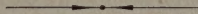

The number of volumes now on the Catalogue is 3697, of which 193 have been added since the last Report. Of these 99 have been purchased by the Committee with the annual appropriation for that purpose, and 94 have been presented by friends of the Library. Among the books purchased is



Appleton's Cyclopaedia of American Biography, a valuable and expensive work in six volumes. We are indebted to Col. A. H. Bellows for the gift of 66 volumes of valuable works, and to our townsman, Mr. Willard T. Blanchard, for eleven volumes, including eight volumes of "The Century Magazine, making a valuable addition.

We also wish to thank Mrs. Emily R. Barnes for the gift of her interesting volume of Reminiscences, and Mr. George T. Aldrich for a copy of Aldrich's History of Walpole. It is the wish of the Committee to gather into the Town Library as the most suitable repository, copies of works having a local interest, such as books printed and published in Walpole, newspapers printed here, memorial pamphlets, Town Reports, and the like. A file of the "Farmer's Museum" published here nearly a hundred years ago, or even scattered numbers would be of great value and interest.

We append a list of donors, and also a condensed Catalogue of all books added during the year. It has been thought best to print the list for the information of the public, and for their convenience in selecting books.

The item of insurance which until last year has been paid from the Town Treasury, has become a serious expense, calling for thirty dollars annually. This amount was reduced last year by a return premium of twenty-one dollars, but this year the whole amount will be called for, making a larger appropriation necessary. We have attended to the duties of Health Officers during the past year to the extent of our abilities. Our suggestions in regard to needed sanitary improvements have been usually well received, and acted upon, and the results appreciated. The laws for our guidance, with a few exceptions, have not been published in a compact form until quite recently, and our duties in some respects have not been quite clear. Not a single case of the dangerous contagious diseases has been reported to us for more than nine months, and we think Walpole may fairly claim to be one of the most healthful localities in the state.

REPORT OF  
**SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 1**

---

It is with much pleasure that your Committee are able to report a year of uninterrupted success in District No. 1.

The schools have been in session thirty-four weeks. One term of ten and two of twelve weeks each. The High School has been under the instruction of Mr. L. B. Varney, whose judicious management has won the confidence of the patrons, and the esteem and respect of the pupils. The constant and steady advancement of the classes is indicative of careful training and close application.

The Intermediate school has been in charge of Miss Emily Jennison. This is her second year in this school. It was evident at the examination that good work had been done. By study and persistent efforts she has secured good discipline in the school, and by her untiring application to its best interests, she has done much towards raising its standing. Her method of instruction is thorough. It was evident that the pupils understood what they had learned, and could impart that knowledge to others. Being well-grounded in the various studies taught in this department, they will enter the next well prepared to master the higher branches.

The Primary Department has been under the care of Miss Annette Brown. Four years ago Miss Brown commenced her career as teacher in this school, and she has made for herself a good record. She has always shown a deep interest in her work and devoted her energies to the improvement of her pupils. Her relations with them have always been affectionate and pleasant, and her care and treatment of



them merits the approval of all her patrons. We believe one of the mothers voiced the sentiment of all, when she said, "I hope Miss Brown will remain in the Primary school as long as my little girl goes there."

Notwithstanding, we report a successful year of school work, there is yet a good margin for improvement. The same evil to which your attention was called in last years report, still exists to a certain extent, that is a lack of constant attendance.

The boy who is not as quick to learn as his companion, may become discouraged and absent himself from school and grow up in ignorance. Whereas, by untiring perseverance and constant application, he might in the end outstrip his more brilliant competitor. Again, we call the attention of parents to the importance of individual effort to remedy the evil.

## REPORT OF TOWN SCHOOL BOARD.

The Town School Board respectfully submit the following report for the school year. No schools have been maintained in what were formerly districts nos. 7, 11, and 13. In no. 10 there was no spring or fall term.

We have had 30 weeks in the school year throughout the district as against 27 weeks last year, and as against 28 weeks the last year's average, under the district system in 1885. The School Board have made 82 visits. There have been 472 visits by citizens and others. The selectmen returned for the whole town this school year, 355 scholars between the ages of 5 and 15 years, (the limits used in dividing school money so far as it is divided upon the scholars) 81 scholars for district No. 1, 274 scholars in the town district.

This is the first year under the town system, that the territory represented by the Town District has received from the common school funds, an amount nearly equal to what was accorded to it, under the old district system. In 1885 the amount of money available for common school purposes, was \$3,737.29, of this amount district No 1 received \$804.50. The remaining districts in town, \$2,932.79.

In 1888 the amount of money available for common school purposes was \$3,882.32; of this amount district no. 1 received \$860.56. The town school district received \$3,021.76.

The territory embraced in the town school district had a larger percentage of the common school funds in 1885 than it had in 1888.

It has seemed best to the board not to recommend and large outlay in repairs, or permanent consolidation of districts, and building new school houses, till the district shall

finally vote whether it will remain in the present system, or return to its original status. One school room at North Walpole has been hired at a rental of \$75, yearly. Another school should be provided for there for the coming year. Schools throughout the district have been generally successful and satisfactory, and an improvement over the preceding year. Several old teachers have been retained through the year in their respective schools, while in other schools wages have been increased and better service secured.

In some schools tardiness and absence have contributed to impair the general good results. It is of the utmost consequence that parents and all concerned, impress upon the youth in our schools, the importance of forming correct habits in this regard. It is not the question of one term of school, it is the matter of a lifetime.

A little time spent at our Normal School, if no more than a term or two by our younger teachers, would contribute largely to equip them for the duties of the school room, and add to the pleasure of their calling.
