# School Report.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR THE YEAR 1887-'88.

*To the Citizens of the Town of Rumney:*

The year just closed has been one of unusual expense and labor. The shingling and repairs made to the several school houses, and the building of a new one, has made the expense and labor for the past year an exceptional one.

The school houses are all in comfortable repair, and there is no excuse for scholars staying at home, or complaining for want of a pleasant or comfortable school room, and the town can feel relieved from any general repairs for several years to come.

There has been no change in the schools the past year, except in District No. 6, where we have a graded school of ten weeks, to accommodate the larger and more advanced scholars.

This school was commenced at the close of the several schools, thereby giving each scholar in town a term of twenty-three weeks, and the larger and more advanced scholars a term of ten weeks additional.

The committee have been fortunate in retaining the services of Mr. C. W. Marston for the past two years, and hope that he may remain with us as a teacher for several years to come.

The schools as a whole have been prosperous.

Having retained some of our old teachers, and employing none who have not previously taught in some other town with success, the committee feel confident that the schools in the past year have not fallen below an average of other towns in the state.

Yet while we feel pleased with the general result, there is room for improvement—in some schools—which we shall aim to improve the coming year.
