### TOWN WARRANT

### The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Gilford in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Gilford Grade School in said Gilford on Tuseday, the 14th day of March, 1967, at 8 of the clock in the forenoon (Polls to be open from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m. at least) to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$180,000.00 for the construction, equipment and furnishings of a new Town Office Building including architect's fees, said sum to be raised by the issuance of serial notes or bonds upon the credit of the Town, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued including their sale and the time and place of payment of principal and interest. (Requires a two-thirds vote by ballot)

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$32,000.00 for the construction of a Highway Garage: \$2,000.00 to be raised by current taxes and the balance by the issuance of six serial notes in the amount of \$5,000.00 each, payable annually, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes shall be issued including their sale and the time and place of payment of principal and interest.

(Requires a two-thirds vote by ballot)

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$28,000.00 for the purchase of a Fire Truck — \$8,000.00 to be raised by current taxes and the balance by the issuance of two serial notes in the amount of \$10,000.00 each, payable annually, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes shall be issued including their sale and the time and place of payment of principal and interest.

(Requires a two-thirds vote by ballot) (Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee)

Article 5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year, including charges for: Town Officers' Salaries, Administrative Expense, Election and Registration, Property Mapping, Repair and Maintenance of Town Buildings, Social Security and Retirement Payments, White Pine Blister Rust Control, Dutch Elm Disease Control, Insurance, Planning Board Operation, Dog Damage, Legal Expense, Civil Defense, Lakes Region General Hospital, Health Officer and Expense, Mental Health, Town Dump, Street Lighting, Town Poor and Old Age Assistance, Memorial Day, Water Works, Cemeteries, Glendale Wharves and Parking Lot, Lakes Region Association, Interest on Temporary Loans, Interest on Long Term Notes and Bonds, Payment of Notes and Bonds, Land Purchase Costs, and Surplus Equipment.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of the Police Department.

Article 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Board of three (3) Police Commissioners whose term of office shall commence on the third Tuesday of March 1967 and shall terminate on the third Tuesday of March 1968, at which time a Board of Police Commissioners duly elected by ballot at the 1968 Annual Town Meeting will take oath and assume office.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Fire Department.

Article 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to supplement the funds appropriated at the 1966 annual town meeting for the Town's share for participation in the Urban Planning Assistance Program.

Article 10. To hear the report and to see what action the Town will take with respect to the recommendations of the Town Manager Study Committee, and to see if the Committee will be continued.

Article 11. To see what amount the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Town Manager Study Committee.

Article 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operation of the Highway Department.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to asphalt October Lane, Skyline-Pine Crest Drives, Bedford Ave., Dump Road, Kimball Road and Harris Shore Road, to build and tar Breton Road and to build the Heights Road on Varney Point, Dinsmoor Point Road, start Wild Acres Road and to raise and appropriate funds for these purposes. Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,500.00 for the following: purchase of an Industrial Tractor complete with bucket loader, 7 foot cutter bar and 12 foot quick-hitch backhoe, including trade of present tractor, and for the purchase of a bulldozer.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to dispose of the Town's Allis Chalmers Bulldozer to such persons and under such conditions as they see fit.

Article 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Road Aid for maintenance, construction or reconstruction of Class V Highways.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,000.00 as the Town's share of reconstruction of town road in conjunction with road construction by the State of New Hampshire at the junction of Route No. 11 and Lily Pond Road.

Article 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Public Library.

Article 19. To see what action the Town will take on an Old Home Day observance or celebration of Town's anniversary and to raise and appropriate funds for the same.

Article 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Parks, Playgrounds and Beaches.

Article 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Farmer Field Improvements.

Article 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Lakes Region General Hospital Building Fund.

Article 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of purchasing materials required for the making of signs.

Article 24. To see what action the Town will take on abandoning that section of the Curtis Road which has been replaced by new construction, which may be described as follows: A sharply curved strip about 350 feet in length measured along the center line of the old road and lying northeasterly of the new roadway with the usual width of 50 feet.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to abandon that section of the old Route 11A, beginning about 100 feet southerly of Belknap Mountain Road where the southerly end line of the store lot extended westerly crosses said old Route 11A, thence running southerly to Gunstock River (Brook).

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and transfer tax liens upon all real estate acquired by the Town at any tax sale, and title to all real estate taken by the Town in default of redemption from any tax sale, to such persons and upon such conditions as they shall see fit.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

Article 28. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase a tract of land from the State of New Hampshire for the sum of \$1.00 subject to the following restrictions: 1. Reversion of land to the State. The main long range use of the tract of land is to be for public outdoor recreation and if this main use changes, the land will revert to the State of New Hampshire.

2. The public shall not be excluded from fishing the length of Gunstock River within the tract.

3. The natural character of Gunstock River within the tract shall not be altered.

Article 29. To see if the town will adopt an Ordinance concerning salesmen and solicitors as follows: No hawker, peddler or itinerant vendor, and no person or group of persons, shall go about the streets or from door to door in the Town of Gilford for the purpose of selling or soliciting the sale of any goods, wares or merchandise or any service, without having first registered with the Chief of Police and deposited name, address, and the nature of their business, and in case they are acting as agents for others, the name and address of their principal. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined no more than twenty dollars (\$20.00) for each offense.

Article 30. To see if the town will adopt an Ordinance concerning Police Officers at dances as follows: No person shall give or hold a dance within the Town of Gilford to which the public is invited or admitted, without having first notified the Chief of Police of the time and place of the dance. The Chief of Police shall detail one or more police officers to attend the dance, services to be paid for by the person giving or holding the dance. The police officer or officers attending the dance shall have authority to preserve order.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to file in behalf of the Town an application

(in form and manner required by the United States and in conformity with P. L. 560, 83rd Congress) and do whatever else may be required for an advance, in the amount of \$16,000.00, to be made by the United States to the Town of Gilford to aid in defraying the cost of preliminary report and plan preparation for sewerage and sewer treatment facilities for the Town of Gilford. (Requires a two-thirds vote by ballot)

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Planning Board to review, and approve or disapprove site plans for the development of tracts for non-residential uses whether or not such development includes a subdivision or re-subdivision of the site, as provided in Chapter 36, Section 19A of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to exchange a parcel of townowned land lying southerly of the church land with common boundary of 355 feet, a depth of roughly 280 feet and an area of about one and six-tenths acres for a strip from the westerly side of church land 30 feet wide and 250 feet more or less long running southerly through the present church structure from a 30 foot frontage on Potter Hill Road.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to dispose of the old town barn on such terms and in such manner as the Selectmen may determine.

Article 35. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

In accordance with a resolution adopted at the 1957 Town Meeting a motion will be presented to adjourn to the Gilford Grade School in said Gilford on Wednesday, the 15th day of March, 1967 at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to take up articles 2 through 35.

#### REPORT OF SELECTMEN

The Town of Gilford is experiencing a growth that ten years ago we all would have perhaps said, "It'll never happen here." Well, it has and is happening. We are embarking on the fields of sewer districts, shopping centers and industrial development.

The growth of Gilford has been evident around the Town Hall. The Town Hall is probably the first to feel the impact of growth. Many more persons make daily use of the Town Hall facilities for building permits, automobile registrations, inventories, dog registrations, beach tags, general information and many items too numerous to mention.

During the year 1966 there were approximately 260 transfers of property in Gilford. Property throughout the Town is turning over at a very rapid rate thus our "Property Mapper" is handling parcels of land in ever increasing numbers. Each transfer means an updating of our mapping. Ever present is the searching of deeds and the straightening out of boundary lines in order that an up-to-date town record can be maintained.

With the Town of Gilford now having an assessed valuation of over thirty-two million dollars (\$32,000,000) our "Tax Collector" must handle many more dollars. Also with the addition of people, this means more head and poll tax payments must be handled and recorded.

Your Selectmen attempted to improve the Gilford look this past year with respect to our "Town Buildings." The Glendale Fire Station, Town Hall and Glendale Comfort Station were painted. Also, the fire escape and side entrance at the Glendale Station were repaired. The firemen completely redecorated the interior of the Central Fire Station. These are the symbols of Gilford and as such, we must maintain their beauty.

Much to our dismay, as well as to everyone else, we continue to lose our stately elm trees. Each year with our "Dutch Elm" appropriation a survey is made by the State of New Hampshire and the diseased trees are tagged. We have followed up the notification and our Highway Department removes and burns the trees during the winter months in between the plowing of snow. Residents who are notified of diseased trees on their property, are encouraged to remove the trees. It is truly hoped that a way will be found to overcome this very disheartening waste.

Once again Gilford has a "Dump." Our neighbors in Laconia opened a new Disposal Garden and we were caught a little unawares. We were very fortunate in locating an attendant for the dump as well as a building and a tractor. It was necessary to reconvene the Budget Committee for an additional appropriation. During the late fall the Dump was closed one day per week and during the winter it is closed two days a week.

Requests for street lights continue at a steady pace. In the past year, we have added or changed lighting on Skyline Drive, Cyrus Lane, Woodland Avenue, Morrill Street, Allen Road, Glenridge Way, Bedford Avenue and Gilford Avenue. Also numerous intersections have been lighted to improve our highway safety.


The "Highway Department" has had a very demanding year. This past year a new policy has been adopted and roads are being finished completely including grading, loaming, seeding and haying. An accelerated road construction project had been in progress for the past ten years to get as many roads as possible under hardtop. It is believed that the objective has been reached. We plan to continue an extensive road building cam-

paign; to do a more finished type of job. The end result will be that we will probably construct less miles of road yearly, but we will be better off with a much more attractive roadside image. We feel that by doing a more complete job that the maintenance costs should ultimately be reduced.

During 1966, Dockham Shore Road westerly from Sanborn Road to Route No. 11-B, was reconstructed as was the Curtis Road. Also rebuilt, but not yet finished, is Liberty Hill Road easterly from Country Club Road where two curves have been eliminated. The surface has been applied to Mountain Drive in addition to the ever present maintenance of the road system along with replacing or resetting of culverts, applying cold patch, the cleaning of ditches, removal of dead trees and the many other duties of a Highway Department. With the construction of State Highways in Gilford, various sections of roads have been by-passed and, of course, these roads revert to the Town. We have the new highway truck that we hope will take over the snow plowing load usually done by the grader.

The Glendale Parking Lot was completely resurfaced and stripes for parking lanes were added. The parking situation seemed much improved over past years. Also, the electric cables supplying current for the lights on the wharfs were replaced. These improvements should reduce the maintenance costs around the wharfs and parking area.

The Planning Board has experienced a very busy year. Much hard work and thought was put into the newly adopted Sub-Division Regulations. The Soil Use Maps for Gilford have been ordered from the County. These maps will provide much needed information. Also, a planning consultant has been selected by the Planning Board. This firm is to do the Comprehensive Plan for Gilford. We hope that this plan will provide us with the avenues that are best followed as Gilford continues to grow. We must plan if we are to grow and develop in an orderly and economical manner.

Specal recognition is given the Youth Fellowship of the Gilford Community Church. This group took on the task of cleaning up the cemeteries around Gilford. If you haven't noticed, you should make it a point to visit the cemetery on Route No. 11-B and see what this group accomplished. They are presently doing the Hoyt Cemetery. Thanks and congratulations for pursuing this most worthwhile project.

Appreciation must be extended to the various other committees not mentioned in the foregoing. The Recreation Commission and the Conservation Commission perform services very vital to Gilford. You'll be hearing much more from both of these organizations. Omitted from the resumé, but not forgotten, are our Police and Fire Departments. It is customary for them to recap the year in their own report. We are proud of our Police Department for the job that they are doing for all of us. We also thank our Fire Department for the many rubbish piles and eyesores that they are constantly in pursuit of so that they can be burned in order to maintain the beauty of Gilford.

It is hoped that it has been noted that junk automobiles are disappearing from the Gilford landscape. Everyone has heard people talk of roadside beautification and we have tried to do our part. Anyone who has any love for our Town should remove these unregistered vehicles from their property. To date, over two hundred vehicles have been removed from some sixty people's property.

The foregoing has been a capsule report of 1966. What does 1967 hold in store for Gilford?

No one can look into a crystal ball and predict the coming year. We feel that the coming year will be more demanding than any of the past years. As we proceed to grow, we must expect to be confronted with new problems. Our commercial development is expected to continue at a rapid rate. Just beginning, but something that is expected to grow, is our Industrial Development. As our increases come in the Commercial and Industrial Sections then it follows that our Residential Development will increase also. This growth means such things as sewers, water systems, burglar alarms, sprinkler alarms, new or improved roads — just to mention a few.

Gilford consists of fifty-one square miles comprised of thirty-eight square miles of land and thirteen square miles of inland water with twelve miles of shoreline. More important than statistics is that Gilford is composed of people. We must continue to maintain a clean, honest Town Government with a reasonable and stable tax structure. We must also maintain the beauty of Gilford by enforcing our regulations, preserving some of our open spaces and by planning the orderly growth of Gilford.

It has been a genuine honor and pleasure to have served the people of Gilford.

#### REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF THE GILFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY

1966

In April the trustees of the Gilford Public Library met with the Planning Board to consider the needs of the library for the next ten years. Some of the things discussed were the present acreage of the library lot, population trends, concentrations of borrowers, improvement of basement rooms, etc. All this information has been considered by the Board of Trustees in planning for future expansion needs of the town library.

During the year several improvements were made in the physical plant. Storm doors and windows were installed in order to conserve heat. The entire electrical system was checked, a separate meter installed, and rewiring done where needed. Previously the library had received electricity through an underground cable from the Town Hall.

Mrs. Pratt, the Librarian, is now the proud owner of a certificate showing that she has completed her course of study at the University of New Hampshire, in Public Library Techniques.

Mrs. Lindsay attended some workshops and bookselection meetings held at Laconia, with Mrs. Pratt.

We now have the booklet, *Books and Libraries Equal Better Students*. This booklet is the culmination of more than a year's work by joint committees from the State Department of Education, the State Library, from public libraries, and from school libraries. It was published by the New Hampshire State Library and the New Hampshire State Department of Education. Mrs. Simonds worked on the committee as a representative of school libraries. She has also attended School Librarians' meetings and is taking two University of New Hampshire extension courses, at Durham and Concord respectively.

# LIBRARIAN'S REPORT OF THE GILFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY

#### 1966

This past year, the library increased its number of card holders from 757 to 839. The library is open 24 hours a week. The library hours were changed slightly, in November. We are no longer open on Friday evenings. We are now open 2 hours on Wednesday morning, 9:30 to 11:30. The hours open are as follows:

Monday — 2 thru 6 pm.

Tuesday — 2 thru 8 pm.

Wednesday — 9:30 thru 11:30 am and 2 thru 6 pm.

Thursday — 2 thru 6 pm.

Friday — 2 thru 6 pm.

In March, with the help of Mrs. Eleanor Lindsay and Mrs. Dorothy Emilio, the tedious job of inventory was begun. We finished all the adult fiction. Miss Tamar Lindsay typed catalog cards for us, in her spare time.

In April, a book selection committee was formed: Mrs. Lee Pitou, Mrs. Fran Talbot, Mrs. Alida Millham and the librarian.

Our reference shelf has a new encyclopedia. It is the Compton's Pictured Encyclopedia and will replace the 1949 edition which we now circulate.

The Bookmobile made four trips to Gilford, this past year. Mrs. Annie Chapman, Mrs. Eleanor Lindsay, Mrs. Ruth Sawyer, Mrs. Alida Millham, Mrs. Lee Pitou and others helped us to select the books. The Bookmobile truck operates out of the State Library in Concord. A total of 2327 books were borrowed. These books are circulated the same way we do our own collection.

There is also another very valuable service which the New Hampshire State Library offers. Any book can be ordered from them. It can be a recent novel, an old favorite, non-fiction, reference materials, or back issues of magazines. This past year, this library borrowed 252 books in this manner.

Throughout the past year, the librarian has been attending meetings at Laconia and Concord. These meetings are concerned with statewide library development.

While the librarian was at UNH, this past summer, the library was run by Mrs. Dorothy Emilio, Assistant Librarian. Mrs. Nancy Campbell assisted her.

In the month of December, the library had a very unusual display. Mrs. Alfred Fairfield of Hancock, N. H., loaned her handcarved Creche. Each piece was carved with a jackknife by Mrs. Fairfield. It was begun in 1960 and one or two pieces were added each year. Mrs. Fairfield is the mother of Mrs. Richard Cilley, a Gilford resident.

In closing, we would like to welcome all Gilfordites, young and old, to use your library. It is located in the Village, just over the bridge.

#### REPORT OF THE GILFORD RECREATION COMMISSION

To the residents and taxpayers of the Town of Gilford:

The Recreation Commission herewith submits its report on operation of Gilford's recreational facilities in 1966.

#### I. GILFORD BEACH.

Again in 1966, your Commission sought to add features at the Beach to increase both safety and enjoyment in use of the facility. Playground equipment was installed, as were additional charcoal grills for picnickers' use. The access road to the Varney section was widened to permit passage of two-way traffic. Lifeguard personnel were provided with electronic megaphones and an additional watch tower.

Attendance at the Beach during the season by residents and taxpayers increased by more than one thousand, to 30,382. Admission of houseguests of residents or taxpayers, and patrons of motels and resorts on reduced-rate tickets increased by a like number, to 4,429. Only public admissions declined, by nearly 5,000, to 3,847. This decline was attributable in part to increase in the admission fee, and in part to apparent increase of reduced-rate tickets by some persons. The Commission had indications that some persons were procuring reduced rate tickets and reselling them to persons who were neither houseguests of residents or taxpavers, nor patrons of motels or resorts. Those who did this were only cheating their fellow townspeople out of needed revenue. Your Commission hopes to take steps to make the practice more difficult in the future.

Even with the decline in numbers of public admission, total revenue still increased, to \$2,699.72. Of this a-

mount, \$7,938.92 was available for Commission use and \$2,561.08 was returned to the Town's General Fund.

Participation in the Red Cross sanctioned program of swimming instruction again showed a sizeable increase, with addition this year of adult classes and a water carnival. Good swimming instruction continues to be one of the Commission's main goals.

In 1967, the Commission hopes to replace the existing raft with a new, larger one and to continue general improvements, such as gravelling parking lots and bettering the appearance of the Beach entrance.

## II. THE VILLAGE FIELD.

Again in 1966, only partial use of the field could be made, due to the existence of an agricultural lease which predated the Town's purchase. However, two baseball backstops were purchased and temporary diamonds laid out. The Little League put these facilities to good use.

Your Commission continued with planning for full use of the Field, adopting a program to spread development steps and costs over a five year period. The program, together with previous studies, was submitted to officials of the State Department of Resources and Economic Development. After a review, these officials informed the Commission that the Town could qualify for 50% financial assistance from the Federal Government under the Land and Water Conservation Act, for development of the Field. This was good news, and the Commission is now taking steps to assure that the assistance funds will be granted.

In August 1967, the Commission will gain full use of the field and if all goes well, we hope to start the first phase of the development program at that time.

Again in 1966, the Commission's job was made easier and more pleasant by the loyal service of its employees and fine cooperation on the part of Gilford people. Our thanks go to all concerned. We would appreciate having written suggestions for improvement of your recreation facilities.

#### REPORT OF THE GILFORD PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board has concentrated its efforts on drafting and adopting Subdivision Regulations and initiating action on the Gilford Town Plan, in accordance with the instructions of the past Town Meeting.

The first project was successfully concluded following six months of working meetings and three public hearings, with the adoption of the Regulations on January 16. As a result of this action, the Board feels that the quality of new developments will improve with a corresponding increase in efficiency of community services.

The second major area of activity was Comprehensive Planning. In April a joint meeting was held with all town officials and agencies to determine needs and considerations for the Planning Program. Subsequently, materials from nine Community Planning firms were received and reviewed. Four firms were personally interviewed and Community Planning Services, a division of Whitman and Howard Engineers was finally selected. Their initial proposal was received in August and after several meetings with Mr. John Atwood, Planning Director for the firm, the final proposal was accepted in December.

The total program will comprise two phases of approximately eighteen months each. The initial phase will be a basic comprehensive plan and the second will include some detailed design, development of modern implementation measures and a communications program concentrating on presenting all the material and plans to the residents and taxpayers for discussion and further revision, as necessary. The total program cost is estimated at \$25,000.00. Gilford's share will be approximately \$9,000.00 and a request will be made to the Federal Government for a grant of \$16,000.00.

In addition to the above, the Board has contracted with the Soil Conservation Service for a Town-wide Soils Study, which should be completed in February; has recommended a Sewage Disposal Ordinance to the Selectmen for adoption; and has studied and reported on the procedures to be followed for sewer studies. There have also been several meetings to review updating the present zoning ordinance.

The coming year will see the Board undertake the start of the Town Planning Program; drafting Building Code with the aid of local builders; and studying the need for zoning revisions.

The Board wishes to thank all the officers and residents of Gilford for their assistance and cooperation in the past year. We hope to involve as many persons as possible in our activities for the coming year, so anyone who would like to assist should contact one of the following Planning Board members.

# REPORT OF OVERSEER OF PUBLIC WELFARE

The year has been one of continued health and prosperity for most of our families. Some have requested help, though often needing more encouragement and counsel, than much actual cash. During these past four seasons the twenty-three families served represented sixty-five individuals. The majority, twenty-five families, received financial aid through the State or direct relief programs. Six families were also helped with contributions of food and clothing from neighbors, as well as surplus food from the County program. Eight families were encouraged toward other resources, e.g., the Mental Health Clinic and State Employment Service. This has involved many home visits, resource contacts, planning and general errands, which have accounted for some fifty hours service and one thousand miles of travel.

To insure anonymity and to facilitate procedures, our former method of reporting expenditures has been modified. Our trust fund trustees have made available their talents and assets to help with support of the town's "worthy poor." Our philosophy to help others to HELP THEMSELVES with dignity and self esteem continues as a constant goal. Your helpful individual considerations and cooperative civic support of this department is much appreciated and I thank you.

# POLICE DEPARTMENT GILFORD, NEW HAMPSHIRE

Annual Report 1966

The following figures are taken from reports made by the Gilford Police Department for the years 1964 and 1965 and a comparison is drawn to the corresponding figures presented in the year 1966.

A careful study of these facts as they are presented will show a predictable trend toward our future responsibilities as a law enforcement agency. The Federal Bureau of Investigation predicts that our crime rate will continue to rise at a rate of from 3 to 6 percent annually. An examination of the actual rate of increase in demand for service made upon our Department will disclose a rise of from 25 to over 100 percent in most areas.

In order to improve the overall efficiency of the Department, an entirely new records system has been built and put into operation. This system is based on that which is recommended by the Federal Bureau of Investigation for a Department of our present size and predicted growth. This system presently contains more than 5000 Master Name Cards and more than 2000 Arrest Cards and Criminal Records Files. The projected expansion of our present criminal identification capability will include the addition of photographic and fingerprint functions.

Combined Criminal and Motor Vehicle offenses for 1966 total 565 while the same combination of categories for 1965 total only 220, not only a greater than 100 percent increase but more nearly 150 percent.

In 1966, though Criminal offenses averaged almost one per day, of the 350 offenses known, 136 were cleared by arrest and court action. Stolen property recovered and fines paid as a result of Criminal and other arrests returned \$13,626.19 to the taxpayer.

Man-hours expended in the investigation of crime have increased in proportion to the increase in offenses committed and to our present capability. During this year a new and very tangible burden has been placed upon our efforts in this area. In order to conduct an investigation in the manner prescribed by and acceptable to the United States Supreme Court and lower courts, many more man-hours are required in both the investigation and preparation of each individual case brought to the court. During this year, based on our present capability, this Department has cleared an acceptable proportion of those offenses committed during that period. We have, as well, cleared a number of offenses that had been committed during the years 1964 and 1965. Our capability in this area is measured by the manpower that is available to commit to this task. The job has grown at a staggering rate in this past year and continues to grow at each moment. We must be prepared to grow with our responsibility both to those residents of the town and those who come within our jurisdiction.

Enlargement of demand upon this Department for service may be laid to many contributing factors. Predominant among these is the very real establishment of the town of Gilford as a business community as well as a popular residential area. Expansion of public facilities in 1966 within the town and establishment of new business and industry, have all contributed to this growth and the probability of additional business and industry in 1967 results in the immediate need for re-appraisal of our commitment to the future.

In 1966 there were 1,746 calls for police service as compared with 193 in 1964 and 569 in 1965. Increases in demand for service were felt in all areas of our function from bank escorts (1966-300 compared to 157-1964) to the investigation of automobile accidents (1966-112 compared to 58-1965).

Patrol of the many miles of town and state highways and roads is a very basic function of your Police Department. In 1966 this patrol mileage was increased as new roads and portions of highways were opened to travel. Our responsibility now covers more than 93 miles of patrol carried out on each day and evening shift. In 1966 your police cruisers traveled 85,136 miles as compared to 62,010 in 1964, an increase of more than 30 percent.

During each patrol the cruiser officer performs many diverse functions which may be divided into two areas of consideration. First, the area of Service, to property owner and motorist alike. Example; in 1966, Gilford Police Officers, while on routine patrol, secured 175 places of business after closing hours, directly assisted 325 motorists and checked 223 residences at the owners' request. Second, the area of actual Enforcement of law. Example; For the period 1966, Gilford Police Officers issued 358 motor vehicle violation warnings, made 513 check-ups, issued 89 defective equipment tags and 315 parking violation notices. Actual traffic law violations numbered 215 in 1966 with 210 resulting in court action. In each of the above categories, those of both Service and Enforcement, I have touched upon only a few representative figures for your examination.

In an effort to meet the challenge and prepare for the future, your Department has embarked on a program of education and training. In the past year a number of accomplishments in this field have been earned and a sound basis for the future established. As law enforcement becomes more a technical profession, its function requiring a high degree of education and continued study, your Police Department has undertaken to develop a sound and realistic program to fulfill these changing requirements.

In 1966, one officer completed the State Police Basic Training School in Concord and another completed an Advanced Course in Criminal Law at St. Anselm's College. Two officers completed a specialized Motor Vehicle Operation Training Seminar sponsored by the New Hampshire State Police and conducted at Concord. During the past year all officers of this Department have participated in In-Service Training Seminars. Among these are: Emergency Resuscitation given by Dr. Peppard of the Lakes Region General Hospital and Roadblock Procedures presented by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. A special Seminar in Court Procedures at St. Anselm's College was attended by three officers.

Your Police Department is but one among many in Belknap County and as part of its function as a law enforcement agency is engaged in a direct and constant co-operative effort with these departments. Over a six week period in the Spring of 1966 all officers participated in Riot Squad Tactics Training under the auspices of the Belknap County Sheriff's Department. This program perhaps best exemplifies our increased commitment to the demands made upon this Department by the community and typifies the relationship of our community to the national trends and statistic rates.

The manifold responsibilities of our Department as a law enforcement agency as engendered by the preceding examples of rises in demand made upon us are a direct and immediate cause for my concern. As your Chief of Police, it is my principal responsibility to guide and direct both the present and projected efforts of this agency. An analysis of cause and effect and both requirements and responsibility has been drawn and a clear presentation of the facts relative to these areas has been made.

In summation I would like to take this opportunity to express my personal appreciation to everyone who has been so helpful to me during my first year as your Chief of Police. The sincerity and co-operation by so many members of the community has been overwhelming. I shall endeavor to ever amplify your continued confidence and trust in this purpose.

# GILFORD FIRE DEPARTMENT

## 1966

Gilford had less fires during 1966 than was experienced the year prior. The following is the year's fire summary:

- 22 House
- 26 Wood and Grass
  - 9 Car
  - 1 Chimney

- 3 Flooded Oil Burners
- 1 Call for Mutual Aid
- 17 Answered Mutual Aid
  - 1 Person caught in Skidoo

This was a very good year with a low dollar fire loss. We extend our congratulations to our residents and guests that are mainly responsible for the good record. We, in the Fire Department, like to feel that we also played a big part in the reduction. We feel that all of our talking and our controlled burning through Permits has really shown results. Also our Volunteers have burned many piles of rubbish and abandoned buildings thus preventing potential fires.

Your Fire Department is requesting your serious consideration of the purchase of an additional fire truck. If approval is granted it will be a minimum of fourteen months before we can expect delivery. Gilford continues to grow at a very rapid rate but now coupled with our Residential Development we are now entering a period of Commercial and Industrial growth in addition. We feel that an additional piece of apparatus is in order if we are to keep pace with the growth of the Town.

As in past years our men have attended Fire Schools at Lily Pond as well as at Fitzwilliam. Again our Firemen displayed their fire know-how by again being Instructors or Assistant Instructors.

Our Volunteers are utilizing available spare time to get our Four by Four truck into shape. When this vehicle is finished we shall have a first rate Forestry truck that will be able to carry men and equipment deep into the woods or up into the mountains to contain forest fires before they make too much headway.

We in the Fire Department have felt that Gilford was not being afforded proper recognition of its Fire Fighting facilities by the Board of Fire Underwriters. We feel that the entire Town of Gilford should be given the same Insurance rates as those within the two miles of the station. Your Fire Chief, Board of Fire Engineers and Selectmen have had meetings with and have written letters to the Board of Underwriters in the fond hope that Gilford will gain some recognition of its fire fighting facilities. The following was brought to the attention of the Board of Underwriters:

### **Gilford Fire Department**

The Gilford Fire Department of Gilford, New Hampshire has been revamped and realigned during the past seven years. Today it stands as one of the finest Firefighting teams that can be found anywhere. Some of the improvements that have taken place are as follows:

1. The Fire Department recognized the lack of a sufficient supply of water in Gilford Village. With the Town Hall, Community Church, Grange Hall, Historical Society, School, Library, Village Store and many homes located in the vicinity it was felt that better protection should be provided. As a result of careful study, the Firemen constructed a Dam beneath the Village bridge. This Dam was constructed of creosoted poles with oak planks and sand bags. Today we have an unlimited supply of water. During the past year Dr. Pilliod constructed an Agricultural pond which adds further to being a reservoir for the Dam. Two Dry-hydrants have been installed at this water supply to provide easy access to the water year round.

2. The Gilford Fire Department has expanded the Dry-hydrant concept and now have installed Dry-hydrants at eight strategic locations. By logically locating the hydrants the water carrying miles have been greatly reduced.

3. The Gilford Fire Department conducted a demonstration of Dry-hydrants for a group of Bankers. As a result of what was proved these Bankers will now loan larger amounts if a water supply and Dry-hydrants are installed.

4. At present in Gilford there are two large Marinas with agitators operating all winter. This affords an unlimited supply of water, easily accessible, throughout the winter.

5. The Gunstock-Belknap Mountain Recreational Area keeps the road to their dam plowed all winter. Thus we have easy access to open water throughout the ski season when crowds of from 7,000 to 10,000 persons are present.

6. The Gilford Fire Department is a member of the Lakes Region Mutual Fire Aid Association and as such has a back-up team of nineteen other departments.

7. In 1960 the Town of Gilford constructed a new Fire Station on Route 11-A at a cost of \$65,000. With this station located on the highway it provided a better start to a fire. The new station was in addition to the \$40,000 Fire station in the Glendale section.

8. Since 1955 the type of apparatus has been improved and the Gilford Fire Department now has three Underwriter recognized trucks. There is also a fourth tanker that will be replaced before too long. Also the Firemen are equipping a weapons carrier type of vehicle to serve as a Forestry truck.

9. The Gilford Fire Department has increased its permanent personnel from one to five. This department has the distinction of being in one of the few towns in the State with a permanent department on duty twenty-four hours a day.

10. The Gilford Fire Department is fully radio equipped, having a base station, tone generator, five mobile units and a portable. In addition to this there are nineteen receivers and five speakers located in the homes of key personnel. The department is presently planning the relocation of its antenna and base station to the top of Mt. Belknap to obtain even better radio communication.

11. With permanent personnel on duty they can be on the road in less than one minute. With the receivers in the Volunteers' homes ample assistance is assured.

12. The Gilford Fire Department is fortunate in having the Fire School at the Civil Defense Training Center at its disposal. Many of the monthly meetings incorporate training at the Center on extinguishing oil fires, etc. Interest has been shown to the point that many Gilford firemen are Instructors at the Fire School here and at Meadowood in Fitzwilliam, New Hampshire.

The Gilford Fire Department has come a long way in a few years. They will continue to strive to make their fire fighting abilities increasingly better. The dividends are evident by seeing only damaged homes instead of cellar holes and chimneys.

The Town of Gilford backs its Fire Department as is evidenced by the equipment that it has and will continue to provide. Further proof is the establishment of the Permanent force. As long as the Fire Department continues to provide the type of service that it now is providing we feel confident that the Town of Gilford will support our constant pursuit of ever improving our services.

Thanks to each and every one of you for maintaining a very fine record this year. This is your Fire Department so stop by and pay us a visit at the station.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board, Parents and Voters:

I am very pleased to present to you my first report as your Superintendent of Schools. This report will be written with the intent of presenting to you information regarding your school in which I feel you are most interested.

Mr. Gene Stearns, the Administrative Principal, has worked closely with the administration in providing the best possible education for the children, working with the teachers in the improvement of salaries and in maintaining the school plant.

It is interesting to note the progress made during the past year of the various educational systems or practices suggested in the school report made by Mr. Fox in 1962.

Remedial reading has been provided with Mrs. Natalie Davis spending two days each week in the Gilford School working with pupils who need improvement. This program is financed under Title I of the National Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965.

Ability grouping in grades 5 and 6 provides for pupils to work with others of much the same ability in the various subject areas. A school library has been developed with budget money provided to purchase books. This is supplemented by federal funds under Title II of the National Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. Although we have no trained specialist available, it is expected that the secretary will spend some time assisting with library work in cataloging and exchanging books for pupils. Mr. Stearns reports that much interest has resulted in additional reading of library books since the books have become available. This is most desirable since reading is basic to all learning and the more pupils read the better this skill will develop.

An annual testing program has been developed for pupils from kindergarten through grade six. These results are used in the placement of pupils in the next higher grade as well as assist in determining strengths and weaknesses in the teaching program. They are also used to indicate the progress of the various pupils.

While Gilford has a music program — with Mrs. Coupal spending two days each week — it is highly desirable that additional help be obtained to instruct pupils in the various instruments. It is expected that such a program will be developed during the next year if present plans materialize.

Dr. Robert Page, part-time psychologist for the Laconia Supervisory Union No. 30, has been employed to serve pupils in attendance and their parents when there is need. He is shared by the schools of Laconia, Gilford and Gilmanton, his time being apportioned on a perpupil basis. His schedule calls for a visit to each school at least once every two weeks.

One of the most desirable accomplishments has been the developing of a salary schedule to attract and retain the best teachers. I am happy to report that all Gilford teachers are now on step and that the present salary scale adopted by the School Board compares favorably with other towns and cities in this area. Additional benefits have been provided in the partial adoption of a "Plan for Teacher Compensation". Although other practices may be adopted as time goes on, I feel that much progress has been made in improving the educational program in the Gilford schools.

## School Costs

It will be interesting to note that the per pupil cost based on the 1965-66 school enrollment was \$423.78. The state average is \$416.00. This was figured on an average daily membership of 397.5. Gilford wishes to keep its classes low in numbers thus providing more individual help by the teachers. This is one reason why the pupil cost is slightly higher than the state average.

## Budget

There are three basic reasons why the Gilford budget has increased during the past year. The first is the establishment of a sound salary scale for teachers with full implementation; the second is an increase in tuition rates for pupils attending the Laconia schools and the third is the hiring of an additional half-time kindergarten teacher and part-time secretary.

#### Heating System

One of the biggest problems has been the dual heating system which has given considerable trouble during the past year. Heating engineers have had to be called many times because of furnace failures. Steps have been taken to remedy the problem but so far have proved ineffective. This will continue to be a problem until the cause has been located and the situation remedied.

#### **Pupil Enrollment**

Although there has been no appreciable increase in pupil enrollment during the past three years, it is expected with the additional building of homes and businesses more pupil space will be needed. With this in mind, I have suggested that the school board establish a study committee to consider the next step for meeting this need at the appropriate time. A piece of land has already been purchased for a school site. The school board used good judgment in this forward looking step

I wish to express my appreciation for the cooperation of the three members of the Gilford School Board, namely, Mr. Rowland Keith, Mr. George Neilson and Mrs. Esther Nighswander. I also wish to express my thanks for the work of the principal and teachers, the cafeteria workers, the custodians, the school nurse and to Mr. Fred Shurbert and his bus drivers. It is my hope that when there is a need, teachers of the highest caliber may be hired for the training and education of the boys and girls of Gilford. This is the key to a good educational system.
