REPORT

OF THE

Superintending School Committee.

Your Committee respectfully submits the following
ANNUAL REPORT:

Our Schools, the past year, have been conducted with as much success and as few failures as could reasonably be expected. By visiting the schools without notice, and with as little ceremony as possible, I have been better able to see them in their normal condition, without the excitement and the special preparations which usually precede formal and expected visits; and good teachers are generally very willing to have their schools seen and known as they are. Of course they desire that their merits should be observed and appreciated, but they also desire to have their faults indicated that they may correct them.

The whole number of children in town, between the ages of five and fifteen, attending school not less than two weeks, is one hundred and fifty-six. The number of children of each sex, between the ages of five and fifteen years, that have not attended school the past year, is eleven—males five, females six.

The amount of money required to be raised by law, nine hundred dollars. Raised in addition six hundred dollars.

Received from the Literary Fund seventy-three dollars, making in all one thousand five hundred and seventy-three dollars, or about ten dollars to each scholar.

The Prudential Committee, Messrs. Charles E. Durell and George B. Wiggin, have taken great interest in our schools, and have discharged their duties in a faithful and impartial manner.

DISTRICT I.

This District embraces three schools, viz:—The Primary, Intermediate and High Schools. The whole number of scholars one hundred and forty-two. Length of schools, the past year, thirty-three weeks.

PRIMARY SCHOOL.

The Primary School has been under the instruction of Miss Hattie E. Sanborn. Whole number of pupils *sixty*. Average attendance during the year 53 1-3; wages of teacher per month \$40.00. The text books used are Franklin's First, Second and Third Readers; Walton's Primary Arithmetic; Eclectic Series, Geography No. 1; Primary Tracing Book.

Our Primary School, whose success so deeply affects that of the other grades, is in a prosperous and improving condition. The importance of this school is beginning to be bet-

ter appreciated and acknowledged. It has too often been taken for granted that a person of small literary attainments would be amply sufficient to take charge of this school. Here is a great mistake. The teacher holds a situation in many respects far more responsible than any one in any other grade of schools. The demands that are made on the Primary teacher are most exacting. Intellect and heart, soul and body, are put in requisition; and to organize such a school and conduct it successfully is a high honor to any teacher, and we claim for such a one the credit of large mental ability.

INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL.

The Intermediate School was taught by Miss C. Flora Hayes. Whole number of scholars forty-two; average attendance 37 2-15. Wages of teacher per month \$40.00. The text books used are Franklin's Third, Fourth and Fifth Readers; Walton's Mental and Practical Arithmetic; Swinton's Grammar; Eclectic Series Geographies.

The Intermediate School, we are happy to report, has made marked improvement within the past year, both in its discipline and the studies pursued, which any person who has visited it in former years cannot fail to see. We regret that so few parents who have children in this school think it a duty and find it a pleasure to visit the school-room where their children are daily receiving so important a part of that culture and training which will decide their future respecta-

bility and success in life. To any candid and intelligent parent or citizen, we would say, it is not only your privilege but your duty to visit this school and see for yourselves what it is. You have no right to judge of it merely by what others say.

HIGH SCHOOL.

The High School was taught during the year by Frederick E. Eldridge. Whole number of pupils forty. Average attendance during the year thirty-four. Wages of teacher per month \$55.00

The list of text books used in this school are Franklin's Fifth and Sixth Readers; Walton's Arithmetic; Eclectic Series Geographies; Quackenbos' Grammar; Greenleaf's Algebra; Greenleaf's Geometry; Anderson's Ancient History; Lossings' U. S. History; Natural Philosophy; Rhetoric and Book Keeping.

Mr. Eldridge is a gentleman of fine literary attainments, and a good disciplinarian; but he labored under serious difficulties. A spirit of insubordination on the part of some of the scholars seriously interfered with the school's progress, and defeated his best endeavors. The school's improvement was very good, and some of the classes are to be highly commended, yet we believe still more improvement might be made. By suitable attention to these rebellious scholars and also by supporting the authority of the teacher, parents may greatly promote the success of this school.

DISTRICT NO. II.

This school was under the instruction,, during the year, of Miss M. Addie Fifield. Length of school twenty-six weeks. One term of twelve weeks and one term of fourteen weeks. Whole number of scholars 14; average attendance for the year 12. Wages of teacher per month \$34.00. Text books—Franklin's Readers; Swinton's Grammar; Walton's Arith-

metic ; Eclectic Series Geographies ; Greenleaf's Algebra ;
Lossing's U. S. History ; Norton's Philosophy.

This School has fully sustained its former reputation "as one of the best." How could it be otherwise with a faithful and efficient teacher, and studious, well-disposed scholars.

Of teachers and pupils and the work of instruction your Committee can generally report favorably, and in some instances with high commendation. Teachers labor at an almost insurmountable disadvantage who have to encounter the adverse influences of the family and home. Many a bitter and angry feeling, much irregularity of attendance, dissatisfaction and complaints would be prevented, if the work of the school-room could be understood at home. When the teacher's varied, difficult and exhausting employments are fully apprehended by parents, then will the prosperity of our schools be secured.
