### Insert from Map of Strafford County from actual survey by J. Chace, Jr. — 1856. Published by Smith & Bartlett Philadelphia & Boston

Ninety-eight years ago the Town was centered near the River, for we note stores, a saw mill, grist mill, and tannery near the Falls. The railroad extended to Dover in 1841, and building tended that way as later maps show.

To orient yourself to this map, start at the upper left corner and note B. Mathes, which is now the A.T.O. Fraternity house. Continue on Main Street — J. B. Smith now owned by Mrs. Paine: on the opposite corner of Madbury Road, B. Thompson, the life-long home of the founder of the University. This burned in 1897; E. Smith by Mrs. Elsie Brown; Hon. V. Smith by Clifford Parker; Frost by Philip Ham; J. A. Richardson Esq. by Harold Loveren; Dea. A. Perkins by Rushton Marston (now moved back); S. Runlett by Russell McGuirk; and Mrs. M. P. Kingman by Mrs. Ninde.

Continue to the River on Old Landing Road—Mrs. Gleason by Philip Wilcox; cross the River—C. A. C. Thompson by Mrs. Sullivan, (though this property was out of the family for nearly seventy-eight years between 1834 and 1912); Cap. J. Langley by Ernest Ritzman. Crossing the Road — Frost by Mrs. Chamberlin, (this house was moved across the meadow to its present location); Mrs. Paul occupied by Bingham. Now we come to the Wm. Jenkins house which is still owned by present generation Jenkins, and crossing the road and River the G. & W. P. Frost house (which is also still in the same family). Capt. A. L. Simpson's widow left this house to the Church and Library, and it is presently occupied by Rev. Bunker, whose ancestry traces to those of the Bunker Garrison. School Street has undergone many changes.

The Town Hall was jointly occupied by the J. W. Coe Variety Store. J. Odell by Thomas Moriarty; M. E. Thompson by Mrs. Phair; Mrs. M. Blytenburg by Red Tower; J. Twombley by Miss Smart, and on Mill Road J. Chesley occupied by Robert Dishman. The Cong. CH. (Community Church) was less than ten years old. The SH. nearby was probably then in use, but very soon after school was kept in the Grange Hall area.

Other houses not herein named are of obscure origin, and have since been moved or destroyed.

### WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

TUESDAY, MARCH 9, 1954, AT 9:00 A.M.
New Hampshire Hall

Two Hundred and Twenty-third Meeting.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at New Hampshire Hall on the University Campus, at Durham, N. H., on Tuesday the Ninth day of March, 1954, A.D. at Nine O'Clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three (3) years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, one Auditor for a term of three (3) years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three (3) years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of two (2) years to fill the unexpired term of Edward L. Getchell (deceased), four members of the Budget Committee for a term of three (3) years, and all other elective officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the budget as submitted and recommended by the Budget Committee (See details following) and that the sum of Eighty Six Thousand Six Hundred Seventy Eight dollars and Sixty Cents (\$86,678.60) be raised and appropriated for the purposes of it.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of approximately Eleven Thousand (\$11,000.00) Dollars to defray the cost of its share of the Strafford County Government.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will direct a discount of one percent (1%) to be made to those persons who shall pay their taxes within a period of six (6) weeks from the date the Tax Rate is approved by the State Tax Commission.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws of the State of New Hampshire relative to playing games of Beano (see ballot).

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars to defray the cost of options on future right-of-way for a road from the Smith Park Lane (Private Way) at the easterly limits of the Adams and Sproul property adjacent to the Durham Laundry, thence easterly to a junction with Newmarket Road in the vicinity of School House Lane.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to revert that portion of the existing Bennett Road right-of-way to private ownership pursuant to the relocation of a portion of said Bennett Road to the North of the Beaudet House and to acquire the necessary right-of-way for the proposed relocation.
- 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to negotiate for the acquisition of the necessary right-of-way and to construct a roadway from Main Street to Madbury Road via Jenkins Court (See Budget).
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Cemetery Committee to expend a sum not to exceed Four Hundred (\$400.00) Dollars (See Budget) for improvement of the Town Cemetery located on Concord Turnpike.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.





### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

As has undoubtedly been true in the past, each ensuing year brings a variety of new and interesting problems to the Board of Selectmen for their consideration. Solutions to these myriad problems cannot always be easily found but it has been our objective to reach a solution to each problem which will be beneficial to the greatest number of citizens of Durham. It is our sincere hope that the policies and plans which we have instigated will result in improvements in Durham as it is today and in Durham of the years to come. The following report will attempt to highlight the events of the year 1953 and give some insight into what we hope will be accomplished in 1954.

We would like first to pay tribute to one of Durham's most loyal citizens. The Board of Selectmen very reluctantly accepted the resignation of Arthur P. Stewart as Town Clerk and Tax Collector. In serving the Town of Durham, in these capacities, he has gained the admiration and respect of young and old alike. We wish him a speedy recovery to good health and look forward to many years of his sound advice and counsel.

As can readily be seen by an examination of this year's budget and other schedules of expenditures listed in the Town Report, the maintenance of town roads and streets and a variety of other facilities in the town is an expensive item for the taxpayers. We have endeavored to obtain a maximum amount of efficiency both from the standpoint of cost and time spent on these tasks and we believe that Don Plaisted and his crew of seven men have done an excellent job in getting a dollars worth of value out of each dollar spent. Although the State Highway Department has the responsibility for upkeep and maintenance of nearly eleven miles of streets and roads in Durham, it will be of interest to many people to know that the Town of Durham itself maintains in excess of eleven miles of hard surfaced roads and in excess of sixteen miles of dirt roads. The task of maintaining the town roads including tarring, patching, grading, brush cutting, and snow plowing in the winter requires considerable time and effort. In addition to this maintenance work, we have scheduled a limited amount of new construction during the

past year and will continue this plan in 1954. Continued reconstruction of the Bennett Road was carried on during 1953 and it is our plan that the TRA funds will be expended again in 1954 on this road. We believe that by efficient planning, this year's program may be able to complete this construction from the Wilfred LaRoche property eastward to the Newmarket Road. The approaches to the Crommet Creek Bridge which have always been very difficult to maintain were reconstructed during the past year and we are planning to tar these approaches in order to avoid future washouts on this rather difficult stretch of road. Due to the increased amount of traffic currently handled by the Wiswell Road, we feel that it is necessary to reconstruct at least a portion of this road during 1954. Although plans have not been completed as yet, it is our hope that we may find some method to relieve the very congested traffic conditions on Jenkins Court in the center of town. If it is possible to make suitable arrangements with various property owners, we envision that this road should be connected with Madbury Road in order to avoid the present confusion resulting from the dead end street now existing. Despite continued maintenance, a small bridge on the Langmaid Road has caused us considerable concern and it is our plan to rebuild this bridge during the coming summer months. The tarring program during 1953 exceeded our original estimates but we believe that this program was well worth while for with minor exceptions, the tarred roads in Durham today are in excellent shape. The program for 1954 envisions the tarring of a number of roads in Durham which have previously not been tarred. We have in mind doing this type of work on Schoolhouse Lane, Cowell Drive, Strafford Avenue, and other locations including Mast Road and/or Garden Lane and Oyster River Road. It is our plan during 1954 to continue the current program of improvement of our entire highway system by widening, improving drainage and reducing hazardous conditions to a minimum

A much needed extension of the Town's sewer system was completed on Cowell Drive, Glassford Lane and Sauer Terrace. The cost of this project was considerably reduced by the use of our own crew rather than contracting for this job. Two minor

extensions of the hydrant water main system were accomplished this year by the town crew and should the need arise, we believe this type of construction can be continued with the town crew.

As can be seen from the budget, the task of trash disposal in the Town of Durham is increasing in cost, however we believe that the handling of this problem has been much improved in the past two years. It is of interest to note that the entire town crew now devotes approximately six days per month to the job of collecting and disposing of trash.

The extension of the main street sidewalk, westward, and the placement of additional curbing, we believe was well worth while and it is our plan during 1954 to continue this work in front of the ATO Fraternity House. Not only will such a project improve the sidewalk conditions but traffic conjestion in this portion of the town will be considerably improved as such a project will mean a widening of Main Street and also improving of the line of sight for cars approaching the village from the University.

As was true in 1953, we plan to continue with the spraying of all elm trees in the central part of town as a preventative maintenance program.

We would like to take this opportunity to commend the members of the town crew for their improved methods of handling town equipment which has resulted in reduced cost of maintenance to the taxpayer. We are requesting that an additional \$2,000 be set aside in a capital reserve fund to be used if and when it is necessary to replace either the road grader and/or tractor bull dozer. Although presently these are functioning well they are of sufficient age that it may be necessary to replace them in the relatively near future. You will note in the budget that we plan to purchase a new Case tractor-bucket loader in 1954.

The Board of Selectmen acting in the capacity of water commissioners have devoted considerable time to the problem of planning and providing for the future water needs of the town of Durham. The rate of growth of Durham and also of the University are such that it is anticipated that within the next few years, it will be necessary for Durham and the University to

provide additional sources of water and therefore acting in accordance with Article 12 of the 1953 Town Warrant, the Board of Selectmen with the cooperation of the U.S. Corps of Engineers have located a number of sources of additional water which are generally in the Spruce Hole area and along the Oyster River at a point approximately 1,000 yards northwest of Five Corners in Lee. In this latter case, we were fortunate in being able to purchase a four acre tract of land surrounding a well which tests have indicated will produce in excess of one half million gallons per day of excellent water. In the Spruce Hole area, we are negotiating with Mr. Clyde Fogg and Mr. Henry Fisher to obtain water rights in areas surrounding two test wells which were driven. The tests here indicated that each of these wells would yield approximately one third of a million gallons of water per day. The University and the Town of Durham are currently using approximately 350,000 gallons of water per day. Roughly 25% of this is town consumption. It is estimated that with the increasing growth of the town as well as the University by 1960 our requirements will be approximately 600,000 gallons per day. We are pleased to report that the financial condition of the Durham Water Department is most encouraging at the present time. Although the present annual surplus which has accumulated from the sale of water in the Town of Durham might indicate that it is advisable to reduce the water rates at this time, we have given very careful consideration to this matter and, after consulting not only with our Public Works Advisory Committee but also with other interested people including the State Public Utility Commission, we believe that it is a sound policy at this time not to reduce the rates but rather to establish a reserve fund of sufficient size to at least in part, finance the anticipated increase in the cost of operating the Durham Water Department.

As will be noted from the report of the Fire Commissioners, considerable time and effort was put into a study of the future needs of the town and the University in terms of fire fighting equipment and personnel to man the present equipment. The town is most grateful for the fine cooperation shown by President Chandler and Mr. McGrath of the University in arriving

at a policy which would adequately take care of the fire protection and would also be as inexpensive as possible to the taxpayers of the town.

A number of citizens of Durham have consulted with us concerning an improved method of maintaining the town cemetery and we have included an item in the budget this year for extra work to be done in this connection. It is our plan to meet with the Trustees of Trust Funds at an early date and review the policies which were adopted a number of years ago with respect to maintenance of the cemeteries.

We would also like to call your attention to the results of some fine work which our Legislative Representatives have done in connection with bringing about a reduction in the amount of money which we annually pay to Strafford County to support the County Government. We sincerely trust that they will continue their vigilance in examination of the County Budget and will, where possible, make further reductions in this cost to the taxpayers.

In reporting the activities of your government in Durham in these short pages, it is very difficult to do more than touch briefly on some of the major items of concern. We would be only too happy to discuss in more detail any of the items mentioned or any other problems which may confront taxpayers of the town of Durham and therefore the Board of Selectmen have made an effort to establish regular office hours in the Town Hall from 9:00 until 11:00 A.M. each Saturday. The counsel and advice which we have received from our Public Works Advisory Committee, Fire Commissioners, University authorities, and other interested people have been most appreciated and it is our sincere hope that through the combined efforts of all of the citizens of Durham, we can make Durham a better and more economical place in which to live.

In closing, we would also like to acknowledge with thanks the assistance given by the Durham Historical Society in planning this and future covers for our annual Town Report.

Perhaps it would be well to call attention to the appropriation of \$100.00 raised by the Town the last few years. This amount is only for the care of the Old Town Cemetery, and should not be confused with the request for funds to improve the Cemetery on the Concord Road.

A new fund of \$100.00 has been left the Town by William J. Drew for care of the Drew family cemetery. This cemetery is located at the rear of the Chamberlin property and is a part of the Simpson lot which is also cared for by a Trust Fund.

Litigation had to be resorted to in order to make the Boston and Maine replace crossing to provide access to Doe property. Now that trucks can get into the property, we expect to proceed with recommended cutting in cooperation with the State Forestry Department. This litigation cost \$100.00 but your committee felt it a necessity in order to provide for future development of the property which comes under our care. All expense has been paid from the income of the Doe Fund.

Mrs. Rose H. Behan, Public Health Nurse of the New Hampshire State Department of Health, conducted 6 Child Health Clinics in Durham during the year. At these clinics, 70 physical examinations were made and 65 immunizations were given for tetanus, diphtheria, whooping cough and small pox. Dr. Gerald Shattuck, Portsmouth, New Hampshire was the attending physician. The Child Health Committee of the Durham Women's Club assisted in making some of the necessary arrangements for the clinics.

The water and milk supplies of the town were found to be of good sanitary quality during the year. Restaurants, stores and a baker shop were inspected periodically to maintain satisfactory sanitary conditions and practices. Attention was given to various nuisances and problems referred to the Health Officer.

### REPORT OF FIRE COMMISSIONERS

The Board of Fire Commissioners are pleased to present to you the following summary of the activities of the Town of Durham — University of New Hampshire Fire Department for the year 1953.

During the year the Department answered a total of 89 calls, 9 of which were to assist nearby communities, thru our mutual aid system, and 4 were medical aid calls to use the oxygen resuscitator. The remainder were all of a minor nature. For this last, the residents of the town and university deserve our thanks for being so "Fire Prevention Minded." We hope they keep up the good work.

The University and Town of Durham have purchased a new 75 foot aerial ladder truck based on specifications drawn up by the Board of Fire Commissioners, to add to our present equipment. This, with the new 600 gallon capacity tank truck with its 500 gallons per minute pump authorized last year, will give the Town of Durham, and the University of New Hampshire the best equipped fire department in the State.

Your Fire Commissioners, again working closely with the Board of Trustees of the University have seen fit to add three permanent men to the Fire Department, making a total of five men. Two of whom will be on duty at all times. This will enable the first piece of apparatus to reach the scene of the alarm that all important "Three minutes sooner."

You will notice in the Budget of the Fire Department that the Board of Trustees of the University and the Board of Selectmen have authorized a new sharing of costs. Beginning this year the University of New Hampshipre will assume two thirds of the expenses of the Town of Durham — University of New Hampshire Fire Department, and the Town of Durham one third. The University will also continue to furnish and maintain the Fire Station. In this connection it might be well to note, that the University will build an addition to the present station to house the new aerial ladder truck on its arrival about the last of August.

The Commissioners would like to thank: The State Fire Marshal, State Police, Town Police, and the Boy Scouts for their assistance and cooperation during the past year. Finally, but MOST IMPORTANT the call firemen, for their strong feeling of civic pride and duty, their faithfullness at twice monthly drills and their efficient operation of the equipment at all times. Without these thirty unselfish men Durham and the University would have no Fire Department.

On September 16, 1953, the Planning Board formally gave its approval to the final plans for the development of the Red Tower Estate.

# REPORT OF THE HAMILTON SMITH LIBRARY January 1954

To the Residents of Durham:

Newcomers to Durham have on occasion asked how the Town happens to limit its library support to \$500.00 a year, when it receives so much in exchange. They are surprised to learn that for only a few years has the Town paid as much as \$500.00, and always they are interested in the contract between the Town and the University regarding library service.

In 1906 the Town for that time had a sizable collection of books. In addition, the Durham Library Association increased the Town's supply of books by means of its subscribing members. An agreement was made among these three, and made official by a contract, whereby town and gown should be served by one library. The Carnegie Corporation furnished \$20,000.00 and Hamilton Smith (in his will), \$10,000.00 toward a new building. (Hence the name "Hamilton Smith Library.") The College furnished the site and the additional funds. All books were pooled, with the understanding that townsfolk should have equal rights with college folk in their use. The College agreed to provide thereafter "heat, light, salaries, insurance, taxes, repairs, and other necessary expenses, perpetually." A further agreement was that the library "shall be kept open . . . every Wednesday and Saturday throughout the year, from two till nine o'clock in the afternoon, legal holidays excepted, and at such other times as the Managers of the Library may prescribe." The Town, for its part, agreed to "appropriate at least twentyfive dollars (\$25.) annually" to be expended for "books, magazines and binding of the same, for addition to and incorporation with the consolidated library." The Durham Library Association income has, through the years, been added to the book funds, and spent for general recreational reading. For 1954 \$285.00 is available for books.

For years the College (now the University) kept its agreement regarding the Wednesday and Saturday hours. But for many years, during vacation periods, the evening openings proved an unwarrantable waste of money. Then came the dim-out, and so, during World War II, the contract was modified by agreement with the Selectmen, and during vacations the Library now closes daily at five.

Through the years the policy has been adhered to of spending Town money primarily for books for the Charlotte Thompson Room — the children's room. In the same way, Durham Library Association funds have consistently gone toward adult recreational reading, for books for which it would be unlikely that University funds would be spent.

Lacking sufficient staff members to assign time specifically for children's service, the Library has been fortunate in its relations with the Durham School, the teachers of which have shown unusual interest in introducing the Library to the children, and in encouraging an appreciation of books. Increasingly, young folk of high-school age are studying in the Library. With the new high school in the district, this Library will naturally be the center for their study. The problem of providing reference service for them and at the same time for the University students looms on the near horizon. Meanwhile, anticipating the need of a separate collection for young people as there is now one for children, the Library staff has begun marking appropriate titles with a "Y" (for "Youth"), so that when the time comes a beginning of a youth library will be ready to install.

Statistically, the Durham Public Library books totaled 4,877 on January 1. During the year 164 were added and 27 discarded. The University collection includes 206,241 volumes.

### AUDITOR'S REPORT

Durham, N. H. Feb. 24, 1954

The Board of Selectmen Durham, N. H.

### Gentlemen:

We have audited the books of the selectmen, treasurer, town clerk, tax collector, justice of the municipal court, trustees of trust funds, water department and sewer department and submit our report herewith. We have examined the bonds of the trustees of trust funds, tax collector, treasurer, town clerk and town bookkeeper in accordance with the law and found them in good order.

In our opinion the attached statements show the true financial status of the Town of Durham, as of December 31, 1953, in accordance with the books and records presented us for audit.

We offer the following comments and suggestions.

Selectmen's Books. We found in many cases the supporting data for the vouchers was simply a statement. Vouchers should be supported by invoices. We still think that the expense of the Community Christmas Tree should not be included in the item "Memorial Day and Veterans' Organizations, Patriotic Purposes" or "Memorial Day and other celebrations." We believe Christmas is supposed to be a religious observance and not a celebration. In our statement we have set the item up as "Community Christmas Tree." We wish to call your attention to the fact that officials and employees of State and Municipal Governments are exempt from the transportation tax when traveling on official business. U. S. Treasury form No. 731 should be filled out and presented when purchasing the ticket, in order to avoid payment of the tax. State and Municipal governmental units are also exempt from the transportation tax on goods received. We found some cases where the town paid the tax. We think that when the selectmen borrow money from other departments they should pay interest to the department from which they

borrow. There is precedent for this, inasmuch as a few years ago the Town borrowed funds from the Sewer Department and repaid them with interest. Inasmuch as the Town Clerk is an elected official we think fees paid him should be classified as Town Officers' Salaries rather than as Town Officers' expenses. Social security taxes were apparently overpaid by \$5.59.

Treasurer's Books. We suggest that the treasurer indicate in his cash book the sources of funds received, i.e., Property Taxes, Poll Taxes, Head Taxes, Highway Income, etc. At present he merely enters "Deposited" on the receipts side of the cash book. A detailed report cannot be made from the treasurer's books as now kept. The Treasurer's report should be made by the Treasurer and not in the selectmen's office.

Tax Collector's Books. The tax collector owes the treasury sixty cents. We do not approve recording the poll taxes and the head taxes in the same book, one being a local tax the other a state tax. The Head Tax Law specifically states that head taxes shall be kept in a separate fund and that fund remitted to the treasurer. The use of one book may be expedient but it certainly is not the most efficient way. The use of only one book for two taxes, materially increases the audit time required. We still think abatement slips should be issued for taxes abated. Only the selectmen have the authority to abate taxes, and they should file such slips in order that official record is made of the abatement and the reason therefor. This applies particularly to poll and head taxes.

Town Clerk's Books. We call your attention to Chapter 39 of the Session Laws of 1953 as follows:

Licensing of Dogs. Amend Chapter 180 of the revised laws by inserting after section 10 the following new section: 10-a, Additional Charge. In addition to the license fee for dogs provided by this subdivision there shall be a charge of fifty cents if said fee is not paid before July first in any year.

Takes effect. This act shall take effect upon its passage. (Approved Mar. 12, 1953)

Trustees of Trust Funds Books. We again recommend that the Trustees of Trust Funds keep a cash receipts and disbursement book. We also recommend that all bills be paid by check.

Water Department. It is obvious from an analysis of the water department funds that \$2,864.04 was spent for construction out of the water operations funds. We suggest that the amount of \$2,864.04 be withdrawn from the water construction fund in the savings bank and deposited either in the checking fund or in the water operations fund in the savings bank.

What we stated above relative to the Treasurer indicating sources of funds in the general books applies also to the Sewer and Water books.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

"Democracy can be only as strong as the intelligence of its citizens. It cannot flourish half educated and half illiterate. It is by education that I learn to do by choice, what other men do by the constraint of fear."

I am pleased to submit the annual report concerning the administration of your schools. This has been a year of much progress. We feel that we have a sound school system that insures steady progress for your children academically, socially, and physically. Mr. John Day, as the principal of the school, is an able administrator who assumes much responsibility and has developed outstanding school morale both among the student body and the faculty. Your teaching staff is experienced, well-trained, and unselfish in caring for the personal interests of the children. Most of them have been in your community for a number of years and are taking an active interest in your civic affairs. Also, I should express my appreciation to the members of the School Board for their cooperation in devoting so many hours of their time in formulating school policies.

In his annual report Principal Day goes into greater detail regarding the progress made in the instructional field. The three R's (reading, writing, and arithmetic) continue to be the basic foundation upon which our whole education system is based but to them other important phases have been added. We constantly strive to more completely discover and develop the potentialities of each child for his own happiness and social usefulness.

As a result of your joint action the Oyster River Cooperative School District was formed this year. This action marks an important milestone in the history of New Hampshire. It is the first instance where the citizens of several communities joined together in order to provide educational facilities from kindergarten through the twelfth grade. Your school board and school administrators have had to judiciously overcome many obstacles thus far, and many more problems must be solved before the Cooperative School is realized. It will necessitate the full co-

operation of all citizens to carry it through its infancy. There are no precedents to follow nor experts to lean to. Progress has been tremendous and the school board is definitely planning on having our own high school at the start of the 1954-55 school year.

It is well that we have formed the Cooperative School District which will provide for additional school housing. Our enrollment is still rapidly increasing. This year we were forced to use the sewing room as a classroom and that is the last remaining space which can be used as a classroom.

Again I wish to thank all citizens for the cooperation which has been extended to me in carrying on and improving the work of education in your community.

### REPORT OF PRINCIPAL

February 1, 1954

To the Superintendent, School Board and Citizens of Durham:

It is my privilege and pleasure to present this sixth annual report of the work of the Durham Center School.

### Instruction

A continuing survey and evaluation of methods of instruction are the rule in the school. Teachers and principal hold monthly meetings, and oftener when necessary, to study the problems of instruction. The entire reading program has been under consideration the past few months. One direct outcome of the study of reading will be the introduction of a "reading-readiness" program into our Kindergarten this spring. Throughout the school greater emphasis is being placed upon the fundamentals. The school experiments with methods that seem to have merit but never hesitates to abandon those that prove impractical. Audio-visual materials, field trips and projects are used as means of instruction only when those devices fit into the entire picture of the learning process. It is the intent of the school to provide a learning atmosphere, adequate text books and materials and the opportunity for each child to think for himself.

Our testing program shows evidence that we achieve a fair degree of success in reaching our goals. The work done in other schools by our graduates is a source of satisfaction and pride.

### Personnel

The school experienced few changes in personnel since the last report. Miss Marguerite Craig replaced Mrs. Marion Williams as a first grade teacher and Mr. Harry Faucy became a sixth-grade teacher. Mrs. Gene Schultz was granted a leave of absence but will return in September. Miss Susan Chafee returned, after being away for two years, to become a fourth grade teacher. Mr. Norman York took over custodial duties in the early spring.

Members of the teaching staff avail themselves of further study through summer session courses, by extension and by inservice study. Several of our teachers take an active part in community affairs while others have, in the past and currently, hold office in various civic and professional organizations. Miss Lurvey and Mrs. Sawyer have held office as Secretary of the Parent-Teacher Association, Mrs. Doris Granger is Treasurer of our District Teachers' Association. Mrs. Dorothea Thompson was our delegate to the annual meeting of the New England Reading Association, held in Providence last fall. Mrs. Dorothy Wilcox holds office in the Association of N. H. Historical Societies and is chairman of the school Junior Red Cross activities. Miss Irene Craven is Crafts Chairman of the New England Folk Festival and secretary of Delta Kappa Gamma. The principal of the Durham School is currently president of the State Department of Elementary Principals and president of the Southeastern Elementary Principals' Association. The principal will represent New Hampshire at the annual convention of National Elementary School Principals at Atlantic City in February.

### Enrollment

School enrollment has shown an increase of about 55% over the past six years. 408 students are registered for the current year. Statistics show that there has been a considerable decrease in the numbers of children from G-I students while there has been a marked increase in the numbers of children of parents coming into Durham, augmenting the faculty of the University, and children of parents who wish to live in Durham though their livelihood may be elsewhere. We may expect an increasing number of children for years to come. With an expanding school plant and secondary offerings we shall be prepared to take care of the rising school population. The current school set-up provides for double grades in order to maintain a lower teacher-pupil ratio.

### Services

The health of the school child in Durham is closely watched by our able nurse, Mrs. Ruth Hopkins. Periodic examinations of all children detect dental defects, eye troubles, hearing difficulties and general physical debilities in time to bring about immediate treatment. Thorough physical examinations are given each year to all students in grades 1, 5 and 8. Dr. George McGregor, school doctor, and Dr. Anna Rudd conduct the examinations which are free of charge to parents.

The school Hot Lunch Program is a school service that is becoming increasingly important. Excellent meals are served to an average of 250 pupils per day. The School District annually appropriates a sum of money to carry on the program. The Federal Government supplements this fund with cash reimbursements as well as by contributions of surplus commodities. For the school year 1952-1953 the School District established a figure of \$3000 to carry out the lunch program. That figure was based on actual district cash out-lay plus what could be estimated would be coming from Federal Funds. For that period, the district received Federal reimbursement to the amount of \$2075.97.

The music program of the school is under the direction of Mrs. Lillian Elwell. The Music Department of the University of New Hampshire, with Mr. Robert Garretson as co-ordinator, enables the school to offer a broad program of music. Mrs. Elwell teaches all vocal work, teaches strings and with the assistance of the Music Department personnel, conducts the band. The school music supervisor also conducts the orchestra. A second band has been organized to provide opportunity for beginners to play together. Free group instruction is given to 61 instrumentalists during the regular school day.

### Acknowledgments

The work of the Durham School has been made easier and more pleasant by the great interest shown by community organizations and individuals. Scanmell Grange No. 122 presents awards each year at commencement time for citizenship and general self-improvement. The American Legion Post awards medals each year for best essays on Americanism. The American Legion Auxiliary conducts an annual Poppy Poster Contest with suitable awards. The Music Department of the Durham Women's Club has given funds for purchase of an instrument and records for music appreciation. The Civics Department of the

Women's Club has made funds available for purchasing strip films on American Democracy. The Women's Club, at this writing, is considering an Art Project for the school which would be of great value to all children. The Women's Physical Education Department of the University renders invaluable assistance each year in our physical education program. As mentioned earlier in this report, we are indebted to the Music Department of the University for much of our fine results in music. Our own Parent-Teacher Association does much to help the school by providing opportunity for parents and teachers to get together. A new strip film projector will be presented to the school this spring by the association.

Individuals who have remembered the school include Mr. and Mrs. Heinz Brown who presented the school with a fine Currier and Ives Volume and Mr. and Mrs. Russell Skelton who gave skates which were given to students who might never have had them. The Skeltons also gave flags for school use.

To the foregoing organizations and individuals the school extends its sincere thanks for their interest and generosity. The school is grateful too, for the many parents and friends who provide the transportation for out-of-town athletic events, picnics and field trips.

### Objectives

The aim of any school is to teach. The Durham School endeavors to go beyond the simple meaning of the word. Never overlooking the fact that the 3 R's come first, the school conscientiously tries to provide an environment conducive to the all-round growth of the child. Opportunities are offered that enable every child to find a place for himself. That opportunity may be in scholarship, in art, in music or in sports. The schools of today are often criticized for their methods. It is claimed that schools are turning out inferior products. It is not remembered that the school today is educating every parent's child and not merely the selected few. For this reason, if no other, today's school must be geared to educate the many. A curriculum must be provided that will enable the slow learner to achieve a modicum of success, provide real incentive for the large average group and offer a challenge to those of superior

mentality. The curriculum of the Durham School is based upon this premise. The building of such a curriculum for the Durham School has been made possible by the fine educational inspiration of our superintendent, Mr. Arthur Toll and the united cooperation of our School Board members, Mrs. Clayton Cross, Mr. Dayton Henson and Dr. Fred Allen. We thank them for our opportunity to give you the kind of school we feel you want.
