safety issue. The larger branches were breaking off under the heavy snow loads and had caused many power outages. The removal of trees involved a two mile area starting at the Town Hall and continued toward the Swanzey Lake Road. As part of the deal with the tree company it was agreed that they would remove the stumps. We assisted in the clean up of the wood chips which saved the Town a considerable amount of money.

June Fuerderer then started a campaign for donations to purchase flowering crab apple trees to be planted along the road front of Mt. View Cemetery as replacements for the pine trees. The trees were planted by Barrett's Greenhouse & Nursery in November. June has done a great job on this project. I would like to thank everyone who made a donation to this project and to June for all her hard work.

Burials for this year are lower compared to last year. There were 26 full burials, 20 cremations, one removal and 24 out of town entombed, and 9 local entombed. Mt. View had 20 full burials and 15 cremations whereas Oak Hill had 6 full burials and 5 cremations and Mt. Caesar and Westport had none.

Again Keene Monument Company has been repairing the stones that have received the most damage throughout the year. This has been an ongoing project as the stones and monuments become damaged from tree branches, frost upheaval and vandalism.

RECYCLING CENTER/TRANSFER STATION

Another year full of activity-good and bad. On the plus side, our tonnage recycled increased by 11% to 1,132 tons (11,000 pounds every day the Center was open) and income was \$51,000. On the down side, the markets for most recyclables were the lowest in memory. Some items such as scrap metal have become zero, or negative, revenue until markets improve (which is still cheaper than paying to landfill). We do see some strengthening in the markets by the end of 2002.

While you have probably heard that we are no longer able to accept most paint and paint products, we remind you that you can still dispose of these and other household hazardous waste items at no charge at the household hazardous waste days in Keene. Swanzey participates in at least 12 collection days annually. Please see a recycling attendant for information on how to properly and safely dispose of these items.

And as always, don't forget our free re-use programs, the Free Exchange (don't miss our January White Sale), free kindling for those cold nights, and wood chips for that beautiful yard.

SEWER COMMISSION REPORT

The upgrade of the West Swanzey Wastewater Treatment Plant approved at the Town Meeting 2000 was completed this fall. The upgrade included replacement of the aeration system with a new state of the art system, addition and renovation to the plant building, a new chemical building, a dechlorination system and the removal of 171.5 dry tons of sludge from the lagoons.

Total project cost was \$885,000. with \$750,000. coming from a low interest loan from the state revolving loan fund and the balance from capital reserve fund.

This upgrade should provide service to the village of West Swanzey for another 20 years under current and projected near term federal regulations.

Town funding contributed \$15,750.00 to the cost of home care and \$3,731.00 for the meals-on-wheels program for residents. Agency fund raising efforts defrayed the balance of the cost of care.

For 2002, we request an appropriation for \$16,250.00 to continue home care services for residents and \$4,275.00 for the Meals-On-Wheels Program.

The Health Department is responsible for monitoring both drinking and swimming water at several locations, inspections of foster homes, day care and preschool facilities, investigation of housing complaints, septic system inspections, assistance in lead paint inspections and miscellaneous public health complaint investigations.

2002 TOWN WARRANT Town of Swanzey State of New Hampshire

The Polls will open at 3:00 p.m. and close at 8:00 p.m. The polling area for questions to be decided by official ballot will be located in the cafeteria of the Monadnock Regional High School. The Town Business Meeting will be held in the Monadnock High School Gym and will begin at 7:00 p.m.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Swanzey, in the County of Cheshire, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified that the Annual Town Meeting and elections will be held at the Monadnock Regional High School in said Swanzey on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at 7:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act on the following subjects:

Article 1: To choose by ballot all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2: To vote by ballot on the following amendments to the Town of Swanzey Zoning Ordinance:

Amendment No. 1 Are you in favor of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance:

Delete the existing 3rd paragraph in Item VII of existing Section IX - Flood Plain District Regulations and replace with new 3rd paragraph as follows:

"Along watercourses that have a designated Regulatory Floodway no encroachments, including fill, new construction, substantial improvements, and other development are allowed within the designated Regulatory Floodway unless it has been demonstrated through hydrologic and hydraulic analyses performed in accordance with standard engineering practices that the proposed encroachment would not result in any increase in flood levels within the community during the base flood discharge. In Zone A the Building Inspector shall obtain, review, and reasonably utilize any floodway data available from a Federal, State or other source as criteria for requiring that development meet the floodway requirements of this section."

Add the following language to Item IX as follows:

"4. The community shall:

(a) maintain a record of all variance actions, including their justification for their issuance; and,

(b) report such variances issued in its annual or biennial report submitted to FEMA's Federal Insurance Administrator."

Comment: The proposed amendment is primarily administrative in nature and is in accordance with recommendations made by the Office of State Planning, National Flood Insurance Program.

Amendment No. 2 Are you in favor of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance:

Amend Section X-A.B. (Industrial Park – Permitted Uses) of the Swanzey Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Add Section X-A.B.8. as follows: "Recreation facility conducted as a business".

Add Section X-A.B.9. as follows: "Child care facility".

The following warrant articles will be addressed during the business portion of the Town Meeting beginning at 7:00 p.m. in the gym of the Monadnock High School.

Article 3: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 41:14-a to allow the Selectmen authority to acquire or sell land, buildings, or both, or take any action thereon. These provisions shall remain in effect until specifically rescinded by the Town. RSA 41:14-a requires any such proposed acquisition or sale be submitted to the Planning Board and Conservation Commission and does not apply to town owned conservation land managed and controlled by the Conservation Commission under the provisions of RSA 36-A, town forests established under RSA 31:110 or any real estate given to the town for charitable or community purposes. (Recommended by Selectmen)

Article 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,039,359 which represents the recommended operating budget for the following purposes:

(Recommended by Selectmen)
- **Article 6:** To see if the Town will vote to authorize Selectmen to enter into a three year lease agreement for the purpose of leasing and outfitting three police cruisers and raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 24,470 for the first year's payment for that purpose, or take any action thereon. (Recommended by Selectmen)
- **Article 7:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,200 for the purchase of a digital copier/printer/fax machine for the Police Department, or take any action thereon. (Recommended by Selectmen)

(Recommended by Selectmen)

Article 14: To see of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate from the Carpenter Home Special Revenue Fund the amount of \$ 200,342 to support operation of the Carpenter Home, or take any action thereon. (Recommended by Selectmen)

Article 15: To see if the Town will vote to change the purpose of the Stratton Free Library Capital Reserve fund to an expendable trust fund, subject to the provisions of RSA 31:19-a, for the maintenance and improvements to the Stratton Free Library appointing the Selectmen as agents to expend the fund, or take any action thereon. (2/3 vote required) (Recommended by Selectmen)

Article 16: To see if the Town will vote to create an expendable general fund trust for emergency services communications equipment under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a, and raise and appropriate the sum of

This prohibition applies to events taking place in either public or private facilities of property, regardless of the purpose of the event or activity and whether or not a fee is charged to spectators."







SWANZEY HISTORICAL MUSEUM

The museum got its start in 1982 when Charlie Hanrahan began talking to the Swanzey volunteer fire companies about rebuilding the old steam fire pumper.

At the time Charlie Hanrahan was retired from Kingsbury Tool and was able to obtain space from the company to work on the pumper. Charlie and the firemen began to rebuild the engine without the benefit of the original drawings. The rebuilding phase was also hindered due to the difficulty of building and/or finding the appropriate replacement parts that would actually make the engine work properly.

With the pumper project underway Hanrahan formed a committee to raise funds to build the museum to house the rebuilt pumper and other memorabilia. In the spring of 1987 the committee decided to hire Francis Worcester as curator.

Our next project is to build an addition since we have filled the museum and still have many items that are packed away and no place to display them.

This past year we obtained a grant to have an appraisal done on our preservation activities. This appraisal has resulted into several projects. We are now upgrading our textile storage and placing these items in acid-free boxes, moving the photo albums into museum quality storage and cataloging all the items as they are being upgraded and stored. Also our record collection is being cleaned and restored in museum quality albums.

This year we need to add humidity monitoring equipment and at least one more dehumidifier to the cellar storage area. The furnace room ceiling and door need to be fire-resistant and the windows need to be covered with ultra-violet resistant film.

SLATE COVERED BRIDGE

During July and August of 2000 the Town of Swanzey submitted requests for bids to construct the Slate Bridge. Bids were received and opened in the early part of September with the construction contract being awarded to Wright Construction of Mt. Holly, Vermont.

In October of 2000 the NH DOT removed the Bailey Bridge which had served as the river crossing since the Fall of 1993 and Wright Construction began work on restoring the existing abutments.

January 2001 brought the arrival of construction materials to the Slate Bridge site. In February Wright Construction began work on the first of the two trusses. Each truss is 143 feet in length, 18 feet tall and contains 854 trunnels. Each truss requires a hole to be drilled in it and the trunnel is then driven into place.

During the week of June 11, 2001 a 300 ton crane from American Steel was brought to the site and assembled and on Monday, June 18th a crane from MACMILLIN Company arrived. Both cranes plus a smaller crane from Wright Construction were used to stand the first truss upright so that it could be swung into place across the river.

The first truss was placed on the existing abutments of the two previous Slate Bridges at approximately 2 pm on Monday, June 18,2001. Wednesday, June 20, 2001, saw the placement of the second truss. With the placement of both trusses across the river, Swanzey wrote a new page in its history. On Saturday, October 6, 2001 the Slate Bridge was dedicated.

We had tremendous cooperation from the abutters on both sides of the bridge, who allowed their property to be used for the storage of materials, to allowing a platform for truss construction and also provided easements across their property, and for that, we thank you. I also extend my heartfelt thanks to the Slate Bridge Committee members and to the Selectmen of the Town of Swanzey.

SWANZEY CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT

The Swanzey Conservation Commission (SCC) consists of nine volunteers who are committed to the purpose of the Commission, which is "for the proper utilization and protection of the natural resources" of the Town. The SCC meets regularly on the second Tuesday of each month and frequently attend meetings of the Land Use Boards. The SCC is attentive to site plan applications, particularly those which involve wetlands, and have conducted numerous site visits during the year. A function of the SCC is to review applications for permits to perform work in or near wetlands and to comment to the NH Department of Environmental Services (NH Wetlands Bureau). The environmental impacts of proposed projects that involve surface water, groundwater, forests and other natural assets are usually reviewed by the SCC.

The Swanzey Aquifer Protection Task Force is committed to increase public awareness about Swanzey's groundwater resources. Continuing with the process that began in 1999, SAPTF has been working with the Town's Health Officer to contact businesses that have had best management practices compliance issues. Most recent efforts have included an informational article about the threats on Non-Point Source Pollution and the gasoline additive MtBE to groundwater. Copies are available at the Town Hall's information desk.

The SCC's proudest accomplishment in 2001 was the finalization of the conservation easement on Mrs. Jean Belding's property. The SCC worked with the Monadnock Conservancy and the Belding family to protect this 30+acre parcel on Route 32. Thank you, Mrs. Belding, for preserving your lovely field for present and future generations of Swanzey residents to appreciate.

The SCC is a member of the NH Association of Conservation Commissions and works with the NH Office of State Planning to monitor properties in town that are protected by conservation easements and the Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP). These properties include the town forest on Mt. Cresson, the Muster Field in West Swanzey and the Tracy parcel on Causeway Road. The LCIP conservation easement on Honey Hill is also monitored and the public is encouraged to hike its trail system. Maps and trail guides are available at the Town Hall. The SCC is involved in the California Brook Natural Area Group, a collaboration of conservation interests from Swanzey, Keene, and Chesterfield with the goal to establish a continuous trail system and the preservation of the watershed.

We have a member who serves on the Master Plan Committee and there were several members who participated in the Swanzey Community Profile Project. The SCC donated their time to provide activities for the children who attended the Swanzey Lake Recreation Camp. This included conservation related presentations about animals, Native Americans, and native plants. Members also maintain bluebird houses on Muster Field and duck boxes on Ice Pond. The SCC offered an environmental studies scholarship to a senior student at Monadnock Regional High School and sponsored a campership which enabled a Swanzey boy to attend the state 4-H Conservation Camp. The SCC also sponsored its annual Ashuelot River canoe trip in May which the public is invited to enjoy.

Most of SCC's activities involve efforts to uphold town and state regulations that protect wetlands. The SCC worked with several Swanzey landowners in 2001 to advise and assist their efforts to obtain necessary state wetlands permits to undertake regulated activities on their properties. The SCC also produced a wetlands brochure to inform residents about what constitutes a wetland, why wetlands are valued and protected, and what activities are regulated and require permits. In 2002 the SCC plan to contact shoreland property owners to be certain they all understand the laws that regulate the use of shorelands, including the installation of docks.

The SCC again requests that the voters of Swanzey appropriate \$3,000. to the Conservation Capital Reserve Fund for future acquisitions of conservation easements or land. The pressures of commercial and residential development in several areas of Swanzey emphasize the importance of preserving additional areas of open space so that future residents may enjoy our natural habitats as well.

ASHUELOT RIVER LOCAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The LAC successfully completed the first season of a new volunteer water quality monitoring program for the Ashuelot main stem. LAC members, Monadnock Sierra Club members and other residents collected river water samples four times during the summer and conducted testing of chemical and biological characteristics. This is the beginning of what is planned to be a long term monitoring project to protect the health of the river and all those who enjoy it.

The Ashuelot River LAC finalized two publications for use by municipal officials, educators and the general public: The Ashuelot River Corridor Management Plan and The Atlas of the Ashuelot River. These documents will be distributed early in 2002.

The LAC reviewed and commented on nine applications for NH wetlands permits during 2001 and two applications for site specific permits. The LAC exercises a role in this process of ensuring attention to basic environmental issues, particularly relationships between site-specific activity and off-site conditions, such as down stream effects on water quality or hydrology and impacts on wildlife movements.

The Ashuelot River presently has 12 dams, four of which generate power to the grid. During 2001 proposals to breach three dams were deliberated locally and statewide. Motivation for dam removal includes relieving owners of the burden of maintenance and restoration of stream ecology. The Ashuelot River is part of the Connecticut River anadromous fish restoration efforts and of particular interest to the NH Fish & Game for shad, herring and eel production. The LAC continued to participate in the NH River Restoration Task Force, a coalition of private and government agencies to better understand the research and public involvement needs regarding proposals to breach or remove dams. In 2001, the destruction plans for the dam in downtown Winchester neared completion, the McGoldrick Dam in Hinsdale (formerly the G.E. Robertson Dam) was removed, and deliberations about the Homestead Dam in West Swanzey continue. The LAC advocates a public process by which decisions about breaching dams can be made based on comprehensive environmental review, including community considerations.

The LAC continues to inform itself on issues affecting the Ashuelot River and the watershed, and participates in discussions locally and statewide as advocates for the river and its communities. The Ashuelot River LAC meets the evening of the third Tuesday of each month in the Keene Public Library. For information contact the Southwest Region Planning Commission.

2001 TOWN MEETING MINUTES Town of Swanzey State of New Hampshire

The Polls opened at 3:00 p.m. and closed at 8:00 p.m. The polling area for questions to be decided by official ballot was located in the cafeteria of the Monadnock Regional High School. The Town Business Meeting was held in the Monadnock High School Gym.

Moderator Gus Lerandeau called Town Meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. He began the meeting by asking James Devine to lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Moderator Lerandeau recognized Selectman Charles Beauregard, Jr. who read the dedication page of the Town Report. This year's town report was dedicated to William M. Smith who was a long time resident of Swanzey and who was involved over the years in the fire department and police department.

Selectman Beauregard than read a statement in memory of Bernard "Mickey" Lambert, which goes as follows:

"This board, as well as residents of our town and region, was saddened by the passing of Selectman Bernard J. "Mickey" Lambert, just 3 weeks ago. Mickey collapsed while serving his town at the Legislature. He was proud to represent our town in Concord. It was just one of the many positions he held in his lifetime of service to Swanzey. Mickey was born in West Swanzey and grew up there, attending Keene High School and working at the Homestead Woolen Mill for many years. He was active in many aspects of town life. He served as a member of the fire department since 1952, almost 50 years. During his tenure with the department, Mickey held the positions of Deputy Fire Chief and Civil Defense Director. He was a member of the West Swanzey athletic association serving many years as its President. He was active in his church, St. Anthony's Parish. Mickey enjoyed sporting events and could frequently be seen at ball games at Brown Field and Alumni Field. He was an avid Swamp Bats fan. When they had a Wednesday evening game in Keene, he applied himself to making sure the selectmen's Meeting was over in time so he could get to at least part of the game. In addition to his interest in local sporting events, Mickey's routine included much of what makes up New England small town life traveling to county fairs through New Hampshire, Maine, Vermont, Massachusetts, and New York, the weekend church supper "circuit", Saturday night at the Hinsdale Race Track and some relatively new rituals like Sunday evening coffee at Dunkin Donuts. Mickey enjoyed community activities, reaching out to help those in need, spreading joy by taking children to circuses and fairs, laughing with his neighbors and friends. All of us will miss Mickey. His steady and continuing contributions to our community have left their mark on us. Our sympathies to his family and those who loved him. We would ask that you all join us in a moment of silence in remembrance of Mickey Lambert."

The Town of Swanzey was awarded a three-year federal grant in the spring of 1999 covering 100% of the regular payroll and benefits costs for the school resource officer who works regularly at the Monadnock Regional High School.

Article 5: It was voted in favor of raising and appropriating the sum of \$66,528 for the purpose of a regional prosecutor. Other town's participating in the regional prosecutor program are anticipated to contribute \$44,984 towards the purposes of this program. The amount to be raised from taxation in support of this article from the Town of Swanzey is \$21,544.

Article 6: It was voted in favor of raising and appropriating the sum of \$ 26,000 to purchase and outfit a police cruiser.

Article 7: It was voted in favor of raising and appropriating the sum of \$21,000 for purchase of defibrillator units for the Fire Department.

Article 8: It was voted by paper ballot in favor of adopting the provisions of RSA 31:95-c to restrict revenues generated by Carpenter Home operations and properties, under the control of the Carpenter Home Trustees, to expenditures for the Carpenter Home. Such revenues and expenditures shall be accounted for in a special revenue fund to be known as the Carpenter Home Special Revenue Fund, separate from the general fund. Any surplus in said fund shall not be deemed part of the general fund accumulated surplus and shall only be expended after vote of the legislative body to appropriate a specific amount from said fund for a specific purpose related to the fund of source of revenue. (Majority Ballot Vote)

Article 9: It was voted in favor of authorizing the Selectmen to layout as a Class V town maintained highway an additional section of California Brook Road, now Class VI, running northwesterly approximately 2,250 feet from Ridgeview Road (private road) to a point approximately 300 feet beyond Pondview Extension (private road) to include a turn around area. This layout request was submitted to Selectmen by petition. Its purpose, as set forth in the petition, is to provide better access for 128 Pondview Extension and frontage for Tax Map 79 Lot 6 so that it may be developed. Article 10: It was voted in favor of raising and appropriating from the Carpenter Home Special Revenue Fund the amount of \$ 200,682 for operation of the Carpenter Home. (Recommended by Selectmen/Recommended by Carpenter Home Trustees)

Article 11: It was voted in favor of authorizing the Selectmen to accept from Stratton Free Library Trustees a deed conveying to the Town of Swanzey the real estate at 9 Main Street in the Village of West Swanzey known as the Stratton Free Library, and authorize Selectmen to enter into an agreement to provide for continued use of the property by the Stratton Library Trustees for purposes in accordance with the terms of the bequest of George Stratton. (Recommended by Selectmen/Recommended by Stratton Free Library Trustees)

Article 12: It was voted in favor of appointing the Selectmen as agents to expend the Stratton Free Library Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen/Recommended by Stratton Free Library Trustees)

Article 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of \$ 160,000 for construction of an addition to the Stratton Free Library, authorize withdrawal of \$ 32,000 available in capital reserve for this purpose and authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend unanticipated money from state, federal, other governmental sources or a private source which becomes available during the year to reduce support required by taxation for this project, or take any action thereon. (Recommended by Selectmen/Recommended by Stratton Free Library Trustees)

This Article was amended to read as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of \$125,000 for construction of an addition to the Stratton Free Library, authorize withdrawal of \$32,000 available in capital reserve for this purpose and authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend unanticipated money from state, federal, other governmental sources of a private source which becomes available during the year to reduce support required by taxation for this project, or take any action thereon. (Recommended by Selectmen/Recommended by Stratton Free Library Trustees) The vote was taken by Yes/No paper ballots.

The Article passes as amended.

Article 15: It was voted in favor of creating an expendable general fund trust, under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a, for planning, repairs, improvements and maintenance of Whitcomb Hall, to raise and appropriate the amount of \$ 30,000 to be placed in this trust, and appoint Selectmen as agents to expend.

Article 16: It was voted in favor of creating an expendable general fund trust for revaluations and assessment updates, under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 20,000 to be placed in this trust and appoint the Selectmen as agents to expend.

Article 17: It was voted in favor of raising and appropriating the sum of \$233,750 to be placed in the following capital reserve and expendable trust accounts of the town:
