INAUGURAL ADDRESS BY MAYOR LESTER H. BURNHAM, JANUARY 2, 1956

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

We assemble here today to organize our city government for a period of two years.

It is the beginning ... both of a new year and a new administration. And it is an occasion on which I feel it is more fitting to preview some imminent municipal affairs than to review those already resolved and behind us.

First, we propose the purchase of 90-day Treasury notes. This would offset part of the cost of short term loans in the financing of city expenditures in anticipation of taxes.

We propose to try the consolidation of rubbish and garbage rellection. We believe this would establish efficiency and reduce costs.

We plan the establishment of a long-range aviation program. This would be established through a proposed aviation fund account with Federal and State matching funds, and a new rental agreement which, over a period of ten years, should amount to \$60,000 to provide for aviation improvement with practically no additional burden to our citizens or our tax rate.

We plan the gradual conversion of heating our city-operated buildings by oll-fire heat. This will continue the program which last year saw the conversion of each of our four firehouses with increased efficiency and economy.

During the year 1955, approximately 320 new homes were built in Nashua. Eighty per cent of these were serviced with the city's sewer system. We expect the same number of homes will be built this year and we plan to service these anticipated homes where possible.

Since most of the existing sewers have now reached their limit by gravity flow, to extend sewer service to some homes, it will be necessary to use a pump. Some other homes will have to be connected with private disposal systems until such time as the city is able to install a treatment plant. Such treatment plants are now necessary by law for all new sewer outfalls in either the Nashua or Merrimack Rivers.


The impact of these laws is already felt by the City of Nashua in the mandate to free Salmon Brook of pollution within the next two years.

While the pollution of Salmon Brook is insignificant compared to the two rivers, this cost will amount to approximately \$23,000. These are some of the proposals which are imminent as we pause to assess our present growth ... and anticipate our growth in the future.

The expansion of our city should be studied and planned... both as to the welfare of our people, the quality and extension of construction, and the services rendered to maintain our city in a manner of which we can be proud.

This is an era of atomics and electronics. May I say that every one of us will be called upon to use his wisdom and his energy for the potential economic development before us. If we share our knowledge and earnest efforts, I am confident we shall succeed in our job to make Nashua a better place for us all.

And finally, I wish for all Nashuans a Very Happy and Prosperous New Year.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the City of Nashua for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1955, which was made by this Division in accordance with your request. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

The accounts and records of all city officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of city funds were examined and audited. An examination was made of a sufficient number of vouchers, payrolls and cancelled checks to satisfy the requirements of accepted standards of audit procedure. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks.

Change in Current Financial Condition:

The Surplus increased by \$49,355.94 during 1955, as indicated herewith:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits D & E)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1955, are presented in Exhibits D and E. As indicated therein, a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$32,556.00, plus a revenue surplus of \$67,230.99, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$99,786.99.

Tax collections (exclusive of State Head Taxes) of the current year's levy, as compared to taxes assessed, for the years of 1954 and 1955, were as follows:

Inter-departmental Charges:

Inter-departmental charges are billed by the department furnishing services, materials, etc., to the recipient department. A city check is then issued and processed in the usual manner. This procedure usually takes a month or more and sometimes overlaps two fiscal years. It is recommended that such inter-departmental charges be accounted for by journal entries, debiting the department to be charged and crediting the department which furnishes the services or supplies. This would eliminate the time lapse and save extra check writing, etc.

Closing of City Books:

It is recommended that the City books be kept open for a few days after the end of the fiscal year, December 31st, in order that all current year charges and credits may be recorded.

Nashua High School Athletic Association:

The faculty advisor of the Nashua High School Athletic Association is the custodian of a "revolving fund" from which cash payments of approximately \$5,000.00 are made during the course of a year. Receipts supporting expenditures made from this fund, as checked by the Auditors, do not appear to be adequate to provide a full accounting for such expenditures. It is also believed that some items paid through this account should be paid by regular City Treasurer's checks.

CITY OF NASHUA, NEW HAMPSHIRE

A checking account could be established out of which "at the game" expenses could be paid through issuance of individual checks to each payee. If cash payments are to be continued some form of payroll should be adopted in order that individual signatures of all persons to whom payments are made may be obtained thereon.

It is noted that it has been the practice for one police officer to sign a receipt for the payment for services of as many as fifteen men.

Parking Meter Funds:

It is recommended that two men be present at all times when parking meter funds are being counted.

Treasurer's Surety Bond:

The surety bond of the City Treasurer should be increased in amount from \$20,000.00 to \$50,000.00.

Conclusion:

The accounts of the city officials and departments which we examined were found in good condition and the accounting and financial procedures, with exceptions as herein noted, conformed to accepted methods. We extend our thanks to the officials of the City of Nashua and their office staffs for the assistance rendered during the course of the audit.

TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF ALDERMEN:

Gentlemen:

Under the provisions of Section 7 Chapter IV of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Nashua (1950), I submit, herewith, my recommendations for the necessary amount of money which should be appropriated for the several departments and other needs of the City of Nashua for the year 1955; and, for the purposes of Section 3 Part 1 of Chapter VII of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Nashua, each item of this budget shall be considered as a 'eparate appropriation.

For convenience, account numbers have been assigned to each item of the budget. When a department makes an expenditure, it will be charged on their books to their appropriate account number. All departments will make regular monthly reports to the Mayor's office of their monthly expenditures and unexpended balances under each item. These reports will be consolidated on a master sheet and kept on file in the Mayor's office for the convenience of the Finance Committee and inspection of the Board of Aldermen.

Each department has been given a different key alphabetical letter to identify its own individual itemizations. In order that comparisons may readily be made between departments of their expenditures for comparable items or to determine easily total City spending for certain specific item , the account numbers are uniform. There are 18 standard items, some of which appear in the budgets of all departments. These standard items all carry the same account numbers throughout all departments. Within any one or more of these standard breakdowns there may be further subdivisions which are indicated by the decimal point and additional numbered classifications. Any item listed after 18 is not one found in the other departments, thus all item beginning with 19 are peculiar to the department concerned. The key for the standard account numbers is as follows:

to carry out such provisions and to exercise and perform its powers and duties under this ordinance. 3. Airport Manager. The Committee shall appoint an Airport Mana-

ger to supervise and control the operation of any landing area which is duly Iccensed or registered under State Laws. Said airport manager and his authorized representatives shall be deputized as law enforcement officers by said committee, and shall have and exercise the powers and duties of such law enforcement officials in respect to all violations of law or rules and regulations occurring on or in the immediate vicinity of the landing area.

The airport manager or his authorized representatives shall have full power to close the airport against the takeoff of any aircraft when in his opinion the proposed flight cannot be conducted without endangering the life or property of others. Provided, that the power granted hereby shall not be used to prevent any flight which can be conducted in accordance with the then current federal and state regulations governing the operation of aircraft.

The Board of Fire Commissioners herewith submits its Annual Report for the year of 1955.

The Board met on January 1st 1955 and organized by electing R. F. Girouard, Chairman; E. A. Whitney, Clerk; R. Soucy, Purchasing Agent.

OPERATING PERSONNEL

The operating personnel on the two platoon system of the Fire Department was as follows: Chief, Sr. Deputy, Jr. Deputy, 2nd Jr. Deputy, Supt. of Fire Alarms, Master Mechanic, 7 Captains, 6 Lieutenants, 54 Privates and 23 Call Privates.

FIRE PREVENTION BUREAU During the year of 1955 a total of 7399 inspections were made of Dwellings, Mercantile and Manufacturing establishments, Schools, Churches, Nurses Homes. Hospitals, Convalescent Homes, Theaters, Hotels, Orphanages, Clubs, Public Places of Assembly and included in this report there were 1582 inspections made of new oil burner installations.

Many of the inspections and investigations conducted by this bureau were made with the assistance of the State Fire Marshall A. G. Robinson and his inspectors H. L. Whitney and Ernest Jenkins. Recommendations were made as a result of these investigations and we are pleased to report that our recommendations have been carried out.

The fire prevention bureau at this time wishes to extend its sincere thanks for the wonderful cooperation received from Manufacturing plant officials, owners and managers of Mercantile establishments also owners and occupants of Dwellings and other Institutions in carrying out our recommendations.

We also wish to thank the Nashua Telegraph and Radio Station WOTW for their assistance in conveying our message on fire prevention to the general public.

FIRE ALARM SYSTEM

During the year of 1955 there were three miles of wire used in line construction to connect the new fire alarm boxes with the fire alarm system, About three thousand man hours was used in change overs in reconstruction work where the Telephone Company and Public Service Company changed poles.

We have put up seven thousand feet of aerial cable from Arlington Street Fire Station to Allds & Main Streets and also from Lake Street Fire Station to Main Street. Several thousand feet of underground cable was pulled into place throughout the City

The radio equipment which was originally installed for the Fire Department has reached the stage where it needs replacement now. This should be done as quickly as possible.

PARK AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT

To: Members of the Park and Recreation Commission;

Nashua, New Hampshire.

SKATING

The park and recreation commission designated the following areas to be used as skating locations: a. South Common, b. Holman Stadium, c. Marshall Street, d. Textile Field, e. Atherton Avenue. The last two locations were designated as smaller areas to provide skating for the smaller children. The season was of five week duration and South Common drew the greatest attendance. Lights were provided at all locations to allow skating during the evening hours. These areas were plowed, swept and flooded by the maintenance personnel of this department. Other departmental activities of the winter months included the building, repairing and painting of playground equipment at the park maintenance shops by the department personnel. The equipment used at the various locations in our City Parks was repainted and completely reconditioned.

GREENHOUSE

This department maintains a greenhouse located adjacent to its maintenance shops at Greeley Park. It provides all of the plants used in the City flower beds as planned and designated by the Commission. This year we raised approximately twenty two hundred geraniums, two hundred cannas, zinnias, salvia, petunia, coleus and marigold plants as needed. This greenhouse is heated by the same boiler which provides the heat for the shop areas, thus keeping the operating cost to a minimum. One of our activities which is proving increasingly popular is the availability of garden plots at Greeley Park. A modest fee is charged for the use of these lots to cover the cort of ploving and harrowing and the list of potential users grows annually.

HOLMAN STADIUM

The Holman Stadium continues to be the focal point for all major athletic and recreational activities. This year the stadium was used by both the Senior and Junior High Schools' Athletic Teams as usual. It was also used by the Senior and Junior Ward League Baseball Teams and the playground baseball teams. The City Fathers played their annual charity softball games at the Stadium. These games provided funds to be used for the entertainment of participants of the Ward League programs such as the annual trip to Boston and banquets. This year, through the courtesy of the Cott Bottling Company, an electric time clock was installed at the stadium. This proved to be a welcome addition as it provides spectators with the correct time remaining to be played at all the football games. Mr. James Lagios, local wrestling promoter, used Holman Stadium to promote action packed and entertaining wrestling matches.

TEXTILE FIELD

This large and attractive athletic area was seeded and fertilized. The field turned out real well and for the first time in many years, was a definite asset as a ball field.

PARK AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT

ANNUAL REPORT

TEXTILE FIELD

This department constructed a tennis court which measures seventy eight feet by thirty six feet. It consists of a gravel base with one and one half inch of premix hot top. A six foot chain link fence which was removed from the old Lake Street School area was installed at both extremities of this court. The net was installed and the court lined off for play. The surface of the wading pool which lies just south of the tennis court was resealed to prevent water loss through a porous surface. The playground area was enlarged by thinning out small trees and brush.

MARSHALL STREET

This baseball field was plowed under and disc harrowed. A smoothing harrow was then used and the field leveled out. It was then fertilized and seeded for a baseball field. One of the largest backstops in our entire system was installed at the ball field. This backstop measures forty feet long and is eighteen feet high. New player's benches were instaled at this location. This field is now one of the best conditioned in our system.

REAR OF STADIUM

This number one softball field outside of Holman Stadium is perhaps the most frequently used. It is utilized by the industrial softball league and was in dire need of a face lifting. This field was completely turned over and made smooth. It was fertilized and seeded and also new players benches were installed. This field is now ready for use by all interested parties and is in excellent condition.

ARLINGTON STREET

In the rear of the Arlington Street School, we installed some swings, one slide and one sandbox. This play area was made available for small children. The equipment was received from the transient camp area and transferred to this aforementioned location. It was certainly utilized to maximum advantage.

TEMPLE STREET

This playground was cleaned up and the play area leveled off. We installed a new merry-go-round and added new seats for the swings. While this is a relatively small area, it is adequate for the children of that vicinity and is very well attended during the playground season.

CITY OF NASHUA, NEW HAMPSHIRE

CENTENNIAL POOL

The new Centennial Pool was constructed under the direct supervision of the undersigned. The excavating and the use of heavy equipment was done by the Board of Public Works. Maximum effort was exerted by this department from early spring until opening day so that the pool would be opened as directed by the Commission. This department installed the cement buttresses and pads which make up the basic foundation for the steel plates of this pool. Tower Iron Works then came in with the steel plates and with the help of a huge crane, lifted the plates and slides into position. Next, welders were put to work welding these plates together and when completed the entire inside surface area was sand blasted by employees of the parent company. Five coats of paint was then applied and the finish surface was a thing of beauty. Four ladders were then installed in the pool and the diving board attached. The filter house was then constructed and all operating equipment installed within its confines. All drain pipes and water feed pipes were welded into place and tested. The pool was then filled with water and the recirculation filter system put into operation. This filter is designed to completely turn over the contents of this pool three times in a twenty four hour period. It worked to perfection after eliminating a few small bugs and kept our water crystal clear. This pool was under the close scrutiny of both the local and State Board of Health during the operating season. The pool was accepted by both agencies after careful observation and a letter to that effect sent to the Park and Recreation Commission.

BATH HOUSE; This department constructed the bath house in its entirety. Lumber was cut during the winter months and sent to the mill. This lumber was processed and finished. In addition this department tore down the old transient camp on the Pine Hill Road. Most all the carrying timber needed in the construction of the bath house was realized in this operation. Soil and drainage pipe was installed and a concrete slab poured to the floor of the bath house. Next, the structure was put up and showers, toilets, sinks, and electric switch boxes were instaled. The outside structure is composed of knotty pine wood with a pickwick pattern. An oil stain finish was then applied. It houses storage space, toilet facilities for both end is located a concession stand for the convenience of swimmers and observers. The overall size of this building is eighty four feet in length and twenty feet in width.

To mention everyone who made this pool a success would take more space than is available in a report of this kind. It was indeed a community effort which was climaxed by the fulfillment of this proposition. Honorable Mayor, Lester H. Burnham was indeed the guiding force of this entire venture from the embryo to ultimate realization. The Park and Recreation Commission directed the entire project from the planning stage to its completion putting in much time, study and effort. My sincere thanks to the aforementioned for I can say that without their guidance and cooperation my efforts would have been much more difficult. I also want to take this opportunity to praise the fine effort put forth by the men of this department in this venture The entire project was completed at a minimum of cost to the City of Nashua.

PROMENADE: The entire promenade area around the outside of the pool was installed by the department personnel. This promenade is constructed with two inches of premix hot top asphalt and the edge of the pool has a cap of cement slabs installed by the contracting company. Temporary bleachers were installed on the outside of the pool so that parents could sit and observe while the children were using the bathing facilities.

FIELD'S GROVE

This swimming area was given a face lifting. Stalls were constructed

in the bath house—this being necessitated by the fact that vandals broke into this facility and caused quite a bit of destruction. The gas chlorine dispensing machine was cleaned off and put into operation. The gas chlorine system operated exceptionally well throughout the swimming season. Field's Grove was well attended by all age groups during the entire season.

BASKETBALL COURTS

The courts of the entire city were again marked out and painted to conform with the Junior regulation size. These courts were in constant use even into the winter months. I have seen some of these courts cleared off by the children using them after a snow storm and quite a representative group enjoying its facilities.

In conclusion may I take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the members of the Park and Recreation Commission for their cooperation and enthusiasm in all projects undertaken by this department. Supplementary: The Recreation Director's Report.

To: Park Recreation Commission:

The following is a report of the recreational activities directed by me and sponsored by the Park Recreation Commission during the year of 1955.

SKATING

The skating season for 1955 was one of the best. We had several days of good skating for the weatherman proved very cooperative with us. We had three regular skating rinks again this year, South Common, Holman Stadium and Marshall St. We also had rinks at Textile and Atherton Ave., when it was possible to make ice at these areas. Several adults as well as the children took advantage of these rinks. South Common was again the area having the greatest attendance.

PLAYGROUNDS

We operated eleven playgrounds this season under supervision. They were situated at the following places; Atherton, Belvidere, Fairgrounds, North Common, Palm St., Rancourt, Shattuck, South Common, Sullivan Park, Temple St., and Textile. We also have play areas at Greeley Park and at the Fields Grove Swimming Pool, where there are several pieces of equipment for the children to use.

Our regular playgrounds were supervised for a nine weck period. They were open daily from nine o'clock in the morning until four-forty-five in the afternoon Monday through Friday and Saturday morning from nine o'clock until eleven-forty-five. All the playgrounds had a boy and girl attendant during these hours.

The playground schedule was arranged so all age groups could participate and be supervised. The younger children played bean bag, ring toss, dodge ball, horseshoes, singing games, stix, tag games, checkers, etc.

The older children played more active games such as badminton, softball, volleyball, soccer, tether ball, hand tennis, deck tennis, hand ball, tennis, touch football, baseball, horseshoes, etc.

During the hot period of the day the schedule was planned so the children played quiet games such as card games and puzzles, or they had a period for reading, coloring or story telling, etc.

The playgrounds were equipped with the following apparatus: swings, slide, sand box, baby swings, see-saws, horseshoes, volleyball, basketball, badminton, ring toss, bean bag, tetherball, etc. We have Merry-Go Rounds on the following playgrounds: North Common, Belvidere, South Common, Textile, Temple Street, Sullivan Park and Rancourt.

Basketball Courts are available for the children on South Common, North Common, Atherton, Belvidere, Temple Street, Sullivan Park and Textile.

We have now ten tennis courts available for the children as well as for the adults. These courts are located as follows: four courts at North Common, two at South Common, two at Arlington Street (Crown Hill) and two built this past season at Textile. The children on the playgrounds where these courts were available made use of these. In conjunction with our playground program, we operated a Playground Baseball League. This league was for the boys who were unable to play in our Ward League or Minor Ward League because of their inability, age, or to some physical handicap. The boy attendants at the playgrounds coached these teams. They taught these boys the fundamentals of baseball and instructed them in good sportmanship. We had about 250 boys playing ball in this league. This league has been a great asset to our program as it has given the younger children and the physically handicapped a chance to play.

During the season we played 68 baseball games in this league. The champions of the league was the South Common team. This team was presented the Scott Jeweler Trophy, which is presented annually by this company to the playground baseball champions.

For the girls we had softball teams, volleyball and basketball teams. As only Belvidere, Atherton, Temple, Textile, Shattuck, South Common and Sullivan Park had teams, we did not have an organized league in these sports but the girls visited the different playgrounds during the season to play these games.

The older boys had a basketball league. The league was limited to the

playgrounds where a basketball court was available.

Every week we had a special activity such as the following:

The winners of these contests were presented a ribbon or a trophy.

Our playgrounds last year, in spite of the extreme heat, had a greater attendance than ever. Our average daily attendance at our eleven playgrounds was approximately 1745. The largest attendance was at the South Common with Sullivan Posk and Atherton the runners up.

The week previous to the closing of the playground we had our annual Championship Day at Sullivan Park. This was our third championship day and it proved very successful with over 175 boys and girls representing the eleven playgrounds participating. I arranged the events so that all age groups of both boys and girls could participate in the events. We sponsored the following events, basketball, foul shooting, horseshoes, ball throwing, ring toss bean bag, checkers, races etc. The winners of the events were declared the city champs and presented trophies signifying such.

On the closing day of our playground season we had our annual playground parties for the children. We had about 2500 boys and girls present at these parties at the various playgrounds. The members of the Park Recreation Commission and some of the Board of Aldermen visited the playgrounds with me and served the children ice cream, lollipops, gum, candy, cookies and balloons. After the "sweets" the children played games and prizes were awarded the winners.

At South Common Chairman Dambroise presented the Playground Trophy to Beverly Kopka and Joseph Wrobleski, the Playground attendants for having the largest attendance for the season. At the same time the Youth Committee of the B.P.O. Elks presented a check to Chairman Dambroise to help in defraying the expenses of the parties. Others who helped in making these parties possible were: Mr. Norman Jeannotte, Mr Philip Lamoy, Mr. Roger Duhamel and Mr. C. G. Scontsas.

HANDICRAFT

In conjunction with our playground program we have our handicraft classes. This year the classes were under the supervision of Miss Charlotte Maney. The program proved to be very successful and interesting. The instructress visited the playgrounds in rotation on an average about once a week. She taught the children to make interesting and worthwhile articles. The classes were so planned as to give all age groups a chance to make some article. These classes were also planned so that the children had a chance to develop ideas of their own and develop skill in hand work.

Some of the articles made this year were: baskets, decorated boxes, painted trays, painted plates, bean bags, pin cushions, yarn dolls, felt animal toy, stuffed animals, gimp bracelets, gimp necklaces, felt and straw bags, napkin holders, pencil boxes, calendars, jewelry (purses, earrings, pins, necklaces, brooches, rings etc.), place mats, table mats, leather articles, (billfolds, purses, comb cases, wrist purses etc.), painted tile plaques, embroidery work, weaving, braided mats, jewelery boxes, U.S. Flower Maps, pipe cleaner art, book markers, pot holders, figurettes, colored wall plaques, art work etc.

WADING POOLS

The wading pools were very attractive to the youngsters this year, especially during the very hot season. The pools were kept in condition having been cleaned every day by the attendants at the playgrounds. We have six of these pools in addition to the pool at Greeley Park. The pools are located at Belvidere, Atherton, South Common, Textile, Sullivan Park and Temple St.

GREELEY PARK

Greeley Park is perhaps one of the most beautiful parks in our state. The park now has twenty outdoor fireplaces which the public can use at no expense to them. In the vicinity of the fireplaces are picnic tables large enough to accommodate a family group. The fireplaces are in constant use all during the picnic season.

For the children at the park we have a play area equipped with swings, baby swings, slides, jungle gym, see-saws etc. We also have a wading pool for the youngsters. There is a rest room and several lawn swings on the park for the general public. On the east side of the park we have softball diamonds which can be used for club outings, etc.

SWIMMING POOLS

On July 7, 1955 our new Centennial Pool was opened officially. Judge Robert Griffith was the presiding officer at the ceremonies. Hon, Lester H. Burnham presented the keys of the pool to Chairman Oliver J. Dambroise. Guests at the opening ceremonies were the members of the Park Recreation Commission, Board of Aldermen, Board of Public Works and representatives of the clubs and other organizations who contributed to the construction of the pool.

The Centennial Pool proved to be one of the very busy spots during the summer. We operated the pool from 10:00 A. M. to 8:00 P. M. daily. Mr. Joseph Lee supervised the pool. He was assisted by four life guards. The matron at the pool rendered first aid and had charge of the checking. I visited this pool on an average of twice a day. This pool has been a great addition to our recreational system both for the children and the adults.

Fields Grove, our other swimming spot, proved also to be an attractive place for our citizens. Although the Centennial Pool helped in relieving the load at the pool, it was still a very busy place. Mr. Edward Desmarais was the supervisor at this pool and he was assisted by four lifeguards and a matron. Mrs. Esther Booth was the matron again this year having been associated with us for five years. She had charge of the bathhouse and rendered first aid when it was necessary.

We had no serious accidents at either pool during the season. The two pools were closed for the season on Sept. 1st. Fields Grove being opened for a twelve week period and the Centennial Pool from July 7th.

The water at both pools was checked and inspected frequently by the Local and State Board of Health. They found the water to be satisfactory.

The swimming classes were again under the supervision of Miss Anne McWeeney. She was assisted by Miss Geraldine Bolduc who also acted as a guard when she was not assisting Miss McWeeney.

Our swimming classes were 'arger than ever. The registration in these classes was 1107 children and adults. The ages of these registrants was from 4 years to 40 plus. The largest group was in our beginners class where there were 800 registered.

The class period for the morning were 20 minutes, the length recommended by national swimming associations for classes at children's camps.

Class instruction for advanced swimmers were given from 2:00 to 2:30 P. M. and for the Junior and Senior Life Saving classes from 2:30 to 4:00 P. M.

Adult classes were held Tuesday and Thursday from 7:00 P. M. to 8:00 P. M. at the Centennial Pool and Monday and Wednesday at Fields Grove. We had an enrollment of 30 adults in these classes. This group showed gratifying progress and at the Aquatic Day gave a very creditable demonstration of the swimming strokes they had learned during the summer.

At Fields Grove in conjunction with the pool we have a play area and picnic area. The picnic area has tables and benches for the public use. This area was in constant use in the late afternoon and weekends with family picnics. Our play area has swings, area for softball, horeshoes etc.

The Nashua Kiwanis Club again this year helped in the defraying of the expenses of the swimming class instruction and the Aquatic Days held at the close of the season. This year we held an Aquatic Day at Fields Grove and another at the Centennial Pool. Over 400 boys and girls participated in the events. The winners of the events were presented prizes and ribbons. The children who passed the Beginners Swimming tests were presented the Kiwanis Swimmer Champ Jerseys. We also presented to those who passed two or more phases of the swimming class tests in which they were enrolled, the Park Recreation-Kiwanis Club certificate. We issued over 650 of these certificates.

We must remember, while the swimming program is part of our recreational program, actually it is more than that; for the children and adults alike are learning skills which give them pleasure to learn and use, but which may also be a means of saving their lives and help in saving others in the future.

DANCES

In conjunction with the dance phase of our recreation program, we sponsored Square Dance classes for the youth of the city. These square dance classes were taught by Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Priest. They were held at the Crowley School Auditorium every Wednesday evening from 6:30 to 9:00 o'clock.

We also sponsored again this year a dance where "Miss Teenager" was selected by a board of judges. The judges were Mr. John Stylianos of the Nashua Telegraph, Mr. John Canty of Radio Station WOTW and Mrs. Alma Lajoi, president of the Nashua Cosmetologost Association. They selected Miss Terri Bonenfant as "Miss Teenager".

BASEBALL

Our Ward Baseball League had a very successful season, the tenth season we have had this league to care for the boys up to 18 years of age. The league consists of 185 boys ranging in the ages of 12 to 18 years. The league is composed of eight teams namely Ward 1, Ward 2, Ward 3, Wards 4-5, Ward 6, Ward 7, Ward 8 and Ward 9.

We equipped these boys with uniforms and this season we issued 45 new uniforms to the league members. We supplied the bats and balls and the catcher's equipment. The only equipment the boys supplied was a glove and shoes. In a few cases we supplied these to boys who were financially unable to supply their own and showed an interest in the league.

Over 100 games were played by the boys during the season. Our ALL Star team played exhibition games with Belmont, Mass. Legion team and the Wilton Town team.

In the playoffs the four top teams in the league at the close of the season participated. They were Ward 3, Ward 6, Ward 8 and Ward 2. Ward 3 won the playoff and were also the season champions and were awarded the Branch Rickey Trophy and the Mayor Lester H. Burnham Trophy.

To care for those boys who were unable to play in our Ward League and the Little League, I organized with your permission the Minor Ward League for boys from 12 to 15 years of age. This league was very successful. It was necessary to have 6 teams in the league as 125 boys registered in the league. The teams were the Yanks, Braves, Dodgers, Indians, Redlegs and Tigers.

As with the Ward League we furnished uniforms, bats, balls and catchers' equipment to these boys. They played 65 games during the season. The Yankees were the Season and Playoff champions.

From the comments of the parents and citizens in general, they believe it was one of our best programs as it took care of that group of children who had been forgotten in most of the recreational programs.

SOFTBALL LEAGUE

The Girls Softball League completed their fifth season. We had 135 girls playing softball this season. The league was made up of four teams; the Gold Sox, Blue Sox, Red Sox and Green Sox.

The girls played 48 games during the season. The season ended with a three way tie, the Blue Sox, Gold Sox and Red Sox tieing for first place. In the playoff the Blue Sox won the two out of three series and was declared the 1955 champs,

We supplied the girls with uniforms, bats, balls and catcher's equipment. We also supplied gloves to many of the girls.

PERMITS

Our baseball and softball diamonds were in constant use during the season by the Minor League, Ward League, Girls Softball League, Industrial League, YWCA League and many independent teams. I issued 1343 permits during the season for the use of these diamonds. These diamonds are located at the following areas: North Common-1 Baseball Diamond and 2 Softball diamonds; Atherton-1 Baseball and 1 Softball diamond; Dike-1 Softball diamond; Marshall St.-1 Softball and 1 Baseball; South Common-combination Softball and Baseball; Textile-1 Baseball and 1 Softball; Fairgrounds-1 Softball; Greeley-1 Softball; Four Corners-1 Softball diamond.

Little League Park, I reserved exclusively for the Little League and issued a permit for the season to them.

Holman Stadium, I reserved for the High School, Junior High, Ward League, Legion, Minor League, Wrestling, etc. I issued 87 permits for this

area. This does not include the practice sessions held by the various teams. Our tennis courts located at North Common, Scuth Common and Crown Hill were used by the High School, Junior High and a few inde-pendent groups. I issued 42 permits for the use of these courts.

BASKETBALL COURTS

Our seven outdoor basketball courts are located at the following areas: North Common, Atherton, Belvidere, Temple, Sullivan Park, South Com-mon and Textile. The court at Belvidere is marked so it can also be used as a shuffleboard area.

These courts are used daily by our children. Even in the winter some of the boys shovel the courts off so they can use them.

COMMUNITY BUILDING

The Community Building on Crown Hill has been in constant use this year. The building has been used by the Arts and Crafts Association, Boy Scouts, Boy Scout Leaders, Girl Scouts, Girl Scout Leaders class, Physically Handicapped, Artist Club, Cancer Society, Barber Shop Singers, Nashua Library and several other community groups who held meetings during the year.

In addition to these groups the Retarded Children group have had classes in the building and also kindergarten was also there both under the direction of Mrs. Beatrice Stewart.

The schedule was arranged so we did not have any conflicts at the building. When our Lake St. Community Building is opened the crowding condition at this building we hope will be relieved.

DISPLAY

At the close of the playground season a display of the handicraft work done on playgrounds was in the window of the Public Service Co. In conjunction with the display, pictures of our activities were shown as well as the equipment we use in our recreational program.

NEW EQUIPMENT

A new Merry-Go-Round was installed at Temple St. playground this season. Seven of our playgrounds have this piece of apparatus at the present time.

We have a new tennis court at Textile Playground. We now have nine courts in the city.

We equipped our Ward League with 45 new uniforms.

COOK OUT

Because of the polio epidemic our annual trip to a baseball game in

boston was cancelled. Instead we had a cookout for the Softball League and the Ward and Minor League at Greeley Park. At the girls cookout we had 125 present. An afternoon of games was held. For the cookout we served hamburgers, hot dogs, tonic, potato chips, pickles, ice cream, etc. At the close of the cookout all the girls were given a souvenir.

At the Ward and Minor League we had 130 present. They also enjoyed an afternoon of games and treats similar to the girls. All the "treats" were prepared by the members of the Park Recreation

Commission and the managers of the various teams.

BANQUETS

The annual banquet for the members of the Girl Softball League was held at the Ladies of Charity Foyer on Tuesday, Oct. 25, 1955. Members of the league, team managers, members of the Park Recreation Commission, Mayor Lester H. Burnham and invited guests were present.

Chairman Oliver J. Dambroise was toastmaster, invocation was given by Rev. Eugene Dranka and Mayor Lester H. Burnham extended the greettings of the city and presented the St. Pierre Jewelers Trophy to the Blue Sox team, the season champions. Chairman Oliver J. Dambroise presented the Park Recreation Trophy to Mr. Gerald Guerette, the Manager of the Blue Sox team.

A banquet for the members of the Minor Ward League was held at the Ladies of Charity Foyer on Thursday, Nov. 17, 1955. Mr. Oliver J. Dambroise was the toastmaster, Rev. J. Norman Barrett gave the invocation and Mayor Lester H. Burnham extended the greetings.

The speaker for the evening was Mr. George "Birdie" Tebbetts.

Mr. Edward Lecius, presented the WOTW Trophy to the Yankees, the season champions and Mr. Michael Shalhoup presented the Nashua Telegraph Trophy to the Yankees, the playoff champions.

At this banquet 240 attended which included the members of the league, managers, Mayor, members of the Board of Aldermen, Board of Public Works and all those who had helped in sponsoring the banquets for the members of our league.

Mr. Francis Nugent was the toastmaster. Rev. Elphege I. Bussiere gave the invocation and Mayor Lester H. Burnham extended the greetings and presented the Mayor's Trophy to Ward 3 Manager Lenny Rioux, the season's champions. Chairman Oliver J. Dambroise awarded the Branch Rickey Trophy to Ward 3, the playoff champions.

This year a new trophy was added to our list of awards. The Maurice Noel Memorial Trophy in memory of Maurice Noel Jr., the second boy of the Ward League to lose his life while serving his country. Maurice Noel was a member of the Ward League for six years and played for Ward 8 until he enlisted in the service in 1954. The trophy was donated by the Social Club and awarded to the Most Valuable Player in the league by Rev. Elphege Bussiere.

The Gilbert Dumais Memorial Trophy was presented by Mr. William

Barrett to the Outstanding Sportman of the League. Mr. Robert Nelson, Vice Pres. J. F. McElwain Co. Presented Certifiicates for shoes to all members of the Ward 3 team.

The Board of Examination of Plumbers respectfully submits the Annual Report for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1955.

The membership of theBoard consisted of the following: Chairman Alcide Turcote, Master Plumber; Edward T. Hodge, Journeyman Plumber; A. E. Maynard, City Engineer, Secretary; S. Raymond Desmarais, Plumbing Inspector.

The regular meetings were held the first Monday of each month except from June to September. Six examinations to pass upon fitness of eight applicants for plumbing license were held. Five were licensed as Journeyman Plumbers and one as Master Plumber. Two applicants were denied a license.

There were thirty-one Master Plumber Licenses and sixty-five Journeyman Plumber Licenses issued during the year.

A total of 1,363 inspections in 376 buildings were made during the year.

Seventy-one plumbing law violations were investigated and corrected.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

Februrary 8, 1956

To the Honorable Mayor

and Members of the Board of Aldermen City Hall

Nashua, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

The Police Commission of the City of Nashua herewith submits its report for the year 1955.

The annual appropriation for the year 1955 amounted to \$243,719.33. The Department expended \$244,526.67, leaving a deficit of \$807.34. The Department turned over to the City Treasurer \$16,847.94, which

The Department turned over to the City Treasurer \$16,847.94, which is slightly higher than in 1954. A detailed breakdown is attached to this report and is marked Schedule A.

The arrest for the year totaled 2421, which is a very sharp increase over the total for 1954 which was 1496. A more detailed report is attached hereto and is marked Schedule B.

It has been the policy of this Commission, since the reorganization of the Inspectors Division late in 1950, to assign one patrolman on a temporary basis to this Division. The purpose was primarily to train the individual officer under actual conditions in the investigation of all types of crimes. It was also our desire to cultivate closer relations between uniformed and and the Inspectors branches of our organization and, by doing so, encourage the flow of information received by the foot patrolman into the hands of our investigators. This Division has three regularly assigned Inspectors under the command of Captain Philip J. McLaughlin. Their duties are varied and many. They not only include public speaking before church, civic, and other groups in Nashua and surrounding communities, but also the processing of police applicants, taxi applicants, junk license applicants, all suspicious persons arrested by other members of the Department, and the handling of all juvenile cases, besides their regular investigative duties.

The patrolman assigned on a temporary basis learns to write his complaints, juvenile summonses, proper report writing, and, most important, how to work with his brother officers in a serious criminal case. We stress the fact he is on a team and an important member of it. He is taught the importance of his doing his job well, and by doing so the whole Department functions as an efficient organization in the protection of our citizens and the prevention of crime.

75% We believe it would be shortsighted to approach the problem of Civil Defense in the spirit of providing a temporary expedient to tide us over a period of world-wide anxiety and apprehension. Certainly, if there had been any doubt, our experience in 1955 coping with two hurricanes and a train wreck within our city established our Auxiliary Police as a permanent part of our organization. It is no longer an organization designed to serve during a period of war, but a manpower pool to assist the regular members of the Department during an emergency, whatever the cause. The two emergencies that occured during 1955 caused by hurricane warning and the immediate response to duty by members of our Auxiliary Police, at no recompense, is indicative of the loyalty, training and esprit de corps of this organization.

During the year 1955, we were able to purchase through the "matching funds program" new reloading equipment. We intend to give the members

of our Auxiliary Police proper training in the use of firearms. Altho these men are unarmed at the present time, we feel knowledge of the firearms used by the Department may prove advantagous in a serious emergency. In the communications field, the Commission purchased a two-way radio set tuned to the State Police at Concord. Prior to this purchase our

In the communications field, the Commission purchased a two-way radio set tuned to the State Police at Concord. Prior to this purchase our only means of communication with the State Police was by way of teletype and telephone. Past experience during emergencies had proven that due to incoming telephone calls it was practically impossible to make any outgoing ones. The flood of police messages on the teletype at the present time makes it difficult to depend on this means of communication. We feel that with radio added we should be able to communicate with the State Police immediately.

The safety of our school children, of primary importance to this Department, was greatly enhanced during the year 1955 by the organizing of a unit consisting of thirteen women known as School Crossing Guards. These women were selected from seventy five applicants on the basis of appearance, availability, mothers of children attending the school to which they were assigned, and their interest in the safety of our elementary school children. These women were properly trained, uniformed, and assure the safety of the children going to and from school. These Guards enjoy the confidence and admiration of our public and are handling their assignments in an excellent manner. We are contemplating the addition of three more guards during 1956.

As an out of state commuter, I have noticed how well protected our school children are.

On heavily traveled Daniel Webster Highway south of the City, a school bus is on its early morning trip to pick up school children.

To insure the youngster's safety, a police cruiser is stopped about 300 feet from the rear of the bus and the officer sees the kids climb into the bus safely, and that motorists stop from both directions upon seeing flashing red lights on the school vehicle.

It gives you a good feeling to see such fine action on the part of the local law enforcement body, and know that our kids are safe.

Altho the Frederick E. Everett Highway, which by-passes the center of Nashua was officially opened in August, our Main Street continues to be the most heavily traveled in the State. Mounting traffic fatalities and personal injury accidents within our State confront all police departments with a terrific enforcement and control problem. Lack of sufficient personnel to properly enforce our laws is the reason given by the majority of police executives in our State.

Various scientific aids are made available to police in assisting them with this problem. Through the generosity of Commissioner Walter L. Barker of this Department, we purchased an alcometer to assist our members in dealing with the drunken driver problem. With legislation establishing .15% alcohol in the blood prima facie evidence of being under the influence, all of our tests recording .15% or greater are prosecuted. Those registering less may be released. We are still experimenting with other aids and techniques in attempting to establish a "fool proof" case for presentation to our courts and juries.

The complete roster of this Department is attached to this report and is marked Schedule C.

Altho highly vulnerable because of its geographical position, Nashua enjoys one of the lowest crime rates in New England. We believe this reflects the zeal, quality, and devotion to duty of the members of this Department.

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REPORT OF THE BOARD OF ASSESSORS

To Mayor Lester H. Burnham,

Members of the Board of Aldermen.

Gentlemen:

The Board of Assessors herewith submits its annual report for the year 1955.

It is with deep regret that the Board reports the death of veteran member John P. Sullivan, who died December 21, 1955. Mr. Sullivan was a valuable member of the Board of Assessors and gave many years service to the city in various positions.

(note—The vacancy on the Board was filled January 10 1956 with election of Michael Joseph Sullivan, at a joint convention of the Board of Aldermen and Assessors.)

ANNUAL REPORT

The year 1955 was again a busy year with the Assessors, due largely to increased building, a large number of property sales and transfers of property, final completion of the state toll road and other conditions.

The total valuation of the City of Nashua for 1955 was \$55,700,330., an increase of \$1,213,614., over 1954. The tax rate for 1955, as approved by the State Tax Commission, was \$51.10 a decrease of \$1.20 per thousand, the second year in a row that the tax rate has gone down.

There were 17,071 persons listed for poll taxes, an increase of 436 and 21,366 were listed for Head Taxes, an increase of 489.

Again in 1955 there was an increase in Veterans exemptions, with 1705 Veterans filing for property exemptions, totalling \$1,720,460., an increase of \$177,685.

During the year 1955 there have been 1343 property transfers and this made necessary the copying of 1343 deeds and making a similar number of changes in our records as well as a number of map changes.

The Board of Assessors made 1141 inspections of property, including new buildings and buildings where additions or changes were made and this made necessary addition or adjustment in valuation figures.

The Board members also visited 113 manufacturing plants and made 275 calls at stores to check stock in trade inventories, present ownership or changes. There were 87 calls at farms to check on livestock and equipment.

During the year the Board held 116 hearings on requests for abatements. The Board also held several meetings with manufacturers who were considering establishing in Nashua. A number of meetings were also held with individuals and groups who were considering the purchase or lease of manufacturing property.

In addition to listing all property transfers and making the necessary changes, the Assessors have listed all mortgages recorded during the year and compiled information on manufacturing plants and business places.

The Board of Assessors and members of the staff answered hundreds of telephone calls from persons requesting information as to property owners, assessments, amount of taxes and other information. A large number of letters were answered during the year in reply to requests for ownership, taxes, assessments and so forth. As in previous years many persons have called at the Assessors office to check records, ownership, transfers, check maps and secure other information regarding real estate.

It had been planned to renew additional rural maps in 1955, to replace 25 year old rural maps, but there was a delay due to final completion of the toll highway. The City Engineers office is now at work on map changes and the layout of the toll highway and it is expected that during 1956 additional rural maps will be renewed and brought up to date. During the year a member of the Board accompanied a timber tax man from the State Tax Commission on numerous inspection trips to check on timber cutting operations.

Board members also attended three Legislative hearings in Concord during the year, on bills of direct interest to the city.

The Assessors also compiled a complete list of all tax exempt property, including land and buildings owned by the city, county, state and federal governments, churches, religious groups and charitable institutions. SUMMARY

RUBBISH COLLECTION & DISPOSAL

We used six rubbish packer trucks and supplemented these with open trucks as needed for the collection of refuse.

During 1955 rubbish collections were extended on Milford Road, Deerwood Drive, Dumaine Avenue, Mathew Thornton Road and Cotton Road.

Collections are made at curb only.

Collections are made weekly in City and monthly on outskirts.

Four Sanitary Dumps were operated during the year:

- Harbor Pond Dump was the most centrally located-the area has 1. been filled and we discontinued the use of same last fall.
- E. Dunstable Road Dump-a low lying area was filled during winter months. This eliminated a swampy area which had been a breeding place for mosquitoes.
- North Hollis Road Dump-on the outskirts of City-this area was 3. used only during winter months.
- Searles Road Dump-a large city owned area on outskirts of City 4. that will serve for many years. Its long distance from the City proper is a handicap as well as the fact that we must keep a watchman on the premises.

DISASTER

Hurricane Diane in July did considerable damage in the City especially to trees. Hurricane Edna which followed brought water damage. A washout at the Edgeville Canal Dam endangered adjoining properties. A washout at the Crowley School on Lake Street did considerable damage to school vard and a retaining wall had to be replaced.

MISCELLANEOUS

We assisted the Park Recreation Department in the construction of a swimming pool on Sargent Avenue. We installed the drainage system, trucked the fill needed and paved approaches.

For the Fire Department we repaired front of Arlington Street Fire Station and paved approaches.

We also rebuilt five (water) holes on Main Dunstable Road (Rt. #111-A) paving sides with premix asphalt to prevent sliding earth.

The old transcient camp at Airport was demolished by our employees as well as a unit of the Rancourt Street Housing project.

In connection with the Memorial Tablet erected on the City Hall grounds, the Department constructed all sidewalk approaches.
