THE MEETING HOUSE

Oyster River Parish

1655

Historical records of Durham and the surrounding area show that the first meeting house of the Oyster River Parish, later to become the Town of Durham, was built by Valentine Hill on the bank of the Oyster River half way between the Falls and the Point. On April 16, 1655 it was voted to build and maintain this Meeting House in order to provide a place of worship for the people who made up the growing settlement along both banks of the Oyster River. Prior to the establishment of this Oyster River Parish the settlers of this area, who relied almost entirely upon river boats for transportation, were required to row across Little Bay and the mouth of the Bellamy River to reach the nearest Meeting House or place of worship. History records that this building erected in 1655 was still standing as late as 1718. Although all other buildings in the vicinity were destroyed in the Indian raid of 1694 this building was spared. Records show that Rev. Edward Fletcher was the first minister in the Oyster River Parish and that he was succeeded by Rev. Joseph Hall. History also records that Rev. John Russ was both Minister and Physician for a period of forty years during the very early days of the Oyster River Parish.

Although time and one of Durham's early industries, the Mathes brickyards, have eradicated all evidence of the foundation of this building the exact location of the Meeting House is believed to be on the south bank of the Oyster River on the property now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Adrian O. Morse. In 1955 members of the Durham Community Church erected a large white cross on the spot where 300 years before people of Durham first met in their own house of worship. This cross can be seen from the Piscataqua River Road.

The photograph reproduced on this Annual Report is taken of an excellent painting done by Mr. John W. Hatch. In his painting, which Mr. Hatch donated to the Durham Community Church on the occasion of their 300th Anniversary, he has reproduced from historical facts and records Durham's first Meeting House.

OYSTER RIVER COOPERATIVE SCHOOL AUDITORIUM

Two Hundred and Twenty-fifth Meeting

To the inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Oyster River Cooperative School Auditorium, Durham, N. H., Tuesday the thirteenth day of March, 1956, A. D. at Nine O'Clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three (3) years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, one Auditor for a term of three (3) years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three (3) years, four members of the Budget Committee for a term of three (3) years and all other elective officers for the ensuing year.
2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee (see details following) and that the sum of \$85,959.08 be raised and appropriated for the purposes of it.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of approximately Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$13,000) to defray the cost of its share of the Strafford County Government.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.
5. To see if the Town will direct a discount of one percent (1%) to be made to those persons who shall pay their taxes within a period of six (6) weeks from the date the Tax Rate is approved by the State Tax Commission.
6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws of the State of New Hampshire relative to playing games of Beano (see ballot).

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Cemetery Committee to expend a sum not to exceed One Hundred and Fifty (\$150) dollars (see Budget) for improvements of the School House Lane Cemetery and the Town Cemetery on the Concord Turnpike.

8. To see if the Town will approve the construction of Mill Pond Road. (see Budget).

9. To see if the Town will authorize the sale of the Hobart electric welder purchased by the Town in 1950.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum not to exceed Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000) dollars by means of long term notes to be retired at a rate of Five Thousand (\$5,000) dollars annually, starting in 1956, for sewer construction on Oyster River Road and Garden Lane and raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand dollars (\$5,000) for this purpose. (see Budget).

11. To see if the Town will increase the annual appropriation for the Library by \$3800.00, for the purpose of employing a children's librarian, to serve in the Town Library and under the jurisdiction of the Town Librarian.

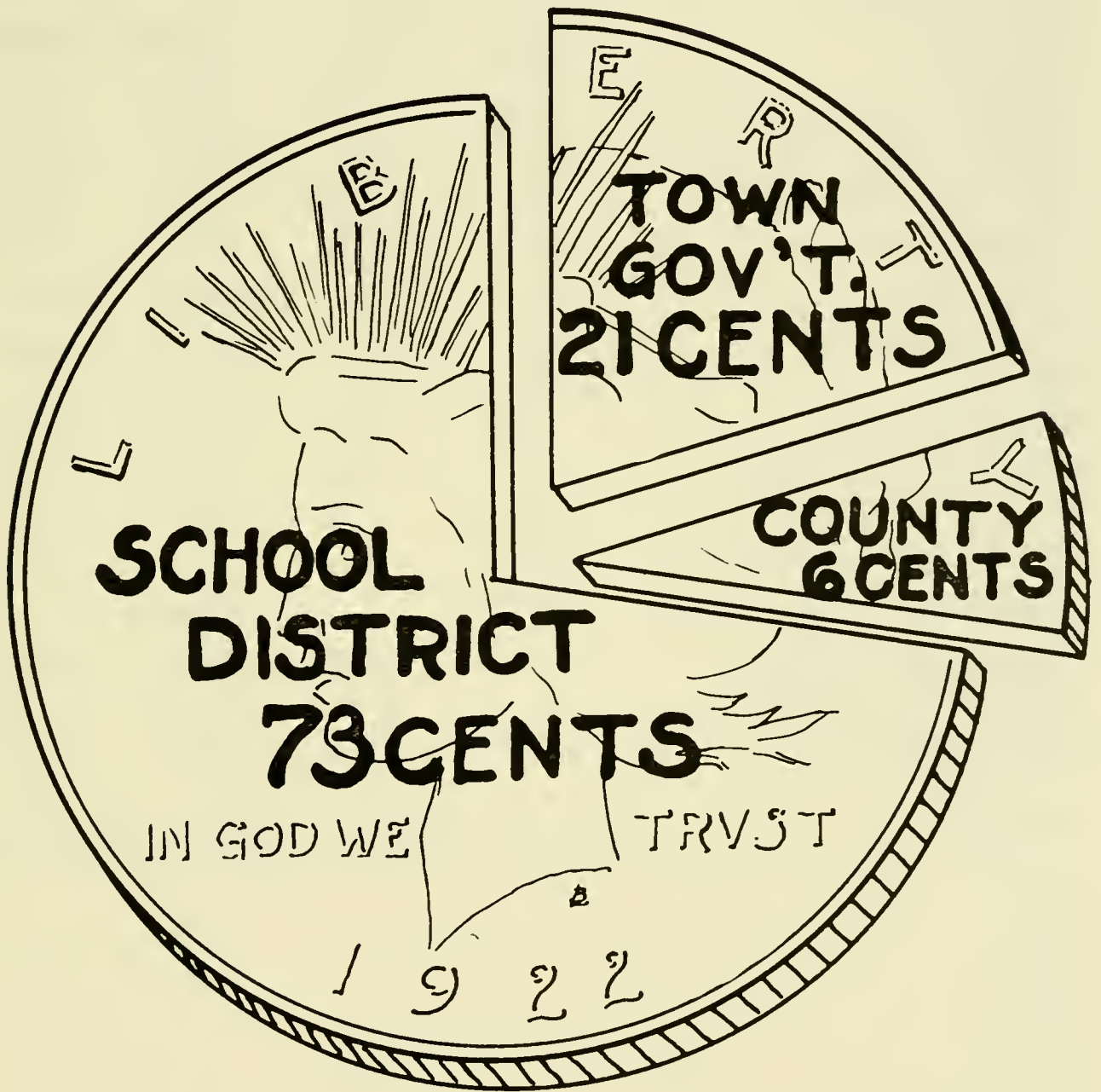

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Some one has said, you must either move forward or go backward; you cannot stand still. The Selectmen believe that Durham is moving forward. The year has seen the completion of the Main Street sidewalk project. We appreciated the favorable comments on the sidewalk and the wall. The Madbury Road parking lot was almost doubled in area. This spring should see the completion of its surfacing, lighting and marking. A long term lease on the piece of land between the Durgin Apartment and the Hardware House enabled us to connect Jenkins Court with the parking lot. We appreciate the cooperation of Mr. deMoulied. Jenkins Court was widened, but one-way traffic was necessary to permit parking space on one side. An asphalt sidewalk with a rolled curb will make that project essentially complete. The cooperation of the Dunfey's, Mr. Michael, Mr. deMoulied and the Franklin Theater owners in donating a part of their property to the project is sincerely appreciated. Oyster River Road and the section of Garden Lane beyond Valentine Hill Road were accepted and surfaced. The section of Mast Road north of the Concord Road (passing the University Barns) and a portion of Wiswall Road were surfaced. For several years we have concentrated "Town Road Aid" funds on Bennett Road. This year saw the completion of that project. We now have a hard surface road from Newmarket Road to the Packer's Falls Road. The new section which removed the road from Beaudet's Barnyard is a great improvement. We appreciate the patience and the cooperation of Mrs. Beaudet.

Last year the Selectmen reported the layout of a new road from Newmarket Road to the Durham Laundry as a connecting link for the roads in the Red Tower Development and a by-pass for Church Hill. The need for this last was strongly underscored the day of the Marston fire. Final agreement on rights of way for the road was not reached because the Selectmen could give no assurance as to when the road might be built. It now appears that "Mill Pond Road" as the Selectmen have named it, may become a reality within the next year.

We are sure the Townsfolk have appreciated the cooperation of the Town Crew, especially in the task of Rubbish Removal, a task which increases each year. Without the loyalty and cooperation of the Crew the Selectmen would not have been able to encompass the many projects undertaken during the year. Town equipment was improved by the replacement of one truck and the air hammer; one new snowplow was added. A long-standing equipment need was met this year by building removable hoods for two of the trucks; the hoods protect the crew while salting or sanding.

A new pump was installed at the Town Dump, which should save its cost many times over in controlling Dump fires, and in saving fire equipment runs to the Dump.

In January and February the Town Crew logged out the Doe Farm woodlot salvaging the blow down from hurricane Carol. This was done on request of the Trustees of Trust Funds.

In the Concord Road Cemetery a new road was built, the existing roads were graded and reshaped, and a considerable quantity of grading done to help care for the drainage problem. Culverts are needed in two or three places to prevent road washouts. These, it is hoped, can be installed during the coming year.

Every seventh year in perpetuity the Selectmen must perambulate the Town lines in company with the selectmen of the adjoining towns, making sure that the bounds are in good order. This was the year of perambulation. The lines were duly inspected and the returns filed with the Town Clerk in accord with the law.

Durham has been growing for several years at the rate of 20-30 new houses per year. This year 27 permits for new buildings were issued. In 1950 the total assessed valuation of the town was \$3,423,773.00. The comparable figure for 1955 is \$4,136,975.00. These figures show a total increase in property valuations of \$713,202.00 for an average of \$118,867.00 per year. The Red Tower Development which was approved as a sub-

division two years ago is now beginning to show activity. Mr. Wendell Davis secured approval last year for the partial development of his proposed subdivision in the Davis Road area where three houses are presently under construction. Mr. Benjamin Orcutt secured approval a year ago for the partial development of a new subdivision on the westerly part of Madbury Road in the Emerson Road area. Three houses have appeared in that area. Mr. Paul DeGross secured approval this year for his plans to develop the area at the easterly side of Madbury Road between Pendexter Road and the Town Line; two houses are under construction in that area. On the Frank Morrison estate Mr. Gangwer is constructing a ten unit apartment building. Many individual homes are under construction.

The subdivision regulations in effect since 1952 provide that roads to subgrade, water and sewage disposal facilities within the subdivision are the responsibility of the subdivider, however, the Oyster River Road area and the southerly end of Garden Lane were laid out and approved prior to the adoption of the present regulations. In this area a real health problem has developed because the septic tank effluent cannot be absorbed by the soil and at times has run in the drainage ditch at the roadside. In order that any plan proposed for the relief of this situation would fit into any future development of the area, the Selectmen engaged the Boston firm of Camp Dresser and McKee, Engineering consultants, to study the area and submit their report. We have their report in hand. The Public Works Advisory Committee and the Planning Board have approved a plan for submission to the voters of the Town.

Relations with the officers of the University have continued to be cordial. The Selectmen have conferred with the Trustees and with other officers of the University at length on the matter of the water supply, but as yet no conclusions have been reached on the selection of an Engineering firm to make a survey of present and future water resources.

Doubtless few of the Townsfolk have noted any change in

the "Wonderful" taste of Durham's water, but users of Town water have enjoyed the benefits of fluoridation since last July.

Through agreements reached with abutting property owners in relation to sharing the cost on the basis of lot front footage, the Madbury Road hydrant line was extended to Pendexter Road. An agreement was also reached with Mr. Paul DeGross which is permitting the extension of the line along Pendexter Road.

Relatively few people are happy to pay taxes, hence but a small proportion are glad to welcome the Selectmen when they appear to assess the property for tax purposes. It is the constant purpose of the Selectmen to have comparable pieces of property assessed in relation to their comparable values. We admit that we are not omniscient and that errors are made. These we attempt to correct whenever they come to our attention. We sincerely appreciate the cooperation, patience and forbearance of the property owners of Durham.

This is the first year in which Durham has had a Town Police Department all its own. On July 1, Chief Louis Bourgoin retired after many years of loyal and devoted service to the University and to the Town. Ben Thomas, who had served the Town for several years under Louis' direction, was appointed Chief of Durham Police. The problems of police protection for the Town and the University have been discussed at length. We have developed a plan for cooperation which should be advantageous to both. In October, Mr. Earl Rogers was appointed Chief of Campus Police and was deputized by the Selectmen as were the watchmen of the University and other campus police in order that they might cooperate more effectively with Chief Thomas. Several times during the year it has been necessary to employ part time police assistance. As the town grows, such assistance must increase.

As we look to the future, we see the need for the improvement of and surfacing of more Town roads. We propose to use the 1956 T. R. A. on sections of the Bay Road and the Dame Road. Bagdad Road, Canney Road and Mill Road must also re-

ceive attention. We hope for improvement in the traffic problem on Main Street with the construction of the proposed rotary, but real relief can come only from a major change in traffic flow. If you would like to see a "by-pass" let the Highway Commissioner know about it; a single voice crying in the wilderness has little effect. As we continue to crystal gaze, we see in the future a need for relief of the Selectmen. The Superintendent of Public Works takes a great load from their shoulders, and we sincerely appreciate the assistance and cooperation of Don Plaisted. Though Leon Crouch is the Tax Collector and Town Clerk, he is also the keeper of the Selectmen's books. Without his many phases of assistance we would be lost. We tender several verbal orchids to Mr. Crouch. As the Town grows, more of the detail work of the Selectmen must be transferred to the shoulders of the Superintendent of Public Works. In the not too distant future, we can foresee the possibility of a Town Manager.

Though this is a long report, we have been able to cover only a portion of the many phases of our Town Government. The Selectmen very sincerely appreciate the cooperation of fellow officers, organizations, and individuals of the Town. Without such cooperation we could not do the job. We welcome your suggestions for improvements and are happy to discuss details of problems confronting the taxpayers.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

No expenditures are shown for the care of the various cemeteries covered by trusts. The work was done as usual by the Town workmen. No bill was received before Dec. 31st from the Town.

The only unusual outlay of Trust Funds is that of the Doe Fund. The following is an explanation of the project which will eventually return a revenue to the Town.

The Town crew did an excellent job in logging the down timber in the Town Forest. 41,120 board feet of logs were salvaged from the trees blown over by the August 31, 1954 Hurricane Carol.

During the Spring of 1955, two thousand selected white pine and spruce trees were pruned of branches to the height of sixteen feet. The pruned trees average about six to seven inches in diameter and about thirty to forty feet in height and are a part of the twenty acres of plantations that were established by Professor Karl Woodward during the twenties. At the start of the next century, forty-four years hence, the selected pruned trees should be seventy to eighty feet tall and have an average diameter, at breast height, of thirteen to fifteen inches. As the selected trees grow, pruning is advised up to a total height of thirty-two feet for the very best of the pruned trees. The value of the pruned logs in the year two thousand should be at least \$50 per thousand on the stump, a total value of more than \$10,000.

Two hundred dollars of the Doe Fund earnings were spent by the Trustees to employ qualified labor to do the pruning. The total cost of the job was \$400. The federal government, in accordance with the provisions of the Agricultural Conservation program, shared fifty percent of the cost.

The plantation needs to be thinned if the 2,000 pruned trees are to continue to make good growth. Arrangements are being made to cut from the plantations 100 cords of pulpwood, 350

barn poles, and 35,000 board feet of white pine sawlogs, which should bring a net return of about \$700.

The Town Forest is located on the Lamprey River off the Bennett Road. The area has excellent recreational possibilities for such activities as picnicking, camping, hiking, and boating. In accordance with the provisions of the Olinthus Doe will, the property can never be sold by the town, and income not used in the development of the property is to be used in the support and maintenance of the common schools in the Town of Durham.

Two Poliomyelitis Vaccine Clinics were held in Durham during May and June and a total of 128 children in grades 1, 2, 3 and 4 were immunized.

The town continued to be provided with water and milk of good sanitary quality. Fluoridation of the Durham water supply was started in August 1955. This should eventually decrease the amount of dental caries in our Durham children by 60 per cent or more.

Restaurants, stores, and barbershops were inspected periodically to maintain satisfactory sanitary conditions and practices. Plans for sewage disposal systems for all new houses in Durham in areas not serviced by the town sewerage system were inspected and approved. Attention was given to various nuisances and problems referred to the Health Officer.

I am most grateful for the confidence the Selectmen have placed in me, and thankful for Town support during the past year. We have had many problems and with your help and the help of others, we have been able to cope with these problems.

With the new school under construction, classes for the lower grades being held in three areas, namely, Church Hill, New Hampshire Hall, and the Bank area respectively, a traffic and safety problem arose. With limited manpower we were most grateful for the aid given us by three Men's Honor Societies at U.N.H., namely, Senior Skulls, Blue Key and the Arnold Air Society. These young men, under the leadership of John Dodge, maintained a patrol at these three areas morning and noon from school opening in September until the new building was ready at the end of the year. I wish, at this time, to extend my personal thanks to them.

The outlying districts were patrolled, and from reports, the residents of these districts approve and appreciate this patrol which was established last year.

More students at U.N.H. have cars this year, thus more traffic on our streets. Signs have been renewed wherever necessary and many new signs have been erected. Night parking regulations

have been strictly enforced. In a few instances, we have had to take drastic measures, but in general the public realizes that regulations are made for the benefit of the majority and are cooperating.

The "Marston" fire on November 29, 1955, once again brought forth the need for a By-Pass to direct traffic around town.

Our civil defense police officers have been contacted and a period of training will get underway as soon as possible.

In November, I attended a conference on "Bank Robbery." This was held in Manchester, N. H., and was found to be educational. It was well attended by law enforcement officials and bank officials throughout the area. This conference, one of four held in the eastern part of our country, was conducted by the F.B.I.

With the Portsmouth Air Base now a reality, we will be confronted with more problems. We will have to enlarge our department personnel. We will need to maintain a night patrol, and with increased traffic another officer will be needed for day work.

We should have money appropriated for the purchase of a radio to tie in with the State Police.

We will also need a police cruiser, preferably with ambulance facilities. We should be looking forward to our own headquarters. We must remember that Durham is growing and we must grow along with Durham.

I wish to acknowledge the assistance given our department by the F.B.I., State Police, and Motor Vehicle Department during the past year. I also wish to thank the U.N.H. officials who have assisted in any way.

REPORT OF THE HAMILTON SMITH LIBRARY

The past year has cast a long shadow ahead for the Library. On last October 1 Durham could boast 1,110 residents 18 years of age or younger. By January 20, fifteen additional births had been recorded. Of these 1,125 youngsters, 690 are of school age and actual or potential users of the Library. In addition, many of the 425 preschool children enjoy library books through the enthusiasm of their parents or of older children.

The librarian is happy to report that the young fry's use of the Library this year has increased noticeably. The high school now an actuality in Durham and the growing population of children (and their parents) have naturally contributed to this increase. More individual children request reference help. Increasingly groups are scheduled for talks on how to use the library. More help is sought in selection of books for pleasure reading.

It is highly desirable that this use be encouraged and even accelerated. Today, when the problem of juvenile delinquency is flaming across the country, it is well to stimulate in every way possible the normal growth and interests of the young people. Good books are a recognized medium to richer and happier lives.

Young folk, like adults, should be able to get service whenever they request it. Of course, as in the bank or the grocery, they will have to wait their turn if they come at a busy period. The Library, like the bank and the grocery, should have a staff adequate for the ordinary run of business. To this end, it should have one staff member whose training and whose first responsibility is work with children. Parents have been suggesting for years that such a person be hired. They need help in selecting books for children of various ages, for specific problems, for the project of the moment; they request books to supplement school studies, and suitable books for reading aloud (which, incidentally, the whole family can enjoy together). Even more, of course, do the children need such help. A librarian in the children's

room would come to know the children, their interests, their reading abilities; she could unlock the riches that are theirs by right, but to which they need the key. Such service cannot be given adequately when sandwiched as it must necessarily be at present between services to University personnel and other adults.

It should perhaps be pointed out anew that Durham's annual library appropriation has in the last fifty years run the gamut between \$25.00 and \$500.00. What has Durham received this year in the way of library service for \$500.00? A library building open 83 hours a week during the school year, and six days a week (45 hours) during vacations. An exhibition gallery, with constantly changing exhibits. A collection of now more than 230,000 books, and access to 1,381 magazines and sixteen daily papers. A reference collection ranging from the latest encyclopedias through Moody's investment services to literary bibliographies and technical handbooks. Trained reference librarians to help with individual problems other than contest questions and to introduce groups to the library and its tools. An unusually good children's collection, from which teachers have been encouraged to borrow generously for classroom use. A pleasant children's room. Exactly the same privileges for Durham town-folk as for University personnel.

Now what has that \$500.00 *paid for*? A small number of popular magazines to which the Library would not otherwise subscribe. Purchase of 174 children's books — not the selection, or the care, or the housing, or the cleaning, or the rebinding, just the initial purchase price. Nothing more.

The question to be decided in 1956 is whether Durham voters want improved service for their children.
