REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

Town residents are reminded that in January of 1976 provision was made for the Lyme Police telephone to be answered on an around-the-clock basis. Accordingly, it is recommended that if service is needed the police number 795-2047 be used rather than attempting to call an officer on his private line. The dispatcher will know if an officer can be reached immediately by radio, or if necessary he can contact a State trooper. Should an extreme emergency exist, it is possible that a Hanover officer, if available, can be dispatched until other coverage is arranged. Residents are also reminded that upon request arrangements can be made for a periodic house check of a vacant dwelling.

Lyme has been fortunate in that we have experienced a decrease in the number of reported burglaries compared to recent years past. Several neighboring towns have not been as fortunate, and continued vigilance and preventative measures by all residents will be necessary if this trend is to continue. With the aid of State police, several burglaries which occurred in prior years were solved. Unfortunately none of the stolen property was recovered.

Together with the selectmen and the chairman of the school board we conferred with New Hampshire Department of Safety representatives concerning school area pedestrian safety. As a result "school crossing" warnings have been stenciled on the roadway, additional symbolic signs have been erected, and the single flashing light has been changed to a two light "bounce" system during certain school hours. The state will not approve a stoplight on Route 10, nor a more sophisticated warning light. State representatives strongly recommended frequent speed zone monitoring and this is being done as often as practical. Speed check logs have shown a definite reduction in average speed thru the school zone since initiation of this program.

Probably our most exasperating problem has been continued vandalism, not only to private property but especially in town owned areas and properties such as the school, the Common, and the Chase Beach recreation facility. Assistance and immediate reporting by alert citizens will be needed if we are to halt this unnecessary drain on our tax dollars.

Our juvenile situation is cause for concern. To this end several informal discussions have been held with the selectmen and members of the Youth and Recreation Committees. A strong, ongoing joint effort is suggested in the hope that this unfortunate condition may be alleviated.

With the aid of state and federal revenue sharing funds we have obtained approximately \$1,000 worth of additional equipment for the department at a cost to the town of about \$1,000. In addition, after reviewing our traffic situation, our patrol funds were augmented by the state to provide an approximately 30% increase in weekly patrol. Unfortunately this is a one-shot grant which will not be available to us on a continuing basis. The results of this activity are that we now have an additional radio equipped car as well as another portable radio and a considerably more effective traffic control program as can be seen in the activity summary.

There were more auto accidents investigated this year than last but fortunately no personal injuries were involved. The majority of the accidents occurred during the winter months in inclement weather, on town roads, and were of the "fender bender" variety. It is hoped that by alert

and cautious driving, especially on snow and ice covered roads, the incidence of crashes will be reduced in the future.

REPORT OF THE FIRE CHIEF

In accordance with N. H. RSA Chapter 154:6 the following is a report regarding the condition of fire apparatus serving the Town of Lyme:

Lyme's fire defenses consist of four primary pieces of apparatus including two triple-combination pumpers, one water tanker, and a rescueutility vehicle.

The 1965 pumper was refurbished in March of 1976 at a cost of \$2,237.\l. This operation consisted of rebuilding the pump, body work and painting, and other modifications to make the piece more versatile. This pumper was tested and recertified on \lambda April 1976, at which time it performed at 12\lambda + of its rated capacity when new. The base unit was constructed at a cost of about \$13,000.00 in 1965 and was appraised in 1976 at a current cash value of \$22,500.00. This is due to an exceptionally favorable original purchase price, quality of workmanship, degree of local maintenance, and the forces of inflation. Barring unforeseen circumstances, this pumper should give the community many more years of dependable service.

The 1974 GMC pumper and related equipment is in like new condition.

In 1976 the firemen purchased a 1972 Ford chassis to replace the 1962 tanker. The water tank has been transferred and this unit is now in service.

In addition, the firemen acquired a 1970 heavy duty four-wheel drive utility unit equipped with a six-man cab. This truck serves as a rescue unit for the FAST Squad as well as for all general fire fighting needs.

Both these units were purchased by the firemen with funds raised through their activities, including auctions, barbecues and tent rentals and represent no out of pocket costs to the taxpayer.

Based on our own capabilities, coupled with an ever stronger degree of cooperation within the mutual aid system, Lyme's fire defenses are in a very favorable position.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF and TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three-year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains the local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the past twenty years.

Circulation for 1976 increased by over 2,000, up 14% over 1975. The school continues to make full use of the library's resources, which are now available $17\frac{1}{2}$ hours per week during the school day. The administration and teachers are emphasizing recreational reading as well as exposure to notable authors and research information. As a result circulation figures have soared and great demands are made on the collection. Students also receive instruction in use of the library and reference materials. A new tool for this purpose is a slide tape orientation program prepared by the librarian as a course project. Many films have been presented using films borrowed from the State Film Service.

At Hallowe'en a Spooky Story Hour was held. During the summer books were available for checking out at Post Pond for those who found it difficult to get to the library.

A pleasant summer Open House was held in honor of Ralph Balch's fifty years as a trustee. The presentation of an engraved silver bowl from many of the trustees who served with Ralph commemorated the event which was attended by many friends. The program also included a slide tape presentation of Historic Lyme compiled by Polly Whittemore, and an exhibit of Bicentennial books.

Sizable memorial gifts were received in the names of Lawrence Martz and Minnie Lamphere which provided additions to the collection in the areas of bicentennial interest and reference resources. Many other gift books have been received for which we are very grateful.

The Librarian completed her course work at summer school. She received her Master's in Library Science from the University of Rhode Island.

Eleanore Mudge has provided library delivery service to shut-ins every two weeks throughout the year. It should be remembered that this service is available and that large print books and magazines are also available for those who need them.

David Washburn of Lyme was elected President of the New Hampshire Library Trustees' $\mbox{\sc Association.}$

Eleanor Crary represented the trustees at a ceremony in Concord where the Lyme Library was presented with a certificate indicating that it qualifies for affiliation with the statewide Library Development Program of New Hampshire.

Barbara Roby has been volunteering one morning a week to process new

books, which puts them into circulation much more rapidly. A book mending group also has been meeting regularly, helping to prolong the life of old favorites.

Miss Gaylord continues to graciously house the Lyme Center Branch in her home. Julia Elder, assistant librarian, has the library available one hour per week for the general public and kindergarten. However, at other times Miss Gaylord will gladly give assistance.

The painting of the interior of the main reading rooms was accomplished at minimal cost, thanks to the cheerful volunteer efforts of the trustees and the librarian and the loan of essential staging by Hugh O'Donnell, Jr.

Small gains were made in the Library Building Fund this year. The major single contribution came from the Book Sale at the Lyme Fair. The Library won an award for its float, and the occasion afforded the opportunity to distribute donated books to Lyme's children at the parade.

The Trustees would like to thank all those who throughout the year, by their volunteer efforts, contributions and patronage, sustain the library and help it fulfill its obligations to the community.

LYME HOME HEALTH AGENCY

Annual Report of the Board 1976

The quality of service provided for the community by the Lyme Home Health Agency continues to meet the complex standards imposed as a requirement for annual certification by Medicare. The broad programs of the Agency are health education, disease prevention and home nursing care. These include health counseling, health maintenance, visits to the elderly, skilled bedside nursing, physical therapy, and well-child clinics for preschool children. These services can help reduce the costs of total care and even shorten the period of hospitalization by providing those services prescribed by a physician but not requiring his personal attention.

During the year 1976 our visiting nurse, Mrs. Roger Jenks, made 558 nursing calls as follows: to patients aged 28 days to 1 year - 13 visits, 1 year to 5 - 20 visits, 6 to 20 - 10 visits, 21 to 44 - 59 visits, 45 to 64 - 52 visits, 65 and over - 394 visits.

The well-child clinics are held jointly with the towns of Orford and Piermont in collaboration with doctors of the Lyme Medical Associates and the Hitchcock Clinic. They include physical examination, simple laboratory tests, immunizations, nutritional and dental counseling. In 1976 a total number of 205 examinations were made of which 97 were of Lyme children. There is no charge for this service and parents are urged to make use of it. The joint efforts of the Agency, the Lyme Medical Associates and the volunteer services of a number of registered nurses and other helpers conducted the flu vaccine program for the town.

It is a major concern of the Agency to be of assistance to any resident of Lyme needing its services, regardless of economic capacity. The office, in the Library basement, telephone number 795-2661, is open Tuesdays and Thursdays between 9 and 12 noon, and the nurse, Ruth Jenks, may be called at her home early in the morning before she starts on her rounds, telephone 795-2176.

REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMITTEE

As is usually the case, 1976 was a year in which the recreation program was a combination of satisfaction in the successful operation of the established activities and frustration in the failure of plans for the future to progress as desired.

The swimming program was successfully conducted by a competent staff of instructors. Better lifeguard coverage was provided by hiring an extra person through the summer work program at UNH.

Physical changes at the area include the construction of a shelter which will permit escape from extreme heat or sudden showers.

The ballfield had its usual busy summer, being in almost constant use through the baseball and softball season. Representatives of the committee worked with those of the School Board and others in planning and making application for Bureau of Outdoor Recreation funds to develop softball and soccer fields on the so-called Grant lot west of the school. These funds have been awarded to Lyme and construction of the fields should mean less congestion at Chase Field.

Plans for the construction of the proposed skating rink were not fulfilled due to a number of reasons, the primary one being the extended period of wet weather which prohibited use of heavy equipment in the area.

The ski program, which suffered through bad weather in the 1975-76 season, had no such problem in 1976-77 and was well organized by its leaders. The committee is sure that it speaks for the whole community in expressing thanks to the devoted staff of volunteers whose efforts made the program possible and insured its success.

Responses to the questionnaire sent to Lyme residents sometime ago showed a desire expressed by many for a facility where tennis can be played. The committee is currently investigating the possibility of applying for BOR funds for this purpose.

The committee wishes to be responsive to the desires of the community and welcomes suggestions affecting any phase of its operations.

LYME PLANNING BOARD

Annual Report for 1976

During the past year the Planning Board held 12 regular meetings, several special meetings, and 15 public hearings on routine subdivision proposals.

The committee which has been helping the Planning Board in working with the Town on long-term goals and plans has finished an extensive analysis of the Town's present situation. The study covers the Town's present land use pattern, road system, soil conditions, slopes, present and projected population, etc. The study will be presented to the Town and explained at a series of public meetings to be held after Town Meeting in March. Copies are available in the Library. The goal is to develop a comprehensive plan to help guide the growth of the Town. The public meetings will give everyone a chance to participate in the development of the plan.

One of the principal responsibilities of the Planning Board is the administration of the Town's Subdivision Regulations. We recommend that any landowner in Town who is considering a subdivision should consult with the Board before making final plans. This will usually simplify the process and make it easier for all concerned. Please note that "subdivision" includes (1) the building of a second home or the installation of a mobile home on a parcel of land which is already occupied by a home, (2) the conversion of a building to apartments, and (3) the construction of a duplex or apartment building. Please note also that the Subdivision Regulations now provide that, except in unusual circumstances, apartment development will not be approved.

The Board meets on the third Tuesday of each month at 7:30 in the Selectmen's Office in the Library. The meetings are open to the public.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

1976 was a fruitful year for the Lyme Conservation Commission. The commission finalized the acquisition of two tracts of land to be held as wildlife preserves in perpetuity for the town. A twenty-one acre tract on Post Pond was purchased from Guy and Esther Nichols, using funds donated by more than fifty families in Lyme and the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation Land and Water Conservation Fund Program. A woodland tract of nineteen acres in the vicinity of Holt's Ledges was donated by Thorwald Trolle.

The commission is continuing its work with conservation deeds and easements and a sign ordinance to preserve the visual quality of our community. We have information available for those interested in wildlife management, forestry practices, and pond construction. A voluminous greenup effort was co-ordinated by the commission; target date for this year's

green-up is May 1, 1977.

Our meetings are the second Tuesday of the month in the basement of the library at 7:30. We welcome your presence, ideas, suggestions, criticisms, and, of course, donations.

LYME YOUTH COMMITTEE

The Town of Lyme has been fortunate to have had the services of Marti and Tom Warren as Youth Counselors. They have counseled young people and parents, served as Probation Officers, provided recreation activities, and been friends when needed. We are unfortunate to have lost these services as the demands of the Warrens' growing business denied them the time to continue as Youth Counselors. In the same way Abby Penfield, who was very instrumental in creating the position of Youth Counselor, has had to step down as chairman of the Youth Committee due to business commitments.

As a result of these resignations there is at present no youth counselor and the committee is trying to reorganize its efforts. The committee is looking for a replacement for Marti and Tom, it is opening communication with the schools to jointly study the counseling role, and it is in communication with the Recreation Committee to encourage recreational activities for young people.

YOUTH COUNSELORS' REPORT

Since June there has not been any active Youth Counselors in Lyme. We were sorry to have to give up our duties as Youth Counselors but found between our growing family and business we did not have enough time to spend with the kids.

Before giving up our duties we met with several Youth Committee members in an attempt to assess the needs of the youth in town. We came to the following conclusions:

- A) A Youth Probation officer for Lyme is needed but should not necessarily be the Youth Counselor. There is an inherent conflict of interest in some instances, and perhaps a different kind of person is more appropriate to each position.
- B) An evening recreation program for the youth is needed. This has proved popular with the kids in the summer and some sort of program run all year might be a good way to get to know our youth better. Various activities could be offered, such as movies, discussion groups, games, basketball, volleyball, etc. The Youth Committee has talked to the Recreation Committee and it is hoped some sort of program could be developed.
- C) When Lyme youth reach high school age and first attend other schools in the area, they are faced with a great deal of growing to do quite quickly. Changing subjects, schedules, rules (or freedoms), and friends all at once is a real trial for many young people. In fact, breaking into a well established peer group can be a challenge to anyone. This is fine insofar as challenge does promote growth but it sometimes seems like a sink-or-swim program, with no one fishing out sinkers. We need to protect our investment in education and our human resources (kids) much more aggressively than we do. When classes are cut or whole days skipped, that is clearly a two-fold loss, and too often nobody knows, except the youth, what is actually going on. The town should require attendance and behavior information from all tuition schools and inform parents and take action when it is warranted. That action is often simply to demand the attention of the appropriate school guidance department or counselor.

Children who can't or won't get involved in the groups and activities in their tuition towns don't have any constructive options open to them. They are often deprived of the support and influence of the more adaptive classmates who have broken into and participated in their new environment. The "left-outs" will get involved in good programs if they are planned for them and leadership is provided. We feel that programs like the recreation program provide essential support for Lyme's kids on their home ground and that the informal constant type of counselling that can grow out of these programs is the most productive.

Later in the summer the Firemen did a super job organizing a special Bicentennial Parade and program with an assist from the Bicentennial committee. The American Legion dedicated a new flag pole on the common, speeches were made, and a drum and bugle corps played. This followed a fine parade of several floats, marching groups (remember the Liberty Bell?) and individuals. Teachers' salaries were raised 7%. Base salary for teachers is \$7,200, from \$6,900.

Mentioned things that had raised budget like maintenance, Clyde Grant's salary, building expense, tuition, Supervisory Union expenses.

David Dennis asked if we had money items to be voted on after this article. Talbert Bacon explained it was legal to vote either way, to add onto budget or to vote total budget.

Mike Smith asked if the money to be raised in Articles 4 and 7 was increased, could this still be done in the same way?

After some more discussion and questions Emily Olmsted withdrew her motion and Jack Menge made motion that we postpone Article 3 until we have acted on Article 7. Seconded. Affirmative.

To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) toward the construction of play fields on the so-called "Grant Property", the total cost of which is estimated at Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00), such Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) to be placed in capital reserve for this purpose, the balance of the total project cost to be appropriated by future district vote and the receipt of an expected Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) from the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation. (Approved by Budget Committee)

Brian Rich made motion to accept above article. Seconded.

Julie O'Hara showed everyone the plan for the "Grant Property". The estimated cost is \$20,000 - BOR funds are given for community projects, not just school. The Recreation Committee has agreed to cooperate with the School.

Barbara Robie asked what this means if we open this to everyone. Julie explained that there would have to be a schedule set up by School and Town. The control will remain with School and Town.

There was quite a lot of discussion and uncertainty about having this field open to public. Marti Warren said that she had talked to State people, and other towns that have done this, and they have not had any problem with people just stopping by to use the field.

The question was brought up by Harry Franklin whether this would affect Post Pond. It was stated that this would <u>not</u> in anyway affect the pond area. Edith Jenks said that they had discussed this at some length and felt that the ball field would not attract the public like Post Pond, for example. Albert Pushee questioned the figure of \$4,000.00. This is not half of \$20,000.

Bill Murphy made motion we amend the motion to read \$8,000. instead of \$4,000.

Question was asked about the need for a football field. Bill Murphy said that he could see no chance of having organized football in Lyme. Marion Hobbs asked about where the \$2,000 Rachael Miller Fund is. Was told it is in the savings account.

Jim Nichols asked how much more it would cost to have a full size soccer field. Bill Murphy said they had no clear figure on it, but felt it would run a lot more money.

Marion Hobbs said she thought the idea of buying this land was for the School children, not the Town or Community. Was brought out that the School would use it during school time.

Norma Randall asked if School has priority. Was said that the Town and School would set up a schedule of events.

Harry Franklin asked if this was for School or Town? For both. Talbert Bacon said that the intent here is to have the land used for School purposes and during the summer months could be used by other people. Harry still said he thinks everyone will be using it.

Mike Smith suggested that if we did not accept BOR funds maybe the Town would supply the other half of money needed. It was brought out that we would have to put up a sign saying "Open to Public" or something like that if we used BOR funds.

Ross McIntyre said he felt the sign would not stay up that long anyway so didn't think that should be of concern. Said he felt we should stick to the amended motion.

Rusty Estes asked where we got the estimate and what happens if the cost goes over the estimate.

Albert Pushee asked about who would take care of this fund, if BOR funds were used, etc. He also requested that this be voted on by paper ballot. Julie mentioned the names of the people on the building committee for anyone who may have forgotten. Bill Murphy, Dick Jenks and Julie. Julie also asked to have the words "to be placed in capital reserve for this purpose" out of the motion. Seconded.

Bayne Stevenson asked if this job would go out for bid. Yes.

Motion: The School District vote to raise and appropriate <u>Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00)</u> toward the construction of play fields on the so-called "Grant Property", the total cost of which is estimated at <u>Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00)</u>, the balance of the total project cost to be upon the receipt of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) from BOR.

Vote: 76 - Yes 37 - No Affirmative

Went back to original motion as amended. Voted affirmative.

Article 5.

To see if the School District will vote to accept an anonymous gift of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for future school building renovation and/or construction and to accept and spend an anonymous gift of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) for enrichment programs in Grades one, two, three and four, which will supplement the usual educational curriculum.

Elsie McCarthy made motion to accept above article. Seconded.

Talbert Bacon said they were informed on December 24th of the anonymous gift. Has been put into an interest bearing account. There was a show of appreciation by handclap.

Albert Pushee asked if this \$5,000 could be used in a later article. Talbert said it was supposed to be for a building project.

Affirmative.

Article 6.

To see if the School District will authorize the school board to make application for, to receive and spend in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from federal, state, local, or private agencies.

Cynthia Bognolo made motion we accept Article 6. Seconded. Affirmative.

Article 7.

To see if the School District will vote to support the report of the Lyme Planning Committee which recommends that the seventh and eighth grades remain in the Lyme School District by authorizing the present building committee to examine programmatic recommendations of past planning committees regarding primarily grades seven and eight, and with the assistance of a professional architect develop plans to renovate and expand present facilities and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.) for such purpose, such committee to make recommendations to the voters of the district at an adjourned school district meeting to be held on November 15, 1976. (Approved by Budget Committee)

Eleanor Crary made motion we accept Article 7. Seconded.

Talbert Bacon told us that it was voted last year to elect the committee which was: Sallie Ramsden, Jim Nichols, Jean Martz, Terrie Viens, Talbert Bacon.

Jean Martz talked about the report of last year's Planning Committee. Said there is something that needs to be done and feels we need further plans by an architect to find out the real cost of this project. Jim Nichols said he thought we are at a point where we really need to know if the Town wants to get on with this project or not.

Jack Menge seconded Jim's thoughts and amended the motion to read as follows:

To see if the School District will vote to authorize the School Board, with the assistance of whatever specially constituted committees, individuals, and professional consultants (including professional architects) they deem desirable, to examine programmatic recommendations of past planning committees and other appropriate evidence regarding the Lyme K through 8 educational program, placing particular emphasis on grades 7 and 8.

The Board shall present a recommended program to the voters of the district at an adjourned school district meeting to be held on November 15, 1976. Such recommendation shall be made only after written consideration, including financial data, presented to the voters, of all reasonable 7th and 8th grade options, including retention of these grades in Lyme, tuitioning arrangements similar to those presently used for high school students, and the possibility of combining aspects of the Lyme School program with other educational opportunities in the area.

The sum of Eight Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$8,500.00) shall be raised and appropriated for such purposes including, where necessary, the development of architectural plans for renovation and expansion of present facilities.

Mike Woodward asked for a paper ballot.

Ballot: 73 - Yes 37 - No

Affirmative, Amendment to Article 7.

Went back to original motion, as amended. Affirmative.

Back to Article 3.

To see if the School District will vote to accept the budget submitted by the Budget Committee and pass any vote in relation thereto. (\$401,003.00)

Emily Olmsted made motion to pass budget of \$401,003.00

Jack Menge commented that he would hope that the School Board would provide us with some results of what is happening, and this would become a routine part of the budget.

Affirmative.

Article 8.

To see if the School District will vote to accept the provisions of Public Law 89-10, designed to improve educational opportunities with particular reference to children of low income families, and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said federal act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further, to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

Debbie Holmes made motion to accept Article 8. Seconded. Affirmative.

Article 9.

To see if the School District will authorize the recitation of the traditional Lord's Prayer in the elementary schools of the district, pursuant to RSA 194:15-a. (Inserted by petition)

Talbert Bacon said this has been voted unconstitutional and made motion we postpone this article indefinitely. Said he was sorry to have to say this but felt we could be in for legal action if we passed this.

Seconded. Affirmative.

Article 10.

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Since there was no other business, Amelia Greenwood made motion to adjourn to November 15, 1976 at 7:30 p.m. Seconded. Affirmative.

Jean Martz, Chairman of the Building Committee, was asked to recap what has been happening since Town Meeting. She started by saying that there have been planning committees for the last seven years studying what should be done primarily for 7th and 8th graders.

This Building Committee has had two open meetings, one on October 27 and the other on November 9, to discuss the Building Committee's plans. By straw votes at these meetings the people indicated they would like to keep the 7th and 8th grades here in Lyme School. She also said there was indication at these meetings that people would like to make some improvements and renovations in the school. She told the people that they have worked very hard and have presented this plan to the School Board and they have approved and she hoped that we would consider this plan.

She made the following motion:

I move that the Lyme School District elect the alternative of building new facilities and reconstructing and renovating old facilities for grades seven and eight as set forth in the report of the Lyme School Building Committee and the Lyme School Board; and the School Board be authorized and directed to call a special School District Meeting and to take all other steps legally necessary to have a bond issue vote on this alternative.

Seconded.

Discussion:

Glen Buzzell asked if the committee had talked to any contractors to see if this facility could be built for the amount of money they have decided to spend. Jean said they had talked to some people and said this was all the money they <u>could</u> spend.

Robert Donnelly made motion that we vote by paper ballot.

Ruby Thompson asked that it be made clear exactly what we are voting on so that it can be a clear Yes or No vote. Also asked what the new renovation would do for basic education. Julie O'Hara said she felt it would help

basic education as well as the vocational courses they want to implement.

Vote by Paper Vote:

Motion Defeated.

Sallie Ramsden read the following Alternate Motion:

Alternate Motion:

I move that the Lyme School District elect the alternative of building new facilities and reconstruction and remodeling old facilities for grades 7 and 8 and direct the Lyme School Board and presently constituted School Building Committee to devise alternative building renovation and construction recommendations so as to reduce the cost of the proposed project which at the same time would allow the programmatic recommendations of the board to be fully implemented and that the School Board and the Building Committee be further authorized and directed to call a Special School District Meeting and to take all other steps legally necessary to have a bond issue vote on this alternative.

Seconded.

David Dennis said he thought there was a pretty clear indication of how the people felt by the first vote without voting on anything further.

Jack Menge said he thought we should vote on whether there is interest in going on with this and not specific amounts of money.

Harry Sanborn asked what figure they had in mind.

Mr. Edwards explained something about the program they would like to have for the 7th and 8th graders. They would like to have the program but try to have less expensive renovations, probably around \$200,000.

Sidney Lea said that he thought we should vote to consider an alternative plan which would cost less money but would offer the same program for 7th and 8th graders.

Motion by paper ballot.

Motion defeated.

Meeting adjourned at 9:43 P.M.

LYME SCHOOL BOARD ANNUAL REPORT

At the School District meeting in March 1976 the School Board was directed to study various options for the improved education of our 7th and 8th graders. The members of the School Board, the Building Committee, the Superintendent and his S.U. #22 staff spent a great deal of time gathering the information that appeared in the report entitled, "Where Do We Go From Here?" After two public hearings, it was voted at the adjourned school district meeting in November not to make any changes in our facilities or program.

Last March the district voted to apply for matching funds from the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation to construct softball and soccer fields on the so-called Grant property. We are happy to announce that our request was approved in November. We are now in the process of advertising for bids in hopes of starting construction as early as possible.

The staff has completed a skills sequence for math and language arts. The science skills sequence is being developed. An evaluation process is being prepared to determine where each child is within the skills sequence and to aid in planning a program for each child's development. Increased emphasis has been placed on reading skills throughout the entire school and test results show marked improvement.

We wish to thank Fran Tullar for her many years of teaching in Lyme and we welcome three new teachers:

Sara DeMont Kindergarten Deborah McLane .. Grade 2
Jill Chapman Grade 3

Some board members have attended various seminars and workshops on the duties of board members, evaluation of administrators and teachers, and negotiation procedures. Also we have representatives on the following Supervisory Union #22 committees: Study of Administrative Salaries, Evaluation of Superintendent, and Title IX (prohibiting sex discrimination in education).

Under the Staff Development system, our teachers and staff have attended many and varied workshops. Five of them have taken college credit courses.

We were fortunate to receive anonymous gifts for the enrichment of grades $1-\mu$ and for the creation of a building fund.

The Board would like to thank the members of the building and land committees, administrators, the staff and the many volunteers who have given so generously of their time. We also wish to thank Everett Rich for his many years as moderator of the school district.

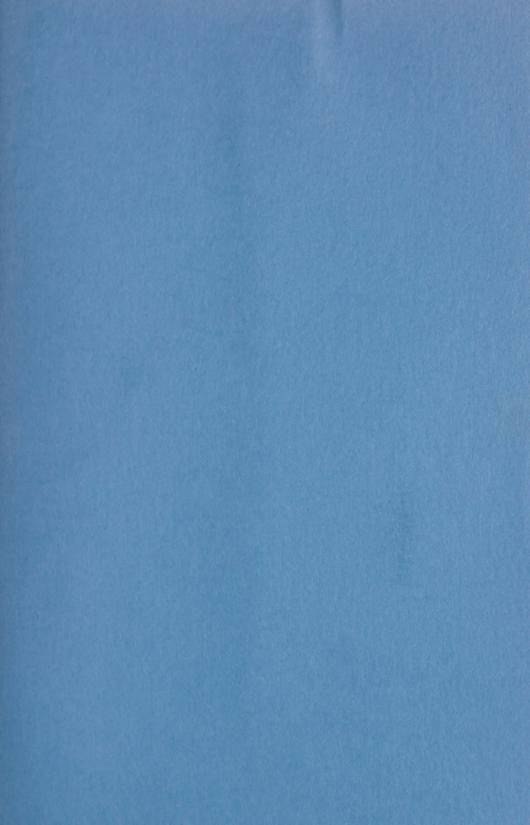
