

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

### TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sullivan on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for building and repairing highways and bridges, or take any action relating thereto.

4. To see if the town will accept state aid construction of Class II road known as Beaver Brook Road and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$276.00 or will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$276.00.

4a. Is it expedient to revise the constitution?

5. To see if the town will vote to pay for digging graves and going with the town hearse for residents.

6. To see what sum of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for the support of the public library.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise money for Memorial Day, or take any action relating thereto.

8. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise \$500.00 or more toward the payment of the tractor notes, or take any action relating thereto.

10. To see if the town will vote to help stamp out the white pine blister disease and raise money for the same, or take any action thereto.

11. To see what sum of money the town will raise for removal of snow from the highway.

12. To see if the town will vote to purchase some snow fence and raise money for the same.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate money for Old Home Day or take any action relating thereto.

14. To see if the town will vote to paint the Hearse House, and to raise or appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

15. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to sell its Fordson Tractor and Snow Plow if they can receive a suitable sum for it.

16. To hear the reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen, or take any action thereon.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Home visits were made to investigate illness and for instruction in the isolation and treatment of communicable diseases.

Visits were made to the school officials pertaining to the health work. Cod Liver Oil was distributed to pupils where the need of it was apparent.

A selected group of pupils were taken to the chest clinic for examination by Dr. Kerr. Where trouble was found, followed up home visits were made to instruct the parents in caring for the children.

The healthier appearance of many of the pupils, also fewer absences due to illness, is apparent as a result of the Cod Liver Oil, milk and correction of defects, under The Child Health Recovery Program.

Whenever possible each child should drink a quart of milk daily. It is needed to supply calcium for the growth of bone and teeth.

The presence in the mouth of decayed and abscessed teeth, both temporary and permanent, increases the susceptibility to communicable diseases and undoubtedly helps to infect tonsils, cause enlarged glands, digestive disorders and other troubles.

The first teeth must be watched carefully and kept clean. When the baby has two or three teeth, a little cotton on a tooth-pick or a small soft brush should be used to remove particles of food from between and around them. If through carelessness or oversight a cavity appears it should be filled immediately. Many children who come to the clinics have previously lost or have to have extracted from one to all four of the so-called "six year molars," which parents do not trouble about, thinking them temporary teeth.

Proper nutrition, daily cleansing of the teeth, having cavities filled as soon as they appear, would eliminate much of the dental work now being done to save the teeth, and undoubtedly improve the condition and the appearance of the permanent teeth as well as save the parents a great deal of expense.

I thank the school officials, teachers, parents and pupils for their interest and help in the health work.
