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

RECORD OF TOWN MEETING MARCH 8-9, 2005

The Annual Town Meeting of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire, was called to order Tuesday March 8, 2005 at 11:00 AM by Moderator Donald W. Melvin. The polls were declared open and the following Ballot Clerks were sworn in by the Moderator:

Mary Ellen Duffy, Diane Hodgson, Melissa Walker, Gail Houghton

At 5:00 PM, due to severe bad weather, Moderator Melvin called for the evening session of the Meeting to be postponed until the following evening. Wednesday March 9, 2005. He announced that the polls, which opened at 11:00 AM for the purpose of voting by ballot on Articles 1 and 2 of the Town Meeting Warrant as well as voting on all Articles on the Oyster River Cooperative School District Ballot, would remain open until 8:00 PM. At that time the school district cast ballots were collected by a school district clerk and removed to Durham to be counted by machine; the Town Meeting would begin promptly at 7:00 PM the next day, with balloting on Articles 1 and 2 remaining open until 8:00 PM unless extended by vote of the Town Meeting. The Town ballot box full of cast ballots was locked in the town's vault overnight.

Moderator Melvin reconvened the meeting at 7:00 PM on March 9, 2005. He asked the assembled citizens (approximately 125) to stand for a moment of silence for those Madbury people who died during the year 2004 and to remain standing for the Pledge of Allegiance led by Town Clerk Pamela Seaver. The deceased citizens include: Muriel Rogers, James Towle, Adam Jakubowski, Janet Bergstrom, Lois Given and Steve Kentris.

ARTICLE 2. Voted by Official Ballot on Amendment No. 1 to the Building Regulations to change Article IV, Sections 1 through 5 regarding "Application Fees." YES - 137 NO - 19 **PASSED**

(Sample ballot on file)

Voted by Official Ballot on Amendment No. 2 to the Building Regulations to change Article V, Section 1 regarding "Requirements."

YES – 133 NO – 26 (Sample ballot on file)

PASSED

ARTICLE 3. Craig Seaver moved and Raymond Wennerberg seconded a motion to authorize the Selectmen to choose all other Town Officers.

PASSED

ARTICLE 4. Bruce Hodsdon moved and Robert Houston seconded a motion to expend Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$400,000.00) for the purchase of the G&R Associates property (Map 3 Lot 16), and further to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00) from the Capital Reserve Fund established for this purpose, and further to authorize the Selectmen to make four annual payments of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) plus interest starting in 2006. A 2/3 ballot vote is required.

Selectman Hodsdon gave a brief history of the G&R 25 acre parcel and the adjoining 90 acre parcel owned by Pike Industries (also formerly owned by G&R). Both parcels are currently active gravel pits. The 90 acre area has had approvals from the State of NH for hydro-mining the gravel since 1988. Hodsdon displayed the 1988 plan which shows a 60 - 70 acre pond, up to 40 feet deep. It may be as many as 10-20 years before the Pike pit gravel is exhausted. G&R expects to be finished mining its 25 acre parcel in 1-2 years.

Hodsdon explained that although currently no specific plans for this property exist, there is a strong possibility of its becoming a recreation area. A lively and mostly positive discussion pursued. Polls remained open for one hour for this ballot vote.

ARTICLE 5. Bruce Hodsdon moved and Barbara Houston seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) for the Capital Reserve Fund created in Article 9 at the 2000 Town Meeting for the purpose of Purchase of Propery and/or Easements.

Selectman Hodsdon urged passing this Article. There being very little discussion, a vote was taken.

PASSED

ARTICLE 6. Craig Seaver moved and Joan Valentine seconded a motion to raise and appropriate Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for the existing Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 9 at the 2002 Town meeting for a Library Building Fund.

ARTICLE 7. Tom Perley moved and Bob Battles seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for the existing Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 8 at the 1994 Town meeting for the purchase of a Fire Truck.

Perkins Road resident Ian Walker praised the Madbury Voluteer Fire Department for their skills, professionalism and dedication to the citizens of Madbury. Walker told how the firefighters saved his home from the fire that destroyed his barn last year. He urged support for this Article.

Fire Chief Perley explained that the MVFD had received an Assistance to Firefighting Grant from Homeland Security/FEMA so that all the Town of Madbury needed to raise was \$20,000.00 as its match to acquire and equip this new tanker truck. A vote was taken and it unanimously

PASSED

ARTICLE 8. Joan Sundberg moved and Donald Sundberg seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) for the existing Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 6 of the 2004 Town Meeting for the purpose of a Town Hall Expansion Fund.

Selectwomen Sundberg explained that there is currently \$50,000.00 plus interest in this fund . Her Board feels that they have "back-burnered" the Town Office expansion long enough. The Safety Complex and Library came first, but now is the time for this major project. Another \$100,000.00 to this fund will allow the project to be completed in the next year if the next article passes.

Very little discussion followed. A vote was taken.

PASSED

ARTICLE 9. Joan Sundberg moved and Tom Perley seconded a motion to authorize the Selectmen to expend up to Two Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00) for the expansion of the existing Town Hall and to further authorize the Selectmen to withdraw One Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00) from the Capital Reserve Fund established for this purpose and expend Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) from surplus funds and to borrow not more than Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) for this purpose. A 2/3 vote is required.

Much discussion ensued, mainly concerning the proposed design and landscaping of the building and grounds. Polls remained open one hour for this ballot vote.

PASSED

ARTICLE 10. Joseph Moriarty moved and Bob Battles seconded a motion to pass the 2005 Budget as posted including Special Warrant Articles 4 and 9: One Million Seven Hundred Thousand Seven Hundred and Forty-Four Dollars (\$1,700,44.00).

There being not one question or comment a vote was taken.

PASSED

ARTICLE 11. Tom Perley moved and Bob Houston seconded a motion to authorize the Fire Department to go to the aid of another city, town, village or fire district, within or without the state, for the purpose of extinguishing a fire, rendering other emergency assistance, or performing any detail as requested. And to allow the Fire Department to receive aid from other towns, and further to authorize the Fire Chief to execute a mutual aid agreement with the fire departments of other municipalities pursuant to NH RSA 154:24-30.

Fire Chief Perley explained that this was a "housekeeping" Article. Madbury belongs to two emergency organizations and already assists other communities when needed. This NH RSA needs to fe formally adopted by Town Meeting vote.

Ian Walker again praised Madbury's firefighters and urged passing this article. No further discussion. A vote was taken.

PASSED

ARTICLE 12. Eric Fiegenbaum moved and Craig Seaver seconded a motion to vote the retention of the unexpended portion of the 2005 Conservation Commission appropriation, said monies to be placed in the Madbury Conservation Fund.

Conservation Commission Chair Eric Fiegenbaum said this Fund now has over \$327,000.00 and will go in part toward purchasing a portion of land around Hoyt's Pond, off Freshet Road, which is currently undergoing development.

After a short discussion a vote was taken.

PASSED

ARTICLE 13. There were no reports of any Committees, Town Boards or Commissions.

ARTICLE 14. Moderator Donald Melvin thanked the committe members of the Noise Ordinance Study Committe from 2003. They are: Joan Sundberg, David Mercer, William Leslie, Donald Sylvester, and Mary Ellen Duffy.

Joan Sundberg announced that the Town has two paid positions open. A recording secretary for the Planning and Zoning Boards and a manager for the Transfer Station are needed. Applicants are urged to call and make an appointment with the Board of Selectmen.

Barbara Troxell asked about towns being required (by RSA) to provide a place to bring household trash. Selectman Moriarty spoke about the Dover Recycling Center on Mast Road being available to Madbury residents year round. He also said that the Selectmen have expectations of John Davis' trash pickup service. The Board has an agreement with Mr. Davis, but no formal contract.

The Bellamy Oyster River Watershed Protection (BORWP) was introduced by Eric Fiegenbaum. He is seeking volunteers to help monitor water quality in the Bellamy River.

Lorraine Morong requested the Selectmen consider creating a "state-of-the-town report" to be included in the Annual Town Report. She feels that such a report would be helpful to future historians researching "how we were managed as a town." Citizens applauded her request.

Community Club President Mayme Trumble announced the Annual Town Pot Luck would be held at the Town Hall on Sunday April 10, 2005 at 5:30 PM. The Library's "Read Around Madbury" program featuring discussions of "Hoot" by Carl Hiassen will follow.

Carolyn Hutton is looking for OLD photos of Madbury for the 2006 Madbury Calendar.

Selectman Jay Moriarty saluted long time Madbury resident Carleton Wentworth. Carl now lives in Dover at Langdon Place. He served as a ballot clerk in Madbury from 1939-2004, was a member of the Oyster River School Board, a charter member of the Madbury Volunteer Fire Department, and served as Assistant Moderator for the Town and OR School District. Madbury thanks Mr. Wentworth for his many years of service to the community.

Selectman Bruce Hodsdon presented Donald Melvin a plaque for his past thirteen years of service to Madbury as Moderator. Melvin also served on the Planning Board, Zoning Board of Adjustment, and Recreation Commission. He was Madbury's eightieth Moderator since 1755.

Moderator Melvin adjourned the meeting at 9:05 PM to count ballots cast on Articles 1 and 2. The Meeting officially adjourned at 9:35 PM.

Then came before me, Richard R. Houghton, Bruce E. Hodsdon, Deborah M.F. Ahlstrom, Elaine C. Sylvester, Elizabeth Nanda, Lorena M. Hart, Roderic Hutton, and Jill Leavenworth and took their oaths of office as required by law.

The polls, which open at 11:00 AM for the purpose of voting on Articles 1 and 2 will close at 8:00 PM unless extended by vote of the meeting .

ARTICLE 1: To choose the following Town Officers: (Majority Vote required)

A Moderator for the ensuing two years

A Selectman for the ensuing three years

A Treasurer for the ensuing year

Two Auditors for the ensuing year

A Trustee of the Trust Funds for the ensuing three years

A Trustee of the Trust Funds for the ensuing year

A Cemetery Trustee for the ensuing three years

A Library Trustee for the ensuing three years

A Supervisor of the Checklist for the ensuing six years

ARTICLE 2: To vote to amend the Town Zoning Ordinances as recommended by the Planning Board (Majority vote required)

AMENDMENT No. 1: To adopt and/or amend Articles I, III, IV, V and IX

ARTICLE 3: To choose all other Town Officers (Majority Vote required)

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) for the existing Capital Reserve Fund created in Article 9 at the 2000 Town Meeting for the purpose of Purchase of Property and/or Easements. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation, and it is included in the posted operating budget. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for the existing Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 9 at the 2002 Town Meeting for a Library Building Fund. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation and it is included in the posted operating budget (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, and authorize the Selectmen to spend, up to the sum of Twenty Five Thousand

Dollars (\$25,000.00) to purchase and equip a police cruiser. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation and it is included in the posted budget. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 7: To see what action the Town will take on the proposed Budget for the current year. The Board of Selectmen recommend this budget. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 8: Shall we modify the elderly exemptions from property tax in the Town of Madbury, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows:

For a person 65 years of age and up to 75 years - \$60,000.00For a person 75 years of age and up to 80 years - \$80,000.00For a person 80 years of age or older - \$100,000.00

To qualify the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least five consecutive years preceding April 1st, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married for at least five years. In addition the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$35,000.00 or, if married, a combined income of not more than \$45,000.00; and own net assets not in excess of \$180,000.00 excluding the value of the person's residence. (Ballot vote- majority required)

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote the retention of the unexpended portion of the 2006 Conservation Commission appropriation, said monies to be placed in the Madbury Conservation Fund (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, if they should deem it necessary, to spray within the Town in order to destroy mosquitoes that may carry West Nile virus or eastern equine encephalitis

ARTICLE 11: To hear the reports of any Committees, Town Boards, and/or Commissions, and act on any motion thereto.

ARTICLE 12: To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

2005 began with Bruce Hodsdon being re-elected to the Board and Jay Moriarty assuming the leadership position of Chair of the Board.

The Selectmen were authorized to purchase 25 acres from G&R Associates, better known as the Iafolla pit, at Town Meeting. This purchase was completed by the end of the year, as was the purchase of 37 acres around Hoyt Pond. These purchases added a combined total of 62 acres to the Town inventory.

Also approved at Town Meeting was the construction of the Town Hall addition. Working with Changing Places, LLC, Selectmen finalized the design and site work was begun in April. Although the landscaping and parking areas will not be completed until 2006, town business was officially conducted in the new addition beginning in November.

In April, Madbury received a grant to update our Emergency Response Plan, which had not been updated in several years. Working with Jane Hubbard of Hubbard Consulting, town officials and emergency responders put in many hours over several months to complete an updated plan that delineates responsibilities and resources in the event of a natural or man-made disaster, including a widespread outbreak of disease.

Both West Nile Virus and Eastern Equine Encephalitis were found in town last fall. On the advice of state officials, warnings and a list of precautions to take were posted. However, Selectmen decided not to spray, since these are mosquito-borne diseases which are eliminated by a hard frost. Such a frost was likely to hit before plans to spray could be completed. In order to prepare for the next mosquito season, the Selectmen have contracted with Dragon Mosquito Control Inc. to prepare a plan for spraying if it becomes necessary and complete an application to the State for permission to spray.

Major road work completed in town this year includes paving of part of Nute Rd, as well as Fern Way and Moss Lane. In other road-related business, the Selectmen have renewed the Town's contract with Arthur Hartford Construction to keep our roads clear of snow and ice for the next three years.

Projects scheduled for 2006 include the completion of the parking area and landscaping at Town Hall. The landscaping at the Public Safety Complex should be completed in 2006, as well.

PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board found this a busy year.

Nine applications of various types were processed during 2005 with four new lots created. That small increase was largely offset by three lot mergers this year (wherein two lots are merged into one) for a net increase of only one lot. You should not, however, conclude that development demand pressure has abated. We have already seen preliminary plans proposing a dozen new house lots and anticipate the arrival of applications for those subdivisions early in 2006.

Master Plan recommendations received a good deal of our time and attention this year as we have worked with Strafford Regional Planning to draft water resource protection ordinances. The results of this process will appear in the warrant for 2006. The Board has devoted several meetings to reviewing these ordinances, learning, debating, editing and refining in hopes of creating protections that will serve Madbury for the long term.

The more difficult issues encountered here revolve around the balance between the public benefit of land use restrictions on the one hand and the rights of individual property owners on the other. As an example, the Board is considering recommendations for improved protection for wetlands. Better protection of wetlands will require additional restrictions on private land use. Board deliberation of this item will continue in 2006. Please watch for a public hearing notice. Your input is valuable.

Planning Board operations this year have benefited greatly from newly budgeted clerical support. The Selectmen authorized the hiring of part time secretarial help to support the Board with routine paperwork and filing work. In an all-volunteer organization this help has been an enormous boost. The availability of paid secretarial help has freed up volunteer time to work on tasks like ordinance development that would not have been done otherwise. This help was especially appreciated by the Board's novice chairman who has been learning his new job with the kind support of the old hands in the group. We are indebted to many people for assistance and advice but two deserve individual recognition. Joanne Schreiber continues her well-informed advocacy for water resource protection. Eric Fiegenbaum has helped us regularly with conservation-related issues. Thanks to you both.

The Board has a vacancy for an alternate member, no experience required. Please contact the Selectmen if you would like to contribute some time and energy to this essential town function.

MADBURY PUBLIC LIBRARY

The popularity and recognition of the Madbury Public Library continued to grow in 2005. Library visits increased 33% from 2004 with over 4800 visits, not including volunteers. Our indispensable team of loyal volunteers contributed over 1500 hours of their time in 2005—equivalent to roughly \$15,000 of paid labor. The Library would not be able to serve the community without Liz Burbank, Suzie Noronha, Peggy Wolcott, Edna O'Sullivan, and Ellie Epstein-White, who help out on a weekly basis.

Over 100 new library cards were issued to enthusiastic patrons, bringing the total to 488 cards issued over 3 years. The number of items checked out of the Library increased from 3567 in 2004 to 9300 in 2005 for an increase of 160%!

Programs For All Ages


The Library held cooperative programs with local community groups including Madbury's Community Club, Historical Society, and Conservation Commission, the Durham Ambulance Corps, and Oyster River Parents and Preschoolers. The Library also sponsored programs with libraries in Lee and Durham.

Programs in '05 included visits from storyteller Pat Spaulding, a lecture about the life of Martin Luther King, training classes on genealogy databases and CPR, an author visit by Norma Mandel, a presentation on birds of prey and a visit from Mr. Phil the Magician.

This year's Read Around Madbury community-wide reading program featured *Hoot* by Carl Hiaasen. Community members enjoyed the delicious Community Club Annual Potluck, followed by a discussion of the book. *Hoot* dealt with friendship, individuality, bullying, environmental awareness and community growth, which led to discussions in which both adults and children could participate. As part of the Read Around Madbury program, the Library and the Conservation Commission hosted live Birds of Prey in a presentation by the Center for Wildlife of Cape Neddick, Maine. Approximately 60 kids and adults enjoyed this exciting and educational program.

The second year of the Summer Reading Program had 20 children participating in activities throughout the summer including an art class, an indoor planetarium, programs about the lives of bees and bears, and a Final Celebration Campfire featuring children's performers Partners in Rhyme and s'mores for a treat!

The summer months also brought a week-long Summer Writing Camp in honor of Robert Connors. Teacher Susan O'Byrne led the children through a week of art and creative writing with some beautiful results. A bi-weekly program on Square Foot Gardening was led by Master Gardener Noreen Gaetjens and was



funded in part by the Strafford County Master Gardener Association.

One of the library's most popular programs was the annual Halloween party, attended by over 40 parents and children. Volunteers from Junior Girl Scout Troop 2015 planned games and crafts for the creatively-costumed attendees, and when the party finally settled down, the children listened to a (not-so) scary story.

Daytime and evening book groups continue to run successfully, and as alway solicit further participation. The library's pre-school storytime, held on Thursday mornings, averages about 6 to 8 children attending each week (note: a record-breaking 17 children and 11 moms attended on January 12th!).

Two new programs started up this year at the Library. A bi-weekly Quilting Group invites quilters of all skill levels to share their work, learn from others' experiences, and enjoy the company of fellow crafters. A monthly lecture series—Natural Health and Alternative Medicine—boasts local health experts, most Madbury residents, as its presenters. Both activities have been well received.

Donations and Grants

In addition to town funding, the Library has received donations from the community and grants from national and local foundations. Over 1700 books do-

nated by community members were added to the Library collection this year. The Library received a We the People Bookshelf grant which provided 12 new classic books on the topic of Freedom. Also received was a Kids, Books and the Arts grant from the New Hampshire State Council on the Arts and partners. This \$150 grant, along with matching funds provided by the Friends of the Madbury Library, paid for the summer reading program's final performance by Partners in Rhyme.

The most exciting grant this year was received by The Friends. The group was thrilled to win a \$5,000 Project Grant from the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation (NHCF)-Piscataqua Region. This grant will be used to conduct an

The NHCF, which has worked to improve the quality of life in our communities since 1962, builds and manages funds, currently totaling \$323 million, created by individuals, families and corporations for charitable purposes of their choosing. In 2004, the Foundation awarded nearly \$20 million to non-profits and scholarship funds. Our Librarian



The Friends continue to provide enthusiasm and fresh ideas, through volunteering and through donations and fundraising. The Madbury Day Book Sale raised almost \$800. In 2005, The Friends provided funding for Summer Reading

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Hoyt Pond Conservation/Recreation Area leads the Commission's news, as the closing on the area's purchase took place in 2005. This locally valued 37 acre natural area off Freshet Road was purchased by the Town through the efforts of the Selectmen and with the cooperation of the Madbury Conservation Commission (MCC). The Pond is stocked with brook trout by the NH Fish and Game. The area is home to a variety of flora and fauna including river otter, beaver, mink, deer, cedar waxwings, downy and hairy woodpeckers, salamanders,

frogs, and snapping turtles. Protected by deed restrictions, the area is open for public enjoyment through low impact recreational activities such as hiking, wild-life watching, fishing, snowshoeing and skiing. In the coming year, the MCC has plans to engage UNH Natural Resource seniors to conduct an natural resource inventory of the property.

In April, the MCC was awarded a \$3,375 Moose Plate Grant from the NH State Conservation Committee for a trail enhancement and conservation awareness project. With a focus on trails behind Town Hall, the project will seek to minimize soil erosion and reduce user impacts on the well used trails through maintenance, improvements and redesign. Conservation awareness will be heightened by providing learning opportunities through postings, naturalist led and self-guided


nature walks, and increased access to educational material. We are also working with the UNH Office of Woodlands and Natural Areas to produce an updated map of trails on and around the Kingman Farm.

In regard to our responsibilities to advise on "the proper utilization and protection of the natural resources and for the protection of watershed resources", the MCC reviewed and expressed concerns on NH Wetlands Bureau permit applications and a subdivision application. We offered comments and assistance to the Madbury Planning Board in their efforts to update and increase the protections of Madbury's water resources.

With an eye toward land conservation, the Commission worked on formalizing two in-house documents. *Land Selection Criteria* provides a guide for the ranking of conservation opportunities while *Steps to a Land Conservation Transaction* gives a framework for the process of buying land or a conservation easement.

As always, we encourage town residents to bring us their concerns, comments and ideas by letter, email, or attendance at our meetings. We meet on the fourth Monday of the month at 7:00 pm in the Town Hall.

VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

On behalf of the Madbury Fire Department, I would like to thank the citizens of Madbury for their continued support. Over the course of this year, we accepted delivery of our new Tank Truck which was purchased with a grant through the Federal Assistance to Firefighters Program. The town was required to contribute 10%, or around \$18,000. The truck was received in April, and was placed in service after about a month of training. In August, we were notified that we had received another grant through the same program which will allow us to replace all of our hose and portable pumps, as well as some additional hardware. We are currently in the process of ordering these supplies. This is the third such grant we have received, which has allowed us to upgrade much of our equipment, with little expense to the taxpayer. I must thank Ted Keith, who has authored all of these grant requests.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

Over the past year the Police Department has undergone a period of transition. Besides being shorthanded, our number of complaints, investigations, accidents and arrests have all increased from previous years.

We lost three officers to other agencies and two officers left police work all together. We have since hired back two previous employees of the Madbury Police Department which has lightened the load considerably. Our current staffing levels are at one full-time officer and six part-time officers. Although employed as part-time officers, our Sergeant and four Patrolman are all full-time certified through New Hampshire Police Standards and Training and either have worked or are working in a full-time capacity at another law enforcement agency.

Over the past year we have been able to take advantage of grant opportunities which have allowed us to secure equipment and supplies. With the help of Morrison's Cycle and Ski-Doo, we were able to obtain a 2006 snowmobile with no cost to the Town. This is part of a loaner program offered by BRP Corporation, the manufacturer of Ski-Doo. We are the first Police Agency to take part in this program in New Hampshire.

This will be the third year the Police Department will be patrolling the snowmobile trails and the Bellamy Reservoir. We urge everyone who uses the trail system to be cognizant of his or her surroundings. The trails are used by a whole host of individuals including snowmobiles, snow shoeing enthusiasts and cross-country skiers. Most trails in Madbury are posted to not allow wheeled vehicles. Please treat the land as if it were your own.

In February of 2005, the Department received a partial grant for an All Terrain Vehicle (ATV / 4-Wheeler). Since February, the ATV has been used on multiple occasions on patrol as well as rescuing injured persons from the Kingman Farm woods. The Fire Department was also able to utilize the ATV on different occasions. Part of the grant allowed for the purchase of the ATV at a reduced rate. A short time ago the Fire Department and the Police Department purchased the ATV at a considerable savings to the Town. This is a valuable resource that has an abundance of applications. We are excited to offer this service to the community.

WATER RESOURCES BOARD

The Madbury Water Resources Board continues in its mission related to the stewardship of all water resources within the Town of Madbury for the benefit of its citizens and the environment. This stewardship includes the consideration of issues surrounding water quality, water quantity, water rights, and water usage and recognizes that these issues lead beyond town boundaries and require a vigilant understanding of regional relationships and concerns.

Efforts were begun to reinstate the well water quality sampling and testing program begun in the summers of 1989 and 1990. Radon and VOC studies were done in 1994 and 2000 respectively. The high dependence on ground water for the town's primary potable water supply and the potential for its contamination, by both natural and human means, are reasons to reassess quality periodically. Testing is expected to take place during the summer of 2006.

Considerable time was spent trying to find the location of the Hick's Hill water system piping. This was especially important at this time in view of the reconstruction of the bridge on Route 155 that crosses the railroad tracks. It was determined that the current water pipe will not withstand pressure from the road buildup and needs to be replaced.

The Water Resources Board carefully followed the activities of the Planning Board as it worked to revise ordinances aimed at protecting the town's water resources. Suggestions were made when deemed appropriate.

Support was provided to Barrington's Conservation Commission in their efforts to acquire a conservation easement on a property in Barrington. This property on Route 125 and Beauty Hill Road includes a tree farm, abuts the SATWaSR (Tamposi property), and has frontage on the Bellamy River.

I want to offer my special thanks to all the members of the Board for their commitment and hard work. Their dedication to fulfilling the responsibilities entrusted to the Board has made its work much easier and more rewarding.

The Water Resources Board meets on the last Tuesday of each month. All citizens are welcome to attend. We need to hear your concerns, comments and ideas.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden (see numbers, below) or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. A fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2217, or online at www.nhdfl.org.

Fire activity was high during the first several weeks of the 2005 fire season, with red-flag conditions issued by the National Weather Service and extreme fire danger in the southern and central portions of the state. This period of increased initial attack activity prompted a 5-day ban on open burning, the first such ban in several years. Despite the dry conditions, the state's largest wildland fire was contained at 29 acres. Our statewide system of fire lookout towers is credited with keeping the fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Fires in the wildland urban interface damaged 10 structures, a reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their homes. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at www.firewise.org. STRAFFORD REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

Strafford Regional Planning Commission serves in an advisory role to its eighteen member communities located in the northern coastal zone. We provide professional planning services to officials, boards, and citizens to manage growth and facilitate collaborative efforts.

SRPC's professional staff offer a range of planning services in transportation, land use, conservation, natural resources, economic development, downtown revitalization, and geographic information systems (GIS) mapping and analysis. These services are available in customized modes to meet the diverse needs of the volunteers who are the foundation of communities. Educational outreach occurs in the form of our website, newsletter, How To Guides, Fact Sheets, workshops, forums, and personalized training.

In 2005 SRPC worked on these regional issues: adoption of regional policies and strategies on transportation, growth management, land use, and community design; adoption of municipal conservation and cluster development subdivision ordinances; water quantity and quality; wastewater and septage; workforce housing; land conservation; regional transportation long range plan and state Ten Year Plan; implementation of a new travel demand model; air quality conformity for new 8 hour ozone standards; coordination of transit services between rail and bus; integration of transportation and land use planning through access management; and completion of 135 traffic counts and road inventories for seven communities.

Services provided to all communities for 2005 included: local match to federal coastal and transportation funds for local and regional planning and construction projects, Census and GIS data and mapping, NH Land Use planning books, websites for SRPC and the Seacoast Metropolitan (Transportation) Planning Organization.

Projects or initiatives conducted with or for Madbury in 2005 include the following:

- Work with Planning Board to update zoning and land use regulations
- Collaboration with the Water Resources Board and Oyster River Watershed Association on water resource and conservation planning issues
- GIS assistance in updating the Madbury Zoning Map
- · Water Resources map for the Town
- Data, information, and mapping for residents of Madbury
- Coordination with NH Department of Transportation on funding for Center Civic District Transportation Enhancement project.
- Added a vision element project to the Seacoast Long Range Transportation Plan for improvements to the intersection of Madbury Road and NH 155





Our volunteers include residents of Madbury, Durham, Lee, and students at UNH. Founded in 1968 in memory of Dr. George G. McGregor, we recently celebrated our 37th anniversary providing exemplary emergency services. DAC McGregor maintains an organizational commitment to excellence, and prides itself on being one of the most cost-effective, highly trained and professionally organized

Statistics. In 2005, DAC McGregor responded to 67 calls in Madbury, an 18% decrease from 2004. In addition to the calls in Madbury, we responded to 263 in Lee, 489 calls in Durham, 339 to UNH locations, and 87 calls to other communities. For



2006, we are projecting over 1300 calls total, a 6% increase.

Community budget contributions have, in the aggregate, grown by only about 1% a year, while:

• Call volume has increased on average by 6% per year.

In 2005, we added:

4 new EMT-Intermediates

1 new Paramedic

bringing our total to 7 active Paramedics, 18 EMT-Intermediates and over 30 EMT-Basics.

2005 Accomplishments

- Vehicle Fleet Increased to Two Full-Time and One Reserve Ambulance
 DAC McGregor completed the purchase of its newest ambulance, replacing
 our older 1996 ambulance. The 1996 ambulance was retained as a "reserve"
 ambulance. The reserve ambulance ensures that two front-line ambulances
 are always available, and allows us to offer three ambulances for major
 events.
- <u>Cost Savings Initiatives</u> Through the implementation of severalsavings initiatives, we limited the growth of the budget contribution from the communities we serve to under 3%. Over the last five years, despite sharply increasing healthcare costs, we have managed to avoid any significant increase in the budget contributions from the communities. These initiatives included creating a formal inventory management system that better controls the volume of supplies we keep, convincing the hospital to replace more of the expensive medications and supplies that we use, and rethinking how we manage equipment to reduce the cost of reserve equipment.
- Implemented Substantially New Patient Care Protocols Responding to a
 substantial overhaul of the medical guidelines that govern the practice
 of medicine by EMTs, we developed new training and protocol guidance
 materials and engaged in extensive training and testing of personnel. We
 shared our efforts and materials with local fire and EMS agencies, in order
 to make the most efficient use of Madbury tax dollars.
- DAC McGregor Grows as Center of EMS Education Enhancing our role providing regional support for EMS, we increased the breadth and depth of our educational offerings. In the past year, we offered the following courses: EMT-Intermediate, EMT-Basic refresher, Emergency Vehicle Operators Course Instructor, and CPR instructor. We also became a Training Center for the American Heart Association.
- Revamped Website (www.dac.unh.edu) Our volunteers completely revamped our website to make DAC McGregor more accessible to the public, prospective members and other local EMS agencies. Paul Harris, a volunteer EMT, has devoted over 300 hours to this endeavor.
- <u>Low-Cost CPR Instruction for the Residents of Madbury</u> Over the past year we have increased the CPR and First Aid training offered to the residents of Madbury, including low cost classes in the Oyster River Schools and at the Madbury Public Library. CPR saves lives!

Our operational goals for 2006 include continuing the initiatives we began in 2005:

- Increase Roster of Volunteer Basic and Advanced Life Support Providers
- Continue to Expand EMS Educational Offerings for Area EMS Agencies
- EMT-Basic Class to Be Offered by DAC McGregor in 2006 Faculty: Ken Hult, a UNH Professor with 20 years experience teaching EMS; Karen Henny, a paramedic with 13 years experience and a UNH instructor in EMS.
- · Increased Public CPR and Emergency Safety Classes
- Biennial Fund Raising Campaign to Support Long Term Growth
- Additional Cost Savings Initiatives- Our goals include: (1) increasing the percentage of billings collected, (2) investigating the availability of grant money, and (3) seeking lower cost vendors.

We invite interested members of the public to ride along with ambulance crews and observe DAC McGregor in action. This program is open to anyone, including residents, reporters, and potential EMTs. DAC McGregor is always seeking qualified volunteers, including both EMTs and others interested in volunteering in non-medical capacities.
