THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Merrimack, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Merrimack on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To choose delegates to the Constitutional Convention.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town officers' salaries.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town officers' expenses.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the police department.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the fire department.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for fighting forest fire.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the health department.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure state aid for the permanent improvements of highways, or take any action relating thereto.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways and bridges.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of trunk lines.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the money to buy a truck, or trucks, to be used in town maintenance work, or take any action relating thereto.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the general expenses of the highway department.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the public library.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of parks and playgrounds.

18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to pay the interest on town notes and the trust funds used by the town.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to build a cement bridge to take the place of the so-called Willow Bridge, or take any action relating thereto.

21. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount for the early payment of taxes and make an appropriation for same, or take any action relating thereto.

22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars for white pine blister rust control, to be spent in co-operation with the State Forestry Department.

23. To see if the town will vote to observe old home day and raise and appropriate money for same.

24. To see if the town will vote to allow the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes, or take any action relating thereto.

25. To hear the reports of the town officers, and transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Merrimack.

GENTLEMEN :

Herewith please accept my eleventh annual report as superintendent of your schools. I am attaching to this, reports from your school nurse, from the headmaster and from the domestic arts supervisor at McGaw Normal Institute.

Membership

The membership of your schools on January 6 of this year was as follows: McGaw Normal Institute, 28; Reed's Ferry, 42; Merrimack, 57; Thornton's Ferry, 30; No. 5, 16; No. 6, 13; No. 7, 13; No. 12, 18, total, 217. This is a few less than your membership a year ago but more than your average membership for the past decade. This figure probably has no special significance.

Teaching Force

You have been quite unfortunate in the loss of teachers since the schools closed last June. During the summer you received resignations from Miss Leslie at McGaw, Miss Hussey at No. 6, Miss Hardy and Miss Anderson at Merrimack. Since the schools opened in September, Miss Merrill resigned from No. 6, Miss Chapman, Mrs. Bruce and Mr. Stacy at Merrimack. These several changes have more or less disrupted the work of these schools and brings it home to us quite forcibly that it is a poor policy to let an excellent teacher go when any reasonable increase in salary will keep her. I surely believe that the public will be better satisfied if you

retain in your elementary schools such teachers as Miss Hardy, Miss Anderson, Miss Hussey, and Mrs. Bruce, even if you have to pay them salaries 50 per cent larger than will hire inexperienced normal graduates. I feel that the difficulties are such in one-room schools of large membership and in the two-room school at Merrimack, that we should hire only teachers of successful experience and approved training, whatever may be the market price of thier services.

It is futile to blame failures in schools to a lack of cooperation on the part of the parents. Times have changed and parents everywhere demand more of teachers and give less. This condition can be met only by engaging and keeping skillful teachers. However, I believe your schools are now in the hands of an efficient teaching force.

McGaw Normal Institute

The work in this institution continues to be quite satisfactory. This is due to the fact that we have in it two tried teachers and one new teacher in whose choice we were fortunate. I call your attention to the reports of Mr. Gunn and Miss Wakely for further information about the progress in that school.

Matters of Instruction

The function of the public schools is to instruct the children in such knowledge, and to train them to such habits of thought and action as shall cause them to become as efficient citizens politically, economically, and socially as their natural endowments will permit. Our classification of the instruction into the various branches of mathematics, language, history, science, etc., with the grading resulting from our setting up of standards of achievement in these branches, frequently obscure the ultimate end sought. It is my conviction that we all too frequently miss the mark because of our slavish adherence to these arbitrary standards. While efficient citizenship should be our aim, the end is lost sight

of in an endeavor to reach certain academic goals. We attempt to turn out a uniform symmetrical product. Any lack of conformity to this pattern in all respects prevents the progress of the individual in the school system. To be specific, a child failing to make the standard in mathematics is not promoted at the end of the year. As a result, for the next twelve months he must mark time in the other subjects while he endeavors to round out in this one respect. One failure weakens his confidence in self, making failure in other lines more probable, and in extreme cases resulting in an inferiority complex. It is a well known fact that Edison could not master arithmetic. Had he attended a modern public school he doubtless would have been a decided misfit. Instructed by a wise mother he has become one of the World's greatest benefactors. In order to develop rather than stunt our "Edisons" it is necessary to break down the inflexibility of our system so that the children in the same phases of development may be instructed together. This can be done more easily in one or two-room schools than in larger systems.

To this end the reorganization of school systems from the old 8-4 to either the 6-2-4 or the 6-3-3 plan was effected. We should complete this change in the schools at Reed's Ferry and Merrimack.

The present drive for the substitution of the problem-project and contract methods in the place of the older types of instruction, has the same end in view.

We are endeavoring in this union to effect this change by placing in the class rooms for individual use such problem-project and contract materials as seemed adaptable and our limited means would permit, and by fostering in the teachers an interest in the study and practise of these methods. Much of Miss Hardy's phenomenal success was due to her understanding of these methods.

In order to train as well as instruct the pupils in the duties of good citizenship, we are fostering an interest in pupil participation in the government of the school. We

find this particularly practical in the executive and judicial functions. Wherever the teacher has tried the experiment, we have had only happy experiences.

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER OF MCGAW
INSTITUTE

To the Superintendent, Trustees of McGaw Normal Institute and Citizens of the Town of Merrimack:

The following statistics, compiled by the State Department of Education, concerning McGaw Institute should be of interest.

McGaw was on the State honor list for the year 1928-29 for having a tardiness of .7 per pupil. The standard set by the state is .9 tardiness per pupil.

The rather high percentage of pupils leaving school is due, in a large part, to families leaving town. 60 % of the pupils who left school during the last two years have re-registered in other schools.

The rather low percentage of attendance for the year 1928-29 was due to the epidemic of Grippe that was prevalent throughout the state during the months of January and February, 1929. The standard of attendance of practically all the schools in the state was lowered by it.

During the administration of the present Headmaster the State Department of Education has continued its custom

of sending Standardized Objective Tests in Constitutional History, English, Arithmetic, Civics, and Reading to be given to the graduating class each year. The results in most cases have been quite satisfactory in that McGaw has compared favorably not only with high schools in New Hampshire but with those of other states in which these tests have been given.

The courses of study have strictly followed the requirements as indicated in the State Program of studies. The courses offered are divided into two Curricula, one for boys and for girls, as drawn up by the Board of Trustees and approved by the State Department of Education. During the past year the State Department of Education advised and subsequently approved of substituting a course in Modern History for one in English History. With the exception of this the two curricula stand unchanged. Minor changes, such as the one mentioned, have the effect of modernizing a curriculum but, in a community where the field of endeavor is restricted, anything that would approach a radical change in the customary objectives of that curriculum would ultimately be discarded because of lack of points of application.

CURRICULUM I. (Boys)

First Year—English, French, History of Civilization, Commercial Arithmetic, Bookkeeping and Commercial Geography.

Second Year—English, French, Algebra, Modern History.

Third Year—Economics, French or Latin I, Physics, Geometry.

Fourth Year—English, Chemistry, U. S. Constitutional History, and elect one of the following: Solid Geometry, Advanced Algebra and Trigonometry or Latin II.

CURRICULUM II. (Girls)

First Year—English, French, History of Civilization, Textiles and clothing.

Second Year—English, French, Algebra, Foods and Nutrition.

Third Year—Economics, French or Latin I, Geometry, The Home, its Care and Management, or Physics instead of French or Latin I.

Fourth Year—English, U. S. Constitutional History, The Family and its Members, and elect one of the following: Chemistry or Solid Geometry, Advanced Algebra and Trigonometry, or Latin II.

In closing—there are two general points in the education of a child that a parent should continually watch and those are: first, do the requirements of the school measure up to the capacities of the child; and second, do the capacities of the child measure up to the requirements of the school. Under these two general points come practically all the problems of child education. These may be solved by: a mutual agreement between parents and teacher to better the situation for the child involved; a reorganization of school requirements, on the part of the teacher, to fit the capacities of the child.

HOME ECONOMICS

To the Superintendent, Trustees of McGaw Normal Institute and Citizens of the Town of Merrimack.

The most probable vocation which a girl will enter is that of home-making, and the opportunity for making this a bigger and finer vocation is given in nearly every high school today.

Our girl of today will soon be the house wife of tomorrow and every successful housewife of today or tomorrow should be equipped with a general education. She should know something of chemistry; she should understand the cares and needs of the human body; she should know something of food values and of cookery. She should be something of a dressmaker, milliner, bookkeeper, doctor, teacher, musician and artist.

A course in "The Home, Its Care and Management" is being given at McGaw Normal Institute this year in which the girl is given the opportunity of studying the ways in which time can be saved in simple home tasks; of learning how to get the most from one's money by careful budgeting; and of gaining the ability to select and arrange furnishings artistically.

After the knowledge is acquired, it can become effective only if the girl is given an opportunity to put her ideas into practice. This is where we must call upon the parents of the girl to help us. If she could be allowed to redecorate her own room at a small expense; help mother in the selection of new rugs, curtains and paper; or help mother and father in budgeting the family income so that it will cover the many expenses of the home, it would make her training as worth while as it is planned to be.

Our course in "Foods and Nutrition" requires in addition to nutrition, buying and food preparation, much train-

ing in management. Here again we must appeal to the parents that the girl may plan, buy, cook and work out problems of diet for the members of a real family.

We cordially invite all parents to visit our classes and see the many problems and projects which we are working out.
