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BIDEN, CLINTON, SANDERS LEAD TRUMP IN HYPOTHETICAL 2016 MATCHUPS

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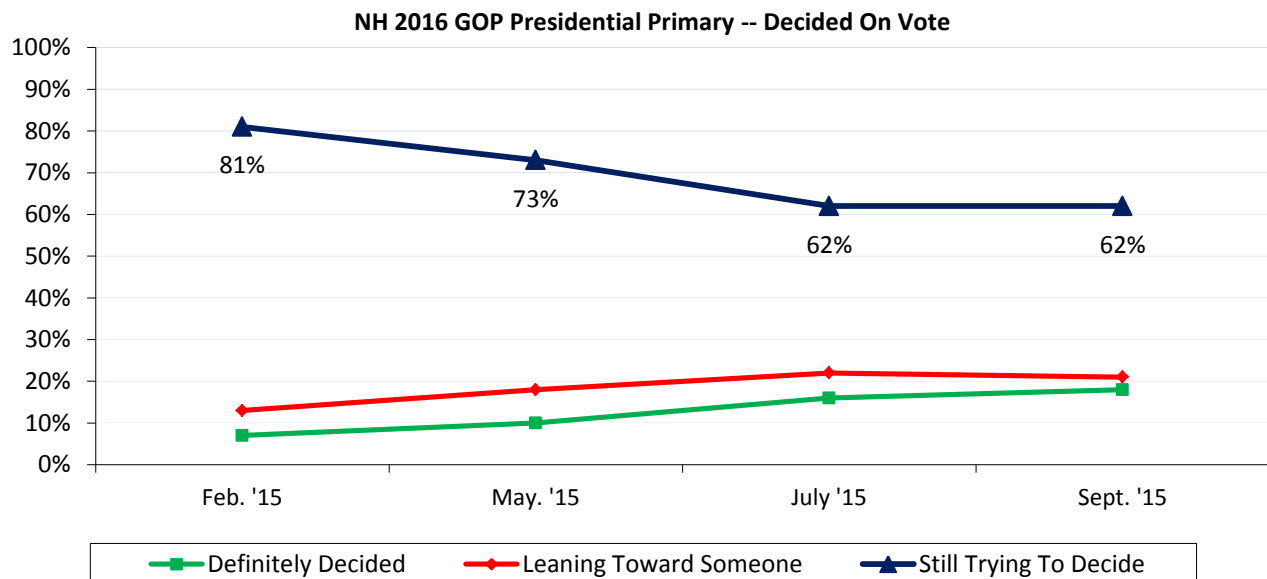
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DURHAM, NH – Current Republican frontrunner Donald Trump trails in hypothetical matchups with three potential Democratic challengers. Vermont senator Bernie Sanders and Vice President Joe Biden lead Trump by double digits, while Hillary Clinton is in a much closer race.

These findings are based on the latest **CNN/WMUR New Hampshire Primary Poll**,* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Eight hundred and twenty (820) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between September 17 and September 23, 2015. The margin of sampling error is +/- 3.4 percent. Included were seven hundred and forty-three (743) likely 2016 presidential election voters (MSE = +/- 3.6).

2016 U.S. Presidential Election

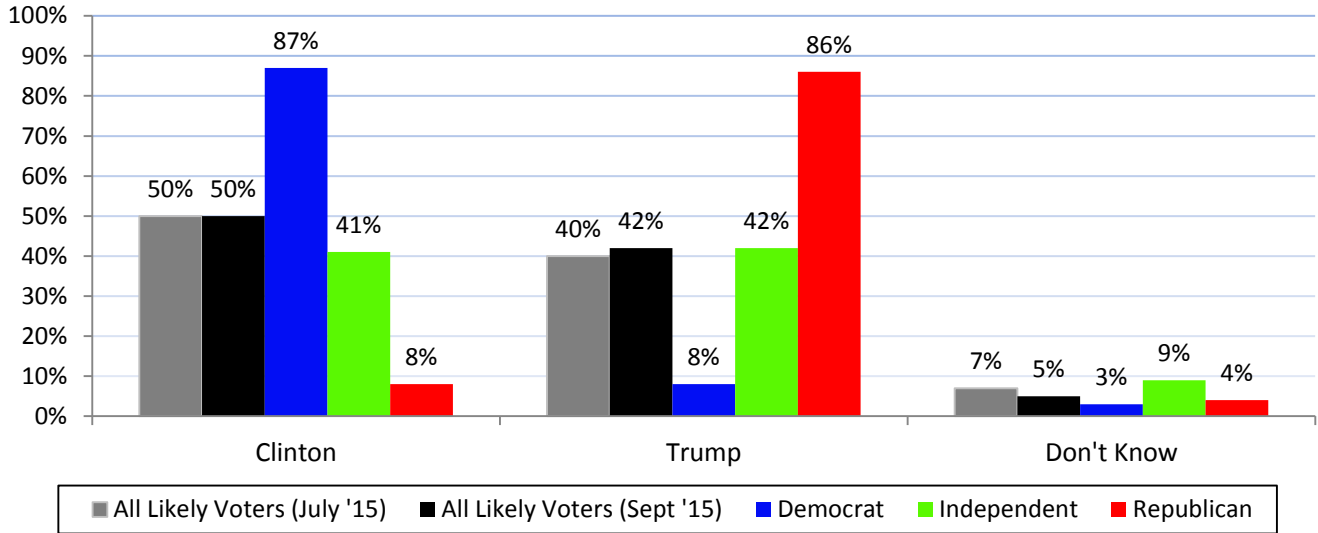
With the 2016 election more than a year away, very few New Hampshire voters have decided who they will support in the November 2016 presidential Election. Only 18% of likely voters say they have definitely decided who to support, 21% are leaning towards someone, and 62% are still trying to decide.

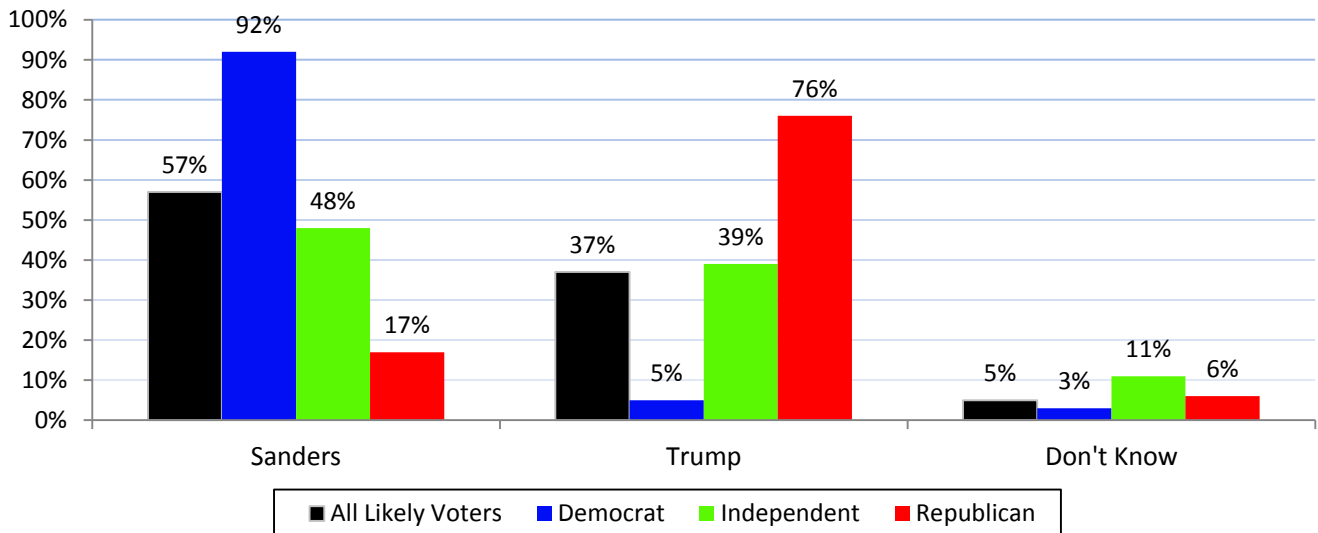
If the election was held today between Hillary Clinton and Donald Trump, 50% say they would vote for Clinton, 42% would vote for Trump, 3% would support another candidate and 5% are undecided. Republicans (86%-8% Trump) and Democrats (87%-8% Clinton) overwhelmingly favor their party's candidate while independents are evenly split (42%-41% Trump). There is a significant gender gap -- men currently favor Trump by a 54%-38% margin and women currently favor Clinton by an even larger 62%-31% margin.

President - Clinton vs. Trump



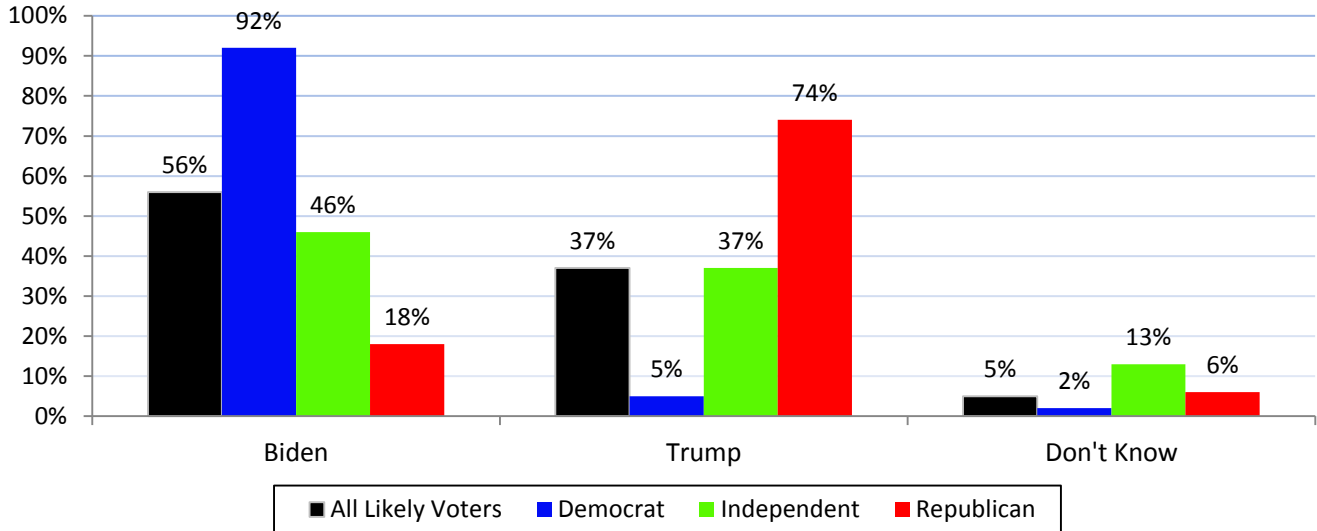
Vermont senator Bernie Sanders fares much better against Trump – currently 57% of likely 2016 voters say they would vote for Sanders, 37% would vote for Trump, 1% would support another candidate and 5% are undecided. Sanders leads among Democrats 92%-5% while Trump has a smaller 76%-17% lead among Republicans. Independents currently favor Sanders 48%-39% and Sanders has the edge among both men (50%-44%) and women (63%-30%).

Vice President Joe Biden also fares well against Trump – currently 56% say they would vote for Biden, 37% would vote for Trump, 1% would support another candidate and 5% are undecided. Biden leads among Democrats 92%-5% while Trump has a smaller 74%-18% lead among Republicans. Independents currently favor Biden 46%-37% and Biden has the edge among both men (50%-44%) and women (63%-30%).

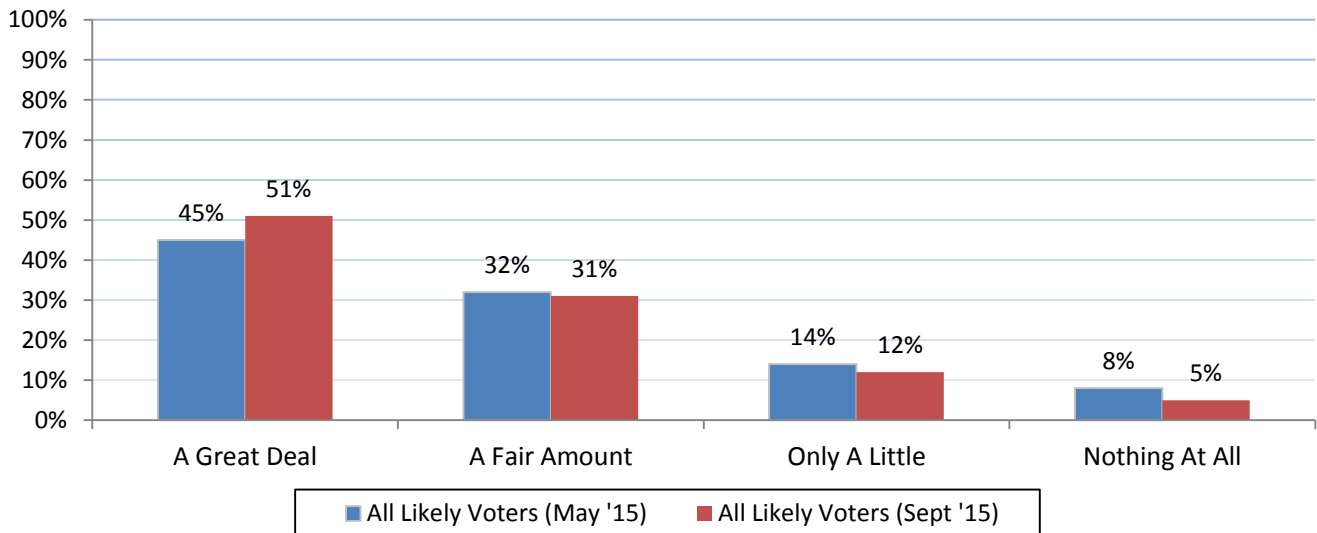
President - Biden vs. Trump



Hillary Clinton Email Use

An issue that continues to trouble Hillary Clinton is her use of a personal email account to conduct official business while she was Secretary of State. Most New Hampshire likely general election voters are aware of the issue – 51% say they have heard a great deal about it, 31% have heard a fair amount, 12% have heard only a little and 5% have heard nothing at all. Knowledge of this issue has increased somewhat since May.

Knowledge of Clinton Personal Email Use

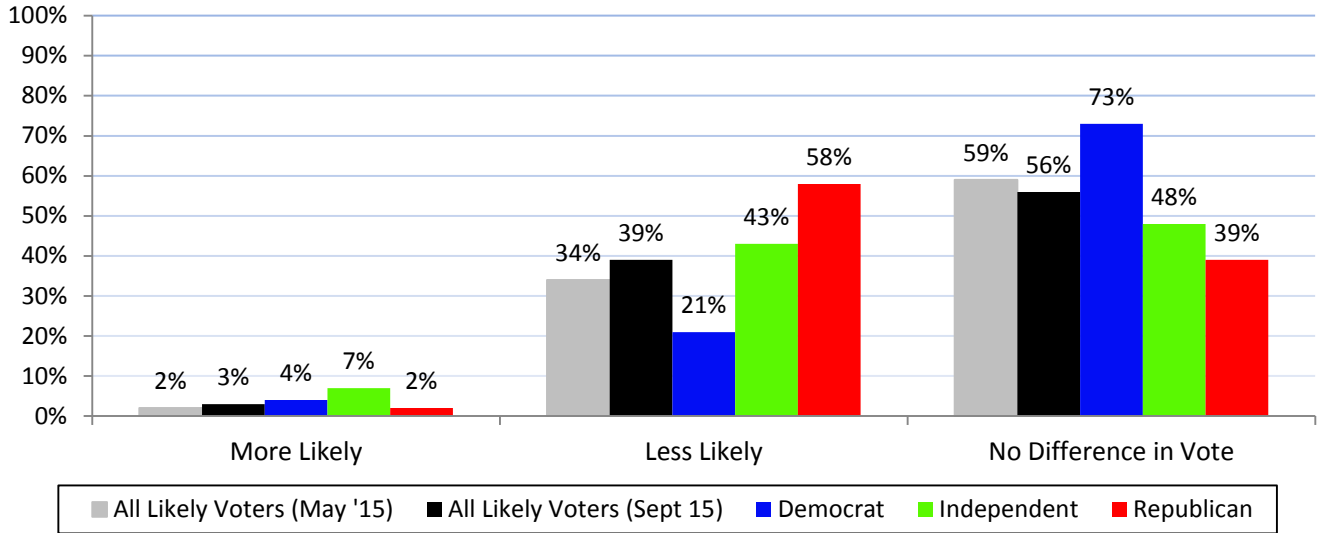


This issue is currently hurting the Clinton campaign in New Hampshire. When asked if this situation would affect their decision to vote for Clinton in the general election – only 3% said they are more likely to vote for her, 39% say they are less likely to vote for her, 56% say this makes little difference in their vote and 2% are unsure.

Currently 21% of Democrats and 43% of Independents say they are less likely to vote for Clinton because of the email controversy. These numbers have increased since May when 13% of Democrats and 29% of Independents said they were less likely to vote for Clinton.

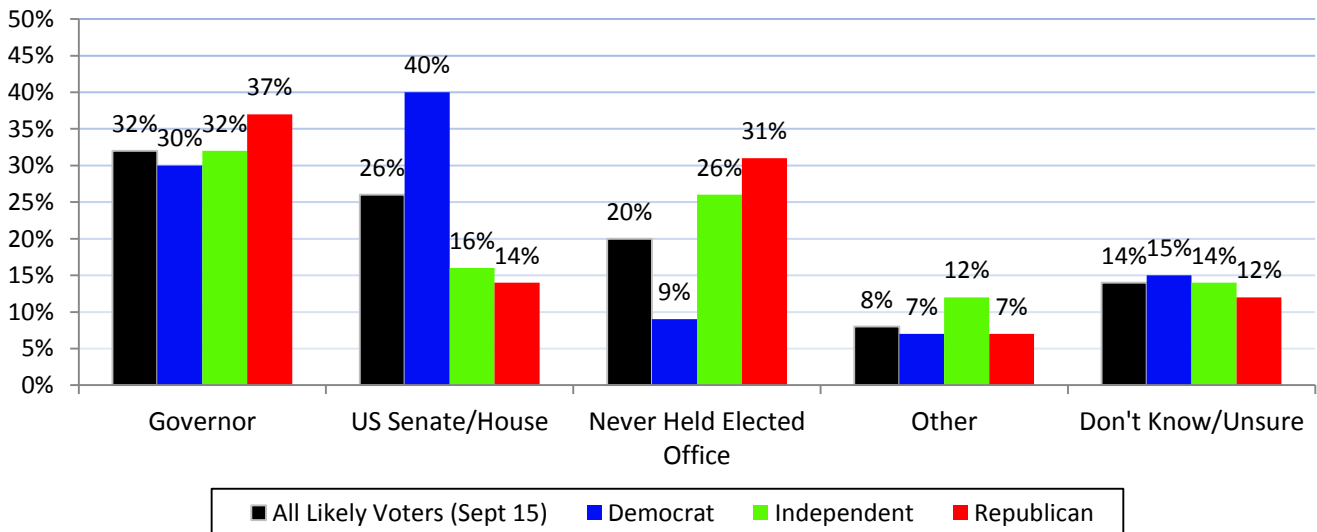
Among likely Democratic Primary voters, 20% say they are less likely to vote for Clinton because of the email issue.

When asked what is the best experience for a president, 32% cited being a governor, 26% said being in the US Senate or House of Representatives, 20% said never holding elected office, 8% said something else, and 14% were unsure. Both Republicans and Independents seem to prefer being a Governor (37% of Republicans, 32% of Independents) or never holding elected office (31% of Republicans, 26% of Independents) while Democrats prefer service in the US Senate or House (40%) or a Governor (30%).

CNN/WMUR New Hampshire Primary Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest CNN/WMUR New Hampshire Primary Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center and funded by CNN and WMUR-TV, Manchester, NH. Eight hundred and twenty (820) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between September 17 and September 23, 2015. If a household included more than one adult, the adult who had the most recent birthday was selected to be interviewed.

The margin of sampling error is +/- 3.4 percent for the entire sample. Included were three hundred forty-three (343) likely 2016 Republican Primary voters (MSE = +/-5.3), three hundred fourteen (314) likely 2016 Democratic Primary voters (MSE = +/-5.5), and seven hundred and forty-seven (747) likely 2016 presidential election voters (MSE = +/- 3.6). These MSE's have not been adjusted for design effect. The design effect for the survey is 1.1% and 1.1% for the sample of likely 2016 general election voters.

The random sample used in the CNN/WMUR New Hampshire Primary Poll was purchased from Marketing Systems Group (MSG), Horsham, PA. MSG screens each selected telephone number to eliminate non-working numbers, disconnected numbers, and business numbers to improve the efficiency of the sample, reducing the amount of time interviewers spend calling non-usable numbers.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households. Additionally, data were weighted by respondent sex, age, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions.
