The Police Department has had this last year six hundred and seven complaints of various types. There have been many complaints about speeding through our town and have asked the police department to stop the speeding.

Your police department has spent several hours more this year than ever before. With the number of cars going through Marlboro it would be surprising to most of you. Your department has kept a record of the cars passing through the town at normal times and find there is an average of one hundred and ten cars in fifteen minutes. This record was not made in vacation times and holiday season.

The work of your police department has increased fifty-five percent over last year. There has been more work for your department than you realize. We are called late at night and early morning. We have been called to seventy-three large and small auto accidents this year, which is more than double over last year.

The time has come when your town of Marlboro should have police protection most of the twenty-four hours of the day.

My summary report to the President, Mrs. Charles B. Knight, and Members of the Marlborough Community Nursing Association includes the records also of Miss Ruth Nichols for the month of January 1947. Since most of my nursing records are in the School Report, I refer you all for such details. A total of 135 visits were made which include the following cases:

One of my medical visits resulted in visits to Keene Hospital for X-ray, instructions in the home for isolation and finally accompanying the patient to Glencliff Sanatorium for tuberculosis of the lungs.

Five patients have been taken to the hospital or doctor's office; three pupils to the dentist's office; and many visits have been made to homes with clothing and supplies for needy. Much of outside school hours have been given to retesting and testing pupils with the Maico Audiometer which is not a satisfactory method at the school building.

I attended the conference in October at the Nursing Home of the Elliot Community Hospital; have had few conferences with the Keene District Nurse.

Much of the sickness seems to be brief and requires medical care only. I hope I have not overlooked any patients that may have needed my attention.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the ninth day of March, 1948, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
- 9. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$150.00) for milk and Cod Liver Oil for underweight children.
- 10. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$350.00) to help maintain services for the school lunch program.

- 11. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) for special repairs and new equipment.
- 12. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum equal to the total amount of the capital reserve fund established by the town for the construction of a school building or buildings, twenty-five hundred dollars and interest thereon accumulated to date now in the custody of the trustees of trust funds, said funds to be placed in the custody of the trustees of trust funds and reserved by the district for the construction of a school building or buildings in accordance with the Laws of 1943, Chapter 160, as amended by the Laws of 1945, Chapter 35 and Laws of 1947, Chapters 8 and 91.
- 13. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) as a capital reserve fund for the construction of a school building or buildings, said funds to be placed in the custody of the trustees for trust funds and reserved for the construction of a school building or buildings in accordance with the statutes pertaining thereto.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Marlboro:

I herein submit my fifth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The general demand for better educational opportunities is indeed a serious problem in our public schools. In order to meet the common needs of pupils the modern school has many new responsibilities. The facilities for these objectives will be limited in many schools during the present period of shortages and high costs. The crisis in education is basically an economic one with many implications.

The maintenance of well qualified teachers in village and rural elementary schools is almost an impossibility unless nearby resident teachers become available. At the present time 70,000 teaching jobs are vacant in the United States. More than 350,000 teachers have left our public schools since 1941. Over 2,000,000 school-age children are not in school and millions of those in school are receiving inferior education due to the fact that about 110,000 teachers, or one out of every eight, are serving on substandard permits. This problem is enhanced by increased enrollments in the schools and fewer students preparing to teach.

IMPROVEMENTS

The Marlboro School District has benefited by the recent increase in the school budget effected by a more substantial state aid allotment. The general purpose of this appropriation was to provide better educational services and opportunities in the New Hampshire public schools. The intended benefits to the school program have been considerably limited everywhere due to the higher prices. In spite of inflated costs the Marlboro School District has been able to make the following improvements:

Better text books.

The new "McKee English Series," published in 1947 by Houghton Mifflin Company, has been obtained for grades three through eight, inclusive.

Grades two through six have the new "Our World of Science Series," published in 1947 by Ginn and Company.

New Health Books and additional supplementary Readers will probably become available before the close of the present school year. Revisions in the Social Science Books are scheduled for the coming school year.

- 2. A new set of Compton's Pictured Encyclopedias, 1947 Edition.
- 3. A complete set of Rand McNally Physical-Political Maps with Beginners Maps in Global Geography and World Map for the Air Age.
- 4. New adjustable furniture for two elementary classrooms.
 - 5. New desks for the teachers in four classrooms.
- 6. The furniture in the High School has been resurfaced.
- 7. A new A. B. Dick Mimeograph machine and four new typewriters for the commercial department.
- 8. The urinals in the boys' basement have been replaced with modern equipment.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT FOR 1947

Mr. John H. Frye, Superintendent of Schools, Marlboro, New Hampshire:

I herewith submit my fifth annual report as Headmaster of Marlboro High School.

ENROLLMENT

The total enrollment in grades 7-12 at the opening of school in September was 112. Of this number 73 were in the senior high and 49 in junior high. This is an increase of 5 over the September figures of a year ago. All but 2 members of last year's eighth grade entered high school here. One of those who did not enter left town shortly after graduation.

The present total is 108. Two have left town, one left school for full time employment and one is in Florida and will be back in the spring. Five of the above are tuition pupils.

SCHOLARSHIP

The scholastic work of the pupils in general is satisfactory. We are attempting to provide for individual dif-

ferences by differentiated assignments in some cases and also by permitting pupils to take an extra subject if their ability warrants it. A few pupils have poor study habits outside of school. I believe this is due to failure of parents to insist upon regular study hours. My recommendation to parents is that senior high school pupils need a minimum of ten hours per week to spend on assigned work besides the time available during school hours. Pupils who are absent are required to file a slip bearing teachers' signatures showing that the work missed has been satisfactorily completed and all pupils are encouraged to secure extra help from the teachers in the afternoon.

Attendance in general has been very good and practically all absence seems to have been justified. Most of the tardiness is caused by a small per cent of the group. Pupils who are tardy are detained at the close of the session or caused to report early the following day. It is unfortunate that the most frequent offenders are among those who live nearest to the school.

SPECIAL ACTIVITIES

Since my last report the usual annual social events have been held by the various groups. These do not exceed one major event per month. A few informal parties, for pupils only, have been held on Friday nights.

The Junior Promenade was one of the most successful events held in recent years. An innovation last year was the selection of a Queen who was crowned with appropriate ceremonies.

The Freshman Reception, the annual Harvest Dance and the production of the play, "Feathers In a Gale" were all events of the fall term which came to a close with the customary Christmas exercises and tree.

Publication of the school magazine is being continued by the junior class. The first issue came out just before Christmas. A second appeared in February with the final issue in May. A special effort is being made to include more items of literary value.

The weekly sale of stamps and bonds is being continued. Sales do not approximate those of the war years but enough are being bought to warrant continuation of the project.

The educational films which have been made available through your office are stimulating and serve to supplement classroom instruction.

Last May the school again participated in Scholarship Day which is held annually at the Teachers Colleges. Our team went to Keene and competed in English Grammar. Marlboro secured ninth place in statewide competition. Members of the team were Dorothy Reed, Theresa Dutile and Phillip Desjardins.

CLASS OF 1947

For the second year in succession all members of the graduating class are either attending school or are engaged in profitable employment. Four of the sixteen members are attending school with two others scheduled to enter in February. Two of these are at the University of New Hampshire and two are at Keene Teachers College. Two other girls will enter schools of nursing within a few days. One member of the class is married.

The class spent five days of the April vacation on a trip to Washington, D. C. and New York City. Many lasting impressions were gained on this trip. Highlights of the time spent in Washington were the visits to Mount Vernon and to the United States Senate in session. Senator Bridges and Representative Cotton took time from a busy schedule to greet the party. Chaperones were Miss Labrie and the Headmaster.

Later in the year the class visited the New Hampshire Legislature in Concord for one day as guests of Representative Benjamin Hall.

On Sunday, June 8, the Baccalaureate Service opened Commencement Week activities.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

Mr. John H. Frye, Superintendent of Schools, Marlboro, New Hampshire.

I herein submit my first report as Supervisor of Music in the Marlboro schools.

We have in our local schools a basic music textbook series known effectively as "The World of Music" published by Ginn & Company. Its fundamental purpose is to install in the hearts and minds of our boys and girls the musical heritage of America. Public school music educators are realizing, more and more, that songs and musical games should be a vital part of the school program. These songs integrated into the whole curriculum make a vivid picture in the minds of youngsters. Through the singing of these songs, pupils capture the dynamic spirit that must have been in the hearts of those who built America. Many times the teachers tell stories of historical and geographical significance, and present records made by great artists to enhance the information given in the books.

In grades one through six of the Elementary Vocal Course, the songs might be classified as follows: Patriotic, Traditional, Children's Songs and Games, Sea Chanties, Songs of the Cowboy, Indian Songs, Spirituals, Plantation and Religious Songs.

The musical experiences of the boys and girls are not wholly confined to singing, but to the study of rhythm, extensive note reading, and appreciation as well. Ear training, both through tonal and verbal dictation, is strongly stressed together with mode discrimination.

We have developed an Elementary School Chorus of about forty voices made up of pupils in the fifth and sixth grades. All singing by this group is done in two and three-parts.

Music in the Junior High consists of unison and part-singing with the study of music fundamentals and appreciation added.

High school assembly singing makes it possible for all pupils, including those in the orchestra and special chorus, to share the cultural values of music.

In conclusion, let me briefly thank everyone for their fine cooperation in helping to carry out the music program.

- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for repairs and construction of sidewalks or act in any manner relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will raise a sum of money for repairs, water storage, equipment, supplies and other expenses of the Fire Department.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Electric Lights.
- 6. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$1,500.00 to aid the Community Nursing Association or act in any manner relating thereto.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Memorial Day.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sums for Perpetual Care of Cemetery lots received since January 1, 1947.
- 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote for the purchase of Tar for its Highways or act in any manner relating thereto.
- 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 as a memorial to the Croteau-Coutts Post No. 24 of the American Legion towards the purchase of their recently acquired Home.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to widen and resurface Prospect and McKinley streets, raise and appropriate money for the same or act in any manner relating thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid on Class V Roads, raise and appropriate the sum of \$515.33 the State to give \$2,061.32.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$149.00 (1/100th of 1% of the assessed valuation) to the Monadnock Region of Southern New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with the 37 other towns in the Monadnock Region.
- 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote for the Athletic Field or take any action relating thereto.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$800.00 to help maintain the Frost Free Library or act in any manner relating thereto.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to use the capital reserve fund now in the hands of the Trustees for Trust Funds, for the construction of a School Building or Buildings, to meet an appropriation by the School District to the extent of the Capital Reserve Fund for that purpose, provided the School District votes to establish a Capital Reserve Fund of this amount for this same purpose.

- 17. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Old Home Day, or act in any manner relating thereto.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to Tar the hill on Bixby street, raise and appropriate money for the same, or act in any manner relating thereto.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept the right of way for a Highway leading from Ling Street to the land of Alden J. Beauregard in accordance by the Deed given by Arthur H. Knight and Ruth H. Knight September 15, 1947.
- 20. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for exterminating White Pine Blister Rust.
- 21. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of improving the sidewalk on the East Side of School Street, running North from the corner of Church Street to the corner of Frost Street.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to rebuild the sidewalk on the East Side of South Main Street beginning at the Junction of South and East Main Streets at the Fire House and going to the Junction of South Main Street and Bridge Street.
- 23. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.



FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drouth and forest fire occurence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops lowered water levels and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned deeply in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most serious conflagration we had.

Governor Dale closed the woods effective at midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent fires for the rest of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occurred during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control agency based on local town wardens and town crews wherever adequately equipped rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient to properly equip the available man power in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both damage and fire costs at a minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 percent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland.
