SCHOOL REPORT.

At the opening of the present school year an important problem was presented in the selection of books under the free text book law. To select from the numerous books upon the different subjects, those best suited to our needs was a work requiring no little study and thought. The prime demand was for the best, and those only. To what extent, if at all, this demand should be modified by the cost was a question requiring careful consideration. Many thought that extreme caution should prevail in making changes, still there was an imperative demand for a change in some of the books. Our purpose was to limit the change as much as possible. The more the subject was studied the more apparent it became, that, on the basis of financial economy alone, the expediency of continuing the old books in use was questionable. Very favorable terms were secured on all books for first introduction, and for such supplies as may be needed for five years.

With careful use a very small percentage of the new books will need replacing during that time, whereas the old ones now in the hands of the pupils would be constantly wearing out, and be replaced by new ones necessarily purchased in small lots at a decidedly greater cost per book. From thirty to fifty per cent. has been saved in the cost of books, as will be seen by the cost mark on the labels, and more than this.

on most school supplies. This discount could not have been secured, of course, on small lots.

Harper's Language Series and Watson's Spellers have been retained. Meservey's Book-Keeping was in use in some of the schools, and additional copies have been purchased to supply the demand.

Eggleston's U. S. History has been adopted, although a few copies of Barnes' Brief History are in use,—both are excellent works. Butler's Geographies have been introduced, and cannot fail to commend themselves to all as text books of great merit.

The new series of Greenleaf's Arithmetics and Lippincott's Readers were adopted.

A copy of the Child's Book of Health has been furnished to each school, to be used under the direction of the teacher for reading, study and oral instruction, and in nearly all schools it has proved very successful. The minds of the youngest pupils have been awakened, and all have received valuable help in the study of Physiology and Hygiene, and are now prepared for more advanced work. Every school has been supplied with a Globe and Dictionary and a few valuable Charts have been added, containing numerous outline Maps, Physiological Diagrams, and instructions in Writing, Drawing, Civil Government, American History, &c. These will be passed from school to school and all will have the benefit of them. The school rooms are now well supplied with helps for teacher and scholar.

To do this work it has cost a considerable sum, but we believe no one who has studied the results will for a moment regret the cost. It has given to every pupil an equal share of books and other school supplies, and the increased interest that many have manifested has proved their appreciation of these advantages. Hereafter the expense for books and supplies will be comparatively small. The school year has been one of general prosperity, and we can safely say of increased success over the previous year. Local causes have

in some instances affected the length of terms and the degree of individual interest and success.

A well begun work in No. 7 was cut short by the breaking out of diphtheria, and the sympathy of the people is with them in their affliction. It was with deep regret that we decided to discontinue the school for the remainder of the year. Medical advice favored this course.

There has been a considerable decrease in the number of absences, but there is still ample room for improvement.

It is generally found that absent marks are mostly confined to a few pupils in each school, while the greater share are constant in their attendance.
