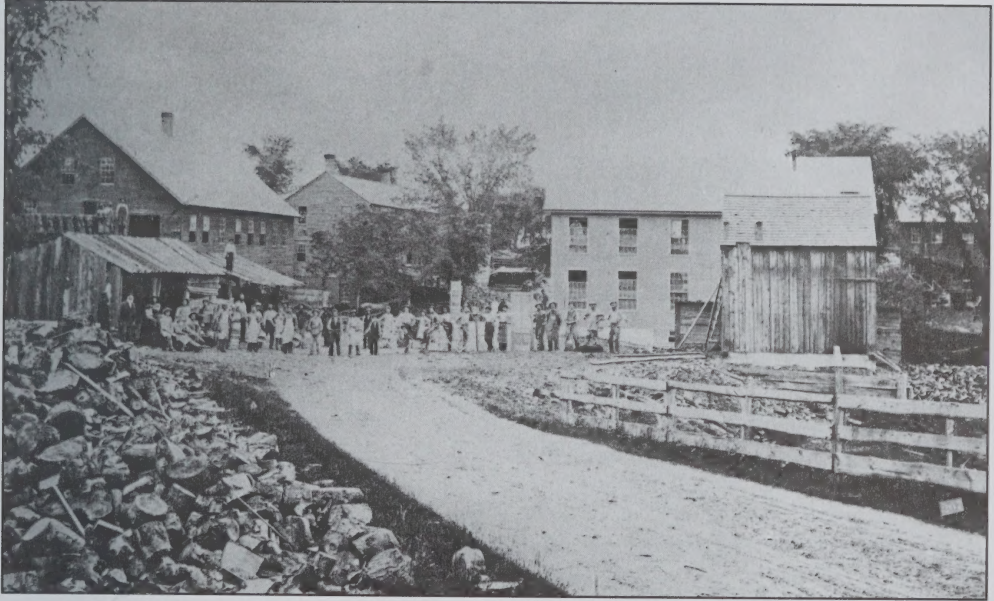

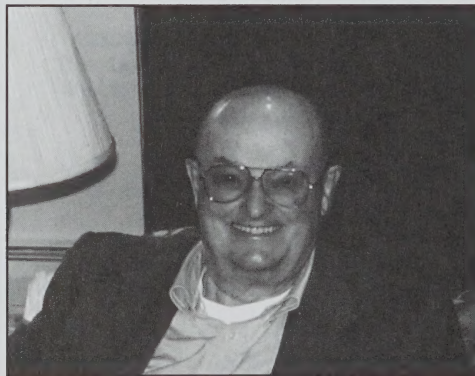

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

In addition to providing information on the town's finances and questions to be considered by voters, the Town's Annual Report is a good source of comprehensive information on town programs, department activities and events. Department reports include a review of events of the past year and previews issues for 2007 and future years. It serves as a historical document of issues faced and decisions made. The Selectmen's Report seeks to highlight some of the past year's activities as well as previewing the issues and challenges facing our town.

Work on several infrastructure projects initiated in prior years has almost concluded. These multi year projects have resulted in improved infrastructure.

- The North Swanzey Project, initiated in 2003, resulted in one of the town's most significant improvements in infrastructure; enhancing roads, water lines and extending municipal sewer service to the North Swanzey area between Route 12 and Route 32. At the close of the year, user hook ups in the new sewer service area were for the most part complete and the final course of pavement on more than 2.9 miles of re-constructed town roads (and portions of Route 32 and Lake Street) was in place. Extension and improvement of the utilities in this area have benefited both residential homeowners around Wilson Pond (providing opportunities for them to improve their homes by adding appliances like washing machines and dishwashers feared with their old septic systems) and also assisting commercial property owners by providing a safe, reliable method for waste disposal. The existence of desirable municipal utilities in this portion of town is expected to serve as a catalyst for new economic opportunities.
- The first phase of infrastructure work in the town's tax increment finance district was completed this fall. Planning for continuation of the road and utility improvements funded by tax revenue generated by properties within the district continues. Attention should be directed to the annual report of the Swanzey Revenue Development District Advisory Board for additional detail on the initial construction and continued planning efforts.
- Major road reconstruction work, funded through capital reserve, on Base Hill and Ash Hill Roads augmenting improvements by NHDOT to the Route 10 corridor was initiated this year as well. Final course pavement for these reconstructed roads will be placed during the 2007 construction season.
- Mt. Caesar Union Library completed updating of the heating/cooling systems serving their historic building, improving its ability to serve the residents of our town. Planning for continued facility upgrades is underway.

Developers have continued to serve as a stimulant to infrastructure expansion in the town adding new roads and utility customers. This year the "loop" from Woodland Heights Drive to C. L. Lane was completed, Kendall Lane (off Eaton Road) and Owens Drive (off California Brook Road) were constructed by developers. Over the past few years the pace of multi-family and commercial developments has picked up sharply. We have added several commercial ventures on Whittemore Farm Road and are anticipating the relocation of Cheshire Horse, from Keene, to its new location in Swanzey.

Financial and operational stability for the Carpenter Home, the town's assisted living facility, has continued. The Home's Special Revenue fund again ended the year in a positive cash position. Census has remained fairly stable and resulting operational costs were more than offset by operational revenue. Capital improvements to the home planned in 2007 include roof work and replacement of the septic system. Replacing the home's boiler system is also being considered. Trust fund income generated by bequests granted to benefit the home are the anticipated funding source for these needed facility improvements.

NHDES and other related state and federal agencies are continuing to plan for the removal of the Homestead Woolen Mill Dam which could well occur this year. NHDOT is assisting the town evaluating the scour threat to the Thompson Bridge and federal funding is being sought to assist the town and state in financing scour mitigation measures. Town officials remain concerned about what the final impact of dam removal will be on the town's landscape, the historic mill village and utility of the river to our residents.


The responsibilities of the Town continue to grow as does the Town - the 2006 population, as determined by the State of NH, was 7,229 residents, up 2.1% from the previous year. The occupancy of more than 120 multi-family housing units in the past few years and an additional 72 now under construction indicate that trend will be continuing. Continued growth, and the accompanying demands for services, is forcing the town to look to improve the manner in which services are delivered and focus on ensuring the sustainability of necessary public services. Our facilities are strained, impacted both by growth and changing requirements. Those needs will require attention, in the short term, to ensure that that we continue to provide needed services in an effective and efficient way. The Capital Improvements Committee, established by voters in 2006, has begun to evaluate these needs and their financing requirements. Their work will greatly assist town leaders and voters as we grapple with these challenges. Success of the efforts of the Open Space Committee will help determine what our town will look like in future years and the quality of life for the residents of our town.

We urge Swanzezy residents to remain attentive to the activities of county government and take steps to weigh in on their proposals by contacting commissioners and members of the county delegation, expressing concerns when warranted. Town officials, residents and other regional leaders have been successful to date in preventing county construction of a new jail on our town's prime commercial real estate (which would result in dramatic negative economic impact for the school and town and affect into the future the support for local needs). The county's jail needs remain unresolved. Attention could easily again turn back to our town and some of the locations previously considered.

Following the town's Deliberative Session voter participation at the polls in March will serve to frame actions considered by officials, activities of departments and projects undertaken in 2006. We urge all of the town's voters to take advantage of the opportunity to exercise their voice in the decision making process and come to the polls. Voting will take place at the Christian Life Fellowship Church, 211 Whitcomb Road and polls will be open from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.

We must all recognize that key to meeting the future challenges facing Swanzezy is the support of its residents. Much of what happens in our town would not happen without volunteer efforts. If you have an interest - sports, hiking, biking, history, public safety, gardening, reading, working with kids or the elderly - we can use you! The efforts of volunteers, board, committee and commission members, firefighters, rescue and emergency management personnel, as well as the efforts of all employees in all the Town's departments will allow future challenges to become opportunities.

TOWN HALL

The Town Hall staff provides a variety of services to the residents of Swanzey. It's a vital link between its citizens, part time officials, town departments and numerous boards and committees. Some of the services that frequently bring residents to Town Hall include motor vehicle registration, dog licensing, vital records and related licenses, assessment and land use inquiries, payment of taxes and sewer and water bills. If you have any questions regarding Town government, please call the Town Hall at 352-7411.

The Town Hall has a variety of activities that are "on- going", such as Home Health Care's monthly blood pressure clinics, representatives from State and Federal government holding "office hours", and the Town's various boards and committees holding meetings and public hearings. This, combined with the Town's regular government daily functions, makes the Town Hall a very busy place.

Our Town Treasurer, Roger Conway, is retiring after serving the Town since 1984. Roger has served as the keystone in management of the town's financial affairs through the terms of 14 Selectmen, 3 Town Clerks and 2 Tax Collectors. We all wish him well in his retirement. He will be missed.

In 2006 Carol DeRocher retired after serving seven terms. Transitioning the office to allow the new Town Clerk Deirdre Geer to learn her duties required that office modify its hours of operation for a period after the election. Deirdre attended mandatory classes sponsored by the state related to vehicle registrations and vital records and participated in the first year of the Town Clerk/Tax Collector certification program.

While 2007 is a quiet year for elections we anticipate much effort will go into preparation for 2008 which is not! State election officials, through implementation of the Help America Voter Act (HAVA), have initiated new systems for maintenance of voter lists. Individuals wishing to register to vote may complete an application at Town Hall during regular business hours, apply during a posted session of the Supervisors of the Checklist or register at the polls. Also in 2006 new equipment to assist disabled voters was purchased by the state and provided to each town. With the presidential primary, town and school elections, state primary and general election schedule in 2008, poll workers will be needed. If you are interested in helping at the polls please contact us.

We encourage town residents consider the town's web site, www.town.swanzey.nh.us, a tool to access information about what is happening around town. In addition to posting minutes of meetings, land use board agendas and hearings held by Selectmen, town ordinances and regulations can be accessed 24/7. Minutes of the boards and committees of the town are also posted on the town's web site. Job opportunities, opportunities to serve on town boards or committees and news events are also posted on the town's site. A goal in 2007 is to work with town departments to expand the site to include more department specific information.

The staff would like to thank the Old Homestead Garden Club for their hard work in maintaining the gardens at Town Hall and the other public gardens in town and to the Swanzey Girl Scouts and Brownies for decorating the hall for the holiday season. We would also like to thank the Public Works Department for their assistance in decorating the hall for Old Home Day, Memorial Day, and the 4th of July.

By participating in town government, each and every citizen makes Swanzey a better place. Your input, efforts and support is needed for the many community events and projects that make Swanzey special. PLANNING BOARD

2006 was, once again, a very busy year for the Planning Board. The Board reviewed 16 applications for site plan review (including a 72 unit condominium project) and 13 applications for subdivisions (potentially creating 68 lots). This is an addition to the numerous applications for signs, home occupations, boundary line adjustments and multi-and new-tenant occupancies.

Growth is occurring in Swanzey, both in the residential and commercial sectors. How best to manage this growth is an issue that the Planning Board continues to address when considering applications, as well as when preparing amendments to the Zoning Ordinance and it is not an easy task. As stated last year, it is extremely important that community members take the time to become informed and involved.

The applications that come before the Planning Board have an effect on every Town department, whether it is the result of the new roads that need to be maintained, an increased demand on the recycling center or the need for additional police officers. These impacts need to be considered when each and every application is considered by the Board. These impacts also need to be weighed against the positive impacts that result from new businesses, additional housing, etc. that are brought to the Town.

Also, it is important to keep in mind that the Planning Board is an elected, volunteer Board. If you have ideas or concerns about the future of Swanzey, it is your duty to make these known to Board members. Even better, there are many opportunities to serve your Town in a volunteer capacity. (Appointed) alternate member vacancies occasionally arise on the Planning Board and are posted on the Town's website (www.town.swanzey.nh.us). In addition, membership vacancies are also experienced by the Zoning Board, Conservation Commission, Capital Improvements Committee and many other Town boards and committees. Your help is needed.

Finally, Planning Board meetings are held on the first and third Thursday of every month at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall and the public is always encouraged to attend. In addition, questions regarding Planning Board matters may be directed to Town Planner Sara Carbonneau at the Town Hall (352-7411).

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) meets on the 3rd Monday of each month at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall with the exception of February when it meets on the 2nd Monday. Notices of public hearings are posted at the Town Hall and the two post offices. In addition, notices are published in the Keene Sentinel and sent by certified mail to all abutters. Agendas and minutes are available for review at the Town Hall or on the Town's website at www.town.swanzey.nh.us

The function of the ZBA is to consider applications from property owners for the following: requests for variances, requests for special exceptions; appeals from administrative decisions and requests for equitable waivers from dimensional requirements. The actions and powers of zoning boards are strictly controlled by New Hampshire law. For example, criteria for granting variances have been established by New Hampshire case law. All towns must utilize that exact criteria and only if the applicant meets all the criteria, the variance must be granted.

The Swanzey Zoning Ordinance is available on the Town's website at www.town.swanzey.nh.us The Swanzey Zoning Ordinance was adopted in 1947 and numerous amendments to the ordinance have been made throughout the years. When zoning amendments are proposed, public hearings are held by the Planning Board in order to solicit input. For any zoning amendment to be adopted, it must be voted on by the citizens of the Town. The ZBA encourages Swanzey residents to take an active role in the development of regulations that affects each and every one of you.

CODE ENFORCEMENT DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Code Enforcement Department currently consists of the Code Enforcement Officer and the Fire Inspector. The Code Enforcement Officer holds regular office hours on Tuesdays from 9 am to noon, Wednesday evenings from 7 to 8:30 pm, and Thursdays from 9 am to noon. Inspections and consultations are scheduled on an as requested basis.

The Code Enforcement Department is responsible for the review and issuance of building permits, as well as conducting inspections during construction and issuing certificates of occupancy. In addition, the Code Enforcement Officer is charged with the responsibility of investigating and enforcing code and zoning violations, as well as reviewing for compliance with approved site plans. During the 2006 calendar year, the Code Enforcement Department issued 197 building permits. The estimated value of construction during 2006 was \$9,010,869.

Building in Swanzey has also been effected by new state laws-specifically the adoption of what is referred to as the "Statewide Building Code." The Statewide Building Code includes the International Building, Plumbing, Mechanical, and Energy Conservation Codes as well as the National Electrical Code, all impacting commercial construction. In addition, the State adopted the International Residential Code for modular housing. "Stick-built" residential housing in Swanzey is regulated by the International Residential Code 2000 with minor amendments. These codes run hundreds of pages long, are very detailed, and require expertise and training in their administration.

As Swanzey continues to grow, more attention should be given to the role and responsibilities of the Code Enforcement Department. To effectively meet the demand for services (including inspections relating to building projects, site plans, and other land use approvals; investigations generated as a result of citizen concerns; and enforcement of code violations) an expansion of the current department may be necessary in the future.

SWANZEY POLICE DEPARTMENT

The increase in residential and commercial growth in Cheshire County was even more evident on the demands of the Swanzey Police Department in 2006. As in the past several years, this year continued the pattern of increased activity and calls to the Department and has placed added demands on all of our staff. This past year brought many serious and complex cases. These cases took a tremendous amount of time and effort. Swanzey is effected by the growing heroin problem in Cheshire County. It may be hard to fathom that a nice community such as Swanzey has a heroin problem, but it does. It is wide spread and it has been the root cause of many of our serious cases. It is affecting many families as well as the crime victims it creates.

Among the more significant types of cases we investigated this past year were: several serious shooting cases, many serious car accidents (two of which resulted in fatalities), multiple sexual assaults, burglaries, high dollar value thefts, serious assaults, counterfeiting, illegal drug investigation, an increase in bad check cases reported by our local merchants, and a significant increase in stolen vehicles. This only scratches the surface of the complex investigations. I would like to add that our staff has done a great job on these cases.

Our available resources have been stretched to the max and I do not see the pace slowing down. I do not want to paint a picture of doom and gloom but our residents need to know the facts. Last year I asked the town voters to support the hiring of an additional officer to increase our authorized strength to 12 officers. Unfortunately, the voters did not support my request and it was narrowly defeated. I am again asking you to support this initiative in 2007. We NEED the help!

I want to again state some facts:

- We have a major heroin problem in Swanzey; it is widespread and is the root cause of many of our serious cases. The methamphetamine epidemic that other states across the country are facing is starting to show its face in New Hampshire. It is said to be the worst of all the illegal drugs with regard to addiction and related crimes.
- We have experienced an increase in volume and complexity of calls.
- The past years have greatly increased the demands of the SPD without an increase in the number of officers.
- Demands will continue to increase from the effects of our town and region's growth.
- We are less proactive and are mostly reactive.
- I am asking for both your understanding and support for funding additional police officers for your police department.

We had some personnel turnover this year as two officers left our town for higher paying positions in other local police departments. The loss of these officers is felt throughout the organization as their knowledge and experience of and in the community is difficult to replace. We have hired two officers to fill these positions who are town residents: Officers Cory Tommila and Robert Eccleston II. On a sad note, recently retired Police K-9, Argo, died on October 3rd after a short bout with cancer. Argo impeccably served our community. It's my hope that we can continue with the K-9 program in the near future.

As the volume of police investigations increases, so does the case load of the Regional Prosecutor. For the past six years, Swanzey has been the administering agency of the Office of the Regional Prosecutor. We manage the eight town program. The program has been reaching its maximum capabilities and is stretching and pushing at the seams. Two years ago, we knew that the program would eventually reach this point. At that time I wrote and submitted a request for a federal grant to supplement the program which would help with our needs. In November 2005, I received notification from US Senator Judd Gregg that my \$300,000 grant request was approved by the DOJ. Due to the long process that allows us the grant funds, we should be able to begin utilizing these funds in January 2007. This grant will greatly assist the RPA Program and will help sustain it for several years.

We've continued to strive to improve our customer service. Our officers have continued to work with two Neighborhood Watch Programs and we continue to regularly visit our elementary schools, interacting with both the staff and the students. We stand behind our Department's Core Values: *Fairness, Compassion and Integrity*. Our Core Values are the key to how we deliver our services.

Our officers continue to attend professional development and advanced training programs to help us stay on the leading edge of law enforcement technology and concepts. As Chief, I am actively involved in several county and state law enforcement committees. I believe this involvement will benefit the Town of Swanzezy. The Swanzezy Police Department believes strongly in being a "team player." We continue to focus on working harmoniously with other town departments to improve the quality of life in Swanzezy.

I'm very proud to be a member of the Swanzezy Police Department. Swanzezy is fortunate to have caring and conscientious personnel for their police department. I would like to thank each and every one of our officers and support staff for their work ethic and job performance. I encourage members of the community to get to know their police officers. I look forward to citizens stopping by the station, asking questions, and learning what we do. I believe it is important for us to have a partnership with the community we serve. I think they will like what they see and hear. Our officers help keep Swanzezy a safe community to reside in and in which to do business. It is, however, a very busy community with regard to police activities and demands. The following is some statistical information with regard to a sampling of the types and numbers of incidents the department handled in 2006.

SWANZEY FIRE DEPARTMENT

2006 was a tough year with the passing of Lt. David Packard, retired Chief Henry Johnson, past Assistant Chief Morgan Wright, and past Captain Robert LaBelle. We will continue to miss their knowledge, expertise, and friendship. It has been difficult, but we continued to respond to emergencies and calls for service. Quick responses and aggressive fire attack methods have limited the damage from fires this year.

Our aging fleet of equipment required a lot of maintenance this year, with front line engines from each station receiving expensive repairs. A new engine is scheduled for purchase this year from the capital reserve fund and will be deployed in the East Station. A separate expenditure to replace the 45-year old tanker is on the horizon.

All three stations have limited storage space and maintenance issues. The Center Station underground diesel tank rusted and leaked and had to be removed along with the heating oil tank. Two new above ground tanks were installed inside, in already cramped space. Contaminated soils were removed and monitoring wells installed. The station under the Town Hall is inadequate for the size of new apparatus. The Town is in need of a new central fire station or possibly an emergency services center.

State and Homeland Security Grants have provided us with new portable radios and carbon monoxide pulse oximeters. As first responders to any emergency, we continue working with Emergency Management on planning for all hazards, including pandemic flu, man-made, and natural disasters.

Training is constant and new members are becoming certified in firefighting. A training burn was conducted on South Road at a house donated by the Morse family. We have attended training at the Meadowood Fire School, NH Fire Academy, NH Community Technical College, and National Fire Academy. We hosted an EMT Intermediate Class and an EMT refresher program.

As Swanzezy continues to increase in population, our volunteers are being asked to respond more often. Making a living along with careers and family obligations does not leave much time for firefighting or the required equipment checks, maintenance, and testing. As adequate staffing becomes a bigger issue throughout Cheshire County, local fire chiefs are working toward regional response teams, in addition, to the mutual aid system we have come to rely on. Buildings and vehicles are becoming safer, but accidents do happen. Our calls are expected to keep increasing as Swanzezy continues to grow and develop.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

This year brought many changes to the department, some expected and others not. In April longtime cemetery supervisor Morgan Wright passed away. He had served the town in that capacity for fourteen years and is missed. My health took a turn for the worst, in April as well, which slowed me up for several months. I want to thank all of you who stopped by to see how I was doing. Thanks to Trevor and the crew for covering for me. In mid-June, Francis Faulkner was hired to oversee care of the cemeteries, parks and other town facilities. Ken Page retired in July leaving a spot in the grounds maintenance crew open. The combination of expected and unexpected changes resulted in the department operating short-handed for much of the year. I could not wait for 2006 to be over because 2007 couldn't be as bad.

Highways, Streets & Bridges

Winter began with a passing weather front that blew down one of the dugouts on South Road. Another wind storm in February kept us busy from noon until the evening with trees down all over town. Some people were without power for several days. In terms of winter weather small storms were the rule. We plowed only three times in January but had to salt the roads seventeen times. In February, we plowed three times but had to salt the roads only seven times. In March, winter pretty much ended, but then came mud season. It is usual to have a wet April but not this year. It was dry to the point that we had brush fires starting in March. Then the rains came in May and June. When the weather is out of whack the town's twelve miles of gravel roads are tough to maintain.

This year, as part of our routine pavement management, we chip sealed 1.57 miles of road, shimmed 1.8 miles of road, and did major reconstruction overlaying 2.25 miles of road. We are hoping to continue to improve our pavement management and do as much, if not more, this coming year. Selectmen and I are working, with the town's Capital Improvements Committee, to develop a multi-year plan identifying town roads requiring maintenance such as sealing or shimming (generally funded through the department's operating budget) as well as scheduling those requiring major reconstruction. Several town roads related to NHDOT's Route 10 improvement project were reconstructed in 2006, including Base Hill Road to the Keene line and a portion of Ash Hill Road beginning at the at the end of the state's project area and running easterly to Sawyers Crossing Road. Plans for the 2007 operating budget include chip sealing on Eaton Road and shimming Carlton and Cobble Hill Roads. The 2007 and 2008 schedule includes plans to reconstruct Webber Hill Road, Main and West Streets (funded through the contributions to the town's expendable trust for road rehabilitation). Town initiated development efforts expanded the town's road network in 2006 with completion of the first phase of improvements in the town's tax increment financing district adding Safford Drive. Developers also extended the town's road network adding about a mile of new town road including Owens Drive and a new section of Woodland Heights Drive.

Property owners are reminded that driveway permits, when constructing, reconstruction, paving or changing the use of a driveway, are required by both the town and state highway departments. Information on the town's driveway requirements may be found under the Ordinances section of the town's web site, www.town.swanzy.nh.us. Town applications may be obtained through the highway department or at Town Hall.

Some repairs relating to the October 2005 flooding, to be funded through the disaster aid declaration funds, remain pending as the 2006 work plan did not accommodate completion. Most significant is repair to the gate at the Lower Wilson Pond Dam. State inspectors have also identified repair work which will require completion in 2007 at the Upper Wilson Pond Dam.

Street lights are managed through the Department of Public Works. Residents are encouraged to contact us if a light is malfunctioning or not operating. Evaluation of the town's street light network, to ensure it continues to address the needs of the residents of our town will be a future department project.

Cemeteries, Parks & Facilities Maintenance

2006 saw expansion of the responsibilities of the Cemeteries and Parks Division with the addition of facilities maintenance aimed at improving the condition and care of town's properties.

Total burials in 2006 were 45 of which 24 were full burials and 21 were cremations. Information on the town's cemeteries and rules and regulations regarding items such as plantings and monuments may be found on the Town of Swanzey's web site under the Public Works section.

Maintaining the town's grounds was challenging during much of the early summer with frequent rainfall making it difficult to keep the grass mowed and trimmed in all five cemeteries and at the town's ball fields. Removal of hazardous trees at several town cemeteries, including Mt. Caesar, Mountainview and Oak Hill occurred. A dangerous tree near the Golden Rod Grange was also removed. All of these trees suffered from lightning strikes and those in the cemeteries a threat to the headstones surrounding them.

At the ball fields, the dug out blown down in January at Lane Field was rebuilt using funds from the town's insurer and the Cal Ripken Board of Directors funded construction of a new 20' x 30' covered pavilion at the Field. Water supply at Brown Field was problematic due a broken line. The West Swanzey Village water supply had to be shut down twice to repair it and install a shut off valve at the field. At ball field at Brown Field was re-graded, thatched, aerated, and over seeded the outfield in order to provide a safer playing surface for the 2007 softball season.

Removal of a diesel fuel tank and underground heating oil tank at the Town Hall/Swanzey Center Fire Station precipitated additional work at this location including construction of a new concrete block retaining wall and installation of two new 330 gallon oil tanks replacing the 1,000 gallon underground fuel tank used to supply oil to the furnace. Provision of fuel for the building's diesel generator is still under consideration.

An additional resident room at the Carpenter Home and the home's pantry area were re-tiled. The casing pipe on the artesian well was changed to bring the well into compliance with today's code. Some roofing work was completed and more is anticipated during 2007. In addition, work on the septic system is anticipated and consideration is being given to replacement of the home's old boiler which provides heat for much of the assisted living facility in this old New England Farmhouse left to the Town by Lucy Carpenter.

In December, work began at the Department of Public Works reconstructing a garage salvaged by town forces to allow for the straightening of a section of Wilson Pond Road in 2005. The addition of this building will allow all of our lawn maintenance equipment to be stored in one location.

RECYCLING CENTER

Another good year-busy as always. We handled over 2,5000 tons of material in 2006. Non-recyclable waste decreased slightly and our recycling/diversion rate rose to 52%, again good for you!

Household recyclables tonnage (paper, plastic, cans, etc.) which are "labor intensive" remained about even with 2005, while tonnage of construction debris, glass, and scrap metal were lower. We are, for the first time, including compost, wood, and aggregates (see below) to our volumes reports as they are a significant part of our operation in both tonnage and costs. Their inclusion gives a truer picture of our operations.

While recycling remains foremost of our concerns, "landfill avoidance" is also very important. Commodities such as wood, glass, compost, and aggregates (stone, concrete, soils) are not always recycled as such, but are "diverted from a landfill" (which in Swanzey's case saves us \$117 per ton). Both "recycled" and "landfill avoided" are now being combined into a "recycling/diversion" rate, which is being increasingly recognized by both the government and the private sector.

On the personnel side, we now have an assistant solid waste manager. Please stop in and meet Steve Stewart. With an extensive background in solid waste, recycling, and facility design and development, Steve is a valuable asset to the Center.

We regretfully had to close our Free Exchange this year. Many factors including decreasing quality, liability, public safety, and costs made this decision necessary (although somewhat unpopular). We thank you for your understanding.

We still have a good supply of wood chips, some excellent compost and (occasionally) kindling. It's **free** and we can help you load it!

Please always feel free to come inside to see how your facility operates. We always welcome the opportunity to give group tours and presentations.

SEWER COMMISSION REPORT

2006 was a very busy year for the Swanzey Sewer Commission.

The North Swanzey sewer, water, drainage, and road realignment project drew to a close in 2006 with final paving in the project area completed in September. Start up of the new collection system went fairly smoothly. The two new pump stations, on Wilson Pond Road and off Route 32, have operated well but for a small glitch at Wilson Pond Road station related to power supply during an August heat wave. Hook up of users to the new collection system, whose waste is treated at the Keene Wastewater Treatment Plant, is almost complete as well. We thank our new users for their patience as we worked through establishing and billing the new sewer accounts and integrating invoicing of water and sewer.

In September, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) issued a new discharge permit for the West Swanzey Treatment Plant. The new permit became effective December 1, 2006. The primary difference, between the new and old discharge permits, is an additional requirement to treat for phosphorous. The Commissioners and staff are exploring the most cost effective method of meeting this new requirement.

A 72 unit condominium project on Owens Drive (off of California Brook Road) started construction during 2006 and new users from the project will begin to come on line in 2007.

Prenatal and well child care, hospice services and regularly scheduled "Nurse Is In" clinics are also available to the residents. Town funding partially supports these services.

HCS FINANCIAL REPORT

The actual cost of all services provided in 2006 with all funding sources is \$1,006,003.

These services have been supported to the greatest extent possible by Medicare, Medicaid, other insurances, grants and patient fees. Services that were covered by other funding have been supported by your town.

For 2007, we request an appropriation for \$16,500. to continue to be available for home care services and \$8,371. for the Meals-On-Wheels Program for Swanzey residents.

REPORT OF HEALTH DEPARTMENT

The Health Department is responsible for monitoring both drinking and swimming water at several locations, inspections of foster homes, day care and preschool facilities, investigation of housing complaints, septic system inspections, assistance in lead paint inspections and miscellaneous public health complaint investigations. The following services were provided in 2006.

The West Nile Virus Program will continue for 2007 with the same procedures as 2006. Municipal Pest Management Services will be obtaining the Mosquito/Black Fly Special Permit from the State Pesticide Board on behalf of the Town of Swanzy. Statewide there were 134 were tested for WNV with 112 testing negative and 22 positive. This year 134 birds were tested for EEE (Eastern Equine Encephalitis) with 129 testing negative and 5 positive. One bird was submitted from Swanzy and tested negative for both WNV and EEE.

A reminder of RSA 125-N, the state law which prohibits residential trash burning. Pamphlets on RSA 125-N are available at the Town Hall.

CARPENTER HOME

The Carpenter Home is an assisted living facility for the elderly and is located on 230 acres near the Swanzey Town Hall. Lucy Carpenter bequeathed the home and land, with a sizeable restricted endowment, to the Town of Swanzey. The Home provides assisted living services in a comfortable rural setting to both private pay and Medicaid recipients.

The facility is licensed for 16 residents and currently serves 15. Although resident census has yet to reach capacity, steps are being taken to do so and progress continues to be made toward this goal.

Deferred work continues on the home. Floors have been updated in many rooms and new doors installed on the porch. The roof and septic system have been this past year's challenges and will need to be addressed in 2007.

During 2006, the Carpenter Home stayed busy. We hosted an open house in October and another one at Christmas time allowing residents and their families to socialize with the staff and public. In February the residents exchanged Valentines with one another. This past summer we attended Prospect Day at the Ashuelot Park and also enjoyed several picnics there, went on a foliage tour, enjoyed eating out once a month at different local restaurants, and had a visit from Santa at our Christmas party. The special education students from Monadnock Regional High School have been very good to the residents. They joined the residents this past fall in doing different kinds crafts and games. The students kept the home beautiful by donating poinsettia plants to each of the residents as well as hanging wreaths for the holidays.

Our residents enjoyed the Senior Swingers Show at Monadnock Regional High School, being entertained by llamas from the Smurf Llama Farm, and Mrs. Curran's monthly piano playing and singing for the residents.

We continue to improve the quality of our services, which in turn improves the quality of life for each of our residents. The Carpenter Home received no deficiencies from our state inspection and we received an award from the Department of Health and Human Services Commissioner John Stephen for our support and quality care for the residents.

As administrator I want to thank all who have supported our facility with their time and donations. The home received many donations and among them was an organ. We welcome anyone who would like to come in and volunteer, especially anyone who can play the organ. If you are interested in volunteering or helping in any way, such as transportation, please call Dawn at 352-2269.

Please help us to continue making the Carpenter Home a valuable resource to the Town of Swanzey. The Carpenter Home intends to maintain financial independence while continuing to provide quality assisted living services to seniors in the Monadnock Region.

MOUNT CAESAR UNION LIBRARY

The library saw a rather tumultuous year in 2006 with many staff changes and much growth. A new library director was hired in March to replace interim director Darcy Doyle, who supported the library through 15 months following Sue McPhail's health leave. Darcy is happily retired but still shows up as a volunteer and friend. At last notice, Sue was doing well, but advised for health reasons to not return to the public sphere. In April, beloved longtime library assistant Robbin Armstrong died. Her spot can be filled but she will never be replaced. In the summer, Andrea Farnsworth and Delorma Morton were hired as library assistant and library aide. Andrea is still here, but sadly, Delorma encountered a chronic health situation that disabled her from the job. Melinda Doolittle has been hired as the new aide and hopefully 2007 will see the current staff line-up holding steady.

The Friends of the Library held many successful parties for the children, with the usual focus on the younger children, but also with new offerings for the older grade schoolers. A Lemony Snicket Party was held in October to celebrate the publication of a showing of the movie made from the series. The purchase of a movie performance license by the library made this showing possible and it is hoped that many more community movie activities will be forthcoming.

The library received a new furnace and for the first time in history, air conditioning. The heat and air will be extended to the second floor so that space will be much more available for community activities. A six-week infant sign language class was held with 20 students in attendance. The class was taught by patron Ana Gonzalez and an article about the class was published in the Keene Sentinel.

The library currently has two public access computer terminals which have seen a tripling in usage during 2006. January of 2007 will bring new computers with Windows Vista which will provide more security and reliability.

BICYCLE/PEDESTRIAN PATHWAYS COMMITTEE

OPEN SPACE COMMITTEE

Conservation Easements: Tools for Preserving Open Space

The best way to maintain the rural character of our town, Open Space Committee members believe, is with the protection of conservation easements. A conservation easement involves a voluntary transaction between a landowner and a land trust. The landowner continues to own the land privately, and retains the right to sell, or leave the land to an heir. The easement permits uses such as agriculture and forestry, but restricts uses like subdivision and development. The protections of a conservation easement are forever - they "run with the land" - and apply to all future landowners. A land trust takes on the perpetual responsibility for enforcing the easement.

Conservation easements can be flexible, and need not apply to every acre of a landowners' property. Often, an easement intentionally excludes certain areas from the easement's restrictions, including lots that may be built upon or sold for development.

Conservation easements may be sold or donated. In the case of donation, a landowner may be entitled to significant tax benefits. (These benefits can be especially generous for farmers.) For some Swanzey residents, outright donations of land or easements may not be possible, while others might need help paying transaction costs. The Town's land acquisition capital reserve fund was established in 1988 to finance purchase of conservation parcels, as well as to offset legal fees and surveying costs associated with establishing conservation easements.

During the past year, the Open Space Committee has been working with several landowners who are interested in permanently protecting their land. As our list of successful transactions grows, so does our appreciation of the amount of time required to complete a transaction. We encourage interested landowners to begin exploring conservation options at their earliest possible convenience.

Please contact any Open Space Committee member with thoughts and ideas about important undeveloped land in town, and about maintaining Swanzey's rural character. The Committee meets from 5:00 to 6:30 pm on the second Tuesday of the month, and the public is always welcome.

SWANZEY HISTORICAL MUSEUM

FIRST SESSION

You are hereby notified to meet for the First (Deliberative) Session of the annual Town Meeting, to be held at the Monadnock Regional High School/Middle School Auditorium, Swanze, NH on **Tuesday, the sixth day of February 2007 at seven in the evening (7:00 p.m.)**. The First Deliberative Session will consist of explanation, discussion, debate of articles and will afford those voters who are present the opportunity to propose, debate and adopt amendments to each warrant article, except election of officers and those whose wording is prescribed by State Law.

SECOND SESSION

You are also notified to meet for the Second Session of the annual Town Meeting on **Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March 2007, at the Christian Life Fellowship Church, 211 Whitcomb Road, between the hours of 10 a.m. and 7 p.m.** to vote by official ballot to elect town officers, to vote by official ballot on warrant articles as they may have been amended at the First Session and those other official ballot questions whose wording is prescribed by State Law.

Article 1 To choose by ballot all necessary town officers including 2 Selectmen, a Town Treasurer, 2 Trustees of the Trust Funds, a Board of Adjustment member, 2 Planning Board members, 2 Old Home Day Committee members, a Library Trustee and a Sewer Commissioner.

Article 2 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$ 4,911,487? Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$4,903,856, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. (RECOMMENDED BY SELECTMEN)

Article 3 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 631,500 to be placed in the following expendable trust and capital reserve accounts of the Town:

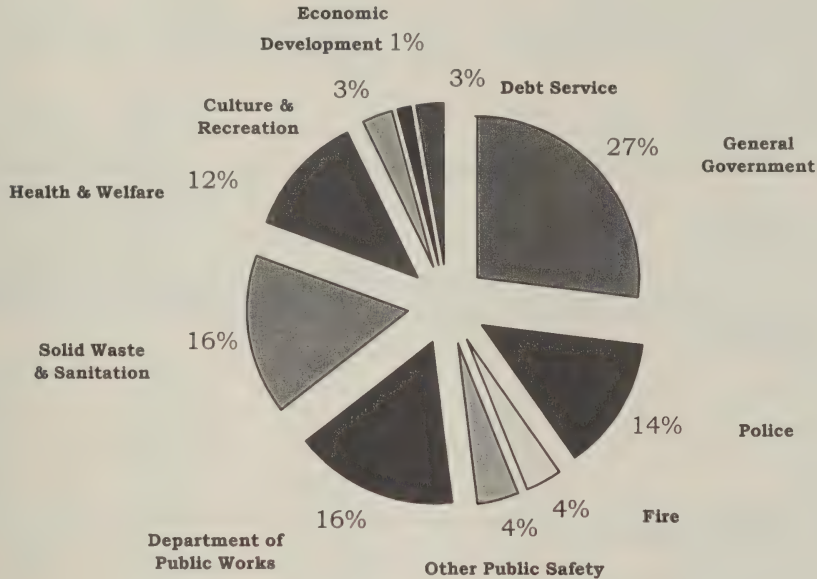

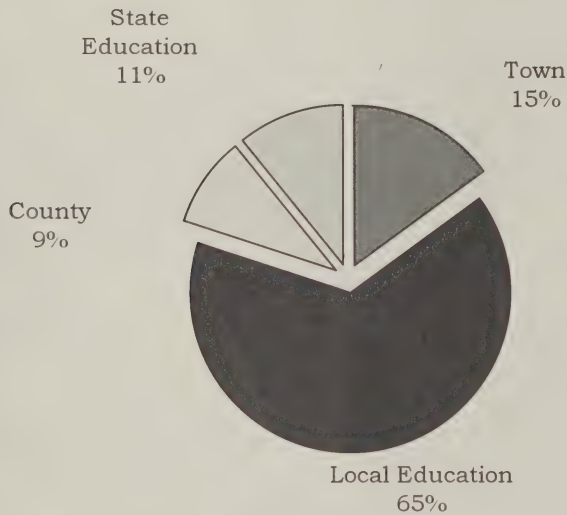

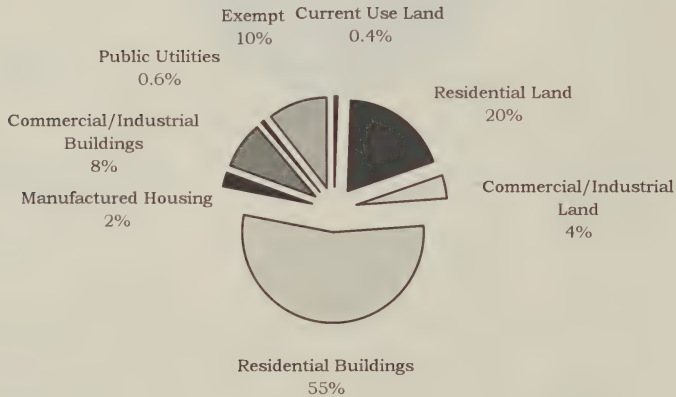
Tax Rate 2006

NORTH SWANZEY WATER & FIRE PRECINCT

2006 marked the first year of the bond payment on the Wilson Pond Project. This was funded by a combination of reserves held in anticipation of that funding requirement and increased revenues from the new water rate structure.

Work on replacing our old obsolete water meters with new remote reading meters proceeded during 2006 and was mainly funded by a grant from Rural Development. The area covered was primarily that encompassed by the Wilson Pond project. We are planning to continue this replacement program in 2007 in other precinct areas. The new meters provide a much more accurate measure of usage as well as saving much meter reading time.

In addition, planning also continues on upgrading the water infrastructure in other parts of town covered by the Precinct-generally east of Rte. 12.

Cooperation between Town staff, Public Works personnel and Precinct staff continues to be excellent with users and both entities benefiting from the good service.

SWANZEY REVENUE DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT

The Swanzey Revenue Development District (SRDD) Advisory Board continued meeting through 2006 as planning and the first phase of the district's infrastructure project continued to move forward. Phase I of Safford Drive establishing an improved roadway and intersection (from Route 32 to Wilson Pond Road) has been completed. The western end of Page Court (at Route 32) will be closed off to vehicular traffic as authorized by voters at Town Meeting 2006.

Preliminary plans and cost estimates for Phase II of Safford Drive (extending it approximately 2,650 feet from Wilson Pond Road to Rte. 12 at the north end of the fairgrounds) have been developed. During 2007, the advisory board will be working with adjacent landowners regarding "right-of-way" acquisitions related to this next phase. Evaluation of the tax increment district's financial position to determine when increment to fund this next phase of work, with an estimated cost of \$1.7 million, will continue.

The Board will continue its activities in 2007 as plans move forward. Anyone wishing further information regarding the district is invited to contact any board member.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PROGRAM COMMITTEE

Our town is thriving. One measure of Swanzey's development is our town's increase in housing. Since 2000, the number of single family homes in Swanzey has grown by 7%. During the same six years, multi-family units have increased 27%.

As our community expands, so does our need for services. We require more equipment, and more places to put it, and the equipment we have wears out faster. Certain town facilities, like the center fire station and the town garage, now are too small to house modern equipment. Other facilities, like some roads, have simply come to the end of their expected life. Over the years, we've done wonders with patching and making-do, but that can't go on forever.

Big, new projects like these may provoke lively discussion, and they certainly will be costly. However, it would be irresponsible for us to ignore our need for them. In 2005, Swanzey voters took the first step by creating a Capital Improvements Committee charged with looking at our town's long-term needs for equipment, facilities, services, and their costs.

The Committee consists of Swanzey residents with a wide range of expertise, and includes representatives from the Board of Selectmen and Planning Board.

Organized in September, so far the Committee has met with department heads to identify predictable major expenses for town highways, fire protection, and recycling. For the Committee's purposes, a "major" expense costs more than \$50,000, and relates to an item with a useful life of more than five years.

"We're looking into the future, and it's not going to be cheap," says Committee member and former Selectman Bob Beauregard. "We're talking about having to spend many millions of dollars as a town. But doing nothing will cost us even more. So we're developing a plan to spread these costs out over a number of years, and making sure we deal with the most important issues first."

Committee members will talk to more departments during the coming months, and hope to call on Swanzey citizens to help pull the information into a unified plan. The completed Capital Improvement Plan will recommend priorities for future municipal spending. Committee members appreciate the opportunity to contribute to this long-range planning effort, and encourage you to offer ideas and recommendations. SWANZEY CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Swanze Conservation Commission (SCC) consists of seven regular members and two alternates, all of whom volunteer their time to help maintain or improve the quality of the air, soil, water, plants, animals, and other natural resources of the Town. We meet on the second Tuesday of each month at the Town Hall at 7:00 pm.

Roadside Cleanup: This year was the second Swanze roadside cleanup, conducted on Saturday, April 22. With last year's numbers in brackets for comparison: Eighty (vs 60) volunteers collected 217 (169) bags of trash, including at least 60 (19) bags of recyclables. THANK YOU VERY MUCH to everyone who helped! The date for the **2007 Roadside Cleanup** has been set for **Saturday, April 21** (rain or shine).

Conservation Lands: SCC is also responsible for monitoring those land parcels under the Conservation Land Stewardship Program (CLSP). Conservation lands Honey Hill, Mt. Cresson, Muster Property, and the Swanze Lake dam area were checked and reports submitted to the State. This year the approach to the Muster Property was cleared and parking spaces cleaned. The trail to the Dickenson Forest was opened up and the footbridge repaired. The trail entrance to Mt. Cresson was brushed out to make it more visible. Trash dumping and vandalism sometimes require extensive follow-up. Other town owned properties were also monitored. We continue to work with the Open Space committee, Southwest Regional Planning Commission (SWRPC), and the Monadnock Conservancy (MC) relative to conserving natural areas in the town.

It is still true that very little land in Swanze is reserved for natural open space (1.4% vs an average of 18% in the Monadnock region). Your Conservation Commission thanks YOU very much for your large increase in support for the Conservation Capital Reserve Fund in last year's voting. That is a substantial step to help preserve the Swanze that we know.

Conservation Camp: For many years, the Conservation Commission has offered two scholarships to Swanze residents who would like to attend Conservation Camp. This 4-H camp in the White Mountains runs several one week sessions for campers aged 10-15. Three sessions usually run in late June through mid-July. Activities include hiking, fishing, wildlife studies, and environmental explorations. This year we had one scholarship recipient, Rob LaRiviere. Rob won first place in two shooting competitions! Students interested in applying for this scholarship should write a letter to the Conservation Commission at the Town Hall as early in the year as possible, saying why they would like to attend this camp. Applications should be available by April. This is a small camp and fills up quickly; the sooner the application is filed, the better the chances of getting in.

Other Committees: SCC continues to participate in the Swanze Open Space Committee. Members attend some of the meetings and hearings of the Planning Board, Zoning Board of Adjustment, or Selectmen where environmental matters are involved. Some of the SCC members also participate in meetings of the Bicycle/Pedestrian Committee, one member sits on the SWRPC Natural Resources Committee, and one is a member of the Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee (ARLAC). Some workshops attended by members were new environmental regulations, environmental permitting, and drinking water source protection.

Permits/Projects: Many permit applications for work in wetlands come before the Commission each year and the State Department of Environmental Services expects our input. In addition, SCC is expected to review all new proposals and ongoing projects with respect to their environmental impacts. The above investigations usually involve site walks. This year again saw proposals for dozens of new housing and commercial units, some with serious associated environmental concerns. A very large gravel removal project is slated for the Matthews Road area. We try very hard to make recommendations that will minimize environmental or ecological damage associated with development proposals.

Complaints/Inquiries: Complaints of alleged environmental violations are also investigated and where appropriate, reported to town and state officials. This function has required hundreds of hours this year alone. Illegal dumping of trash, appliances, and tires along unpaved town roads continues to be a problem. We also endeavor to answer various environment-related questions and concerns from citizens throughout the year.

Other Activities:

- Canoe trip: Our annual trip down the river occurs in early May, with all interested persons invited. You may not even need your own canoe! Watch for publicity in the spring, with numbers to call if you are interested.
- Nature related educational activities: Sessions for the children at Swanze Lake Summer Camp are offered by CC members each year.
- College Scholarship: We offer help for a Swanze resident who is a senior at Monadnock Regional High School and who intends to major in the environmental field at a college of his/her choice.

- Wildlife habitat maps: The town has obtained maps from the NH Fish and Game Department as part of the statewide Wildlife Action Plan designed to keep species off rare species lists.

Thank you: The Commission offers its special gratitude to Barbara Skuly, who retired from the Commission this year after decades of service, including chair and vice-chair. At a special supper/ceremony in September, we honored Barbara and other long-term former members Jean Blood (our SWRPC Natural Resource Committee delegate), Walt Calkins, and Ruth Pratt for their valuable and faithful service to our town.

ASHUELOT RIVER LOCAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee (ARLAC) was established in 1994 one year after the Ashuelot River was enrolled into the State Rivers Management and Protection Program. Since then, members, nominated by local municipal officials and appointed by the Commissioner of the Department of Environmental Services (DES), have been educated in a broad array of issues associated with the river and its watershed. It is the hope of the Committee to be a resource that works well between the interests and concerns of the citizens in the watershed and State authorities.

The volunteer Ashuelot River Water Quality Monitoring Program, in conjunction with DES Volunteer River Assessment Program (VRAP), is now in its sixth season. Ten sites were sampled along the river's 64 miles from Washington to Hinsdale along with an additional site on South Branch. Analyses were done for temperature, pH, total phosphorus, dissolved oxygen (DO), turbidity, and conductivity with the City of Keene donating lab services. ARLAC members worked with community volunteers, participated in a spring training session that led into a five month effort of sampling once per month from May through September. In November, Stephen Stepenuck presented ARLAC and monitor volunteers with a summary presentation of this year's sampling results. The six years of data are available on at <http://academics.keene.edu/pegglest/AshuelotRiver.htm> or <http://www.des.state.nh.us/wmb/VRAP/>

A second water quality concern is the elevated phosphorus readings, again, mostly south of Keene. This year ARLAC participated in the review of the NPDES permits issued by the US EPA for Keene and West Swanzey Wastewater Treatments Plants. The amount of phosphorus discharged by West Swanzey's will now be regulated. Phosphorus was also added to Keene's discharge limitations, however, at this time, the amount of that limit is not finalized. Winchester was recently re-permitted under a general permit and Hinsdale's permit renewal is scheduled to occur this year.

A regular task for ARLAC is to review and comment on state permit applications within the river corridor that may have potential impacts on the river. This year we submitted comments on projects proposed in Washington, Gilsum, Keene, Swanzey, Winchester, and Hinsdale. Those included three site-specific applications and nine wetland applications.

We continued participation as a member of the NH River Restoration Task Force and continued to support removal of the Homestead Dam. Concerns regarding the stability of the Thompson Covered Bridge are being addressed but continue to delay dam removal plans.

ARLAC's winter hike took place in Hinsdale and Winchester using the rail trails that border the Connecticut and Ashuelot Rivers to obtain a new perspective on the river corridor. Visible from the Fort Hill line is the confluence of the Ashuelot with the Connecticut, and the Ashuelot line offers intermittent views of the river through a wooded corridor.

The committee meets each month on the third Tuesday evening in Keene. The Local Advisory Committee invites citizens and town officials to contact their ARLAC representatives or the Southwest Region Planning Commission for more information.

Town Clerk, Carol DeRocher was asked to lead the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Moderator Lerandeau continued by reading the following:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Swanzev in the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in Town affairs:

FIRST SESSION

You are hereby notified to meet for the First (Deliberative) Session of the annual Town Meeting, to be held at the Monadnock Regional High School Auditorium, Swanzev, NH on **Tuesday, the seventh day of February 2006 at seven in the evening (7:00 p.m.)**. The First Deliberative Session will consist of explanation, discussion, debate of articles and will afford those voters who are present the opportunity to propose, debate and adopt amendments to each warrant article, except election of officers and those whose wording is prescribed by State Law (Articles 1, 13 & 14).

SECOND SESSION

You are also notified to meet for the Second Session of the annual Town Meeting on **Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March 2006, at the Christian Life Fellowship Church, 211 Whitcomb Road, between the hours of 10 a.m. and 7 p.m.** to vote by official ballot to elect town officers, to vote by official ballot on warrant articles as they may have been amended at the First Session and those other official ballot questions whose wording is prescribed by State Law.

Article 1 To choose by ballot all necessary town officers including a Selectman, Town Moderator, Town Clerk, Supervisor of the Checklist, a Trustee of the Trust Funds, 2 Board of Adjustment members, 2 Planning Board members, 2 Old Home Day Committee members, a Library Trustee and Sewer Commissioner.

Article 2 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$ 4,726,385. Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$ 4,575,971, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. (RECOMMENDED BY SELECTMEN)

(RECOMMENDED BY SELECTMEN)

It was voted in **favor** of including this Article on the Second Session Ballot with no amendments being made.

Article 6 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,525 to fund activities of the Open Space Committee established as a result of the recommendations contained in the "Plan for the Protection of Open Space" adopted in 2004, or take any action thereon. (RECOMMENDED BY SELECTMEN)

It was voted in **favor** of including this Article on the Second Session Ballot with no amendments being made.

Article 7 To see if the town will vote to approve the cost items included in the collective bargaining agreement reached between the Board of Selectmen and the Teamsters Local 633, Swanzev Police Officers which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits at the current staffing level:

If approved by voters, the full annual cost of this position estimated at \$55,000 will be included in the town's operating budget in 2007. (RECOMMENDED BY SELECTMEN)

It was voted in **favor** of including this Article on the Second Session Ballot with no amendments being made.

Article 9 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 30,000 to fund weekday daytime fire department coverage beginning in the fall of 2006 and designate this appropriation as non-lapsing pursuant to RSA 32:7,VI until December 31, 2007, or take any action thereon. *Note: This article is designated by Selectmen as a special warrant article and provides six months of funding for a trial period of weekday daytime fire coverage beginning in the fall of 2006 through March 2007.* (RECOMMENDED BY SELECTMEN)

This Article was amended to read as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$0 to fund weekday daytime fire department coverage beginning in the fall of 2006 and designate this appropriation as non-lapsing pursuant to RSA 32:7, VI until December 31, 2007, or take any action thereon. The amendment passed with a standing vote of 82 Yes and 14 No.

It was voted in **favor** of including this Article on the Second Session Ballot as amended.

Article 10 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 50,000 to reduce the risk of scour to the Thompson Covered Bridge, or take any action thereon. *Note: Engineers report that river water action is causing scour which undermines the bridge's center pier and abutments. 2. Amend the following definitions to read as follows:

Area of special flood hazard is the land in the flood plain within the Town of Swanzey subject to a 1 percent or greater chance of flooding in any given year. The area is designated as Zone [A, AE] on the Flood Insurance Rate Map.

Development means any man-made change to improved or unimproved real estate, including but not limited to buildings or other structures, mining, dredging, filling, grading, paving, excavation or drilling operations or storage of equipment or materials. (Note: This definition appears in the opening paragraph of Section IX, Flood Plain District Regulations and Item I, Definitions, of the Flood Plain Development Regulations.)

Manufactured home means a structure, transportable in one or more sections, which is built on a permanent chassis and is designed for use with or without a permanent foundation when attached to the required utilities. For floodplain management purposes the term “manufactured home” includes park trailers, travel trailers, and other similar vehicles placed on site for greater than 180 consecutive days. This includes manufactured homes located in a manufactured home park or subdivision.

Regulatory floodway means the channel of a river or other watercourse and the adjacent land areas that must be reserved in order to discharge the base flood without cumulatively increasing the water surface elevation more than a designated height.

Start of Construction includes substantial improvement, and means the date the building permit was issued provided the actual start of construction, repair, reconstruction, rehabilitation, addition placement, or other improvement was within 180 days of the permit date. The actual start means either the first placement of permanent construction of a structure on a site, such as the pouring of slab or footings, the installation of piles, the construction of columns, or any work beyond the stage of excavation; or the placement of a manufactured home on a foundation. Permanent construction does not include land preparation, such as clearing, grading and filling; nor does it include the installation of streets and/or walkways; nor does it include excavation for a basement, footings, piers, or foundations or the erection of temporary forms; nor does it include the installation on the property of accessory buildings, such as garages or sheds not occupied as dwelling units or not part of the main structure.

Substantial improvement means any combination of repairs, reconstruction, alteration, or improvements to a structure in which the cumulative cost equals or exceeds fifty percent of the market value of the structure. The market value of the structure should equal:

- (a) the appraised value prior to the start of the initial repair or improvement, or
- (b) in the case of damage, the value of the structure prior to the damage occurring.

For the purposes of this definition, "substantial improvement" is considered to occur when the first alteration of any wall, ceiling, floor, or other structural part of the building commences, whether or not that alteration affects the external dimensions of the structure. This term includes structures which have incurred substantial damage, regardless of actual repair work performed. The term does not, however, include any project for improvement of a structure required to comply with existing health, sanitary, or safety code specifications which are solely necessary to assure safe living conditions or any alteration of a "historic structure", provided that the alteration will not preclude the structure's continued designation as a "historic structure".

3. Add the following definitions:

Manufactured home park or subdivision means a parcel (or contiguous parcels) of land divided into two or more manufactured home lots for rent or sale.

Violation means the failure of a structure or other development to be fully compliant with the community's flood plain management regulations.
