Effie ("Vada") Hall was one who knew well the secret of savoring life to the fullest of her 91 years. A native daughter of Sanbornton, she returned to this town in the late 1940's, making her home on Hermit Woods Road. A good neighbor and friend, she had a special love for children. Ask any youngster who passed her door when coming home from school... there was always a cookie (or two) waiting for those who lingered for a visit.

Vada was a devoted member of the First Baptist Church of Sanbornton, supported its good works and was Sunday School Superintendent there for many years. We remember her, too, along with her husband, Bob Hall, dispensing the popcorn at the Chapel band concerts! When Bob died she continued to serve her community. The polls will be open from 10:00 am to 7:00 pm.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Sanbornton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sanbornton, on Tuesday, the twelfth (12th) day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To choose all necessary District Officers for the Winnisquam Regional School District.

3. To vote on the following proposed amendments to the Town Zoning Ordinances:

Amendment No. 1

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Delete Article XVII.F. Accessory Building, and Replace Article XVII.F. with a definition of "Building" which includes accessory buildings.

Amendment No. 2

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article XXI.B. Steep Slope Conservation District to allow the planning board to waive the minimum lot size requirement of six (6) acres where suitable contiguous area of less than 15% slope exists for buildings and subsurface sewage disposal.

Amendment No. 3

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article XVII.P. Mobile Home, by replacing it with Article XVII.P. "Manufactured Housing" as defined by RSA 674:31, and replacing all references to mobile home(s) with the term "manufactured housing." The amendment also defines "pre-site built housing" as defined in RSA:674:31-a.

Amendment No. 4

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article XVII "Definitions" to define "non-conforming lots."

Amendment No. 5

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article X "Nonconforming Uses, Buildings and Lots" to clarify which non-conforming lots may be built upon.

Amendment No. 6

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 6 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article X, Section B(2) "Non-conforming Buildings" to clarify the ordinance allowing reconstruction of damaged nonconforming buildings.

Amendment No. 7

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 7 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Article XII.B. Adding new Section 12 which will allow by special exception the subdivision of previously merged substandard lots.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Sanbornton Life-Safety Building in said Sanbornton on Wednesday, the thirteenth (13th) day of March next, at seven of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. Subject: General Business

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debt in anticipation of taxes in order to pay current maintenance and operation expenses and to insure a note or notes therefore; to administer any real estate acquired through Tax Collector's deeds; to apply for, accept and expend such grants, funds, and gifts as may be available to the Town from private sources and from other governmental agencies; and to accept the dedication of any street shown on a subdivision plat approved by the planning board, provided that such street has been constructed to applicable town specifications as determined by the Board of Selectmen or their agent.

Article 2. Subject: Semi-Annual Tax Billing

To hear a report on semi-annual tax billing to the taxpayers of Sanbornton, as authorized by Article 29 at Town Meeting in March of 1990, and to see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to implement this fiscal policy beginning in July 1991, as recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 3. Subject: Library Trustees To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38,749 and make the same available to the Library Trustees. Recommended by the Selectmen, not recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 4. Subject: Lakes Region Community Health Agency To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,200 for the Lakes Region Community Health Agency. Recommended by the Selectmen, not recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 5. Subject: Highway Maintenance

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$207,770 for the maintenance of highways and bridges, this sum to include \$1,000 to use for repair of town bridges. Recommended by the Selectmen, not recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 6. Subject: Highway Block Grant To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60,358 to be received from the State for the Highway Block Grant for the purpose of paving and resurfacing March Road, Osgood Road, and Hermit Woods Road. Recommended by the Road Agent and by the Selectmen.

Article 7. Subject: Police Department

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$152,160 for the purpose of operating the Sanbornton Police De-partment, said appropriation to be offset by \$10,000 of drug forfeiture funds acquired by the Town. Recommended by the Selectmen, not recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article 8. Subject: Police Cruiser Purchase To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,500 for the purchase of a new police cruiser, this sum to be offset by the sale of the excess cruiser for \$2,750.

Article 9. Subject: Capital Reserve Funds

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums of money of which: \$10,000 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for Heavy

Equipment;

\$37,000 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the Sanitary Landfill;

\$25,000 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for Revaluation;

\$2,000 is to be placed in the Town Bridges and Roads Capital Reserve Fund;

\$15,000 is to be placed in the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund; and

\$1,000 is to be placed in the Sanbornton Fire Department Repair and Refurbishing Capital Reserve Fund.

Article 10. Subject: Sanitary Landfill

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$45,648 for the landfill operating budget, \$8,145 of which is to be withdrawn from the Landfill Non-Lapsing Fund, a fund established by vote of the Special Town Meeting on August 31, 1989.

Article 11. Subject: Budget Committee Report To hear the report of the Budget Committee and to pass any vote in relation thereto.

Article 12. Subject: Cemetery Committee To see if the Town will vote to establish a committee for the purpose of exploring the possibility of establishing a public cemetery in the Town of Sanbornton (as required by RSA 289:1), and to report its findings at the 1992 Town Meeting. The Cemetery Committee is to be comprised of three members appointed by the Selectmen.

Article 13. Subject: Amendment to Solid Waste Ordinance To see if the Town will vote to amend the Solid Waste Ordinance which was adopted at the 1988 Town Meeting, to establish mandatory recycling as of June 1, 1991, to include plastics as a required recyclable, and to make certain technical corrections to the Ordinance. (The amendment is printed elsewhere in the 1990 Annual Report.)

Article 14. Subject: Basic 911 Emergency Service To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to request that New England Telephone Company conduct a study to determine the feasibility and suitability of providing Basic 911 Emergency Service to the residents of Sanbornton. (This study will be done at no cost to the town.)

Article 15. Subject: Fire Rescue Truck Sale

To see if the Town will vote to allow the Sanbornton Fire Department to sell the old Rescue Truck, which was purchased by the members of the Sanbornton Fire Department. The proceeds of said sale to be placed in the fund established by the members of the Sanbornton Fire Department, for the intent of replacing the present unit now in use.

Article 16. Subject: Excess Town Property

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of excess town property through the state public auction process, or other means, if it is determined by the Board of Selectmen that such a method of disposal would be of greater advantage to the town. (Excess town property is currently sold at town auction on the first Saturdays in April and October.)

Article 17. Subject: Cable TV Committee

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish a committee for the purpose of monitoring the provisions of the cable franchise agreement in effect with the town, receiving public input regarding cable services in the town, making recommendations to the Selectmen regarding enforcement of the terms of any cable franchise agreement in effect, and to act as agents designated by the Selectmen for such purposes as the Selectmen may direct. This committee is to be comprised of four members appointed by the Board of Selectmen for the term of one year.

Article 18. Subject: Land Conveyance To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey the strip of old roadway along the westerly side of Burleigh Hill Road to the abutting landowners.

Article 19. Subject: Other Business To transact such other business as may legally come before the Town Meeting.

Report of the Selectmen

The economic downturn in 1990 was evident in a number of areas. Revenues were off, and like most other communities public assistance soared. For the first time in many years, the public assistance appropriation was consumed, and the Overseer found it necessary to dip into the Needy Poor Trust Funds.

In August we sustained damages to many of our roads as a result of a heavy rainstorm. The Huse Bridge was knocked out and several roads required major repair work. Fortunately, the town is able to receive disaster relief from the Federal Emergency Management Agency, and hopefully some will be forthcoming from the State. The Road Agent and his crew worked hard throughout August and into the Fall to bring the roads back to full use.

In the Fall, it became apparent that Amrac Cable Television would not be able to fulfill its agreement with the town. Despite completing much of the preparation work, including location of a tower site, securing the necessary town approvals and utility estimates, it appears Amrac will not be able to build Sanbornton's system.

At this writing, we are in serious negotiations with Community TV Corp. of Laconia. Several citizen groups have been very helpful in identifying additional coverage areas, which are being considered by Community TV Corp. Our primary interest is to see as much of the community "wired" as possible, and that a responsive customer service plan is in place.

In September, following inspection by the Selectmen and the Road Agent, the Board officially accepted 500' of the Range Road, off Tower Hill Road, as a Class V road. This was done in accordance with Article 25 of 1990.

Last Spring, the Selectmen met with the Board of Tax and Land Appeals relative to property assessments in Sanbornton, and in May the Board ordered that the Town of Sanbornton be revalued as of April 1, 1993. Since receipt of the Order, we have been able to secure a commitment from the NH Department of Revenue Administration to do the work, at an estimated cost of \$100,000.

A highlight of 1990 was word from the LCIP Board of final approval of the town's proposal to acquire a conservation easement on Ralph and Olive Meader's Calef Hill property. We are very grateful for their decision to donate this easement to the town. It means a beautiful part of Sanbornton will be forever protected under the watchful eye of the Conservation Commission and with the easement, the town will be able to acquire other properties for protection.

As we prepare this report of 1990 activities, our thoughts are with our fellow Sanbornton residents who have been called to active military duty or are serving in the Persian Gulf. Our prayers are with you and your families and our hope is that you will soon be home safely.

The following Automatic Dialer Alarm Code was adopted.

309. 1. 1 DEFINITION

ALARM SYSTEMS: Any assembly of equipment and devices arranged to signal the police and fire departments of the presence of a hazard requiring urgent attention and to which the police and/or fire departments are expected to respond.

DIGITAL ENCODER ALARMS: Those alarm systems which automatically

communicate an emergency situation, by transmitting a sequential toning signal over a telephone line to a digital communicator, for the purpose of signaling the police and/or fire department.

DIRECT DIALER TAPE ALARMS: Those alarm systems which automatically seize a telephone line connected to the police and/or fire department and reproduce a prerecorded voice message indicating the existence of an emergency situation.

FALSE ALARM: The activation of an alarm system through mechanical failure, accidental tripping, misoperation, malfunction, misuse, or the neglect of the owner or lessee of an alarm system, or of his employees or agents. It shall include any situation in which an alarm is signaled when, upon subsequent investigation of the police or fire department, there is no evidence of intrusion or other legitimate need or legitimate cause of activating the system. It shall not however include alarms caused by earthquakes, violent winds, or external causes beyond the control of the owner or lessee of the alarm system.

309. 1. 2 FALSE ALARM CHARGE: Any person who owns or maintains an alarm connected to the police or fire alarm system, to an alarm agent, alarm business or a person responding to audible alarms, which has caused any signal, message, or alarm to be transmitted to the police department or fire department either by direct telephone or other communication and which is proven to be a false alarm shall pay a false alarm charge to the Town of Sanbornton as follows:

(a) During the period commencing with the effective date of this ordinance and for one (1) year thereafter the service charge for false alarms shall be:
First three false alarms - No charge.
For any subsequent false alarms during that one (1) year period following the effective date of the ordinance, the service charge shall be \$150.00, per false alarm. For each (1) year period thereafter, two (2) false alarms per one (1) year period no charge. For subsequent false alarms in each one (1) year period the service charge shall be \$150.00

309. 1. 4. NOTICE OF DISCONNECT FOR EXCESS FALSE ALARM: Whenever a particular alarm system has resulted in twelve (12) or more false alarms during a period of twelve (12) consecutive months, the Chief of Police or Fire Chief shall send to the party responsible for that alarm system a notice that the alarm will be disconnected from the police and fire alarm system. Any person receiving such a disconnect notice shall have thirty (30) days to show just cause why that alarm should not be disconnected. In the absence of just cause, the alarm will be disconnected at the end of the thirty (30) day period.

per false alarm.

309. 1. 5 APPEALS BOARD: Any person aggrieved by decision to impose a fee under the provision of this ordinance may appeal that decision to an appeal board consisting of the Chief of Police, Fire Chief and three (3) other members who shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen, one (1) of whom shall have expert knowledge of alarm systems and two (2) of whom shall be members of the general public.

309. 1. 6 WRITTEN PERMISSION NECESSARY: In accordance with RSA 370-A no alarm system as defined above may be installed or operated with the Town of Sanbornton without prior written permission received from the Sanbornton Fire Department and the Sanbornton Police Department.

309. 1. 7 TAPE DIALER PROHIBITED: The use of direct dialer tape alarms directed to Town Offices within the Town of Sanbornton is prohibited and permission will not be given for their use. Any person responsible for the misuse of such alarm shall be guilty of a criminal violation in accordance with RSA 370-A.

24. Subject: Ladder Truck To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept the gift of a ladder truck from private sources for use by the Sanbornton Fire Department.

Article 25. Subject: Reclassification of Road To see if the Town will vote to approve as a Class V road 500 feet in a generally westerly direction of the Range Road on Tower Hill, subject to the property owners bringing this section up to Town standards. INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Sanbornton Sanbornton, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements and the combining and individual fund financial statements of the Town of Sanbornton as of and for the year ended December 31, 1990, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Asset Account Group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Asset Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Account Group results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Sanbornton as of December 31, 1990, and the results of its operations (and cash flows of nonexpendable trust funds) for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Also, in our opinion, the combining and individual fund financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of each of the individual funds of the Town as of December 31, 1990, and the results of operations of such funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT


The year 1990 has shown an 18% increase in calls for service over the previous year. Serious crimes were down 46% for the same time period. Due to the addition of a fifth police officer and the inception of 24 hour patrol, the burglary rate dropped 68%, while the thefts have decreased 40%. Your help in reducing this number by you, the citizens, is still greatly needed by letting us know whenever you observe anything that appears suspicious or out of the ordinary.

Very recently, the Towns of Northfield, Sanbornton and Tilton have created our own Crimeline Program. This program affords the citizens to make known to the Police any information they may have concerning crime in the Tri-Town Area. Any person, through information received from them, may be eligible for a cash reward in which their information results in an arrest/indictment. In all instances, the caller's identity will be not be known to anyone, including the Police.

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REPORT OF THE SANBORNTON PUBLIC LIBRARY

Each passing year brings evidence of greater activity in all phases of the library's services to the town. As the present uncertain economy reaches many town's residents, our resources are stretched to the limit. Circulation figures reflect an increase, as readers turn to library books and periodicals rather than purchasing their own. Our copier is in constant use, as resumes, medical and legal documents continue to proliferate in the daily lives of our patrons.

In preparing the budget for 1991, we were ever mindful of the need to keep expenses down. However, with utilities, telephone and supplies escalating in cost, it is difficult to hold the line. One of our projects for 1991 is a long overdue roof repair and a coat of paint for the exterior of the building.

We now have a computer in service and the staff is finding it a vital link with the libraries throughout the state. It brings inter-library sharing of information and materials to a much higher level. The computer will make in-library routines more efficient as we continue to develop its potential.

The library is open 30 hours a week, serving browsers, readers, classes from Sanbornton Central School, and genealogical enthusiasts, to name a few. An increase in hours is reflected on Tuesdays and Thursdays when we close at 5 pm instead of 4 pm. We would be unable to support even this modest gain, if it were not for the willing help of our volunteers. We applaud their dedication as they continue to serve our needs.

Do stop by and assess the many advantages available to you, as well as the opportunity to relax for awhile in this friendly atmosphere.

REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Sanbornton Fire Department had a decrease in calls over last year, responding to 183 calls. Fire calls were down, but Emergency Medical calls were up, as has been the trend over the past few years. Brush fires and non permit fires were very low, with a total of under two acres being burnt. This is attributed to the alertness of residents and better burning habits. There was only one major fire in Sanbornton in 1990.

The members of the Sanbornton Fire Department purchased a used Rescue Truck which was put into service this year. Monies to buy the unit were raised by the membership through various projects. This unit has upgraded the effectiveness and equipment carrying capabilities of the EMS team. The unit is equipped with a 4 bottle cascade system for filling breathing equipment, a generator-powered lighting system on telescoping poles, and a 10 ton winch on the front. The unit has storage compartments in the body for housing various types of equipment. The interior is well cabineted for the storage of medical supplies and other equipment used in patient care and stabilization. This unit will provide many years of service to the town, and will allow the EMS section to expand.

Training is still a top priority within the department. Members attend mandatory training, as well as other schooling throughout the year. In-house training is constantly evaluated and updated as required, to provide members with up-to-date changes in the service. The EMT program is progressing well, and we also have two members certified in Advanced Life Support. Training in both fire suppression and EMS will be expanded in the ensuing year.

The members of the Sanbornton Fire Department wish to thank you for your support. Through your support, this department has grown into what it is today. Men and women who take a lot of time out of their private lives helping others, is what your department is made up of. These people do it because they want to, it is not just a job to them, they care. The support of the townspeople makes the department put in that little extra effort, to do a better job, to care a little more, and to be proud to be a member of the team.

The Sanbornton Fire Department is looking for a few good men and women who want to work hard, train, and sometimes stay up half the night. It is self satisfaction at the maximum. Anyone eighteen years or older who is really interested should contact the Chief or Deputy Chief.

REPORT OF OUR STATE REPRESENTATIVES

The 1991 legislative session promises to be one of the most trying in recent memory, as the current economic recession is resulting in a state budget deficit and pressure to increase taxes to make up the red ink. It is clear that difficult decisions must be made about services the state provides and about the way we tax our citizens and businesses.

We are disappointed to report that state education aid is, once again, down from the previous year. Our town now receives zero state foundation aid funds. This lack of state assistance puts increased pressure on property taxes. New Hampshire ranks 50th of the 50 states in state aid to education, a fact we are trying to change.

State aid to municipalities - long considered a "sacred cow" - also is on the chopping block as the state tries to balance its books. Unfortunately, any reduction in financial assistance to towns will result in higher property taxes. We are working to ensure that such state assistance is not reduced. New Hampshire's property taxes already are the highest in the nation per capita, and we will fight to see that the state does not balance its budget on the backs of the property taxpayer or through "backdoor" fee increases.

However, we believe the state must provide basic human services, funds to protect our natural resources, and a strong economic development program. With proposals calling for elimination of an immunization program for school children, gutting the tourist promotion budget vital to our region, and the closing of profitable liquor stores, we will scrutinize the state budget carefully and only vote for taxes that are fair. We also will monitor legislation calling for a progressive income tax designed to raise revenue for property tax relief, and welcome your thoughts on the subject.

County taxes are also on the rise. As members of the county delegation, we are pushing for a "bare bones" county budget that provides adequate public safety as well as human services for the elderly and low-income citizens that need it most.

For the first time in history, however, county taxpayers will be paying for the operation of Gunstock Recreation Area. Although final figures are not available at this time, it appears that approximately \$600,000 will be added to the county budget because of the skiing and camping facility's inability to meet its bond payments. This will be reflected in an increased county tax rate on your property tax bill this year.

We continue to be concerned about environmental issues in the wake of Earth Day. Rep. Steven Maviglio has sponsored legislation that calls for a wide range of measures to protect water quality in our lakes, rivers, and streams. This includes increasing the septic setback to 125 feet, requiring minimum lot sizes and building standards, and banning the clearcutting of trees and vegetation along shorelands. In addition, the long-awaited nomination of the Pemigewasett River to the New Hampshire Rivers Management and Protection Program also in under review by the legislature. A speed limit for boats and limitations on billboard construction also have been proposed. Enhanced 911 emergency service for our town also may become a reality in the near future, thanks to legislation filed by Rep. Tom Salatiello. The House already has approved the bill, which

calls for a committee to evaluate the costs and logistics, the first step in obtaining E-911 service.

We have introduced a variety of other legislation on subjects ranging from funding Meals-On-Wheels to legislative ethics. We will keep you informed of the progress of these bills through our newsletter (posted in the town offices and mailed to those requesting it) and through area newspapers.

We also hold "office hours" in the town office and meet with the selectmen on a regular basis. We truly appreciate your input on matters before the legislature. Please do not hesitate to contact us to share your views, or if you need assistance with a state or county agency.

REPORT OF THE LAKES REGION PLANNING COMMISSION

The Lakes Region Planning Commission (LRPC) continued to provide basic and technical assistance to the Town of Sanbornton during 1990.

Basic technical services are provided to the Town through the annual membership fee. These basic services typically took the form of providing data relating to the Town Landfill Committee, assistance to the Zoning Board of Adjustment, data and guidance to the Planning Board and many other requests for information to the Town.

The LRPC co-hosted the annual Municipal Law Lecture series where practicing attorneys provide a legal perspective on local planning, zoning, and procedural issues. Three public workshops for land use boards were held. These covered ordinances and regulation flexibility, high intensity soils mapping, and safe drinking water.

The LRPC also sponsored such events as the Legislative Night where state and local legislators addressed shoreline protection and impact fee legislation. It also sponsored the Regional Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day.

Technical assistance has been provided to the Town of Sanbornton through its contract with LRPC to provide a professional planner on a part-time basis. This person is called a Circuit Rider Planner. The planner devotes most of his time to Town Planning Board issues, problems and ordinances. He does have full access to the services and tools of the LRPC which is headquartered in Meredith, NH.

Each towns' dues are the source of basic funding to the Lakes Region Planning Commission. As this funding continues, the LRPC's ability to request funds from other sources is enhanced. The LRPC is able to obtain about three dollars from other sources for each dollar raised by dues. This enables the LRPC to sponsor many services to individual municipalities and to the region as a whole.

The LRPC is made up of 32 Lakes Region communities, most of which have representation as Commissioners to the LRPC. The basic concept here is to share information, avoid costly duplication and, where possible, to standardize forms, plans, documentation and systems.

REPORT OF THE LAKES REGION COMMUNITY HEALTH AGENCY

The fiscal year for this Agency is July 1 - June 30. This report will reflect the activities of this Agency, in Sanbornton, during the 1989-90 fiscal year.

We have seen thirty-five individuals in Sanbornton. This type and intensity of services varies with each individual. The statistics for the services are as follows:


These figures do not include families who have benefitted from Immunization Clinic.

During this year, the "match" contribution from the Town appropriation for Homemaker Services was \$1520. The cost of this program is covered by: Federal Title XX dollars, \$2960 (60%); client contribution \$420 (9%); Town "match" \$1520 (31%). All the people who benefit from this program meet specific income requirements. In addition, there were 4 individuals who were determined to be "medically indigent". They required skilled nursing care and were without health insurance coverage. The Agency provided that care. The total cost of that care was \$3680. Therefore the total town subsidized care in Sanbornton in 1989-90 was \$5200.

With the help of state funds, we have been able to provide respite help to families caring for someone, in the home, who has Alzheimer's Disease. The funds are limited and we were able to serve only one Sanbornton family last year in this capacity. We have also been able to sponsor a Support Group for families of Alzheimer's Disease victims. The Sanbornton family has been a part of the Support Group.

The funds appropriated for the Lakes Region Community Health Agency by the Town of Sanbornton are essential to care for individuals who are medically indigent (have no insurance and have no financial resources) and to provide the "match" dollars required by both state and federal grants for services to lower income people. Home health care services are quietly provided, without much visibility. At the same time, the viability of the Agency requires that we "manage" our grant funds. Last year the Agency did not use all of the allocated federal funds available because there were not enough "match" dollars. The Agency has greatly appreciated, in the name of all the Sanbornton residents we serve, the strong support for the services we provide.

REPORT OF THE YOUTH ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The Youth Assistance Program of Northfield, Sanbornton and Tilton is a Court Diversion Program for juveniles who are first time offenders and a Prevention Program for youth up to the age of eighteen.

This year the Youth Assistance Program actively pursued alternative funding to offset the tax burden to our townspeople. We have received a stipend from the Belknap County Incentive Fund for 1991 and have applied for help from Merrimack County as well. It is the program's intention to pursue county funds in the future, however, there is no assurance that these funds will be available or approved.

As an offshoot of our program we are preparing to teach a course for youths for the prevention of drug and alcohol abuse. We are pleased to have received a grant from the Governor's Office to pay for this educational program.

A special thanks go to our many volunteers, our Board of Directors and many friends. We are especially grateful for the cooperative support of our schools, police departments and town officials.

REPORT OF THE SEWER COMMITTEE

The Sewer Committee continued to advise the Board of Selectmen on the use of the Winnipesaukee River Basin Project (WRBP) sewer in Sanbornton. Committee members are: Donald Foudriat (Chairperson), Andy D'Angelo (Secretary), Tom Salatiello (Selectmen's Representative), Everett Joslyn (Health Officer), and Stephen Goodwin, who replaced Byron Dalton when his term expired. Earl Leighton, Sr. continued to serve as a committee alternate.

During 1990, the Committee notified several property owners who had not connected to the sewer, of their legal obligation to do so, and monitored the subsequent actions to ensure connection. In one instance, action by the Town Attorney was required. Requests for sewer charge abatements were reviewed and granted where cause was shown. An abatement application form was prepared for use in 1991. User fees were increased by 15% to cover higher operations and maintenance costs imposed by the stateoperated WRPB.

It was not possible to complete the 1991 budget for sewer changes in 1990 because of delays in receiving WRBP estimates. Estimates received in January, 1991, however, indicate that there will be a significant increase in fees, which will need to be reflected in user rates.

REPORT OF THE SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE

During the past year, the Solid Waste Committee has spent much of its time developing the Town's recycling program. A warrant article was passed at the last Town Meeting appropriating \$10,000 for the purchase of recycling equipment to be matched by a \$10,000 grant from the state. The state did approve our grant application and the Town has since constructed a loading dock and purchased a baler and a forklift. You can now bring to the landfill for recycling, all colors of glass bottles, newspapers, cardboard, aluminum cans, and plastic soda, milk and detergent containers.

Now that our recycling facility is properly equipped, we need to increase the level of participation in the program. Recycling provides revenue to the Town from the sale of recylcables, avoids costs associated with landfilling and the eventual trucking of our trash elsewhere, and is an environmentally responsible method of disposal.

At the 1988 Town Meeting, the Town adopted its landfill ordinance which called for mandatory recycling in one year's time. Unfortunately, we were not ready for recycling until this past year. An article is included in this year's Town Warrant to reaffirm the Town's commitment to mandatory recycling and also to make minor changes in the solid waste ordinance.

The Town contracted with the engineering firm, Dufresne-Henry, to complete the groundwater study at the landfill. Three new monitoring wells were installed at the landfill this past year. They are in the process of analyzing the results of water sampling taken from all the wells at the landfill to determine if the landfill is polluting the groundwater.

The Town will need to expend money this coming year to develop a closure plan for the landfill. This is a state requirement for all unlined landfills. A warrant article is included for this purpose. It has not yet been determined when the landfill will need to be closed. This will depend largely on the results of the well testing and the analysis done for the closure plan.

The Committee wishes to express its thanks and appreciation to its former chairman, Earl Leighton, Sr., who resigned this past fall after 26 years of service on the Committee.

1991 PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE SOLID WASTE ORDINANCE

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town of Sanbornton Solid Waste Ordinance, as adopted at the 1988 Town Meeting, as follows:

(1) Replace all references to "Landfill-Recycling Facility" or "Solid Waste/Recycling Facility" with "Solid Waste Facility".

(2) Replace all references to "Landfill-Recycling Attendant" with "Facility Manager or their agent".

(3) Amend section 2 and section 3 as follows:

2. SEPARATION:

All material brought to the facility for disposal shall be separated into the following categories to be deposited in designated containers or locations as the Facility Manager or their agent directs: (Note: Items A through E shall be voluntary from Town Meeting 1988–1991 through-Town Meeting 1989 June 1, 1991. The Facility Manager or their agent may accept additional categories or types of recyclables not specified below, on a voluntary basis.)

A. Cle	ar Glass	Shall mean <u>rinsed</u> empty clear glass containers. No ceramics, window glass, or light bulbs. Labels do not have to be removed.
B. Gre	en Glass	Shall mean <u>rinsed</u> empty green or blue glass containers. No ceramics, <u>window glass, or light bulbs.</u> Labels do not have to be removed.
C. Bro	wn Glass	Shall mean <u>rinsed</u> empty brown glass containers. No ceramics, <u>window</u> <u>glass or light bulbs.</u> Labels do not

D. Metal Cans & Containers Shall mean rinsed empty tin or steel -or aluminum containers of a size one gallon or smaller. Labels do not have to be removed.

<u>D-1. Aluminum Cans</u> <u>Shall mean rinsed empty aluminum</u> <u>containers.</u>

<u>D-2. Plastics</u> <u>Shall mean rinsed empty plastic con-</u> <u>tanners made of PET and HOPE resins.</u>

E. Paper Shall mean all clean, dry paper, separated into the following two categories:

1. Newspapers

have to be removed.

 Corrugated paper, cardboard, and brown paper bags.

F. Large Metal Objects Shall mean scrap metal or all kinds, i.e., motor vehicle parts, pipe, wire, appliances, sheet metal, bed springs, motors, tools, etc. The Facility Manager or agent shall have the right to refuse motor vehicle parts based on size of parts.

G. Tires Shall mean all tires removed from wheel or rim.

H. Leaves and Clippings and dry garden waste, and manure (to be dumped in mulch pile).

I. Tree Limbs and Brush Shall mean all tree limbs and brush not exceeding 12" in length 6" in <u>diameter</u> (to be deposited in the burn pile).

J. Building Material Shall mean the refuse from demolished building<u>s</u> (the burnable shall be separated from non-burnable).

K. Used Motor Oil <u>By special arrangement only. Shall</u> <u>mean only used crankcase oil in</u> <u>closed plastic containers.</u>

L. Bulky Items Shall mean couches, mattresses, and other large, non-metallic items.

M. Garbage Shall mean any other residential waste which is not listed above.

N. Industrial Waste Shall mean any waste from any process or industry, manufacturing, trade, or business. Any such waste not falling within the above categories, by special arrangement only.

3. UNACCEPTABLE MATERIALS

The following materials will not be acceptable at the Landfill-Recylcing Facility:

A.-Stumps, trees, and limbs greater than 18" in length.

B. Harmful, hazardous, or toxic waste.

C. Sludge or septic waste.

D. Dead animals.

E. Junk motor vehicles and boats.

F. Any material which in the opinion of the Facility Manager or their agent constitutes a serious hazard to other users of the facility, to the property of the town, or to the operation of the Solid Waste Facility.

(4) Amend Section 9 as follows:

9. TRESPASS:

The gate will be locked at all times when the Solid Waste Facility is not open to the public. Anyone entering the Solid Waste Facility when the gate is locked, without express permission, is guilty of trespass and shall be charged with violating the terms of the Ordinance.

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REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

In 1990, the centerpiece of conservation in Sanbornton was the donation by Ralph and Olive Meader of some \$93,000 enabling the town to apply for state matching funds for the acquisition of a conservation easement on about 86 acres of the historical Calef Farm on Burleigh Hill. Their initiative launches the town's active participation in the New Hampshire Land Conservation Investment Program. It follows their previous conservation easement donations of 122 acres of the March Farm, and 62.3 acres of the Hanson Farm to the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests. Theirs has been a lifelong commitment to preserve the historical nature and character of the town.

Thanks to the special efforts of Virginia Hutton and Steve West, 1990 also marked the formulation and adoption of Wetland Regulations that will prepare the town for entry into the 21st century.

On August 15th, President Bush signed legislation tasking the National Park Service to study sections of our Pemigewasset River for future possible "wild and scenic" designation, subject to local community approval.

Due to the special efforts of Curtis Beaupre, town forests have been designated, improvement "cuts" made, federal funds received and the conservation program in Sanbornton made selfsupporting.

REPORT OF THE TOWN PARK DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The Sanbornton Town Park Development Committee met on several occasions during the past year to develop a master plan for the recreational needs of the community. This is an independent committee, appointed by the Selectmen with representatives of the Planning Board, Budget Committee, Recreation Commission, and Conservation Commission. Planning began with the generation of a series of recreation questions that were included in the Sanbornton Community Survey. The results of this survey are being formulated to corroborate previous data concerning the recreation needs of the town.

The committee has been following steps and guidelines provided by the Office of Recreation Services, a division of the Department of Resources and Economic Development, a division of Parks and Recreation in Concord, NH. The initial phase in developing a town park is to establish a committee and determine the specific needs of the community. This effort has included a review of proposed subdivision plans to determine the growth pattern of the town, an inventory of existing recreational facilities in town, identification of open space, and mapping of town-owned property. As a result of these activities, the committee has completed the planning phase, and is now preparing a master plan.

Once this step is completed, it is anticipated that the major thrust will be to lay the ground work for a town park. The committee will be expanded and blueprints for a town park will be developed. Preliminary discussions about a town park have addressed possible locations and the type of property needed. It is anticipated that at least ten acres would be required to provide for youth baseball and soccer fields, playgrounds, basketball courts, tennis courts, and a picnic area.

During the next phase, the committee will be seeking an appropriate location for the town park.

REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMISSION

As we reflect back upon 1990, we feel very fulfilled by the many recreation programs offered and enjoyed by Sanbornton residents. During 1990, the Recreation Commission organized and coordinated eleven programs and sponsored and/or assisted with three other town programs. The community enthusiastically participated in the wide range of programs offered this year.

A major task of the commission is to coordinate and implement the Beach Program. Jennifer Collard, a resident of Sanbornton, was hired to supervise the operation of the beaches and to coordinate summer programming. The BEACH PROGRAM involved three components:

1. BEACHES. Preparation of Hermit Lake and Winnisquam Lake Town Beaches for summer usage included the following: cleaning debris away; applying new sand; repairing rafts and anchoring to the lake bottom; putting out safety buoys; arranging for telephone service, garbage pickup, water testing, and toilet facilities; and the painting and repair of vandalized beach houses. Throughout the summer, commission members continued to monitor proper usage and maintenance of the beaches. At the end of the season, the beaches were cleaned and equipment properly stored for next summer.

2. LIFEGUARDS. The commission advertised, interviewed, hired and supervised three Red Cross certified lifeguards to maintain safety at both beaches, seven days a week, throughout the summer. Our lifeguards for the 1990 season were Maria Chapdelaine, James Knowlton, and Donna Ouellette.

3. WATER SAFETY INSTRUCTION. Lessons were provided to 115 Sanbornton children, by instructors Jennifer Collard and Donna Ouellette, at Hermit Lake and at Winnisquam Lake.

SOCCER. This was the fifth successful year of the Sanbornton Youth Soccer Program. 114 children, ages 6 through 12, participated, necessitating the formation of four additional teams. Twenty-six local parents and community members volunteered their time to coach, prepare the field, referee, and provide refreshments. The games were played on Saturday mornings (one hour practice and one hour play), September 8th through October 27th. Sanbornton Central and Sant Bani Schools provided the playing fields. The season ended with games at the Winnisquam High School field, between the Sanbornton Youth Soccer team and the Tilton-Northfield Youth Soccer team. An awards ceremony, held at the Sant Bani field was enjoyed by soccer participants and families.

TENNIS. An adult round robin of singles and doubles ran throughout the summer, in which 21 players participated. Thirty-two children and adults took tennis lessons, which were taught by tennis pro Peter Fagan at the Winnisquam High School courts.

COED SOFTBALL. For the second year, coed adult softball was played weekly at the Baptist Church bay field throughout the summer months and into the fall.

HALLOWEEN PARTY. A Halloween party including prizes, refreshments, a haunted walk, and games was held at the fire station. Children of all ages filled the station with creative costumes. **GYM AND SWIM.** This was the seventh year of this successful program offered by the Lakes Region YMCA for Sanbornton Central elementary children. Approximately 55 children attended sessions held during the spring.

ARTS AND CRAFTS, DANCE, AND SUMMER SOCCER. In its second year, an arts and crafts program was provided to 50 Sanbornton children at the Town Hall during July and August. Jennifer Collard, with the help of Amy McDougal, provided creative activities for the children. New this year, Chuck Wyman taught soccer skills to 23 children ages 7 to 12. Movement and music, and beginning ballet was enjoyed by 20 children taught by Karen Gregg.

AEROBICS. Sanbornton aerobic instructors, Elaine DeMello and Lynn Abraham started an adult coed aerobics program offered twice a week at the Town Hall beginning this winter. The response to this program has been excellent, thus plans are to continue into 1991.

The commission also sponsored and/or assisted with several town recreation programs. These included skating lessons and family skating at the Tilton School Rink, and support for the Sanbornton Youth Baseball League.

Commission goals for 1990 were fulfilled, with the exception of expanding Winnisquam Beach. This was not accomplished due to lack of funding. A wide range of safe and guality leisure and recreation programs were expanded and offered to community members of all ages and abilities. The Town Park Development Committee, which was formed in 1989, has been working on a long range plan and studying potential town park sites, along with the town planner. This committee is now an autonomous committee with members from a cross section of town committees.

Goals for 1991 include the following:

1. To continue to promote safe and quality leisure and recreation programs at minimal cost to the town.

2. To expand the offerings to be available to more adults and senior citizens in town. A fishing derby, a contra dance, a ski program at Highlands Ski Area, and coed aerobics are new programs to be added in 1991.

2 3. To support and offer assistance to the Town Park Development Committee when needed.

The commission would like to thank the many community members who volunteered their time, energy and creative ideas to this year's programs. We would also like to thank the Sanbornton community for their tremendous support and encouragement which has made working on this commission a very rewarding and fruitful experience.

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
