

REPORT OF THE CONANT LIBRARY BUILDING COMMITTEE TO MARCH 1, 1891.

In accordance with the instructions of the town by a vote at the annual meeting in March, 1890, we herewith submit our report to date, of the action taken by the town towards constructing a library building, and our action in carrying out our instructions. By instructing us to print our report with the other annual reports of the town, we construe that the voters desired a report which should show the origin and progress of the building to the present date.

About the middle of the November, 1888, the Selectmen of Winchester received the following communication :

"Boston, November 12, 1888.

To the Selectmen of the town of Winchester, in the State of New Hampshire.

Gentlemen :--Mr. Ezra Conant who died at Boston, Mass., October 20, 1888, in and by his last will duly proved and allowed by the Probate Court for the County of Suffolk, held at Boston, this twelfth day of November, A. D. 1888, makes the following bequest :

'I give and bequeath unto my said Trustees, Eben Alexander and Phineas R. Smith, the sum of fifty thousand dollars, in trust, however, for the following uses and purposes, that is to say, to receive interest and take the care, custody and control of the same, and to collect the gains, income and profits thereof, and to pay over in semi-annual payments, or oftener if in their judgment it be deemed expedient, the net income, gains and profits thereof to said Helen F. Granger, for and during her natural life, and no longer; and at the decease of said Helen F. Granger, then I direct my said Trustees or their successors in said trust, to pay over said principal sum of fifty thousand dollars, and all increase thereof, if any, to the town of Winchester in the State of New Hampshire, for the purpose of purchasing and maintaining a Public Library; provided however, and upon the express condition, that said town shall within six years after this will shall have been duly proved and allowed in the Probate Court, erect a suitable brick or stone building in the central village of said town, for the sole purpose of a Public Library.

I direct that this legacy for the benefit of Helen F. Granger be paid to my Trustees as soon as conveniently may be after my decease, and without any liability to contribution in case of deficiency of assets.'

To the foregoing communication the following acknowledgement was made by the Selectmen.

"Winchester, N. H., Nov. 19, 1888.

To Eben Alexander and Phineas R. Smith, Trustees of the estate of the late Ezra Conant.

Gentlemen :—As the legally constituted agents of the town of Winchester, we have the honor of acknowledging the receipt of your favor of the 12th inst., conveying the official information of the munificent bequest of the late Mr. Ezra Conant, to the town of Winchester for the purpose of "purchasing and maintaining a Public Library." In behalf of the citizens of Winchester whom we represent, we would express to you as the trusted agents of our former townsman and fellow citizen, our gratitude and appreciation of the great gift which has thus fortunately fell to this community. We also wish to assure you that we shall do whatever may seem expedient to avail ourselves of the great benefits to this and future generations of this grand opportunity for educational advancement of the people of this town.

We would also ask the privilege of consulting with you personally at some convenient time in the near future, as to measures that may be thought advisable for the town to adopt in order to best promote the plans and wishes of our respected benefactor. Please to accept our thanks personally for your courtesy. Yours respectfully,

At the annual meeting in March, previous to the foregoing correspondence, the town had appointed a committee to investigate in regard to plans and estimates for a new Town Hall, which was contemplated by its advocates, should also contain a suitable room for the Public Library which the town now owns, and which is fast outgrowing the limited quarters where it is located. There was among our citizens a very general desire that the Town Hall and Library Building should be under the same roof, both on account of convenience and economy. It was thought desirable to have a consultation with the trustees of the fund which had been bequeathed to the town, to ascertain their views in regard to the legality of incorporating the two buildings; accordingly in January, 1889, the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, and Mr. Abbott, had an interview with Mr. Alexander, one of the trustees, and informed him of the desire of the town. He readily agreed to the desirability of our plan, and promised to confer with Mr. Smith at an early date and communicate their views upon the matter in writing, which are contained in the following letter.

"Boston, Jan. 12, 1889.

S. M. Morse, Esq.,

Dear Sir:—More delay has occurred than I intended should, when I told you I would at once confer with Mr. Smith on the topics you spoke about when here last week. As far as we are concerned as Trustees, we see no objection to the erection of a suitable stone or brick building combining the uses of a Public Library and Town Hall, provided sufficient prominence be given in it to the former, to carry out the evident ideas of the donor in his very liberal gift. Your town council can of course advise you as to whether such a building would come under the meaning and intent of the will. In the event of other Trustees having the charge of the fund when it should come into your hands, it will be well that no cause be given which would in any way make trouble. The element of safety for such an institution is to be considered and it might be questioned whether the use of the building for other purposes would not impair the security. This and other points will readily suggest themselves to you.

In the matter of finance I can say that we are at liberty to invest in your town bonds on terms to be agreed upon, but with the understanding that we should be on the same footing exactly as any other investor. As Trustees we are bound to make the best investment we can, and can only look to negotiable bonds which we can change at any time the interests of our ward would require. Such bonds as we might therefore take of you, would have to be without condition as regards the Trust Funds, and be such as you might have to dispose of for any town purpose. We are fully disposed to do all we can to assist you in this important matter, but cannot exceed our duties and powers as Trustees.

During the winter of 1888-9, the question of accepting the conditions of the Conant bequest was freely discussed by the citizens of the town, and at least one informal meeting was held at the Town Hall for that purpose. At the annual meeting in March, 1889, an article having been inserted in the warrant permitting free action upon the subject, the town took action as follows:

Dr. G. W. Peirce introduced the following preamble and resolutions which were voted without a dissenting voice.

"Whereas we, citizens of Winchester, N. H., having learned of the bequest of the late Ezra Conant of Boston, Mass., of a very large sum of money for the purpose of founding and maintaining a public library in said Winchester, and being desirous of testifying, regarding our great appreciation of said gift, hereby

Resolve 1st, That the name and memory of Ezra Conant shall be held in perpetual recollection and reverence till the latest hour of our individual and corporate existence.

Resolved 2d, That the institution for which he so generously provided, when completed, shall be known as the Ezra Conant Library.

Resolved 3d, That a copy of this preamble and these resolutions be printed and presented by the Town Clerk, each, to

Eben Alexander, Trustee, of Boston, to Phineas R. Smith, Trustee, of Boston, and to Helen F. Granger, also of Boston.

Resolved 4th, That this preamble and these resolutions be spread upon, and become part of the records of the town of Winchester."

It was also voted at the same meeting that a committee of three be appointed by the Moderator to procure plans and specifications for a library building, and report at an adjourned meeting; subsequently it was voted to adjourn to meet at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, on the second Tuesday of September, 1889.

The undersigned were appointed by the Moderator as the committee called for by the above vote.

It will be noted that this committee were entirely uninstructed by the town in regard to the style, dimensions, or cost of the building for which they were to procure plans; their only guide was contained in the conditions of the bequest, which called for "a suitable building of brick or stone."

Public opinion upon the subject seemed to be very vague and unsettled, and the committee were obliged to rely on their own judgment as to what would be acceptable to the voters. Having learned of the great satisfaction which the citizens of Brattleboro, Vt., manifested in their library building, which had recently been constructed, your committee decided to inspect it, and were not long in agreeing that with some modifications in ornamentation, and a little additional room to match our prospective magnificent endowment fund, it would be a very "suitable" structure for the Conant Library. Accordingly we consulted with the architect who furnished the plans for the Brooks Library at Brattleboro, Mr. J. M. Currier of Springfield, Mass., and in connection with the committee, which had been appointed by the town to procure plans for the Town Hall, contracted with Mr. Currier to furnish working plans and specifications for both the contemplated buildings, for which the town was to pay \$700. The library plans were to be delivered previous to Sept. 5, 1889, and the plans for the Town Hall previous to March 1, 1890.

We received the plans and specifications, as per contract, for the library building, and as we had expected, from the reputation of the maker, found them very accurate and satisfactory. At the adjourned annual meeting held Sept. 10, 1889, there was a fair attendance of the voters of the town, and a report of the committee on plans was read by the chairman, and the plans and specifications were exhibited and explained by a member of the committee. After a free, and full discussion of their merits, during which another plan was proposed by a citizen of the town, but with very indefinite and verbal specifications, it was voted to accept and adopt the plans made by Mr. Currier, and the following resolution was adopted by a strong vote :

"*Resolved*, That the plans and specifications for the Conant Library Building as presented to this meeting by the committee, with such modifications in detail which shall tend to reduce the expense of the building, as may be thought expedient by the committee, be accepted and adopted by the town.

Resolved, That the committee be instructed to advertise for proposals for the construction of the building, the whole contract to be included in one job, or to be divided into two or more contracts, as may in their judgment seem best; but in no case shall contracts be made which make the whole cost of the building completed according to the specifications exceed the sum of \$15,000; and the building must be completed to the acceptance of the committee prior to January 1, 1892. *Resolved*, That the Selectmen and Treasurer of the town

Resolved, That the Selectmen and Treasurer of the town of Winchester be instructed to borrow on the credit of the town, at a rate of interest not to exceed four per cent. annually, and for a time not to exceed twenty years, the sum of \$15,000, and that such portion of such amount as may be necessary shall be appropriated to the use of the Library Building Committee, as payment for the construction of the library building ; that said Selectmen and Treasurer are hereby authorized and instructed to advertise said loan in one or more newspapers published in Boston, and to issue the note or bond of the town, as may be deemed expedient, interest on said loan not to commence previous to July 1, 1890." An amendment by adding, "That no contract for the building should be made until the plans and specifications had been approved by the trustees of the Conant estate," was moved by Dr. G. W. Pierce, and adopted by the town. "*Voted*, That a sufficient portion of the south part of the Jennings lot shall be set apart, upon which shall be constructed the library building."

As soon as convenient after the meeting, the committee advertised for proposals for the construction of the building, in the New Hampshire Sentinel at Keene, Springfield Republican, Springfield, Mass., and the Engineering and Building Record, published at New York city, and fixing on the date of November 30, 1889, for opening the proposals. The following were found to be the bids for the building complete :

Before closing a contract we sent the plans and specifications to the trustees at Boston, according to our instructions, to see if they met with approval, and with the following correspondence :

"Winchester, N. H., Dec. 3, 1889.

To the trustees of the Ezra Conant estate.

Gentlemen :---We shall send you today by express the plans and specifications which have been adopted by the town for the new library building. In accordance with a vote of the town instructing us to procure your endorsement before contracting for the building, we herewith submit the plans for a building which we believe will be a suitable building, to comply with the terms of the bequest as made by the will of the late Mr. Conant, and also a building which will be an honor and credit to the town in future years. You will see by the specifications that it is to be a brick building, with cut granite trimmings, and thoroughly built in every respect. We believe that the plans for inside are as convenient and comfortable as in any building of its size within our knowledge, while the stack room is so constructed that it can very easily be enlarged at small expense to accommodate future growth. We have advertised for proposals for building the structure, which were opened on Saturday last, and we have satisfactory figures from at least one responsible firm, with whom we propose to contract if the plans meet your approval. The appropriation authorized by the town for the use of the committee in constructing the building, is \$15,000, exclusive of the lot and the grading; and the time in which it is to be constructed expires January 1, 1892.

We shall be under obligations if your Board will examine the plans at your earliest convenience and return the same to us at our expense by express, as they are the only set we have at present. We shall also be pleased to have you state to us officially whether you approve or disapprove of the plans, so that we may comply with our instructions.

Dear Sir:—We have carefully examined the plans, etc., for the new library building, and enclose as an endorsement on your letter of the 3d inst. our approval of the same. I return the plans by express today. We think you have been very successful, and that you will have, when completed, a very convenient and attractive building for the uses designed. * * * * Hoping to visit you next summer and note the progress of the new building, I am

We do, so far as we have the right, hereby approve the plans for a public library building, to be erected in the central village of the town of Winchester, N. H., made by J. M. Currier, architect, of Springfield, Mass., and submitted to us by the Building Committee of said town, as per annexed letter.

EBEN ALEXANDER, PHINEAS R. SMITH,

Executors and Trustees under will of Ezra Conant."

The proposal of Mather & Whiting coming very near our limit, they concluded to discount \$100 and on December 9, 1889, a contract was signed between them and the committee, by which they agree to build the building according to the plans and specifications as originally made by Mr. Currier for the sum of \$15,000, the building to be completed previous to Oct. 1, 1891. Operations were commenced in April, 1890, and the work steadily advanced until December, by which time the outside of the building was nearly completed and the plastering completed inside.

According to the terms of the contract, we have paid them in monthly instalments, 80 per cent. of the work and materials furnished according to the estimate of the architect, amounting to the sum of nine thousand dollars, leaving six thousand more to be paid when the job is completed. We have had no occasion for complaint in the progress of the work and the contractors, so far as we are competent to judge, have shown a rare degree of honesty and faithfulness in carrying out their contract. We feel that we are very fortunate in our architect, and our contractors, and believe that the town will have a building that will be a credit to all connected with it when it shall be finally completed, which will probably be sometime during the coming summer.

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REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

Sirs,—We have the honor to submit the following report as to the affairs which have been under our charge the past year. Our report will occupy but a small space, because the general sanitary condition of the town—while by no means ideal—has been so good as to necessitate less official action on our part than any previous year. At Ashuelot, on the Broad Brook road, in the lower village, are a series of houses whose sanitation can, in our opinion, only be made satisfactory by an expensive sewer, whose outlet shall be in the Ashuelot river, at some point which a survey would locate. We shall cheerfully endorse any measures the town may take which will help solve the problem.

We beg leave to again call the attention of the town to the bad sanitary condition of the two Ashuelot school houses, and hope immediate steps may be taken for their betterment.

We, in conclusion, ask each citizen to do all in his power to reduce the causes of bad sanitation to a minimum, both for his own and for the public health, and bear in mind that when all the public has power to do has been done, yet the greatest factor in maintaining the good health of the community, is the care and intelligent foresight shown by the individuals composing it.

The Board desire to call attention to the fact that the entire appropriation of five thousand dollars, raised by the town for school purposes, has been absorbed in payment of salaries of teachers. That owing to the fact that Massachusetts, and other states so near us, pay teachers so much more liberally than we have so far been able to do, that only by adjusting wages as we have done are we able to secure the services of satisfactory teachers, and the whole tendency of wages is upward, rather than otherwise. So that it will be impossible to conduct our schools in the future, for a less sum annually in this direction, and an increased appropriation is imperatively demanded, unless the parents and friends of the scholars are willing to lesson the number of weeks of school, for each school in the town. We would still further call attention to the fact, that for succeeding years another school (No. 19) will have to be provided for, thus increasing the demand for still further appropriations, and we wish every voter to note, that with every increase of the number of schools, there is an absolute necessity for an increase of appropriation, and we particularly call your attention to the disposition, too general we fear, to multiply individual schools. This might be very convenient from an individual standpoint, but would be absolutely destructive to the cause of education, and expensive beyond estimate.

The State having made it compulsory that free text books and supplies should be furnished to all schools, according to their needs, the Board of Education thereby have been compelled to make purchase of the same, in excess of the appropriation made by the district at the last annual meeting. We have issued 1,637 bound volumes, only upon the requisitions of the teachers, to supply absolute known wants in their individual schools. In addition to this, we have also been compelled by the same law, to furnish the entire amount of ink, pens, pencils, paper, writing books, composition books, slates, crayons, etc., etc., required for school purposes.

The school year has been a remarkably successful one. This more particularly applies to our graded and larger schools, the result largely of the opportunity given to employ more competent and experienced teachers, besides having longer terms. The ambition of individual scholars is aroused by competition, and a desire to emulate their associates, also a large amount of knowledge is acquired by the larger opportunities afforded for observation.

The subject of transportation of scholars is one that has given the Board a great deal of anxiety. As the law now stands, all sums paid for transportation of scholars reduces the sum total of the amount available for support of schools by just so much. And as we have before stated, the only way funds can be obtained for this purpose is by reducing the school hours below the present standard.

If the district could see its way clear to appropriate a specific sum for this purpose, and in some manner decide as to its payment, it would perform both an act of generosity to the Board, and an act of justice to such individuals as now or hereafter may feel from force of circumstances that they have just claims for such compensation.

REMARKS.

In justice to ourselves and our constituents, and for the benefit of those who will be our successors in office, we offer the following remarks in explanation of our acts in the discharge of our duties as Selectmen for the past year. The expense of keeping the roads in repair for the past year as by our report, appears to be large, yet when we consider that the amount paid for building the new road is included in the sum total, and that, as by vote of the town March 11, 1890, we were instructed to set aside a sum sufficient to pay for the building of the said new road, and by deducting the expense of same from the amount expended, we feel that the cost of keeping our roads in repair is not above an average with the cost for same for the past four years. We have newly planked the iron bridge, and bought and put in a large quantity of drain tile in place of old plank sluices, which we believe to be good policy. The expenses for paupers and aid for dependent soldiers and their families have been large, and although we have been quite severely criticised by some for this outlay, we feel that we have acted cautiously and lawfully, and for the same we have no apologies to offer.

For which there was no appropriations we have paid the following amounts: Paid \$100 for cancelling contract for making plans and specifications for Town Hall. Paid \$250 filling in and around Conant Library Building as by vote of town. Paid \$300, interest on Town Bond, Library Building Paid Wm. There are many other items of smaller note but time and space forbid us to mention. The report of 1890 shows that the town was in debt \$952, the report of this year shows a balance in favor of the town of \$271.13. This amount has nothing to do with the town bond loan. As our time is limited by which to get our report ready for the printer, we are prevented from making more explanations or offering suggestions.

Thanking our friends and constituents for their past favors and for the respect which they have shown us, we submit the above to your consideration.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, 1891, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

ARTICLE I.—To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting.

ART. 2.—To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 3.—To see how much money the town will vote to raise for ordinary town charges for the ensuing year.

ART. 4.—To see how much money the town will vote to raise to keep the roads in repair the ensuing year.

ART. 5.—To see what method the town will vote to take to support the poor the ensuing year, and raise money therefor.

ART. 6.—To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Fire Department for the ensuing year.

ART. 7.—To see if the town will vote to pay the firemen anything in addition to what is allowed them by law.

ART. 8.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed seventy-five dollars to defray the expense of painting the engine house in the Center Village.

ART. 9.-To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen or Firewards to take down the tower on the

engine house in the Center Village, and build a new tower on the outside of the west end of the said engine house, to raise money therefor or act thereon.

ART. 10.—To see how much money the town will vote to raise for decorating soldiers' graves.

ART. 11.—To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the Town Library the ensuing year.

ART. 12.—To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the care of Evergreen Cemetery for the ensuing year.

ART. 13.—To see how much money the town will vote to raise for improvements in Evergreen Cemetery for the ensuing year.

ART. 14.—To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to pay Charles F. Plastridge \$48.84, on account of damages to goods and cart in 1877, occasioned by a defective highway.

ART. 15.—To see what disposition the town will vote to make of the unexpended balance of any or all the several appropriations by the town for the year ending March 1, 1891, as reported by the Selectmen, or act thereon.

ART. 16.—To see if the town will vote to purchase the electric light plant now in operation in the Center Village, raise money therefor or act thereon.

ART. 17.—To see if the town will vote to build a concrete walk from the residence of F. P. Willis to Maple Avenue on Mechanic street (the street crossings being already laid), to raise money therefor or act thereon.

ART. 18.—To see if the town will vote to put in drain tile from the old school house lot in Ashuelot, on Broad Brook road to the Ashuelot river, raise money therefor or act thereon.

ART. 19.—To see if the town will vote to choose a board of three appraisers to appraise the real estate property in the town of Winchester, or act thereon.

ART. 20.—To see if the town will vote to adopt a code of by-laws for managing and ordering its prudential affairs, and annex penalties thereto, as is provided by statute for towns to regulate. ART. 21.—To see if the town will consider and adopt the report, or any portion thereof, made by the Board of Firewards in the year 1889 (and overlooked by mistake), in regard to the laying of pipe and setting of hydrants for fire purposes, raise and appropriate money therefor or act thereon.

ART. 22.—To see if the town will vote to lay a tile drain pipe and connect with sewer, to relieve the annoyance of water often accumulating on the common, raise and appropriate money therefor or act thereon.

ART. 23.—To see if the town will vote to purchase land and buildings to be known and used as the Winchester Poor or Town Farm, raise money therefor or act thereon.

ART. 24.—To transact any other business that may legally come before the said meeting.
