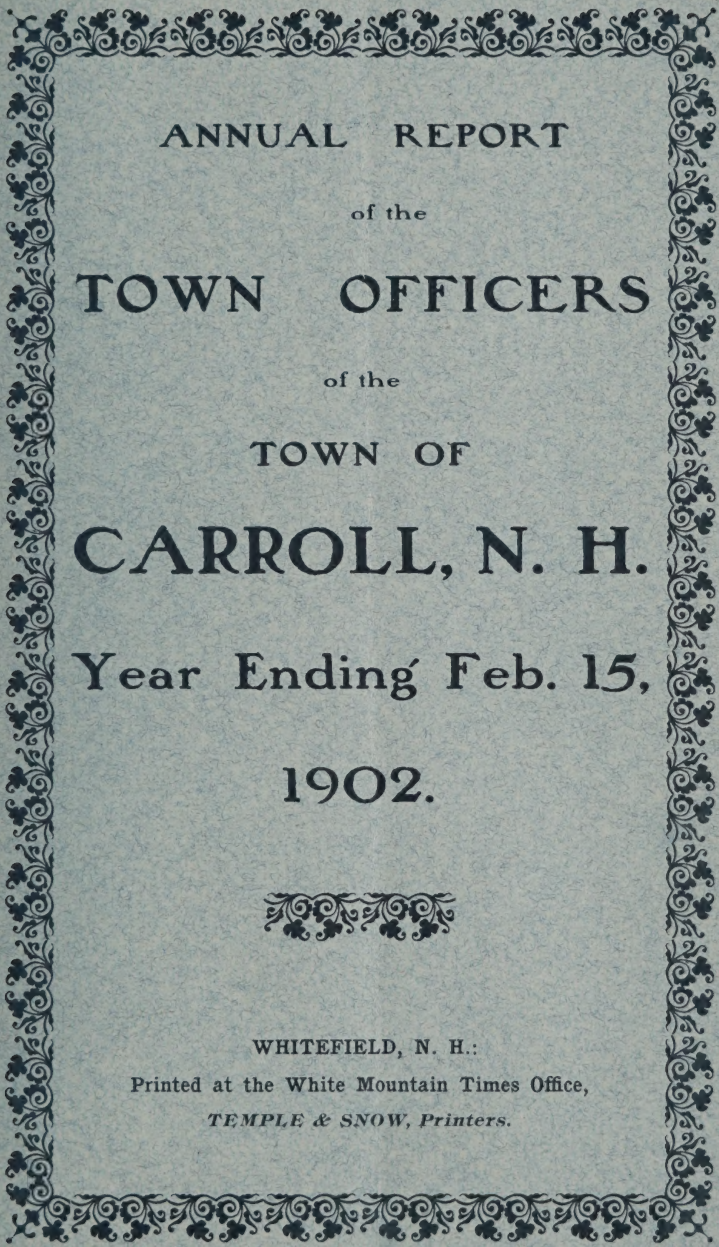


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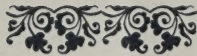

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

The review of the year shows that progress has been made, and in some schools unusually marked improvement has been manifest.

The Pine Grove school was taught first term by Miss Georgia A. Black, of Lancaster, who has had good success as a teacher in different parts of our town heretofore. The remainder of the year was taught by Miss Eunice Stegman, of Littleton, whose return is desired by every one in the district. Pupils on Roll of Honor one term, Clinton Baldie, Henry Lennon; two terms, Martha Damon; the entire year, Vincent Gage.

Cherry Mountain school was taught the first two terms by Miss Nina Stillings, of Whitefield, who also commenced the third term but was taken ill the second week. The work was ably taken up by Miss Lula Wilkins, of Gimanton, who proved herself a young teacher main-

taining excellent order and discipline. The progress of this school in arithmetic was something remarkable, Miss Stilling's methods being excellent. Pupils on Roll of Honor one term, Mabel Miles, Hattie Brill; two terms, Almeda Rines, Alice Glidden, Elmer Brill; for the entire year, Hazel Glidden, Ethel Hudson.

Town House school was taught first term by Mrs. Hattie Harvey; the last two by Miss Georgia Back who has also taught this school several previous terms. This school, although not large, is studious and well advanced with excellent attendance. We listened to the best oral spelling in this school of any in town. Pupils on Roll of Honor one term, Anna Hunt, Charlie Wentworth, Gladys Nelson; for two terms, Leon Hunt, Avice Hunt, Annie Whalen; for entire year, Ethel Lindsey, Gertrude Whalen, Mamie Whalen.

The Applebee school first term was taught by Miss Marion Hilliard of Lancaster; the last two by Miss May Washburn of the same town, both of whom gave excellent satisfaction. The improvement in reading is very marked in this school. We are glad to learn that new and more comfortable seats are to be placed in the room, and that a new and much needed blackboard is to be added. We also hope for an improved attendance. Pupils on Roll of Honor for one term; Sadie Ingerson, Bessie Ingerson, Mamie Eagle; for two terms, Hattie Ingerson; for the entire year, none.

The Fabyan school was taught the entire year by Miss Charlotte Belknap of Lancaster. In our six visits to this school we were impressed with the good order maintained and the thorough recitations. The attendance of this school should be almost perfect, as it is conveniently located, there being no long difficult distances even in winter, and the register should show fairer pages. Pupils on the Roll on Honor one term, Scott Wells; two terms, Edna Wells; for the entire year, none.

The grammar room of the Twin graded school was taught first term by Miss Mary A. Seymour, the faithful efficient teacher of many previous terms; and the last two by Miss Julia Mae Swain, of New Hampton, who by her knowledge and rich experience was able to make it almost equal to a high school room. Through her kindness and ability the more advanced class finished commercial arithmetic and got a good start in algebra, geometry, and French. There is a unanimous call for Miss Swain's return. Pupils had taught four years at Fabyans one term, Wm. Ogle, John Ogle, James Kelly, Tommie Monohan, Roy Brown, Clarence Brown, Bridget King, Mary McCann, Ethel Seymour, Willie Cote; for two terms, John Kelley, Sidney Brown; for the entire year, Elworth McMillan.

Primary room teachers during the year have been Miss Stella Seymour, Mrs. Florence Jenness Allen, and Miss Florence I. Swett, all of whom have probably put in the most "right down hard work" of any required in town. Mrs. Allen had taught four years at Fabyans and was prepared to deal with a room full of little restless ones with success. Much bright interesting work is done in this room, and we wish parents would often visit it and see for themselves. The penmanship of this grade is excellent and would be a credit to advanced pupils. Those on the Roll of Honor for one term, Michael McCann, Frank McCann, Arthur Cote, Allen Quinn, Charlie Jobin, Charlie McGee, Flora Southam, Lemira Burrows, Marguerite Quinn, Grace Cote, Edna Haynes, Marie O'Donnell; for two terms, Herbert McGee, Francis King; for the entire year, none.

Supplementary reading has been taken up in nearly every room for afternoon reading. So that now the pupils can read articles from magazines or newspapers in a manner to interest the listener. The old monotonous sing-song style of reading has become a thing of the past.

Particular attention has been given to hygiene and the effect of tobacco and alcohol upon the mental and physical system.

Fractions, the bugbear of many a pupil, have been thoroughly handled and simplified. We have been pleased and proud to see the practical work done by our boys and girls this past year in mathematics, while grammar, we feel safe to say, has never been so well understood.

Our new up-to-date histories, with full illustrations and maps of our new possessions, fill a long felt need, and are eagerly studied by our ambitious pupils.

In laying down the work we have so much enjoyed, we wish for our successor the same kindness and helpfulness from parents, teachers, and pupils that have been given to us during the past three years.
