

2012 Hart's Location Town Warrant State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hart's Location in the County of Carroll, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, 979 US Route 302, Hart's Location on Tuesday, March 13, 2012 at 5:15pm to act on the following:

Article 1: To choose all necessary town officers for the coming year.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Article 2: \$250,000 (gross budget) for the purposes of municipal infrastructure and the property repairs arising from the 2011 flooding damage from Tropical Storm Irene and to authorize the issue of up to \$250,000 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal finance Act (RSA Chapter 33, as amended) and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue, negotiate, sell and deliver such bonds or notes and to determine the interest rate thereon, and the maturity and other terms thereof as shall be in the best interest of the Town; to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, obtain and accept federal and state disaster relief funds, grants, gifts or other forms of assistance, if any, which may be available for such projects; and to authorize the Selectmen to take any other action or to pass any other vote related thereto. It is anticipated that 75% of this appropriation will be covered by federal/state disaster relief funds, and that upon receipt, theses funds shall be applied to pay down the bonds or notes; and an anticipated 25% of this appropriation shall be the town's matching share. It is further anticipated that State Highway Aid Funds will fund 2/3 of the town's matching share. (Two thirds majority ballot vote required) Selectmen favor.

Article 3: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4000 (gross budget) for the purchase of fire fighting equipment and to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, obtain and accept state grants, gifts or other forms of assistance, if any, which may be available for such projects; and to authorize the Selectmen to take any other action or to pass any other vote related thereto. It is anticipated that 50% of this appropriation will be covered by state matching grant funds. Selectmen favor.

Article 4: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5000 (gross budget) for the purchase of communications equipment and to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, obtain and accept state grants, gifts or other forms of assistance, if any, which may be available for such projects; and to authorize the Selectmen to take any other action or to pass any other vote related thereto. It is

anticipated that 50% of this appropriation will be covered by state matching grant funds. Selectmen favor.

- **Articles 5-11:** Amendments to Hart's Location Floodplain Conservation District Ordinance. As recommended by the State Office of Energy & Planning to comply with eligibility requirements for the National Flood Insurance Program. (Selectmen & Planning Board Favor) To be voted on by secret ballot.
- **Article 5:** To see if the town will vote to amend the Hart's Location Floodplain Conservation District Ordinance, Appendix B, to include the following language:

SECTION 2: DISTRICT BOUNDARIES

2:01 **DEFINITIONS**:

- 1. "Base Flood" means the flood having a one-percent possibility of being equaled or exceeded in any given year.
- 2. "Basement" means any area of a building having its floor subgrade on all sides.
- 4. "Flood Insurance Rate Map" (FIRM) means the official map incorporated with this ordinance, on which FEMA has delineated both the special flood hazard areas and the risk premium zones applicable to the Town of Hart's Location.
- 5. "Flood Insurance Study" (FIS) means an examination, evaluation and determination of flood hazards and, if appropriate, corresponding water surface elevations, or an examination, evaluation and determination of mudslide (i.e. mudflow) and/or flood-related erosion hazards.
- 8. "Historic Structure" means any structure that is:
 - a. Listed individually in the National Register of Historic Places (a listing maintained by the Department of Interior) or preliminarily determined by the Secretary of the Interior as meeting the requirements for individual listing on the National Register;
 - b. Certified or preliminarily determined by the Secretary of the Interior as contributing to the historical significance of a registered historic district or a district preliminarily determined by the Secretary to qualify as a registered historic district;
 - c. Individually listed on a state inventory of historic places in states with historic preservation programs which have been approved by the Secretary of the Interior; or
 - d. Individually listed on a local inventory of historic places in communities with historic preservation programs that have been certified either:
 - i. by an approved state program as determined by the Secretary of the Interior, or
 - ii. directly by the Secretary of the Interior in states without approved programs.
- 9. "Lowest Floor" means the lowest floor of the lowest enclosed area (including basement). An unfinished or flood resistant enclosure, usable solely for parking of vehicles, building access or storage in an area other than a basement area is not considered a building's lowest floor; provided, that such an enclosure is not built so as to render the structure in violation of the applicable non-elevation design requirements of this ordinance.
- 10. "Manufactured Home" means a structure, transportable in one or more sections, which is built on

a permanent chassis and is designed for use with or without a permanent foundation when connected to the required utilities. For floodplain management purposes the term "manufactured home" includes park trailers, travel trailers, and other similar vehicles placed on site for greater than 180 consecutive days. This includes manufactured homes located in a manufactured home park or subdivision.

- 11. "Manufactured Home Park or Subdivision" means a parcel (or contiguous parcels) of land divided into two or more manufactured home lots for rent or sale.
- 12. "Recreational Vehicle" is defined as:
 - e. built on a single chassis;
 - f. 400 square feet or less when measured at the largest horizontal projection;
 - g. designed to be self-propelled or permanently towable by a light duty truck; and
 - h. designed primarily not for use as a permanent dwelling but as temporary living quarters for recreational, camping, travel or seasonal use.
- 13. "Regulatory floodway" means the channel of a river or other watercourse and the adjacent land areas that must be reserved in order to discharge the base flood without cumulatively increasing the water surface elevation more than a designated height.
- 14. "Special flood hazard area" is the land in the floodplain within the Town of Hart's Location subject to a one-percent or greater possibility of flooding in any given year. The area is designated on the FIRM as Zone AE.

Article 6: To see if the town will vote to add the following language to the Hart's Location Floodplain Conservation District Ordinance, Appendix B:

SECTION 3: PERMITTED USES:

All proposed development in any special flood hazard area shall require a permit.

Article 7: To see if the town will vote to amend Section 8, Construction Requirements, of the Hart's location Floodplain Conservation District Ordinance, Appendix B, to read:

The Board of Selectmen shall review all building permit applications for substantial improvements to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is located in a **special flood hazard** area, all substantial improvements shall: ...

In the preceding paragraph, the words: "special flood hazard area" replace the words: "flood prone area".

Article 8: To see if the town will vote to amend SECTION 2. WATER AND SEWER SYSTEMS of the Hart's Location Floodplain Conservation District Ordinance, Appendix B to read:

Where replacement water and sewer systems (including on-site systems) are proposed in a **special flood hazard** area the applicant shall provide the Board of Selectmen with assurance that these systems will be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood waters, and on-site waste disposal systems will be located to avoid impairment to them or contamination from them during periods of flooding.

In the preceding paragraph, the words: "special flood hazard area" replace the words: "flood prone area".

Article 9: To see if the town will vote to add the following section as a new section of the Hart's Location Floodplain Conservation District Ordinance, Appendix B:

SECTION 10: CERTIFICATION

For all substantially improved structures located in Zone AE, the applicant shall furnish the following information to the Board of Selectmen:

- a. the as-built elevation (in relation to NGVD) of the lowest floor (including basement) and include whether or not such structures contain a basement.
- b. if the structure has been floodproofed, the as-built elevation (in relation to NGVD) to which the structure was floodproofed.
- c. any certification of floodproofing.

The Board of Selectmen shall maintain the aforementioned information for public inspection, and shall furnish such information upon request.

Article 10: To see if the town will vote to add the following section to the Hart's Location Floodplain Conservation District Ordinance, Appendix B:

SECTION 11: WATERCOURSES

1. In riverine situations, prior to the alteration or relocation of a watercourse the applicant for such authorization shall notify the Wetlands Bureau of the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services and submit copies of such notification to the Board of Selectmen, in addition to the copies required by RSA 482-A: 3. Further, the applicant shall be required to submit copies of said notification to those adjacent communities as determined by the Board of Selectmen, including notice of all scheduled hearings before

the Wetlands Bureau.

- 2. The applicant shall submit to the Board of Selectmen, certification provided by a registered professional engineer, assuring that the flood carrying capacity of an altered or relocated watercourse can and will be maintained.
- 3. Along watercourses with a designated Regulatory Floodway no encroachments, including fill, new construction, substantial improvements, and other development are allowed within the floodway unless it has been demonstrated through hydrologic and hydraulic analyses performed in accordance with standard engineering practices that the proposed encroachment would not result in any increase in flood levels within the community during the base flood discharge.

Article 11: To see if the town will vote to add the following section to the Hart's Location Floodplain Conservation District Ordinance, Appendix B:

SECTION 12 SPECIAL FLOOD HAZARD AREAS

- 1. In special flood hazard areas the Board of Selectmen shall determine the 100-year flood elevation in the following order of precedence according to the data available:
 - a. In Zone AE, refer to the elevation data provided in the community's Flood Insurance Study and accompanying FIRM.
- 2. The Board of Selectmen's 100-year flood elevation determination will be used as criteria for requiring in Zone AE that:
 - a. All substantial improvement of residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated to or above the 100-year flood elevation.
 - b. That all substantial improvements of non-residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated to or above the 100-year flood level; or together with attendant utility and sanitary facilities, shall:
 - i. be floodproofed so that below the 100-year flood elevation the structure is watertight with walls substantially impermeable to the passage of water;
 - ii. have structural components capable of resisting hydrostatic and hydrodynamic loads and the effects of buoyancy; and
 - iii. be certified by a registered professional engineer or architect that the design and methods of construction are in accordance with accepted standards of practice for meeting the provisions of this section.
 - c. All manufactured homes to be placed or substantially improved within special flood hazard areas shall be elevated on a permanent foundation such that the lowest floor of the manufactured home is at or above the base flood level; and be securely anchored to

resist floatation, collapse, or lateral movement. Methods of anchoring may include, but are not limited to, use of over-the-top or frame ties to ground anchors.

- d. All recreational vehicles placed on sites within Zone AE shall either:
 - i. be on the site for fewer than 180 consecutive days;
 - ii. be fully licensed and ready for highway use; or
 - iii. meet all standards of Section 3 of this ordinance and the elevation and anchoring requirements for "manufactured homes" in Section 11 (2) (c) of this ordinance.

A recreational vehicle is ready for highway use if it is on its wheels or jacking system, is attached to the site only by quick disconnect type utilities and security devices, and has no permanently attached additions.

- e. For all substantial improvements, fully enclosed areas below the lowest floor that are subject to flooding are permitted provided they meet the following requirements:
 - i. the enclosed area is unfinished or flood resistant, usable solely for the parking of vehicles, building access or storage;
 - ii. the area is not a basement;
 - iii. shall be designed to automatically equalize hydrostatic flood forces on exterior walls by allowing for the entry and exit of floodwater. Designs for meeting this requirement must either be certified by a registered professional engineer or architect or must meet or exceed the following minimum criteria: A minimum of two openings having a total net area of not less than one square inch for every square foot of enclosed area subject to flooding shall be provided. The bottom of all openings shall be no higher than one foot above grade. Openings may be equipped with screens, louvers, or other coverings or devices provided that they permit the automatic entry and exit of floodwater.

Article 12: To approve the Town Budget for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same:

2011 Board of Selectmen Report

Fires & Flooding & FEMA, Oh My! Here are some of the town highlights of 2011: We can say without hesitation that life isn't dull here in Hart's Location!

In July we had the Conway Scenic Railroad track fires, late August brought us Tropical Storm Irene and September saw the rapid response of NHDOT and FEMA. We are grateful to Governor Lynch and the NHDOT for their quick response restoring highway access to and from our community after Irene. The temporary Bailey Bridge over the Sawyer River was completed in just three weeks! The manpower and equipment dedicated to that project and to infrastructure repairs around the region was truly impressive. Our thanks to everyone involved.

Bill King was kept busy as Fire Warden this past year, and helped coordinate efforts to contain the railroad track fires in July 2011. Thanks are also due to Michelle & Jon Goodreau, Nancy & Carroll Hayes, and Charlie Ruggiero for their efforts to help control these fires. The fires along the railroad corridor highlighted the need to update our fire suppression equipment. Bill has identified a couple of grant opportunities to obtain state matching funds to upgrade our fire fighting and communications equipment. Articles 3 & 4 address these opportunities.

Jon Goodreau offered to fill the vacant road agent post last March and we upgraded him, appointing him as our third selectman in April. His ready participation and interest in learning about town affairs has helped the board of selectmen keep up with the many tasks at hand.

Rick Greenwood was appointed to serve as our Road Agent in April. Rick volunteered to rake Burke Road last spring at no cost to the town and has done an excellent job with the snow and ice removal contract at town hall and on Burke Road. Rick was also quite helpful to the DOT engineers shuttling them between road washouts in the aftermath of Tropical Storm Irene.

Michelle Goodreau has recently been appointed Deputy Fire Warden, and shows great enthusiasm for her new post.

The board wishes to thank Leslie Mallet for her continued service as administrative clerk/tax collector, conducting much of the clerical work of the town. Leslie keeps office hours at town hall on the 2nd & 4th Monday of each month from 5 to 7pm and can be contacted during these hours by phone at 603 374-6397 or by email at: hartslocationtc@gmail.com Leslie has indicated that she will be stepping down in 2012 and it will be necessary to find a new administrative clerk/tax collector. And we still need a resident town clerk...

We'd like to thank Nancy Hayes, our new Treasurer, for all her time and effort managing the town's financial affairs. Nancy has made a significant effort this past year to update our book keeping and post all payments and receipts within the current fiscal year. The Comparative Statement of Appropriations and Expenditures reflects these changes.

Special thanks to Beth Shurman for her many years of service to the town as Treasurer. Beth used the traditional ledger & journal method of bookkeeping, and she is likely the last town treasurer to do so. Beth stepped down last March.

Thanks to Chuck Henderson, from Senator Shaheen's office, for his hands-on efforts to help secure federal assistance and cooperation for the various infrastructure repair projects in and around town. We appreciate that Chuck took the time to attend meetings, get his feet muddy, and visit areas impacted by the storm.

The Board of Selectmen appointed Richard Garabedian to represent us as project manager for the town in all matters pertaining to the berm repair and mitigation project on the Bemis Brook along US Route 302. It has been a huge undertaking, and Richard's hard work has paid off, we've qualified for FEMA matching grant funds and state highway aid funding. Article 2 addresses this project.

The following is an overview on this project prepared by Richard:

Flooding on the Saco River resulting from Tropical Storm Irene in August of 2011 severely damaged a river embankment structure along the west bank of the Saco River at the north end of town, collapsed the Sawyer River Bridge, severed the town's communication lines, and rendered Route 302 impassable in several areas. Leaving the majority of our towns' residents isolated until such time as reconstruction efforts could be completed.

The river embankment at the north end of town destroyed during the event, was originally constructed in 1949, and severely damaged in the Fall of 1995, it was reconstructed in the spring of 1996 with 75 % FEMA grant funds, 12.5% State DOT funds and 12.5% town raised funds. The embankment historically provided flood protection to the town by stabilizing the river channel and preventing the Saco River from flowing west into the historic floodplain. The embankment is no longer effective, and has failed in many locations. A portion of the Saco River now flows west into the historic floodplain.

This new flow pattern is causing erosion at the shoulder of Route 302 at the confluence of Bemis Brook with Davis Brook, and extends south along Route 302 to the confluence of Bemis Brook with the Saco River. If this river embankment were not to be reconstructed it is likely, under a less significant or similar event the Saco River could breach onto route 302 and into a secondary channel causing increased flows that would likely impact the towns safety, accessibility, and regress/degrees along the town only main road. Further, the proposed reconstruction of the river embankment will benefit the long term stability and integrity of Route 302 and as such the NHDOT is willing to participate in funding the project.

Warrant Article 2 authorizes the Board of Selectmen to obtain and accept federal FEMA and State Highway Aid disaster relief funds to reconstruct the river embankment with a mitigation component to perform river modeling and detailed engineering calculations to ruggedize the embankment against future events.

FEMA has estimated the total project cost to be \$242,397.55, of which FEMA will pay 75%.

The remaining 25% matching funds (\$60,600.) will be provided through the State Highway Aid program, 2/3 State funds (\$40,400.) and 1/3 Town funds (\$20,200.). The Board of

Selectmen is proposing to fund the Town's portion of (\$20,200.) from the Town's Unreserved Equity Fund Balance. This will result in no increase to the Town's tax rate or budget for this project.

Selectman's Note: The Unreserved Equity Fund Balance is currently \$75,867 and is a higher percentage than is normally recommended by the NH Dept of Revenue. The Board of Selectmen have been drawing down the Unreserved Equity Fund Balance to reduce the municipal portion of the tax rate for the last several years, but chose not to do so in 2011. This kept funds available to offset the costs of this anticipated project. If the town uses \$20,200 from the Unreserved Equity Fund Balance, there will still be \$55,667 remaining.

Articles 5-11 are proposed changes to the Floodplain Conservation District Ordinance. 2011 saw updated flood plain mapping for much of Carroll County. A section of the Saco River within Hart's Location and just over the Bartlett town line was included in the updated mapping, and was identified as a Special Flood Hazard Area. The detailed study did not go further upstream. As a result of this newly designated Special Flood Hazard Area, we were contacted by the NH Office of Energy & Planning and advised that we need to amend our Floodplain Conservation District Ordinances if we want to maintain our eligibility for the National Flood Insurance Program. A public hearing was held by the Planning Board on February 6th and the proposed amendments were accepted as written to be placed on the ballot. There is a lot of language to sift through, but suffice it to say we need to make these changes in order for our residents and property owners to remain eligible for flood insurance. The Board of Selectmen and the Planning Board recommend a yes vote on all these articles.

We contracted with Purvis & Associates for assessment services for the next four years. 25% of the properties in town will be assessed each year, with the Statistical Update and Review phase scheduled for 2015. 2015 is the next Town-wide Revaluation year, and the field data collected over the next 4 years will be analyzed and reviewed as part of the Revaluation process. Property owners will be notified of their new valuations in 2015.

We formally adopted the multi-jurisdictional hazard mitigation plan coordinated by June Garneau, formerly of the North Country Council, in conjunction with the town of Bartlett. This document provides an assessment of current hazards that could affect both towns, as well as mitigation strategies that can be implemented. The Hazard Mitigation Plan is an evolving document, and will be revisited by both towns on a periodic basis.

Meeting Minutes

Moderator Les Schoof called the meeting to order at 5:30 pm. Ed Butler made a motion to waive the reading of the articles. Seconded by George Holmes. Motion passed unanimously.

Article 2: To raise and appropriate \$27,435.00 and approve the Town Budget for the ensuing year.

Discussion followed to clarify budget numbers since the budget hearing was poorly attended. Notes comparing 2010 and 2011 were included in the Town Report pages 7-8.

New expenditures were explained by Mark Dindorf. Under Financial Administration annual licensing fees for new computer software were included. The issue of separating the Town Clerk/Tax Collector post will be discussed in more detail in Article 3. Currently Leslie Mallet is paid for her services. Ed Butler signs paperwork to fulfill the residency requirement.

Issue of privacy in dealing with motor vehicle registration was raised by Charlie Ruggerio if the post was separated.

Question was raised about expenditure for Fire and Rescue. It was explained that the town selectmen met with Bartlett officials and determined that \$5000 for ambulance and fire services for Hart's Location would be a compromise from the calculated \$8000. An additional \$500 is included to cover expenses that are not reimbursed. This arrangement will be tracked and reviewed if there is significant change in requested services.

No funds from the Damage & Legal line was used but \$1000 is appropriated. Solid Waste Collection saw a slight increase. Highway expense includes plowing for Town Road and Town Hall. Insurance for Town Hall was updated to reflect the office move. New locks for Town Hall is a one time expense reflected in the Town Building line.

Mark Dindorf made a motion, seconded by Ed Butler to vote on the Town Budget. All in favor.

Article 3: To see if the town will vote to discontinue the combined elected position of Town Clerk/Tax Collector and create two separate positions, the elected position of Town Clerk, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a qualified individual to perform the duties of the Tax Collector. Pursuant to RSA:41.45. To be voted on by secret ballot.

Discussion: RSA allows for the separation. Town clerk duties could be lightened to only include election responsibilities and shifting other duties to the tax collector. The tax collector position can be outsourced. This shift would allow the town to fill the tax collector post with a non resident addressing the challenge of filling elected positions with residents. The Town Clerk post with a lesser time commitment would be easier to fill with a resident.

Charlie Ruggerio again raised the issue of privacy with motor vehicle registrations.

Question - Can Hart's Location contract with Bartlett for Motor Vehicle registration and avoid Twin Mountain?

Secret Ballot Vote: 11 yes; 2 no. Article passed.

Article 4: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5000 to be added to the Town Hall Capital Reserve Fund.

Discussion: Last year funds were taken out for covering moving expenses and town mapping.

Nancy Ruggerio asked if \$11,000 in reserve is to be used for disaster. It was explained that in order for the funds to used it must be within the scope of purpose or a special town meeting needs to be held to approve expenditure.

Previously town appropriated between \$3,000-5,000 in 3 funds. It was suggested to put \$10,000 in 2 funds; the Town of Hart's Location Capital Reserve Fund and the Town of Hart's Location Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund.

Ed Butler made a motion, seconded by Calvin Hunsicker. Article passed - all in favor.

Article 5: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum \$5000 to be added to the Town Revaluation Capitol Reserve Fund.

Ed Butler made a motion, seconded by Bill King. Article passed - all in favor.

Article 6: To conduct any other business that may legally come before the town.

Zarvin Shaffer volunteered to mentor with Ed Butler or Leslie Mallet to help in the office with paperwork. Mark Dindorf, selectman, will contact Zarvin to set something up.

Mark Dindorf made a motion to vote on adjourning the meeting, motion was seconded by Nancy Ritger. All in favor.

Official Minutes Hart's Location School District Meeting Tuesday, March 8, 2011

Present: Les Schoof, George Holmes, Nancy Holmes, Carolyn King, Bill King, Nancy Ruggerio, Charlie Ruggerio, Mark Dindorf, Nancy Ritger, Calvin Hunsicker, Michelle Goodreau and Carl Nelson, Superintendent, SAU 9. Also in attendance, as a property owner & taxpayer, but not a voter, Nancy Hayes.

Moderator Leslie Schoof called the meeting to order at 4:31 pm.

Mark Dindorf moved, seconded by Bill King, to waive the reading of Articles 1 & 2. The motion passed unanimously.

Article 3: Carl Nelson discussed new Audit requirements mandated by HB1448. SAU9 has retained Gryzlak & Assoc. as district auditors. \$2000 included in budget to cover their services. Nancy Hayes asked why that figure was so high, especially for a school budget that typically has less than two dozen transactions per year. Carl responded that we could find an auditor other than Gryzlak and perhaps pay less, but that the \$2000 was included to cover the cost of a professional audit. Bill King asked if we spend less (on another auditor), would appropriated funds roll back into the general school fund? Carl answered yes. Mark clarified that the Article under discussion was about meeting the new state audit requirements and not about appropriating the funds. Les asked about the specific requirements, Carl responded that they can be provided on request. Les reviewed the article and the discussion before moving the question. Bill King moved & Nancy seconded.

Motion was made to amend the article to replace the term "CPA auditor" with the phrase "auditor that meets the requirements of HB1448". Bill King moved & Nancy seconded.

Vote to Amend Article 3 – all in favor. Amended Article 3 passed unanimously.

Article 4. Budget. Motion to accept article as written by Mark, George seconds. Discussion: Nancy Hayes asked about Workers Compensation insurance, Carl says it's required. Carl brought up the possibility that Hart's Location could become a donor town in the coming year, with an estimated \$14730 due to Concord. The estimated worst case impact on the local school rate would be an additional \$2.28 per \$1000 in valuation. or \$1.31 per \$1000 in a best case scenario. With the option to take out \$10,000 from the tuition reserve fund, that impact could be lessened to \$1.82 per \$1000 worst case or \$0.86 per \$1000 best case.

Nancy motioned to move the article, Bill seconds. Article passes.

Article 5. \$3000 in special education expenses for a new student during the current school year. George moves to accept the article as written, Mark seconds. Discussion: Funds were not budgeted and need to be appropriated. Article passes.

Article 6. \$1500 for anticipated Special Education expenses in the coming year. Motion to accept article as written. Calvin moves, Nancy seconds. Article Passes.

Article 7. \$10,000 from the special tuition reserve fund to offset anticipated tax increases. Nancy moves to accept the article as written. Calvin seconds. Discussion: Nancy Hayes suggested that the town might want to hold onto the funds, considering the possibility that a new family could move into town. Carl explained how it would work if a hypothetical new family depleted the

available funds in the tuition reserve account. Mark motions to move the article, George seconds. Article passes.

Article 8 \$1500 for transportation expenses for new student not budgeted in current school year. Calvin moves, Nancy seconds. Discussion. Mark clarified reason for article. Article passes.

Article 9 Any other business. Calvin asked about transportation expenses for Hart's Location students. Nancy explained the per parent reimbursement formula based on federal mileage standards. The Hunsickers' currently have one student in Fryeburg and were not getting reimbursed. Discussion followed that the Hunsickers were entitled to that reimbursement, and that the budget should be amended to include that expense. Carl explained the procedural requirements necessary to revisit articles already voted on. Nancy made a motion to Reconsider Article 4. Mark seconds.

Discussion on reconsidering Article 4: Carl recommends using the historical expense figure of \$8700 (for transportation to Fryebrurg), increasing the budget amount from \$117,160 to \$125,860. Mark moves to amend Article 4 to include the new amount of \$125,860. Calvin seconds. Mark motions to move question, George seconds. Motion for Article 4 to be reconsidered as amended passes.

Article 4 Motion to accept Article 4 as amended. Calvin moves, Nancy seconds. Article 4, as amended, passes.

Discussion followed pertaining to current year transportation funding not budgeted. Motion made by Carolyn to reconsider Article 8. George seconds.

Mark made motion made to amend the amount in Article 8 from \$1500 to \$4500. Nancy Seconds. Motion for Article 8 to be reconsidered as amended passes.

Article 8 Motion to accept Article 8 as amended to include the new amount of \$4500. Nancy moves, Calvin seconds. Article 8, as amended passes.

Article 9 Any other business. Mark motions to adjourn. Calvin seconds.
