Report of School Board

For the Year Ending Feb. 15, 1914

To the Citizens of the School District of Brookfield:

We submit the following report to the welfare of our schools:

A few needed repairs have been made and a few new text books purchased during the past year, the school year also being lengthened to thirty weeks.

On account of sickness the Stoneham school under Miss Grace Tuttle was obliged to be closed.

Miss Cecile V. Marden of Wolfeboro taught eight weeks in the Hackett school; at the end of that time she resigned and the vacancy was immediately filled by Miss Martha L. Meserve of Jackson.

Miss Ethel Lang. of B. F. A. '13 proved a very successful teacher in the Churchill school, it being her first experience.

One of the most important thing in a school room is order; without this the interest is not on the work and but little is accomplished. The little ones are expected to be a little restless, but teachers do not find much trouble in quieting them if older ones do not make a disturbance. Pupils usually behave in school as they are taught to conduct themselves at home; therefore it is the duty of every parent to encourage not discourage the good behavior of their children. It is not wholly the duty of the teachers to keep order, but also that of each individual pupil to aid her and make the school room a place of enjoyment and pleasure rather than a place of study and hard work, because if a teacher is allowed to put her attention wholly on her work she is able to make it much easier and pleasanter for everyone.
