REPORT FROM THE "ROUND ROOM"

For some years now we have been writing a Report from the Round Room on the "state" of the Town, and generally this has been a happy report on accomplishments, past and present, and how well things are going, from the purchase of a new fire truck, growth of assessables, the recreation industry in Sutton, to the influence of the Interstate Road. We are forgoing some happy theme this year and instead choose to discuss an important topic—the over-riding topic in this 1967 Report must necessarily be TAXES. Then, too, many times before we have "lectured" on the two major ingredients: the amount to be raised, and the assessables needed to produce the money raised. The former divided by the total of the latter making "the thing" known as the TAX RATE. So we'll skip the mechanics of the arithmetic this time and concentrate on what hoppened in 1967, and give some thoughts about what appears to be coming in the future.

As everyone, but everyone, knows full well a re-evaluation of all the assessables in the Town of Sutton took place in 1967. The wheels for this were set in motion by a favorable vote at the 1966 Town Meeting "requesting the assistance of the State Tax Commission for the appraisal of all land and buildings in the Town for the tax year beginning April 1, 1967." At the 1967 Town Meeting the funds necessary for this project were voted with scarcely a dissenting voice.

The reasons for the re-evaluation appear to be as valid now that it has been accomplished as they were when it was proposed.

- 1. The necessity of out-side help to do the job which is too time-consuming for a part-time Board of Selectmen. The mass of information on the assessment record cards testifies to the truth of this statement; and is a tribute to the men who worked to gather the data.
- 2. The need to up-date a one hundred per cent of market valuation policy at least every five years. We now have had three such reviews 1957, 1961, and 1967.
- 3. The need for a readjustment of values between various categories of property, in particular land values as compared with other taxable property. The results of the re-evaluation bear this out because in general the greatest increases were in land values.

- 4. The use of a set of standards for the valuation of buildings, or a "scientific" approach to answer the growing insistence of the taxpayer for specific information. The information on the assessment record cards is the "specific information" that we set out to get; from these cards all may see the factual basis for the valuations, and find out what is valued, and how it is valued. While comparatively few tax-payers have availed themselves of the opportunity to see their card for themselves we urge all to come to the office and have a "look-see."
- 5. The trend toward increasing costs of local government, especially in our area with the Regional School plan, requires a broad and equitable tax base. More about this in a moment.

First let us see in this "Thumb Nail View #1" what the changes are in the various categories of taxable property, and finally noting that the over-all percentage of increase of assessed valuation is eighty-two percent (82%).

At the same time look at the "Thumb Nail View #2" which shows the other part of the formula, namely the money to be raised. Noting here that the increase of the amount to be raised, over all, is twenty-two and four-tenths per cent (22.4%).

So what hoppened to "the thing" (Tax Rate)? Dividing net total assessables (up 82%), by total amount to be raised by taxes (up 22.4%) the Rate was lower by thirty-three per cent (33%). And that is what hoppened in 1967. What then of the future?

Analysis of the record of the assessed property will quickly show that the item of "Road Building and Construction Machinery" will nearly be wiped from our tax rolls upon the completion of the construction of Interstate 89, or 7.2% of the total will be gone. Therefore, the tax base will certainly be reduced by this amount (one-half a million Dollars), and will stand at about seven million Dollars. Assuming that the same amount of money, will have to be raised on the tax base reduced by the loss of the road machinery, the Rate would be twenty-one Dollars and fifty-five Cents per thousand of valuation (\$21.55 per M) or UP one Dollar and fifty-five Cents per thousand (\$1.55 per M) from the 1967 Rate. The assumption that the amount to be raised would stay the same is a pretty weak one, and in all probability the money "needed" will increase. Making another weak assumption that the increase in Town, School, and County money to be raised is a mere 10%, the Tax Rate on the reduced base valuation would be

\$23.57, UP \$3.57 per M from the 1967 Rate. Thus on a tax base of slightly over seven million Dollars, for each additional \$1,000.00 to be raised the Tax Rate would increase .14¢ per M of valuation, or \$1.40 per M of valuation for each \$10,000.00 "raised." In the following "Thumb Nail View #3" a series of projected tax rates is illustrated using a tax base value of 7 million Dollars, and with varying amounts to be raised, showing increases of "needed money" of 10%, 15%, and 20% of the amount raised in 1967.

Of course, it is difficult to predict increments to be raised, but we can be certain that there will be increments. Based on state averages, School authorities predict that an annual increase of 8% to 10% in the budget of the Regional School District can be expected; and this is outside of, and without considering payments on bond issues and interest on buildings or buildings as yet not even proposed. One should not lose sight of the importance of the money voted in the Regional District as their share of our 1967 taxes is 58%.

It is well to consider, too, not only where increased demands for money may be made, but how much control we have over them. The projected Tax Rates above were predicted on increased spending varying from 10% - 20% of the total money raised in 1967 for all purposes. Another quickie look at "Thumb Nail View#2" showing the percentage increases from 1966 - 1967 readily proves that 10% is "modest" thinking. As per "Thumb Nail#2" it is easily seen that the Town's share of the tax Dollar is only 36% and that this went up 15.3%; and this is the only part of the Tax Dollar under the direct control of the Citizens of Sutton. By far the biggest sector, 58% for the Regional School

District went up 27.3%, is controlled by Sutton residents only in dilute form in so far as they take part in Region District affairs. There are six other towns each with their own problems, and desires, and except for the possibility of aligning with each other on an issue, such as frugality in spending for example, or some other issue, we have lost control of 58% of our Tax Dollar. Our voting population in itself represents only about 12% of the total District voters; and this is not taking account of the fact that it is extremely unlikely that the whole 12% would be present and voting at a Regional Meeting. The impotence of our vote is obvious. Still another sector, 6% of the Tax Dollar went up 21.4% in 1967; and it is scarcely possible to control this at all by Citizens of Sutton. This is the County Tax. In that case we have only one representative at the County Convention where the money is voted, and in fact we really only have 1/3 representation, as he must answer to three towns in his district.

The conclusions appear to be inescapable. We have lost control of 64% (58% School District, 6% County) of the money we pay in taxes! We have become a tax raising precinct for larger districts, and we must simply pay over to them the money for which we are billed. Only 36% of our Tax Dollars are directly under our control, represented mostly by the Highway Department. The corollary of this seems to be that our very existence as a corporate, town entity is seriously threatened; and to project an idea as a possibility: in the future the boundaries of present towns might be obliterated, and new regional district towns set up for the administration of the functions of local government, and the collection of taxes. It would be hoped that such new districts could be arranged to be homogeneous in regard to geography, community interests, economic standing, etc., at least to a greater degree than the recently created School District.

There is one more dismal detail in connection with the payment of the tax imposed by the Regional School District, namely that a portion of our tax base has been lessened by the pollution of Kezar Lake caused by the New London sewage plant effluent. In making appraisals of property in the area of this lake the Tax Commission reduced values by 30% across the board. It is abundantly clear that we are expected to bear our share of the school tax to build and support a school in the same town that has brought about this unhappy condition, while continuing to stand

the loss of assessables for some time to come. And this means for a very minimum of ten years, as we are assured by "experts" that even if the source of pollution were to be stopped as of the very instant you are reading this, that it would take that minimum of time for any *visible* sign of improvement to take place.

Common sense dictates that it will take a long time for Nature to repair the damage to the lake, let alone the restoration of property values; the latter might take even longer due to the stigma that has become attached to the Lake. The statements about a Regional School in New London producing only a 10% increase in flow to the sewer plant, or that the flow comes at a different time of day from a school than it does from homes, have no bearing on the matter: the damage has already been done, it is very real; and we must live with it for a long time to come.

One important part of the tax picture omitted from the above discussion is the possibility for increases in assessable property. It is not easy, of course, to "make up" a half million Dollar loss, but there are some immediate prospects for some additions to the valuation side; and over the long pull overall economic conditions, and the influence of I-89 may make themselves felt. However, "the Name of the Game is 'Nip and Tuck'" to see whether valuation increases can keep pace with increases in expenditures, and thus to keep TAX RATE, and taxes within bounds.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Town Equipment

As stated above, the amounts of money raised have been significant, and so also the results have been significant. Just to reflect on the matter of the acquisition of equipment; between 1963 and 1967 we purchased our first, new, "bot'n" fire truck, 1963, for \$14,500.00; a tractor-loader, 1964, for \$14,500.00; and a new conventional drive, highway truck, 1965, for \$6,725.00. These were obtained through the operation of "our" five year plan, raising \$7,000.00 per year; 1967 saw all these acquisitions paid for.

Starting on the second plan for keeping abreast of purchases, the ante has been raised only \$1,000.00 to \$8,000.00 annually. The first purchase on this 'second time around' is the new road grader. Once more this is the first all-new grader, and replaces the second-hand one acquired in 1959. At that time that machine cost \$14,500.00. The allowance on this old machine, which served us for eight years, was \$7,000.00 on the total price of \$26,000.00 for the new one, \$2,000.00 from 1967 taxes, plus \$17,000.00 in notes payable to 1972 as follows: 1968 - \$3,500.00; 1969 - \$3,500.00, 1970 - \$3,500.00, 1971 - \$3,500.00, and 1972 \$3,000.00.

After due consideration of several makes, models, etc., the grader purchased was decided upon as offering us the most service, with a new snow wing, hydraulic controls throughout, all wheel drive, and our old front push mounted for use with a "V" snow plow; this is a year around machine.

Village Road

Another project involving a considerable sum (\$5,000.00) was voted at the 1967 Annual meeting for 1967 taxes, namely the Village Road entrance re-location. While this was not completed, a start was made by the acquisition of the necessary property, and finally destruction of the house in preparation for the actual road re-location. It is expected that actual work on the road will be started at an early date in the Spring.

Tax Map and Re-Evaluation

Along with the purchase of equipment we should include the preparation of the Tax Map, and the Re-Evaluation. As we have stated before these are acquisitions for the Administrative offices which have not had new "machines," except for an adding machine, and a typewriter, for a long, long time. The Tax Map is nearing completion and is promised in its final form, up to date as of April 1, 1968 for use in making assessments this year. The total cost, including the additional sum voted at the 1967 meeting, is \$10,600.00. In making comparison with other tax maps prepared by different means we are well pleased with ours for two reasons. In the first place, Sutton's Tax Map is prepared on the firm foundation of deed information, and deed histories on the records of Merrimack County. Secondly, the system of numbering the segments is capable of expansion as the land is sub-divided down to a projected (but impossible) lot size of 15 square feet.

The Re-Evaluation was discussed more fully above. Final payment for this job is not required until after the time requests for abatement may be filed, and the final settlement of these appeals by the Tax Commissioners themselves. The Tax Map and Re-Evaluation are two important additions to our equipment.

Interstate 89 and other Road Matters

The cover illustration, and two pages of "inserts" with pictures of completed I-89 through the Town of Sutton, and of the exercises of Dedication, point up the importance of the event to us. It is a useful, beautiful road, and a joy to have a smooth highway connection into town. Some final notes on the highway are in order, the tax matter above is already noted.

There are some odds and ends of road repairs on town roads to get done another Spring. The Road Agent and the Selectmen are in touch with the contractors and the State authorities on this problem.

There is a note for hope and promise that Route 114 from North Sutton Village to New London is due for a face lifting, new drainage, application of a gravel base, and a smooth surface, in 1968!!! This has come about due to the extreme damage to the road by the heavy construction equipment which pounded over it; and the contractor and the New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways are going to cooperate to set the road a-right. This will not be a major re-alignment of #114, such is never promised, but some straightening and widening will be done. Incidentally, the Planning Board, and the Selectmen may have helped to nudge this project into being by making a strong, but friendly, appeal to Deputy Commissioner, Robert Whittaker.

An un-anticipated development was the re re-location of the North Road. As it turned out the design of the North Road, as it was to be improved as an access to I-89, contemplated drastic changes in a residential area that were not expected. Another location was proposed, and after a public hearing, August 16, 1967, the Selectmen "laid out" the re re-located North Road, and it has been constructed, swinging westerly from near the Whiskey Pine, crosses the Gile Road, and enters Route 114 at the site of the Bullard buildings. It is expected that this road will be maintained summer and winter by the State Highway Department.

A note about the approaches to I-89, and TRA funds. 1967 saw the use of two years worth of TRA money; one location is on the Baker Hill Road, from Brockelbank Corner to a point a little westerly of the former Poplar District School house; the other location is on Shaker Street from the end of the newly constructed connector from I-89, northerly to the Andrews Corner, so-called. We now have a number of TRA projects that have not received surface treatment, and if these funds are voted this year, these will be surfaced, in particular the Gile Pond Road. When this latter is completed the State Highway Department assures us that the directional signs from I-89 will be changed to indicate this as a route to Sutton and South Sutton.

Sutton was privileged to be the site of the Dedication program of this part of I-89, the General Frank D. Merrill Highway, at Exit 10. The following is quoted from the December 1967 issue of the "New Hampshire Highways Magazine":

"On November 21, Governor John W. King, in company with the Executive Council, joined federal, state officials and other invited guests at a buffet luncheon and dedication ceremonies to place a newly completed 11 mile stretch of Interstate 89 into service in the towns of Warner, Sutton and New London.

"The New Hampshire Good Roads Association and the Associated Contractors of New Hampshire were hosts at the Buffet Luncheon held at the Gray House in New London at Crockett's Corner prior to the Interstate Route 89 dedication ceremonies at Sutton.

"A luncheon highlight featured a presentation by Mr. John Palazzi of the Palazzi Corporation, Hooksett, of several blue amethyst crystals to Governor John W. King. These rare stones were excavated during the construction of Interstate Route 89 by members of the Palazzi road building organization.

"Approximately 150 state, Federal and local community officials attended the dedication ceremonies at the Sutton interchange near exit 10 at 2 P.M.

"Mr. Robert S. Bristol, Chairman of the Sutton Board of Selectmen, and representing both the Warner and New London Boards, called the completion of this section of the General Frank D. Merrill Highway 'a great historic moment' for the area which would put the region 'on the main stream again.'

Mrs. Coburn receives Post cane

SUTTON — Mrs. Lillie G. Coburn received the Boston Post cane from the Selectmen in a private presentation recently at her home. Mrs. Coburn, 94, was born July 2, 1873, and has lived here for 62 years since the day of her marriage to the late Benjamin K. Coburn. It was 19 years ago that the same gold headed cane left the same Coburn house after his death.

There is a record of longevity in Mrs. Coburn's family. Her mother lived to be 100 years and eight months old; and of 10 children, five have lived to be 90 years or more old. Mrs. Sadie Shepard, her sister, is 96 years old, lives in Sunapee and holds the Post cane in that town.

Mrs. Coburn lives alone at her home in Sutton except for the winter months at which time she goes to Sunapee to be with her sister, Mrs. Shepard. Mrs. Coburn has been at her present house for 21 years; she is active in the King's Daughters and has a pin from that organization representing 60 years of membership.

"Governor King called the new road an 'immediate saving in time, a saving in money, and most important, a saving of life.'

"Thirteen bridges and three interchange areas were part of the construction work. Interchange facilities will be located at N.H. Route 103, (north), at Warner, the N.H. Route 114 connector at North Sutton Village and the N.H. Route 11 and 114 connector at King Ridge Road.

"Construction work on the Warner-New London section has been underway since 1965 by four highway construction firms working on eight separate contracts valued at nearly \$9 million."

Another note concerning the dedication of I-89 is the newspaper clipping reproduced on the page with the pictures.

Boston Post Cane

In the work of Selectmen of small towns the opportunity to participate in ribbon cuttings, and other ceremonial events, is not frequent. 1967 was different; and among those pleasant interludes was the presentation of the gold headed "Post" cane to a spritely, gracious lady, 94 years young, who is a long time resident of Sutton: Mrs. Lillie G. Coburn. The newspaper account of the event is reproduced on the page with the picture of Mrs. Coburn and the Selectmen. The cane bears the words "to be transmitted;" the transmittal traditionally is by way of the "Town fathers;" sadly after the death of the cane's previous owner, in this case Mrs. Nettie R. Howe who passed away September 21, 1967.

Town Reports

Another ceremonial event was the receipt of our eleventh consecutive certificate for placing first in the New Hampshire Town Report Contest; presentation took place at the banquet at the Annual Meeting of the New Hampshire Municipal Association at Concord. At the same meeting a member of the Sutton Board took part in a panel on "Better City and Town Reports - Now!" Our tenth consecutive award for first place in the New England Town Report Contest was brought to us from the New England Council by Mr. Fowler of the Tax Commission staff.

Town Line Perambulations

The lines of two adjoining towns, New London on the north, and Bradford on the south, were perambulated in the Fall of 1967. While this appears to be an archaic practise, it is a well-defined duty of Selectmen, RSA 51:2; including a penalty for failure to perform: "each selectman so neglecting shall forfeit twenty Dollars, one half for the use of the town whose selectmen have done their duty, and the other half to the use of the county." Perambulation is useful as it serves to instruct the Selectmen where the town lines are in the event a dispute concerning the location of taxable property. Such a problem arose twice in recent years. Also "renewal" of the bounds on the lines does just this; how many bounds on private property become obscured and "lost" for lack of periodic renewal.

SOME PROSPECTS FOR 1968

Surplus

A surplus as indicated on the balance sheet of 1966 and 1967 has grown to significant proportions. This surplus was brought about in large part by the added taxes on road machinery assessed late in 1966 in the amount of \$11,000.00. With the advice of the Tax Commission \$12,000 of the surplus may be used; therefore, it is suggested that \$10,000.00 of it be applied to the cost of the proposed garage, and \$2,090.00 to apply against the cost of the re-evaluation which exceeded the money appropriated by \$2,083.96. The net result of applying the surplus for any purpose is, of course, to reduce the amount of tax money that has to be raised. In 1968 this means that the total budget for town purposes (that 36% we still control) will remain nearly the same as in 1967. (see total figures of the Budget Committee Recommendations with comparison, 1967: \$58,095.88 v. 1968: \$59,035.31.)

Equipment Purchase Proposed

To be included in the Warrant for the Annual Meeting is the question of the purchase of a truck for the Highway Department this year. This follows the plan that was set up last year, (see page 18 of the Annual Report, 1966) and is patterned after our first five year equipment purchase plan. The plan simply consists of raising \$8,000.00 per year for the purchase of equipment, and

by balancing needs and time for payments, the very considerable results, noted above, were obtained. Since the purchase of equipment is a continuing need we believe that the plan outlined below should be kept in operation, and that this regular replacement schedule should be followed so that we will not be faced with many purchases at once (this latter problem was once the case.) The schedule as proposed is prepared in consultation with the Budget Committee; the equipment may then be kept up to date on a rotation as follows:

Town Garage

The construction of a new Town garage for housing all town equipment has been under discussion for a number of years. The present buildings have been out-grown, both in regard to the number of units to be housed, and by the size of the units themselves. The safety, convenience, and efficiency of a new building for our big investment in excellent equipment of both these departments would suggest that this proposal be given thoughtful consideration and action at the 1968 Annual Meeting. An eleven stall building, 32 x 142 would garage all Highway Department and Fire Department equipment. That is, four stalls for the fire equipment; five stalls for trucks, tractor-loader, tractor, one stall of adequate size for the grader, and one stall for a repair area partitioned from the machine storage area; concrete floor throughout, masonry or steel wall construction, insulation, and a heating plant to warm the work area to a comfortable degree for working, the balance of the building to have "overflow" heat from there to make it warm enough to melt snow and ice from the equipment. The estimated cost of this installation is \$24,000.00. The proposed

construction would be submitted to bids from building contractors. grading after completion of the structure to be done by town road workers on regular time with town equipment. As you will recall the sum of \$8,725.00 was "laid aside" as a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of purchasing land and/or buildings for Town use; with interest to December 31, 1967 the total amount is It is then proposed to apply \$10,000.00 from the \$9,087.86. Surplus to this project, leaving \$5,000.00 to be raised from taxes, \$2,500.00 in 1968 and \$2,500.00 payable on a note in 1969. A revision of this proposal downward to build a garage for only Highway equipment, or seven stalls, would eliminate whatever economies there are in doing the whole job at one time, and consequently postponing the use of the building by the Fire Department. The estimated cost of a seven stall building is \$16,000.00; less the money from the Capital Reserve Fund of \$9,000.00, leaving the balance of \$7,000.00 to which sum an equal amount from Surplus could be applied. Thus the construction of the smaller building could be accomplished without additional taxes.

Street and Road Naming and Signs

Another article to be considered at the Annual Meeting is the adoption of street and road names. In the Planning Board's Report is a more complete discussion of this subject together with a 'fold-out' map of the Town with street and road names indicated on it. As far as we know there has never been any official action by the Town on the adoption of street and road names, with the exception of "Foothills Road," for which the Selectmen made a formal agreement with Mr. Eliot B. Foot. The second part of the proposal is to erect signs on the streets and roads. By adopting both the names and the proposal to erect the signs the confusion of multiple names, and the difficulty of finding particular streets would be eliminated.

The names on the map are proposals based on long accepted names and local history; amendments may be made at the Annual Meeting for acceptance by the voters.

Town Hall Improvements

Remember back only a few years, would you believe to 1959, and consider the changes wrought in the Town Hall, and since that time various refinements? There are some things yet to be done, and more beyond these present proposals. First, the recently

formed Historical Society has requested, and received, approval by the Selectmen to clean out, refurbish, and use the second floor Round Room for their meetings, and for storage of papers. Secondly, the amount of the appropriation for the Town Hall has been increased, with the blessings of the Budget Committee, for flooring and furnishings in the Selectmen's office; and for repairs to settees and chairs in the rest of the Town hall.

Plowing Private Driveways

The matter of the use of Town-owned equipment for private hire and on private property is of vital concern to us and to many other New Hampshire towns, especially in regard to snow removal from driveways. In Sutton this practice was started many years ago on a "for free", and sort of catch-as-catch-can basis; until by vote of the Annual Meeting that a fee of five Dollars was to be charged for any driveway of any dimension, for each entire winter season!!! On several occasions the Selectmen have asked for a town vote on whether the Town wanted "out" of the business, or wanted to raise the fee, or to change onto some other basis. At these times the information was presented about the difficulties of large equipment in small driveways, the added burden of the work with public highways to take care of, the differences in driveways, etc., and the cost to all taxpayers including those who do not, can not, or do not choose to avail themselves of the service.

As many have probably noted, our driveway-plowing-situation is similar to towns in the immediate vicinity, and all over New Hampshire for that matter, where complete cessation of plowing, or increasing the charge for the work have brought howls of protest, special town meetings, and what not. This quotation, from the New Hampshire Municipal Association's magazine "New Hampshire Town and City" for January 1968, tells the story about other communities:

"In Sunapee, selectmen have set up a fee schedule based on \$10 per hour for plowing. A minimum charge of \$2.50 is charged anytime a town plow drops its nose on private property.

"Hanover discontinued private plowing services this year, even though the town was collecting fees for the service. Plainfield and Enfield stopped free plowing some time ago.

" 'We've just got too much else to do,' said Hanover Town Manager Neal G. Berlin.

"Private driveways don't lend themselves very well to large and expensive highway plowing equipment," says David L. Mann, executive secretary of the New Hampshire Municipal Association.

"There is some feeling town selectmen could be hard-pressed to justify releasing equipment to do private driveways after public roads have been done in light of the growing demand for sanding and salting of public roads after the snow is pushed aside.

"In a town with 40 or 50 miles of public highway using two trucks to plow, it can take a good 24 hours just to get the snow cleared and the banks pushed back. Then the crews would have to start sanding and salting, and that could take another day's work.

"The result of this would seem to make waiting for the town plow to come around pretty unattractive.

"A side issue in the matter is what a town's liability for damage to private property is: A Plainfield town plow once ran over a tricycle buried in the snow and the property owner sued for damages and got paid.

"In New London, the town repaired a stonewall a wing had knocked down.

"At any rate, the long run trend appears to be for the towns to give up the driveway business to private enterprise and to stick to public needs, even though feelings may be ruffled in the process."

Legal authorities are definitely on the side of discontinuing the plowing of private driveways with town equipment. To quote from the case of Clapp et al. v. Jaffrey et al. 97 N.H. 456 decided by the Supreme Court October 9, 1952: "The first question transferred to us is whether it is lawful for the town to rent equipment or to perform services for private individuals on their property. Assuming that such actions are subordinate and incidental to town needs, and that prices charged are sufficient to cover the cost so that no burden falls on taxpayers, we believe such actions are lawful. While neither expediency nor wisdom should be allowed to overcome principle, it is common knowledge and a fact entitled to weight that town help and equipment which would otherwise be idle have been used to plow private ways for many years. This has been both a source of income to the towns and a convenience to individuals who otherwise might experience great difficulty in obtaining this necessary service . . . Our conclusion is that if the

individuals pay a sufficient fee so that no tax monies are being expended, and if the acts are subordinate and incidental to the town needs, the town may perform any or all of the services in question."

Conclusions:

- 1. The town cannot lawfully plow private ways or driveways unless the private person pays a sum sufficient to cover the cost of the service so that no public funds are used upon private property. That is it follows that each person must pay in accordance with the cost incurred, rather than at a flat rate because it is obvious that it costs more to plow a thousand feet of way than an hundred feet.
- 2. Plowing of private ways at cost is simply an implied contract between each property owner and the town; and therefore the subject is not a "public purpose" and as such the town has no legal right to vote upon the matter.

With this preponderance of legal weight against the practise of plowing driveways, in order to be legal driveway plowing will be continued on the following terms:

- 1. Use of Town equipment only as subordinate and incidental to the Town needs.
- 2. Payment for services performed by Town employees and/or equipment shall be based on the following fees in order to recover the actual costs involved: \$10.00 per hour, minimum charge \$2.50.

CONCLUSION

As you reach the end of these rambling notes, one thing shows clearly — that our town affairs cover a wide spectrum, and if colors express moods, from the "dark" of difficulties to the "light" of the pleasurable. We, your Town officers, who work in this broad spectrum find its challenges increasing, and are grateful for the helping hands that are sometimes offered. We hope our efforts will be met in the spirit in which they are tendered - to serve our Town well.

REPORT OF PLANNING BOARD

One of the projects your Planning Board has been concerned with in 1967 is street signs. There are few signs on our roads and these were put up by the State directing to various parts of the town and its parks. The Board feels that street and road signs are very necessary in town, particularly to people looking for special streets and homes. With this in mind we have had the map brought up to date (see inside back cover) with areas of interest and street names. To the best of our information and from town records these names are correct and appropriate, but there may be some discussion about them.

The Board has also checked into the cost and style of town signs and there is in the Town Warrant for 1968 an article for the appropriation of money for the purpose of having signs made and erected. If the appropriation is approved the Board hopes to have this project well on its way this spring.

In accordance with Article 21 of last year's Warrant the Planning Board and Selectmen, in consultation with the heads of various departments involved have studied the location for and construction of a Town building to house the various departments and their equipment. The plans and estimate of cost will be presented at the Annual Town Meeting. There will be an article in the Warrant requesting funds for this building.

A member of the Planning Board observed that if some clearing was done around the one remaining Primeval Pine near relocated North Road the view of this rare tree would enhance the beauty of the area. The Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests, who at present own the land around the tree, is willing to deed this land (about 5 acres) to the Town along with \$100 they received from the Department of Public Works and

Highways in payment for the land they took for highway construction. The Society suggested that this money be used for maintenance, cautioned about clearing too much around the tree, and offered to have someone visit the area and mark those trees which could be cut.

With the hope of continued effort to make our town an even more attractive place in which to live, the Planning Board is urging individuals to plant trees. In connection with this, we would like to quote from Revised Statutes Annotated 76:19, "For shade trees, the selectman, upon application of any person who shall plant and protect shade trees by any highway adjoining his land, may make such abatement of taxes to him as they shall deem just and equitable; but no such abatement shall affect his settlement or right to vote."

Your Planning Board has been and shall continue to study and formulate regulations for developments. This encompasses many factors which need to be thoroughly investigated. We shall present such regulations to the Town when we have them adjusted for the benefit and betterment of our Town.

This year we have held work sessions each week to re-organize and up-date your library, putting some books up for sale and replacing others. Mrs. Cynthia Postal, Library Consultant from Keene, has visited with us and helped us with this project.

The Library Board voted to aid Mrs. Gordon Bird of Bradford with a partial payment for the three-week course in cataloging which she attended at the University of New Hampshire. Mrs. Bird still gives much of her time in assisting with the reorganizing.

Being a State Affiliated Library, we received a \$100 grant from State Library Aid with which we purchased reference books.

Many new books have been purchased and quite a number have been donated. The proceeds from the food sale and the book sale have also helped toward the purchase of books.

Another Library project is monthly educational films shown to the Sutton School children.

During Library Week April 16-21, stamp collections were exhibited. Books were given as prizes for the five best book jackets designed and made by the third and fourth grade pupils.

Permission was given the King's Daughters to store items in the library basement. The Cancer Dressing workers have been invited to meet at the Library on the days the Library is open, if needed.

New drapes were purchased for the Library, and an all-weather rug for the vestibule.

We feel much has been accomplished during the year. Many thanks to all interested people.

REPORT OF THE SUTTON VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

Your Fire Department is made up of forty members who are on call at all times in case of fire. These men are not paid, and I would like to take this opportunity to thank them for the cooperation which they have given me, and for the improvements which they have made possible in the Department.

This year they have responded to 12 fire calls. No buildings have been lost. The Red Network, on which fire calls are made has been in continuous operation.

A new and improved tank truck has been added to the equipment, thanks to hours of work. This truck has already proved its usefulness.

We have a second Walkie-Talkie Radio, having found the first very useful in locating forest fires and lost hunters.

A number of raincoats, boots, helmets and mittens for protection of the men were also added. These things were purchased with money raised at the annual rummage sale, held on the first Saturday in August, and with gifts of money which have come from several individuals. We wish to thank everyone who helped by work, or by donations of money or saleable articles.

Six men were awarded diplomas for training which they received at Meadowood Fire School, Fitzwilliam, N.H., taking time off from their regular jobs to attend.

The money which the Town appropriates for the Department is used to maintain buildings and equipment, insurance on trucks and men, and for the Red Network system.

I would like to make special mention of one of our members, Allan (*Butch*) Palmer who is in the Navy, and who was serving on the Forrestal at the time of the fire. The Department is proud of him.


