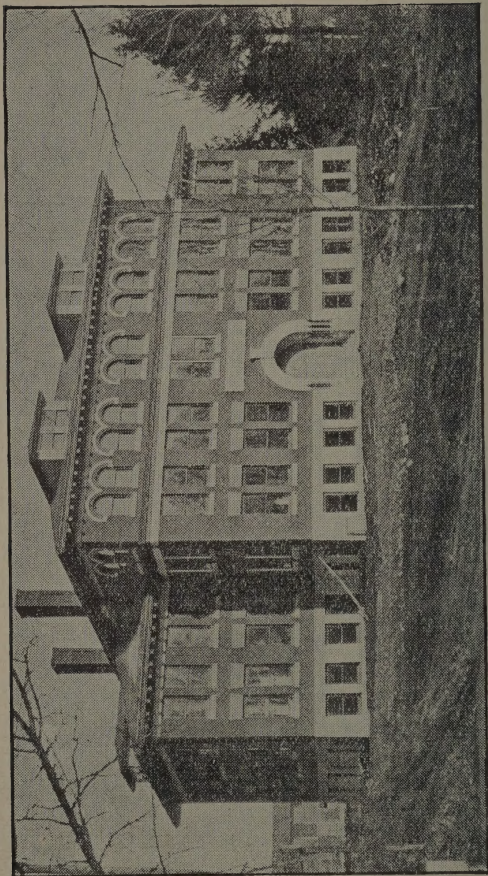

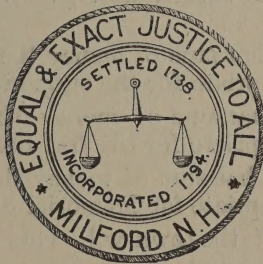

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Milford in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said town, on the twelfth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- 1st. To choose a moderator to preside in said meeting.
- 2nd. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3rd. To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 4th. To choose three selectmen for the ensuing year.
- 5th. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- 6th. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.
- 7th. To hear the reports of all town officers and committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 8th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools.
- 9th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the free library.
- 10th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial day.
- 11th. To see if the town will vote to employ a night watchman and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 12th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire department.
- 13th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for lighting streets and town hall.
- 14th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for building and repairing highways, bridges and sidewalks.

15th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for sewers.

16th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for furnishing the the new high school building.

17th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the heating plant, the sanitary closets, the lighting, and all other things necessary to the completion of the new high school building and the grounds about the same.

18th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town house repairs.

19th. To see if the town will vote to purchase such horses, wagons, carts, sleds and harnesses as may be necessary for the use of the town, and take any action relating thereto, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

20th. To see if the town will vote to extend its electric fire alarm system by the addition of four boxes, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

21st. To see what action the town will take in regard to extending the street running from West street, past the house of C. L. Manning, to Cottage street, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

22nd. To see if the town will vote to purchase a stone-crusher, and raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

23rd. To see what action the town will take in regard to increasing the pay of the firemen.

24th. To see if the town will vote to give the use of the town hall, banquet hall and piano, to the Woman's Relief Corps one day in each year, or pass any vote relating thereto.

REPORT OF POLICE COURT.

The town voted at its last annual meeting to establish a police court, and voted a salary of \$100 per annum to its Justice. In accordance with that vote, the Governor appointed Arthur L. Keyes as Justice, the commission being dated April 25th, 1894, and expiring Dec. 2, 1932. William A. Guild was appointed Special Justice May 23, 1894, his commission to expire March 19, 1932.

The Court commenced its duties May 1st, 1894, and this report covers a period of a little more than nine months. The court room now in use is not as large or as favorably located as it should be, and it is to be hoped that the town will in the near future be in a position to furnish all the needed room to its various officers that is required for the transaction of public business.

As will be seen by the above statement, there was turned over to the Town Treasurer the sum of \$395.19. The selectmen have drawn orders for salaries, expense of fitting up court room, printing and other expenses, and paid to the town of Amherst, \$55.00 as their share of the fines in certain liquor cases where that town was the complainant. These orders amount in all to \$202.87. The difference between this amount and the amount paid to the Town Treasurer is \$192.32, which represents the net profit of the Court to the town from May 1, 1894, to Feb. 15, 1895.

During the coming year, but little printing will be required, and unless some extraordinary expense should arise, which cannot now be foreseen, the expense of maintaining the Court will be less than it has been for the past nine months.

REPORT OF FIREWARDS.

The board of firewards submit the following report of the condition of the fire department for the year ending February 28, 1895. The department consists of Eagle hose company, 12 men; Souhegan hose company, 12 men; and Alert hook and ladder company, 16 men.

Apparatus.

Eagle hose wagon, Souhegan hose wagon, Alert hook and ladder truck, Neptune fire engine and hose carriage, Souhegan fire engine and hose carriage, all fully equipped.

Hose and material on hand: 1,600 feet 2-inch hose in good condition; 2,500 feet 2½-inch hose in good condition; 100 feet 1-inch hose in good condition. There are 28 rubber coats.

We would advise selling boiler and steam pipe used in old engine house, also a water motor in good condition.

The electric fire alarm system is in good working condition. An indicator is located at engine house to designate which alarm box has been rung.

It is necessary that hose carriages and hook and ladder truck should have runners under them during the winter season. For this and the usual expenses of the fire department for the year, we would recommend the appropriation of \$1,000. This will cover the actual expenses for the year.

Water Supply.

The new well built in 1893 has had more than a year's test and has proved a complete success in every particular. The severe drouth in August and September, 1894, had very little apparent effect upon our supply and we think the town is to be congratulated on the success of this most important factor of the water-works. The quality of the water is extra good. A recent analysis proves it to be absolutely free from any injurious or detrimental quality whatever, and an excellent water for any and all household uses.

Extension of Mains.

Very little has been done in the way of extending the main pipe line. The only new construction being the extension of Elm street main 228 feet. One application for an extension of the main pipe line through West and Crosby streets was rejected because the income pledged was not sufficient to warrant the Board in extending the main through both streets. The 2-inch galvanized pipe in Vine and Farley and Dearborn streets has been taken up and replaced with 4-inch cast iron pipe.

Repairs and Improvements.

The items in this account are only such as would ordinarily occur; a few leaks in different parts of the system and necessary repairs on hydrants.

The standpipe has been painted and a small addition made to the tool house. The pump room at the station, which was formerly heated by a coal stove, has been piped for steam heat from the large boiler.

Anybody who carefully examines the foregoing table will discover that we are obliged to pump almost as much water in mid-winter as we do in mid-summer. This can only be explained by the notorious fact that some of our citizens on very cold days and nights, allow their faucets to be open to prevent freezing. This act is strictly prohibited by the Board, and any cases will be punished to the full extent of our rules.

Every service is provided with a stop and waste cock, either in the cellar or below the frost line, which is to be used to shut off the water when there is any danger of freezing.

General Remarks.

Each successive annual report of the Milford Water-Works demonstrates clearly the wisdom displayed by the town in purchasing the plant. The town has a property which is increasing in value very fast. The figures in the financial report plainly show that the works are practically self-supporting, and if the same ratio of increase in private services is kept up for a few years longer, the works will show a surplus each year over all fixed charges. We cannot urge too strongly upon the citizens of the town, the advisability of having the water service installed in every house which is adjacent to the mains. There are very few wells in the more thickly settled portion of the town which produce good, wholesome water for table use, and the majority of the wells in that section should be absolutely condemned as injurious to health. The Water Board have always made it a rule to put the water service into the

houses of our citizens at a price as near the actual cost of labor and material as possible. We now have 347 private water services. Let us make the number 400 or more before our next annual report.

REPORT OF

The Board of Health.

The year just past has been in the main favorable to health and presents a better record than several previous ones, with the exception of severe epidemic of la grippe in January, no wide-spread or long-continued cause of ill health has appeared. Milford now has a population of three thousand and three hundred. There were forty-seven deaths within the limits of the town during 1894. This gives a mortality of a little less than one and one-half per cent. and furnishes figures that will compare favorably with those of an equal number of citizens of any other portion of the state.

Of communicable diseases there have been four cases of scarlet fever; two of typhoid fever, of diphtheria and membranous croup, none. The cases of diseases mentioned were promptly isolated, and as rigid quarantine as possible preserved. There is no question but that a much larger number of cases was prevented by this means. The importance of the strict observance of quarantine in cases of contagious diseases, cannot be too highly appreciated. In the city of *Nashua during the past winter, scarlet fever has been very widely distributed and difficult to stamp out, and it is believed to have been due more to the difficulty in the enforcement of the necessary laws concerning isolation of the victims, than to all other causes combined, that so many deaths have occurred.

The following extracts from authorities, who have given opinions as to the length of time which should elapse before all danger of communicating the disease is past, are appended as they have a practical value in directing the management of such cases :

The Paris Academy of medicine says, "For small pox, scarlet fever, measles, and diphtheria, isolation should not be shorter than forty days." The American Public Health Association, through a special committee, reports : "The affected individuals (i. e., in diphtheria) should be kept strictly isolated for not less than four weeks

after the disappearance of all traces of the membrane." The New Hampshire state Board of Health advises isolation of scarlatina for forty days. Dr. Ransome, Owen's college, Manchester, Eng., from researches, says, "measles are infectious before eruption appears, and communicable for thirty-one days after infection; scarlatina, in some cases, communicable before eruption and for six weeks after; diphtheria, infectious from receipt of poison until complete recovery, in ordinary cases, thirty-three days." The Pennsylvania state Board of Health for 1890, reports the period during which a person who has had diphtheria is in danger of conveying the contagion, to be four to six weeks. Medical officers of School's association, of England says: "Scarlet fever, not less than six weeks; measles not less than three weeks, if desquamation has ceased; whooping cough, six weeks, if cough has stopped; diphtheria, not less than three weeks, if discharge has ceased," as the time of safety in returning to school, after suffering from these diseases.

Dr. Herman Biggs, pathologist to the New York City Board of Health, found diphtheretic germs in three cases, five weeks after exudate had completely disappeared from the throat, and in another case, no membrane in the throat, found the bacilli in the nasal discharge, five weeks after apparent health. Thereupon, a rule was adopted to continue isolation until examination showed absence of the bacilli.

It will be observed from the above extracts that more time is considered necessary after an attack than is generally supposed, before allowing the patient to mingle freely with others. It is however a wise and prudent course to pursue, and should be strictly followed.

At our annual meeting last March, the usual appropriation of \$2500,00, was made for the purpose of extending our sewer system. This money, although wisely and economically used, did not prove sufficient to complete the work for which it was intended, viz.: the extension of the Souhegan street branch, from the outlet near the electric light station, up Souhegan street, to the foot of Pleasant street, and up Pleasant street to the height of land near the residence of W. D. Sargent. The section therefore, as it remains at present is incapable of relieving the dwellers upon Pleasant street and part of Souhegan street, near the junction of the two. The completion of this part of the system as above outlined, we regard as of great importance. It is the opinion of the Board that the two cases of typhoid fever already referred to, were directly tracable to a precisely similar condition to that which prevails on Pleasant street now, and that a reappearance of this dreaded visitor may

confidently be expected there unless this sewer be built. We would therefore urge the appropriation of the same sum of money for the present year and for the completion of this section and, if possible the construction of other parts, now badly needed.

The abundance and excellent quality of the town water supply continues to give great satisfaction, while wells continue to give trouble, because of lack of sufficient quantity of water, or impurities, or both combined. Several analyses made during the past year, revealed the presence of lead in poisonous quantities. It is profitable to remember in this matter that the danger in impure water is not in those wells whose waters are so abundantly supplied with poisonous materials as to point directly to this as the cause of illness, for common prudence would dictate the abandonment of such cesspools at once, but we would warn every one against the more numerous class which furnish to the unsuspecting victim a favorable soil for the seeds of disease by impairing his vitality through smaller amounts of dangerous matter supplied constantly and during a longer period.

Wherever ill health then persists, unaccountable and mysterious, the character of the drinking water should be settled beyond a doubt by a competent chemist.

The best test of the value to a community of a public library is the use the citizens make of their library and the statistics accompanying this report will give a general idea of how much the library is used and a comparison with former reports is most flattering.

The special object of a library is, not ornament, but use.

It serves the same purpose for adults that the public schools do for children. It is an educator.

Whether it fulfils the design can be judged, at least, in part, by the patronage it receives.

The circulation of books during the past year was 18,600, an increase of more than 4,000 volumes over any previous year in the history of the library, and according to the last State Library Report, no town in the state of our population has so large a circulation.

The reading room, which was opened at first with some doubts as to its value has also met with unqualified success, and seldom can one look into that popular part of our library without finding from one to twenty patrons quietly reading from the excellent list of magazines and periodicals which are regularly to be found upon the table.

Side by side may be seen the man who has reached his three score years and ten, and the boy who but for this room, might be spending his time unprofitably in the street.

As a supplement to school work, the library is proving a valuable factor, and both teachers and pupils make constant use of it.

During the past year a complete catalogue has been issued, copies of which may be obtained from the librarian.

By referring to the treasurer's report, herewith submitted, the citizens will find, we think, that the annual appropriation of one thousand dollars, has been carefully and judiciously expended, and for the coming year, we shall ask for a like appropriation, believing it to be for our credit and advantage in advancing our educational interests to maintain our Free Public Library on the high plane it now occupies.

For the purchase of new books there is available, annually, the income from these two bequests.

REPORT OF The Board of Education.

The Board of Education presents to the citizens of Milford this report of the condition of the schools, for the year ending Feb. 15, 1895:

The Board, at the commencement of the year, found itself confronted with a difficult problem, the problem of providing immediately more room for the little people entering school.

This problem was solved by taking one-half of the room, previously occupied for a recitation room by the Grammar School, and converting it into a room for a Primary School. An entrance was made to this room by a flight of stairs, built upon the outside of the building, at the north end. These stairs were covered in at the commencement of winter, and were made safe and comfortable for the children to climb. This plan has worked very well indeed, and has enabled the Board to take care of all the children for the entire day, with but a small increase in the outlay of money.

The Board would not, for one moment, have the citizens think it has had all the room it wanted or needed to properly accommodate our schools, but it has in this way been enabled to house all the children who have presented themselves at the school-room door. With the accommodations which will become available in the new building in September, we feel that our schools will be so domiciled that they need be second to none, if only they are given that hearty support that can alone make any system of schools successful.

With the opening of the new building it will become necessary for the Board to make some rules and regulations which may seem to some parents and scholars somewhat strict, but we trust that all parents will strive to second every effort made by the Board for the keeping and preserving of this place of beauty so liberally provided for our children by the good citizens of Milford.

With the opening of the new building the *Intermediate* school

will die. The schools below the High school will be divided into two grades, *Grammar* grades and *Primary* grades. With the opening of the new building there will be a need of greater liberality on the part of the citizens to provide for the increase of schools, and the Board feels sure that the same spirit which has actuated the good people of Milford to build a school house which is both an ornament to the town and a monument to the progressive spirit of its citizens will not allow its usefulness to be lessened in the least by a lack of means to carry on the good work contemplated in its erection.

The present Board is of the opinion that every school in town should have thirty-six weeks in the year, and it has tried as far as possible to carry out this idea in regulating the length of terms during the past year.

Some of the outside schools are very small, and for this reason it is very difficult to maintain schools that are satisfactory to either parents teachers or scholars; but we feel that the previous standard in these schools has been fully maintained.

We wish that the scholars in our graded schools in the village would learn a lesson from the record made by the scholars attending the school in Pine Valley. Not *one* scholar attending that school has been tardy during the whole year. This is a most excellent record, and great credit is due the teacher, Miss Crosby, as well as each scholar in the school.

The Board is aware that there are some few children in town of the school age, whom it is almost impossible to get into school, and even harder to keep there. The Board asks each citizen to consider it his duty to inform the authorities of all such cases.

The schools are still in session, and therefore some items usually appearing in this report will be omitted.

Every inhabitant of our town desires that our schools shall be of the best; if this be true, let each person remember that there are four parties who share the responsibility of making them of the best. These four parties are the parents, the scholars, the teachers, and the Board of Education, no one of which can wholly blame the others for any failure which may occur.

The Board wishes to express the thanks of the district to Mr B. F. Foster, for the valuable collection of minerals which he has, during the year, presented to the school, and which will be placed in the new building. And we feel quite sure that the Board of another year will be very glad to express similar thanks to any of our citizens who may feel disposed to present the district with anything useful or ornamental toward the furnishing of our new house-
