## RESULTS OF THE JACKSON TOWN MEETING MARCH 14, 2009

Polls were opened at 8 AM and closed at 7 PM on March 10<sup>th</sup> by Moderator Willis Kelley to vote on Articles 1 through 5.

The town meeting was called to order by Moderator Willis Kelley on Saturday, March 14, 2009 at 9:34am. Moderator Kelley thanked everyone for attending the first ever Saturday meeting then led the attendees in the Pledge of Allegiance and one verses of God bless America. Sam Harding provided a blessing. Moderator Kelley thanked Ed Dubie for 49 years in fire department as well as Susan Way, Julie Maiorano and Tracey Scranton for their service. He then introduced Bea Davis, chair of the selectmen who introduced Jeanette Heidmann, the new Deputy Town Clerk and Tax Collector. Bea provided an update on Stephen Illsley who injured his hand while working in the town maintenance facility. It is expected he should regain full use of his hand.

Moderator Kelley then reminded attendees of the rules for the meeting: he will not tolerate shouting matches and suggested we all work together to achieve a common outcome for the town. He will allow anyone to speak on the article at hand and reminded attendees the last article is an open discussion but that article does not allow for the raising or spending of funds.

Moderator Kelley suggested and a motion was made, seconded and passed to dispense with the reading of the warrant as this was going to be read as each article came up.

As in the past few years the categories of some articles were grouped together at the suggestion of the Department of Revenue Administration. Although we will discuss each line item, the voting will be based on the total appropriation. The line items can be adjusted if the voters feel it is necessary.

Dave Mason provided a brief overview of the budget as presented this year. While the budget looks like \$2M vs. \$1.9 last year, in reality, there is a bond article for \$618K which will not be funded with taxes. In 2008 we funded \$1,477,839 with taxes and propose funding \$1,405,474 (a 5% reduction over 2008) in 2009. The tax rate is comprised of several parts: Municipal, School and County totaling \$10.96. The 5% reduction to the municipal portion would result in a reduction from \$4.41 to \$4.19/thousand.

Articles 1-5 were voted on by ballot during polling hours on March 10, 2009.

ARTICLE 2: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.1 as proposed by the Planning Board to the Jackson Zoning Ordinance, in order to correct an omission from last year and to clarify meanings in the new Site Disturbance section?

#### 3. Definitions

3.2 "Accessory Apartment means a room or rooms which meets the definition of a Dwelling Unit and which is accessory to a principal Dwelling Unit on the same lot.

[(The definition inserted here was part of proposed Accessory Apartment amendment that the Planning Board presented at public hearings in 2007; it was inadvertently omitted from the warrant for the March 11, 2008, Town Meeting. It will be presented to the town for a vote at the March 2009 Meeting.)]

- 3.5 ["Building Development" means the process of changing the character of the land from its existing condition to a more useable condition by the construction or placement of a building or buildings thereon.]
- **3.14** "Erosion" means the wearing away of the ground surface as a result of the action or effect of wind, water, ice, snow and/or land disturbance activities.
- 3.18 "Land Development" means the process of changing the character of the land from its existing condition by any construction or grading activities including but not limited to placement of a building or structure on the land.
- **3.32** "Sedimentation" means the deposition of sediment resulting from Erosion or construction-vehicle tracking.
- **3.33** "Site Disturbance" means any human activity that removes the Vegetative Cover from the land surface.
- 3.41 "Vegetative Cover" means grasses, shrubs, trees, and other vegetation that hold and stabilize soils. (Renumbering will be necessary)

- ARTICLE 3: Are you in favor of the adoption Amendment No.2 as proposed by the Planning Board to the Jackson Zoning Ordinance, to ensure that reasonable measures will be taken to minimize chances of erosion, providing greater protection for both neighboring and Town lands?

  Section 4 District Regulations
  - **4.1.6 Site Disturbance** Any Site Disturbance or Land Development shall be designed and performed reasonably to prevent increased run-off, soil loss or Erosion from the site or lot.
  - **4.1.6.1** Design guidelines which may be used by developers, Disturbance or Land Development activities will be available in the Town Office for review and use in designing site work so as to minimize Erosion and Sedimentation.
  - **4.1.6.2** All areas of Site Disturbance and Land Development still in progress at approach of winter shall be stabilized against Erosion and Sedimentation prior to November 15th, to minimize soil depletion and degradation over winter.

ARTICLE 4: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.3 as proposed by the Planning Board to the Jackson Zoning Ordinance, in order to make clear that compliance with the State Building Code is required?

15.2 Compliance with State Building Codes and Regulations All construction, extension, removal or alteration of a building or structure shall comply with the requirements of the State Building Code (SBC), State of New Hampshire RSA 155-A. Section R105 (Permits) within the International Residential code (IRC), and Section 105 (Permits) within the International Building Code (IBC) shall be superseded in part by the permit process described in Section 15.3 of this Ordinance. The words "building" and "structure" are defined in the IBC.

ARTICLE 5: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.4 as proposed by the Planning Board to the Jackson Zoning Ordinance, to codify existing practices reflecting compliance with the Sate Building Code. Some work will no longer require building permits; some will require permits, but no permit fees. In general, building permit applications will need to be filed for most construction and alteration work in order to ensure compliance with State codes. The threshold at which a permit fee must be paid is not changed?

15.3 Requirement of Building Permit (formerly Section 15.2-will be renumbered throughout as necessary)

15.3.1 (changed from existing 15.2.1) A building permit shall be obtained before a building or structure is constructed, extended, removed or altered, including, without limitation, [This requirement also applies to] swimming pools, mobile homes, modular homes and exterior signs, and

the like, unless specifically exempted below. An alteration(s) to an existing building or structure [within the existing footprint] that does not: [exceed \$10,000 in estimated value shall not require a permit.]

- (i) modify the volume or footprint of the building or structure, or
- (ii) affect any supporting or structural elements of the building or structure, or
- (iii) involve new plumbing or electrical work or changes to existing plumbing or electrical components

shall not require a building permit. Likewise, any alternation to an existing building or structure that is exempted by the IRC, IBC, or SBC from requiring a permit shall not require a building permit from the Town of Jackson. Emergency repairs and maintenance shall be handled in accordance with the IRC or IBC, as applicable

15.3.2 (existing 15.2.2)-no change

Insert new 15.3.3 No fee shall be due for any proposed work for which the estimated value of the completed project does not exceed \$10,000. The fact that a fee is not required shall not eliminate the need to obtain a building permit.

**15.3.4** (existing 15.2.3) Delete last sentence: [The Zoning Board of Adjustment may, upon appeal, special exception or variance, direct issuance of a permit.]

15.3.5 &15.3.6 (existing 15.2.2 & 15.2.5) -no change

**15.2.6.** Delete in its entirety: [No permit shall be transferred to a subsequent owner.]

15.3.7 through 15.3.10 (existing 15.2.7 through 15.2.10) - no change 15.3.11 (changed from existing 15.2.11) Occupancy permits shall be obtained from the Board of Selectmen or Building Inspector when and if required by the State Building Code. To the extent that the SBC may require that a building or structure that has been altered, or changed in use, not be occupied until a Certificate of Occupancy has been issued, the Building Inspector may waive this provision to permit occupancy during the pendency of the Certificate of Occupancy if the Building Inspector concludes that the safety of the occupants and surrounding buildings and structures is not compromised.

Results Yes 129 No 183

Dick Badger inquired how many votes had been cast. Moderator Kelley noted the total was 330.

**ARTICLE 6:** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 1,000,000.00 for the purpose of building a new Public Safety Facility and Sand/Salt Shed (the "Project"); \$618,19 9.00 of such sum to come from bonds or notes issued by the Town in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33); furthermore, to see if the town will vote to discontinue the Town's

Public Safety Facility Capital Reserve Fund created in 2005; and to authorize the withdrawal of \$278,691.00 plus any accumulated interest in this fund. Furthermore, to see if the town will vote to discontinue the Sand and Salt Shed Trust Fund created in 2007 and to authorize the withdrawal \$103,110.00 plus any accumulated interest in this fund. Furthermore to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest, maturity, and other terms thereof; and to authorize the Selectmen to take all other action required to carry out the vote and complete the project. 2/3 Ballot Vote required. Selectmen Favor.

After reading the article, Moderator Kelley reiterated the vote requires 2/3 majority to pass and will be a written vote. Once open, the poles will stay open for 90 minutes or the end of the meeting whichever comes first. The article was moved and seconded.

DISCUSSION: Although not part of the article, there was extensive discussion on the potential location of the project with several town people and the selectmen providing background on the potential site locations. Some were unconvinced that Bartlett is not interested in releasing land at the transfer station despite repeated overtures to that effect. While most everyone agreed on the critical need for these facilities, there remains hesitation with proceeding at this time until additional study or a revised master plan for the Gray's Inn location are presented to the town. The former transfer site was also suggested as a possible location and this may be considered after the results of the ongoing environmental impact study. Since this article doesn't speak to the location of the facilities, Moderator Kelley took a straw poll asking by a show of hands how many were in favor of the Gray's Inn location – 51 Responded positively. Then he asked for a straw poll with a show of hands how many were interested in a different location – 61 responded positively. After more discussion, the vote was taken.

**ARTICLE 7:** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$37,753.00 for the purpose of Highway Repair and Reconstruction, said funds to come from the Special Revenue Fund known as the <u>Highway Repair and Reconstruction Fund</u> held by the Treasurer.

DISCUSSION: Dave Mason, selectman, proposed an amendment to item O to reduce that line to \$17,000 since the balance is expected to be collected in fees. The increase in town fees was questioned by Dick Badger. The explanation was that a minute taker was not included last year, there were increases for Elections & Equipment, and a larger portion of the property needs to be reevaluated. The question was asked if the item F effort went out to bid. Rob Hatch of the highway dept indicated he specked two machines. Gino Funicella, selectman, interjected that each year of the lease has to be voted on for each subsequent year. In other words, while we entered into a multi year municipal lease, each year is enacted upon separately. Ray Abbott suggested purchase not lease. Bill Wogish was on the committee with the highway department. They negotiated the price down to \$23,300 (less \$3,300). This is a \$110K piece of equip. The lease has an out-clause where we can return at no charge, except for any damages. We can use the equipment up to 1000 hrs/year. In either case, they got quotes from both John Deer and Caterpillar, the town would own the equipment at the end if the lease. Lease costs would cover the warranty for the life of the lease. The current machine would be moved to the transfer station and a 1/2 interest sold to Bartlett. Regarding item M: A citizen asked if Bartlett approved their half of the cost for this facility. Selectmen indicated Bartlett did not put on their warrant so it won't "fly". As a result, a citizen recommend taking item M out of the budget. The selectmen recommended keeping the item in the budget with the rationale that we are already 5% below last year for municipal budget. At some time we need to set aside the \$60K for this item. Next March we would take the funds from the unencumbered balance and move to a capital reserve account. A question was asked if we can do something just to improve the conditions for the Jackson folks. Selectmen replied the transfer station is supposed to operate as a joint facility. That is not happening so the respective selectmen will meet to resolve.

Moderator Willis entertained a motion to reduce article 8 by \$86,300 to \$1,141,021 Moved and seconded, Motion to amend carried Vote on amended amount of \$1,141,021 for article 8 Vote: Verbal approval

Jerry Dougherty, Vice Moderator, move to move forward in the warrant to articles 22 & 23. By way of explanation, articles 22 & 23 relate to capital reserve funds that exist. These two articles would force the town to put the funds in the capital reserve fund even if the revenue were not available forcing a potential loan situation. Article 9 seeks to raise the exact amount of funds but puts the \$125K total into a general fund then the available funds would be moved when the revenue is available.

Vote on motion to move forward to 22&23

Verbal approval to move forward to 22

Moved and seconded.

**DISCUSSION**: After the passage of articles 22 & 23, the order returned to article 9

Vote: Verbal defeat

At this point the polls were closed and there was a five minute recess to count the ballots on article 6.

**DISCUSSION:** A question was asked what these funds were for and Karl Meyers, police chief, responded they would be used toward a new computer system.

**DISCUSSION:** A citizen inquired if this is enough to fix the green bridge? The selectmen replied it was not but that we have applied to the state. If approved the state would fund 80% so we must have the balance available. The selectmen clarified that we have 3 bridges on the red list so have gone to the state for all three.

**ARTICLE 20:** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be placed in the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund. Selectmen Favor.

**DISCUSSION**: A citizen asked the balances in these funds. A selectman indicated the fund is basically empty.

**ARTICLE 21:** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,600.00 to be placed in the Ambulance Capital Reserve Fund. Selectmen Favor.

**DISCUSSION**: A citizen asked the account balance. A selectmen indicated there is currently \$56.9K and this is the balance we need. This will actually be expended to find an ambulance. Since the fees have been increased and Medicare is paying more, they are hoping to be self sufficient.

**ARTICLE 22:** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75,000.00 to be placed in the <u>Highway Truck Capital Reserve Fund.</u> Selectmen do not recommend.

**DISCUSSION**: A selectman thanked the capital improvement committee and outlined the financial prospect for the coming year. Essentially the town bills behind for things we are paying for now. We know some costs such as the school will go up and revenue from the state may go down. The town has set up with treasurer a sure note. We don't set tax rate and send out bill till mid Nov to receive funds in Dec. If article 22 is passed, the funds must be transferred into the capital reserve fund whether we have them or not. This being the case, we must borrow funds to pay to ourselves. This option gives us more flexibility. Moderator Kelley reiterated if we pass article 22 you mandate the selectmen to fund the capital fund, which must be done by December 15. The selectmen voted 2-1 not to recommend

Vote: Verbal approval

**ARTICLE 23:** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 to be placed in the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund. Selectmen do not recommend.

**DISCUSSION:** None Vote: Verbal approval

**ARTICLE 24:** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$26,500.00 for renovations including compliance with fire codes to the Jackson Fire Department building. This will be a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7, VI and will not lapse until the renovation is complete or by December 31, 2010, whichever is sooner. Selectmen Favor.

Moved and seconded

**DISCUSSION**: A question was raised what these funds are or since the town has been raising funds for the fire station for three years. Moderator Kelley responded that this will put hot top in the front of the building.

**ARTICLE 25:** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$17,000.00 from the Baker Prospect Farm Trust for the purpose of maintaining the Forestry Management plan voted by the town in 2003.

**DISCUSSION**: A citizen asked why we were paying for a new plan when we never did anything with the old one. The conservation commission indicated we are not doing another plan, but are doing work up there to improve road and permit logging up there. Their desire is to start something which is easy to maintain.

**ARTICLE 26:** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$1,771.00** for the support of the White Mountain Community Health Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joan Goettler, et al. Selectmen Favor.

**ARTICLE 32:** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$624.00 for the Mount Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross. Agreeable to a petition signed by Lisa White, et al. Selectmen Favor.

DISCUSSION: None Vote: Verbal approval

**ARTICLE 33:** To see if the town will authorize the Library trustees, pursuant to RSA 202-A: 4-d, to accept gifts of personal property, other than money, which may be offered to the library for any public purpose. If voted this article shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the town.

Moved and seconded

**DISCUSSION:** None Vote: Verbal approval

**ARTICLE 34:** To see if the town will vote in support of a proposal made jointly by the Library Trustees and the Jackson Historical Society to re-erect the Trickey Barn on the Gray's Inn Property owned by the town for use a public library. It is the intent of the Library Trustees and the Historical Society, if this article is passed, to engage in fund raising and to use funds in the Jackson Public Library Capital Reserve Fund established in 2008. The Library trustees were named agents to expend in Article 24, in 2008.

Moved and seconded

**DISCUSSION**: A citizen asked how we can vote to erect the barn on the Grays inn property if we don't have a master plan. A selectman replied that we have had 3 master plans and the library was included in those plans. Alan Brooks reminded attendees the library placement was done by professionals (architect et al) with the location and parking considered. There were several comments referring back to the discussion on article 6 and the discussion was closed by the Moderator reminding attendees that everyone in the town needs to work together Vote: Verbal approval

**ARTICLE 35:** To see if the voters of the Town of Jackson would like to establish a <u>Capital Reserve Fund</u> for the purpose of <u>Road Construction</u> for town roads; Furthermore to name Board of Selectmen as agents to expend. Moved and seconded

**DISCUSSION:** A question was asked why there is no funding associated with this. The selectmen indicated this arose out of discussion by the capital construction committee which recommended \$160,000. Selectmen chose not to support the funding but to still establish the fund as dollars are available. Another option would be to fix roads with bond. To have all roads reconstructed would be \$3.2M. We have 35 miles of road. \$160,000 would have fixed 1 mile of road. If people think we really need to fix the roads, then we need to approach the bond issue. The moderator agreed to fix the article wording to re-construction as a clerical correction. There was general agreement that the town needs a long range plan to approach this challenge.

Vote: Verbal approval

**ARTICLE 36:** To see if the voters of the Town of Jackson would like to authorize the Board of Selectmen to explore the idea of bond financing for road construction in future years.

Moved and seconded

DISCUSSION: None Vote: Verbal approval

**ARTICLE 37:** To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to enter into a lease of *the town hall to the* (indicates an administrative change for accuracy) Jackson Historical Society upon such terms and conditions as the selectmen shall deem prudent. If this article passes, the Society will use the Town Hall as its headquarters to house its archive of documents and photographs pertaining to the history of Jackson and display its collection of antique maps, paintings and other artifacts. A program for the modernization and preservation as well as the continuing maintenance of the building shall be paid by the society. It is the goal of the society to establish the Town Hall as a cultural center for the history of Jackson, the visual arts and to create a facility available for use by other groups and individuals in Jackson.

Moved and seconded

**DISCUSSION**: Someone asked the terms of the lease. Selectmen indicated it is currently suggested at 15 years with the right of renewal as well as a right to extinguish the lease if we need to move the road. There was discussion of a public hearing to address the contents of the lease but the vice-moderator pointed out if we don't pass the article, then the town can't even proceed Vote: Verbal approval

**ARTICLE 38:** To act upon other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Sam Harding asked about the status of cable television (local channel 3). The selectmen indicated the funds were in the general fund and that we had Time Warner come in three months ago and are waiting to hear back from them. There appeared to be some disagreement as to who has an action and the selectmen agreed the communications need to be clarified.

Sarah Clemons thanked the various people on all the committees and the selectmen.

Joyce Allen inquired on the result of the request to study the number of occasions of cancer in town.

Martha Benesh indicated the study is under way and should have results within the next couple of months.

Moderator Kelley closed by asking if the attendees preferred to have the deliberative session on Saturday. There was a show of hands which was indecisive.

The Moderator dissolved the meeting at 2:20pm

#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The sudden and untimely passing of long-time employee Michael Clemons, a truly wonderful person of outstanding character saddened us all. This Town Report is thereby dedicated to Mike with a deep appreciation for his many years of service to our town.

During 2009, the Selectmen/Board hired a Road Agent and crew led by Jay Henry; a new Office Administrator, Diane Falcey; Deputy Tax Agent, Jeanette Heidmann; and Linda Dresch to round out the team. These employee changes have led to rapid improvements in the operation of the town. The changes have enabled the Selectmen to get a much better handle on the town operations and have allowed your elected officials to more quickly and efficiently address errors and potential pitfalls and then correct them once uncovered. Moving forward, the improvements will enable future select bodies to have greater faith in the accuracy of the associated costs and dissemination of town information. During the past year, many residents who gave their valuable time aided us in the performance of our duties. Among these were the town treasurer, moderator, the planning and zoning boards, conservation commission, supervisors of the checklist and the trustees of library and cemetery.

The five-year reassessment process was completed this past year updating the valuation of the town by an increase of 47 million dollars. These increases mainly took place during 2005, 2006 and 2007. In 2008 and 2009 values stayed flat or went down somewhat.

The Selectmen are solidly behind the bond request for a new town garage located on the town owned land commonly called the Gray's Inn property. This garage, if approved, will enable our road crew to bring all vehicles indoors for repairs and maintenance. Its setting on the Gray's Inn land at 400 feet from Main Street will free-up the current location for potential needs of the Fire Department. The site for the new Public Safety Facility and Salt Shed will be unseen from Main Street and nearly the same to businesses in the area. There will be special sound devices installed on equipment to lower noise levels; lighting in the garage yard will be as unobtrusive as practical. Special thanks to the committee who spent many hours in the field and office working on the project.

The warrant asks for an additional \$125,000 commitment for the new town library. These funds will come from the unreserved fund balance, which does not require an increase in taxes. This will help complete the job and will enable the facility to be ready for operation by late 2010 or early 2011. This state-of-the-art building will be a credit to Jackson residents of today and long into the future. The budget you are asked to approve is nearly identical in dollar expenditures to

last year's and is in keeping with continued efforts to hold the line on municipal tax increases.

It is hoped that by the time of the annual meeting, the town will have settled its problems with the transfer station partnership with Bartlett. Our efforts have been redoubled the past few years to gain adherence to the contract.

We continue our commitment to upholding the zoning requirements of the Town of Jackson. The town decided over 50 years ago to have a building permit process and over the years, the Select Board and townspeople have continually budgeted tax dollars to uphold the process. We observe state law first, last and always and do not have a choice in this matter. As elected officials, the Selectmen take these laws seriously and do all we can to uphold them, as our sworn oath requires. To do less would be illegal. The outpouring of support by many in the town for the select body and its decision-making processes was much appreciated.

As we all go forward, we trust the will of all the people and follow the dictates of our conscience and the laws of the State of New Hampshire and ordinances of the Town of Jackson. We don't have to always agree, but we should make an attempt to be agreeable.

#### **JACKSON FIRE DEPARTMENT**

I would like to begin by saying that my first full year as the Fire Chief has been enjoyable. We have had some very difficult calls in town and I would like to thank my officers and members for helping me through this year. I would also like to thank Shawn Bergeron and Bob Goudreau for helping me out with fire inspections. Bob Goudreau is our new Fire Inspector and his is working out very well. He is keeping office hours on Tuesdays and Thursdays if you should need to reach him.

A very difficult part of our year was the loss of Michael Clemons, who had been one of the most dedicated firefighters to ever pass through the Jackson Fire Department. He will be greatly missed by all.

The newest addition to our fleet is a 2009 Ford F-550 utility truck, which is working out extremely well. This truck carries our breathing air and miscellaneous equipment. Unfortunately we suffered a massive pump failure on our 1989 Mack Pumper. It has been fixed and is back in service, however the future replacement for this truck is expected to be 2015 and is currently being planned.

Our radio system on top of Tyrol now has a small windmill that is supplementing the solar panel with 12 volt power. We also have a new monitoring system in place to keep track of the voltage. A number of times last winter this system was under powered for our radio transmission needs for emergencies.

Propane calls seem to be up in the past few years so please mark and protect all propane tanks, including those buried underground. It is especially difficult to find propane leaks in the winter when we cannot even locate the tank. Above ground tanks should routinely be cleaned of snow. The vent holes in the cover are there for a reason and need to be kept clear. Blockages of snow and ice can cause a back up of Carbon Monoxide or propane into your home.

Please remember to check your smoke detectors and CO detector batteries twice a year. If your CO detector is alerting, please do not hesitate to call 911. These devices <u>have</u> saved lives. If either your smoke detector or CO detector is sounding, you should leave the house immediately and call 911.

Please also make sure your house is properly numbered so that all emergency services can locate your house easily in the event of an emergency.

The new addition on the fire station is finally complete and we are enjoying the increased space and insulation. If anyone would like to join the Jackson Fire Department, please contact Chief Jay Henry at 383-4090 or come to one of our meetings held on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at 6:30PM at the

Fire Station. A desire to help your community is all that is required to join. Training will follow later.

The Jackson Fire Fighters Association greatly appreciates the support of the town and the community for their fund-raising efforts in the acquisition of the thermal imaging equipment. This fund raising effort exceeded our expectations and allowed us to acquire this critical piece of life saving equipment.

We would also like to thank the people of Jackson, the Jackson Selectmen, the Bartlett Fire Department, Bartlett-Jackson Ambulance Service and the members of the Jackson Fire Department for their support throughout 2009.

In 2009, 31 members trained locally, took special courses out of town, responded to calls and spent other hours working for the Jackson Fire Department. This took time away from their families and work places and totaled 2,266 hours.

- 188 hours for Chief's work (paperwork, inspections, meetings, etc.)
- 775 hours were spent responding to calls in Jackson.
- 251 hours were spent responding to out of town calls.

#### JACKSON POLICE DEPARTMENT

2009 has been our busiest year yet. To name a few of the bigger items, we had two fatal motor vehicle accidents, a suicide, a rise in the number of underage alcohol drinking parties and the number of arrests is up from 26 in 2008 to 37. We arrested four men who burglarized a residence and in doing so set off the burglar alarm. They were caught as they were making their get-away. As usual, motor vehicle complaints remain our #1 complaint, specifically speeding. The Police Department has issued 131 tickets for various violations with the bulk of them being speeding related.

In March, we learned of a grant from President Obama's Stimulus Funds that paid for 100% a third full-time police officer (wages, health benefits and over-time) for 3 years. We applied for it, but unfortunately did not receive it. The Police Department applied for this grant as we have seen an increase in our activities and work load over the years and to increase coverage as well. In addition, two officers covering Jackson for 7 days a week, 24 hours a day, on-call or on-duty is wearing us down. Since we were not awarded the grant, the Police Department is now looking for support from the town's people by voting for the creation of a position for a third full-time officer. A third officer would give the Police Department more flexibility on coverage (ex. When an officer is out of town, the work schedule can be altered to create coverage until the officer returns) and would increase coverage from having an officer on for only 10 hours a day to 18 hours a day.

The Police Department wants people to know we do not charge our citizens when they need to be printed for employment, to participate in school related activities or for other reasons. For the parents, we will fingerprint your child so you can have a set of prints.

The Police Department has had another good year of working with the Jackson Fire Dept. and the Bartlett/Jackson Ambulance. We thank them both for their support and giving us the assistance that were not their responsibilities but they went the extra mile to help us. The Police Department wishes also to recognize the Highway Dept. as they have undergone changes and have had their own challenges but continued to assist us however they could. In closing the Police Department thanks the Board of Selectmen for their support and faith. Without their backing us, a lot of what we do could not be done.

#### JACKSON HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The Jackson Highway Department lost a great member this year with the passing of Michael Clemons. He will be greatly missed by the Highway Department as well as the whole town.

The Highway Department has a brand new crew for 2010, and we will try to please everyone as much as we can while still providing top notch service.

The new 2009 Paystar truck is proving to be a very good addition to our fleet. We replaced the Case backhoe with a new Caterpillar backhoe this year, but we will need to stay on schedule for replacement of equipment in order to not get behind and have to replace too many pieces at once. For example, we expect to need a new truck for 2010 as well as a new grader sometime in the future.

The Tin Mine Road project has been completed, including the final paving. Lower Highlands, Red Barn Road, Switchback Way and Old Jackson Road were also paved. Many ditches have been cleared and shoulders shimmed with gravel. The next project needs to be a "reclaim" from Middle Mountain to the top of Tyrol. A "reclaim" means that the existing asphalt will be pulverized in place and then inorporated into a useable base course to be paved over. This recycles the existing asphalt and saves transportation costs while still giving us a new solid base. Additionally, Green Hill Road will need paving and Sugar Hill Lane will need some major work.

The small building located at the ball field was replaced with a newer one, at <u>no</u> <u>expense</u> to the taxpayers thanks to the Lila Pond Trust. Everyone should enjoy this upgrade.

For the first time ever, the Highway Department is up and running with a new computer. This should make access to information as well as record keeping much easier. We are also thinking about reconstructing the sidewalk from the Wildcat Service Station to the bridge in the future.

Please try to drive carefully in the winter months. We try our best to keep the roadways of Jackson safe, but as you all know, it's hard to compete with Mother Nature.

On a personal note, I would like to thank the Selectmen, the Highway Department crew and the town's people for their support as I take on the Road Agent's job. Moving forward, I want to provide the best service to the town that I can. I will try my best to do as good a job as several past Road Agents who meant a great deal to me: my grandfather Howard Kelley as well as my good friend, Arthur Fernald.

It is also time for the town to look to the future. In 1988 the Selectmen, in their annual report to the town said, "...the Purchase of the Gray's Inn property probably best exemplifies our eyes to the future. Jackson will grow in numbers as the years pass. Already our Highway Department is in need of more space..."

A committee has been working since May on plans for a new garage. Public hearings will be held and the town will be asked to vote on the plans in March. The needs of the Highway Department are greater now than in 1988 with larger and more sophisticated equipment. The current garage is inadequate and unsafe. I urge the town to approve the building of a modern, safe highway garage.

#### **BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT**

The board of adjustment duties are generally to hear and decide appeals of decisions by the Board of Selectmen alleging errors in interpretation of the Zoning Ordinance and to hear requests for variances from provisions of the Zoning Ordinance where the literal interpretation of the Zoning Ordinance would cause an unfair burden on a property owner given the unique characteristics of their property.

In calendar year 2009 and early 2010 the Board of Adjustment heard 6 cases:

- 2009-01 Request for an Equitable Wavier of Dimensional Requirements by Pamela Landess concerning property at 28 Frances Drive, Map R 18, Lots 42 and 43. The Board found that there was no structure or building at the property which was in violation of the setback requirements of the Zoning Ordinance and that no relief was required.
- 2009-02 Appeal of an Administrative Decision (denial of the renewal of a Building Permit) by Holly Lewis concerning property at 191 Tin Mine Road, Map V-08 Lot 30. This appeal was denied and the decision of the Board of Selectmen sustained. A subsequent request for Rehearing was denied.
- 2009-03 Request for an Area Variance by Larry Garland concerning property at 143 Ridge Road, Map R-12, Lot 106. This request was granted.
- 2009-04 Request for an Area Variance by William Fetterolf(under contract to Brian and Kathy Byrne) concerning property at 57 Green Hill Road, Map V-01, Lot 9. This request was granted.
- 2009-05 Request for an Area Variance by Lawrence Siebert concerning property at 60 Main Street, Map V 09 lot 30. This request was denied
- 2010-01 Appeal of an Administration Decision (denial of a building permit) by Jackson Ski Touring Foundation concerning property on Carter Notch Road, map R 17 lot 10. This appeal was granted. The Board found that parking lots were intrinsic to the use of ski trails and that such lots were permitted where ski trails were a permitted use.

#### JACKSON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

New Hampshire Conservation Commissions were established for advancing the proper utilization and protection of a town's natural resources (N.H. RSA 36-A). A Conservation Commission is the only local board specifically charged with protecting the natural resources of a town and providing a focal point for environmental concerns.

SPNHF Conservation Easements: Each year, the Conservation Commission responds to a questionnaire from the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests regarding the condition and uses of land on which the SPNHF has a conservation easement or an interest in an easement. This year members of the Conservation Commission visited several of the properties under easement. Some corrections were made and some issues discussed with the landowners.

<u>Wildcat River:</u> JCC carried out plans for maintenance in the area where the town holds a conservation easement on the west side of the Wildcat, north of the stone bridge up to Jackson Falls. Commission members met to cut brush, improve the view, maintain a small flower garden and improve access to the island. The commission also paid to have the island brushed in the Fall. The area around Profile Rock (or Washington Boulder) was also brushed this year.

<u>Prospect Farm:</u> Three views were cut in 2007 at Prospect Farm – Lookout Rock, Monument Rock, and on the Hall Trail near the boundary of the property. This year, the views were maintained by brushing the area as well as the Apple Orchard and five of the old cellar holes. The front part of the Hall Trail view was stumped and seeded to make maintenance easier in the future. The USFS continues work on the Than Project.

N.H. Wetland Dredge and Fill Permit Application Review: The primary intent of the N.H. wetland permitting process is to see that various forms of site work and alteration undertaken occur with the least short and long-term impact to watersheds and associated wetlands. In Jackson, maintenance of watershed quality is of increasing concern especially as development takes to higher and steeper ground. The permitting process relies heavily on voluntary compliance and citizens are urged to plan ahead and seek required permits prior to undertaking a project.

During 2009, the JCC reviewed only a few N.H. Wetland Dredge and Fill permit applications. Considering the amount of building activity in Jackson during the year, the JCC would again like to remind landowners and contractors of the need for permits if site work or construction involves wetlands over which DES has jurisdiction.

<u>Gray's Inn Property:</u> A small apple orchard on the property was brushed. We received a permit from the state that will enable us to deal with the dams as well as remove debris left from the Gray's Inn fire – a collapsed building and assorted pieces of metal and culverts. Work on that has begun and will continue next year. As part of the review process for a town garage, a master plan for the Gray's Inn property was developed.

<u>Invasive species:</u> The JCC obtained a permit to treat Japanese Knotweed close to the banks of the Wildcat at the center of town, around the town hall and on the Gray's Inn Property with a herbicide which was applied in September.

#### JACKSON PLANNING BOARD ANNUAL REPORT

In 2009, Jackson Planning Board members reviewed proposals for land use changes from property owners, committees, and Selectmen. Approvals granted to property owners during the year included one Voluntary Merger, one Boundary Line Adjustment, and one two-lot Subdivision; the Board also recommended to the Board of Selectmen approval of a third cellular tower to be installed on Black Mountain. In addition, Board members reviewed existing ordinances and regulations, plus State laws, court decisions, and recommendations from Selectmen, committees, and citizens, to determine what Zoning Ordinance revisions might benefit the town. The Board presented potential Zoning Ordinance changes at two public hearings, gathering public opinion prior to proposing four Zoning Ordinance amendments for vote at the 2010 Town Meeting cycle. The proposed Zoning Ordinance amendments changed as a result of these hearings, with one proposal dropped entirely, and parts of the others changed in accordance with suggestions.

During spring, summer and fall, the Planning Board worked with two subcommittees to discuss which proposals citizens believed would benefit the town. The Board continues to invite the community at large to join in the planning process; often there are openings on the Board, and opportunities are available at nearly every point in a meeting for citizens to express their comments and ideas. Planning Board meetings are publicized in advance, meeting State requirements for notice of public meetings and hearings: electronically on the web (www.jacksonvillage.net) and through the town's internet communication system (sign up at ENews@middlemtn.com); on paper both in the posting case outside the Post Office-Bakery area and at the Town Offices building; and in the Conway Daily Sun.

- At the 2009 Town Meeting, voters approved Zoning Ordinance amendments to add a definition for the Accessory Apartment section, and to add definitions and requirements concerning Site Disturbances.
- Zoning Ordinance amendments proposed for voting in March 2010 focus on the need to 1) clarify a section on non-conforming buildings, 2) comply with State laws indicating that municipalities must provide "reasonable and realistic opportunities for the development of Workforce Housing", 3) add a definition concerning Historic Structures because the term is used at the section on Areas of Special Flood Hazard, and 4) bring the section about how the Board of Adjustment must review appeals into compliance with State laws.

At this time, there is one opening for a regular member, and one for an alternate member on the Planning Board; members and alternates are appointed by the Selectmen. Typically, the term of service is three years. Present Planning Board members represent a wide variety of Town interests and concerns; they work well together, attempting to reach consensus on matters that they determine to be important to the Town.

Thank you as well goes to Rick Davis for his quality work in maintaining the Dundee Cemetery, and to Eastern Green which continues to do an outstanding job with the beautiful flowers and plants at the entrance to the Village Cemetery. Comments from both visitors to our town and our residents have been very positive.

Three new plots were assigned this year at the Village Cemetery; there were no new plot assignments in Dundee. For the protection of cemetery grounds and existing graves and markers, interments are not permitted when ground conditions are unsuitable. The Trustees must be contacted prior to any interment to determine appropriate timing and correct location.

As a reminder, updated lists of both Dundee and the Village Cemetery may be accessed on-line at <a href="www.jacksonvillage.net">www.jacksonvillage.net</a>. To view, click on the "Other Town Agents" link, then on the "Trustees of Cemeteries" link where records may be reviewed alphabetically, by plot number, and by date of death. An annual update will be forwarded to the Village web site this spring after the snow is gone. Also posted on the site are the "Rules and Regulations" for the Jackson Cemeteries. An updated map plan of both of the cemeteries is complete, and a copy can be requested from the Trustees.

#### JACKSON PUBLIC LIBRARY

It has, once again, been a very busy and exciting year at our library. In 2009, 814 items with a retail value of \$14,792 were added to the collection. Thanks to the generosity of library supporters, 381 of them (\$6,958) were donations. The total number of volumes in our collection now stands at 10,491. We discarded 838 items. One hundred and three new patrons were added to our growing list of library users. Jackson Library patrons borrowed 1,688 books through the Interlibrary Loan Program, and we loaned out 524 volumes to other libraries in New Hampshire. We want to thank the Jackson Library volunteers who gave 330 very productive hours of their time to help keep us operating efficiently and economically.

Adult library visits increased by 397 in 2009. Children's visits decreased by 64. Total print circulation was 11,428, a slight decrease (64) from 2008. Our audiobook circulation increased by more than 10% with a total of 579 books. One hundred and seventy-one patrons took advantage of our downloadable book circulation, now available to iPod owners. Total circulation for 2009 (14,336) was very close to 2008 (14,341).

Thanks in part to the Friends of Jackson Public Library, the library offered 18 more adult programs in 2009 (28 total) than it did in 2008, and attendance for these programs increased significantly (264 in 2009 vs. 89 in 2008). The number of children's programs remained essentially the same. There is not enough space in this report to describe them all in detail, but there was a wide rage of topics. Some examples include wind power; book club discussions; Tom Ryan and his canine friend Atticus; Cartooning for Kids with Jay Piscopo of Captain Eli Comics; raising chickens; traveling the Silk Road; and writing and poetry workshops. In the future library programs will continue to be a priority.

We were sad to have to say good bye to Meg Murphy, who for four years very successfully ran our children's and school programs. We welcome Tessa Narducci, who has enthusiastically jumped in to replace Meg. Stop by and say hello to Tessa if you have not yet met her.

Plans for Jackson's new library have become a reality! The Trickey Barn now proudly stands with a new roof, exterior walls, siding and windows. Steven and Michael Weeder and the Tamarack Construction crew, working with timber frame expert Curtis Milton, skillfully reassembled the barn, made repairs and integrated the many necessary engineering features to give us this beautiful structure that, with your help, will be our new library at this time next year.

Jackson is indeed indebted to the hard-working volunteers on the building committee who met often, did extensive research, and made the difficult decisions

that went into this very complex project. We hope that Roger Aubrey, Allen Brooks, Phil Davies, Susan Dunker-Bendigo, Sam Harding, Bob Kent, and Wendy McVey will continue to help with the planning for the second half of Jackson's new library project.

We are also indebted to the 250 generous donors who gave or pledged \$775,000 for the new library. Including the \$100,000 in capital reserve, we now have \$875,000 of the estimated total of \$1,175,000. None of this money would be there without the many hours and courageous efforts of the Friends of the Library/Capital Campaign Committee. We hope that Phil Davies, Sam Harding, Betsey Kent, Helene Matesky, Wendy McVey, and Lynn Stevens will also continue to help raise the much needed funds to complete Phase II. Finally, the barn would not be standing without the help from Warren Schomaker and the Jackson Historical Society who not only paid for the disassembly of the Trickey Barn, but also donated generously to the effort. Thank you as well to the individual Historical Society members for their generous donations.

You can still find news, scheduled library events and book recommendations from your librarian Susan Dunker-Bendigo in our monthly newsletter, posted on e-news or available at the library. Don't forget that wireless internet is available 24/7, and we have four new computers for you to use during library hours. Drop by on any of the following days and Susan, Tess, Kim or one of our friendly volunteers will be glad to help you to take advantage of the wonderful resource that is your public library:

#### MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY ECONOMIC COUNCIL

In just the third full year since opening its doors, the Tech Village in Conway has become a prominent center for business resources and educational opportunities for the Valley. The facility accommodates several start-up businesses as well as an exceptional academic venue utilized by Granite State College and White Mountains Community College. Attractive building space on adjacent property is available to interested technical businesses and services. The following are some of the resources provided by the Economic Council as well as highlights from 2009:

Progress continues on the development of the Tech Village. In July, the Economic Council received conditional subdivision approval for five lots. Moreover, proceeds from the sale of tax credits have gone to the development of infrastructure. To date, 22 businesses have purchased 1.25 million in tax credits, with \$71,000 left to sell.

The Council's **Revolving Loan Fund** remains the preferred alternative leader in financial assistance for small businesses in the region. In 2009, the Council loaned out \$326,000. To date, 24 loans have been made to local businesses totaling \$1.8 million.

In partnership with Granite State College, the Council has continued to provide an educational series of workshops, called "Boot Camps," focusing on professional training for businesses and nonprofit organizations. There were 14 of these workshops in 2009, totaling 539 attendees.

In concert with the MWV Chamber of Commerce, the Economic Council continues to work with the **MWV Young Professionals**, a group which fosters career development opportunities, mentorship for community involvement, and support for civic leadership. The Council is also a co-sponsor of the third year of the leadership program series, which is a MWV version of Leadership NH.

The Tech Village serves as the home to **S.C.O.R.E.** – counselors from the Service Corps of Retired Executives are available to provide free and confidential small business advice to entrepreneurs.

The Tech Village also houses the MWV School to Career Partnership, which aims to build and sustain local partnerships that support education programs for the future workforce.

Lastly, 2009 was another successful year for the on-going **Eggs & Issues Breakfast Forum**, which provides timely and vital information for area organizations on business, educational, and political topics. In April, guest speaker Governor John Lynch addressed a crowd of nearly 150 attendees on the state of the New Hampshire economy. In total, nearly 450 individuals attended the 10 sessions held in 2009.

#### BARTLETT-JACKSON AMBULANCE SERVICE

The calls for service in 2009 hit a yearly high of 465. In order to keep up with increased costs of fuel, maintenance and other operating cost, we increased our base rate for the first time in many years. The combined increase and call volume allowed us to be in a much better financial situation and we did not spend the budgeted money from the towns of Bartlett and Jackson. We can not accurately predict income so we have requested money from each town to ensure that we can cover expenses for 2010.

We purchased a 2010 PL Custom ambulance and took delivery at the end of December. The old ambulance was sold to Center Conway Fire/EMS for \$20,000 which was much more than we would have received in trade.

In 2011 the State of NH Bureau of EMS will be requiring more advanced equipment on all ambulances in order to be licensed. To meet those requirements we purchased a Zoll E Series 12 lead Cardiac Monitor with many adjuncts. We paid \$10,000 out of the 2009 budget and will pay the balance from the 2010 budget. The State regulations are set by the State EMS Medical Board and must be implemented regardless of cost to the services. We are pleased to be ahead of the deadline with our state of the art equipment.

When we ordered the new ambulance we included a Stryker power cot and a new stair chair that has a track. Both items are intended to prevent back and/or other injuries to our members when they are lifting and moving patients. The cot was paid for with donation money and the chair was purchased through the operating account. They have proved to be a great asset to our department and the crew loves them.

Our membership continues to grow but there are times when it's difficult to staff 24/7 with paid/on call volunteers. We have a very diverse group of people as members and we are proud of the professionalism and dedication that we offer our communities. To stay certified at any level requires 72 hours of recertification/continuing education in a 2 year period. This year a refresher course was sponsored by the Region 5 District Board and was held at Conway Fire Station. Several local instructors provided the training for a minimal charge. We appreciate their efforts and hard work! Basic and intermediate level EMTS are required to take computer based tests biannually and the only locations nearby are Conway and Whitefield. All of the above is in addition to answering emergency calls for our towns. Anyone that is interested in being part of our team, please contact us!

In addition to our members, we are fortunate to have, and truly appreciate, North Conway Ambulance as mutual aid. Although they have been sold to Care Plus

Ambulance of Merrimack they continue to provide assistance and backup as needed. SOLO, IME, AMC, NH Fish and Game have been essential in sending expertise in carry out situations and DHART helicopter service has been invaluable for transporting critical patients to trauma hospitals. Thank you all for your help!

Special thanks to Bartlett, Jackson and North Conway Fire Departments, the highway crews and the police departments for all they do and to the town people for your continued support.

### REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN & STATE FOREST RANGER

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact their local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or <a href="www.des.state.nh.us">www.des.state.nh.us</a> for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603)271-2214, or online at <a href="www.nhdfl.org">www.nhdfl.org</a>.

Spring fire season was unusually short this past year, with wet weather beginning the third week in April and lasting virtually all summer long. Consequently both the number of fires and the number of acres burned were below the last five year average. Due to state budget constraints, the staffing of our statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers was limited to class III or higher fire danger days. Despite the reduction in the number of days staffed, our fire lookout towers are credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. The towers fire spotting capability was supplemented this year by contracted aircraft and the Civil Air Patrol when fire danger was especially high. Surprisingly the largest single fire this year occurred in late November during an unusual dry spell, in the northern Coos County town of Clarksville. This fire burned 17.1 acres and is presumed to have been caused by a careless hunter. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2009 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at www.firewise.org. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department and the State's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

Please remember Fire Permits are available at the Jackson Transfer Station from Jon Edgerly during the regular business hours. The Jackson Transfer Station is open Friday through Tuesday from 12:00 Noon – 6:00 p.m. Fire Permits are also available from Gordon W. Lang, Warden; Jay Henry, Fire Chief/Deputy Warden and Kenny Crowther, Deputy Warden. All brush piles larger than the equivalent size of a "Volkswagen Beetle" must be inspected by one of the above listed people, prior to igniting.

#### BARTLETT/JACKSON TRANSFER STATION

It still pays to recycle. In 2009 the recycling commodities made a very slow, but progressive recovery after the 2008 November market crash. The first to start on the upswing was Old Corrugated Cardboard. The rest followed slowly and all but our commingled have gone positive and have returned to "normal" levels. This relates to the "operating budget" which is still being covered by what we recycle. This operating budget covers all costs associated with running the facility except, each town's municipal solid waste, construction debris and personal wages plus benefits. Each town also currently pays for the maintenance of their own compactors. See the Transfer Station summary elsewhere in the town report. The municipal solid waste numbers are down and this is most likely contributing to the downside of the economy and to increased recycling. Recycling was up by 235.42 tons with the biggest increase coming from the fact that we now receive credit for recycling our glass. The glass is used as 'daily cover' instead of the facility hauling in sand to cover the working face of the landfill each day. There is still a lot of paper and aluminum cans present in the compactor. These two items are the easiest and most cost effective items to recycle, with beer and soda cans paying about .50 per pound (or \$1,000 per ton). Pet food cans must go in the commingled container with plastic and tin, however, beer and soda cans cannot. Please ask the attendants if you ever have any questions. We will gladly tell you where things go.

# Warrant and Budget



#### 2010 TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Jackson, in the County of Carroll, and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified that the annual town elections of the Town of Jackson, New Hampshire, will be held at the Whitney Center on Tuesday, March 9, 2010. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. to vote on Ballot Articles 1-5.

All other Articles will be discussed and acted upon during the annual Town Meeting at the Whitney Center on Thursday, March 11, 2010 at 7:05 p.m.

ARTICLE 1: To choose the necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

1 Moderator	2 year term

Note: Articles 2, 3, 4 and 5 are Zoning Ordinance Amendments proposed by the Jackson Planning Board; changes are indicated as follows: Underlining=insertions; [bracketed]=deletions from present Zoning Ordinance

ARTICLE 2: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.1 as proposed by the Planning Board to the Jackson Zoning Ordinance, in order to clarify work permitted in a non-conforming structure, by adding at Section 2.2.3 this sentence to follow "... nor may the volume of the structure or building exceeding the Height limit be increased."

Further, if altering the pitch or configuration of the roof increases the volume of the structure or building within the proscribed Setback area, it shall be permitted where: (i) the change is dictated by considerations of safety, snow disposal or building code requirements, and (ii) the change does not result in an increase in the interior floor space within the structure or building.

ARTICLE 3: Are you in favor of the adoption Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board to the Jackson Zoning Ordinance, in response to State regulations requiring municipalities to provide realistic opportunities for creation of Workforce Housing:

#### SECTION XX. AFFORDABLE OR WORKFORCE HOUSING

#### XX.1 AUTHORITY AND PURPOSE

This Section is enacted in accordance with the provisions of RSAs 674:58-61 and 674:21 which authorize municipalities to provide reasonable and realistic opportunities for the development of workforce housing, and to establish inclusionary zoning designed to produce Affordable Housing by offering incentives for the production of such housing. Providing incentives to encourage creation of Workforce Housing will permit the Town of Jackson to preserve and foster a diverse community. This Section recognizes three special features of the Town of Jackson: (1) a large percentage of land within the Town of Jackson is permanently protected from development, intensifying development pressures and increasing land costs; (2) the Town's location attracts tourism, necessitating employment of service workers who must live within a reasonable distance of their employment; (3) an increasing elderly population may require low-cost housing in the future. Because Jackson has a small year-round population, incentives for provision of low-cost housing shall include those shown in Section 9, Accessory Apartments. In addition, the number of Dwelling Units approved under this Section shall be limited to avoid over-burdening town services within any one year period.

The purposes of this Section are to:

- (a) Provide a realistic opportunity for Low and Moderate Income individuals and families to obtain Affordable or Workforce Housing in the Town of Jackson,
- (b) Provide appropriate incentives to encourage the production of such housing, without creating a hardship for provision of town services.

#### XX.2 DEFINITIONS

The following words are specifically defined for purposes of this Section of the Zoning Ordinance:

- XX.2.1 Affordable or Workforce Housing: Any housing unit created in this category shall be "affordable" within the meaning of NH RSA 674:58, as may be revised from time to time.
- XX.2.2 Eligible Elderly Household: An individual or couple in which the individual or at least one person of the couple is 60 years of age or older and who by income qualifies as a Low or Moderate income Household as defined in this Section.
- XX.2.3 Low and/or Moderate income Household: A person or family which has a household income meeting a particular percent of the median income, adjusted for family size, of Carroll County as published annually by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development; Low is up to 80 percent, and Moderate is up to 100 percent, of the above-cited median income level.

#### XX.3 PROCEDURES

The Planning Board is authorized to review and approve plans for creation of Affordable or Workforce Housing in the same manner specified in Section 8 of this Ordinance, as applicable, except as modified in this Section.

#### XX.4 AFFORDABLE OR WORKFORCE HOUSING CRITERIA

The Planning Board will authorize incentives to encourage development of Affordable or Workforce Housing units, providing the following Affordable or Workforce Housing development characteristics are met.

XX.4.1 Minimum Number of Affordable Units: For every four Dwelling Units being constructed in accordance with this Section, at least one of those four shall be built to be "affordable" to an individual or family meeting the definition of Low or Moderate Income Household as specified in XX.2.3. In the first four units, one must be available to a Low Income Household at under 80% of the Median Income Index for Carroll County; in the next four units, one must be available to a Moderate Income Household at under 100% of the Medium Income Index for Carroll County; additional units shall be made available in the same pattern.

XX.4.2 The Dwelling Units designed to be Affordable or Workforce Housing units shall be restricted as follows:

- (a) Approvals shall require that a one-bedroom unit may not exceed 900 square feet of heated space, a two-bedroom unit may not exceed 1,100 square feet of heated space, and a three-bedroom unit may not exceed 1,300 square feet of heated space;
- (b) Deed restrictions shall be placed on each Affordable or Workforce Housing unit that;
- i. prohibit an increase of more than 10 percent of the total heated space of the unit or other improvements having a value in excess of 10 percent of the purchase price of the unit;
- ii. prohibit a sale of an owner-occupied unit to any person or family which does not meet the Low or Moderate Income Household requirements of this Section;
- iii. limit, in the case of rental units, any annual rent increases to the annual percentage increase in the Carroll County median income published annually by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development; and
- iv. require that each Affordable or Workforce Housing unit be occupied as a primary residence by those meeting the definition of Low or Moderate Income Household or Eligible Elderly Household
- v. deed restrictions related to an affordable or Workforce Housing unit established under this Section must be approved by the attorney for the Town of Jackson and documented on all plans filed with the Planning board and with the Carroll County Registry of Deeds.
- XX.4.3 No more than 20 percent of the Affordable or Workforce Housing units may be one bedroom or studio units, or be restricted to occupancy by Eligible

Elderly Households. No more than 25 percent of the Affordable or Workforce Housing units may be three or more bedroom units.

# XX.5 CERTIFICATION OF INCOME LEVELS

To ensure that only Low and/or Moderate Income Household persons or families occupy the designated Affordable or Workforce Housing units, the candidate for occupancy must comply with regulations set by the NH Housing Finance Authority. Paperwork necessary to comply with those regulations shall be submitted to the Board of Selectmen or their designee at least 30 days prior to the transfer of title or execution of lease agreement.

# XX.6 AFFORDABLE HOUSING INCENTIVES FOR SECTION XX

The Planning Board is authorized to permit the following incentives provided that the criteria in Section XX.5 are met:

XX.6.1 Site Development: All structures may be placed on the cluster development site in a manner to minimize environmental impact providing the structures comply with the dimensional requirements in Section 8 of this Ordinance unless modified with Planning Board approvals according to Sections XX.6.2 or Section XX.6.3.

XX.6.2 Areas and Dimensions: The cluster development shall comply with Section 8 of this Ordinance, except that, as an incentive to develop Affordable or Workforce Housing units, the cluster parcel may have as little as 150 feet of frontage along a public or Private Road.

XX.6.3 Water and Sewer Requirements: The cluster development shall comply with Section 8 of this Ordinance, except that, as an incentive to develop Affordable or Workforce Housing units, the density of the parcel shall be permitted to be determined by utilizing current NH Department of Environmental Services standards for the quantity of land necessary to provide a proper and adequate community water supply and septic disposal system for each development containing Affordable or Workforce Housing units.

XX.6.4 The Planning Board may reduce application costs for development proposals considered within this Section.

### XX.7 MAXIMUM UNITS CREATED WITHIN THIS SECTION

To avoid placing an undue burden on town services, no more than a total of 12 Dwelling Units (3 of which are Affordable or Workforce Housing units) receiving incentives through this Section shall receive approval in any single year.

#### XX. 8. ADMINISTRATION

This Section shall be administered by the Board of Selectmen.

XX. 8.1 Certificate of Occupancy. No certificate of occupancy shall be issued for an Affordable or Workforce housing unit without written confirmation, from the Board of Selectmen or their designee, of the income eligibility of the tenant or

buyer of the unit and confirmation of the rent or price of the unit as documented by an executed lease or purchase and sale agreement.

XX. 8.2. Monitoring. Ongoing responsibility for maintaining the compliance with rental restrictions on Affordable or Workforce Housing units for rent shall entail an annual report certifying that the gross rents of such units and the household income of the tenants of such units have been maintained in accordance with and comply with the requirements of this Section. Such reports shall be filed on May 1st of each year with the Board of Selectmen or their designee and shall list the contract rent and tenant income of all units for the calendar year. XX.8.3 In the event that a tenant's household income exceeds 135 percent of the median income for that family size, the unit must be made available to an incomeeligible tenant within one year.

### XX.9. APPEALS

Appeals under this Section shall be governed by the provisions of RSA 674:61.

ARTICLE 4: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.3 as proposed by the Planning Board to the Jackson Zoning Ordinance, in order to provide a definition for "Historic Structure", a term used at Areas of Special Flood Hazard, Section11.1.19 within the current Zoning Ordinance. The Planning Board recommends adding a definition used in state and federal flood plain and flood hazard regulations to clarify how a building may be labeled an historic structure: "Historic Structure" means any structure that is:

- (a) <u>Listed individually in the National Register of Historic Places or preliminarily determined as meeting the requirements for individual listing on the National Register;</u>
- (b) <u>Certified or preliminarily determined as contributing to the historical significance of a registered historic district;</u>
- (c) Individually listed on a state inventory of historic places; or
- (d) Individually listed on a local inventory of historic places.

ARTICLE 5: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.4 as proposed by the Planning Board to the Jackson Zoning Ordinance, to bring into compliance with State laws the powers that the Zoning Board of Adjustment shall use in hearing appeals; no-longer-applicable wording in the Jackson Zoning Ordinance at 16.2.3 would be removed, and the following would be substituted: 16.2.3 Hear and authorize, upon appeal in specific cases, a variance from the terms of this Zoning Ordinance, if the Board finds that the criteria set forth in RSA 674:33(I)(b), as amended from time to time, are met. Delete: [16.2.3.1, 16.2.3.2, 16.2.3.3, 16.2.3.4, 16.2.3.5, 16.2.3.6] since they are no longer applicable.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate

the sum of One Million Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,200,000.00) for the purpose of building a new Public Safety Facility and Salt Shed (the "Project"); Seven Hundred Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$755,000.00) of such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the Municipal Finance Act, RSA 33:1 et seq., as amended; to see if the town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of Two Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand Four Hundred Seventy-Four Dollars (\$275,474.00) from the Public Safety Facility Capital Reserve Fund (fund balance as of 12/31/09 - \$279,614.00) created in 2005 for this purpose; and to authorize the withdrawal of Ninety-Four Thousand Five Hundred Twenty-Six Dollars (\$94,526.00) from the Sand and Salt Shed Capital Reserve Trust Fund (fund balance as of 12/31/09 - \$98,026.00) created in 2007 for this purpose; with the balance of Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00) to be raised by taxation; to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, obtain and accept federal, state or other aid, if any, which may be available for said project and to comply with all laws applicable to said project; to authorize the Selectmen to issue, negotiate, sell and deliver said bonds and notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon and the maturity and other terms thereof; and to authorize the Selectmen to take any other action or to pass any other vote relative thereto. A 2/3 ballot vote required to pass this article. Recommended by Board of Selectmen [3-0-0].

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the Selectmen's recommended Operating Budget of the Town in the amount of \$1,609,882.00, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately (See 2010 Budget).

To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two million, two hundred thirty-two thousand, eight hundred and sixty-five dollars (\$2,232,865) for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District. # MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING JACKSON SCHOOL DISTRICT March 16, 2009

The Annual Meeting of the Jackson School District was held at the Jackson Town Hall on Monday, March 16, 2009. Moderator, Tim Scott, called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

The Moderator called for a Motion to dispense with reading of the Warrant in its entirety as his intent was to read each article as it was being addressed. Motion was made by Mary Burack, seconded by Tish Hanlon, to dispense with the reading of the Warrant in its entirety. Motion carried.

School Board Chairman, Jerry Dougherty, thanked outgoing School Board members Bob Thompson and Jon Edgerly for their years of service on the School Board, and welcomed incoming Board members Keith Bradley and Genn Anzaldi. Mr. Dougherty also acknowledged and welcomed Jackson Grammar School Principal, Gayle Dembowski.

Article 1. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two million, one hundred eighty-five thousand, six hundred and seventy-seven dollars (\$2,185,677.00) for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District. This article does not include appropriations voted in other warrant articles. (Recommended by the School Board.)

Motion was made by Peter Benson, seconded by Mary Burack, to approve Article 1 as written.

Discussion: Gino Funicella questioned dollar amounts as follows, acknowledging that his math may not be totally correct: Health costs, up 6% (\$79,709 in 2008, \$84,901 for 2009). He stated at the Town Office health insurance went down while the school's has gone up. Dr. Nelson explained the District received a guaranteed maximum price percentage increase of 7.8%, the 6% reflects changes in health plans.

Mr. Funicella questioned salaries/benefits of \$360,921 for 2008, \$418,146 for 2009, an increase of 15%. He stated his concern is if that is going to follow every year it will double in 7 to 8 years. He questioned Health, Aide, Spec. Ed. at \$13,344 for 2008, \$19,733 for 2009, an increase of 40+%. Dr. Nelson stated that reflects a change in the plan from a 2-person plan to family plan. He stated regarding the salaries, the Board has put into this budget some salary adjustments and benefit packages for teaching and non teaching staff, adding up to approximately \$20,000 over last year.

Mr. Funicella questioned Tuition, Special Education at \$63,300 for 2008, \$153,000 for 2009, an increase of 141%. Dr. Nelson stated the District may spend that, there is an increase in number of Special Education students.

Mr. Funicella questioned Contracted Services-Librarian \$4,000 for 2008, \$5,672 for 2009. Dr. Nelson stated that is a request that the Library provides to the School Board each year.

Mr. Funicella questioned Supplies, Fuel showing a 15% increase, noting fuel costs have gone down. Dr. Nelson explained that includes the new building. Utilities cost an additional \$10,000 to accommodate the Whitney Center when it is up and running.

Richard Bennett questioned Custodian Salary at \$13,000 for 2008, \$27,040 for 2009. Ms. Dembowski stated it was \$11,000 for the cleaning service and \$13,000 for the custodian which was to start in January. It was to be paid to the company who is contracted to do the building cleaning. Jerry Dougherty said they were looking to spend about \$25,000 for the school building alone, now we have the Whitney Center. The Board felt the best way to handle that is to hire a person to clean both buildings and logistically run the Whitney Center for opening up and closing down in the evening. He stated this will provide a lot of flexibility on how and when the buildings get cleaned. Cleaning is done during after school hours.

Mr. Bennett questioned the \$60,000 for maintenance and cleaning. Mr. Dougherty stated that includes outside work as well, maintaining the position at 30 hours a week because we now have two buildings to fully operate all the time. Mr. Bennett stated \$60,000 is a lot of money to spend on two people for maintenance and cleaning for those two buildings. Mr. Dougherty did not agree. It was noted it is 260 days a year, eight hours a day, \$13.00 an hour for a full time custodian.

Angus Badger questioned why not have one person at 40 hours? Mr. Dougherty stated they will need a full time position for the cleaning alone. Mr. Bennett said he does not see 40 hours a week of custodian work, and 30 hours a week of maintenance work in those two buildings. Ms. Dembowski said both of those positions are time card positions, they are paid for the hours they actually work. Maintenance is the physical plant: shoveling, maintenance of the boiler, etc. The custodian would be 20 to 25 hours. The cleaning up would cost between \$27,000 and \$30,000 at \$160 per day. She said that comes within \$5,000 of the \$27,000 and gives us someone to assign tasks to on site, gives a lot more flexibility to meet the needs.

Tish Hanlon questioned at what point benefits are offered, noting with benefits for two people it is \$103,000. Mr. Kearns said it is new, we have this investment in the addition on the school and the community center, and are looking at that investment and keeping it as good as we can. Mr. Funicella said they should have the number of hours they have applied to for a plant that size. Ms. Jefferson stated

the policy is to provide benefits at 30 hours. Mr. Dougherty said the budget is for a full time position with a family plan.

Mr. Dougherty, Sr. questioned Whitney Foundation contribution. Mr. Dougherty said this year they are looking at \$10,000 from the Whitney Foundation to be applied toward the different costs associated with the building. It will be determined by the Whitney Oversight Committee as to how it will be spent. Ms. Dembowski stated Betty Whitney also did specify that a good portion of that money has to go toward programs for the community.

Sara Kimball questioned the fact that Tuition, Special Education shows a major jump from \$63,300 to \$153,000; however, the Report shows no Special Ed out-of-district placements. Dr. Nelson stated this is in anticipation of a possible out-of-district placement.

Angus Badger questioned whether teachers' starting salaries are still tied to Conway, are less than Conway, or greater than Conway? Mr. Kearns stated Jackson is not tied to Conway. The School Board increased the starting salary schedule. Dr. Badger questioned, not including benefits, is the salary more or less than, or the same as Conway? Mr. Kearns said it is greater than Conway or Bartlett's starting schedule; however, as time passes it drops behind Bartlett. It is 3% each year for the next three years.

Trish Ashworth questioned the percentage increase in the budget from last year to next, average cost per student, projected meal plan (noting \$24,000 has been budgeted). She questioned also how many use the lunch plan and the cost per lunch, and whether other alternatives have been looked at. Mr. Dougherty said they are looking at 15% increase maximum. The State will inform us of that. As regards the per pupil costs, Dr. Nelson said this year Middle School is \$13,400, next year \$14,990. Ms. Jefferson stated the actual estimated number for 2007-08 was \$15,596, high school about \$30,000.

Lunch Program – Ms. Dembowski stated the lunch comes from Bartlett. Jackson had an initial expense for buying paper goods and containers to transport the food, etc. They pay someone 3 to 4 hours a day to pick up and deliver the meals and take care of everything. She noted they also have a free and reduced lunch program and a milk program. As to the numbers participating, it varies – sometimes on Friday (pizza day) they have 40 children, some days only 5 or 6, depending on what is being served. The average is 12 per day. Ms. Dembowski explained we are required by State law to provide that lunch. Dr. Nelson said the cost per pupil is \$2.75 and the District will contribute about \$9,000 to make the lunch program break even – it is not self-sustaining. Mr. Dougherty noted the biggest reason we had not explored other avenues is health regulations - we would not have control over other providers. Peter Benson stated the program has worked very well due to the really great presence of a positive lunch atmosphere and the person hired to do it, and it is affordable. There being no further

questions, there was a call for the vote. The Moderator declared Article 1 carried.

Article 2. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate eighty-four thousand dollars (\$84,000) to purchase one 66 passenger school bus; and authorize the withdrawal of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) from the Capital Reserve Fund (School Buses), previously established for this purpose. The balance of forty-four thousand dollars (\$44,000) is to come from general taxation. (Recommended by the School Board.)

Motion was made by Mary Burack, seconded by Peter Benson, to approve Article 2 as written.

Discussion: Bob Davis questioned why we need a 66 passenger bus when we have only 12 kids on it. Mr. Thompson said we have been purchasing a bus every three years. This year we did a thorough study with a Transportation Committee. They looked at a number of different options rather than a 66 student capacity bus. The bus drivers stated they could not fit 66 students on the bus (especially with everyone carrying backpacks). The adult capacity is 44. Mr. Thompson explained all options looked at. He noted every day when they operate the bus route they have 25 Jackson students on some of those routes. He said if we are going to a different vehicle we would have to change the entire fleet over time. He noted about 12 to 15 times a year they have to transport the entire school. Mr. Thompson stated also Jackson has agreements with Bartlett and are transporting a larger number of students because we pick up some Bartlett kids. The town does receive compensation for that. Mr. Thompson stated the Committee felt the 66 passenger bus is the most practical for Jackson. He reported passage of this article will increase the tax rate about \$13.00 per \$100,000 valuation.

Mr. Funicella questioned how many young kids on an average day come to school by bus? The bus driver stated it is about 25 to 30 on average, noting that on the high school bus there may be about three in the afternoon, in the morning it is pretty full.

There were no further questions. The Moderator called for the vote and declared Article 2 carried.

Article 3. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund (School Buses) previously established for this purpose, with these funds to be offset, in part, by National Forest Reserve Funds. (Recommended by the School Board.)

Motion was made by Ms. Burack, seconded by Mr. Funicella, to approve Article 3 as written. There being no discussion, the Moderator called for the vote. Article 3 was declared carried.

Article 4. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to be added to the Expendable Trust Fund (Tuition Trust Fund) previously established for this purpose. (Recommended by the School Board.)

Motion was made by Mary Burack, seconded by Judy Botsford, to approve Article 4 as written. There being no discussion, the Moderator called for the vote. Article 4 was declared carried.

Article 5. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000) to be added to the Expendable General Trust Fund (School Building Maintenance Fund) established for that purpose in 1996. (Recommended by the School Board.)

Motion was made by Mary Burack, seconded by Judy Botsford, to approve Article 5 as written. There being no discussion, the Moderator called for the vote. Article 5 was declared carried.

<u>Article 6.</u> To see if the School District will vote to approve the three-year tuition contract with the Bartlett School District for the Jackson seventh and eighth grade students to attend the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School. (Recommended by the School Board.)

Motion was made by Mary Burack, seconded by Peter Benson, to approve Article 6 as written.

Discussion: Mr. Benson questioned changes from the previous tuition contract. Mr. Dougherty explained there was a change in the formula, it will be the same as the formula for Conway, we will be able to predict the amount. He said if there is any difference in cost it may be slightly higher, if less they will be returning money – this is so that Bartlett will not be "money out of pocket" to cover tuition costs.

Angus Badger made reference to Article XI of the Tuition Contract – Tuition Calculations - questioning Dept. of Labor Consumer Price Index plus 2.5%, asking for explanation of why we are paying 2.5% above actual cost. Dr. Nelson stated the CPI for last year was 4.9%, plus inflation factor of 2.5%. Mr. Dougherty said it is designed to have a buffer on what we are predicting to pay. Ms. Jefferson said Jackson is paying Bartlett actual for 2007-08, this inflation factor will get them on par with the current year's budget; presently we are paying a year behind. Dr. Nelson said if Jackson pays too much they will get a credit, if too little they will get a bill.

There being no further discussion the Moderator called for the vote. Article 6 was declared carried.

<u>Article 7.</u> To see if the District will vote to authorize, in accordance with RSA 32:5,V-a, the placement of numerical tallies on the votes of the recommendation that accompany the warrant articles.

Dr. Nelson explained in the past if the School recommended an article and it was a split vote it would be reflected on the warrant. If the District wants to continue to do that this Article has to pass.

Motion was made by Mary Burack, seconded by Angus Badger, to accept Article 7 as written. There being no further discussion, the Moderator called for the vote. Article 7 was declared carried.

Article 8. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Peter Benson stated in looking at enrollment last year Jackson graduated two students from Bartlett, this year it is up to six, a 300% increase. Dr. Nelson said we have a total of eleven children we anticipate in 7th and 8th grades in 2009-10. This year it is a total of ten. Ms. Jefferson said there were some additional students that moved into the District.

Trish Ashworth expressed concern that she is hearing there are lots of leaks at the Jackson School. Mr. Dougherty stated the leaks have been occurring for as long as the building has been there. He said the addition to the building has drainage around the base of the foundation. He noted that earlier tonight the School Board approved a comprehensive engineering study on the building and application for a wetlands permit to deal with the drainage.

Angus Badger noted the projected enrollment for the next four years in Kindergarten is ranging from 5 to 7, this year 6; however, there was only one birth in the Town of Jackson in 2008. He questioned whether the school would encourage tuition to this school from outside towns, noting there are a number of kids being tuitioned to other schools in the area such as the Montessori School. Mr. Dougherty said he thinks that is a wonderful idea, but would want more input from the Principal and Superintendent. Ms. Burack said the reason Jackson got a Kindergarten in the first place was the whole school population was down to 19 children some 20 years ago. Several people wanted to close the school and the School Board members decided to take in Kindergarten. She said if we can expand it, fine. Ms. Dembowski pointed out that Kindergarten is now State law. Ginger Bailey said it had been discussed that they were to close the school, a study was done on the cost to send our children to John Fuller or Bartlett, which would have cost Jackson a lot more to tuition to another town than to provide a school in the town. People from other towns advised Jackson to consider it carefully in that once closed it cannot open again.

Mr. Benson said projected enrollment for 2012 is what you know you have – it is what comes in that makes up the part of the District. The numbers do not tell the whole story when it comes to student enrollment. Trish Ashworth noted the capacity is 75 students.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, Motion was made by Mary Burack, seconded by Peter Benson, that the meeting be dissolved. The Moderator declared the motion carried and the meeting was dissolved at 8:00 p.m.

To the Citizens of Jackson:

As the school districts of SAU #9 start the 2010-11 school year, we will do so with yet another marked reduction in our drop out rate for the third year.

The Continuous Improvement Process, which has guided us for the last twelve years, allows us to make data-driven decisions, which enables staff, administrators, and school board members to focus energies and resources in the areas that have been identified for improvement. The data obtained from our testing program, postgraduate surveys, and other local sources provides us guidance to continue staff development and curriculum development with regard to budgeting and resource allocations targeted at compliance with state and federal regulations.

Once again, the New Year brought with it the publication of our eleventh Report Card for each of the individual schools in SAU #9. Each building administrator will, in turn, have meetings with parents and community members to review specific School Report Cards for their school. This district-wide Report Card contains such data as testing results, post graduation surveys, demographic information, as well as socioeconomic information. The Report Card is available at individual schools, the SAU #9 office, and on our web site (www.sau9.org).

The dedication and quality of the people who serve the communities of SAU #9 and the Jackson School District continues to remain our most valuable asset. The Valley's desire to improve and support education remains the driving force behind our fine educational system. Your school board members, along with this administration, have made every effort to improve the high quality of education and the delivery of services to our students and community while controlling costs in a very difficult economy. We ask you to remember that an investment in education is an investment in the future of the Mount Washington Valley.

### JACKSON GRAMMAR SCHOOL Principal's Report By: Gayle Dembowski

The 2009/2010 school year has been smooth and productive. The completion of our playground and building projects has facilitated our ability to meet the needs of our youngsters and also our community members. The Whitney Center has been well utilized for drama, meetings, music, yoga, dance and sewing, in addition to the school uses for art, music and physical education. We have even hosted a wedding! A calendar of events may be found via a link on the Jackson Grammar School website.

Jackson Grammar School is quite proud of our student achievements. This year's NECAP results reveal that 97% of our students achieve at proficient or above in reading and 100% score at or above proficient in math. Enrollment has remained stable at 54 students. They are being instructed in a K/1 classroom (12), a 2/3 classroom (17), a 4/5 classroom (15) and a grade 6 classroom (12). Throughout the year the grade 4, 5 and 6 students worked successfully in collaborative lessons, allowing for a wide range of learning opportunities for the students. Our weekly community meetings, whole school recess, field trips and buddy programs create a strong feeling of care, belonging and community among the students.

The academic program provides the students with a variety of hands on and multi sensory learning opportunities. The fall festival and project blocks inspire students to explore many creative venues and experiment with activities the typical school curriculum cannot provide. The Whitney Center provides a perfect venue for a variety of enriching activities and programs. The arts are also alive and well as more than two thirds of our students participate in either chorus or band and special project days offered by our art teacher are filled to capacity at recess time. A Jeanne Limmer Dance residency was very well received by the children as they explored movement as an expression of culture around the world.

Our staff continues to model the love of lifelong learning here at JGS! The entire teaching staff is participating in a writing course that is focused on inspiring students to write in a variety of genres. The course, provided through the Learning through Teaching Center at UNH, provides opportunities for staff to develop and discuss new ways to increase student performance as well as stimulate some new strategies and techniques to meet our students' unique needs. Attendance at the Christa McAuliffe Technology Conference inspired the purchase of an interactive white board that has created much excitement for both staff and students. We will all be working to explore how this exciting tool can enhance our instructional program! We continue to be active members of the SAU 9 Curriculum committees as we work with our regional colleagues to refine and update curricula to meet current standards and increase student learning.

Jackson can be proud of the opportunities that the close-knit community affords the children here. I continue to be impressed by the level of parent and citizen involvement in the school and community support of the programs and activities we offer. We are grateful for our PTO and community members that support our students. The smaller school environment provides an environment where we can realize our goal of providing each and every child a stimulating, individualized and effective educational program!
