#### RECORD OF TOWN MEETING

The Annual Town Meeting of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire, was called to order Tuesday, March 13, 2007 at 11:00 AM by Moderator Richard R. Houghton. The polls were declared open and the following Ballot Clerks were sworn in by the Moderator:

Diane Hodgson Mary Ellen Duffy Melissa Walker Jill Leavenworth

Moderator Houghton convened the meeting at 7:00 PM. He asked the assembled citizens (approximately 90) to stand for a moment of silence for those Madbury people who died during the year 2006 and to remain standing for the Pledge of Allegiance led by Town Clerk Pamela A. Seaver.

Those citizens deceased in 2006 include: Mary Barton, Wesley Ross, Raquel Lima, Lera Brown, Ruth Abbott, Grafton Kennedy, Avery Kennedy, Joan Schreiber and Emma Downs.

Moderator Houghton said he tried to find some minutes of past town meetings but was unable to find anything really interesting. Instead he decided to read from an 1888 Madbury School Report about the expectations for all of Madbury's school age children "in these times of sharp competition and labor troubles." 2007 is the 253<sup>rd</sup> year of Madbury citizens coming together to discuss and vote on matters important to them and the 240<sup>th</sup> actual Town Meeting. (Madbury did not receive full Town privileges until 1768.)

AMENDMENT NO. 4 as recommended by the Planning Board to delete old and add new, updated language and clarification to Article VIII, Sections 1 and 3. Sand and Gravel Excavation (previously named Madbury Sand and Gravel Regulations).

Yes-226 No-31 PASSED

AMENDMENT NO. 5 as recommended by the Planning Board to adjust Article VI of the Building Regulations by deleting Sections E, F and G and by adding alternate Section E, which will read:

The Madbury Board of Selectmen shall establish procedures and appoint qualified individuals to inspect and certify that the Sewage Disposal System installation complies with design. The Town shall in no way be liable if the system does not function properly.

J. An ice cream and sandwich shop which is attached to or part of a dwelling or farm and comprises no more than one-third of the gross floor area of all buildings on the lot is permitted in this District

ARTICLE 4. Robert Houston moved and Alfred Grimes seconded a motion to authorize the Selectmen to choose all other Town Officers. No discussion. Vote was taken.

PASSED

**ARTICLE 5.** Joseph Moriarty moved and Barbara Houston seconded a motion to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,065,728.00 for general municipal operations. This operating budget warrant article does NOT include appropriations contained in any other warrant articles.

No discussion. A vote was taken.

PASSED

**ARTICLE 6.** Joan Sundberg moved and Roberta Stearns seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) for the existing Capital Reserve Fund created in Article 9 at the 2000 Town Meeting for the purpose of Purchase of Property and/or Easements. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

No questions or discussion. A vote was taken.

PASSED

ARTICLE 7. Peggy Wolcott moved and Janet Wall seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for the existing Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 9 at the 2002 Town Meeting for a Library Building Fund.

No questions. No discussion. A vote was taken.

PASSED

ARTICLE 8. Jim Davis moved and Alfred Grimes seconded a motion to raise and appropriate Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) for the existing Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 8 at the 1994 Town Meeting for the purchase of a fire truck. Assistant Fire Chief Jim Davis said there is currently \$941.00 in this Capital Reserve Fund. Most of this Fund was spent in 2005 when Madbury purchased a new truck. The Department now needs a new Utility Truck and in four (4) more years we will need a new Pumper.

There were no questions. A vote was taken.

**PASSED** 

**ARTICLE 9.** Eric Fiegenbaum moved and Peggy Wolcott seconded a motion to vote the retention of the unexpended portion of the 2007 Conservation Commission appropriation, said monies to be placed in the Madbury Conservation Fund.

No discussion or questions. A vote was taken.

**PASSED** 

**ARTICLE 10.** Joan Sundberg moved and Roberta Stearns seconded a motion to discontinue the following Capital Reserve Funds: Transfer Station Capital Reserve Fund established 3/14/1995, Property Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund established 12/20/2000, and the Town Hall Expansion Capital Reserve Fund established 12/17/2004. These funds have a zero balance and no funds will be transferred to the general fund.

Selectperson Joan Sundberg explained that this is a housekeeping article. Voters need to take an official vote to take these Funds off the Town books

With no questions or further discussion a vote was taken.

**PASSED** 

ARTICLE 11. Peter Leavenworth moved and Barbara Houston seconded a motion to vote on the Article presented by Petition of 25 registered voters. The Petition reads: To see if the town will go on record in support of effective actions by the President and the Congress to address the issue of climate change which is increasingly harmful to the environment and economy of New Hampshire and to the future well being of the people of Madbury. These actions to include:

- 1. Establishment of a national program requiring reductions of U.S. greenhouse gas emissions while protecting the U.S. economy
- Creation of a major national research initiative to foster rapid development of sustainable energy technologies thereby stimulating new jobs and investment

In addition, the Town of Madbury encourages NH citizens to work for emission reductions within their communities, and we ask our Selectmen to consider the appointment of a voluntary energy committee to recommend local steps to save energy and reduce emissions.

The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the NH Congressional Delegation, to the President of the US, and to declared candidates for those offices.

Bill Trumble spoke to clarifying this request by asking the President and Congress to carry through on already-formed programs.

Peter and Jill Leavenworth offered to work on a local energy committee.

No further discussion. A vote was taken.

ARTICLE 12. Eric Fiegenbaum reported on the Water Resource Board's water testing program. The owners of the 54 wells that were tested in the fall have received their results. A summary of the results will be available for all citizens at the Board's information table on Madbury Day. They will also have available results of earlier tests that were done for a baseline. Eric said that the DES and EPA recommend having household wells tested every 3 to 5 years

ARTICLE 13. Selectman Bruce Hodsdon introduced Blaine Cox, Oyster River School District's business administrator, who wished to present to Madbury voters the possibility of the school district leasing some of Madbury's recreation land for about 10 years. He proposed leasing a portion of the Tibbetts Field along Route 155, creating/ completing a softball and baseball field and parking area, using it for ten years and then returning it to the Town. All of this hinged on the passing of an Article on the ORSD ballot to bond the funding of athletic fields. Hodsdon assured everyone that there would be plenty of opportunity for questions and comments at public hearings if this idea were to be pursued.

Betsey Renshaw asked for a new outside bulletin board. Joan Sundberg assured her it was in the works and should be ready soon.

Alfred Grimes praised this year's Annual Town Report. He especially liked the color photos on the covers. Moderator Houghton told him that Craig Seaver was responsible for designing and editing the Report. There was a round of applause for Craig who was sick and not able to attend the meeting.

Noreen Gaetjens reminded everyone that Town Clean Up Week would be the week of April  $22^{nd}$  this year. Trash bags are available at the Town Hall.

At 7:50 PM Moderator Houghton declared the polls for voting on the Town and School official ballots would be open for ten more minutes and the meeting would adjourn promptly at 8:00 PM to count ballots on Articles 1, 2 and 3. Meeting officially adjourned at 8:50 PM.

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#### RECORD OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING DECEMBER 11, 2007

A Special Town Meeting of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire was authorized by Order of the New Hampshire Superior Court for Strafford County, dated November 21, 2007. The meeting was called to order Tuesday, December 11, 2007 at 7:00PM by Moderator Richard R. Houghton. The polls were declared open and the following Ballot Clerks were sworn in by the Moderator:

Diane Hodgson Mary Ellen Duffy Melissa Walker Jill Leavenworth

ARTICLE 1. Selectman Joseph Moriarty moved and Karen Larson seconded a motion to see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$200,000 for the purpose of funding the Town's acquisition of conservation easements on the Hayes Family Farm on Mill Hill Road, and the Roselawn Farm located on Perkins Road, before year's end, to take advantage of favorable tax laws which will change after year's end, and to authorize the Selectmen to expend \$100,000 from Town surplus and to borrow up to \$100,000 from Town surplus, or a lending institution, with a commitment to repay said sum within two years to cover said appropriation.

Selectman Bruce Hodsdon introduced Madbury Conservation Commission Chair Eric Fiegenbaum to speak to the motion and answer any questions from the floor. Eric gave a comprehensive overview of the properties involved. He explained what impact the easements will have on the property owners and the Town, what activities will and will not be allowed on the easements, and what other revenue sources will help secure the easements.

Hodsdon explained how the Board of Selectmen was expecting to fund this project. The actual cost of the two conservation easements is approximately two and a quarter million dollars. Madbury's share AFTER the landowners' donations, the Town of Durham's share and the Federal Government's Farm and Ranch Land Grant is \$750,000. Toward that total the Madbury Conservation Fund will contribute \$450,000; \$100,000 will come from the Capital Reserve Fund set up for the Purchase of Property and/or Easements; \$100,000 will come from Town surplus and the last \$100,000 will be borrowed in increments of \$50,000 per year for two years.

Janet Wall thanked the Conservation Commission, Eric Fiegenbaum for his strong leadership, the Board of Selectmen, and the Hayes and Gangwer families for making these easements possible.

Planning Board Chair Bob Sterndale urged all voters to support the Article. "This is a fantastic opportunity and we don't want to miss it."

Sandra Straus spoke in favor of the Article. "Environmentally this is a good deal."

After very few questions Moderator Houghton called for YES/NO paper ballots to be cast.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:00 PM and the ballots were counted.

#### BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Joan Sundberg was re-elected to the Board of Selectmen at the 2007 Town Meeting. Following Town Meeting, Bruce Hodsdon was elected Chair. Committee assignments for the 2007 term were made. In addition to serving as chair, Bruce Hodsdon continued as the Welfare official, and was appointed as ex officio member to the Recreation Commission. Joan Sundberg continued to represent the Town at the Southern Strafford Community Health Coalition, and served as ex officio member of the Water Resources Board. She also assisted with representation to the McGregor Memorial Ambulance Corps and with Welfare. Jay Moriarty continued as the Town's representative to the Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative, and was the ex officio representative to the Planning Board. He also continued as the Road Agent, and supervised the Transfer Station, as well as providing representation to the Ambulance Corps.

The Board of Selectmen made several personnel changes in 2007. Joseph McGann was appointed Acting Chief of Police in July, and became Chief of Police in October. Mark Morong was hired as Building Inspector in November. The Board is currently in the process of replacing their long-time assistant, Diane Hodgson, and expects to have her successor in place before Town Meeting in March.

In other business, the Board was involved in the purchase of the easement on the Hayes property on Mill Hill Rd, which was finalized in January, after a Special Town Meeting held in December to obtain approval for financing. Approval was also given for funding to purchase an easement on Gangwer land located on Perkins Rd, but the purchase of the easement on this property has not yet been finalized. The Board also participated, with Lee and Durham, on committees formed by the Oyster River School Board to consider the future direction of the District in the areas of the School Funding Formula, Recreation and Playing Fields, and School Budget.

The Board continues to monitor proposed changes by the City of Portsmouth at the dam on the Bellamy Reservoir and their water processing plant on Freshet Rd. Also being monitored is a proposal by Pruven Aggregates to withdraw water from the Bellamy River at its site on Pudding Hill Rd and ship it to a bottling plant. A reprise of water issues would not be complete without mention of the Board's perpetual struggle with beavers, who manage to flood portions of the community every year. This year there were problems on Moharimet Drive, Madbury Road, Sarah Paul Hill, and Cherry Lane.

#### PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board has concluded proceedings on four subdivisions during 2007 adding a total of 10 new house lots to the town. Three or four of these new lots are to be committed to farmland protection, precluding their development, when easements sought by the Town are finalized. It has been a relatively slow growth year.

The Board's time has been dominated by the extensive hearing and review process associated with the Redimix Company's Site Review application for their proposal to convert an asphalt plant on Route 9 to a concrete batch plant. The proposal has raised numerous technical and legal issues. The Board has devoted a great deal of time to understanding the real impacts of the proposed use and to clarifying the legal issues involved before making decisions. That process continues.

Our heavy schedule of hearings has precluded work on ordinances this year so Madbury's voters will not see zoning ordinance changes on this year's ballot. Intense scrutiny of various legal issues this year has produced a list of items needing clarification or strengthening in our ordinances. We look forward to addressing these ordinance issues when we find some relief from our busy hearing schedule. We hope to have ordinance improvements on next year's ballot.

The Board did make time to review the concept of commercial uses in the Route 9 corridor with its Planning Consultant. The Consultant did not see any benefit to the Town in establishing a special zone along Route 9. She did educate us about a three-tiered system of permitting and regulating commercial uses that has been implemented in Peterborough. For Madbury, this might be seen as an expansion of our existing home occupation provisions that would provide more intensive review, permitting, and oversight for larger-scale commercial uses. This has been a discussion item only. No ordinance changes are contemplated at this time.

This year Planning Board operations have required significant legal and clerical support. Budgeted support for these services is essential to the operation of the volunteer Board and greatly appreciated by the Board members, especially the chairman who would be hard pressed to meet obligations without it.

We are also indebted to Eric Fiegenbaum for his regular and diligent advocacy for conservation issues and certainly for his work in securing protective easements on important properties in Madbury.

The Board has a vacancy, no experience required. Please contact the Selectmen if you would like to contribute some time and energy to this essential town function.

### MADBURY PUBLIC LIBRARY

2007 was a year of both new beginnings and continuity for the MPL. In January came on board as your new library director; we hired a children's librarian to work five hours a week; the Library went wireless so that our patrons can work on their laptops; new families registered for library cards and newcomers attended story time; a reading room/ youth room took over one of the back rooms; and patrons downloaded audio books to CD or MP3 players from the comfort of their own living rooms. Mixed in with the new were some wonderful constants: Liz Burbank, Assistant Librarian, working here five hours a week; the very supportive Friends of the Library group; a dedicated Board of Trustees; and patrons who always come through the door, smiles on their faces, looking for the newest novel, submitting interlibrary loan requests or bringing their children to pick out great books or to attend a story time. None of the above can be truly reflected in our 2007 statistics.

Connors' Picturing Writing Camp," marked its 4th year with a new name honoring the life and memory of this respected Madbury resident. Instructor Renee Torr had a full group, 12 young writers and illustrators. I think Bob would have loved their work.

Our Summer Reading Program theme was "Reading Road Trip USA. This year 6 teens and 15 adults gave reading miles to the 35 children who completed the Road Trip. Along the way we enjoyed several programs:

### Groups which use our meeting space include:

- The Madbury Quilting Group which meets on the first and third Monday of each month. The group has expanded to include people involved in any type of hand craft and meets from 6:30 to 8 p.m.
- MadLee Knitting which meets to knit for a variety of organizations while sharing knitting tips once a month
- Our lively Book Group meets to discuss books once a month. In addition to its monthly readings and discussions, the Book Group participated in New Hampshire Public Radio's Granite State Stories.
- We were delighted to be able to provide space for the Moharimet Mitten

Board's community outreach program, giving volunteers a place to store, wrap and deliver gifts prior to the Holidays. Over a dozen volunteers were here at the library sharing their time and effort in the season of good will.

**Grants:** your library does not operate only on tax dollars, volunteer services, and donations. In 2007 grants enriched both our collection and our programs.

- NH Humanities Council Grant. Professor David Mackey as part of the Big Read: NH Reads Fahrenheit 451. His talk was "Surveillance in the Post 9-11 World."
- We participated in the National Endowment for the Arts grant which provided the books for the Big Read.
- A Libri Foundation grant bought us over a thousand dollars worth of new books for toddlers to teens.
- Kids, Books and the Arts 2007 Grant allowed us to bring magician Peter Boie to Madbury with a wonderful show of magic and illusion.
- The Friends of the Madbury Library gave financial support to many of our programs, especially the Summer Reading Program and the Annual Bob Connors' Picturing Writing Camp. When you join the Friends, make a donation, or buy books at their sales your money goes a long way to enriching programs here at the library.

ORMS Energy Audit: Members of Oyster River Middle School's Hybrid Heros (they left out the E to save energy!) and their teacher Al Stuart conducted an energy efficiency study of the Library building, cellar to ceiling. The audit included a blower door test and a digital imaging test. Several weeks later the students reported their findings to the Library Board of Trustees. They suggested



several immediate improvements to reduce energy loss throughout the building.

The students also made a scale model of the library, complete with red arrows pointing to energy deficiencies. The model will be on view at the library when the students have completed their work. The Hybrid Heros went on to win first in the UNH 2007 First Lego League Regional Tournament Power Puzzle competition, using their presentation of the Madbury Library energy audit findings and solutions.

Our generous donors are too numerous to mention. Indeed many of them remain anonymous. Most of our periodical subscriptions are donated to the library.

New this year was a subscription to the *Atlantic Monthly*. Many books, DVDs and Audio books which are in our collections were donations. Children noticing gaps in our collection found innovative ways to help us (see photo of Felicia Ayer, right), as others have done in years past. Our collection has an estimated value of \$144,704.01!

### CONSERVATION COMMISSION

onservation Easements (CE) dominated the work of the Madbury Conservation Commission in 2007. While the Commission has ongoing discussions regarding properties and granting opportunities, we focused our efforts on two properties this year. In January, we entered into discussions with the Hayes family who offered to place a conservation easement on their Mill Hill Road property. The 90 acre property abuts the UNH Kingman Farm and has three



assembled. The outcome of the Roselawn CE awaits the Federal grant review process. The Hayes Farm CE was signed on December 28, 2007. The Town is grateful to these property owners who offered significant donations of easement

quarters of a mile of frontage along the Bellamy River. A proposed subdivision on a portion of the Gangwer's Roselawn Farm on Perkins Road brought together a group of concerned citizens and land protection specialists from UNH Extension. The 60 acre portion south of Perkins Road crosses over the Town border into Durham, and contains significantly important farmland soils. With the help of an appraisal provided by neighbors, the Commission contracted with a local land protection consultant to apply for a USDA Farm and Ranchland Protection Program grant. Ultimately, funding from the USDA, Madbury, and Durham was value. The Commission is indebted to the Selectmen, and the Town Office staff for their support, and to the residents of Madbury for turning out for a Special Town Meeting to show overwhelming support for these projects.

The Commission completed its Moose Plate grant tasks by joining with the Southern NH Chapter of the New England Mountain Biking Association to relocate a portion of trail and build six sections of boardwalk over wet areas on the trails behind Town Hall. We also updated the kiosk behind Town Hall with a new trails map (available for downloading at the Town website). Thanks to Dave Field (from Dover) who helped make nature trail posts and provided a beautiful wood-burned map for the trail head.

Under the category of regular duties and activities, we reviewed NH wetland permit applications and provided comment and advice to citizens and the Planning Board on proposed projects within Town. We conducted our yearly monitoring of three existing conservation easements, reported a Shoreland Protection violation to the Selectmen, and provided information to the State Department of Environmental Services when drilling under the Bellamy River for a biogas pipeline accidentally released clay into the River.

As always, we encourage town residents to bring us their concerns, comments and ideas by letter, email, or attendance at our meetings. We meet on the fourth Monday of the month at 7:00 pm in the Town Hall.

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### WATER RESOURCES BOARD

The Madbury Water Resources Board is charged with the stewardship of water resources within the Town to the benefit of its citizens and the environment. The Board concerns itself with issues of water quality, quantity, rights, and usage while recognizing these issues go beyond town boundaries and involve complex regional relationships and concerns. Its program is based on recommendations in the Madbury Master Plan.

The Board followed and responded to a number of water related issues this year. Applications before the Planning Board regarding the siting of a concrete batch

plant and expansion campground were of interest because of their proximity aquifers and surface waters. An inquiry to draw water from the Bellamy River in Dover for sale drinking bulk water elicited a letter from the Selectmen remind parties that the Town has water rights associated with the Hicks Hill water system which used supply the greenhouses. The Board expressed concerns over possible

shoreland protection violation on the Bellamy River; and followed the spill and subsequent cleanup of bentonite clay during the drilling for the UNH biogas pipeline under the Bellamy River.

The Board continued to address plans to make the Hicks Hill water system fully functional. A segment of pipeline, as it runs under SR 155, was installed due to concerns from the reconstruction of the railroad bridge. There was preliminary contact with some consultants, and more information about the system and its current state was collected. The Board put forth to the Selectmen the recommendation that a capital reserve account be established to fund repairs and maintenance of the system.

Members of the Board attended water related conferences and workshops. Information on private well and septic maintenance along with information about

arsenic in groundwater were displayed at Madbury Day. At the Annual Town Meeting, the Board gave a summary report on last year's town-wide well water testing.

The Board meets on the last Tuesday of the month at 7:00 pm, and interested residents are invited to attend and participate in the discussions.

- Officer Jared Welman, who came to us from the Lee, N.H. Department. Both Moors and Welman are full-time certified officers in the State of New Hampshire.

Officers Jonathan March, Kimberly Arvanitis, Bronwyn Leto and Erik Rappolt completed the 100-hour Part-Time Police Academy during the Spring Session. All did very well with their training, and I am very proud of them. The men and women of the Madbury Police Department are committed to serving the residents of Madbury with the highest level of professionalism.

We continue our training with the University Police Department at no cost, and we also continue our working relationship with the Strafford County Attorney's Domestic Violence Unit. Domestic violence does occur in Madbury and our well-trained officers are committed to providing professional service to all victims.

### CHIEF GEORGE E. TAYLOR

Chief George E. Taylor was appointed Chief of Police for the Town of Madbury in 1976 and held that position until June of 2007.

When Chief Taylor started his tenure, he used his own car. There were no uniforms nor portable radios. He worked out of his house and was responsible for policing the town and taking callouts at night. He worked on a voluntary basis and was away from home for many hours.



As the years went by, he was responsible for hiring professional officers who worked part-time. He was eventually successful in providing uniforms, radios, and a marked cruiser for the use of his men.

Chief Taylor moved his operations from his home to the small room off the meeting room at the Town Hall. This room, in turn, became the Town Library when the town purchased the property at 9 Town Hall Road for the use of the Police Department.

The Chief volunteered in "gutting out" the building and converting it into Madbury's first police station. He provided materials at no cost to the town, utilizing them in this building.

In 2000 the Selectmen, along with the Fire Chief and the Police Chief, began planning for the new Safety Complex. Chief Taylor was instrumental in planning and laying out the police side of the facility, assuring that it would meet national accreditation standards. Also in 2000, he was responsible for the hiring of Madbury's first full-time officer.

Chief Taylor strove over thirty years to maintain a caring, professional agency that would better serve the community of Madbury. He had a simple philosophy: "BE A PEACE OFFICER FIRST, AND A POLICE OFFICER SECOND, AND ALWAYS TREAT PEOPLE THE WAY YOU WANT TO BE TREATED." He set the standard for what a "small town" police chief should be.

### FIRE DEPARTMENT

2007 was a busy year for the Madbury Fire Department, not only in call volume, but also in other activities. We have 34 volunteers on the roster, most of whom are very active in the organization. This fall marked the beginning of our 60th year, the department having been formed in the Fall of 1947 by a group of concerned community members following several severe forest fires that hit New England. The founders included Carl Wentworth and John "Bud" Shevenall, two of our surviving Charter Members, along with Jim Colprit (30 years as Chief), Col. Putney, John Elliot, Dan Hoyt, and Ken Morrow just to name a few.

Over the years many more committed much time and effort toward the building of the Madbury Fire Department; I wish I was able to mention them all. We remember Don Begley and Willie Sanders, who devoted so many hours, and are honored that many longtime members still participate in our organization: Al Grimes, Bob Hodgson (47 years each), Ken Wolcott (45 yrs, 20 years as Chief), Arthur Anderson (29 years, 2 as Chief), and David Raynes (29 years). These members did a great deal with very little, usually buying only what they couldn't build, find used or, do without.

Although times have changed, and rules and standards now dictate much of our operation, we do our best to follow the model that they set forward. In recent years we have been very successful in replacing old equipment, or adding new through state and federal grants, which allows us to provide better service with little tax impact to the residents of Madbury.

Over the course of the year, we completed a variety of training sessions. In March

we trained jointly with the Lee Fire Department in using our Cold Water Rescue suits. In the spring we completed commercial vehicle safety training, put on by NH Property Liability Trust. This training led to several more of our members receiving their Commercial Drivers License (CDL), the first step to becoming Operators of our larger vehicles.

In addition, many of our members attended training courses outside of regular department training. Andrew Clark, Chris Donnelly, Butch Dresser, and Eric Mancuso attended NH Firefighter 1 certification training. Artie Boutin, Chris Donnelly, Eric Mancuso, and Adam Melvin completed NH Firefighter 2 certification. Each of these programs requires over 100 hours of training to complete, and the commitment to complete them must be commended. Adam Melvin also completed the C2F2 career training program. Dana Smith attended the York County Fire Officers Training Weekend, and also attended a seminar at the National Fire Academy in Emmitsburg, Maryland.

In December we recognized Artie Boutin, Eric Jaeger and John Lavoie for 5 years of service. Ken Wolcott was recognized for 45 years of service, and Carl Wentworth for 60 years of service. John McCooey was named the 2007 Firefighter of the Year.

We always welcome community members who wish to get involved in our organization. I would like to thank all of the residents of Madbury for their continued support.

### STRAFFORD REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

Strafford Regional Planning Commission (SRPC), a political sub-division of the State of New Hampshire, serves in an advisory role to the Town of Madbury and seventeen other member communities. We provide professional planning services to help officials, boards and citizens manage growth and to facilitate regional collaborative efforts.

SRPC's professional staff offers a range of planning services in transportation, land use, conservation, natural resources, economic development, and geographic information systems (GIS) mapping and analysis. These services are available in customized modes to meet the diverse needs of the volunteers who are the foundation of communities. Our member communities also have access to additional SRPC educational resources including our website, workshops and forums, and personalized training.

SRPC conducted the following projects and initiatives for Madbury in 2007:

- Conducted a comprehensive GIS road inventory for all public and private roads, (23.14 miles @ \$160/mile for a total value of \$3702.40).
- Provided Regional Impact Review with public hearings for a Madbury site plan application.
- Developed an Environmental Assessment methodology for subdivision and site plan applications.
- Facilitated discussion with Town Boards and state agencies on the federal flood insurance program.
- Prepared Review and Evaluation of Madbury Master Plan, ordinances and regulations for Town boards.
- Created a large format standardized map set for the Planning Department.
- Created a comprehensive GIS land use data layer, identifying categories of land use.
- Developed a GIS road frontage annotation data layer to be used on the Town tax maps.

SRPC also provided the following services to Madbury and other municipalities in 2007 including:

- Established a Regional Impact Committee, which reviewed three developments determined by local Planning Boards to have potential regional impact.
- Coordinated communities' responses to the NH Ten Year Transportation Plan.
- Hosted a Riparian Buffer Workshop to help communities protect water quality.
- Updated the Regional Travel Demand Model for traffic modeling

- and air quality conformity
- Prepared Model Drinking Water for Protection of Surface Water Supply Areas Ordinance as part of the Innovative Land Use Planning Techniques. http://www.des.state.nh.us/REPP/ilupth/20070805\_ drinking water supply.doc
- Distributed New Hampshire Planning and Land Use Regulation books to all local land use boards.

### REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. 
Fire activity was very busy during the spring of the 2007, particularly late April into early May. As the forests and fields greened up in later May the fire danger decreased. However, a very dry late summer created very high fire danger again from August into September, with fire danger reaching very high on Labor Day weekend. Even with the dry conditions, the acreage burned was less than half that of 2006. The largest forest fire during the 2007 season burned approximately 26 acres on the side of Wantastiquet Mountain in Chesterfield during the month of May. Our statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers is credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2007 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. 


### Statistics

In 2007, McGregor responded to 103 calls in Madbury, a 45% increase from 2006, as well as to 996 calls in Durham and on the UNH campus, 335 calls in Lee, and 78 calls to other communities. For 2008, we are projecting approximately 1500 calls total.

CPR and First Aid Training

We are proud to be the largest provider of CPR training to the communities we

serve. In <u>2006</u> 250+ local CPR heroes were trained by McGregor, and in <u>2007</u> that figure rose to 700+ local CPR heroes.

These are *ordinary* people living and working in Durham, Lee, Madbury and UNH, who have learned to do an <u>extraordinary</u> thing—Save a Life.

### Advanced Life Support (ALS)

### 2007 Accomplishments

- On-Call Volunteer hours increased 25%: 15,000+ hours volunteered in 2007 (est.) and 12,000+ hours volunteered in 2006. This is the fundamental basis for our ability to deliver call coverage 24x7.
- High Performance: McGregor's availability is one of the best in the state, with McGregor's two front-line ambulances available 99.3% of the time (2006)
- Over 700 "Community CPR Heroes" Trained: McGregor EMS is the largest provider of CPR training to the local community, all done at low cost in partnership with Madbury, Lee and Durham public libraries.
- CPR Safe School Training and Certification Program: McGregor EMS began its CPR Safe program in 2006. Schools are certified as CPR Safe when they have one or more defibrillators (AEDs) available and have trained over 75% of their teachers and staff in CPR.

The following Oyster River schools are CPR Safe: Moharimet Elementary, Mastway Elementary, Oyster River Middle School.

McGregor EMS's CPR Safe program has been cited by the NH State Dept. of Education as a model for other schools.

McGregor purchased additional defibrillators for the schools using \$6,000 in community donations.

 Homeland Security Grant Award: McGregor received a Homeland Security Grant for new protective clothing, increasing readiness for both day-to-day and large scale emergencies. This grant saved taxpayers \$50,692.

We have applied for a \$38,000 grant to fund new communications equipment, and are hopeful that it will be awarded.

School Emergency Medical Equipment Maintenance Program: At no cost to
the schools, McGregor now maintains defibrillator and oxygen equipment at
the Oyster River schools. This program, together with the CPR Safe program,
saves the schools over \$5000 previously paid to a for-profit company.

- · Paramedic On-call Program: 24/7 on-call paramedic program was added to provide enhanced coverage to the community. A McGregor paramedic is available 98% of the time.
- Station Renovations: Extensive renovations of our station enhance operational readiness and help retain and attract volunteers. These renovationswere paid for with donations from the McGregor Building Fund, and McGregor volunteers donated hundreds of hours of labor.
- McGregor Institute of EMS "Committed to Excellence in EMS Education": among the largest centers of education for the EMS professional in the Seacoast. It offers low-cost CPR to the community, provides crucial education to EMS professionals living in the Seacoast and beyond, is financially self-sustaining, and reduces the cost of providing EMS coverage, saving our communities over \$40,000 per year.

The Great Bay Chapter is committed to fulfilling its mission of not only assisting all Madbury residents during a disaster, but through our health, safety, and prevention programs and courses, help them to be better prepared for any emergency or disiaster that may befall them in the future.

Our vital services are not duplicated by any other agency, and are free to everyone. As we receive no financial support from the federal, state, or county governments, or from national headquarters, we must rely on communities like Madbury to assist us. Therefore, we renew our application for financial support for our fiscal year of 2007-2008 and ask that you give us support with an \$800 grant.

Last year (July 2006-June 2007) the Chapter provided the following services:

- Disaster Relief: 49 disasters, 84 families, 175 people
- Blood Services: collection of 12,845 units of blood in 122 blood drives
- Health, Safety, and Community Services: 1 Madbury resident trained in lifesaving skills
- Armed Forces Emergency Services: assisted 180 military families; 1 in Madbury
- Volunteerism: Great Bay Chapter volunteers logged 40,815 hours last year at a cost saving of \$750,000 to the 40 cities and towns within its jurisdiction.
- After the 2007 Nor'easter flooding, we sheltered 97 residents, served 213 meals, distributed 170 clean-up kits, and helped 28 families get settled.

Our disaster fund is quite strained right now due to the flood-related services rendered. Your generous support helps us to continue all of the good work that we do. It is our hope that this year you might consider increasing your funding and if not, at least match what you did last year.
