SELECTMEN'S REPORT

This past year has been a productive year for the Selectmen, thanks to the efforts of our very professional staff supervised by Joanne Dover, Administrative Assistant. The Board of Selectmen also experienced a change in leadership this past year. After serving as Chairman for an unprecedented six consecutive years, Tom Salatiello stepped down as Chairman, with Warren Lake succeeding him. We are fortunate Tom has continued to serve as a Selectmen, while also fulfilling his duties as a State Representative.

Three issues having important long-term implications for the Town, with which the Selectmen have been involved, are cable TV, the State mandated revaluation of all property in Town, and the continued use of the Solid Waste Facility.

Perhaps the most frequently asked question of the Selectmen this past year has been, "When are we going to get cable TV?". After receiving public input on the subject, the Selectmen awarded a new cable franchise to Community TV of Laconia to replace the previous franchise awarded to AMRAC Cable Company. The Selectmen were able to negotiate and receive a settlement amount of \$4500 from AMRAC under its performance bond for failure to complete its contract. We have recently been informed by Community TV that they expect to begin providing service to the Town this May, and hope to complete the task of installing cable in Town by September.

Revaluation of all properties in Town must be completed by 1993, in order to comply with the order of the State Board of Land and Tax Appeals. The Selectmen have confirmed the Town's commitment to have the State of New Hampshire conduct this revaluation. It is anticipated that this process will begin during the late summer or early fall. The State will have up to six personnel working in Town for a period of approximately five months to complete this work. We have been assured that every effort will be made to visit each property in Town, and to obtain access to all residences. There will be ample opportunity for citizens to meet with the State's appraisers to discuss their assessments. We are hopeful that this will be a smooth and successful process. The goal is to ensure that all properties are assessed accurately and fairly.

The future of the Town will also be dramatically affected by proposed changes at the Solid Waste Facility. At this time, it is expected that the Town will be required to close the existing landfill area in the fall of 1993, and to cap this area with an impermeable cover in 1994. The result will be that in 1993, the Town will need to develop alternative means of disposing of our household waste. Most likely, this will be to pay for the cost of transporting our waste to other facilities. The cost of closing the landfill and paying for disposal of our waste will become a

significant element in the 1993 and 1994 budgets.

Lastly, we wish to express our appreciation to the many volunteers who serve the Town in various capacities, and we wish to encourage all those with an interest in participating in community affairs to show their interest by attending public meetings and hearings held throughout the year. Individual commitment and involvement can make a difference in our community and in the quality of our local government. We welcome your suggestions and encourage your active involvement in Town affairs.

MINUTES OF THE 1991 TOWN MEETING' SANBORNTON, NH MARCH 13, 1991 LIFE/SAFETY BUILDING

In accordance with the Warrant for this Town Meeting, the Moderator, Ralph Sleeper, called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM. The results of the previous day's polling were read. With the premise that officers do not officially take office until the period for a recount has expired, the Moderator administered the oath of office to Guy J. Giunta Jr., Warren Lake, Edna Hansen, Judith Burlingame-Rich, Robert Stoecklin, Warren H. Wilson, Steve Maviglio, and Jean Auger as well as Mr. William Franks whom he appointed Moderator Pro Tem.

The Moderator recognized the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, Thomas Salatiello, who awarded the Boston Post Cane to Mr. Alphonse Auger who is 95 years old and the town's eldest resident. Mr. Salatiello noted that this cane is given as a token of the deep and profound respect of one generation for another.

Having set a few general rules for the conduct of the meeting, and having honored a vote to waive the reading of the warrant in full, the Moderator proceeded with the business meeting.

Article 1. Subject: General Business

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debt in anticipation of taxes in order to pay current maintenance and operation expenses and to insure a note or notes therefore; to administer any real estate acquired through Tax Collector's deeds; to apply for, accept and expend such grants, funds, and gifts as may be available to the Town from private sources and from other governmental agencies; and to accept the dedication of any street shown on a subdivision plat approved by the planning board, provided that such street has been constructed to applicable town specifications as determined by the Board of Selectmen or their agent.

Article #1 was accepted as read.

Article 2. Subject: Semi-Annual Tax Billing

To hear a report on semi-annual tax billing to the taxpayers of Sanbornton, as authorized by Article 29 at Town Meeting in March of 1990, and to see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to implement this fiscal policy beginning in July 1991, as recommended by the Budget Committee.

The article having been moved and seconded was opened for discussion. Mr. Brian Gallagher, a member of the budget committee, gave a report of their study of semi-annual tax billing and recommended

that due to the rising costs of borrowing, the town begin semiannual tax billing in July of 1991.

Article #2 was defeated.

Article 3. Subject: Library Trustees
To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38,749 and make the same available to the Library Trustees. Recommended by the Selectmen, not recommended by the Budget Committee.

Mr. Brian Gallagher offered an amendment to this article as follows: "To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$33,113 and make the same available to the Library trustees".

The proposed amendment to Article #3 failed.

Article #3 was accepted as read.

Article 4. Subject: Lakes Region Community Health Agency
To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,200 for
the Lakes Region Community Health Agency. Recommended by the Selectmen, not recommended by the Budget Committee.

Mrs. Judith B. Rich proposed the following amendment to Article #4: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3570 for the Lakes Region Community Health Agency, as recommended by the Budget Committee".

The proposed amendment to Article #4 failed.

Article #4 was accepted as read.

Article 5. Subject: Highway Maintenance
To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of
\$207,770 for the maintenance of highways and bridges, this sum to
include \$1,000 to use for repair of town bridges. Recommended by
the Selectmen, not recommended by the Budget Committee.

Article #5 was accepted as read.

Article 6. Subject: Highway Block Grant
To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of
\$60,358 to be received from the State for the Highway Block Grant
for the purpose of paving and resurfacing March Road, Osgood Road,
and Hermit Woods Road. Recommended by the Road Agent and by the
Selectmen.

Mr. Curtis Beaupre offered the following amendment for consideration:

"To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60,358 to be received from the State for Highway Block Grant for the purpose of resurfacing March Road and Hermit Woods Road, and to direct the Road Agent and others, as may be appointed by the Selectmen, to investigate the use of geotextiles and other appropriate technologies and techniques as an alternative to the paving of Town owned gravel roads."

The amendment was accepted.

Article #6 was accepted as amended.

Article 7. Subject: Police Department

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$152,160 for the purpose of operating the Sanbornton Police Department, said appropriation to be offset by \$10,000 of drug forfeiture funds acquired by the Town. Recommended by the Se-lectmen, not recommended by the Budget Committee.

Mrs. Judith B. Rich proposed the following amendment: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$151,836 for the purpose of operating the Sanbornton Police Department; said appropriation to be offset by \$10,000 of drug forfeiture funds acquired by the Town, as recommended by the Budget Committee."

The amendment was accepted.

Article #7 was accepted as amended.

Article B. Subject: Police Cruiser Purchase

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,500 for the purchase of a new police cruiser, this sum to be offset by the sale of the excess cruiser for \$2,750.

Article #8 was accepted as read.

Article 9. Subject: Capital Reserve Funds

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums of money of which:

\$10,000 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for Heavy Equipment;

\$37,000 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the Sanitary Landfill;

\$25,000 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for Revaluation;

\$2,000 is to be placed in the Town Bridges and Roads Capital Reserve Fund;

\$15,000 is to be placed in the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund;

and \$1,000 is to be placed in the Sanbornton Fire Department Repair and Refurbishing Capital Reserve Fund.

Mr. Larry Gibson offered the following amendment: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums of money of which:

\$2500 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the Development of a Town Recreation Park, in addition to those funds listed under Article 9" of the warrant.

This amendment was accepted.

Article #9 was accepted as amended.

Article 10. Subject: Sanitary Landfill
To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$45,648
for the landfill operating budget, \$8,145 of which is to be withdrawn from the Landfill Non-Lapsing Fund, a fund established by
vote of the Special Town Meeting on August 31, 1989.

Article #10 was accepted as read.

Article 11. Subject: Budget Committee Report
To hear the report of the Budget Committee and to pass any vote in relation thereto.

Mrs. Judith B. Rich reported that "The total appropriations figure of the 1991 budget (Line #71)", \$1,231,782, "has been amended by votes at this Town Meeting on the following articles:

Article #3 - Library + \$5636 Article #4 - LRCH + 630 Article #5 - Highway + 4365 Article #9 - Rec. Park + 2500

to \$1,244,913.

On behalf of the Budget Committee, Mrs. Judith B. Rich proposed the following motion: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,244,913 for the purpose of funding all Town operations and warrant articles as approved by the Town tonight, March 13, 1991."

Mr. Brian Gallagher noted that since semi-annual tax billing was not approved, the anticipated costs for interest expense on line #33 must be changed and offered the following amendment.

"The Budget Committee moves to amend Article #11, line #33, 'Interest Expense-Tax Anticipation Notes', by recommending an incre

ase of \$30,000 to budget for anticipated actual expenses resulting from borrowing on tax anticipated notes and further, to increase line #91, 'Interest on Deposits', by \$10,000."

This amendment was accepted.

In light of recent State legislation affecting the town's contribution to New Hampshire Retirement, Mr. Edwin P. LeBel made a motion to amend line #37 of the budget, "Retirement-All", to \$5000.

This second amendment failed.

Article #11 was <u>accepted as amended</u> by Mr. Gallagher. The total of all appropriations was \$1,274,913.

Article 12. Subject: Cemetery Committee
To see if the Town will vote to establish a committee for the
purpose of exploring the possibility of establishing a public
cemetery in the Town of Sanbornton (as required by RSA 289:1),
and to report its findings at the 1992 Town Meeting. The Cemetery
Committee is to be comprised of three members appointed by the
Selectmen.

Article #12 was accepted as read.

Article 13. Subject: Amendment to Solid Waste Ordinance To see if the Town will vote to amend the Solid Waste Ordinance which was adopted at the 1988 Town Meeting, to establish mandatory recycling as of June 1, 1991, to include plastics as a required recyclable, and to make certain technical corrections to the Ordinance.

Article #13 was accepted as read and printed below.

(NOTE: Words deleted have a line drawn through them. Items added are underlined.)

1991 PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE SOLID WASTE ORDINANCE

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town of Sanbornton Solid Waste Ordinance, as adopted at the 1988 Town Meeting, as follows:

- (1) Replace all references to "Landfill-Recycling Facility" or "Solid Waste/Recycling Facility" with "Solid Waste Facility".
- (2) Replace all references to "Landfill-Recycling Attendant" with "Facility Manager or their agent".

(3) Amend section 2 and section 3 as follows:

2. SEPARATION:

All material brought to the facility for disposal shall be separated into the following categories to be deposited in designated containers or locations as the Facility Manager or their agent directs: (Note: Items A through E shall be voluntary from Town Meeting 1988—1991 through Town Meeting 1989—June 1, 1991. The Facility Manager or their agent may accept additional categories or types of recyclables not specified below, on a voluntary basis.)

A. Clear Glass

Shall mean <u>rinsed</u> empty clear glass containers. No ceramics, window glass, or light bulbs. Labels do not have to be removed.

B. Green Glass
Shall mean <u>rinsed</u> empty green or blue glass containers. No ceramics, window glass, or light bulbs. Labels do not have to be removed.

C. Brown Glass

Shall mean <u>rinsed</u> empty brown glass containers. No ceramics, <u>window</u> glass or light bulbs. Labels do not have to be removed.

D. Metal Cans & Containers Shall mean rinsed empty tin or steel

or aluminum containers of a size one
gallon or smaller. Labels do not
have to be removed.

D-1. Aluminum Cans Shall mean rinsed empty aluminum containers.

D-2. Plastics Shall mean rinsed empty plastic contanners made of PET and HDPE resins.

E. Paper Shall mean all clean, dry paper, separated into the following two categories:

1. Newspapers

Corrugated paper, cardboard, and brown paper bags.

F. Large Metal Objects Shall mean scrap metal of all kinds, i.e., motor vehicle parts, pipe, wire, appliances, sheet metal, bed

springs, motors, tools, etc. The Facility Manager or agent shall have the right to refuse motor vehicle parts based on size of parts.

G. Tires Shall mean all tires removed from wheel or rim.

H. Leaves and Clippings Shall mean all lawn clippings, green and dry garden waste, and manure (to be dumped in mulch pile).

I. Tree Limbs and Brush

Shall mean all tree limbs and brush
not exceeding 12" in length 6" in
diameter (to be deposited in the
burn pile).

J. Building Material Shall mean the refuse from demolished buildings (the burnable shall be separated from non-burnable).

K. Used Motor Oil

By special arrangement only. Shall
mean only used crankcase oil in
closed plastic containers.

L. Bulky Items Shall mean couches, mattresses, and other large, non-metallic items.

M. Garbage Shall mean any other residential waste which is not listed above.

N. Industrial Waste Shall mean any waste from any process or industry, manufacturing, trade, or business. Any such waste not falling within the above categories, by special arrangement only.

3. UNACCEPTABLE MATERIALS

The following materials will not be acceptable at the Landfill-Recylcing Facility:

- A. Stumps, trees, and limbs greater than 18" in length.
- B. Harmful, hazardous, or toxic waste.

- C. Sludge or septic waste.
- D. Dead animals.
- E. Junk motor vehicles and boats.
- F. Any material which in the opinion of the Facility Manager or their agent constitutes a serious hazard to other users of the facility, to the property of the town, or to the operation of the Solid Waste Facility.
- (4) Amend Section 9 as follows:

9. TRESPASS:

The gate will be locked at all times when the Solid Waste Facility is not open to the public. Anyone entering the Solid Waste Facility when the gate is locked, without express permission, is guilty of trespass and shall be charged with violating the terms of the Ordinance.

Article 14. Subject: Basic 911 Emergency Service
To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to request
that New England Telephone Company conduct a study to determine
the feasibility and suitability of providing Basic 911 Emergency
Service to the residents of Sanbornton. (This study will be done
at no cost to the town.)

Article #14 was accepted as read.

Article 15. Subject: Fire Rescue Truck Sale

To see if the Town will vote to allow the Sanbornton Fire Department to sell the old Rescue Truck, which was purchased by the members of the Sanbornton Fire Department. The proceeds of said sale to be placed in the fund established by the members of the Sanbornton Fire Department, for the intent of replacing the present unit now in use.

Article # 15 was accepted as read.

Article 16. Subject: Excess Town Property
To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of excess town property through the state public auction process, or other means, if it is determined by the Board of Selectmen that such a method of disposal would be of greater advantage to the town. (Excess town property is currently sold at town auction on the first Saturdays in April and October.)

Article #16 was accepted as read.

Article 17. Subject: Cable TV Committee

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish a committee for the purpose of monitoring the provisions of the cable franchise agreement in effect with the town, receiving public input regarding cable services in the town, making recommendations to the Selectmen regarding enforcement of the terms of any cable franchise agreement in effect, and to act as agents designated by the Selectmen for such purposes as the Selectmen may direct. This committee is to be comprised of four members appointed by the Board of Selectmen for the term of one year.

Article #17 was accepted as read.

Article 18. Subject: Land Conveyance
To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey
the strip of old roadway along the westerly side of Burleigh Hill
Road to the abutting landowners.

Article #18 was accepted as read.

Article 19. Subject: Other Business
To transact such other business as may legally come before the Town Meeting.

State Representative, Steven Maviglio proposed a resolution as quoted below: "Resolved, that the Town of Sanbornton supports the inclusion of the Pemi River in the N.H. Rivers Management and Protection Program."

The resolution received the support of the assembly.

Special Town Meeting Sanbornton Town Hall December 16, 1991

The Town Meeting was called to order at 7:30 PM by the Moderator, Ralph Sleeper. The Moderator then appointed and administered the oath of office to the Assistant Moderator, Warren Wilson.

Article 1. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen as disbursing agents for the Capital Reserve Fund for Road-Bridge Reconstruction.

Once Article \$1 was read, Warren Lake, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, raised a point of order questioning whether the Moderator felt it appropriate to inform the legislative body that Article \$2 had been determined to be an inappropriate matter for this Special Town Meeting. Since the status of Article \$2 might effect the vote on the first article, the Moderator explained that a vote of this legislative body to withdraw funds from a Capital Reserve Fund would constitute an "appropriation". Unless voted by ballot by at least 1/2 of the number of legal voters on the checklist of the last annual or biennial election last preceding the Special Meeting, for action taken on any article of appropriation at a Special Town Meeting to be binding, authorization by the Superior Court is required. (RSA 31:5) Authorization had not been requested and therefore any action taken on Article \$2 would be moot.

Discussion of Article #1 followed.

Mr. Gallagher inquired if the acceptance of Article #1 would authorize an "appropriation" of Funds.

The Moderator responded that acceptance of Article #1 would authorized the Selectmen to act as disbursing agents so that they could immediately draw upon that Capital Reserve Fund at their discretion. No disbursing agent had been designated in the original warrant article. (Article #13 of the 1988 Warrant- Copy Attached) Rather the article noted that expenditures from this Capital Reserve Fund would require a vote of the Town.

Mr. Salatiello noted that it has been the philosophy of this Board of Selectmen to make expenditures from Capital Reserve Funds only in an emergency or following a vote at a Town Meeting even when the Selectmen have been designated disbursing agents.

Mr. Lake explained that there may not be enough money in the General Fund to cover the expenses of the emergency repairs to Plummer Road Bridge and Turkey Bridge on Johnson Road. Failure of this article could result in overspending the bottom line of the budget.

Article #1 was accepted as read by unanimous vote.

Article #2. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw \$6,316 from the Capital Reserve Fund for Road-Bridge Reconstruction to pay for emergency repair work to town bridges.

Article #2 was dismissed by unanimous vote.

Article #3 To transact such other business as may legally come before the Town Meeting.

No business was brought before the legislative body under this article.

The meeting was adjourned.

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Sanbornton Sanbornton, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements and the combining and individual fund financial statements of the Town of Sanbornton as of and for the year ended December 31, 1991, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Assets Account Group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

Also, in our opinion, the combining and individual fund financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of each of the individual funds of the Town as of December 31, 1991, and the results of operations of such funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sanbornton, on Tuesday, the tenth (10th) day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose all necessary District Officers for the Winnisquam Regional School District.
- 3. To vote on the following proposed amendments to the lown Zoning Ordinances:

Amendment No. 1

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment Number 1 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Restrict the present allowed use of land for airfields in the General Agricultural District and others, to permit only private, non-commercial airfields in these districts.?

Amendment No. 2

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment Number 2 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Zoning Ordinance Article XII to replace obsolete statutory references to state law (RSA 31 et. al.) with current correct references as recommended by Town Counsel?

Amendment No. 3

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment Number 3 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

1) Amend the definition of a "Building" to exclude unenclosed pervious materials installed at ground level from the definition;

2) Permit the expansion and/or construction of unroofed impervious ground cover within the 40 foot setback from the high water mark, not to exceed five percent (5%) or two-hundred (200) square feet of the setback area, whichever is less in the shorefront District?

Amendment No. 4

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment Number 4 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: Amend Zoning Ordinance Article XII.B(4)(e) to replace an obsolete reference to state law (RSA 149:8a) with the current correct reference (RSA 485-A 17)?

You are hereby notified to meet at the Sanbornton Life-Safety Building in said Sanbornton on Wednesday, the eleventh (11th) day of March next, at seven of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. Subject: General Business

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debt in anticipation of taxes in order to pay current maintenance and operation expenses and to insure a note or notes therefore; to administer any real estate acquired through Tax Collector's deeds; and to apply for, accept and expend such grants, funds, and gifts as may be available to the Town from private sources and from other governmental agencies; and to accept the dedication of any street shown on a subdivision plat approved by the planning board, provided that such street has been constructed to applicable town specifications as determined by the Board of Selectmen or their agent.

Article 2. Subject: Revaluation

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$63,600, and to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of \$42,493, plus interest, from the Capital Reserve for Revaluation for the purpose of revaluation of property effective April 1, 1993 (total revaluation cost is estimated at \$106,100).

Article 3. Subject: Library Trustees

To see if the town will vote to authorize the Sanbornton Public Library Trustees to apply for, accept, and expend without further action by the Town Meeting, money which may become available during the fiscal year from the state, federal or other governmental units. The article or item shall be used only for legal purposes for which a town may appropriate money; not require the expenditure of other town funds; and be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32, relative to limitations and expenditures of town funds.

Article 4. Subject: Highway Maintenance

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$210,770 for the maintenance of highways and bridges, this sum to include \$1,000 to use for the repair of town bridges.

Article 5. Subject: Highway Block Grant

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$62,126 to be received from the state highway block grant to pave portions of Usgood Road, and/or to reclaim already paved sections of Perkins Road, Cram Road, and Perley Hill Road.

Article 6. Subject: Fire Department

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38.262 for the operation of the Fire Department.

Article 7. Subject: Police Department

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$151,836 for the operation of the Police Department. Said appropriation to be offset by \$2,278 of drug forfeiture funds acquired by the town.

Article 8. Subject: Police Department 4-Wheel Drive Vehicle
To see if the town will vote to authorize the acquisition of a
third vehicle, a 4-wheel drive, for use by the Police Department.
(Action to acquire a vehicle in 1992 would require an amendment to
Article 9.)

Article 9. Subject: Police Department Cruiser

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,700 for the lease of a new police department cruiser, this sum to be offset by the sale of the excess cruiser for \$2,500.

Article 10. Subject: Capital Reserve Funds

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums of money of which:

\$10,000 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve for Heavy Equipment; and

\$37,000 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the Sanitary Landfill: and

\$2,000 is to be placed in the Town Bridges and Roads Capital Reserve Fund: and

\$15,000 to be placed in the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund; and

\$2,000 is to be placed in the Sanbornton Fire Department Repair and Refurbishing Capital Reserve Fund; and

\$500 is to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the Town Recreation Park.

Article 11. Subject: Sanitary Landfill

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$39,600 for the landfill operating budget, \$3,825 of which is to be withdrawn from the Landfill Non-Lapsing Fund, a fund established by vote of the Special Town Meeting on August 31, 1989.

Article 12. Subject: Household Hazardous Waste Collection
To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of
\$1,905 to contribute to a regional Household Hazardous Collection
Program. This program will allow for the proper disposal of
hazardous household products, such as paint, thinners, solvents,
pesticides and similar products.

Article 13. Subject: Surplus

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate from the December 31, 1991 general fund surplus the sum of \$6,316 to be added to the Road Bridge Reconstruction Capital Reserve Fund, previously established.

Article 14. Subject: Capital Reserve for Town Office Computer
To see if the town will vote to close the Capital Reserve Fund
established for the Town Office Computer and to authorize the
Selectmen to expend the balance (\$948, plus interest) for the
purchase of a desktop computer for use in the town offices.

Article 15. Subject: Timber Revenue

To see if the town will vote to authorize sales of timber and wood products from town-owned lands and the revenue from such sales to be placed in the general fund. Such sales to be administered by the Conservation Commission. (This is to modify action taken on Article 8 of the 1988 Warrant).

Article 16. Subject: Budget Committee Report
To hear the report of the Budget Committee and to pass any vote in relation thereto.

Article 17. Subject: Sale of Land

To see if the town will vote to approve the sale of a town lot along Route 132, known as Lot 10 of Map 8, to abutting land owners, Donald and Patricia Kelly and to grant an easement to allow the Kellys to install septic system piping under and across the Class VI public road separating the town lot from the Kellys' land. The sale price shall be at fair market value as determined by the town assessor for the time of sale. Proceeds shall be deposited in the general fund to offset taxes. Recommended by the Selectmen.

Article 18. Subject: Easement

To see if the town will vote to grant an easement to benefit land of Donald and Patricia Kelly for the purpose of installing an approved septic system on a town lot, known as Lot 10 of Map 8. Said easement to include the right to place septic system piping under the Class VI public road separating the town lot from the Kelly land.

Article 19. Subject: Petition Article

"To sell to William K. Foster and Roseamond R. Foster for one dollar or other valuable considerations a certain parcel of property belonging to the town of Sanbornton. Lot location approximately 1/4 mile south of the Conestoga Lodge on Route 132. Formerly Eastman property on Route 132 approximately 339 ft. on highway, elongate in shape, approximately 400 ft on abandoned road bordering land of Kelly, map 8 lot 4." Submitted by Petition.

Article 20. Subject: Other Business
To transact such other business as may legally come before the
Town Meeting.

Legal Debt Margin

According to State Law, Town borrowing (exclusive of those exceptions allowed under the provision of the Municipal Finance Act) may not exceed one and seventy-five hundredths percent (1.75%) of the valuation of property based upon the applicable locally assessed valuation of the municipality as last equalized by the Commissioner of Revenue Administration. At December 31, 1991, the Town of Sanbornton is using an equalized value of \$169,432,299 and a legal debt margin of \$2,965,065.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Sanbornton Fire Department responded to 211 calls for the year. There was a large increase in fire calls and a slight decrease in EMS calls. Although EMS runs were lower than last year, the severity of the calls increased. The department responded to six incidents that resulted in ten fatalities, five of which were motor vehicle accidents and one double drowning. Because of the nature and tragic results of those calls a stress management program was instituted. This program is designed to help members to cope with the stress that is a result of the trauma involved with the incident. This program has worked very well, and has been accepted wholeheartedly by the membership.

Training in both sections, fire suppression and EMS remain a high priority. Cross training of personnel and program updates are ongoing. Almost all of the members are now State Certified Firefighters and several are enrolled in EMS courses. Training consists of monthly department sessions, as well as outside schools and interdepartment training. Training programs cover basic skills and new methods related to the field, as well as use of equipment.

Many calls this year have been minor in nature due to the alertness of the people calling in an incident. Without that help, many would have developed into a serious and time consuming run. We would like to thank those people for their prompt action.

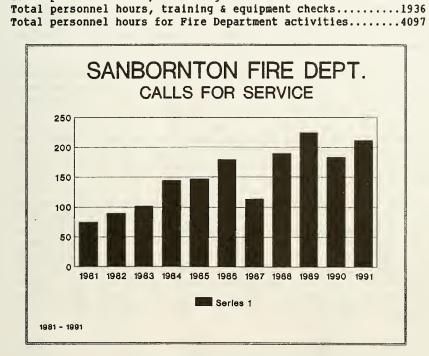

FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

The year 1991 was a very dry and busy year for the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service, as well as local fire departments, due to our increase in the number of fires. Our three major causes of fires in 1991 were non-permit, children, and smoking materials. The 450 wildland fires New Hampshire had last year burned approximately 150 acres, for an average fire size of one-third acre.

Primarily, the local fire department is responsible for extinguishing these fires. Keeping the average fire size this small is a tribute to early detection by citizens, our fire tower lookout system, and the quick response of our trained local fire departments.

In every municipality, there is a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens that are responsible for directing suppression action on wildland fires, working with other fire department members under the direction of the NH Forest Fire Service to make sure that all fire department members are properly trained and equipped for suppressing wildland fires. Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Wardens receive specialized training each year, presented by the NH Forest Fire Service, to keep their skill level and knowledge of forest fire laws up to date.

The local Warden and selected Deputy Wardens are also responsible for issuing burning permits for any open burning that is to be done in their community. In New Hampshire, any open burning, except when the ground is completely covered with snow, requires a written fire permit prior to lighting the fire. Before doing any open burning, it is recommended that you contact your local fire department to see if a permit is required and to save your community the cost of sending fire equipment on a false alarm. Any person violating the permit law (RSA 224:27) shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Please help your local Warden and fire department by requesting a fire permit before kindling a fire, be understanding if they tell you it is not a safe day to burn, and help keep New Hampshire green! Thank you for being fire safe.

The year 1991 has shown a 29% increase in calls for service over the previous year, and major crimes increased by 35%. These sharp increases can be attributed to the economic situation that we are all going through. Now, more than ever, we need your help by letting us know whenever you observe anything that appears to be criminal in nature, or out of the ordinary.

We are now in our second year of the Northfield, Sanbornton, and Tilton Crimeline, which has proven to be extremely helpful in dealing with the successful solutions of crimes. Any person may call the Crimeline, and their identity will never by known by anyone, including the police. If a person's information to the Crimeline results in an arrest or indictment of the responsible party, they may be eligible for a cash reward.

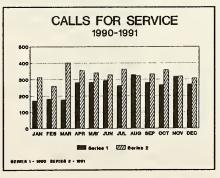

SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE REPORT

For the most part, residents are supportive of the Town's recycling efforts. Participation in recycling has increased during the year, and employees at the Recycling Center are busy sorting, crushing, baling, and shipping out recyclables. The Committee, however, has received complaints that some people are avoiding their responsibility to recycle and that it is discouraging to see recyclables in the landfill. The Committee is looking at ways to further educate Town residents on recycling, and to also examine methods of enforcing the mandatory recycling ordinance.

The landfill has a series of monitoring wells located around the trash burial area. They were installed to find out if any contamination of the groundwater is occurring. Unfortunately, samples taken from these wells indicate the presence of certain volatile organic compounds. These levels are higher than what is permissible, but not alarmingly high, nor unusual for a municipal landfill. The direction of the groundwater flow is away from any residential homes in the area.

The Town is in the process of developing a closure plan for the landfill, with the assistance of the engineering firm of Dufresne-Henry. The State as well as the Committee is concerned about this groundwater contamination problem. The State is indicating that the Town should stop using the landfill by the Fall of 1993, and to close it by the Summer of 1994. This closure timeline is earlier than had been expected.

Though at this point it is unclear when exactly the landfill will have to be closed, it will not be long before we will have to dispose of our trash in a different way. We will probably need to construct a transfer station next to the Recycling Center and ship it out for final disposal. Constructing a new lined landfill at the site would probably be too expensive for our Town to afford.

Closing the landfill will require capping the buried trash so that rain water can not percolate through the trash and carry the contaminants into the groundwater. Preliminary estimates indicate that it will cost the Town between \$250,000 and \$500,000 to close the landfill, depending upon whether the sand at the landfill is suitable for closure use. If it is determined in our closure plan that the landfill will have to be capped in the Summer of 1994 (which is the earliest time being considered), we will need to allocate funds at the 1994 Town Meeting for the closure. By that time, there should be at least \$200,000 in the Landfill Capital Reserve Fund to help pay for it.

SEWER COMMITTEE REPORT

The Sewer Committee continued in its role of advising the Board of Selectmen on the use of the Winnipesaukee River Basin Project (WRBP) in Sanbornton. Committee members are: Donald Foudriat (Chairman), Andy D'Angelo (Secretary), Tom Salatiello (Selectmen's Representative), Everett Joslyn (Health Officer), and Stephen Goodwin. Earl Leighton, Sr. continued to serve as a committee alternate.

During 1991, the committee reviewed billing problems and recommended adjustments or abatements, if applicable. A 25% billing rate for all sewage dischargers was recommended for 1991 to cover anticipated increases in WRBP costs.

Various committee members attended meetings of the WRBP Advisory Council, which has been reformed after years of dormancy. The council meets quarterly with the WRBP administrator, Randolph Monti, to receive information and discuss problems of the WRBP. All towns and cities in the WRBP are represented. The Laconia city engineer, James Presher, is chairman of the council.

The 1992 budget request was prepared and presented to the Budget Committee. The requested budget will not require additional user fees for 1992, if adopted as requested.

During 1991, the Recreation Commission organized and coordinated eleven programs and sponsored and/or assisted with three other town programs. The community enthusiastically participated in the wide range of programs offered this past year.

Beach Program - A major task of the Commission is to coordinate and implement the Beach Program. Joanna Hoffman was hired to supervise the operation of the beaches, to coordinate summer programming and to teach swim lessons. The Beach Program involved three components:

- 1. BEACHES. Preparation of Hermit Lake and Winnisquam Lake Town beaches for summer usage included the following: cleaning debris away; applying new sand; repairing rafts and anchoring to the lake bottom; putting out safety buoys; arranging for telephone service, garbage pickup, water testing and toilet facilities; and painting and repair of vandalized beach houses. Throughout the summer, Commission members continued to monitor proper usage and maintenance of the beaches. At the end of the season, the beaches were cleaned and equipment properly stored for next summer.
- 2. LIFEGUARDS. The Commission advertised, interviewed, hired and supervised three Red Cross certified life guards to maintain safety at both beaches, seven days a week, throughout the summer. Our life guards for the 1991 season were James Knowlton, Joshua Hurt, and Derek Fournier.
- 3. WATER SAFETY INSTRUCTION. Lessons were provided to over 100 Sanbornton children, by instructor Joanna Hoffman, at Hermit Lake and at Winnisquam Lake.

Soccer - This was the sixth successful year of the Sanbornton Youth Soccer Program. 121 children, kindergarten through seventh grade, participated. Thirty-five local parents and community members volunteered their time to coach, prepare the fields, referee and provide refreshments. The games were played on Saturday mornings (one hour practice and one hour play), September 7th through October 26th. Sanbornton Central and Sant Bani Schools provided the playing fields. The season ended with games at the Winnisquam High School field between the Sanbornton Youth Soccer and the Tilton-Northfield Youth Soccer teams. An awards ceremony, held at the Sanbornton Central Field was enjoyed by soccer participants and their families.

Tennis - An adult round robin of singles and doubles ran throughout the summer, in which 25 adult players participated. Twentyfive children and adults took tennis lessons, which were taught by tennis pro Peter Fagan at the Winnisquam High School courts.

Coed Softball - For the third year, coed adult softball was played weekly at the Baptist Church bay field throughout the summer months and into the fall.

Halloween Party - A Halloween haunted house was held at the Sanbornton Town Hall, which included a haunted walk, refreshments and volunteer entertainment. Stories were told by Cat Austin Franks.

Arts and Crafts, Sports, Theatre, and Water Olympics - In its 3rd year, the summer program offered many activities. Joanna Hoffman, along with assistant Amy McDougal, conducted arts and crafts, sports, theatre, and a water olympics held at Hermit Lake Beach. Will Ellis conducted a baseball program for 7 to 10 year olds at the Sanbornton Central Field.

Aerobics - Sanbornton aerobic instructors, Elaine DeMello, Lynn Abraham and Bert Whetstone volunteered their time to provide an adult coed aerobics program offered twice a week at the Town Hall.

Contra Dance - Dudley Laufman played and called a contra dance at the Town Hall. This dance was enjoyed by many Sanbornton families.

The Commission also sponsored and/or assisted with several Town recreation programs. These included skating lessons and family skating at the Tilton School Rink, support for our Youth Baseball League and a youth skiing program at Highlands Ski Area.

Commission goals for 1991 were fulfilled, with the exception of holding a fishing derby. A wide range of safe and quality leisure and recreation programs were offered to community members of all ages and abilities. Goals for 1992 include the following:

- 1. To continue to promote safe and quality leisure and recreation programs at a minimal cost to the Town. Each year, over the past four years, the Recreation Commission has increased its income, which has resulted in actual expenditure reductions. Between 1988 and 1991, our income increased from \$683 to \$2784, resulting in and actual expenditures decrease from \$13,129 to \$11,031.
- 2. To support and offer assistance to the Town Park Development Committee when needed.

The Commission would like to thank the many community members who volunteered their time, energy and creative ideas last year. We would also like to thank the community for their tremendous support and encouragement which has made working on this Commission a very rewarding and fruitful experience.

TOWN PARK DEVELOPMENT REPORT

The process of bringing a vision to reality is an enormous endeavor. Such is the case with the Town Park. Over the past three years of the life of this Committee, much has occurred, although not a lot of it visible.

Before a park could even be thought of, studies needed to be conducted to find out what the residents of Sanbornton wanted, what facilities were already available, and what was in fact most desperately needed. So at three different times, needs assessment studies were conducted by both the Recreation Commission and also the Town Planner. With these results in hand, the Committee began searching for a tract of land that could accommodate the many diversified interests. It's tough to find a piece of land steep enough for downhill skiing, large enough for miles of cross country trails, with waterfront access for boat launching, that was still flat enough for soccer and baseball fields, much less one within our financial means!

The Committee, with much assistance from the Town Planner, and input from other groups such as the Conservation Commission, has reviewed all parcels currently owned by the Town. After extensive study, all tracts were determined to be unsuitable for the need that received top priority in all studies, that being multipurpose playing fields. Tracts were eliminated for such reasons as unsuitable underlying soils, topographic features such as slopes, wetlands, inaccessibility or remoteness from the population centers in Town, or inadequate size. One site remains, and work is underway to have a suitability study conducted on this last parcel. Should this also prove to be unsuited, the Committee would look towards the acquisition of private landholdings. The goal look towards the recent monthly meeting of the Committee is to have a recommended site plan for presentation at the 1993 Town Meeting.

The Committee thanks the residents of Sanbornton who have continued to show their support for the Town Park by the affirmative votes given for the past three years at Town Meeting in regards to the establishment and continuation of the Capital Reserve Fund set up for the Town Park. That is what is required to make this vision for the future become a reality.

CABLE TV COMMITTEE REPORT

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

1991 was a busy and interesting year for the Conservation Commission:

Several of the Board members attended a workshop entitled, "Monitoring Conservation Easements", so that we may efficiently monitor the Meader Easement and others which we may receive in the future.

Thanks to the efforts of Curt Beaupre and Bob Anderson, we have on-going maintenance and improvement of Town owned land. Pruning and selective cutting is in process, and to date \$5,816 has been transferred to the General Fund as a result of the sale of logs and firewood.

The members of the Commission walked a portion of the School House Hill lot, and were impressed with its beauty and potential for recreational use by the Townspeople. A culvert has been replaced at the entrance, improvement cutting has been done, and the assistance of Trailwrights, Inc. has been requested for the construction of trails. These trails will be monitored and maintained by volunteers under the guidance of trailwrights.

Two signs, given to the Town by the Division of Forests and Lands, have been posted on the Fairgrounds Lot on Tower Hill and on the School House Hill Lot.

We welcomed Faith and Bill Tobin and Gordon Craig as new and valuable members of the commission. As a member of the Pemi Valley Council, Bill keeps the Board advised on the progress of the Valley study. A student will be sponsored in 1992 to the Conservation Camp offered by the Society for the Protection of NH Forests. For further information, contact Faith Tobin.

Committee member Bob White has been appointed an alternate on the Solid Waste Committee, and he is keeping the Commission updated on the operation and changes at the Solid Waste Facility as it would effect the environment. Virginia Hutton has compiled a list of Town owned land for easy reference, which is on file with the Conservation Commission.

Many dredge and fill operations were reviewed last year, and recommendations were made to the Wetlands Board.

The Commission accepted, with regret, the resignation of Bob Anderson. Bob has worked diligently on the Forestry Committee and other projects, and will be missed.

SANBORNTON PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT

Despite the current economic situation, the staff and trustees try in every way to take a creative approach to local library service. Librarian Priscilla Bodwell is a member of a cooperative association of 20 area libraries, appropriately named, "Scrooge & Marley". By joining together to purchase supplies, books, videos and bindery services, it is cost-effective. Through this same group, a circulating video collection is shared, augmenting local holdings in this popular category. Children's and adult classic films, travel, history, and home-improvement are just a few of the subjects available.

The copier and computer widen all phases of library service, both in-house and for the public. We continue our use of the facilities and expertise of the State Library. Our staff members have attended seminars, classes, and meetings, bringing this experience back, to our great benefit.

Because we have a group of working volunteers, we are able to continue serving the Sanbornton Central School. Classes make regular visits, familiarizing the children with the world of books and ideas. Their enthusiasm inspires us, too! During the last week of school in 1991, the introduction of our summer program, "Some Enchanted Reading", resulted in a colorful parade in which the whole school body took part. We all enjoyed their excitement as well as the ice cream served at the Bodwell Farm.

A significant part of our budget involves the upkeep of the historic building entrusted to us. We now have a newly repaired and shingled roof, and a coat of fresh paint. On the 1992 agenda, we must deal with furnace repair, as well as giving consideration to a new ceiling for the upstairs meeting room, and a more efficient fire alarm system.

Our allotted space here is limited, but we reach out to all townspeople to continue supporting and using your public library.

LAKES REGION PLANNING COMMISSION REPORT

The LRPC - Lakes Region Planning Commission - is a voluntary, non-profit corporation enabled by state legislation to address regional issues and to provide services to member towns in the region. The LRPC continued to provide basic services to the Town of Sanbornton during 1991. These services are provided to the Town through the annual membership fee. Typically, these services take the form of providing assistance to various Town offices as well as the Planning Board, Zoning Board of Adjustment, Town Landfill Committee, Conservation Committee, Hazardous Waste Committee and other Town organizations.

The LRPC again co-hosted the Municipal Law Lecture series, where practicing attorneys provided a legal perspective on local planning, zoning and procedural issues. Three workshops - open to the public - were held for local land use boards and covered such items as Planning Board tools of the trade, agricultural land and impact fees.

Technical assistance has been provided to the Town of Sanbornton through its contract with LRPC to provide a professional planner on a part-time basis. This person is called a Circuit Rider Planner. The planner devotes most of his time to Town Planning Board issues, problems and ordinances. He does have full access to the services and tools of the LRPC, which is headquartered in Meredith, NH.

The LRPC sponsored such events as Legislative Night, where state legislators addressed water quality, ground water legislation and solid waste legislation. It also sponsored the Regional Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day. In addition, the LRPC produced a Regional Transportation Plan and held four public hearings in the Lakes Region.

Each Town's dues are the source of basic funding to the Lakes Region Planning Commission. As this funding continues, the LRPC's ability to request funds from other sources is enhanced. The LRPC fosters the orderly development of the region through cooperative and coordinated actions in the areas of land use planning, transportation planning, environmental planning, economic development and use of its geographic information system.

The LRPC is made up of 32 Lakes Region communities, most of which have representation as Commissioners to the LRPC. The basic concept here is to share information, avoid costly duplication, and, where possible, to standardize forms, plans, documentation and systems.

Regular meetings are held the first Thursday of each month at 7:00 pm. Officer's meetings are held the third Thursday of each month at 7:00 pm. Special meetings are held as needed. The Department consists of 40 active members, 9 of whom are Emergency Medical Technicians, 6 are qualified for defibrillator use, and 2 are qualified as Intermediate (Advance Life Support). Two members completed the Firefighter Level 1 course. Training sessions were held throughout the year, including CPR, cold water rescue, and hazardous materials. Various schools were attended by members.

The Department and Ladies Auxiliary held various suppers and fundraisers throughout the year. This year, we incorporated a Haunted House into our fundraising activities. This was a great success and will continue on an annual basis. The annual Carole Davis Memorial Christmas party was held for the children in the Winnisquam area, as well as a Halloween Party. The Winnisquam Fire Department and Ladies Auxiliary would like to thank the community for its continuing support.

YOUTH ASSISTANCE PROGRAM REPORT

This program benefits the three towns it serves: Northfield, Sanbornton, and Tilton. Money is saved that would otherwise be needed to pay the costs of police officers on juvenile affairs. Thousands of dollars are saved when young people are successfully diverted from the Juvenile Court System and out-of-home placement is avoided. The results of shoplifting, vandalism, burglary and other juvenile crimes are greatly lessened because of the existence of the program. In 1991, restitution of \$816 was collected and returned to victims, and 246 hours of community service work was done by youthful offenders.

The staff of two regularly upgrade their skills with frequent reviews of procedures and with college level training. This year a course in adventure-based counseling was successfully completed, and a week long concentrated program was attended on substance abuse counseling with emphasis on adolescent problems. Volunteers enhance the program wherever such help can be used. A volunteer for office help serves us regularly. We enjoy help from an intern from Plymouth State College for several months of each year, and our list of volunteers for Juvenile Review Boards and our Board of Directors continues to be strong. We have a program matching volunteers with at-risk youths, and we use older youths to help younger children by tutoring and playing games. We work with our schools and police departments for kids-at-risk and families in trouble because of acting out youth. We have had a parent support group for several years. We are prepared to assist at any time with a crisis situation.

Our substance abuse training, called the Challenge Program, was used by 15 youths who were picked up by the police or school officials for possession or theft of illegal substances. Some youths chose to take part in the training because of other needs. The Challenge Program is supported by the Governor's Drug Free Schools Program. We have enough funding from the State for three training sessions in 1992, and hope to continue in 1993. We have been awarded some incentive fund money from the counties of Belknap and Merrimack for 1992. We have been told that it is likely that this money will not be available for 1993.

STATE REPRESENTATIVES' REPORT

Deepening economic woes have, once again, put the squeeze on the State of New Hampshire's budget. Soaring health care costs for low-income families are responsible for the bulk of the state's increased spending, and this is likely to result in budget cuts to the tune of \$10 million before year's end. It could have been far worse: the state took advantage of a one-time \$200 million federal bail-out to narrow the budget deficit. When that federal money dries up, the state will once again face a massive deficit and difficult choices about its tax structure.

A bid to enact an income tax that sends money back to municipalities for property tax relief and school aid failed under a veto threat from the Governor. However, a constitutional amendment that would pave the way for the broadening of the business profits tax may be on the ballot sometime soon.

Both of us have been active in promoting other legislation in Concord. Rep. Steven Maviglio has introduced legislation that tightens the screws on those that don't pay court-ordered child support payments. The bill requires the state to report nonpayments to credit bureaus, thereby jeopardizing the credit ratings of those who don't pay.

Legislation that will lead to statewide Enhanced 911 emergency service is winding its way through the legislature. Cosponsored by Rep. Tom Salatieilo, the bill, if enacted, would provide 911 service to every community in the state, probably within the next three years. Funding will come from a small surtax on telephone charges.

Legislation designed to preserve the water quality of New Hampshire's lakes and rivers sponsored by Rep. Steven Maviglio also is on the way to the Governor's desk. The bill increases the septic system setback from 75 feet to 125 feet near lakes, and provides a model shoreline protection ordinance for communities to adopt. Legislation paving the way for increased public boating access sponsored by Rep. Maviglio also is expected to pass.

Five bills that would alter the state's current use program have been introduced in the legislature, including one that abolishes the entire program. The only bill expected to pass will require a study of the system, including ways to reduce the impact of current use in property-poor towns.

As your state representatives, we also serve on the county delegation, which is responsible for the county portion of our tax bill. Health care premium increases, plus a seven percent raise for county employees negotiated by the Belknap County Commissioners are two of the leading reasons behind another hefty tax

increase in the county portion of our tax bill. We will, as usual, take action to reduce this tax increase.

Included in this year's budget is a proposal for the creation of a Belknap County Economic Development Council. Our county is the only one in the state without a local agency to attract and keep jobs here. We believe the investment in starting an organization to help support economic growth is essential in these recessionary times.

With the 1992 legislative session in full gear, we will be available at the town office to listen to your views on legislation pending in Concord. Notices will be posted in municipal buildings and in newspapers. We appreciate the opportunity to serve you, and welcome you to stop by and talk to us and share your concerns.
