RECORD OF TOWN MEETING

MARCH 8, 2011

Moderator Richard R. Houghton called the Annual Town Meeting of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire, to order Tuesday, March 8, 2011 at 11:00 AM. The polls were declared open and the following Ballot Clerks were sworn in by the Moderator:

Mary Ellen Duffy Diane Hodgson Melissa Walker

At 7:05 PM Moderator Houghton asked the assembled citizens (approximately 65) to stand for a moment of silence for those Madbury citizens who have died since last year's Town Meeting and to remain standing for the Pledge of Allegiance led by Town Clerk Katherine K. Cornwell.

Those deceased include: Robert Battles, Iva Bromley, Albert Bussiere, Jr., Eileen Byron, Kathryn Chadwick, William Hale, John O'Neill, and Helen Trafton.

The moderator requested permission of the voters to extend the closing time of the polls to 8pm as that was the time announced at a recent school district hearing. Permission granted.

Reminding the audience that for the first time in 32 years there is a new Town Clerk taking minutes, Moderator Houghton read his rules for Town Meeting which included asking any voter who speaks to stand, state his/her name and street, and to use the handheld microphone. Lydia Ahlstrom was introduced as microphone bearer and thanked for her service.

ARTICLE 2. The following amendments to the Zoning Ordinance were voted on by Official Ballot:

AMENDMENT 1: "Revising provisions for Special Exceptions in Articles XIII and XV and related references to these articles in Article V. Eliminating involuntary merger of lots (Article XII, 3, B) which is now prohibited by State law. Clarifying (at Article XV, Section 2, B) the prior elimination of certain uses (by Town Meeting vote 2000) and updating N.H. statutory references.

YES 190 NO 27

AMENDMENT 2: "Creating the opportunity for Accessory Apartments in

Single Family Dwellings by the addition of Article V Section 4, related changes to Articles V, V-A and definition changes in Article III.

YES 174 NO 49

ARTICLE 3. Bob Houston of Cherry Lane, moved, and Janet Wall of Kelly Rd., seconded, a motion to authorize the Board of Selectmen to choose all other Town Officers.

Hearing no discussion, the Moderator called for a voice vote.

PASSED

ARTICLE 4. Selectman Jay Moriarty moved, and Mark Townsend of Moharimet Dr., seconded, a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,177,292.00 for general municipal operations. This operating budget warrant article does NOT include appropriations contained in any other warrant articles.

Don Sundberg, of Nute Rd., commended the Selectmen for spending less than appropriated in 2010. He asked where that money is shown in the following year's budget. He also asked where the capital outlay of \$37,900 came from.

Selectman Hodsdon stated that the unused money is transferred to the General Fund Balance. It is utilized to reduce taxes. For example, in 2010, \$100,000 from the General Fund Balance was used to offset the amount raised through property taxes. The goal is to keep that fund in a growth pattern.

Treasurer Ahlstrom explained that the \$37,900 came from a capital reserve fund to pay for the revaluation of town properties.

Hearing no discussion the Moderator called for a voice vote.

PASSED

ARTICLE 5. Selectman Joan Sundberg moved, and Chuck Goss of Cherry Lane, seconded, a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to add to the existing Iafolla Reclamation Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 4 at the 2010 Town Meeting for the purpose of reclamation of land purchased by the Town from the Estate of Michael Iafolla.

Selectman Sundberg described the property and stated the town intends to create a recreation area with water access. There is no specific plan in place at this time but the town likes to plan ahead to spend money.

Hearing no discussion the Moderator called for a voice vote.

PASSED

ARTICLE 6. Selectman Hodsdon moved, and Diane Hodgson of Freshet Rd., seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to add to the existing Recreational Facilities Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 5 at the 2010 Town Meeting for the purpose of planning and development of recreational facilities within the town.

Selectman Hodsdon stated that the town is preparing for the future. The town is currently debt-free and the selectmen want to keep it that way. Projects

under discussion include a fitness trail on the Tibbetts property, improvements to the Tibbetts Field, and bringing water to the baseball diamond.

Hearing no discussion the Moderator called for a voice vote.

PASSED

ARTICLE 7. Selectman Hodsdon moved, and Mike Southworth of Perkins Rd, seconded, a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) to add to the existing Police Equipment Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 6 at the 2010 Town Meeting for the purpose of purchasing police equipment.

Selectman Hodsdon explained that this is, again, in the interests of preplanning. The town currently owns four police vehicles, model years 2003, 2004, 2005, and 2008. The 2003 vehicle will be passed to the Fire Department when the Police Department purchases a 2011 cruiser.

Hearing no discussion the Moderator called for a voice vote.

PASSED

ARTICLE 8. Selectman Moriarty moved and Rhonda Hodsdon of Hayes Rd. seconded, a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) to add to the existing Purchase of Property and/or Easements Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 9 at the 2000 Town Meeting for the purpose of purchase of property and/or easements.

Selectman Moriarty explained that this fund exists so that money is available if a property comes on the market.

Lee Rice of Fern Way asked if money from this fund can be used to purchase land for advanced fire protection purposes (ie. cisterns, dry hydrants, etc). Mr. Rice stated that insurance companies are concerned about the lack of water availability in some areas of the town

Selectman Moriarty responded that the selectmen would look at that on a case-by-case basis. He thinks a cistern would be stretching the intent of this fund and would rather see that brought to Town Meeting.

Rick Erickson of Moharimet Dr. asked if there is a goal amount for this fund. Selectman Hodsdon responded that there is approximately \$256,000 in the fund. In 2007 a Special Town Meeting was held to raise \$700,000 for the Roselawn/Gangwer purchase. This fund is not at the point where the selectmen are ready to say enough is enough. Having the funds available to step in quickly when a desirable property becomes available is wise and advantageous.

Chuck Goss pointed out the hidden, indirect benefit of avoiding the costs associated with development. Strategic management prevents worse alternatives.

Hearing no further discussion the Moderator called for a voice vote.

PASSED

ARTICLE 9. Selectman Sundberg moved, and Peggy Wolcott of Old Stage Rd. seconded, a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand Dollars (\$11,000.00) to add to the Property Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 6 at the 2009 Town Meeting for the purpose of the revaluation of town properties.

Selectman Sundberg explained that the state requires revaluation of all town properties at least every five years. This was completed in 2010 and will happen again in 2015. The town does incur costs for assessing every year. 1/3 of the town is reinspected each year, and a full revaluation is done in the fifth year. It is better for the town to spread these costs across the five years.

Rebecca Anderson of Nute Rd asked why the 1/3 is done each year. Selectman Sundberg explained that the town records have to be updated as properties change.

Hearing no further discussion the Moderator called for a voice vote.

PASSED

ARTICLE 10. Don Melvin of Moharimet Dr. moved, and Peggy Wolcott of Old Stage Rd. seconded, a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) to add to the existing Library Building Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 9 at the 2002 Town Meeting for a library building fund.

Mr. Melvin spoke to the library's history, noting its humble beginnings in a closet at the Town Hall. The current building is very crowded. A new building would provide more library space as well as serving as a civic center and more. Hearing no discussion the Moderator called for a voice vote.

PASSED

ARTICLE 11. Fire Chief Tom Perley moved, and Roberta Stearns of Bunker Hill Lane seconded, a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) to add to the existing Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 8 at the 1994 Town Meeting for the purchase of fire equipment.

Chief Perley explained that this is a savings fund for Fire Department equipment. The department is currently saving to replace the 1988 truck. They hope to replace it in 2018 at an approximate cost of \$400,000.

Hearing no discussion the Moderator called for a voice vote.

PASSED

ARTICLE 12. Selectman Sundberg moved, and Rod Hutton of Mill Hill Rd. seconded, a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to add to the existing expendable trust fund known as the Madbury Memorial Park Fund established in Article 6 at the March 1994 Town Meeting for the purpose of maintenance and operation.

Selectman Sundberg stated that this is the third year this request has been in the warrant and there should be enough to install a sprinkler system at the cemetery. She thanked the hard-working volunteers who have created such a beautiful park.

Hearing no discussion the Moderator called for a voice vote.

PASSED

ARTICLE 13. Selectman Moriarty moved, and Herb Dresser of French Cross Rd. seconded, a motion to see if the town will adopt the provisions of RSA 72:37, Exemption for the Blind, to allow an inhabitant who is legally blind, as determined by the blind services program, to be exempt each year of the assessed value, for property tax purposes, of his or her residential real estate up to the value of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000).

Selectman Moriarty explained that the town has been granting this exemption for some time but there is no clear record of the town passing it.

Ian Walker of Perkins Rd., asked if the town should implement a residency requirement for this exemption.

Selectman Hodsdon responded that there is currently one long-term resident using this exemption. Most towns have a higher exemption.

Jack Myers of Moharimet Dr., appreciates the selectmen setting the house in order. He asked why other disabilities don't receive consideration.

Selectman Hodsdon said that the town is following state legislation. If the law allowed other exemptions the town could vote to allow them.

Lorraine Morong of Madbury Beach urged residents to vote for this article because it will cost the town more money if the selectmen go to jail (laughter).

Alison Cloutier of Hayes Rd. asked if the amount goes to the bill or the value. Diane Hodgson replied it goes to the value.

Selectman Hodsdon pointed out that this is the minimum exemption allowed by the state, the town could increase the amount if desired.

Hearing no further discussion the Moderator called for a voice vote.

PASSED

Noting that there was still plenty of time before the polls would close, Moderator Houghton offered a presentation about Madbury's role in U. S. Constitutional history. Stating he found much of his information in a monograph written by Robert Hodgson of Freshet Rd. concerning the life of the Rev. William Hooper, Moderator Houghton shared some facts about the minister's role in Madbury politics. Mr. Hodgson stated that the Rev. Hooper voted against the Constitution as he wanted an anti-slavery article included. N. H. was the 9th state to ratify the U. S. Constitution on June 21, 1788. Moderator Houghton stated that the Hooper burial ground on Evans Rd. is a lovely sight. (applause)

ARTICLE 14. Selectman Hodsdon moved, and Treasurer Deb Ahlstrom seconded, a motion to discontinue the Tibbetts Field Capital Reserve Fund established by voters at the March 13, 2001 Town Meeting and to place the remaining balance in the general fund.

Selectman Hodsdon explained that this fund was established for the develop-

ment of the Tibbetts Field. This article will close this fund as most of the money has been spent.

Rhonda Hodsdon asked how much money is left in the fund.

Selectman Hodsdon stated \$0.99 (Ninety-nine cents).

Don Sundberg of Nute Rd. asked how the selectmen intended to use that amount. Laughter ensued and Mr. Sundberg withdrew the question.

Hearing no further discussion the Moderator called for a voice vote.

PASSED

ARTICLE 15. Eric Fiegenbaum of Moharimet Dr. moved and Jeannie Sowers of Hayes Rd. seconded, a motion to vote the retention of the unexpended portion of the 2011 Conservation Commission appropriation; said monies to be placed in the Madbury Conservation Fund.

Hearing no discussion the Moderator called for a voice vote.

PASSED

Moderator Houghton announced that the clock was approaching 8pm and anyone wishing to vote on town and school ballots should do so. He declared the polls closed at 8pm.

ARTICLE 16. Chuck Goss of Cherry Lane, issued an invitation from the Madbury Historical Society to a presentation about the Thresher incident. Nancy Pape of Nute Rd. asked anyone interested in helping with Madbury Day to contact her.

Bob Hodgson announced that there would be copies available at the Town Hall of the Hooper monograph referred to in Mr. Houghton's presentation.

ARTICLE 17. Selectman Hodsdon stated that in 2007 a Special Town Meeting was held to raise \$700,000 for the Roselawn/Gangwer conservation easements purchase. \$100,000 was loaned to the Conservation Commission from the Purchase of Property and or Easements Capital Reserve Fund which the Conservation Commission was to pay back. The Commission has repaid \$50,000 to date. The Selectmen propose forgoing the remaining balance so that the Commission will have money available for other projects. The selectmen want to know the voters' feelings on this issue.

Conservation Commission Chair Eric Fiegenbaum stated that the Commission appreciates the selectmen's offer. The current economy makes 'slowgoing' to repay this debt and not having it would make it easier to pursue other options. The Commission can't make a purchase without the town's approval but would appreciate the opportunity to look at other options.

Chuck Goss asked what the Commission has now.

Selectman Hodsdon answered that there is about \$10-12,000 on hand now. The selectmen are asking for a "sense of the meeting". The meeting is in unanimous support.

Moderator Houghton asked that the record reflect there was not a single 'nay' vote during the 2011 Town Meeting! (applause)

Town Clerk Cornwell conveyed the greetings of former Town Clerk Pam Seaver who loves living in Colorado but misses her many friends in Madbury!

Don Sundberg thanked the many volunteers who perform many and varied tasks that make Madbury a wonderful community. (applause)

Bob Houston moved, and Karen Niland of Hayes Rd seconded, adjournment of the meeting at 8:14PM.

Residents shared a social time with refreshments while the ballots were counted.

The meeting was officially adjourned at 9:12PM.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madbury on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, 2012 at 11:00 a.m. in the morning for the purpose of voting on Article 1 and at 7:00 o'clock in the evening for action on Articles 2 through 17.

The polls, which open at 11:00 a.m. for the purpose of voting on Article 1, will close at 7:30 p.m. unless extended by vote of the meeting.

ARTICLE 1: To choose the following Town Officers: (Majority vote required)

A Selectman for the ensuing three years

A Moderator for the ensuing two years

A Treasurer for the ensuing year

A Supervisor of the Checklist for the ensuing six years

Two Auditors for the ensuing year

A Trustee of the Trust Funds for the ensuing three years

A Cemetery Trustee for the ensuing three years

A Library Trustee for the ensuing three years

ARTICLE 2: To choose all other Town Officers. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,187,398 for general municipal operations. This operating budget warrant article does NOT include appropriations contained in any other warrant articles. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to create a capital reserve fund for the purpose of purchasing grounds maintenance equipment and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) to add to this fund; and further to name the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from the Grounds Maintenance Equipment Capital Reserve Fund.

Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to create a capital reserve fund for the purpose of major repairs to town government buildings and to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) to add to this fund; and further to name the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from the Government Buildings Repair Capital Reserve Fund.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) to add to the existing Purchase of Property and/or Easements Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 9 at the 2000 Town Meeting for the purpose of purchase of property and/or easements. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand Dollars (\$11,000) to add to the Property Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 6 at the 2009 Town Meeting for the purpose of the revaluation of town properties.

Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) to add to the existing Library Building Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 9 at the 2002 Town Meeting for a library building fund.

Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) to add to the existing Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 8 at the 1994 Town Meeting for the purchase of fire equipment.

Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Safety Complex Capital Reserve Fund established by voters in Article 8 at the 1998 town meeting; this fund has a \$0 balance.

Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to ratify the deposit of Five Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$5,100.00) in the Madbury Memorial Park Fund established in Article 6 at the 1994 Town Meeting. Said amount has been deposited in this account from 1994 to 2011 at a rate of \$50.00 per cemetery lot sold. This action should have occurred annually and requires no further appropriation; it will be placed on the warrant for action annually going forward. THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

At the 2011 Town Meeting, Bruce Hodsdon was re-elected to the Board of Selectmen. Board appointments for 2011 were made following Town Meeting. Joseph Moriarty was elected Chair, and was also appointed to continue serving on the Board of the Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative. He will assume the responsibility of legal liaison, and will continue assuming primary responsibility for the Board's Road Agent function. Bruce Hodsdon will continue as Welfare Officer, and will represent the Board on the Planning Board and on the Water Resources Board. Joan Sundberg will continue as the Town's representative on the Board of the Health and Safety Council of Strafford County. She will serve as the Board's representative on the Recreation Commission, will continue as assistant Welfare Officer, and will represent the Board on the Joint Loss Committee.

The Board signed a new three year snow removal contract with Arthur Hartford for snow removal on town roads and parking areas. The Board also renewed several contracts this year, including our contract with Dragon Mosquito Control Inc for maintenance of the town's mosquito control program, its contract with the City of Dover for use of the Recycling Center located on Mast Rd, and the town's membership in the Strafford Regional Planning Commission. The Board also signed a Memorandum of Understanding with McGregor Memorial EMS for continued ambulance service for the town.

In March, the Friday morning workshop format was changed to a regular meeting format, at which votes can be taken and decisions made. No change was made in the 8:30am start time for these meetings.

Although there was discussion of allowing on-line payments to the town, as some residents had indicated a preference for this option, a survey indicated that there was insufficient interest to institute the program at this time. A major factor was the cost involved in each on-line transaction that would fall on the resident making the payment.

During the fall, an internal control overview was conducted by Municipal Resources Inc to determine if proper procedures were in place in town offices to prevent financial loss. The citizens of Madbury should be quite pleased with the resulting report, which rated Madbury very highly. We have our excellent Treasurer, Deb Ahlstrom, to thank for this great review. She makes sure we are following all proper procedures diligently, with able assistance from our Town Clerk/Tax Collector Kitty Cornwell and our Selectmen's Assistant Colette Clickman.

The Board of Selectmen meets on the first and third Monday of the month at 7:00pm and every Friday morning at 8:30am at the Town Hall. Residents are always welcome to attend the meetings and to put forth ideas to benefit our community.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The year 2011 has come to a close, and it is hard to believe that we are now in 2012. The department was very active during 2011. We saw, again, changes in our personnel with the departure of two officers and the hiring of four. We certainly wish the officers who left our department great success in their future endeavors.

Officer Ryan Mayer attended the New Hampshire Full-Time Police Academy from April through July. I am very pleased to inform you that he graduated and is recognized as a full-time certified police officer in the State of New Hampshire, and is still serving the community of Madbury.

In January, 2011, we hired Officer Corey McGann, who has completed the 200-hour New Hampshire Part-Time Police Academy in Concord, graduating in November. In July we brought Officer Kenneth Tilley on board. He is a certified full-time officer, coming to us from the Farmington Police Department. We also want to welcome Officers Andrew Wood and Antoinette Raffaele, who are currently attending the New Hampshire Part-Time Police Academy, and who will be graduating in May.

All members of the Madbury Police Department continue to complete required yearly training set forth by the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council.

During the summer of 2011 the town experienced three home burglaries. I am very happy to inform you that two of the burglaries were investigated and the persons responsible have been charged – the third remains an active case. I am very pleased to inform you that the assistance of folks in the various neighborhoods, who gave us information relative to a motor vehicle and subjects seen in the areas, was most helpful in our investigation. It was a joint effort between residents and other law enforcement agencies; namely, Lee and Dover, who assisted with this end result. The individuals responsible are being held for other community burglaries as well.

The Madbury Fire and Police Departments continue to work as a "team" in providing the community with information, assistance and various services needed during the storm-related damages throughout the town.

In the early part of December the Madbury Police Department began negotiations with the University of New Hampshire for the providing of dispatching services. This was done for two reasons:

- 1. Officer Safety As a result of budget cuts by the State of New Hampshire, at times the services were delegated to the NHSP Headquarters in Concord, where individuals there, who are not familiar with our area, dispatched our officers. At times, also, our officers were unable to hear the transmissions from Concord Headquarters.
- 2. United Services The greater accountability between the UNH Dispatch Center, Madbury Fire and Madbury Police.

This change in the dispatching services was discussed and approved by the Board of Selectmen. This, I believe, will benefit the community as a whole.

In closing, as I do every year, I would like to thank the Madbury Board of Selectmen for their quality services to this community, as well as to the Madbury Fire Department for their assistance throughout the year. Thanks also to the University of New Hampshire Police Department for their continued assistance, and to the men and women of the New Hampshire State Police for their continued support to our department. I would also like to thank my officers for their hard work and dedication over the past year. Lastly, I would now take this opportunity to thank you - the Citizens of Madbury.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

I would like to thank the citizens of Madbury for their continued support over the past year. This past year Firefighters Rachel Goulding and Mike Combra joined our department. We also welcomed back Artie Boutin who had taken a year off due to work obligations.

Over the year, members participated in training covering Fire Fighter Safety, Cold Weather Operations, and apparatus operation. In addition we hosted a training program covering Locomotive Rescue. I would like to thank Jay Moriarty for allowing us to use his field in May to bring Dartmouth Hitchcock Advanced Response Team's (DHART) Med-Evac Helicopter to Madbury for Landing Zone training. Craig Brayen and Luke Zagar all completed NH Fire Fighter 1 training. This program consists of 212 hours of training covering Fire fighter Safety and basic skills required for an entry level fire fighter, and we require this training before they can participate in many department operations. The time required to complete this program demonstrates the commitment of the volunteers serving on this department. In addition, more than half of the members have completed NH Fire Fighter II certification, which is an additional 116 hours of training covering more operational training.

After 33 years of service, David Raynes has decided to step down as an active Fire Fighter, retiring from his position of Captain and Training Officer. In December, he was named as our Fire Fighter of the Year, and has also been made a Life Member of the Madbury Fire Department, joining existing Life Members Carl Wentworth, Ken Wolcott, Arthur Anderson and Bob Hodgson. We also recognized Brian Raynes and Ted Keith for 15 years of service, as well as Bill Brouse and Dave Peterson for 10 Years of Service.

The Madbury Public Library is proud to share highlights of a very successful year marked by continued growth and innovative use and implementation of the latest technology. Our library is just one of many NH libraries that participate in the NH Downloadable Books Consortium where you'll find thousands of audio books and a growing collection of e-Books. This service can be used from home or anywhere you have access to the Internet and there are never any late fees. With the growing number of patrons having kindles, nooks, or MP3 players, this service is invaluable.

Databases at the Library:

The following genealogical databases are available at the library and/or in the comfort of your own home. They are provided to us through the NH State Library. Our genealogical databases include Heritage Quest which can be accessed from home; and Ancestry.com which is only accessible from the library. You might want to try www.familysearch.org too. It includes the 1850 census.

Other research databases include *Ebsco*, which provides information on a variety of subjects and includes magazines. Another is *Newsbank*, which allows access to the Union Leader, NH Sunday News, Concord Monitor and 27 of America's news magazines including US News and World Report. You can also search our online library catalog through the Madbury Library website and place items on hold or, search the NH State Library catalog (also available on our website) to browse what is available through the State of NH. If you see something you would like to check out, simply let us know and we can ask for an Interlibrary Loan. This allows our patrons to borrow material from other libraries that we may not have readily available in our library.

Programs:

Children's Story Time

All story times are held weekly in our under-the-sea themed children's room. These informal programs offer opportunities for parents to introduce their children to reading and the library in an enjoyable setting. It is also a time when parents can meet other parents! Please join us for stories, crafts, and fun!

Read To Rosa! Rosa, our English Setter trained reading dog, listens to new

and emerging readers every month. She patiently listens to children reading aloud allowing the children to proceed at their own pace. This allows a reluctant or struggling reader practice time to improve their reading skills.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Two wetland applications came before the Commission. Both were in conjunction with subdivision for building lots and driveway access. We commented and signed one application as the proposal was for a shared driveway which had taken a route to avoid and minimize wetland impacts. While the second application proposed a shared driveway for two lots, we felt that the applicant had not chosen the appropriate NH DES wetland application to file.

The Commission completed its annual monitoring of the four conservation easements held in part by the town. The city of Portsmouth finally completed a stream crossing on the Hayes Easement. The old crossing had washed out twice in recent years. Activities on the Fernald Easement include upgrades to

better manage horse manure and enhancements for wildlife habitat.

In July, we became aware that the 54-acre Brett parcel on Rt. 108 had been placed under a conservation easement to be held by the Nature Conservancy. The farm includes fields, a forest and numerous beaver impoundments. The Oyster River Watershed Association documented a redfin pickerel, a state species of concern, on the property in 2004. During the easement process a NH designated endangered plant was discovered. The land and its water features are important not only to Madbury, but also the protection of the Great Bay.

The Commission helped to sponsor a vernal pools workshop in Madbury and Lee. Members also attended workshops on changes to the NH Shoreland Protection Act and the process of monitoring conservation easements.

Since 2007, the Commission has been using its share of the Current Use Tax to pay back the Selectmen for funds that helped to purchase easements on the Hayes and Roselawn farms. At the 2010 Town Meeting the Selectmen proposed and the assembled unanimously supported the forgiveness on the remaining balance. The action will allow the Commission to be better prepared should an appropriate conservation opportunity arise.

As always, we encourage town residents to bring us their concerns, comments and ideas by letter, email, or attendance at our meetings. We meet on the fourth Monday of the month at 7:00 pm in the Town Hall.

WATER RESOURCES BOARD

The Madbury Water Resources Board concerns itself with issues of water quality and quantity in Madbury and the watersheds of the region. The many areas of interest are guided by the Town's Master Plan.

During this past year the Board reviewed several lot line adjustment/ wetland crossing requests received by the Planning Board for water impact issues. Copies of recent testing of the Bellamy River and regular water quality monitoring at the Pike Industries gravel pit and the New England Metal Recycling (Schnitzer Steel) facility were also received and reviewed. In the coming 2012 year the Board is planning another round of voluntary well water testing for volatile organic compounds (VOCs), this type of testing was last offered to residents in 1996.

In 2010 the Oyster River Watershed Association had nominated adding the Oyster River to the State's Rivers Management and Protection Program. This action was strongly supported by the Madbury Water Board. In 2011 action was taken up by the State and the Oyster River was officially designated to the State's Rivers Management and Protection Program (RMPP) by HB 44.

In 2011 Jim Irish continued to represent the Town's interest as a member on the Board of Directors of the Southeast Watershed Alliance. SWA is a regional organization of municipalities in New Hampshire's coastal watershed. Its mission is to establish a regional framework for coastal watershed communities, regional planning commissions, the state, and other stakeholders, to collaborate on planning and implementation measures to improve and protect water quality and effectively address challenges of meeting clean water standards.

As part of a joint outreach and educational project Board member Barbara Maurer worked with members of the Madbury Sugar Maples 4H club as they learned to operate a watershed model. Club members then set up a booth display including the model and were on hand to discuss watershed issues with the public on Madbury Day.

Recently Water Board members and Selectmen along with local residents attended a grand opening tour of the new Portsmouth Water Treatment Plant on Freshet Road in Madbury. The new facility went on line during the summer. It boasts increased capacity and improved treatment processes that reduce chemical and energy requirements while generating less sludge needing disposal.

The Board continues to work with the Selectmen and the Fire Department to make repairs to portions of the Hicks Hill water system. Additional pump repairs and testing of the system are planned for the coming year.

The Madbury Water Board meets on the last Tuesday of the month at 7:00 pm at the Town Hall, any interested residents are invited to attend and participate in the discussions.

STRAFFORD REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

Strafford Regional Planning Commission (SRPC), a political subdivision of the State of New Hampshire, serves in an advisory role to the Town of Madbury and seventeen other communities. We provide planning services to assist officials, boards and citizens in managing growth and development and to foster regional collaborative efforts.

SRPC's professional staff offers a range of planning services in transportation, land use, economic development, hazard mitigation, natural resources and geographic information systems (GIS) mapping and analysis. These services are available in customized modes to meet the diverse needs of communities. Access is also provided to SRPC educational resources including our website, library, workshops and forums, and customized training.

2011 Accomplishments:

- Collaborated with Madbury Town officials and businesses to create the 2011-2015 Strafford Regional Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy including a regional priority projects list
- Met with Town officials to solicit transportation projects for the NH Transportation Ten Year Plan and the Strafford Transportation Long-Range Plan
- Submitted Route 155/Madbury Road/Town Hall Road intersections as a priority "deferred project" for consideration within the draft NH Transportation Ten Year Plan
- Worked with Town officials in developing a corridor management plan for the Route 108 corridor to be submitted to NHDOT to be considered for the State Scenic Byway program

DRAGON MOSQUITO CONTROL

The 2011 mosquito season began dry and ended wet. Dry summers favor the occurrence of West Nile Virus (WNV) over Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE). There were nine WNV mosquito batches found in Brentwood, Nashua, Manchester, Portsmouth and Keene. No EEE was found in the state during 2011.

Dragon has identified 78 larval mosquito habitats in the Town of Madbury. Crews checked larval habitats 271 times throughout the season. There were 47 sites requiring treatment to eliminate mosquito larvae. In addition, 46 catch basin treatments were made to combat disease carrying mosquitoes. Flying adult mosquitoes were monitored at four locations throughout town. Nearly 1000 mosquitoes were collected in light traps, identified to species, and select species were sent to the State Lab to be tested for diseases. No mosquitoes collected in Madbury tested positive for disease in 2011. Spraying to control adult mosquitoes was not conducted in Madbury last season.

The proposed 2012 Mosquito Control plan for Madbury includes trapping mosquitoes for disease testing, sampling wetlands for larval mosquito activity, larviciding where mosquito larvae are found, efficacy monitoring, and emergency spraying when a public health threat exists. The control program begins in April when mosquito larvae are found in stagnant water such as red maple and cedar swamps, salt marshes, ditches, and woodland pools. Trapping adult mosquitoes begins in July. The mosquito control program ends in late September or early October when temperatures drop and daylight diminishes.

Homeowners can reduce the number of mosquitoes in their yard by emptying any outdoor containers that hold standing water such as buckets, trash barrels, and boats. Tires collect enough water for mosquitoes to survive. It is also a good idea to change the water in bird baths every two or three days.

If you're new in town and do not want your property treated for mosquitoes, then a written request is needed. Please send a letter to Dragon Mosquito Control, P.O. Box 46, Stratham, NH 03885. Be sure to include your name, physical address, phone number, and a description of your property with boundaries. Otherwise, your property may be treated. Anyone who sent a written request in 2011 may contact the office to reaffirm your request. Inquiries may be sent to info@dragonmosquito.com or call the office at 734-4144. You may call or email our office for assistance regarding mosquitoes, the insecticides we use, when we plan to spray, or questions about EEE or WNV.
