TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of New London in the County of Merrimack, in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To hear reports of agents or auditors and the budget committee heretofore chosen and pass vote relating thereto.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$9,965 to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the observance of Memorial Day.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800 for the Town Library for the ensuing year.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,323 for street lighting for the ensuing year.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for cemetery purposes for the ensuing year.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500 for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year, \$300 of the appropriation to apply on the Hospital debt.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$7,000 for summer maintenance and \$2,500 for winter maintenance of highways, bridges and sidewalks and make appropriation of the same.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$457.05 and the State to give \$1,828.20 to be expended on Class V highways and make appropriation of the same.
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for Hydrant Service.
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 toward the expenses of a series of Band Concerts during the ensuing year.
13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800 to reimburse the Town for building the Degenring Road.
14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$82, balance due on new curtain.
15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$350 to construct a road to lot owned by Wayne Wheeler.
16. To see if the Town will vote to lay out and build a road to house constructed by Louise H. Shepard, approximate distance of 175 feet, and make appropriation of \$200 for same.
17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 to recondition the street extending from West Pleasant Street to its terminus by the property of Harry Barrett.
18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500 for the exchange of trucks and the purchase of a wing for the new Baker Snow Plow.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Board of Selectmen, in the name and on its behalf, to reconvey the real estate known as the Tracy Memorial Library to Jane A. Tracy on terms and conditions satisfactory to said Board, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 to extend the Sewer to the proposed street for Wayne Wheeler.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$250 for Police Patrol for houses closed through the winter.

22. To see what action the Town will take in regard to a resolution adopted by the General Court,—“Is it expedient to revise the constitution?”

23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.

24. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to discount on taxes.

25. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

TRACY MEMORIAL BUILDING

Librarian's Report

For the year ending September 30, 1936

With the coming of October 1936, Tracy Memorial Building completed its tenth year of service to the community. A glance at the records of the years shows a steady growth in the scope and character of its contribution. The tenth year has been no exception.

The usual organizations have held their regular meetings in the building: namely the Woman's Club, the Garden Club, the Hospital Aid, the Stamp Club and the Forum; while occasionally there have been meetings of the Civic Association, the 4-H Clubs, the King's Daughters, the Woman's Aid, Farm Bureau Dairy Groups and many committees of the various town organizations.

Among other uses of the building have been the use of the basement for moving pictures for the high school classes; and the use of basement, club room and hall by the various organizations for demonstrations, pageants and plays. Two parties were given as tributes of appreciation to the Superintendent of the New London Hospital and to one of the school teachers, both of whom were leaving town for other fields of activity. The piano pupils of Mrs. Almina K. Barton gave a recital in the hall. On the evening of July 18 the library presented Miss Mildred Messer in a song recital.

During the celebration of Four-Hundred Years of the English Bible a most interesting exhibit was arranged in the library. Besides many very old Bibles there were shown copies of the Bible in twelve different languages. Other exhibits during the year have been: Daguerreotypes, tints and silhouettes of local people, North American wild

flowers, Medicinal Herbs in water-colors, Nantucket the Far-Away Island, a scythe made by the New London Scythe Company in 1885-88, a collection of mummy cloths, a very tiny book, and several interesting dolls.

The Stamp Club had its Second Annual Exhibition in May. Great interest was shown. The club sent an exhibit of Canadian stamps and air-mail covers to the Keene Philatelic Exhibition.

The third year of the New London Forum proved conclusively the important place that organization now holds in the community. The meetings were divided into five groups: December—Current Events, January—Education, February—English, March—Science, and in April a group of panel discussions of Current Events.

Good Book Week was observed with the usual display of books in the Post Office window under the slogan "Reading for Fun". On an evening during the week Miss Dorothy Morse, R. N., of Sunapee, gave a most interesting talk on "A Nurse's Experiences in Chile and Brazil".

The Holiday Season was observed with appropriate decorations, a Christmas service, and New Year's Open House. There was a tree and program in the children's room, and the children of the fifth and sixth grades gave a very pretty play "The Littlest Shepherd" at the library. At the Open House colored motion pictures were shown by Mr. Herbert D. Swift.

During the early summer the building was repainted. The library was closed for the month of August, at which time the entire interior of the building was redecorated and a new heating system was established in the assembly hall. This system makes it possible to have the hall heated and available at all times, an improvement which is much appreciated.

About five hundred books were added during the year—two hundred and fifty of them by gift. Through the generosity of "A Graduate of Yale" and several other friends of the library a group of fifty exceptional books was included in this number. Mrs. Tracy's gifts included a beautiful edition of the complete plays of Eugene O'Neill and a seven-volume set of Childcraft. Other generous gifts of books were received from Mrs. Victor Cutter, Mrs. Christine Morey and the estate of the late Mrs. Francisco J. Manrique.

There have been changes in the staff during the year. On June first Miss Mildred Peaslee resigned. She is now in the reference department of the Carpenter Memorial Library at Manchester. Miss Lennie M. Messer was made assistant librarian with charge of the children's room. Miss Alice A. Todd was also added to the staff as assistant and has charge of all musical activities.

Collections of books have been sent frequently to the Elkins school, a service which is much appreciated. Books from the Traveling Library of the State Library Commission have been borrowed at various times for the use of the pupils of the town schools. From time to time books have been borrowed from the State Library for classes and individuals. A large number of gift books which were duplicates of those already on our shelves have been given to other libraries where they would be of service. Several of our books have been loaned to the Traveling Library for Rural Women.

REPORT OF THE NEW LONDON HOSPITAL AND NURSING ASSOCIATION

Looking over old reports of past secretaries, we find mention made of plans and specifications for an addition to the hospital which would include delivery room, X-ray room, dark room, nursery and an elevator shaft. At last our dream has been realized and we have all of these things, including excellent X-ray equipment valued at \$1,350, bought by Colby Junior College, housed by the hospital and used with the best interests of both in mind.

Contributions totaling nearly \$1,000 were received after letters were sent out requesting funds for the addition. Open House was held May 12th, that being National Hospital Day, and tea was served in the dining room.

Miss V. Geraldine Crowell of Exeter, N. H., took over the position of head nurse October 24th, 1935, replacing Miss Ellen Boyle whose resignation went into effect on that date.

Repairs to the extent of \$1,000 have been made during the past year, including a new hot water tank, and painting of the hospital building inside and out.

Tag Day netted over \$1,260 not including receipts brought in by entertainments given by various hotels and summer camps. Lake Sunapee Country Club gave \$229 toward the building fund.

The gift of a large instrument sterilizer in August fills a long felt want, the old one having been much too small.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the members of the New London School Board:

I herewith submit the annual report of the Superintendent of Schools.

School Work

The work of the school is going smoothly under the present efficient administration. We are emphasizing drill for mastery in the fundamental subjects. Although we may not attain perfection we feel that we are making progress. This is shown by standard tests, especially in the subject of reading. Typewriting is again offered as an additional non-credit subject and is still popular with the pupils. This year 15 pupils are starting typewriting and six are taking it for the second year. In response to some requests for an extension of commercial courses we are considering the addition of another teacher who would have charge of instruction in typewriting, junior business training, book-keeping, and possibly shorthand. Such an extra teacher would make it possible for the present teachers to give more courses in language. These are needed for those preparing for some colleges.

We appreciate having the services of Miss Alice Todd in music instruction this year. This is made possible by the thoughtful generosity of Mrs. Tracy. Miss Todd has charge of the high school boys' glee club, the girls' glee club, and grades 7 and 8. She gives piano lessons to 23 children at the Tracy Memorial Library. She also gives music instruction to the pupils of the Elkins School every afternoon except Friday. The music in the first six grades is in charge of Miss Ruth Mary Doe.

The 5th grade, in connection with its school work, has visited the Woolen Mill in Sunapee. The 5th and 6th grades listen every Friday afternoon to the musical programs given by Mr. Walter Damrosch which come over the NBC network.

Other Activities

The high school pupils participate in basketball, field hockey, and boxing. They appreciate having the use of the Town Hall since there is, of course, no school gymnasium. The school sponsors during the year several musical and dramatic programs. It is planned to enter some pupils in the State Prize Speaking Contest sponsored by the University of New Hampshire. Other pupils plan to enter the one-act play contest and probably the State Music Festival in the spring.

Hot lunches are served every noon to those pupils who need them. At present 37 children are receiving such lunches. The preparation and serving of these hot lunches are in charge of those pupils who are employed under the National Youth Administration. Two teachers are on duty at the Central School Building during the noon hour to supervise the pupils who do not go home to lunch.

Attendance

The per cent of attendance for 1935-36 was 95.38. This is an improvement over the per cent for the preceding year (93.79).

The total number of tardinesses last year decreased about 100 from the preceding year. We can make still further improvement in the matter of punctuality and should do so in the interest of establishing good habits in our children.

At the Elkins School Charles Morgan and Louise Morgan have had a perfect attendance record for the past four years.

Teachers' Meetings

Teachers' meetings are held every Friday afternoon at the Central School to discuss routine matters. Once a month there is a discussion of some professional subject. This year the teachers are studying character education with the purpose of formulating better ways of developing the correct attitudes and habits in the pupils. This study is being carried on in all the towns in this union.

Graduates

In the past four years there have been 26 pupils graduate from the New London High School. Ten of these have entered higher institutions of learning. None of these have failed in their college work and some have done excellent work. The University of New Hampshire attracts more of our graduates than any other one college. Our high school is approved by the State Board of Education and its graduates are, therefore, admitted on certificate to the state college and normal schools.

Finances

The total of the Budget for 1937-38 is less than the expenditures for last year and is nearly the same as the expected expenditures for this year. The appropriation needed is a little larger than the appropriation of last year owing to the fact that our anticipated balance this June will be smaller than the balance carried over last year.

The number of tuition pupils is practically the same as last year but the income will be larger this year because not as many tuition pupils are leaving this year.

I appreciate very much the cooperation always shown by the School Board and teachers. I want also to commend the janitors for their excellent service. A clean and comfortable building is essential for good school work and we appreciate having it.
