REPORT OF

SUPT. SCHOOL COMMITTEE

OF DISTRICT NUMBER. 1,

For the Year Ending March 1st, 1887.

The committee in charge of the schools in Dist. No. 1 submit the following brief report.

The schools commenced the year with Geo. W. Ransom in charge of the High School, Miss Emily Jennison in the Intermediate, and Miss Annette Brown in the Primary. At

the beginning of the fall term Mr. Ransom resigned to take charge of a school in an adjoining state. Mr. G. W. Tolman from Pittsfield, Mass., was employed to fill the vacancy. At the end of seven weeks it became apparent to the committee that the interest of the school required a change. Mr. Tolman was dismissed and Mr. L. B. Varney from Litchfield, Me., was engaged, under whose firm and judicious management the recalcitrant element was restrained, order restored, and the school has done good work from that time to the close of the year.

The Intermediate and Primary departments have been under the same instructors through the year. They have labored faithfully in the interest of the schools, and good advancement is the result of their labors.

Your attention has been called in previous reports to the subject of raising the standard of the schools, and adopting a course of study for a series of years.

We believe the greatest obstacle in the way of securing this result is the lack of constant attendance for a number of consecutive terms. This evil obtains first in the intermediate department. Soon after entering this grade some members of the class are allowed to become irregular in attendance, and very soon fall behind their classmates. Therefore when the class is ready to enter the high school these must be dropped out into the next lower class, or sent up to become a dead weight to be carried by the others. Such is the condition of the class to be promoted at the beginning of the next term. This evil is still more apparant in the higher grade. One or two pupils in a class perhaps are kept out or allowed to absent themselves for a few weeks or a term and when they return the class is beyond them. If they attempt to resume their former position, having lost what the other members have acquired in their absence, their progress will necessarily be slow, and they become a hindrance to the advancement of others. We appeal to the parents and patrons of the schools to co-operate with your commit-

tee and teachers to the end that this evil may be remedied.

REPORT OF TOWN SCHOOL BOARD.



The Town School Board herewith report to the town its doings for the past year, with financial report for two years past.

We have made the numbers of our schools correspond to the numbers of the old districts in which they were located, as being more intelligible than the method adopted in our last report.

The number and location of schools have been the same as for the preceding year. There has been no school in what was formerly Dists. No. 7 and 13. In No. 11 there was no spring or fall term. The school in that neighborhood this winter was small and unprofitable, demonstrating the principle that good results can only be attained in schools having a number of scholars sufficient to awaken and hold the interest of the pupils in their work, also making the position acceptable to teachers of ability and experience, and if those parents who reside in neighborhoods having only a half a dozen scholars or less wish to secure the greatest profit to their children from time spent and money expended we would suggest, as worthy of their consideration, that every effort of the committee to secure the union of such with some other school is only a step looking to that end, and deserves the co-operation of all parties interested.

It has been our aim to continue in the same school for a succession of terms such teachers as have shown themselves to be well qualified for their positions.

But we have not found it possible to secure veteran teachers of known ability to fill every place, consequently some teachers have been employed having had no previous experience. There have been four of this class during the year, one of whom, at least has made her school more than ordinarily interesting.

No change of teachers has been made for the year in Nos. 2, 3 and 6. In No. 2 much has been accomplished through the co-operation of the teachers in grading the schools, thereby reducing the number of classes and rendering the labor of the teachers more efficient.

In this district also an uncommon interest has been shown in supporting a subscription school of ten weeks under the instruction of Miss Phelps. One is now in progress under the supervision of Mr. Comings.

In all parts of the district, so far as we have learned, teachers have been generously received and have been granted the forbearance and charity merited by the nature of their position. If any have failed in the support which is so helpful to the teacher and essential to the best good of the scholar it has been that exception which makes the general rule more evident.

Repairs for the year have been slight except in Nos. 2 and 14. In No. 14 new floor timbers entire were put in and floors relaid, cost about \$27.00. In No. 2 several new desks in the Grammar school, a blackboard in the Primary division and general repairs, in amount about \$30.00.

Other than these no repairs of any importance have been made, nor is there much needed for the year to come except such slight repairs as replacing fallen plaster in three or four houses.

As the advantages of our common school system cannot be overestimated, its benefits as the showers of Heaven bes-

towed upon all alike from the general fund ; a place where all of every sect and every nationality meet upon equal ground to mingle and to study the principles which fit for the affairs of life and the duties of a common citizenship. We say to its patrons, as you love your country, as you would have her people united, happy and prosperous, cherish and protect the common school.

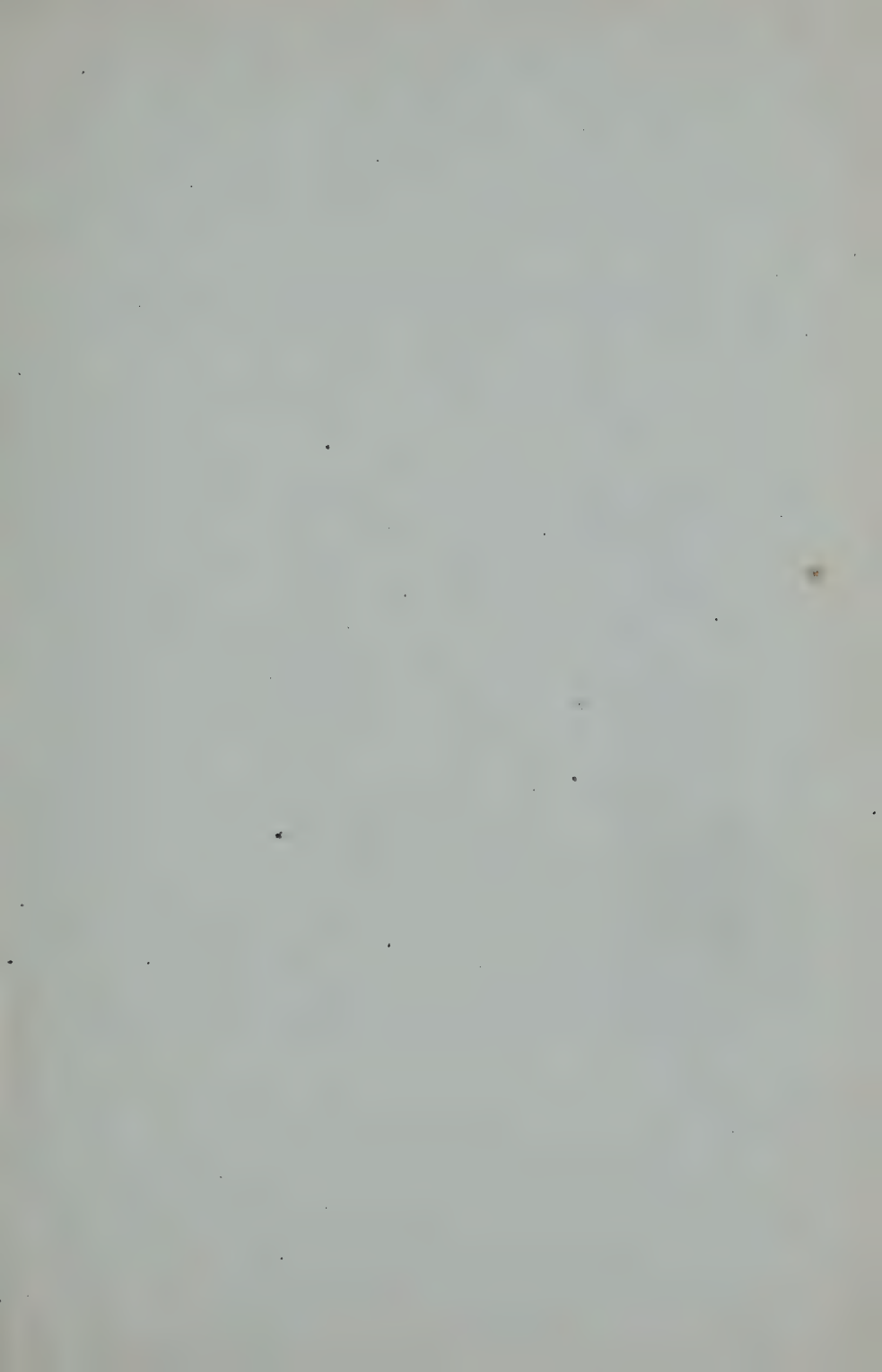

1. To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting.
2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose Selectmen, Fish and Game Wardens, and all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.
4. To raise money for the support of schools for the ensuing year and direct its apportionment.
5. To raise money for the repair of highways and direct how it shall be expended.
6. To raise money for the support of the poor, to build bridges and highways, to appropriate for town library, and for all other current, incidental and contingent expenses that may accrue.
7. To see if the town will allow the selectmen to build a lock-up in the basement of the town house.
8. To see if the town will vote to accept the legacy bequeathed by the will of the late Joseph Plaistridge.
9. To see if the town will vote to adopt the By-Laws licensing dogs according to Secs. 8 and 9 in Chap. 115 of the General Laws of New Hampshire.
10. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$50 to defray the expenses of decorating the graves of the soldiers who lost their lives in the late rebellion, on Decoration day, 1888 ; and provide how the same shall be raised.
11. To act on any accounts that may be presented against the town.
12. To see if the town will vote a certain discount on all taxes paid on or before the first day of November.
13. To act upon any reports.
